When head coach Dwayne Hultquist took over the Florida State men's tennis program in 2000, the Seminoles were seventh out of nine teams in the ACC and barely ranked in the top 60 nationally. Under his leadership, Hultquist morphed the Seminoles into a winning sensation, coaching the team as high as No. 7 in the country in 2008, the highest in program history. Hultquist's coaching expertise led the men's tennis team to be recognized as a top contender in the conference and across the nation, revamping the perception of the program. As the winningest coach in program history, Hultquist has brought Florida State men's tennis a sense of confidence and success that had not been seen before.

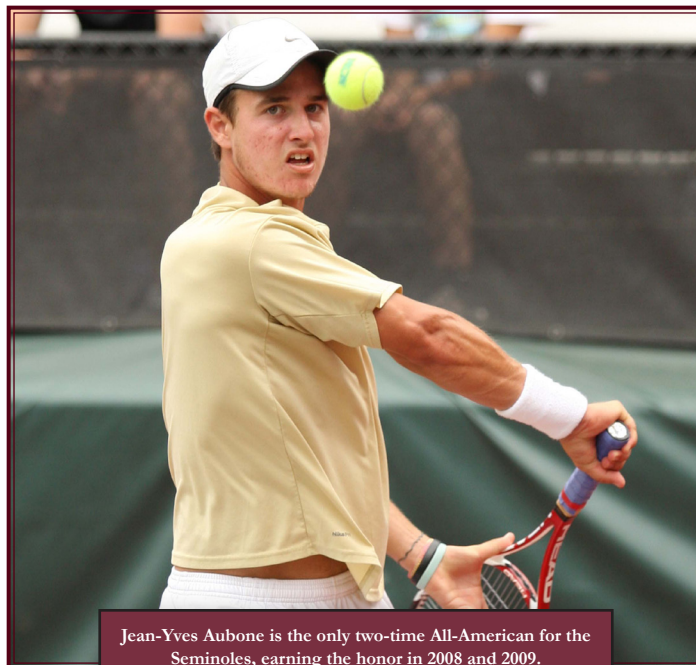
Hultquist and the 'Noles have played in the NCAA Tournament a school-record 12 consecutive years, including a trip to the quarterfinals in 2005 and two round of 16 appearances in 2008 and 2009. Since bringing on associate coach Nick Crowell in 2004, the 'Noles have made the NCAA Tournament every season and ranked no lower than 47th in the country. Included in the 11 years together for Hultquist and Crowell were five consecutive finishes ranked in the teens, capped off by a school-record finish of No. 13 in 2005, 2008, and 2009.

Hultquist has won a career-high 21 matches in a season three times, and finished with a winning record in 12 of his 15 seasons as leader of the 'Noles. Overall, Hultquist has a record of 238-162.

Florida State is known for developing elite talent and its reputation was further sustained when the men's tennis team was invited to compete in the NCAA Tournament for the 12th consecutive season in 2014.

Throughout the history of the Florida State men's tennis program, many notable players and coaches have passed through the courts in Tallahassee, including Don Loucks, the first tennis coach in program history who led the team to a 9-4 record in his inaugural season with the 'Noles.

Other notable Seminoles include Ray Bellamy, a team captain in 1960 and 1961 who lost only three times during his time with FSU and later went on to join the Navy as a flight surgeon and win the state's 35-and-over singles and doubles championship in the 1970s; Marco Abilhoa, a three-time Metro MVP in the early 1980s; Joey Rive, a five-time Metro Conference champion (three singles, two doubles) who was named the 1987 Tennis Magazine Sportsman of the Year and went on to rank as high as No. 57 on the ATP Tour; and Jean-Yves Aubone, the Seminoles first two-time singles All-American and 2009 ACC Player of the Year who ranked as high as No. 8 in the country in 2009, the highest ranking for a Seminole in school history.

In the 67-year history of the program, Florida State has won seven conference titles, made 18 NCAA Tournament appearances, and finished the season ranked 28 times, including 21 consecutive years.

A key part to maintaining Florida State's reputation as an elite collegiate team is having ambitious athletes that continue to ace the competition on and off the court.

Florida State was one of only seven schools to have multiple athletes represented on the 2014 ACC All-Academic Team, highlighted by returning star Cristian Gonzalez Mendez.

Gonzalez Mendez was also recognized as an ITA All-American for the third consecutive season.

Six 'Noles were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2014, including Gonzalez Mendez for the third time and first time honorees Parker Evertsen, Jack Haffey and Marco Nunez.

On campus, the Seminoles were honored for the second consecutive season with the Golden Torch Award, given annually to the men's and women's athletic team that has achieved the highest GPA for the previous year. Individually, Gonzalez Mendez was honored with the Golden Torch for the men's tennis team for having a GPA over 3.8 for the year.

In 2011, Vahid Mirzadeh became the second athlete in school history to be honored with the prestigious ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, following in the footsteps of Mat Cloer in 2005.

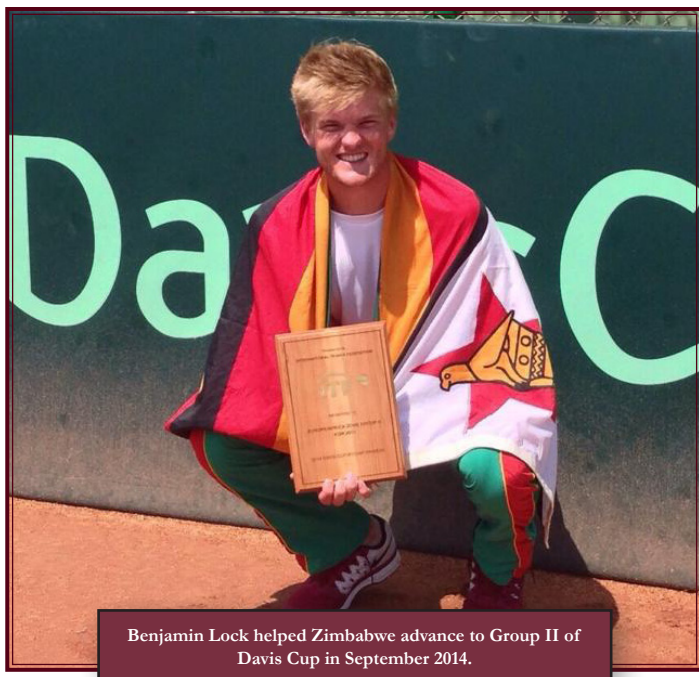
In 2010, Jean-Yves Aubone was named the ACC Men's Tennis Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Over the last decade, FSU men's tennis has been represented 50 times on the ACC Academic Honor Roll by 23 different athletes.

In the history of the Seminole men's tennis program, Florida State has had six All-Americans play for the 'Noles, including Vahid Mirzadeh and Connor Smith as a doubles tandem in 2011 and Brian Stanton and Ken McKenzie as a doubles pair in 1995; Mat Cloer in singles in 2005; and the only two-time winner in school history, Jean-Yves Aubone, in 2008 and 2009 in singles play.

Other honors for the Seminoles include the Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, won by Mirzadeh (2011) and Cloer (2005); the ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year for Dwayne Hultquist (2013); ITA Regional Assistant Coach of the Year, won in 2003 by Ty Braswell, 2010 by Cloer, and 2006 and 2013 by Nick Crowell; and ITA Regional Player of the Year, won by Aubone in 2010.

Additionally, two Seminoles have won at the prestigious Bedford Cup, an annual tournament that features players from around the state of Florida. In 2012, Benjamin Lock paired with Andres Bucaro to win the doubles draw, and in 2013, Cristian Gonzalez Mendez won the singles draw.

Multiple Seminoles have played in the Davis Cup for their countries, including Ricardo Bernd for Brazil (1971-72), Rejean Genois for Canada (1973-74), Enrique Andrade (1975-76) and Hernan Luque (1979-80) for Ecuador, Joey Rive for the U.S. (1989) and Puerto Rico (1992-94), Marco Nunez for Mexico (2011), Andres Bucaro for Guatemala (2013-14) and Benjamin Lock for Zimbabwe (2011-14).

ith the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Donald Loucks Courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and 2007 and 2008 NCAA Regionals have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities. During the fall of 2012, the Seminoles hosted the ITA Southeast Regional Championships for the first time.

The Scott Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, two team lounges and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program was honored just after its opening, when the United States Tennis Association (USTA) awarded the structure with its "Top Notch" facility award in 1994.

The Scott Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the United States government as missing in action in 2001 and missing or captured a year later. However, in 2009 Speicher's remains were found in the Anbar province of Iraq after a nearly 20-year search. The Scott Speicher family was later honored by Florida State at a home football game with a missing man formation flyover from the Navy. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The varsity tennis courts were named for Donald Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of Men from 1957-1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes. In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first men's basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team.

Scott Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized tennis facility design consultant.



After breaking ground on construction in January of 2010, the Indoor Tennis Facility was completed in April of 2011. The multimillion dollar indoor practice facility serves as an additional playing arena for the Florida State tennis teams. Since the completion in spring of 2011, the facility has served as a site for both training and competition.

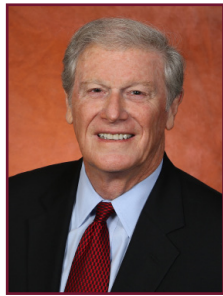
The building hosts six regulation courts, locker rooms, athletic training room, equipment room, office and lobby. With the new facility, both men's and women's Seminole Tennis teams are equipped with the tools to host both regional and national championships now and in the future. For the next phase, plans are in place to add spectator seating, team lounges, extended locker rooms, more offices and a press box.

In addition to use from the tennis programs, the Multi-Purpose Educational Facility is used for academic classes, clinics and camps. It is now available for use by the public. The facility was the first indoor tennis facility approved for college competition in the state of Florida and still one of only a few in the southeast.

The women's tennis team had its first practice on April 6, 2011, while the men practiced the next day on April 7. At the men's Seminole Invitational during September 2011, the back draws were played there for the facilities first competition. The first women's dual match was played on January 21, 2012 against UCF where Florida State won 6-1. The men's team played Furman on January 22, 2012, and came off the courts with a 7-0 victory.

The building was designed by Architects: Lewis + Whitlock while construction was completed by Rippee Construction. The facility is located adjacent to the Morcom Aquatics Facility and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course and Club at 2566 Pottsdamer Rd.

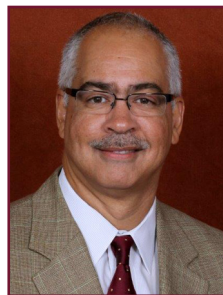

The 2014 USTA Collegiate Clay Court Invitational, presented by VISIT FLORIDA, was held from Oct. 30-Nov. 2 at the ESPN Wide World of Sports in Orlando, Fla. The third-annual event was held in collaboration between the USTA, ESPN, and Florida State University.

Billed as the largest collegiate clay court event in the country, the USTA Collegiate Clay Court Invitational featured athletes from 31 men's and women's programs around the country, including the 2014 NCAA Men's Champions USC Trojans. Of the 31 teams in attendance, 19 athletes finished the 2014 season ranked in the ITA poll, including the 2015 Men's Singles Champion, Hunter Harrington of Clemson, ranked No. 30 in the country.

The Florida State duo of Benjamin Lock and Marco Nunez, ranked No. 10 in the country in the preseason ITA poll after reaching as high as No. 4 as a pair last year, won the Men's Doubles A championship. In the finals, played on Center Court at the Wide World of Sports complex, they beat teammates Cristian Gonzalez Mendez and Jose Gracia in a third-set tiebreaker. It was the first doubles win for a Seminole pair at the event and second win overall - Gonzalez Mendez won the inaugural 'garnet draw' in singles in 2012.

This year, 12 hours of footage was shown live on ESPN3, featuring commentary from former professional tennis player Patrick McEnroe and ESPN's Kevin Corke.

Joining the Seminoles on the men's side was Auburn, UCF, Clemson, Columbia, Florida, Georgia Tech, Miami, Penn State, Princeton, South Alabama, USC, Stetson, and Virginia Tech.

On the women's side, Florida State hosted the Seminole women's team along with Auburn, UCF, Clemson, Columbia, Illinois, Miami, North Carolina, Northwestern, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, USF, Stetson, Texas Tech, Virginia Tech, and Youngstown State.

Schedule

Florida State will again play one of the tougher schedules in the country in 2015. The Seminoles will play at least 14 teams that were ranked in the final ITA poll from 2014, and could play as many as 18 depending on the matchups in the Seminole Tournament the first weekend of the season. The eight-team tournament will feature five schools that finished last year ranked. The bracket-style play will take place at the Speicher Tennis Center January 10-11.

Out of conference, the 'Noles will host its annual Sunshine Showdown with Florida, ranked No. 13 in the first poll of the season, on February 6. The team will also travel to Alabama (36) for its first match against the Crimson Tide since 2006, and travel to last year's national runner-up Oklahoma (2) at the end of February. During the ITA Kickoff Weekend, the 'Noles will play matches against two of three teams among Texas (9), Michigan (43), and Minnesota (49).

In conference, the Seminoles will face its usual onslaught of tough opponents. With the addition of Louisville (39) and Notre Dame (14) over the past two seasons, the conference tennis profile continues to grow.

The Seminoles toughest stretch could start with that Oklahoma match on February 28, which kicks off a five-match road stretch against teams ranked to start the season. After the Oklahoma match, the 'Noles will travel to Louisville (39), North Carolina (6), Wake Forest (20), and Georgia Tech (75). The Seminoles will also finish the season playing seven consecutive games against teams ranked to start the season, highlighted by the final weekend of the regular season in Tallahassee against Virginia (3), a national semifinalist and defending ACC champion, and Virginia Tech (38).

Head coach Dwayne Hultquist on the schedule:

"Our schedule is more difficult than last year. We added Louisville in the ACC and Notre Dame last year, and both of those schools make our conference even stronger. I look at the ACC and of the 13 schools that compete in tennis, 12 of them are expected to make the NCAA Tournament this year. You could argue that the ACC, from top to bottom, is maybe the best in the country. Adding those two to the conference has made the ACC better. Outside of the conference, we will travel to Alabama and Oklahoma. Competitively, we're going to have tough matches nearly every time out on the court."

New Rules

In August, new rules were implemented for Division I dual meets that would speed up the pace of play by switching to no-advantage scoring in both singles and doubles, each doubles match to six points (instead of eight), and tiebreakers at six-all in both singles and doubles. The new rules would also eliminate warm-up with opponents that stalled the pace of play. According to ITA Division I Operating Committee member Billy Pate, head coach at Princeton, the move will "make our team matches more exciting, grow the sport and gain new fans." Additionally, the scoring change will make for "faster and more fan-friendly matches; greater excitement and entertainment in the games; an easy-to-understand scoring system; and mental toughness with more pressure points." The format was used in the fall season.



As the lone senior on the team, Gonzalez Mendez will be counted on for guidance on and off the court.

Head coach Dwayne Hultquist on the new ITA rules:

"I'm in the group that thinks the rules changes are an improvement. It helps speed up matches and builds excitement - if it's a no-ad point, fans can watch that court knowing the game or set is going to be won. About 75 percent of the coaches agree with me and the new changes. It doesn't mean we have to play no-ad forever, because there has been some pushback, but at least for this season we should to see how it goes and to help promote the college tennis brand on television and avenues that aren't available as much as we'd like them to be right now."

Returning Stars

The Seminoles will be led by redshirt junior captain Benjamin Lock and senior captain Cristian Gonzalez Mendez. Lock entered the 2014-15 season ranked No. 79 in the preseason ITA poll and will be a top-of-the-lineup player all season. He is coming off an injury that sidelined him for most of the 2014 season. Before he was injured, however, he paired with Marco Nunez to rise as high as No. 4 in the country in doubles. The two are ranked No. 24 to start 2015.

Additionally, Lock will use his experiences playing with the Zimbabwe Davis Cup team to improve for the Seminoles this year. In September, Lock was a member of the Davis Cup team that advanced to the Africa/Europe Zone Group II stage for the first time

since 2006. During the Group III matches, held in Cairo, Egypt, Lock went 4-1 combined in singles and doubles as the Zimbabwe team went undefeated to advance.

Gonzalez Mendez is ranked No. 103 and led the team in 2014 with 27 victories. He was named to the All-ACC Third Team. In the fall, he paired with redshirt freshman Jose Gracia in doubles. Gracia and Gonzalez Mendez faced Lock and Nunez in the Men's Doubles Final at the USTA Collegiate Clay Court Invitational in November, falling to the pair in a third-set tiebreaker that showed the strength of both sides and provide what could be a formidable 1-2 doubles punch for the Seminoles.

Nunez is in his second season with the Seminoles after transferring from Georgia following the 2013 season. His improvement in singles play has been recognized and he enters his second season at FSU ranked No. 99 to start the year. He will pair with Lock in doubles. In the fall, he beat the first two ranked opponents of his career in singles and took down the fifth-ranked doubles team in the country in TCU's Will Stein and Nick Chappell in his first match with Lock. Combined, Lock, Gonzalez Mendez, and Nunez are winning over 62 percent (159-96, .624) of matches in their careers.

Head coach Dwayne Hultquist on Lock, Gonzalez Mendez, and Nunez:

"Benjamin Lock and Marco Nunez, winning the Disney doubles tournament in the fall, winning regionals and reaching the semifinals of National Indoors in 2013, they're clearly an outstanding doubles team and both of them will bring some good experience to us on the singles side. Ben has done a great job over the summer of picking up some ATP points, and Marco had some good ranked wins this fall. We'll see both of those guys in the top four of our lineup. Cristian continued to have an excellent fall. Cristian is great when matches go three sets - he's very strong mentally, consistent in his play, has good serve and good forehand and continues to work hard and has gotten better each year here at Florida State."

Newcomers

Florida State is replacing three letterwinners from last year's team that combined for 38 percent of the 'Noles singles wins in 2014. In addition to the return of Lock and redshirt freshman Jose Gracia from injury, FSU signed twin brothers Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst from Tallahassee. The duo enrolled in January and will be fighting for playing time in the spring. Additionally, more will be expected of rising sophomores Jack Haffey and Jake Albo, as well as stalwarts João Gauer and Michael Rinaldi. Redshirt freshman Parker Evertsen will play in his first dual matches in 2015 after redshirting the 2013-14 season.

Head coach Dwayne Hultquist on the other contributors:

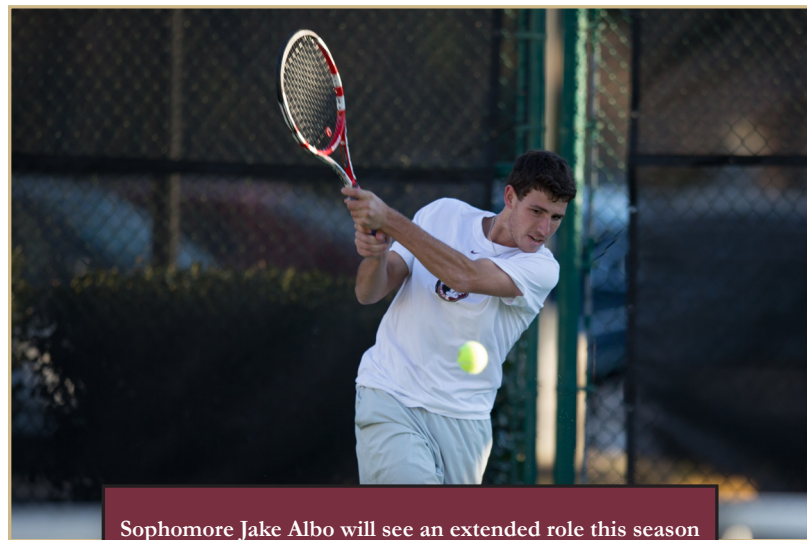
"Terrance has ranked as high as No. 1 in the state of Florida. He's had a lot of success in doubles playing with Terrell and as a pair went as far as the semifinals of the junior National Hard Court event. They've picked



up ATP points in pro events and add a tremendous amount of athleticism. Jack Haffey has maybe improved as much as anybody. He had good fall results and had some good wins, competing very hard and like some of the other guys, has improved his fitness. He's really committed to his style of play. We're pleased with the results out of Jake from our strength coaches working with him, getting him more fit and stronger. He's hitting the ball bigger and finishing around the net a little more and improving his serve. Jose is coming off his foot surgery and continued to get better every tournament this fall. He's got a very powerful game and has worked hard to get himself in better condition for the spring season. We're looking forward in the spring to having Michael back. Michael had wrist surgery this fall and has been able to practice, but he wasn't able to play so we're interested in seeing where he is when the season begins. He is a third-year guy in our system and his leadership on and off the court will be looked at closely by the younger guys."

Coaching Consistency

Along with returning nine of 12 players from last year's NCAA Tournament team, the Seminoles are returning all three coaches as well. Head coach Dwayne Hultquist is entering his 16th season with FSU and, sitting at 238, looks to notch win No. 250 in his time at Florida State midway through the season. Along with Hultquist is associate coach Nick Crowell,

entering his 12th season at Florida State after playing at the University of Texas under then-assistant coach Hultquist. The two have helped spark a resurgence in Seminole tennis.

Second-year assistant coach Taylor Braziel also returns. Having all three coaches and nine players return from last season should help build on last season's NCAA Tournament run.

Additional notes from head coach Dwayne Hultquist:

"Michael Rinaldi is a solid performer - very strong physically, moves well, and we expect him to win a lot of matches for us."

"Jake Albo has also improved a lot this fall. He won a lot of matches and has improved his game from last year. He's gotten a lot more physical."

"João Gauer had some really good summer results and in our first tournament of the fall, played really well over in Jacksonville at the Bedford Cup. João and

Jack have done really well in the fall in doubles, and we're pleased with the development there."

"Parker Evertsen had what I really like to see out of our players - a great comeback against a top player from Columbia at the USTA Clay Court event in Orlando. He came back from 6-1, 3-0 down to take the match and showed his Seminole spirit in coming back and fighting back."

"Both Jose and Cristian had good results in doubles in the fall, reaching the finals in the Disney event and playing Marco and Ben very closely during that final match."

"Cristian is so good in three-set matches because he keeps his head about him and doesn't panic. He lost a three-setter against Auburn at the Disney event, but even then he was down big in the third set and fought back to really make a match out of it and almost came back. Last year, he was 11-1 in three-set matches."

"Our doubles is a definite strength - we have a lot of ways we can put together a three-team lineup. It's a little more dicey now with the new scoring system, each set only to six points with a tiebreaker at 6-all to determine the point, but we think we will put a strong doubles product on the court day-in and day-out, behind the leadership of Ben and Marco at the top."

"There's an urgency in college tennis to get our product on television. With the rise of conference networks that show a ton of programming from various sports, we have to find a way to get on TV, in some capacity. We are doing that this year with the help of Seminole Productions to air five matches on ESPN3. This will not increase the exposure of our players and our program, but also highlight the rise of college tennis. Tennis, men's and women's, is one of the most international sports in the NCAA. Widening the viewing options for fans helps make FSU a destination for athletes from all over the world."

In his 16th season as the head coach at Florida State, Dwayne Hultquist has put himself atop the Florida State record books and the Seminoles in the national spotlight.

Under Hultquist's leadership, Florida State men's tennis has emerged as one of the top programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the country. In 15 seasons under Hultquist, FSU has had three ACC Player of the Year recipients, five All-American honors and two national ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award winners.

In 2014, the program finished with an 18-12 record, giving Hultquist 238 wins in his 15 years at FSU. The winningest coach in program history, Hultquist has led the 'Noles to 12 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and has finished ranked in the final poll of the season all 15 years. It was also the 14th time that a Hultquist-led Seminole team has reached the double-digit win mark, and seventh time the program has reached 18 wins under Hultquist.

Last season, Hultquist oversaw a team that reached the second

round of the ACC Tournament. The 'Noles took down nine ranked teams in 2014, highlighted by victories over No. 18 Wake Forest, No. 47 Miami, and No. 60 Nebraska. Hultquist and the 'Noles have defeated in-state rival Miami in 13 of the past 14 seasons. The doubles pairing of Marco Nunez and Benjamin Lock ranked as high as No. 4 in the country before a season-ending injury knocked Lock out of competition for most of the spring.

The 'Noles also placed two members on the All-ACC teams, with Dominic Cotrone (second team) and Cristian Gonzalez Mendez (third team) garnering honors. Two players, Gonzalez Mendez and Blake Davis, were also named to the ITA All-Academic Team, while Cotrone and Gonzalez Mendez were named to the All-ACC Academic Team.

The 2012-13 year was no different from the previous winning seasons. The year saw both Hultquist and associate coach Nick Crowell sweeping the ITA Southeast Regional coaches of the year awards. Cotrone and Davis ranked as high as No. 14 in the nation in doubles and played in the NCAA Doubles Championships at the end of the year.





During the 2012 season, Hultquist coached the team to its 10th straight NCAA appearance. The team finished 19-10 and reached the semifinals of the ACC Championships. Jordan Kelly-Houston was named to the All-ACC team while Andres Bucaro, Davis and Lock were named to the All-ACC Academic team.

In 2011, Vahid Mirzadeh headlined the season as he and Connor Smith were named All-Americans in doubles play, Hultquist's fourth and fifth athletes to earn that honor. Mirzadeh made a huge impact off the courts as he was awarded the ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, showcasing his playing abilities, leadership, community service, academic achievements and sportsmanship.

The 2009-10 season had the team making the NCAA tournament for the eighth year in a row where they reached the second round of play. Awards started coming in the fall as Clint Bowles was the Wilson/ITA Southeast Regional Singles Champion. Later in the year, Jean-Yves Aubone was named the ITA Senior Player of the Year and was named to the All-ACC team along with Mirzadeh. The Seminoles stormed the class-

rooms that year with seven members of the team being named to the ACC honor roll. Aubone capped the year by being named the ACC Men's Tennis Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

For the first time in school history, the Seminoles reached the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament in consecutive seasons (2008 and 2009). The 2009 season also marked the first time that the Seminoles finished the season ranked inside the top 15 in consecutive seasons (No. 13). Once again, Hultquist helped direct his players to career seasons with Maciek Sykut becoming the winningest player in Florida State tennis history in both singles and overall victories. Aubone also became the first player in school history to become a two-time All-American. The 'Noles also had three All-ACC performers for the second consecutive season with Aubone, Bowles and Sykut earning those honors.

It was also in 2009 that Hultquist surpassed his predecessor David Barron as the winningest coach in school history, notching win No. 142 in the fourth match of the season against ACC-rival Duke on January 31, 2009, in the first round of the National Indoor Championships. With 21 victories in 2009, Hultquist won more than 20 in one season for the third time in his career and the second season in a row.

The 2008 season was a year of records for Florida State culminating in a trip to the round of 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles achieved their highest ranking in program history at

No. 7 during the season and individually saw Aubone earn the highest singles' ranking in the school's history. FSU's 21 victories marked the second time Hultquist led his squad to a 20-win season during his tenure.

Under the direction of Hultquist, Florida State players rose to new heights in 2008 with Aubone earning singles All-American honors and Sam Chang and Bowles getting All-ACC accolades. Aubone and Bowles also finished second in school history for doubles victories in a single season (28).

In 2007, Hultquist led Florida State to a 17-10 record and the Seminoles rose to No. 10 during the season. FSU also hosted an NCAA Regional for the first time in school history.

In Hultquist's sixth year at FSU, the Seminoles reached the 2005 NCAA Elite Eight for the first time and finished with its then highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and stamped its first 20-plus win season since 1985. Hultquist led his squad to an impressive 21-8 mark and a second-place finish in the ACC. Under Hultquist's tutelage in 2005, Mat Cloer became the school's first singles' All-American and won the program's first national honor with the ITA Arthur Ashe Award.

Hultquist hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led his troops to an impressive fall campaign. For the Seminoles' efforts, Florida State not only earned the school's first invitation



to the 2006 USTA/ITA National Men's Team Indoor Championship, but also garnered a respectable preseason ranking of No. 11 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.

Individual honors were bountiful in 2004 with Cloer claiming his second ACC Player of the Year honor, only the third player in league history to receive the award in consecutive seasons. Freshman Jonathas Sucupira was named to the All-ACC team, a first by an FSU rookie since 1992.

Florida State had a break-out year during Hultquist's fourth season as the 2003 squad returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998 and ended the year with a 15-10 mark. The Seminoles produced their best finish in the ACC standings, taking second, while winning the ACC Indoor Doubles Championship for the second year in a row. Individual accolades rolled in as Hultquist's former aide, Ty Braswell, was named ITA Assistant Coach of the Year. On the court, Cloer became the first Seminole to earn ACC Player of the Year honors.

In his first year, Hultquist brought the Seminoles a winning record of 14-10. In his second year, the men's team entered the 2001-02 season ranked No. 59 by the ITA.

Hultquist arrived at Florida State after serving eight years as an assistant coach at the University of Texas. While working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, Hultquist became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for scheduling, fundraising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day operations of the program. While at Texas, Hultquist coached nine All-Americans, helped lead the Longhorns to six conference titles and made it to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in each of his eight years.

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tournament qualifier in doubles, and earned all-conference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that traveled to Korea and China for competition.

Hultquist is married to the former Angela White. The couple has four daughters, Devan, Avery, Addison, and Mackenzie and one son, Blake.

In his 12th year on staff at Florida State, associate coach Nick Crowell continues to prove that he is one of the elite assistants in the country. While earning All-American honors in doubles play for the Longhorns, Crowell played for FSU head coach Dwayne Hultquist, who was an assistant coach at the time. Since Crowell's arrival, Florida State has reached the NCAA Championships every season and shattered several team records. In addition to his coaching duties, Crowell runs the Seminole High Performance tennis camps which help mold young players into champions.

Entering the 2014-15 season, the Seminoles top doubles team, Benjamin Lock and Marco Nunez, is ranked No. 10 in the country. Last season, the duo topped out at No. 4 in the country before Lock went down to injury for the remainder of the season in February.

During the 2010-11 season he helped coach Florida State's second doubles tandem to achieve All-American status in Vahid Mirzadeh and Connor Smith. During the 2012-13 season he helped coach Dominic Cotrone and Blake Davis to No. 14 in the nation and a berth in the 2013 NCAA Doubles Championships. Crowell was named the 2013 ITA Southeast Region Assistant

Coach of the Year.

Over the last three summers, Crowell has coached the Florida USTA Junior Under 18 team and in 2010 his team won the National Team Championship at the University of Illinois. This marked the first time since 1983 that the Florida team has won this prestigious tournament. His team's performance over the #1 and #3 ranked teams was described as one of the greatest upsets in 25 years. His coaching ability made good players believe they were great and for his efforts was named the USTA Florida Junior Coach of the Year.

A doubles specialist in college, Crowell helped mold several new Seminole duos in 2009. In a matter of months, Crowell helped turn Jean-Yves Aubone and Vahid Mirzadeh into a top 20 ranked team who upset the No. 1-ranked duo in the country from Wake Forest. The pair also earned a trip to the NCAA Doubles Championships in College Station, Texas. Crowell also helped guide Drew Bailey and Maciek Sykut to 23 victories in 2008-09, including an upset win against the fourth-ranked team from Virginia.

After another successful campaign in 2008, Crowell was





elevated to the associate coach position at FSU. In 2008, he took the duo of Jean-Yves Aubone and Clint Bowles who had never played together and helped guide the pair to the second most doubles wins in school history in a single season (28). The pair also advanced to the second round of the NCAA doubles tournament, falling one win shy of All-American honors. In May 2006, Crowell was named the ITA Mid-east Region Men's Tennis Assistant Coach of the Year and became a finalist for the national award.

The 2006 season found the Seminoles concluding the year with an 18-12 record with arguably the hardest strength of schedule in the nation. Florida State's 18 wins tied as the second-most victories in the 16 previous seasons. FSU advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship and made the school's first four-peat appearance in the Big Dance since its run of five consecutive trips from 1994-98. Crowell was a big factor in the success of Ytai Abougzir, who became the first Seminole in 12 seasons to qualify for both the NCAA Singles and Doubles Championship.

After a few months off, the pair of Seminole coaches hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led their

troop to an impressive fall campaign. For the Seminoles efforts, Florida State not only earned the school's first invitation to the 2006 USTA/ITA National Men's Team Indoor Championship, but also garnered a respectable preseason ranking of No. 11 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.

In his first year with the Seminoles during the 2004 season, FSU reached heights it hadn't seen since the mid 1990's. The Tribe's second trip to the national summit was their first back-to-back appearance since the 1997-98 campaigns and they

ended the 2004 year ranked for the 11th season in a row with a 10-13 record.

Early in his playing career at Texas, Crowell established himself as one of the top doubles players in the country. During his freshman season, he teamed up with Paul Martin to advance to the quarterfinals of the doubles draw at the NCAA Tournament, earning him his first All-American honor. That season he also earned the Big 12 Conference and ITA Region VI Freshman of the Year awards. His rookie of the year accolade from the league would be the first of many for Crowell. Starting his sophomore year, he earned all-conference honors his last three seasons in singles and doubles.

Finishing his career just as he started it, Crowell captured his second All-American honor during his senior season as he and playing partner Michael Blue advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Tournament. Earlier in the season, the two paired up to win the doubles title at the ITA National Indoor Tournament. With nearly 100 doubles victories during his tenure with the Longhorns, Crowell ranks third in school history with 98 triumphs. His 29 doubles wins with Martin during 1997 still ranks in the top five for a single season. Sparked by a 35-win season in 1997, he ranks 15th on the all-time singles list at Texas.

A native of Amarillo, Texas, Crowell is married to the former Lindsey Smith of Tallahassee and the couple have three children, daughter Brooklyn and sons Cash and Hays.

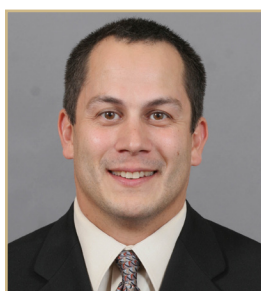

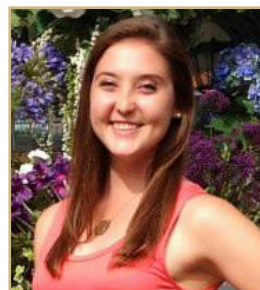

2013-14 SEASON IN REVIEW

Florida State tennis finished 2014 with another winning record, going 18-12 and 5-6 in ACC play. The 'Noles advanced to the 64-team NCAA Tournament field for the 12th consecutive season, and finished ranked in the final ITA poll for the 21st straight year. Some highlights:

Strong Start

The 'Noles began the season 8-0 during the first two weekends of play hosted at FSU. The Seminoles took down No. 71 North Florida, Mercer, South Alabama, and Furman to start the season, dropping just two points all weekend. The following weekend, Florida State hosted Florida Gulf Coast, The Citadel, No. 60 Nebraska, and Troy. The 8-0 start helped the 'Noles win its 13th consecutive season opener, and marked the third consecutive year the team started 7-0 or better.

Ranked Opponents

Of the 'Noles 30 dual matches held in the spring, 21 were against ranked opponents. In those matches, Florida State went 9-12 and 5-7 in the ACC (including the ACC tournament). Every ACC team the 'Noles played in 2014, with the exception of Boston College, was ranked at the time of the match. Included in those nine wins were two over the University of Miami in consecutive matches to end the regular season and in the first round of the ACC Tournament. Two of the losses were against the University of Virginia, which would go on to represent the conference in the NCAA Tournament semifinals, falling to eventual national champion USC.

Ranked Seminoles

Six 'Noles were ranked at various points during 2014. Dominic Cotrone was ranked in every poll of the season, beginning at No. 112 and finishing at No. 73. In between, he rose as high as No. 66. Benjamin Lock was the highest ranked Seminole to begin the season, topping at No. 61 before getting injured early in the spring season. Even with the injury, Lock was ranked every week and finished the year No. 120 in the country. Crisitan Gonzalez Mendez and Grayson Goldin were also ranked as singles players, while Lock teamed with Marco Nunez to rank as high as No. 4 in the country in doubles play, while Cotrone paired with Blake Davis to rank as high as No. 23 in doubles play.



As a team, the Seminoles were ranked every week of the season, topping out at No. 24 during the March 25 poll following victories over ranked NC State and Wake Forest teams in conference play. The 'Noles finished ranked No. 37 in the country for the second consecutive season.

Honors

For their play on the court, Cotrone and Gonzalez Mendez were named to the All-ACC Team. Cotrone finished the season with a 20-15 record playing primarily on Court 1 during the dual match season and earned Second Team honors. Gonzalez Mendez finished with a team-high 27 victories to eight losses, and was named Third Team All-ACC.

Off the court, Cotrone and Gonzalez Mendez were also named to the All-ACC Academic Team, the second honor for Cotrone and the first for Gonzalez Mendez. In September, Gonzalez Mendez won his third consecutive Golden Torch award, given by Florida State to the athlete with the top GPA on his or her respective team.

Newcomers

The 'Noles welcomed six newcomers to the team in freshmen Jake Albo, Parker Evertsen, Grayson Goldin, Jose Gracia, and Jack Haffey, and University of Georgia transfer Marco Nunez. Combined, the newcomers went 56-41, highlighted by Goldin's 23-10 singles mark and Nunez pairing with Lock to go 13-2 in doubles action. Evertsen redshirted the entire season, while Gracia went down early in the spring season with an injury after going 3-0 in dual matches to begin the season.

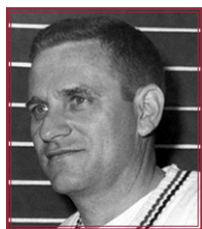

Loucks became the first coach of the men's tennis program in 1948 after coaching every sport at the Florida State College

for Women in 1936. Under his leadership, the 'Noles went 29-13 during his first stint from 1948-50, then went 24-7 after returning for another two year stint in 1952-53. He went on to be named Dean of Men from 1957-67. The courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center are named in his honor, and Loucks was named to the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1985.

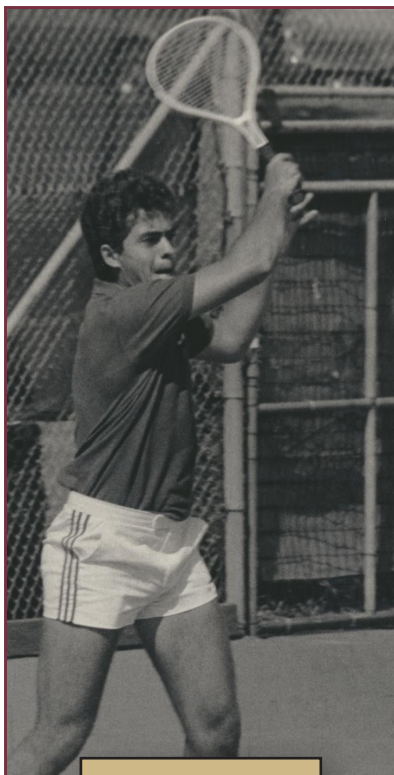


TOP SEMINOLES

MARCO ABILHOA

Marco Abilhoa, a native of Brazil, was one of the great Florida State Seminole tennis players who made an impact on the collegiate scene. Prior to enrolling, he was ranked No. 3 in the Brazilian Juniors, when former Florida State head coach Randy Jobson discovered him.

A five-year member of the Seminole tennis program from 1980 through 1984, Abilhoa was at the top of the Metro Conference. He was the No. 1 singles and doubles champion in 1981 and 1982. Upon his return in 1984, Abilhoa went back to the place where he left off, at the top of the Metro Conference. His dominating presence earned him a record three Metro MVP awards in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

JEAN-YVES AUBONE

Singles All-American, 2008 & 2009

Jean-Yves Aubone stepped onto Florida State's campus for the 2006-2007 school year and left a legacy that will be forever etched in Seminole lore. The Miami native is Florida State's only two-time singles All-American and 2009's ACC Player of the Year. Aubone is a two-time All-ACC team member, two-time All-ACC Academic Team member and two-time honoree of the ACC Academic Honor Roll. In September of 2009, Aubone was ranked at No. 8 in singles, the highest in Florida State history. In 2008, Aubone and Clint Bowles teamed up to record the second-most doubles victories in a single season with 28 wins. He finished his career named the ACC Men's Tennis Scholar Athlete of the Year.

DR. RAY BELLAMY

FSU Hall of Fame, 1992

His accolades go far beyond the tennis courts, yet Dr. Ray Bellamy's triumphs at the net still stand out as one of the best as he was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1992. He served as his team's captain in 1960 and 1961, and during those two years only lost a total of three matches.

After leaving FSU and joining the United States Navy, Bellamy went on to become the All-Navy doubles champion and played on the

All-Navy team in 1967 and 1968 while serving as a flight surgeon. After returning to Florida to begin his practice, Bellamy became the state's 35-and-over singles and doubles champion in the 1970's.

MAT CLOER

Singles All-American, 2005

Mat Cloer, a native of Brevard, N.C., became one of the greatest players in not only FSU history, but also conference history during his outstanding senior season in 2004-05. During that year, the two-time ACC Player of the Year became the first player in school history to earn All-American honors in singles. He also received the national ITA/Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, the first national award for any FSU men's tennis player. He finished his FSU campaign with 83 singles victories and 70 doubles wins. Cloer returned as an assistant coach at Florida State from 2007-11.

PAUL HAARHUIS

FSU Hall of Fame, 1993

Paul Haarhuis, the "Dutchman" from Eindhoven, The Netherlands, came to FSU in 1986 after transferring from Armstrong State College in Savannah, Ga. He went on to become one of the

best tennis players ever to come out of FSU and was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1993. With the Seminoles, his first season was a true success as he went 35-5 in singles competition and 25-5 in doubles. Included in his long list of accolades was the first-ever Men's Intercollegiate Invitational Tennis Championships held in Panama City.

At one point, Haarhuis had 24 consecutive wins. Once his collegiate career was finished Haarhuis had a 70-10 overall singles record for his two years and consecutive Metro Conference MVP awards, including 1984 when he helped lead the Seminoles to their third team title in four years.

As successful as Haarhuis was for FSU, his career flourished even more once he turned professional in 1989. Through the 2003 season, Haarhuis had career earnings totaling over \$7.7 million dollars. During his 14-year run on the ATP tour, Haarhuis amassed 54 doubles titles including six Grand Slam championships. He won the

career Grand Slam with three French Open titles and one championship at Wimbledon, the US Open and Australian Open. He won his lone singles title in 1995 during an event in Jakarta.

DON LOUCKS

FSU Hall of Fame, 1985

After six decades of service to FSU athletics, Don Loucks was inducted into the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1985. In 1936, Loucks started off his relationship with FSU as the coach of every sport at the Florida State College for Women. He was the "pioneer" of many of the current athletic programs. In 1947, he was the first coach for the men's basketball team and a year later was named the first tennis coach. His hoops team scored the first victory for the newly formed athletics program. His tennis team was the first to have a winning season, going 9-4.

Loucks served as Dean of Men from 1957 through 1967 and during this time, he served as a lead figure in the Seminole athletics program, as well as in the department of education. He retired from the athletics department in 1980 as professor emeritus in physical education. His dedication did not go unnoticed as the varsity tennis courts were renamed in his honor. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center was built around his courts.

VAHID MIRZADEH & CONNOR SMITH

Doubles All-Americans, 2011

Vahid Mirzadeh spent three years as member of the tennis team and the last two as the captain of the team. Mirzadeh capped off his career as an All-American in doubles alongside Connor Smith. In 2011, he was also the second Seminole to receive the national ITA/Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award. Mirzadeh started his junior season ranked at No. 115 in the nation and worked his way to a career best of No. 21. In doubles play, he and Smith teamed up to play stellar tennis and boasted a 38-19 record together over two seasons. He was named to the ACC Honor Roll and Academic All-ACC Team all three seasons.

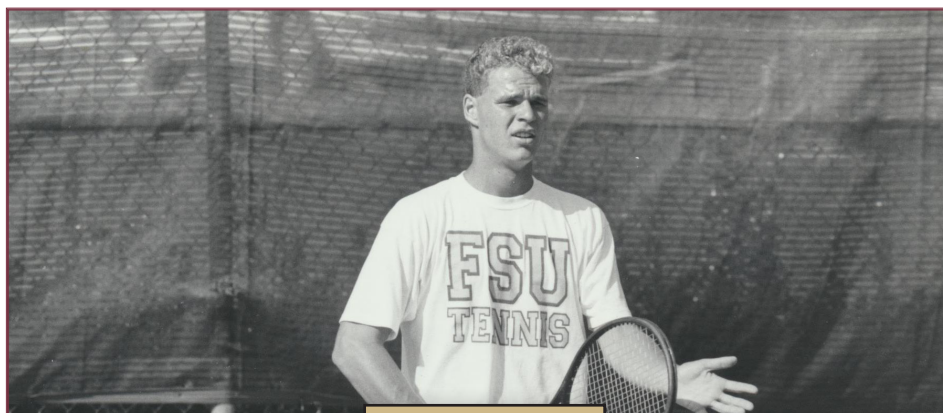


STEPHEN NOTEBOOM

After earning NATA All-American honors at Huntington College in Montgomery, Ala., Stephen Noteboom was the second "Dutchman" to thrive at Florida State for the Seminoles for the 1990-92 seasons.

Almost immediately making his presence known, Noteboom grabbed the Metro Conference's coveted MVP award for winning the title at No. 1 singles and doubles. That same year, he earned an invitation to the 1991 NCAA Championships for singles.

During his pro career, Noteboom captured a pair of doubles titles. He joined up with Fernon Wibier to win the Ordina Open. Two years later, he teamed up with Lan Bale to win the BMW Open.

ANTONIO PRIETO

Antonio Prieto, a native of Curitiba, Brazil, was an outstanding player during his time here at Florida State. His best year came in 1995 when he was an All-ACC performer, ACC Flight Champion in No. 2 doubles, and received an invitation to the NCAA Tournament. In 1996, his final season, he won the National Collegiate Tennis Classic. He turned pro in 1997 and had a successful doubles career, including an appearance in the 2001 Australian Open. He was consistently ranked in doubles throughout his career and posted a career best mark of 95th in the world during the 2000 season.

JOEY RIVE

FSU Hall of Fame, 1999

Joey Rive, a West Palm Beach native, played for the Seminoles from 1981 through 1985. As one of the top players ever to compete at Florida State, Rive led the team in wins in 1983, 1984 and 1985. During his period at number one singles, he was nationally ranked among the Top 25.

His stellar performance for the Tribe resulted in three Metro Conference singles championships in 1983, 1984 and 1985 and two doubles championships in 1983 and 1985, including the conference's top crown, the MVP in 1985. His Metro success led to his invitation to the 1985 NCAA Tournament and to the 1987 Tennis Magazine Sports-

man of the Year award.

Following his FSU career, Rive played the ATP tour where he reached as high as No. 57 in the world in 1988. He returned back to Tallahassee where he served as an assistant from 1993 to 1994. He is currently running his own collegiate tennis consulting company.

BRIAN STANTON & KEN MCKENZIE

Doubles All-Americans, 1995

Brian Stanton of Coral Springs and Ken McKenzie of Tallahassee finished up their playing careers with the Tribe in 1995. As a doubles team, the duo ended their final campaign earning collegiate tennis' top honor, an ITA All-America award.

The doubles pair received the 1995 accolade after a superb run

in the NCAA Championships. What may be the most impressive feat for them was being ranked among the nation's top 10 doubles pairs throughout the season.

During his stay at FSU, Stanton won back to back Junior Davis Cup singles titles in 1993 and 1994, won the 1993 Junior Davis Cup in doubles, and was named to the All-ACC team his sophomore and junior seasons.

McKenzie left behind a void in doubles that was a great challenge to fill. He and Stanton guided No. 1 doubles to an impressive No. 3 national ranking, the highest ranking the program has ever received. He also was impressive on the singles side, earning ACC Flight Championships at No. 2 singles in 1994 and No. 3 singles in 1995.

MACIEK SYKUT

Maciek Sykut is a handful of successful Seminoles under the tutelage of head coach Dwayne Hultquist. From 2005-09, Sykut tallied 93 singles victories (second in school history) and 82

doubles victories (fifth). Combined, his 175 victories are good for third on the school's all-time wins list and the most for a Seminole in the past quarter-century.

Nationally, "Magic" ranked as high as No. 76 in singles in 2007. Playing with Andrew Bailey in 2009, the duo took down the No. 4 doubles team in the country from Virginia.

Professionally, Sykut reached as high as No. 145 in the world in doubles play in 2012. For his efforts at FSU his senior season, he was named to the All-ACC team.

JASON WHITE

Jason White finished his four-year run with the Seminoles in 1996, his best season as a player by far. As the top singles and doubles player, White was given a lot of responsibility as FSU's captain.

Even though he won the ACC Championship at No. 4 singles in 1994 and a pair of championships at No. 2 doubles in 1994 and 1995, White was still on top of ACC tennis in 1996. Nationally ranked for most of the year, the senior from Longwood received a bid to the 1996 NCAA Tournament after being edged out for the championships at No. 1 singles.

LEX WOOD

FSU Hall of Fame, 1982

In 1982, Lex Wood became the first player from the Florida State tennis program to be inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. He was a player for the Seminoles from 1963-64, then the program's head coach from 1965 through 1969.

When Wood arrived from his native South Africa in 1962, head coach Eddie Cubbon knew he had a leader amongst his new crop of tennis players. For the following three seasons he would become a mainstay among the nation's top 20 players, playing at No. 1 singles and doubles.

In 1963, his singles match record was 22-1 and his career mark was 51 victories in 54 singles matches. Over the course of his Florida State career, Wood defeated many great collegiate players including a former U.S. Davis Cup player, Marty Riessen. As head coach, his Seminoles went an impressive 81-33-1 during his tenure. His last two teams in 1968 and 1969 went 20-4 and 22-5-1 in dual match play, respectively.
