"UNFINISHED BUSINESS"



Another year, another slogan for the 2012 Florida State indoor volleyball team as it comes off its record-breaking 2011 campaign that included the program's first-ever trip to the NCAA Final Four.

Looked at as one of the programs that was "on the rise" since head coach Chris Poole accepted the FSU volleyball coaching position on June 10, 2008, the Seminoles have officially carved their name as a **National Contender** across the NCAA Volleyball realm.

When Poole first arrived in time for the 2008 season, the slogan was "Turning up the Heat" as he and the coaching staff were hoping to change the outlook of the program quickly. In 2009, FSU knew big things were ahead and proceeded to call the season of high expectations the "Dawn of a New Era," which was a pinpoint saying for the year as the Seminoles turned the corner and reached their first-ever NCAA Elite Eight.

In 2010, the slogan "We Believe" was implemented and for good reason as FSU made the NCAA Tournament once again despite a turbulent season filled with a rash of injuries and heartache away from the court.

Last season was coined as "Building on Success," which is exactly what the Garnet and Gold did in making its historic run to reach new program heights.

In 2012, there is much to look forward to once again. Although the Seminoles lose substantial pieces of their offensive attack, they've reloaded through enormous recruiting talent combined with some key returning pieces. Altogether, it is a year to prove that last season was not an aberration, and collegiate volleyball's biggest prize is attainable for a group of Noles who have "**Unfinished Business**" to take care of.

A RECOGNIZABLE NAME

The Rising Popularity of Florida State Volleyball has become well-known throughout the Tallahassee campus, with home matches routinely drawing a **vast amount of fans**. An FSU volleyball match at Tully Gym is known as one of the university athletics' most exciting events, highlighted by a packed gymnasium in the stands and dominant play on the court. Friday night matches at Tully Gym have become an **exciting tradition** for Tallahassee families and students in the community.

In 2011, the Seminoles averaged nearly 1,000 fans at its historic home site. On six occasions, FSU topped the quadruple digit mark highlighted by its NCAA first-round match against Albany that drew nearly 1,400 fans.

Florida State also made a strong **national presence** after filling up the seats against conference rival Miami for the first-ever ESPN televised match at Tully Gym in 2011. In front of a raucous home atmosphere, the Seminoles defeated 20th-ranked Miami in three straight sets to deliver an always-important nationally-televised victory.

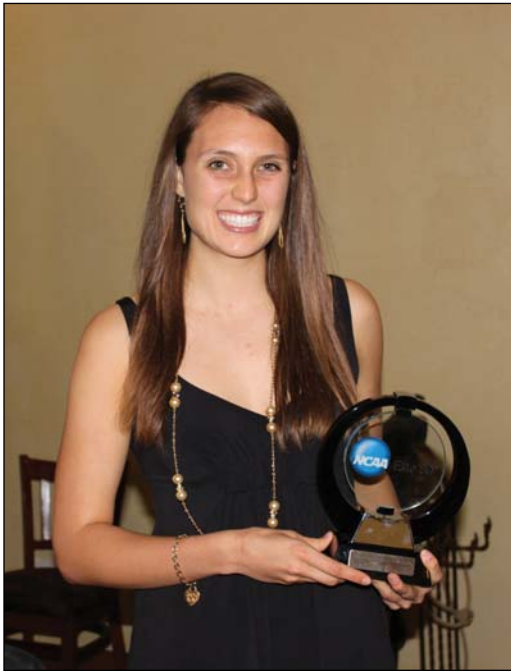
In fact, Florida State made a habit out of rising up in ESPN and FOX Sports broadcasts last season. The Seminoles went **5-1** in televised and webcasted contests between the two big sports networks, defeating Miami, Clemson, North Carolina State, Purdue and Iowa State in front of national audiences.

2012 SEASON OUTLOOK

Incoming Class for the Ages

Florida State lost four significant pieces from its 2011 NCAA Final Four squad, including All-Americans Jekaterina Stepanova and Visnja Djurdjevic as well as 2009 All-American Rachael Morgan. However, head coach Chris Poole and his staff did their best to compensate for the departed seniors by signing the third-ranked recruiting class in the nation that begins their Seminole careers this fall.

The highly-touted incoming freshmen include middle blockers Mara Green (McDonough, Ga.) and Sarah Burrington (Ruskin, Fla.) as well as outside hitters Nicole Walch (Stuart, Fla.) and Leah Mikesky (Schulenburg, Texas).

Sisterly Love

The Seminoles will have two sets of sisters on the team this season. Freshman outside hitter Nicole Walch joins older sister Elise, who was an important part at the right side last season. Freshman twin sisters Laura and Caroline Dadowski, both liberos from Pittsburgh, Pa., are also part of the squad and will look to add quality depth to the position.

The Glory Years

Just three Seminoles remain from Florida State's Elite Eight season in 2009 that jumpstarted its current run of unprecedented success.

Seminole seniors Fatma Yildirim (outside hitter/Istanbul, Turkey), Duygu Duzceler (setter/Istanbul, Turkey) and Sareea Freeman (middle blocker/Fresno, Calif.) are the only group of FSU student-athletes who have been a part of both an Elite Eight and a Final Four. All three have contributed largely to FSU's strong three-year run and look to end their careers on the right note.

Freeman, Wickstrom Represent Well

Seminole volleyball student-athletes Sareea Freeman and Sarah Wickstrom participated at the United States Women's National Volleyball A2 Tournament over the summer in Columbus, Ohio.

The two FSU standouts combined to help the USA Blue squad to a 4-1 mark at the tournament, where it faced other USA squads featuring some of the best intercollegiate players across the country. Over the last couple years, FSU has been well-represented with USA Volleyball participants. Last year, student-athletes Katie Mosher, Elise Walch and Nicole Walch competed for the A2 squad and won the European Global Challenge championship in Croatia.

Seminoles Heavy in Spotlight in 2012

Under the Atlantic Coast Conference's extended deal with ESPN, the Seminole volleyball team has loaded its schedule with several matches that will either be televised or streamed on

ESPN platforms or through regional sports networks.

As of August 22, FSU will have seven matches on the big stage, starting out with an ESPNU televised contest at Miami on Sept. 7 at 7:30 p.m. FSU also has five scheduled ESPN3 matches, with three on the road at Clemson (Oct. 21), N.C. State (Nov. 2) and North Carolina (Nov. 3). Its two home matches are Oct. 24 versus Florida and the Nov. 23 affair against Miami at 1 p.m. FSU will also have a match televised on RSN channels at Georgia Tech on Oct. 19.

Old School Poole

Ever since he came to FSU as head coach in 2008, head coach Chris Poole has always been a fan of tough scheduling. He is a big proponent of the ratings percentage index and understands there is a necessity for quality nonconference competition in helping your RPI and preparing you for the NCAA Championship.

This season, the Seminoles are slated to face three Elite Eight opponents from last year, including neutral-site contests against Pepperdine and Iowa State. FSU battles rival Florida, also an Elite Eight team, at home on Oct. 24 at 6 p.m.

Also part of the difficult nonconference schedule is a season opener at 2011 Southeastern Conference champion Tennessee as well as a neutral-site match against Cincinnati, which fell to the Seminoles in five sets of the NCAA second round last season.

Sareea Tackles All Challenges

Senior middle blocker Sareea Freeman enjoyed a fantastic junior year highlighted by her substantial play in the NCAA Elite Eight victory over Iowa State last year. But no matter how well she performs, perhaps nothing compares to the obstacles she has already overcome in her personal life.

Freeman grew up in a rough area of Fresno, Calif., forcing herself and her family to steer clear of drugs and crime in her neighborhood. When she was 11 years old, Freeman's mother lost her job and both her and Freeman were forced to live out of a car for several months.

Despite the incredible hardships faced, Freeman found volleyball as her escape and performed well enough in high school to get looked at by college coaches. A scholarship to Florida State has helped change her life, with coaches and other resources providing her immense support in her time in Tallahassee.

Freeman, who finished last season 37th nationally in blocks per set, is ready to culminate her Seminole volleyball career with her biggest year yet. But no matter how the season plays out, she has already become a success story by tackling her challenges and taking advantage of her opportunities at FSU.



2012 SEASON OUTLOOK

Middle Blocking Monsters

Prior to the start of the season, the strength of the Florida State volleyball team appears to be up front with a host of talented middle blockers.

The combination of reigning AVCA Honorable Mention All-American Ashley Neff, Sareea Freeman, Marija Milosavljevic and prized freshmen Sarah Burrington and Mara Green give the Seminoles one of the top blocking units in the nation.

Neff comes off an incredible sophomore campaign where she amassed 197 total blocks, the most in the nation. Freeman averaged 1.25 blocks per set and was tremendous in the NCAA postseason, while Milosavljevic has shown her potential in several matches, including a 12-block effort last season against Wake Forest.

In several positions, freshmen contributions will be relied upon. Both Burrington and Green expect to contribute right away as they learn from a trio of strong middle blockers in front of them.

The Stuart Connection

The area of South Florida is always a tremendous pipeline for all of Florida State athletics. The city of Stuart, Fla., in particular has been an impactful spot for the FSU volleyball squad as three members hail from there.

Sisters Elise and Nicole Walch, both from Martin County High School, and Sarah Wickstrom, a Jensen Beach High graduate, are important players for FSU in the present and going forward. All three student-athletes were nationally-ranked recruits at their respective positions coming out of high school, and both Wickstrom and Elise Walch were vital toward FSU's NCAA Final Four run in their first seasons.

Nicole, who enrolled early in January, will also have an opportunity to challenge for consistent playing time at the outside hitter position. All three players have shown how important it is for FSU to pick up quality players in South Florida.

Serbian Influence

The 2012 season will mark the sixth consecutive year that the Seminoles will carry at least one Serbian-born player on the roster, as junior college transfer Olivera Medic begins her FSU career.

Medic, who was a top-notch junior college performer at Western Wyoming, is tasked with helping fill the void left by fellow Serb Visnja Djurdjevic and Latvian-born Jekaterina Stepanova, who also excelled after JUCO. Head coach Chris Poole has said she will remind fans of Djurdjevic in that she possesses excellent ball control, passing and defense.

In recent years, FSU has had great luck with its Serbian-born players. In 2010 and 2011, Djurdjevic earned spots on the AVCA

All-America Honorable Mention Team, as did former Seminole outside hitter Mira Djuric in 2009.

Captain Katie

Early in the preseason, redshirt sophomore libero Katie Mosher earned her rightful spot as team captain. Judging by the leadership qualities she exuded last season, the Fort Myers, Fla., native is more than ready to lead the Seminoles going forward.

In just her first season of action, Mosher set the single-season school record of 604 digs. As a true freshman in 2010, she red-shirted behind senior libero Jenna Romanelli and continued to get better through the daily grinds of practice.

Now entering her third year at FSU, and with two years of eligibility left, Mosher has the talent to be an all-conference performer. She was at her best last season when it mattered most, putting together a fantastic performance in FSU's NCAA Sweet 16 win over Purdue when she amassed 28 digs in just four sets. Her excellent play throughout the year was a vital part in FSU making history in 2011.

Noles Ranked 12th in AVCA Preseason Poll

Despite the loss of three key seniors, the Florida State indoor volleyball team continues to garner high expectations in 2012 as it was ranked 12th in the American Volleyball Coaches Association preseason poll.

The Seminoles were the only Atlantic Coast Conference team to be placed in the preseason Top 25, with conference opponent North Carolina receiving the second-most votes outside the Top 25 while Miami also received votes.

A total of five opponents on this year's schedule were given preseason rankings, highlighted by 10th-ranked Iowa State. The Cyclones and Seminoles are set for a rematch of last season's Minneapolis Regional final won by FSU, as both teams square off at the Lady Vol Comcast Classic on Aug. 25.

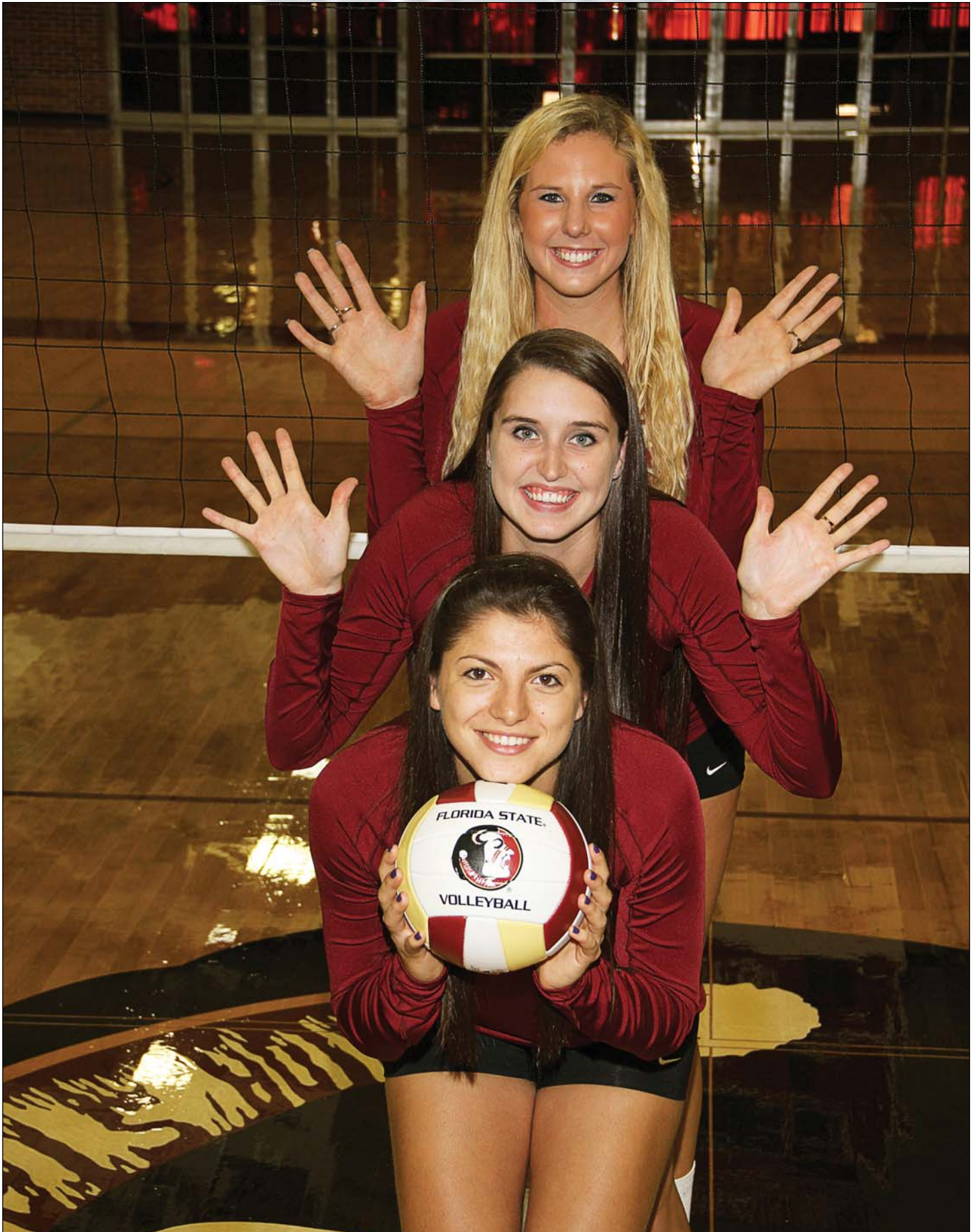
Pepperdine, another repeat opponent which earned a spot in last year's Elite Eight, enters the season ranked 11th. FSU opens the year against defending Southeastern Conference champion Tennessee on Aug. 24, as the Lady Volunteers show a No. 15 ranking.

In-state rival Florida, which visits Tallahassee on Oct. 24, is 18th in the poll. Ohio State rounds out the FSU opponents with a No. 24 ranking.

Throughout the year, FSU will have plenty of opportunities to defeat nationally-ranked opponents as it faces another difficult schedule. Last season, the Seminoles knocked off five Top 25 foes, including No. 8 Purdue, No. 14 Iowa State, No. 20 Miami, No. 23 Tulsa and No. 23 Dayton.

DUYGU DUZGELER



A talented setter who will form with sophomore Sarah Wickstrom once again in 2012 ... continuously puts her attackers in great position for kills ... improved defensively in her junior season as she looks to develop that aspect even more as a senior.

- A key piece behind FSU's nationally-known attack, generating 787 assists and 6.10 assists per set
- Showed off her talents behind the service line, putting together 26 service aces for the second most on the team
- Recorded six double-doubles, including two in the NCAA Regional Semifinal and Finals versus Purdue and Iowa State. Duzgeler posted 20 assists and 10 digs versus the Boilermakers and 35 assists and 14 digs against Iowa State
- Registered a career-best 37 assists in a five-set victory over Wake Forest on Oct. 2, 2011
- Tied career high with five kills at Virginia on Sept. 23, 2011
- Had three 30-plus assist totals, including 37 versus Wake Forest, 35 versus Iowa State and 32 at Wake Forest (11/11/11)
- Had career highs of 14 digs at Wake Forest and against Iowa State

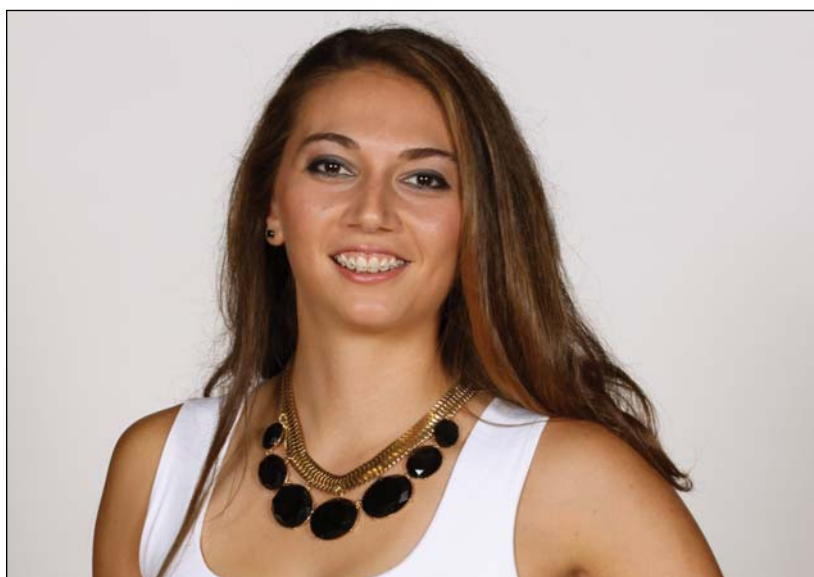

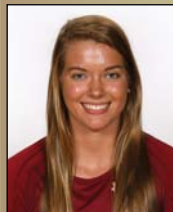

HEAD COACH CHRIS POOLE



The transformation has been thorough and quick.

When Chris Poole inherited the Florida State volleyball program in the summer of 2008, he took over a team that had failed to reach the 20-win plateau in five-straight seasons and hadn't been to the NCAA Tournament since 2002. It was a program looking for answers; a program looking to get back to the winning ways it had grown accustomed to in the 1980s and early '90s.

Four years later, Poole, associate head coach Holly Watts and assistant coach Gokhan Yilmaz have made their mark and revitalized a program that has built itself into a national contender. That notion became a fact in 2011, when Poole led the Seminoles to their first-ever NCAA national semifinal appearance in what was a startling year to say the least.

In 2011, FSU earned its third ACC title and its second in the last three seasons while finishing with a 28-7 overall record and an 18-2 mark within the conference. The Seminoles entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 12 national seed and began the Field of 64 by defeating Albany and Cincinnati in Tully Gym. From there, FSU upset No. 5 Purdue in four sets in the Sweet 16 and defeated fourth-seeded Iowa State in five sets in the Elite Eight in Minneapolis to achieve a feat that many deemed unthinkable when Poole and his staff first arrived.

FSU became the first ACC volleyball team to ever advance to the final round of four, where it eventually lost to NCAA champion UCLA in the national semifinal at the Alamodome in

San Antonio. FSU was the only team in the final four that had gotten through its regional in which both Sweet 16 and Elite Eight opponents were nationally-seeded. In his four seasons leading the Seminoles, Poole has compiled eight of FSU's nine NCAA postseason wins, showing an 8-3 mark in championship play.

As a result of FSU's historical 2011 campaign, Poole helped the Seminoles achieve their highest national ranking ever as they finished at No. 7 in the final AVCA Poll. FSU also finished with the seventh-best RPI in the nation. Poole capped his incredible season by being named the ACC Coach of the Year for the second time as well as the AVCA East Region Coach of the Year. He coached AVCA Second-Team All-American Jekaterina Stepanova to a career year as well as AVCA Honorable Mention All-Americans Visnja Djurdjevic and Ashley Neff.

The Seminoles earned 21 wins in Poole's first season in 2008 and then followed that up with an incredible 2009 campaign. FSU not only posted a 31-3 overall record, but under Poole's tutelage the 'Noles captured their first outright regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference championship in school history and made it to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

In addition to those program firsts, Poole's Seminoles also set the school standard for most conference wins in a season with 19 and ACC wins in a row with 16, which was then tied by the 2011 team. A national ranking of No. 11 was the highest ever for a Florida State volleyball team at the time and its No. 3 national seed in the Big Dance continues to be the highest ever.

For his squad's multiple successes, Poole garnered ACC Coach of the Year and AVCA Division I East Region Coach of the Year honors.

He also coached a handful of players that generated quite a few accolades. Brianna Barry became the first Seminole to ever be named the ACC's Player of the Year and she also garnered AVCA Division I Second-Team All-American honors. Barry, an ESPN The Magazine Academic All First-Team member, was joined by Jordana Price, Mira Djuric and Rachael Morgan on the 2009 All-ACC Team - a record at FSU for most players on that list in one season. Price, Djuric and Morgan also each achieved an AVCA Division I Honorable

Mention All-American nod. Poole also coached an ACC All-Freshman Team performer in Fatma Yildirim.

The 2010 season featured several roadblocks for the Seminoles, ranging from life-altering misfortunes off the court to devastating injuries that inhibited the team's continuity. Despite all the hardships, the gutsy FSU squad finished 22-11, including 12-8 within the ACC. Several program feats were accomplished - making back-to-back postseason appearances for the first time in over a decade, advancing to the second round of the NCAA Championship in consecutive years for the first time in school history and finishing with at least 20 wins for the third straight season.

Veterans Jenna Romanelli and Stephanie Neville capped off their four-year careers in excellent fashion. Junior outside hitter Djurdjevic was one of the top transfers in the country, being named an AVCA Honorable Mention All-American and an AVCA Honorable Mention All-East Region member. She joined Neville as members of the All-ACC Team as well.

The fact that Poole has breathed life in the FSU volleyball program should come as no surprise as he brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the school after heading the program at the University of Arkansas for 14 accomplished seasons.

Poole started Arkansas' volleyball program in 1994 and was not only successful, but led the Lady Razorbacks to 11 Southeastern Conference Western Division titles. Add to that 11 postseason appearances - two NIVC and nine NCAA - along with an SEC Tournament title and numerous individual player honors.

Upon arriving in Fayetteville, Ark. in 1993, Poole personally handled every element of building the program from buying the first pieces of equipment, hiring the assistants and recruiting the players, to renovating the court and building locker room facilities.

With head coaching stints at Arkansas, Arkansas State and Arkansas Tech, Poole earned a 550-230 career record in 21 seasons prior to his hiring at FSU and had been named conference coach of the year seven times and was pegged the South Region Coach of the Year in 1997.



During his 14 seasons at Arkansas, in which he compiled a 316-161 record, Poole produced two AVCA All-Americans, three AVCA Honorable Mention All-Americans, 24 players with 44 All-SEC honors, three SEC Freshmen of the Year and 25 AVCA All-District/All-Region honorees. In addition to the success on the court, Poole's Arkansas teams excelled in the classroom as well with 67 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, 10 CoSIDA All-District selections, two H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete finalists and one McWhorter winner.

Poole certainly made his mark in the SEC as he guided Arkansas to a 159-65 record in the SEC regular season for a 71 percent league-winning mark. Poole and the Lady Razorbacks were even more impressive against the Western Division, winning 11 of 14 titles.

Poole spent an entire year away from competition preparing for the Razorback's inaugural season in 1994 and it was time well spent as he led Arkansas to a 19-17 overall record, a 10-5 SEC mark and an SEC Western Division title with a perfect 10-0 divisional record in the first year of competition. The Lady Razorbacks finished third overall in the league that year and played well enough to earn a postseason bid to the National Invitational Volleyball Coaches tournament in Kansas City where they finished seventh in a field of 20 teams. Poole was selected as the 1994 SEC Coach of the Year while two of his players earned All-SEC honors and one player earned All-District honors.

Poole's ability to build a program was proven first with Arkansas Tech then at Arkansas State. He took over days prior to the 1987 season at ASU and his first team showed the effects with an 8-24 record. But with one season under Poole's careful tutelage, virtually the same team was 41-1 the next year, launching a five-year run of winning seasons for the Lady Indians.

His 1988 team had a 33-match win streak, longest in the nation, and posted a school-record 41-1 overall mark. The next year, ASU had a 34-match win streak, notched a Lady Indian record with 43 wins (43-6 overall) and was ranked ninth in the South Region.

In his last season at ASU, the Lady Indians were 41-6 and received an automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament in 1992. ASU entered the 32-team NCAA field with the most wins of any team, but lost a tough four-game match to

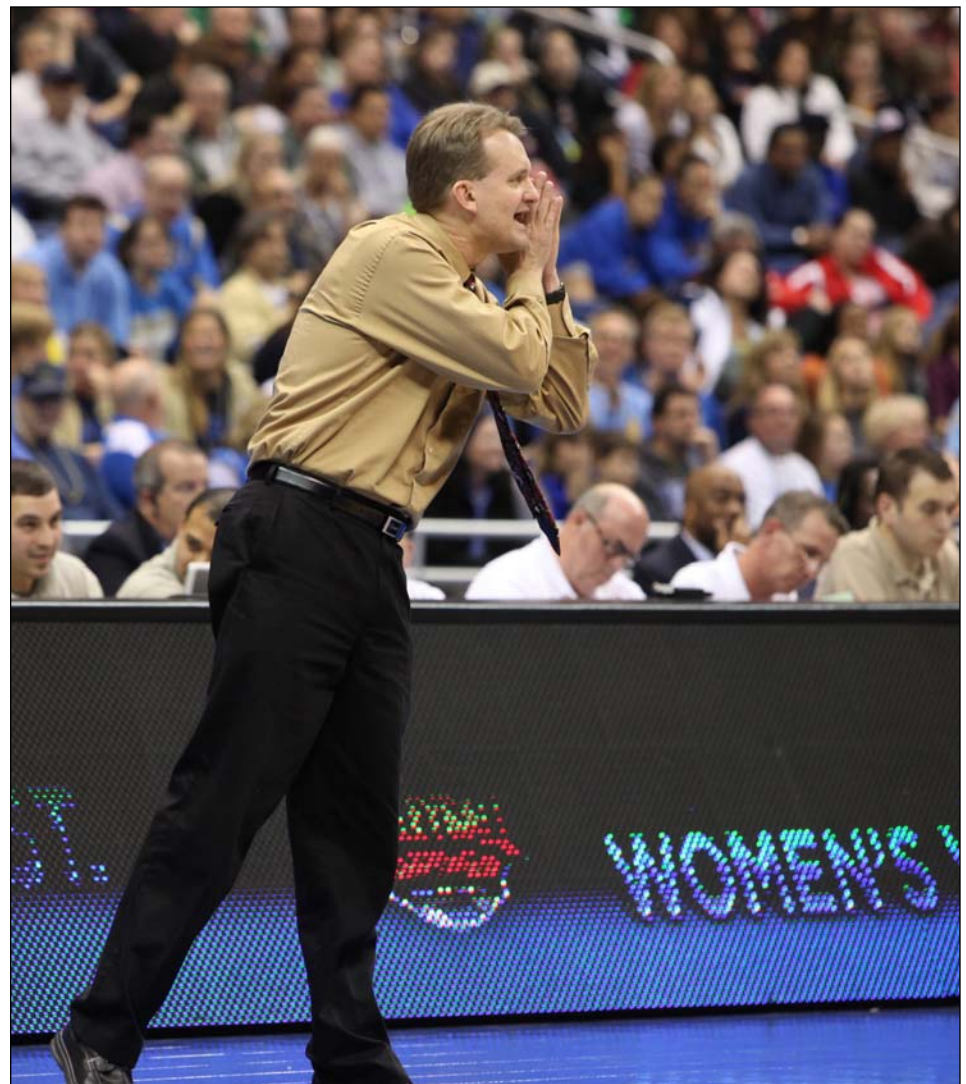
the Northwest Region's top-seeded team, Long Beach State.

Prior to ASU, Poole was an assistant and later head coach at Arkansas Tech. In two seasons as head coach at ATU, he posted a 53-20 record, winning the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference title in 1985 as co-head coach and finishing runner-up as head coach in 1986. He started his collegiate career in 1983 as a graduate assistant for the nationally ranked Arkansas Tech Golden Suns. Tech was 58-9 with a perfect 24-0 conference mark in two seasons with Poole as an assistant coach.

A native of Heber Springs in north-central Arkansas, Poole is a 1983 graduate of Arkansas Tech and earned a master's degree from there in 1989. He is a member of the American Volleyball

Coaches Association and has served on the AVCA's All-American, All-South Region and All-South Region Ranking committees and is also an AVCA Top 25 voter.

Poole and his wife, Toni, a former Arkansas State track and field standout, have two children, son Joshua and daughter Taylor.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH HOLLY WATTS



Playing a vital role in the resurgence of Florida State volleyball has been associate head coach Holly Watts, who will be entering her fifth season at FSU.

Watts is coming off a historical campaign in which she collected the AVCA National Assistant Coach of the Year Award after making the Seminoles one of the nation's top blocking units in 2011. Having already improved FSU's block since arriving in Tallahassee in 2008, Watts helped raise the Seminoles' blocks-per-set average to 2.98 for the seventh-best mark in the nation as well as the best in the ACC.

Watts' impact on her student-athletes could be summed up in the significant rise of standout middle blocker Ashley Neff, who led the country with 197 total blocks and finished fifth with 1.55 blocks per set. Watts also helped mold middle blocker Sareea Freeman into a formidable presence, as she broke through with 1.25 blocks per set to finish 37th nationally. Altogether, FSU produced double-digit blocking totals in 21 of its 35 matches played, including an unprecedented 26 blocks at N.C. State on Oct. 9, 2011.

Simply put, it was what Watts taught that paved FSU to its best season in school history in 2011. The Seminoles' run to the NCAA national semifinal was largely due to the team's ability to combat offensive attacks, which was shown on a national stage when FSU recorded 15 blocks in a victory over fifth-seeded Purdue in the Sweet 16 and 16 blocks against fourth-seeded Iowa State to advance to the Final Four in San Antonio.

After helping head coach Chris Poole build the University of Arkansas volleyball program into a consistent NCAA postseason team, Watts has done the same in Tallahassee as the Seminoles also finished with two of their best seasons in program history in 2009 and 2010. In 2009, FSU earned its

second regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference championship in school history and reached the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever. Watts helped coach a team that also set the school record for most wins in the ACC (19) and most conference wins in a row (16). FSU also garnered a No. 11 ranking in the entire country, which was also a program best until the 2011 squad ended with a No. 7 spot.

Watts' effective coaching style was key yet again for FSU in 2010, helping guide Visnja Djurdjevic and Stephanie Neville to stellar seasons while meshing in a talented blend of newcomers and transfers. The result was another trip to the NCAA Tournament for a unit that amassed a 22-11 overall record.

Although her duties have been many and varied, one of Watts' most critical jobs has been to coordinate all of the recruiting efforts including correspondence, evaluation, visits and tracking athletes at Florida State.

She is also in charge of scheduling the fall and spring travel for the team and coordinating many of the day-to-day activities in the office.

Prior to Florida State, Watts joined the Arkansas program in 1996. The Lady Razorbacks accomplished a 262-129 record, nine Southeastern Conference Western Division titles and nine NCAA Tournament appearances with Watts in the second chair. Her hard work and commitment to the program was rewarded at the conclusion of the 2002 season when she was promoted to associate head coach.

Just as she does now at Florida State, Watts served as the primary coach for the middle blockers and quick attack at Arkansas. Her blocking talents are evident as the Lady Razorbacks consistently ranked in the top of the SEC and the nation in blocking during her 12-year stint.

Watts' impact was immediate at Florida State in 2008 when the team finished sixth in the ACC with a 2.32 blocks-per-set average after finishing in 12th (last place) with only 1.96 blocks per game average in 2007. In 2009, the 'Noles finished second in the league in the category with a mark of 2.51 blocks per set, and ended in second yet again in 2010 with 2.42 blocks per set. Watts helped elevate the play of middle blockers Lauren Young and Freeman in creating one of the best blocking tandems in the ACC in 2010.

Watts coached the best blockers in Arkansas volleyball history, including All-Americans Jessica Field and Kim Storey along with Sara Kincaid, an honorable mention All-American, and many all-conference and all-district selections. In the previous two seasons at FSU, she coached All-Americans

Jordana Price and Brianna Barry, who also earned ACC Player of the Year honors in 2009.

Watts also played a vital role with the summer camps where she helped build Arkansas from ground level to averaging around 600 campers. At Florida State, she now plays an important role in drawing all talent levels to FSU in an effort to introduce volleyball to beginners and elite players alike.

While with the Lady Razorback program, Watts founded Ozark Juniors Volleyball Club, which played nationally and provided playing opportunities for all ages. Watts also served on the board for Ozark Juniors, which has continued to expand with each season.

Watts was invited to assist with the U.S. National Team for several weeks in the summer of 1998, working with the country's elite volleyball players and with then-head coach Mick Haley.

As an athlete, the former Holly Graham helped the University of Texas to national dominance and was the Lady Longhorns' MVP as a senior. An all-conference pick, she was an All-SWC and All-SWC Tournament selection as well as being named to the all-South region team in her final year. She went on to play basketball in her final year before graduating with a degree in Kinesiology from the University of Texas in 1994.

Watts, a Devine, Texas, native, began her coaching career while in college working with Haley at the University of Texas volleyball camps. Watts accepted the assistant coaching job at Texas-Arlington in 1994, a position she held until going to Arkansas in the spring of 1996.

Watts is married to John Watts and the couple has two sons, Jeremiah and Jared.

ASSISTANT COACH **GOKHAN YILMAZ**



Gokhan Yilmaz is heading into his fifth season at Florida State after joining the staff in 2008 following two seasons as an assistant coach for the Arkansas Lady Razorbacks under current FSU coach Chris Poole.

Yilmaz's primary role is the team's training coordinator where he is in charge of the day-to-day training while working to enhance the skills of all players. Yilmaz has also taken on an expanded recruiting role to help establish Seminole volleyball at the regional, national and international level.

Yilmaz played a significant part in FSU volleyball's historic 2011 season in which it reached its first NCAA national semifinal in the school's 44-year history. Yilmaz has proven to be an extremely effective instructor in drawing up match plans for the opposition, which is part of his daily teachings to his student-athletes. The knowledgeable assistant coach's strategies for scouting the opposition, teaching the fundamentals to his team and motivating his student-athletes has made him a tremendous asset to the FSU coaching staff.

In 2011, Yilmaz helped several FSU players fulfill their individual goals. Outside hitter Jekaterina Stepanova became just the second non-honorable mention All-American in school history by earning AVCA Second-Team honors, while Visnja Djurdjevic joined Ashley Neff in earning AVCA Honorable Mention All-America honors. In addition, three Seminoles in Neff, Djurdjevic and Stepanova made the All-ACC Team while freshman setter Sarah Wickstrom was an all-conference freshman.

In the recruiting realm, Yilmaz helped make an enormous splash with the signing of four players ranked in the Top 53 of the PrepVolleyball.com senior class rankings. The standout athletes include middle blockers Sarah Burrington and Mara Green and outside hitters Nicole Walch and Leah Mikesky.

His efforts have been rewarded with a strong 2009 recruiting class that included two National Team-level players from his home country of Turkey and an up-and-coming middle blocker from California. Outside hitter Fatma Yildirim and setter Duygu Duzceler made the transition to American volleyball from Turkey and became key contributors as true freshman in 2009 with Yildirim even earning ACC All-Freshman team honors. Sareea Freeman has also made great strides in her first three years after playing behind veteran stars Brianna Barry and Jordana Price in 2009.

As for the 2010 recruiting class, Yilmaz once again helped to land a group of talented prospects that continue to push the program to new heights. In addition to Americans Ashley Neff and Katie Mosher, Yilmaz helped in the signing of junior college All-American transfers Jekatarina Stepanova (Riga, Latvia) and Patricia Figueiredo (Rio de Janeiro, Brazil) from Missouri State University-West Plains. Both JUCO transfers aided the Seminoles tremendously in a return run to the NCAA Championship.

Yilmaz continued his splendid recruiting efforts for the 2011 season by helping land standout setter Wickstrom of Stuart, Fla, who is an All-ACC freshman.

Yilmaz had a busy spring in 2009 after being selected as an assistant coach for the Florida Region Girls Junior National Team. This allowed him to make inroads in the Florida recruiting base and gave him a chance to work with plenty of young talent.

While at Arkansas with Poole and FSU associate head coach Holly Watts, Yilmaz went to work on re-energizing practices as the training coordinator for the Lady Razorbacks. He was also involved with recruiting by making trips both nationally and internationally to spread the Lady Razorbacks' name.

Yilmaz's first exposure to Arkansas came in the spring of 2005 when he worked with the Lady Razorbacks as a volunteer coach. Prior to Arkansas, Yilmaz was at Northwood, where he helped the Timberwolves to a regional semifinal in 2005 with a 23-11 overall record. They were conference runners-up with a 14-4 mark that same season. Northwood was 16-11 and had three players selected to the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic all-conference team in 2006.

Also at Northwood, Yilmaz coached a first team All-American and Regional Player of the Year in Gorana Maricic, as well as four other All-Conference players. Yilmaz was also in charge of camps, recruiting and training for the Timberwolves.

Yilmaz got his coaching start in the United States as an assistant at Cameron University from 2003 to 2004 and at Western New Mexico from 2002 to 2003. Before coming to the states, Yilmaz worked for various club programs in Istanbul, Turkey, as well as with the Turkish National Team. While working with the Turkish National Team, Yilmaz guided multiple age groups to eight National Titles. He also worked with the Turkish Junior National Team during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. He has also worked with national team coaches from Cuba, Russia and Bulgaria, assisting in their practices and working in the physical training aspect of the game.

Yilmaz received his bachelor's degree in European Studies in 2002 from Istanbul University and completed his master's degree in Sports Psychology while coaching at Cameron in 2005.

2011 SEASON IN REVIEW

"ONE FOR THE BOOKS"

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (Seminoles.com) - In a year like never before for the Florida State volleyball team, the 2011 season can be summed up in one word: historical.

FSU volleyball's unforgettable campaign was a season of firsts, with none standing out more than the Seminoles' incredible march to their first-ever NCAA national semifinals. It was a journey that was nearly unpredictable, yet as the gritty bunch blossomed throughout the year they knew the possibility was within their reach.

Were the 2011 Seminoles the most talented group in school history? Who knows. Did they achieve the best record in school history? No, the 2009 squad that went to the NCAA Elite Eight ended up with a tremendous 31-3 mark. But what this group of Seminoles showed was how far a cohesive unit can go when it works in sync and executes well enough in some of the game's most crucial aspects.

Through a majority of the season, FSU was a talented, well-oiled machine on defense with one of the most fearsome blocking duos in the program's 44-year history. The Seminoles finished seventh nationally with nearly three blocks per set, and opponents knew whenever they went up against FSU they'd have to figure out ways to hit around the vaunted block of sophomore Ashley Neff and junior Sareea Freeman. The exceptional performers combined for 353 total blocks, including Neff's 197 which is the sixth-most in school history and the most nationally.

If the defense was enough to provoke headaches by the opposition, FSU's offense soared this season with another entertaining pair that included senior outside hitters Jekaterina Stepanova and Visnja Djurdjevic. The left-side players possessed different styles of attacking in carrying the offense, where Stepanova and her team-best 421 kills were based more on aggression and power while Djurdjevic also had plenty of strength but was craftier with her shots. Together, both players were the perfect compliments to a unit that finished 20th nationwide with a .259 hitting percentage.

In hindsight, it was the individual accomplishments of every player in head coach Chris Poole's 6-2 offense that made the season so special. Like any good team, each player specialized in a certain role and executed it to the best of their abilities. Each player's ability to step up, whether it was record-breaking redshirt freshman libero Katie Mosher's knack for keeping rallies alive or setter Duygu Duzceler's penchant for putting her hitters in great position, contributed greatly to FSU's 28-7 overall record and third ACC championship.

Perhaps this upstart squad's dreams and aspirations should have been realized from the start. It was opening night when the Seminoles sent a message that they would not be pushed over when they swept a Kentucky squad that ended up reaching the Sweet 16. In front of a raucous Tully Gym crowd, FSU won in convincing fashion, which included a memorable 25-8 win in the second set as Neff highlighted the match with an impressive 10 blocks in just three sets of action.

FSU would go on to win the annual FSU Invitational, sweeping future NCAA postseason opponent Albany and defeating then-No. 23 Tulsa. Stepanova, who was named an AVCA Second-Team All-American this season, combined for 26 kills, 31 digs and a .339 hitting percentage in three eye-opening wins to earn tournament MVP honors.

Coming off a strong opening weekend, the Seminoles received a dose of reality when they visited a crowded Stephen O'Connell Center in Gainesville, Fla., to face the Gators. FSU was unable to get the job done, falling in three sets despite holding large leads in the second and third sets. In the end, the Seminoles never let the loss affect them as they reached a farther point in the NCAA Championship

than UF for the second time in the last three years.

The Seminoles then traveled to the Delaware Invitational on Sept. 2 and faced a tough Northern Iowa squad that wound up finishing with one of the best RPI's in the nation. The match proved costly to FSU as it marked the only time the Seminoles let a two-set lead slip away, falling to UNI in five which included a 15-13 defeat in the final set. FSU got back on track with consecutive wins over Delaware and California-Irvine in three sets apiece. Against the Anteaters, Stepanova led the charge again by racking up 19 kills and a .600 hitting percentage. As a team, FSU hit .481 versus UCI, the third-highest percentage by an ACC team in 2011.

The Dayton Marriott Flyer Classic was looked at as a measuring-stick tournament to help gauge where FSU stood as it wrapped up its non-conference portion of the schedule. However, the trip turned out to be a sobering experience as the Seminoles opened up with a three-set loss to Michigan, allowing the Wolverines to hit .410 in the match to mark the highest percentage by an opponent since Poole took over in 2008. FSU rebounded with a quality win over then-No. 23 Dayton on the road, rallying behind Stepanova and Djurdjevic's combined 38 kills and

Neff and Freeman's combined 15 blocks.

The final match of the trip turned out to be a 3-1 loss to Elite Eight squad Pepperdine, leaving FSU on a sour note as it returned to Tallahassee needing to prepare for a nationally-televised match against a difficult Miami squad that already showed wins over Oklahoma and Pepperdine.

Perhaps it was on Sept. 14 when the turning point occurred in FSU's memorable season. Playing on ESPN2 in front of 1,307 fans at Tully Gym, FSU turned on the jets and got a great effort out of right-side hitter Elise Walch to sweep the Hurricanes. Walch, a Stuart, Fla., native, finished with 12 kills on 17 attacks for a .706 hitting percentage, earning ACC Player of the Week honors.

Following its win over Miami, FSU made it known that it was a force to be reckoned with. The Seminoles strung together 16 consecutive wins, becoming just the fourth team in ACC history to show a 16-0 conference record. The winning streak was the fourth-longest in school history, and it began with wins over Miami, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Duke that were in straight sets.

One of FSU's landmark wins in the conference came on Oct. 7 at UNC, when both teams entered the match with identical 5-0 ACC records. Falling behind in the first set, the Seminoles rattled off three consecutive set victories as it was powered by 20 team blocks. The next match, FSU won a hard-fought five-setter at N.C. State behind an amazing 26 team blocks.

The Seminoles' entertaining run in the ACC came to an end when they fell at Duke on Nov. 13, losing in five sets at Cameron Indoor Stadium. However, FSU would earn its fourth ACC championship the following weekend on the road, getting past Clemson in front of an ESPN3.com audience in four sets and winning over Georgia Tech in four sets as well. The matches were important not only because they solidified FSU's second conference crown in the past three years, but showed its toughness in playing in front of boisterous fan bases and still coming away with wins.

FSU would then find out on the ESPN2 Selection Show that it was a deserving 12th seed in the NCAA Tournament, and hosted Albany once again as well as Cincinnati. FSU cruised past the Great Danes behind Stepanova's 16 kills and .467 hitting percentage, and managed to get past a difficult Cincinnati team in a nail-biter that went to five sets in the second round. The victory sent the Seminoles to a familiar place - Minneapolis for the NCAA Sweet 16.

Awaiting the Seminoles in cold Minnesota was a fifth-seeded Purdue squad that featured one of the

nation's best attackers in Ariel Turner. FSU was unfazed and turned the match around quickly after trailing 21-13 in the opening set before winning the first frame and staying in control throughout the match. Led by Mosher's 28 digs in just four sets, FSU recorded a season-high 104 digs and took the Boilermaker attack out of their game to win convincingly.

FSU's win meant another shot at an Elite Eight opponent, where the program reached two seasons ago before falling to host Minnesota. This time, fourth-seeded Iowa State stood opposite the Seminoles. Once again, FSU showed its mettle by winning the opening set before the Cyclones tied up the match with a 25-23 win in set two. Both teams dueled to an incredible five-set affair, but FSU came out on top as it was guided by Stepanova's 20 kills and Freeman's double-double of 12 kills and 10 blocks. In what will be one of the most memorable plays in FSU volleyball history, Djurdjevic delivered a match-ending service ace to send FSU into euphoria as it reached the NCAA national semifinals in San Antonio in the Alamodome. Indeed, FSU was headed to collegiate volleyball's biggest stage.

In its 14th NCAA appearance in school history, FSU volleyball finally got over the hump and reached the final round of four. The Seminoles were the lone double-digit seed, as they joined ninth-seeded UCLA, seventh-seeded USC and third-seeded Illinois in San Antonio. FSU was looking to become the lowest seed to ever win an NCAA championship, hoping to eclipse No. 11 Stanford's feat in 2004.

Despite enjoying an unforgettable and unpredictable journey to the national semifinals, FSU was unable to get past NCAA champion UCLA as it fell in three sets. The loss ended a record-breaking season that put a charge into North Florida as the team's thorough coverage on television networks and

newspapers signified just how special the program, let alone the season, had become.

FSU's fan base truly wrapped around the team in 2011, as the Seminoles finished with an unblemished 12-0 record in front of the home faithful (not including tournament wins over Albany and Cincinnati). Tully Gym emerged as an intimidating place to play on Friday nights, with the average attendance reaching into the 1,000s for ACC matches. With fans packing the gym and FSU's prominent play unfolding throughout the year, the times show that the Seminole volleyball program is becoming one of the next great things to hit the Tallahassee area.

Besides its local impact, FSU volleyball entered the season looking to make a statement to the rest of the nation after finishing the 2010 season on a difficult note. With a collective group determined to prove to the state and nation just how strong Seminole volleyball is, several goals were achieved in a momentous journey that no fan will ever forget. Indeed, 2011 was an exceptional year for Poole and his gang. It was one that FSU fans will savor, one that could be a starting point for an incredible run in the upcoming years.

And undoubtedly, the recent season is one that will be put in historical perspective several years down the road. The season was truly one for the books.



2011 SEASON ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Made the first NCAA National Semifinal appearance in the school's 44-year history (the first NCAA women's volleyball tournament was played in 1981).
- Of the four teams in the NCAA Final Four, FSU Volleyball was the only team to defeat two nationally-seeded teams in the Sweet 16 and Elite Eight, winning over fifth-seeded Purdue and fourth-seeded Iowa State.
- FSU finished the season with the No. 7 RPI and also ended the year with the program's highest ranking ever in the AVCA at No. 7.
- The Seminole volleyball program has nine victories in NCAA Tournament play. Since head coach Chris Poole arrived in 2008, he has led FSU to eight of those victories. Since Poole's arrival, the Seminoles are 8-3 in the NCAA Tournament.
- FSU was this year's lone double-digit seed in the Final Four, being seeded 12th. It was the seventh time a double-digit seed made the Final Four since the current seeding format began in 2000. It was just the second time the program has earned a national seed in the NCAA Field.
- The Seminoles became the first ACC volleyball team to ever make an appearance in the NCAA National Semifinals.
- In 2011, FSU defeated at least one school from five of the six BCS conferences. The only conference it did not get a win against was the Pac-12.
- FSU faced 16 opponents in 2011 who were in the NCAA Field of 64 and showed an impressive record of 13-7 against those postseason squads. The Seminoles owned multiple wins over NCAA Tournament teams Albany and North Carolina.
- Based on the AVCA Poll, FSU volleyball tied for its highest-ranked win in the Poole era when it defeated eighth-ranked Purdue in the NCAA Sweet 16 on Dec. 9. The win matched FSU's victory over No. 8 Illinois on Sept. 4, 2009.
- Based on the AVCA Poll, the Seminoles defeated five nationally-ranked opponents in 2011. Those teams include No. 8 Purdue, No. 14 Iowa State, No. 20 Miami, No. 23 Tulsa and No. 23 Dayton. FSU also defeated Kentucky in its season opener, as the Wildcats ended the year ranked 13th.
- The Seminoles became just the second school from Florida to make the NCAA Final Four.
- FSU finished in the Top 20 nationally in three key statistics. The Seminoles were seventh with 2.98 blocks per set, 18th in winning percentage at .800 and 20th with a .259 hitting percentage.
- FSU's five-set victory in the second round against Cincinnati marked coach Poole's 650th of his career and his 100th at FSU.
- FSU finished 14-0 at Tully Gym in 2011, with 12 of those wins counting as actual home matches while the final two NCAA Tournament matches are counted as neutral-site matches.
- The Seminoles clinched their second ACC championship in the last three seasons by defeating Georgia Tech by a 3-1 score on Nov. 19. FSU finished with

an 18-2 ACC record, and shows ACC titles in 1998, 2009 and 2011.

- At one point, FSU was 16-0 in the ACC to become just the fourth ACC team to show such a record. FSU's attempt to become the first 17-0 team in ACC history was snapped against Duke.
- FSU held a 16-match win streak, all within the ACC. The streak was the fourth-longest in school history overall.
- Only two of FSU's nine ACC opponents at home took it beyond three sets.
- FSU owned four of the ACC's six nonconference wins over Top 25 teams.
- Within conference play, FSU showed three of the top nine blockers in blocks per set (Ashley Neff, Sareea Freeman, Rachael Morgan)
- FSU's victory at UNC on Oct. 7 marked its best ACC start ever at 6-0
- Won first four ACC matches in straight sets, a span of 12 sets. The last time it swept four straight ACC opponents was in 1998.
- Head coach Chris Poole holds a winning or tying record versus every ACC team since coming to FSU in 2008.
- Made an NCAA Tournament three-peat for the first time since joining the ACC in 1991.
- Now has four straight seasons of 20-plus wins since joining the ACC. Only did that twice in a row before (1992-93, 1997-98)
- Signed arguably one of the nation's top recruiting classes, getting four players ranked in the Top 53 of the Prepvolleyball.com senior class rankings
- Earned six victories against Top 25 RPI teams based on the final rankings
- Attracted over 11,000 fans at Tully Gym during the regular season. FSU averaged exactly 1,000 fans in ACC home matches
- Became the fourth-fastest team to reach 20 victories in school history, needing just 24 matches to reach the number

2011 Accomplishments in the ACC

- Finished with an undefeated home record during the regular season for the first time since joining the ACC (12-0).
- Became just the fourth team in ACC history to show a 16-0 record in conference play. FSU's attempt to become the first 17-0 team in ACC history was snapped against Duke.
- Clinched its third ACC Championship.
- Held a 16-match win streak, all within the ACC. The streak was the fourth-longest in school history overall.
- Only two of FSU's nine ACC opponents at home took it beyond three sets.
- Only eight of FSU's 20 ACC matches saw its opponents hit above .200 against them.
- Owned four of the ACC's six nonconference wins over Top 25 teams.
- Had three of the top nine blockers in conference play.
- Victory at UNC on Oct. 7 marked best ACC start ever at 6-0.
- Won first four ACC matches in straight sets, a span of 12 sets. Last time it swept four straight ACC opponents was in 1998.
- Head coach Chris Poole holds a winning or tying record versus every ACC team since coming to FSU in 2008.
- Has made an NCAA Tournament three-peat for the first time since joining the ACC in 1991.
- Has four straight seasons of 20-plus wins. Only did that twice in a row since joining the ACC (1992-93, 1997-98).

- The Seminoles' top-ranked win according to the AVCA Poll occurred on four occasions, defeating eighth-ranked Florida twice (Sept. 7, 1993 & Oct. 31, 1994), Illinois (Sept. 4, 2009) and Purdue (Dec. 9, 2011).

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now, in its 60th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 127 national championships, including 67 in women's competition and 60 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 145 times in men's competition and 104 times in women's action.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the University of Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be five national football titles for the ACC. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981 while Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990. Florida State pocketed national titles No. 4 and 5 in 1993 and 1999.

Additionally, Miami has laid claim to five national gridiron titles over the past 29 seasons. Four of the Hurricanes' five national titles (1983, 1987, 1989, 2001) were unanimous with both the sportswriters and coaches polls, while in 1991 Miami (AP) shared the national title with Washington (coaches).

The 12 institutions that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 586 first- or second-team gridiron All-Americans and 73 first-team academic All-Americans.

ACC Football, though, has always been about more than just wins and losses and individual athletics honors. For the sixth time in the last seven years, ACC schools, cumulatively, were ranked higher nationally than any other conference in the most recent rankings of American Universities by the U.S. News & World Report, with seven ACC institutions ranked 38th or higher nationally and all 12 schools rated as "Tier One" schools.

The Conference was No. 1 in the NCAA's APR for the sixth consecutive year in 2012, and the ACC has led all Football Bowl Subdivision Conferences in the NCAA's graduation rate (GSR) in six of the last seven years. In 2011, six ACC schools were honored nationally (AFCA) for their graduation rates. ACC schools have led the nation in football graduation rates no fewer than 20 times and have been honored for their rates 101 times, far more than any other conference.

Since becoming a 12-team league in 2005, the ACC has consistently made history in the NFL's annual professional football draft. This year, the ACC had 15 of the first 100 players chosen in the NFL Draft, and had the first linebacker chosen.

In the 2009 NFL Draft, the ACC was the only league with four players chosen among the top nine selections in the draft. It marked the second time in four years the ACC had managed that trick, also claiming four of the top nine picks in 2005. During the 2006, 2007 and 2008 drafts, the Conference became the first college league in the history to have two of the top four NFL Draft picks in each of three consecutive years.

In 2008, the ACC also set an NFL Draft record having the first defensive player chosen for three straight years with NC State's Mario Williams (2006), Clemson's Gaines Adams (2007) and Virginia's Chris Long (2008) claiming the honor.

The ACC's run began with the 2006 Draft when the Conference set an NFL Draft record with 12 players chosen in the first round and 51 players chosen overall. During that time, the ACC is second among all conferences in the last seven years in first-round draftees, having 40 chosen, and total number of draftees with 245.

Heading into the 2012 football season, no league in America has sent more linebackers to the NFL, as no fewer than 45 former ACC standouts began the summer on NFL rosters leading both the Big Ten (44) and SEC (38) for that honor. This marked the fourth straight year the Conference had led or tied in numbers of linebackers on NFL rosters.

Since 2006, the ACC has had more defensive ends or outside linebackers--the glamour positions of

defense in the NFL--drafted in the first or second rounds (19) than any other league. The Big Ten is next with 13 followed by the SEC (8).

The 12 current ACC schools have had 2,287 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 232 first-round selections.

Last year, the ACC had three teams ranked in the among the Top 25 in both final polls for the Associated Press and USA Today Football Coaches. Virginia Tech was ranked 21st by AP and 17th by USA Today, followed by Clemson (22nd in both polls) and Florida State (23rd in both polls).

The ACC also has a storied bowl tradition, setting an NCAA record with 10 of its teams (.833) invited to post-season bowl games in 2008, breaking its own record for bowl participation (.778) set originally in 2002.

Since 2005, the Conference is second among all leagues with 58 of its teams travelling to post-season bowl games. Additionally, five of its teams-- Florida State (6th, 25-14-2, .634), Boston College (11th, 13-9, .591), NC State (16th, 14-11-1), Georgia Tech (17th, 22-18, .550) and Miami (20th, 19-17-0, .528)--rank among the Top 20 winningest bowl programs of all-time, with a sixth--Maryland (23rd, 11-11-1, .500)--tied for 23rd.

Three ACC schools are also among the top eight nationally in current bowl game streaks including national leader Florida State (30 straight bowl games), Virginia Tech (3rd, 19) and Georgia Tech (tied for 4th, 15).

2011-12 Review

The 2011-12 academic year saw ACC teams capturing four more national team titles and 7 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 55 national team titles over the last 14 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 29 of the past 31 years.

The ACC was one of only three conferences in America to place two of its teams in the final Top 10 rankings of the 2011-12 Learfield Director's Cup Standings--symbolic of the nation's top overall programs--as Florida State (5th), North Carolina (8th), Virginia (15th) and Duke (16th) all were ranked nationally in the Top 20.

This past year also marked the 11th consecutive year that the ACC has placed four or more teams in the Top 30.

A total of 126 ACC teams placed in NCAA post-season competition in 2011-12. League teams compiled a 116-73-5 (.611) mark against opponents in NCAA championship competition.

Dr. Eric J. Barron became 14th president of The Florida State University on February 1, 2010.

He is a 1973 Florida State alumnus, with a bachelor's degree in geology. He earned master's and doctoral degrees in oceanography from the University of Miami.

Prior to assuming the Florida State presidency, he served as director of the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colo. From 2006-2008 Dr. Barron was dean of the Jackson School of

Geosciences at the University of Texas at Austin. At Pennsylvania State University from 1986 to 2006, he was professor of geosciences, director of the Earth System Science Center, director of the EMS Environment Institute, and finally dean of the College of Earth and Mineral Sciences.

Dr. Barron is a Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Geophysical Union, the American Meteorological Society and the Geological Society of America. He has received many national awards as a scholar, researcher and distinguished lecturer, has published extensively, and has been editor or a member of the editorial boards of a dozen academic journals.

He has testified before Congress and has chaired numerous committees in service to the federal government, including the NASA Senior Review for the Earth Sciences in 2005. He has chaired committees and panels of the National Research Council since 1987 and currently chairs "An Ocean Infrastructure for U.S. Ocean Research in 2030."

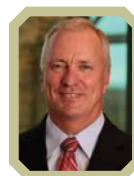

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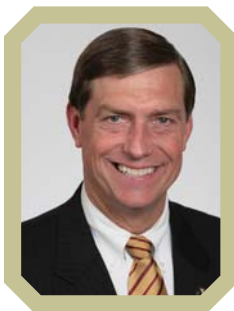

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

Randy Spetman Director of Athletics



Florida State Director of Athletics Randy Spetman can rightfully look at his four years at the helm of the Seminole athletic program with great pride. In his three full seasons as the Seminoles AD, FSU qualified for NCAA postseason play in every sport every year with just one exception. This past athletic year FSU equaled its highest-ever Director's Cup finish placing fifth for the second time in three years. The Seminoles were also just one of two schools to finish ranked among the Top 25 in football, men's basketball and baseball. Six Seminole teams made it to the final four in their respective sports and the ACC named six of FSU's student-athletes the top scholar-athlete of the year in their sport.

In 2010-11 Florida State athletics was the only Division I department in the NCAA to have all of its 19 sports participate in the NCAA postseason. It marked the second consecutive year that FSU sent every one of its athletic programs into NCAA postseason play. In addition, this past athletic year the FSU's men's basketball program won the ACC Tournament

Title for the first time in school history, as did the Seminole women's soccer team.

After being ranked 15th nationally in the Director's Cup following his first year, FSU earned its highest ever ranking in 2009-10 when the school finished fifth overall. In 2010-11 FSU was in the top 10 once again finishing ninth in the nation. These were the first top 10 finishes in school history and in each of the last seven years the Seminole athletic program has finished higher in the standings than at any other point in program history. The first ever top 10 finishes under Spetman are so impressive as this has been accomplished during a time when budgets are as constrained at Florida's universities as they have ever been in the modern era.

In 2011-12 Florida State had a banner athletic year under Spetman's guidance both on the field and in the classroom. There were more than 50 All-America honors earned by Seminole student-athletes this past year, a number that was surpassed only by the amount of athletes selected to All-ACC Academic Teams.

"This was a wonderful athletic year on so many levels. Finishing in the top 5 for the second time in three years, something only four programs with three straight top 10 finishes have done, speaks to the commitment and excellence of this entire department, our coaches and especially our student-athletes," said Spetman. "To finish in the top 5 for a second time in three years and inside the top 15 every year I have been at Florida State is an amazing accomplishment. We are very proud to be amongst this select group of athletic programs and I know our fans appreciate the success we have had across the board."

In 2011-12 Florida State was one of only two schools to have football play in a bowl game, the men's team make the NCAA Basketball tournament and the baseball team play in the College World Series. That blend of rare success has been the norm the last three years at Florida State under Spetman. FSU was one of only eight schools to have its football team play in a bowl game, its men's basketball team selected to the NCAA Tournament and its baseball team selected for the NCAA Championships in 2010-11. That came on the heels of 2009-10 when the Seminoles were one of only three universities in the country to appear in a bowl game, a NCAA men's basketball tournament and advance to the baseball College World Series.

The success Spetman has experienced at Florida State begins with excellence in the classroom. In November of 2008, football's Myron Rolle highlighted the academic year when he became the second Seminole student-athlete since 2006 to earn a Rhodes Scholarship - one of the oldest and most prestigious awards for international study. It was the first time in nearly 25 years a Rhodes Scholar was awarded to a prominent college football player. Rolle is the fourth Florida State student ever to be named a Rhodes Scholar.

In the last three years alone there have been 18 Seminoles named the ACC's top student-athlete in their sport, 13 student-athletes have been named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, 25 have been named CoSIDA Academic All-District first team selections and well over 200 All-ACC Academic honors have been bestowed on FSU student-athletes.

The success FSU's student-athletes and coaches have achieved since Spetman's first full year on the job in 2009 is a credit to his leadership and direction for the department. In just four years, there have been more than 250 All-America honors earned by Seminole student-athletes, 18 ACC Coach of the Year awards, 18 ACC team championships and out of a possible 76 NCAA Tournament appearances, the Seminoles have advanced to NCAA postseason play 69 times.

Over the last two years FSU added three exciting facilities with the completion of a multi-purpose teaching facility and six indoor courts for the tennis programs, a softball hitting complex, and a new sand volleyball complex as well. In 2011-12 the football practice fields, which underwent a major renovation during the summer, opened for fall practice.

Spetman was introduced as Director of Athletics at FSU on February 4, 2008 following a national search. A former pilot and retired Air Force colonel, he took over after serving as Director of Athletics at Utah State from 2004-2008 and in the same position at the United States Air Force Academy from 1996-2003.

Spetman, 59, was lauded over his tenure at Utah State for the success of the Aggies' athletic programs both on the field or court and in the classroom. Utah State joined the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) in 2005 and claimed four conference championships in its first two years. USU's student-athletes led the WAC with a 78 percent graduation rate and maintained over a 3.0 cumulative grade point average.

Under Spetman's leadership, Utah State made high profile improvements to the football stadium. He also spearheaded fundraising and building efforts for a \$12.5 million facility and crafted a unique business partnership for medical health coverage that improved the overall coverage of USU student-athletes and reduced

medical costs. In addition, he negotiated a lucrative new marketing agreement for Aggie Athletics with Learfield Sports Properties.

Spetman spent eight successful years as Director of Athletics at the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo. During his tenure, he administered the school's 27-sport intercollegiate program as well as the physical education and intramural programs. Under his command, the football team participated in four bowl games.

Born and raised in Council Bluffs, Iowa, Spetman graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1976. He earned three letters as a defensive end for the Falcons and was a team captain as a senior. He also won a pair of heavyweight Wing Open Boxing Championships. Spetman's 28-year military career took him around the world in a variety of positions. A command pilot with more than 3,000 hours of flight time, his range of positions took him from assistant football coach at his alma mater to Chief of Bomber Planning in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm to serving as Chief, Command and Control Division, Operations Directorate of the U.S. European Command in Stuttgart, Germany.

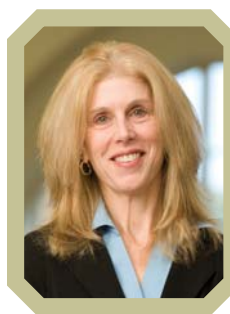
A graduate from Squadron Officer School, he attended the National War College and earned a master's degree in National Security Strategy. Spetman also holds a master's in management and supervision from Central Michigan University.

He served as President of the National Association of Collegiate Director's of Athletics (NACDA) in 2009-10.

He and his wife, the former Becky Lühring of Des Moines, Iowa, are the parents of two grown children, Brian and Kim.

Perrewé is the Haywood and Betty Taylor Eminent Scholar of Business Administration and Distinguished Research Professor at Florida State University. She received her Bachelor degree in Psychology from Purdue University and her Master and Ph.D. degrees in Management from the University of Nebraska. Dr. Perrewé has focused her research interests in the areas of job stress, burnout, coping, mentoring, organizational politics, emotion and personality. Dr. Perrewé has published several books, over 20 book chapters and over 100 journal articles in journals such as *Academy of Management Journal*, *Journal of Management*, *Journal of Applied Psychology*, and *Organizational Behavior and Human Decision Processes*. She holds Fellow status in the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology and the American Psychological Association.

Dr. Perrewé has maintained a commitment to her profession as well as to Florida State University for over 25 years, and she has won teaching, mentoring, and research awards at Florida State University. She has served as the Management Department Chair as well as the Associate Dean for Graduate Programs in the College of Business. She has a passion for sports, enjoys playing tennis, and has served on the Athletic Board since 2004. Dr. Perrewé also served on the Board of Scientific Counselors of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) from 2004-2007. She is married to Dr. Gerald R. Ferris and together they have six children: Erin, Jennifer, Emily, Ellie, Stephen and Matthew and one granddaughter, Lily.

Monk Bonasorte Senior Associate Athletic Director

Monk Bonasorte is in his fifth year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics at Florida State and among his responsibilities is oversight of internal operations within the athletic department and oversight of Florida State's football program.

Currently, Bonasorte is responsible for administrative oversight of the following departments: Media Relations, Equipment, Communications, Student Services, Athletic Training, Coaches Video and

Strength & Conditioning.

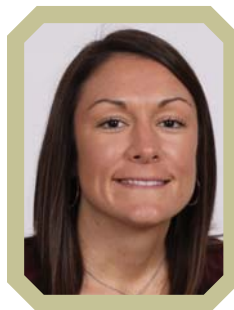
A member of Florida State's All-Time football team as named by Athlon Magazine, Bonasorte earned four varsity letters (1977-80), played in the 1977 Tangerine Bowl and two Orange Bowls (1980 and 1981) and was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1995 as one of the top defensive backs in school history. He ranks second in school history with 15 interceptions while his eight interceptions in 1979 ranks as the second highest single season total in school history.

Bonasorte joined the Florida State athletics department executive staff in 2008 after a 13-year career as the president and executive director of the Florida State University Varsity Club - the organization that gives back to every Seminole letter winner and allows them to give back to the current letter winners. He helped build the FSU Varsity Club into one of the top organizations of its kind across the nation.

As a player, Bonasorte earned All-America Third Team honors in 1979 by the Associated Press and All-America Second Team honors from Football News in 1980 starting on one of the toughest defensive units in Florida State history in 1979. He led the nation in interceptions for the majority of the 1979 season and finished with eight to rank fourth nationally and set a Seminole record for interceptions in a season. The Seminoles ranked sixth nationally and fifth nationally during his junior and senior seasons respectively.

Bonasorte spent seven years working with the Elmont Sports Group - a leader in the building and marketing of professional sports teams. He served as the marketing director for two seasons for the Tallahassee Scorpions of indoor professional league. He served as the director of marketing for the East Coast Hockey league Tallahassee Tiger Sharks (1997-99) and served as the Vice-president and General Manager for the Tallahassee Thunder of the Arenal Football league (1999-2003).

Bonasorte and his wife, Beverly, have two sons, T.J. and Rocky.



Vanessa Fuchs Senior Associate Athletic Director SWA, Volleyball Oversight

Florida State Athletic Director Randy Spetman promoted Vanessa Fuchs to the role of Senior Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator in May of 2012. Fuchs has served as the department's associate athletic director for compliance since 2010.

Since joining the athletics staff in 2010, Fuchs has focused her time on building a comprehensive rules education program, implementing a department-wide recruiting and compliance software system and establishing a new team structure for the compliance office.

Prior to arriving at Florida State, Fuchs committed seven years to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in Indianapolis, Indiana. In 2007, her extensive knowledge of NCAA legislation, interpretations and the NCAA's governance process earned her a promotion to Associate Director of Academic and Membership Affairs (AMA).

Fuchs remained rooted in AMA throughout her tenure with the NCAA. Fuchs was primarily responsible for supervising the functions of the Legislative Relief Waiver team and contributed heavily to issuing interpretations, serving as a staff liaison to NCAA governance committees and leading project teams for the association.

Before embarking on her career with the NCAA, Fuchs got her start working for the Atlantic Coast Conference as a Championships Intern in 2001. The Pompano Beach, Fla., native was a four-year letterwinner for the Seminoles' women's basketball team from 1997-2001. She was the team co-captain in her senior year. Fuchs finished her career as a three-time ACC Honor Roll selection.

Fuchs graduated Magna Cum Laude with a bachelor's degree in communications at Florida State University and earned her master's degree from the University of North Carolina in sport administration. She will oversee the compliance and academic departments in her new role.



Kevin Terry Senior Associate Athletic Director CFO

Kevin Terry is in his eighth year with the Florida State Athletics Department. After serving as Assistant Athletics Director of Business Operations and Finance, Terry was elevated to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director and CFO in July of 2010. This past year he added oversight responsibilities for Florida State's men's basketball program.

Terry joined the Florida State University Athletics Department in 2004, he served as Assistant Business Manager from 2004-2007 and was promoted to Business Manager in 2007 in charge of all business operations for Seminole Athletics. Terry was later promoted to Assistant Athletics Director of Business Operations and Finance in 2009.

In his role as chief financial officer of the department, Terry directs the development and administration of the program's \$67 million budget and oversees the athletic department's financial planning.

Terry received both his bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Finance and a master's degree in Sport Administration from Georgia State University in Atlanta.
