NO. 3 SEED SEMINOLES RETURN TO NCAA TOURNAMENT; FACE FLORIDA GULF COAST

Florida State, which has defeated a nation's best seven teams in the top-25 of the RPI, plays Florida Gulf Coast in its first game of the 2017 NCAA Tournament on Thursday, March 17, 2017 at the Amway Center in Orlando, Fla. It marks the second time in the Seminoles' now 15-year NCAA history that they will play in the NCAA Tournament in the state of Florida. Florida State played the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament's Southeast Regional at the Orlando Arena where it defeated both Evansville (82-70, March 18) and Tulane (94-63, March 20) on its way to the Elite Eight of the tournament before falling to Kentucky one win short of the Seminoles' second NCAA Final Four appearance in school history. Florida State will meet its 2017 first round opponent - Florida Gulf Coast - for just the second time in school history and the second time in the postseason. The Seminoles defeated the Eagles, 58-53, on March 18, 2014 in the first round of the NIT at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. It was a win that helped Florida State advance to the Final Four of the NIT. A victory over Florida Gulf Coast on Thursday would put the Seminole into a third round NCAA Tournament game against the winner of a second round game between No. 6 seeded Maryland and No. 11 seeded Xavier.

FLORIDA STATE'S NCAA TOURNAMENT HISTORY

Led by sophomore center Dave Cowens, Florida State made its first NCAA Tournament appearance during the 1967-68 season. Cowens averaged a double double of 18.8 points and 17.0 rebounds for the 19-8 Seminoles who fell to East Tennessee State, 79-69, in their first ever NCAA Tournament games. The Seminoles have a 15-13 overall record in NCAA Tournament play, played UCLA for the 1972 National Championship, have played in one Final Four (1972), one Elite Eight (1972) and have played in the Sweet 16 four times (1972, 1992, 1993 and 2011).

FLORIDA STATE IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

The Seminoles' selection to the 2017 NCAA Tournament marks the 15th time the Seminoles will appear in the NCAA Tournament and fifth time under head coach Leonard Hamilton. The Seminoles participated in the NCAA Tournament in a school-record four consecutive seasons from 2009-12. Florida State has now participated in the postseason in 12 of Hamilton's 15 seasons at Florida State.

FLORIDA STATE'S NO. 3 SEED IN 2017 NCAA TOURNAMENT TIES HIGHEST IN FSU HISTORY

Florida State No. 3 seed in the West Regional of the 2017 NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles' No. 3 regional seed ties the school record for highest seed and marks the fourth time in school history they have been a No. 3 seed. Florida State was the No. 3 seed in the West Region in 1992, the No. 3 seed in the Southeast regional in 1993 and the No. 3 seed in the East Regional in 2012.

FLORIDA STATE RAN THE GAUNTLET IN JANUARY

From December 31 through January 21, the Seminoles earned a 5-1 record in games played against six consecutive nationally ranked opponents. In consecutive games, the Seminoles played No. 11/11 Virginia (Won 60-58, December 31 in Charlottesville), No. 21/23 Virginia Tech (Won 93-78, January 7 in Tallahassee), No. 7/7 Duke (Won 88-72, January 10 in Tallahassee), No. 11/12 North Carolina (Lost, 83-96, January 14 in Chapel Hill, N.C.), No. 15/15 Notre Dame (Won 83-80, January 18 in Tallahassee) and No. 21/11 Louisville (Won 73-68, January 21 in Tallahassee). It marked only the third time during a regular season that an ACC team faced six consecutive ranked teams; Florida State was 5-1 while the previous teams (Maryland in 1993 and NC State in 1979) were a combined 2-10.

LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...

...Defeat Florida Gulf Coast and win its first NCAA Tournament game in a given year for its third consecutive tournament and for the ninth time in 15 NCAA Tournament appearances.

...Defeat Florida Gulf Coast and win its fourth consecutive game against a team from the state of Florida. The Seminoles are undefeated this year against Miami (2-0) and Florida (1-0) - both of whom are playing in the 2017 NCAA Tournament;

...Defeat Florida Gulf Coast and wins its 26th game of the season. The school record for victories in a single season is 27 by Florida State's 1971-72 teams - the first Seminole to advance to the NCAA Final Four and play in the championship game of the NCAA Tournament.

FLORIDA STATE'S WIN TOTAL IN THE LAST 11 YEARS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last 11 years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total games played as a member of the ACC with 254 wins. The Seminoles average 21.2 wins per season with records of 20-10 (2005-06), 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10), 23-11 (2010-11), 25-10 (2011-12), 18-16 (2012-13), 22-14 (2013-14), 17-16 (2014-15), 20-14 (2015-16) and 25-7 (2016-17).

FLORIDA STATE'S RECORD AGAINST NCAA TOURNAMENT TEAMS

Florida State had a 12-4 record against 11 teams that will play in the 2017 NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles played 11 teams and earned wins over 10 of those teams on its way to a 25-8 overall record and a school-record tying No. 3 seed in the West Region of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles played Duke (88-72, January 10; 70-75, February 28), Florida (83-78, December 11), Louisville (73-68, January 21), Miami (75-57, February 1; 66-57, March 4), Minnesota (75-67, November 28), North Carolina (83-96, January 14), Notre Dame (83-80, January 15; 72-84, February 11; 73-77, March 10), Virginia (60-58, December 31), Virginia Tech (93-78, January 7; 74-68 March 9), Wake Forest (88-72, December 28) and Winthrop (100-86, November 12) during the 2016-17 regular season and ACC Tournament.

FLORIDA STATE'S VICTORIES

Florida State has won seven of its last 11 entering the 2017 NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles are 2-1 during the month of March and were 5-3 during the month of February. The Seminoles have winning records in each of the first five months of the season (8-0 in December, 6-1 in November, 5-3 in February, 4-3 in the month of January and 2-1 in the month of March).

FLORIDA STATE FINISHES IN SECOND PLACE IN ACC STANDINGS

Florida State enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament with a 25-8 record and a 12-6 mark in ACC play. The Seminoles finished in second place in the ACC standings and were the No. 2 seed in last week's ACC Tournament at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn. Florida State defeated Virginia Tech in the quarterfinals before falling to Notre Dame in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.

SEMINOLES SELECTED TO PLAY IN NCAA TOURNAMENT WITH 25 WINS

Florida State won its 25th game of the season with its 74-68 win over Virginia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament on March 9 at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn. The Seminoles' 25 victories is tied for the second most in a single season in school history and puts them only two wins away from tying the school record for wins in a single season. Florida State's 1971-82 team won a school record 27 games in advancing to the championship game of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history.

FLORIDA STATE HAS DEFEATED A SCHOOL RECORD TYING SEVEN RANKED OPPONENTS

Florida State enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament having earned a school-record tying seven games over nationally ranked team. The Seminoles have earned victories over No. 21/21 Florida (December 11; 83-79), No. 11/11 Virginia (December 31, 60-58), No. 21/21 Virginia Tech (January 7, 93-78), No. 7/7 Duke (January 10, 88-72), No. 15/15 Notre Dame (January 18, 83-80), No. 12/11 Louisville (January 21, 73-68) and No. 25 Miami (March 4, 66-57). It marks the second time in school history the Seminoles have defeated seven nationally ranked opponents in a single season. The Seminoles also defeated seven ranked opponents during the 1992-93 season.

FLORIDA STATE WAS UNDEFEATED AT HOME

Florida State capped off an undefeated, 18-0, record at home in the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee with its 66-67 win over Miami on March 4. It marked the sixth time in school history the Seminoles were undefeated at home.

FLORIDA STATE AGAINST TEAMS CURRENTLY IN THE NATION'S TOP 25

Florida State is 5-3 against teams currently ranked in the top-25 of the Associated Press poll with wins over Louisville, Duke, Florida, Virginia and Notre Dame. The Seminoles are 7-4 against teams that have been ranked among the nation's top 25 teams at some point during the 2016-17 season. Florida State was 5-1 as it played a gauntlet of six consecutive ranked teams from December 31 through January 21 with wins over No. 11/11 Virginia, No. 21/23 Virginia Tech, No. 7/7 Duke, No. 15/15 Notre Dame and No. 12/11 Louisville.

HAMILTON IS THE EIGHTH WINNINGEST ACC COACH

Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament as the eighth all-time winningest coach in ACC history with 281 career wins as the head coach at Florida State. Hamilton entered the 2016-17 season with 256 victories and in 11th place in total career wins in ACC history. During the season, he surpassed former NC State (and Florida) head coach Norm Sloan, and former South and North Carolina head coach Frank McGuire

FLORIDA STATE VS. FLORIDA GULF COAST – THE LAST MEETING

Florida State's Aaron Thomas scored 22 points to help a short-handed Florida State squad advance to the second round of the NIT with a 58-53 victory over Florida Gulf Coast. Thomas helped eliminate the Eagles on March 18, 2014 at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. Thomas carried the Seminoles in the second half, scoring 14 consecutive points during one stretch after Florida State gave up a five-point halftime lead. It was the first time during his collegiate career that he played all 40 minutes. Florida State was without second-leading scorer Ian Miller because of a foot injury, so that was 13.7 points missing from the lineup. Bernard Thompson led the Eagles with 16 points and Jamail Jones chipped in 11. Florida Gulf Coast opened the second half on a 6-0 run that extended to a 15-4 stretch and a 34-28 lead. That's when Thomas took over with his 14 straight points. White scored seven of the last 10 Florida State points to ice the game.

HAMILTON RANKED NINTH FOR ALL-TIME ACC WINS

Florida State's Leonard Hamilton enters in ranked ninth in ACC history with 127 ACC victories (ACC regular season and Tournament victories). Hamilton led the Seminoles to 12 ACC wins this season which has allowed him to move from 12th place into his current position of eighth. Hamilton surpassed Norm Sloan of NC State with the Seminoles' sixth ACC victory over Louisville on January 21 and surpassed Virginia Cavalier legend Terry Holland for sole possession of eighth place on Thursday night in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals with Florida State's win over Virginia Tech.

Florida State Men's Basketball By The Numbers

.392 Graduate student Michael Ojo is shooting .794 from the free throw line – an improvement of .392 percentage points as compared to his first three seasons at Florida State.

.582 Sophomore Terance Mann enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament shooting .582 from the field for his career. He shot .584 from the field as a freshman and is shooting .581 from the field as a sophomore.

.754 Florida State is shooting a combined .754 from the free throw line in the last six games – including a .826 mark against Virginia Tech in the ACC Tournament and a .824 mark against Boston College (February 20) and a .821 mark against Clemson on February 25.

.667 Sophomore Christ Koumadje is shooting .667 from the field (14 of 21) in the last 10 games. He was a perfect three of three from the field in Florida State's victory over Miami on March 4.

.818 Seminole freshman Trent Forrest is shooting .818 from the free throw line (nine of 11) in the last seven games. He began his streak with a perfect two of two performance from the free throw line against Pittsburgh on February 18.

.828 Sophomore Dwayne Bacon is shooting .828 from the free throw line (24 of 29) in the last six games. He was a perfect five of five from the free throw line at Clemson (February 25) and at Duke (February 28).

.844 Sophomore PJ Savoy has made 45 field goals with nearly 85 percent of his made field goals (38, .844 percent) coming from the 3-point line.

.938 Junior Braian Angola Rodas is shooting .938 from the free throw line in the last 10 games. He made 12 consecutive free throws from February 5 against Clemson through the first half of Florida State's game against Notre Dame in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.

1 Jonathan Isaac has pulled down 219 rebounds – the highest rebound total by a freshman in Florida State history.

SEMINOLES RANKED AS HIGH AS NO. 6 IN ASSOCIATED PRESS POLL

Florida State was ranked No. 6 in the Associated Press poll and No. 8 in the USA Today poll during the week of January 23 – just after its victory over Louisville and beating five nationally ranked team in six game span (December 31-January 21). It was the Seminoles' highest ranking in the AP poll since February 22, 1993 when they were also ranked sixth. The Seminole's highest AP poll ranking came on December 5 and December 12 of 1972 when they began the season and spent the first two weeks of the regular season ranked as the No. 2 team in the country.

FLORIDA STATE AS A TEAM IN THE RECORD BOOK

Florida State enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament ranked third in the ACC in scoring with an 82.5 points per game scoring average. The Seminoles' scoring average is their highest since the 1992-93 team averaged 86.3 points scored per game. Florida State's 2,721 points as a team this season ranks as the fourth highest total in school history. The Seminoles have made 982 field goals (the sixth most in a single season school history; and have made 227 3-point field goals (the fourth most in school history). The Seminoles have earned two of the top five single season point scoring totals in school history and are averaging 80.2 points per game in the last two seasons.

SEMINOLES' BACON, ISAAC AND RATHAN-MAYES EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

Florida State's Dwayne Bacon (All-ACC Second Team), Jonathan Isaac (All-ACC Freshman Team, All-ACC Honorable Mention) and Xavier Rathan-Mayes (All-ACC Defensive Team) were all honored as the Atlantic Coast Conference announced its post season all conference men's basketball teams. Bacon, Isaac and Rathan-Mayes have helped lead the Seminoles to the most successful regular season in school history with a 24-7 overall record and a 12-6 mark in ACC play. Bacon, who leads the Seminoles in scoring (career-high 16.8 ppg) and 3-point shots made (career-high 57 3FG made), was named to the All-ACC Second Team. He received the sixth-highest number of votes in the polling for the three All-ACC teams – giving him the highest number of votes of the five players named to the All-ACC Second Team. Isaac, who leads the Seminoles in rebounding (7.2 rpg) and blocked shots (1.5 bpg), earned All-ACC Honorable Mention and All-ACC Freshman team honors. Rathan-Mayes was named to the All-ACC Defensive team and finished fifth in the voting for the ACC Defensive Player of the year.

BACON NAMED TO ALL-DISTRICT TEAM BY U.S. BASKETBALL WRITERS

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon was named to the District IV All-American team by the United States Basketball Writers Association. Bacon was one of 10 honorees in the district and one of only two from the ACC (also Ben Lammers from Georgia Tech) to be named to the team. It marks the first time Bacon has earned the honor during his two-year Seminole career.

BACON WAS A TOP-10 FINALIST FOR JULIUS ERVING AWARD

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon was a finalist for the Julius Erving Award presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. The Seminole star was one of 10 finalists for the award which recognizes the top small forward in men's college basketball.

BACON NAMED TO WOODEN AWARD MIDSEASON TOP 25

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon was one of five ACC players named to the John R. Wooden Award Midseason Top 25 list. Bacon was also on the Robertson Award Watch List, Naismith Award Watch List, the Julius Erving Award Watch List (as the nation's top small forward), was named to the NIT Season Tip-Off All-Tournament Team, was named the Most Valuable Player at the Orange Bowl Classic, was named the Lute Olson National Player of the Week (Jan. 2) and was named the ACC Player of the Week (Jan. 2). Bacon was a preseason All-ACC Second-Team selection by the media in attendance at the ACC Operation Basketball in October. He earned Freshmen All-American honors and was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team as he became just the second freshman in school history to lead the Seminoles in scoring during the 2015-16 season.

BACON NAMED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK ONCE AS A SOPHOMORE

Sophomore Dwayne Bacon was named the ACC Player of the Week by the conference office on January 3. It marked the first time in his career that he has earned ACC Player of the Week honors after earning ACC Rookie of the Week honors a school-record five times as a freshman in 2016.

ISAAC NAMED TO MIDSEASON WAYMAN TISDALE AWARD WATCH LIST

Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac, the leading rebounder among freshmen in the ACC, was named to the Wayman Tisdale Award midseason watch list. The trophy is presented each year to the national freshman Player of the Year. Isaac was joined on the list by Dennis Smith, Jr. of NC State and Jayson Tatum of Duke – giving the ACC three players on the list.

ISAAC NAMED ACC ROOKIE OF THE WEEK TWICE

Florida State University freshman Jonathan Isaac was named the ACC Rookie of the Week twice during the 2016-17 season. Isaac earned the honor for the first time on November 21, 2016 and for the second time on January 23, 2017.

FORREST NAMED TO ALL-ACC ACADEMIC TEAM

Florida State freshman Trent Forrest, who earned a 3.0 grade point average during his first semester as a collegiate student-athlete, has been named to the All-ACC Academic Men's Basketball team as announced by ACC Commissioner John Swofford. He was one of eight freshmen named to the 26-member team. To be eligible for consideration, a student-athlete must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during his academic career.

HAMILTON WAS NAMED MIDSEASON COACH OF THE YEAR

Florida State head coach Leonard Hamilton was named the Jim Phelan Midseason National Coach of the Year by collegeinsider.com – one of the country's premier college basketball websites. Hamilton led the Seminoles to an 18-2 record through the first 20 games of the season which tied for the best start in school history.

28 Graduate student Michael Ojo has blocked a single-season career-high 28 shots this season. He is ranked 19th in school history with 76 career blocked shots.

54 Graduate student Michael Ojo has made 54 free throws and is shooting .794 from the free throw line this season. He made 41 free throws and shot .402 from the free throw line in the first three seasons of his career.

66 Sophomore Dwayne Bacon has started 66 of his 67 career games – the only non-start of his career came on Senior Day in 2016 against Syracuse.

82.5 Florida State enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament scoring an average of 82.5 points per game. The Seminoles have averaged 80 points or more scored per game in 17 previous seasons – most recently during the 1992-93 season (86.3 ppg).

99 Sophomore Dwayne Bacon enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament with 99 free throws made. He needs only one free throw made to reach 100 second consecutive season.

135 Senior Jarquez Smith will play in his 135 career game – tied for the fourth highest total in school history. The school record for career games played is 139 by Okaro White (2011-14).

160 Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes has been credited with a single-season career-high 160 assists and averaging a career-high 4.8 assists per game.

ISAAC IS A REBOUNDING MACHINE

Freshman phenom Jonathan Isaac totaled 12 rebounds against Virginia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament and a career-high 15 rebounds against Notre Dame in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. He enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament with an FSU record for freshmen 219 rebounds. Isaac's 7.6 rebounds per game average has him ranked seventh in the ACC among all players and first among all freshman in the nation's top conference. His 7.6 rebounds per game margin is the second highest by a freshman in school history with the 7.8 rpg mark by Corey Louis during the 1994-95 season ranking as the standard for Seminole freshmen.

ISAAC LEADS FLORIDA STATE IN BLOCKED SHOTS

All-ACC Freshman team selection Jonathan Isaac is ranked fifth in the ACC, first in the ACC among all freshman and is Florida State's leader with 45 blocked shots and a 1.5 blocked shots per game average. He has at least one blocked shot in 14 of the last 15 games and in 26 of the 30 games in which he has played this season. He blocked an incredible seven shots (including two in the final 2.2 seconds) of Florida State's 83-80 win over No. 15/15 Notre Dame on January 18 in Tallahassee. Isaac has at least one block in 14 of the last 15 games (28 total blocked shots) and is averaging 1.9 blocks per game since his incredible seven-block outing against the Fighting Irish.

ISAAC LEADS FLORIDA STATE FROM THE FREE THROW LINE

All-ACC Freshman team selection Jonathan Isaac enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament as Florida State's team leader in free throw shooting with a .796 mark. Isaac made his career-high of eight free throws at Syracuse (21 total points) and in the Seminoles' victory over NC State (21 total points). He has made at least one free throw in 22 of the 28 games he has played in and made 14 total free throws in consecutive wins over No. 15/15 Notre Dame (seven of seven) and No. 12/13 Louisville (seven of seven) in January. Isaac was also a perfect six of six from the line in his first appearance in the Seminoles' series against Florida.

ISAAC EARNS SEVENTH CAREER DOUBLE DOUBLE AGAINST VIRGINIA TECH

Freshman phenom Jonathan Isaac totaled scored 11 points and pulled down 12 rebounds in Florida State's victory over Virginia Tech in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament – the seventh double double of his first season at Florida State. He totaled double doubles against Detroit Mercy (November 20, 14 points and 10 rebounds), Minnesota in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge (14 points and 13 rebounds), at North Carolina (17 points and 12 rebounds), Notre Dame (23 points and 10 rebounds), Louisville (16 points and 10 rebounds), at Syracuse (19 points and 12 rebounds) and against Virginia Tech (11 points and 12 rebounds). For Isaac, five of his seven double doubles have come against ACC competition and six have come against a team that is, or has been, ranked during the 2016-17 season.

FORREST IS FLORIDA STATE'S CHIEF THIEF

Freshman Trent Forrest enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament ranked first among his Seminole teammates in steals with 43 and a 1.3 steals per game average. He has earned multiple steals in 13 of the Seminoles' 33 games and has at least one steals in 25 of the Seminoles' 33 games. He established his career-high of four steals in victories over Detroit Mercy and Illinois and against Georgia Tech in ACC play. Forrest's 43 steals are fourth most by a Seminole freshman.

FORREST GOES TO THE BOARDS

Freshman Trent Forrest pulled down his ACC high of nine rebounds in his first trip to Cameron Indoor Stadium on February 28. It marked the second time this season – he also pulled down nine rebounds in Florida State's victory over Southern Miss on December 6 – that he had earned nine rebounds in a single game.

BACON SCORES OVER 500 POINTS FOR THE SECOND CONSECUTIVE SEASON

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon hit the 500-point mark for the second consecutive season in a rather emphatic way on a dunk in the final seconds of Florida State's game against Duke on February 28. He scored 536 points as a freshman and enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament with 558 points. Bacon is just the 14th player in school history with at least 500 points scored in consecutive seasons.

Junior Braian Angola-Rodas scored his career high of 17 points in Florida State's game against Notre Dame in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. Jonathan Isaac – There is no specific reason I wear No. 1. I wore No. 11 when I played for USA Basketball as a senior in high school, I wore No. 1 when I played AAU ball with Each 1 Teach 1, I wore No. 42 when I played in the NIKE Hoop Summit and I wore No. 1 as a senior at IMG Academy.

CJ Walker – “I wear No. 2 at Florida State because my favorite player, Kyrie Irving, wears No. 2. I have been a fan of his for a long time; he has certainly influenced my game and how I play my game. I am looking forward to meeting him sometime during my career.

Trent Forrest – “I wear No. 3 to honor two of my teammates who have recently passed away. Two of my former AAU teammates (Rod Scott) wore No. 3 and another (Herman Williams) wore No. 13. So with the No. 3 in common in both of their numbers I decided to change to that number at Florida State when it became available. Rod passed away after he was involved in a car crash in 2016 and Herman collapsed while playing in a pick-up game at his church just before his freshman year began at University of Louisiana Monroe.”

Dwayne Bacon – “I wear the No. 4 because that’s my favorite basketball number. There is no significance – it’s just the number I am most comfortable wearing.”

Braian Angola-Rodas – “I wear No. 11 because that’s the number my dad wore when he played basketball. He loved wearing that number when we played against each other. He passed away in 2014; I have made him a promise that I will always wear No. 11 in his honor.”

Terance Mann – “I wear No. 14 because that’s the number my mom wore when she played at Georgetown. It’s also the date of my grandmother’s birthday – December 14.”

Xavier Rathan-Mayes – “I wear No. 22 because that’s the number my father, Tharon, wore when he played at Florida State. I have always wanted to follow in his footsteps; I always wanted to break the records he set wearing the same number he wore as a Seminole. “

Jarquez Smith – “I wore No. 22 in high school because every male in my family that has played basketball has worn that number. I switched to No. 23 because that’s the closest to 22, which is my family’s number.”

Brandon Allen – “I chose to wear the No. 40 as a tribute to my dad, Randy, who wore the number when he was a Seminole. My dad enjoyed a great career as a Seminole and comes to as many of our games as he can.”

Michael Ojo – “I wore No. 50 in high school and it’s a big man’s number. I felt like I had some success in high school and I was wearing it in high school when I was recruited to play at Florida State so I decided to stick with it when I came to play for Coach Hamilton.”

Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes enters Thursday’s game against Florida Gulf Coast ranked 13th in school history with 125 career 3-point field goals made. He is chasing his father, Tharon, who made 128 career 3-point shots as a Seminole for 12th place on Florida State’s all-time 3-point field goals made record list.

RATHAN-MAYES ALSO CHASING HIS DAD ON THE SEMINOLES’ ALL-TIME SCORING LIST

Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes enters Thursday’s game against Florida Gulf Coast ranked 26th in school history in scoring with 1,210 points. He needs two points to surpass Seminole great Sam Cassell and move into 25th place all-time in scoring as a Seminole. He also needs only 51 points to move into 22nd place in scoring with 1,261 points – surpassing his father, Tharon.

SAVOY SHOOTING WELL FROM ALL OVER THE COURT

Sophomore PJ Savoy is certainly one of the Seminoles’ most impressive shooters. He is tied for second among his Florida State teammates with 38 3-point shots made and is only of three Seminole regulars shooting better than 40 percent from the bonusphere. He has made three or more 3-point field goals in five games including three in Florida State’s win over Notre Dame on January 18 and seven in Florida State’s victory over Southern Miss on December 6. Savoy made 21 3-point shots in ACC play.

MANN GOES TO THE OFFENSIVE BOARDS

Sophomore Terance Mann, who has started 32 of the Seminoles’ 33 games this season, enters the 2017 NCAA Tournament as Florida State’s leader in offensive rebounds with 64 and a 1.9 offensive rebounds per game average. Of Mann’s 154 rebounds – 64 (or .416 percent) have come on the offensive end of the court. Mann has pulled down at least five offensive rebounds in four different games – and averages 10.5 points per game in those four Florida State victories.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Freshman Jonathan Isaac scored 17 points and added 11 rebounds and teammate Michael Ojo contributed 14 points and 13 rebounds to lead Florida State to a 119-58 win over Southeastern in men's basketball exhibition action at the Donald L. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State accomplished something on Sunday that hasn't happened in Leonard Hamilton's 29 seasons and 879 games as a college coach -- hit triple digits in consecutive games. The Seminoles rolled to a 100-71 victory over Detroit Mercy as they were 40 of 70 from the field and had five players in double figures. It is the first time since December of 1996 -- against Jacksonville and Tennessee State -- that FSU has scored 100 or more in back-to-back games. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State's 66-57 victory over No. 25 Miami on Saturday gives the 15th-ranked Seminoles a double-bye in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament and their first unbeaten home season in 41 years. Florida State (24-7, 12-6) will be the second seed for the tournament,

which begins Tuesday at Barclay's Center in Brooklyn, New York. It is their highest seeding since they were second in 1993. Florida State, Louisville and Notre Dame are tied for second but the Seminoles have the higher seed based on a better combined record over the Irish and Cardinals. The win also wrapped up the Seminoles' first unbeaten home season since 1975-76. They are 18-0 at the Tucker Center this season, with six wins against ranked teams. They have won 21 straight at home dating to last season. The first half saw five ties and nine lead changes as Florida State led 37-34 at halftime. Miami's Davon Reed, who had 22 points, started the second half with a 3-pointer to tie the game at 37 before FSU went on a 12-3 run to take control. Jarquez Smith, who was one of two seniors playing his final home game, had five of his 11 points during the run. A dunk by Bacon with 4:19 remaining gave the Seminoles a 59-48 lead but the Hurricanes went on a 9-2 run to close within 61-57 with 19 seconds remaining. FSU closed it out by scoring the final six points.

Leonard Hamilton Might have His Best Team – But Don't Tell Him Just Yet

It wasn't as if Florida State Coach Leonard Hamilton didn't warn his players.

After his team had beaten Louisville eight days ago to finish a remarkable six-game run in which the Seminoles went 5-1 against ranked teams, he warned his players not to get carried away with all the oohing and aahing they were receiving nationally.

"'Noles now a number one seed!' screamed the bracketologists, who change their predictions on an almost hourly basis.

"FSU looks like a Final Four team," was another Internet headline — as if early April somehow came in late January.

"I told them that what they did against those teams was impressive, but they better not let down with three straight road games coming up," Hamilton said on Tuesday afternoon, just before he and his team flew to Atlanta to play Georgia Tech the next night. "They let up on the road in this league and they'll pay for it. I hope they understand that."

Apparently, they didn't. At least not on Wednesday when Georgia Tech — the only team to beat North Carolina in ACC play so far this winter — hammered the Seminoles, 78-56, having led by 26 at halftime.

"They outplayed us, they out prepared us," Hamilton said afterward. "Their players played better and they probably outcoached us. They were connected mentally and emotionally a lot better than we were.

"Inevitably, it seems to happen to every team every year. I hope it's the only one we're going to have."

Then, on Saturday, the sixth-ranked Seminoles fell again, 82-72, at Syracuse.

The truth in Hamilton's last comment can be found in the fact that no college basketball team has gone undefeated since 1976. The night before his sixth-ranked team got burned in Atlanta, top-ranked Villanova, second-ranked Kansas and fourth-ranked Kentucky all lost on the road.

Still, there is plenty of reason to believe the losses won't start a prolonged slump for the Seminoles, who are 1804 overall and 6-3 in the ACC. Hamilton has been at Florida State for 15 years. His 2011 team reached the Sweet 16 before losing by one to VCU's Final Four team. His 2012 team won the ACC tournament. He believes this could be his best team.

"Potentially," he said. "We'll have to see how much we improve between now and March. I keep telling them if we want to get where we want to go in March, we have to improve every day in January and in February. It's a good group. Most of the time, they listen."

The Seminoles are talented and fascinating all at once. They have two seven-footers who are role players: 7-1 senior Michael Ojo and 7-4 sophomore Christ Koumadje combine to play about 24 minutes a game, averaging about nine points and five rebounds between them. But each is an intimidating defense presence on the floor and helps give Hamilton the ability to play big, small or both.

There isn't a senior among the team's three stars: junior forward Xavier Rathan-Mayes; sophomore guard Dwayne Bacon; and freshman center Jonathan Isaac.

At 6-7, Bacon can get his shot almost anytime he wants — he hit the winning three-pointer at Virginia to culminate a 29-point afternoon — but also passes the ball well. Isaac is a possible one-and-done, averaging more than 13 points and almost eight rebounds a game. Rathan-Mayes is the glue guy: he doesn't score that much (10.1 points per game) but averages nearly five assists. All could come back next year. Or all could be gone.

"I don't worry about that," Hamilton said. "Now is certainly not the time to do that anyway. But I think we've recruited well and we're in a place now if we lose some kids early, we'll continue to be good. It's a different time. You have to be prepared for that."

Hamilton is 68 and has seen many different times and many different places in his coaching career. He was with Joe. B. Hall at Kentucky when it won the 1978 national title and reached two other Final Fours. His first head coaching shot came at Oklahoma State, where he went from eight wins in season one to 17 in season four. He then took over a Miami program that was about to go into the Big East and promptly went 1-17 in conference play in 1991, the Hurricanes' first season.

Nine years later, Miami tied for first in the regular season and reached the Sweet 16.

And then came Michael Jordan.

Jordan had taken over the Washington Wizards' front office during the 1999-2000 season and was looking for a new coach after a 29-53 disaster. He landed on Hamilton. One year later, after going 19-63, Jordan went looking for a new coach again.

"I've never regretted it," Hamilton insisted about his lost season in Washington. "We faced some challenges, but I thought the team was well-coached. When Michael told me he wanted to come back and play and bring back a coach he'd played for before [Doug Collins], I respected that."

The following season, for the first time in 30 years, Hamilton wasn't coaching. "I could have had a job," he said. "I had college teams contacting me during the season in Washington. But I decided to wait — I'd never had a vacation. By January, when I was constantly watching two games at once in two different rooms, my wife said to me, 'You need to go back to work.' "

So he did, at Florida State. Fifteen years later, only Mike Krzyzewski has been coaching in the ACC longer. What's more, Hamilton says he isn't going anywhere anytime soon.

"I don't play golf, I don't fish and I don't like to travel very much," he said, laughing. "I feel great and, even with all the changes, I still love doing this. I wake up every morning excited about practice, excited about the games.

"I love the relationships I have with the players — the ones here now — and the ones who I've coached in the past. The best thing to me isn't winning, it's being invited to weddings or christenings or the phone calls from guys who are about to get married or have a baby. To me, that's winning."

Sometime soon, Hamilton will win his 500th game as a college coach. He's at 496 and hopes he'll keep adding to that number for years to come. He's the only person to win coach-of-the-year honors in both the Big East and the ACC. He's been to the Sweet 16. He'd like to go farther than that this spring.

"We've got a chance," he said. "But right now, I don't even want to think about that. If I think about that, if the kids think about that, then we won't be good enough in March. I know we need to get better on defense and be more consistent on offense. Believe me, I can find plenty of things to work on every day in practice. We've got a long way to go. I need to make sure they understand that."

Saturday's loss at Syracuse proved again why Hamilton was concerned about this three-game road swing. There is clearly much more to learn. Selection Sunday is six weeks away.

Bacon's improved 3-point shooting bolsters No. 15 Seminoles

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Dwayne Bacon's offseason work on his shooting mechanics is continuing to pay off for Florida State.

The sophomore leads the 15th-ranked Seminoles in 3-pointers with 39 — he made 32 all of last season. Bacon's improvement from the perimeter, where he has made 36.7 percent of his shots, is one reason why FSU (19-4, 7-3 ACC) has already equaled last year's overall and conference win totals.

"I definitely continue to have confidence in it because it has been successful all year," said Bacon, who is 10th in the conference in scoring at 17.1 points per game.

Bacon's perimeter shooting struggles was one of the reasons why he took his name out of consideration for the NBA draft last spring after only four days. The 6-foot-7 guard shot just 28.1 percent on 3-pointers last season.

Assistant coach Charlton Young said Bacon's form last season was similar to a dart thrower where he wasn't getting much arc on his shots. The biggest change they made was getting Bacon to shoot more upward and not outward.

Bacon said by the time the season opened, the new shooting style was second nature due to repetition. "It feels like my natural shot and I have been able to stick with it. I have been very happy with the results," he said.

Instead of being able to beat teams by just driving to the basket, which has always been his strength, Bacon is showing he also can beat teams in other ways. Teams have been more aggressive defending Bacon, picking him up once he gets past midcourt.

"He has always had an X on his back going into every game," Young said. "Teams like to load up the paint and force him to beat them from the perimeter. He's been able to hurt teams like that and that's from the work he put in over the summer."

Bacon's overall field goal percentage remains at 44.7 percent, but coach Leonard Hamilton has been pleased with his guard's shot selection and ability to make the big shot when called upon. Bacon has three game-winning shots in his two seasons at FSU, including the game-winning, 3-pointer in a 60-58 win over then No. 12 Virginia on Dec. 31. He had a career-high 29 points in that game, including six 3-pointers.

"The one thing that I noticed is they have played him a lot at the two guard spot," Miami coach Jim Larranaga said. "He's always been able to drive it well but now he's shooting at a very good percentage from the perimeter that he has been a nightmare matchup for a lot of guards."

Bacon goes into Sunday's game against Clemson with a 32-game streak where he has scored in double figures, which is also the longest current streak in the ACC. It is also the longest by a Florida State player since Toney Douglas did it in 33 straight games from 2007-08. Bacon is a long way from Dave Fedor's school record of 72, which occurred from 1960-62.

Florida State lost the first two games of a three-game road trip, but got some of its confidence back with a 75-57 win last Wednesday against Miami. The Seminoles have a 17-game winning streak at home. FSU enters the weekend third in the ACC standings, which puts them in position to earn a double bye for the conference tournament.

"The Miami win was good to get us back on our feet. We've lost only four games the whole season which is big," Bacon said. "Nobody thought we would have the record we would have today. We still have a lot ahead of us."

Patience, Perimeter Shooting Allowing Dwayne Bacon To Thrive

The changes Dwayne Bacon has made this season go beyond statistics and testimonials from his coaches and teammates. There have been several examples, and here's one of them.

The Florida State men's basketball team was in the early stages of what would be a 98-49 win over Southern Mississippi on Tuesday. FSU was moving the ball around, and it eventually went to Bacon, who was nestled in the corner.

The sophomore swingman is hitting on 40 percent of his 3-pointers this season. So a somewhat-open attempt from long range would have been justified.

Instead, Bacon opted to drive inside. Then, faced with two men protecting the rim, he quickly passed the ball out to a wide-open Jarquez Smith, who drained a 3-pointer.

"I know every night the defense is going to come out and put pressure on me at first," Bacon told Warchant. "But once I get everybody involved, loosen up the [defense], then, it comes back to me eventually."

Through nine games, it appears FSU's star sophomore has overhauled his game in an attempt to become a more complete player.

Bacon leads the Seminoles (8-1) with 16.7 points per game and has scored in a variety of ways. He's still using the athleticism that made him a five-star prospect out of high school. But he's also made a concerted effort to take more mid-range shots and 3-pointers from better angles.

He's shooting 49.5 percent from the field, 40.5 percent from beyond the arc and close to 74 percent from the free-throw line. One year ago, Bacon finished the 2015-16 season shooting a respectable 44.7 percent on field goals but only 28.1 percent from 3-point range.

His perimeter struggles were perhaps the most crippling during conference play. He was 19 of 70 for 27.1 percent in 18 conference games last season. FSU went 8-10 in those games.

Poor mid-range and outside shooting were among the reasons pundits believed Bacon was better off returning to school instead of jumping to the NBA after one season.

"Oh man. From last year, there were a lot of people criticizing his shooting ability," senior forward Jarquez Smith said. "The whole summer. Every time we would talk in the gym, all we would see is 'Bake' with Coach [Stan] Jones or [Charlton] Young working on his 3-point game.

Now that guys have seen he can shoot the 3, they're starting to play him a lot tighter, and now he can use his driving ability to get to the basket."

For FSU to be successful and end its four-year NCAA Tournament drought, the team will rely heavily on Bacon and his ability to score. And while he'll certainly have games where his 6-foot-7 and 220-pound athletic build will be too much for typical college shooting guards and/or small forwards to defend.

There will be other times when he'll need to rely upon his improved perimeter skills.

Seminoles coach Leonard Hamilton said that versatility is a testament to Bacon's work ethic and desire.

"I think he's pleased with the fact that he's improved his perimeter shooting," Hamilton said. "But he's improved every phase of his game. I think a lot of guys don't necessarily have the courage to make those kind of tough decisions about where they are as basketball players.

"I can't say enough about how coachable he's been. How such a good teammate he's been. He is cheering just as hard for his teammates, and he's all in. I think that's one reason why he's relaxed and does not feel a lot of pressure."

A year ago, the Seminoles needed either Bacon or fellow freshman Malik Beasley to score if they were going to win games. They didn't have the consistency or depth necessary if those two were having an off night.

Beasley's now in the NBA with the Denver Nuggets, but the Seminoles still seem to have more options. Freshman forward Jonathan Isaac, who was also a five-star prospect, is averaging 15.1 points while shooting 58.8 percent from the field and 44.4 percent from 3. The Seminoles have 11 players who are averaging more than 12 minutes per game.

Bacon's new approach, along with a stronger supporting cast, means there's more freedom to pick and choose when to shoot or to pass.

"I am just looking for the best shot," Bacon said. "I mean once [the coaches] see I haven't had a shot in a while, they tell me, 'You gotta still be aggressive and get downhill,' when I get the ball and come off a screen.

"I tend to take the best shots this season because I know my shot selection last year was a little crazy. "

There's Nothing Normal About Jonathan Isaac

There's a picture from the second half of Saturday's game against Miami that perfectly sums up Jonathan Isaac.

It's right after Terance Mann had thrown an alley-oop to Dwayne Bacon to give Florida State an 11-point lead late in the second half.

As Bacon is still hanging on the rim in the background you see Isaac in the foreground, throwing a fist and screaming as if he had just hit the game-winning and-one.

That single moment is one of the reasons Isaac is so unique. He was in foul trouble all game. Scored just two points. Didn't make a single basket from the floor. And yet, it was his outlet pass that led to the alley-oop. And because he only cares about winning – not how many points he's scored – he celebrated Bacon's dunk like it was his own.

"That's what separates him," FSU head coach Leonard Hamilton said with a smile when I brought up that specific celebration.

"(Winning) is the goal," Isaac said. "That should be the goal for everybody."

Should be. Sure. But we all know that isn't the goal for every basketball player in a gym. Some of them aren't going to be happy if they don't score points. No matter how the team does.

Isaac is the polar opposite. He averages 12.2 points and 7.2 rebounds but is taking just 7.9 shots per game. That's because he hardly ever forces anything. If he's open he shoots. If he sees a path he'll drive toward the basket.

Otherwise he's content to play within the offense. And celebrate a teammate's dunk like it's his own.

That's not exactly the norm for these one-and-done super-duper type talents.

"That's just kind of the person I am," Isaac said. "I don't really care too much about myself. I want to be on a winning team. I want to be on a great team, and I think that's what I'm on right now. So when guys make plays like that it just gets me so excited."

Think about what this can do for team chemistry. When the future lottery pick takes so much joy in *other* people scoring. When the most talented player on the team is also the most selfless that has a way of permeating an entire roster.

It's one of the main reasons these Seminoles seem to get along so well and take real joy in watching each other succeed. After all, if Jonathan Isaac can be perfectly happy scoring two points in a game then how can that *not* have an impact on the players who won't be hearing their names called by NBA Commissioner Adam Silver?

The 6-foot-10 forward is about to play in his first (and most likely last) college basketball postseason, starting tonight in Brooklyn in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals.

It's been a terrific freshman year for Isaac, who has had one of the more unique ascents of all time for a top NBA prospect.

As a sophomore in high school he was 6-foot-3 and couldn't dunk.

He wasn't sure he would ever be good enough to play college basketball, much less be a first-round draft pick. But he kept getting better. And more importantly kept growing.

When the recruiters first came calling he admits he had no idea what he was in for. He wasn't a big fan of college basketball so he wasn't familiar with all of the schools and conferences. Coaches had to explain to him where they were located and who they played.

His first offer, in fact, was from Arkansas State. East Carolina was after that.

But he struck up a relationship with FSU assistant Dennis Gates early on in the process. They became close. And he realized he wanted to be a Seminole – even after the likes of Kentucky and Louisville came knocking later on.

That's what makes this year so sweet for Isaac.

After he signed with Florida State there were plenty of people that asked him what he was thinking. Why would he go to a "football school" that hadn't been to the tournament in four years instead of a traditional power?

To say there was skepticism from some about his decision would be an understatement.

Well, there's not any skepticism anymore.

The Seminoles are 24-7 and are the No. 2 seed in the ACC Tournament.

Thanks, in large part, to their soft-spoken freshman phenom.

"I hope we did (prove the doubters wrong)," Isaac said with a smile. "But we're not done proving. We're not done proving by a long shot. We've still got work to do. But it's been a dream regular season for me. To come in here and have that doubt in the back of my head, 'Did I make the right decision? Should I have went to Kentucky or someplace where I'm just going to be in all the hype?'"

"But I truly believe I made the right decision."

Isaac Fitting In Well At Florida State

Jonathan Isaac sometimes marvels how far he's come in his basketball career.

Four years ago, he was a 6-foot-3 guard coming off the bench for a rather average Barron Collier High School squad.

Now, he's one of the key reasons No. 16 Florida State (18-4) is a legitimate ACC contender with national title aspirations. The 6-foot-10 forward is among the Seminoles leaders in nearly every statistical category, leading FSU in rebounding (8.1 per game), blocked shots (1.6), and free-throw percentage (.821). He's also second in the team in scoring (13.1) and steals (1.2). An all-around threat, Isaac is also fourth on the team in 3-point field goal percentage (.362).

Isaac and his Seminoles teammates are in Miami on Wednesday night, looking to snap a two-game skid that's seen the Seminoles fall out of the Top 10.

"I thank God every day for the position I'm in," Isaac said. "Looking back, I couldn't have imagined being in this situation in a million years. I'm just so thankful."

Isaac said he and his teammates expected to be successful when the Seminoles began preseason drills in August.

"I had no doubt in my mind since I got here in the summer, being around these guys, I had no doubt in my mind we could be a special team," he said. "The ACC is tough. Every game is a grind. Every game is a battle. In nonconference, you sometimes have those games you can run away with, but in the ACC, it often comes down to the wire and you need to finish the game making plays."

Sophomore guard Terance Mann, who was on last year's 20-14 NIT FSU squad, says Isaac has made an immediate impact on the program.

"He's brought a lot to the team, especially on the defensive end," Mann said. "He blocks a shot. He gets a lot of defensive rebounds. As a teammate, he's a great teammate. He brings a lot of leadership and energy that we need."

Mann, one of Isaac's best friends on the team, says he's been impressed with his teammate off the court as well. "Jonathan is outgoing. He truly cares about every person he meets," Mann said. "He's not the type of dude where someone goes up to him and says 'I'm so and so, I've been a fan of yours' and he just shakes their hand and walk away. He truly cares about all his little fans. He introduces himself and asks everyone their name. He's just a caring, loving dude."

Isaac had a bit of a nomadic high school experience, playing at International School of Broward in Fort Lauderdale for two years before spending a year honing his skills at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, a private athletic training institute for youth, high school, collegiate and professional athletes. His time at IMG helped prepare him for the mental grind of college athletics.

"That's probably been the easiest adjustment, actually," Isaac said. "At IMG, you go to classes and then you go focus on your sport. They really get you ready for that challenge."

As a player, Isaac says he's much better this year than he was last year. For one thing, he feels he's more mature as a player.

"I just worked on my mentality a lot," Isaac said. "Obviously, I'm working on my game but as soon as I got to college, I knew I needed to work on my mindset and kind of get comfortable and play carefree without a lot on my mind. That's probably been the biggest thing."

Isaac says he still keeps in touch with his friends in Naples. During Christmas break, he got together and played hoops with past and present members of the Golden Gate High School basketball team. He's good friends with former Golden Gate players Jeffercy Jean, Jeremiah Hopper and Arcaim Lallemand, who are all playing college basketball.

"I love all those guys, and they're always wishing me luck and following what I'm doing (at FSU)," he said. He said his mom Jackie and little brother will be at Wednesday night's game.

"I don't like to talk too much about my accomplishments," he said. "My mom loves to brag, though. She'll tell everybody so I don't have to."

Isaac is already projected to be a lottery pick in this year's NBA Draft. He insists that's the farthest thing from his mind right now.

"You can't be one foot in, one foot out the door and help your team," he said. "Right now, I'm focused on doing everything I can to help us win games."

Isaac Uses Early Years, Family for Motivation

Sometimes, before the Florida State men's basketball team hits the court for its pregame warmups, freshman standout Jonathan Isaac's phone lights up.

If not his mother, Jackie, it is usually a text from one of his five siblings wishing him luck before he steps between the lines of the court. These pregame rituals, pep-talks, and jump shots are all important to Isaac, but nothing eclipses family. It's been that way since his childhood days in New York, which serve as just the first chapter to a story that he still channels for motivation.

"To continue to keep moving forward, you need to look back at what you've gone through," Isaac reflects on his past. "I draw on my experiences all the time. I feel like you have to."

When he was 10-years-old, Isaac's mother pulled him and his siblings out of an unsafe living environment and moved from the Bronx to Naples, Florida. The relocation not only brought about a new way of life, but it also sparked an interest in something that would change everything — the game of basketball.

There wasn't much sibling rivalry in the house when it came to sports; just a strong bond between Isaac and his older brother, Jacob. The competition between the two led Isaac to further pursue basketball, and the fire that was ignited in Naples still burns to this day. A newly-developed love for the game met up with perfect timing— his growth spurt — and it was a match made in heaven.

"That is pretty much why I got picked on teams, and I just kept playing," Isaac refers to his towering frame. "I stuck to it, and that was the only thing I knew how to do. It's still the only thing I know how to do."

Several chapters of his story had passed before Isaac finished high school at IMG Academy in Bradenton. By that time, he had emerged as one of the best basketball players in the country with length, athleticism, and finesse all in his arsenal.

At 18 years old, and 6-foot-10, the stand-out was faced with a choice even bigger than himself — enroll in college, or become the first American player since 2005 to enter the NBA directly out of high school.

On the sixth day of July in 2015, Isaac made the monumental decision to forgo the NBA and enroll at Florida State. Fast forward to the Seminoles chapter of this superstar's story.

"Looking back at my old self and seeing how immature I was before coming here has taught me so much about what it takes to be a team leader," Isaac said of his choice to come to FSU. "Now I look back and know that I made the right decision."

'Noles head coach Leonard Hamilton has signed many high-level recruits since he's been at the helm of Florida State's basketball program, but no one quite compares to this. Isaac's impact has been felt immediately, as he's been an essential part to the Seminoles success this season.

During his squad's stretch of six consecutive matchups against ranked opponents, the freshman totaled 56 points, corralled 32 rebounds, and shot 17-for-18 from the free throw line in the final three games.

The 19-year-old may possess all the tangibles necessary to succeed in basketball, but more importantly, he embodies the elements that can't be coached — mental and physical toughness: check. High basketball IQ: check.

Allowing the game to come to him while maintaining a balanced aggression on the court: incredibly hard to do at a young age, but still, check.

“He is locked in and we’re letting him mature at the right pace,” Hamilton praises. “It’s organic and his body language while communicating with players is allowing him to gain confidence.”

From time to time, Isaac flips through those pages of the early chapters of his life. However, his story has many blank pages left to be filled and one of those will be reserved for his decision on whether or not to declare for the 2017 NBA Draft.

If he stays, the entire Florida State fan base will be happy. If he leaves, the pro team that drafts him will be happy. Regardless, the sky-high man with a youthful smile will leave a mark wherever he goes.

Florida State's Ojo Among ACC's Most Improved Players

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida State's most popular player isn't one of the Seminoles leading scorers. That honor belongs to workmanlike senior center Michael Ojo.

The 7-foot-1 Ojo's improved contributions on the court have helped the 15th-ranked Seminoles assure themselves a berth in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in five years.

Ojo has made marked improvement after sitting out last year due to a knee injury. After averaging a meager 1.9 points and shooting a woeful 40.2 percent from the free-throw line his first three seasons, the native of Lagos, Nigeria, goes into Saturday's game against No. 25 Miami averaging 5.2 points and 79.4 percent from the foul line.

It is Ojo's turnaround has him in the discussion for most improved player in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"He is shooting well from the line but the bigger thing is the effect he has on the game that doesn't show up in the statistical column," coach Leonard Hamilton said. "He is being physical and has been very effective on defense in the lane."

Ojo credits his defensive strides to watching film and seeing the game develop from the bench while rehabbing last season. The big man feels like he has developed into a smarter player and has better overall court awareness during the course of a game.

He is also quick on his feet — with jokes.

When asked if he believes he has been among the ACC's most improved players, Ojo laughed and then replied, "if only I could make more layups."

Ojo's gregarious personality is a major reason for his popularity. Hamilton has often said Ojo could run for student-body president and win without campaigning.

"He's going to send me a Christmas card. He's going to call me on Father's Day. All the things that sometimes people take for granted, Michael seems to think are important," Hamilton said.

The extra year at Florida State also allowed Ojo to work toward his master's degree in international studies, which he will earn by the end of summer.

"My injury was very unfortunate but fortunately for me it happened," he said. "Now I have an opportunity to play in the NCAA Tournament."

Florida State (23-7, 11-6 ACC) still has plenty to play for before the NCAA brackets are set on March 12. A win on Saturday over the Hurricanes (20-9, 10-7), who they beat 75-57 in Miami on Feb. 1, would earn them a double-bye to next week's ACC Tournament in Brooklyn, and 12 victories in conference play for only the third time.

A win also would wrap up the Seminoles' first unbeaten home season since 1975-76. They are 17-0 at the Tucker Center this season and have won 20 straight dating back to last season.

One thing that will be missing from Ojo's final home game will be his family. He left Nigeria in January of 2012 to attend prep school in Tennessee before arriving at Florida State. Ojo said he would like to return home eventually but realized he had to come to the United States in order to secure a better future.

Miami coach Jim Larranaga believes Ojo has a bright future and the physical intangibles to play professionally.

"I would say he's destined to play in the NBA one day. I don't know if it will be immediately," Larranaga said. "But a guy who has made as much progress as he has and offers you a very specific set of physical characteristics, there's always a place for a guy like that."

Ojo's Leading And Succeeding For FSU Hoops In Senior Season

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Born and raised in Lagos, Nigeria—home to more than 10 million people— Michael Ojo did not realize the talent he possessed nor the passion within him for basketball early on in his life.

He initially played soccer during his middle school years until he was told that his broad physique (Ojo currently is listed as 7 foot 1, 291 pounds) would allow him to play basketball and potentially compete at the collegiate level. Though opportunities to play basketball were limited in Nigeria, Ojo discovered an outlet that would allow him to prosper.

Prior to his arrival to Tallahassee in January 2012, the Lagos native traveled all throughout Europe to different basketball training camps that would ultimately assist him in developing the basic fundamentals of the game. He made his way to Chattanooga, Tennessee where he would then attend a preparatory school—Tennessee Temple— where he would earn All-American Honors from the National Association of Christian Athletes during his senior year.

During his five-month tenure at the prep school, Ojo averaged 15.0 points per game, 14.0 rebounds per game along with five blocks per game.

"I started seeing coaches and that everyone was trying to recruit me," Ojo said. "I decided to come down here to Tallahassee.

During the first three years of his collegiate career, his role on the team drastically heightened as he emerged as a team co-captain. Averaging just shy of two points per game and more than two rebounds per game in his first three seasons, the 7-footer connected more than 50 percent of his shots during his sophomore and junior campaign.

"I've met some great people here. The coaching staff has been really, really helpful," Ojo said. "My progress from my freshman year has been moving up. I've enjoyed my time in Tallahassee; this is like my second home."

However, it was during his fourth year of eligibility that Ojo took on another role in the program after suffering from a meniscus tear prior to the start of what would have been his final campaign as a Seminole.

"Sitting out last year gave me a chance to learn more about the game. With that, I was able to help my teammates out last year even though I wasn't playing," Ojo said. "I traveled with them because I wanted to be part of the team. I didn't want to exclude myself. I followed the same scouting report, listened to the same details that they do so during the course of the game, I am able to help them out. My role last year was being the very best teammate that I could be."

And it worked. After sitting out an entire season and spectating the game from a different perspective, Ojo returned as a much improved and revitalized center for Florida State. Of the five years that Ojo has suited up in garnet and gold, it is this year that he and his teammates have something special. It is this year that a bid to the NCAA Tournament is feasible and not just a mere figment of one's imagination.

Additionally, it is that special something that has contributed to the Florida State men's basketball team having the best start in program history.

"Because I'm back," was his joking response about the team's winning this year, before adding that what's making the team success "didn't happen just now. This is something we've been preparing for since August—since summer that these new guys came in.

"When you have the group of guys that are very hungry for success; their work ethic is good, they have a good attitude, the want to learn—they are coachable. There's no doubt that we have something special going on."

Sitting atop the ACC, Florida State stands with a 16-2 overall, 4-1 ACC record. Prior to suffering a draining 13-point loss to No. 11 North Carolina at the Dean Smith Center, the 'Noles ranked among the top 10 in the nation. Though slightly too early to dictate whether or not the wins that FSU has earned midway through the season are enough to secure a spot in the tournament, Ojo and the men's basketball team have ensured that their national renown does not inhibit their focus on their primary objective for the season.

"We are humans; it would be stupid for [thoughts of making the tournament] not to cross your mind when you are ranked in the top 10. Yes, it crosses your mind because we've worked so hard for this. The good thing is, and I remind my guys about it, we work so hard for this, and I would like to keep it as long as possible so we can't let up.

"It crosses your mind but you can't let it get to you. You don't go to the tournament winning 16 games, or four games in the ACC. There is a lot of games left in the season. It is a long season and we still have a long way to go. We just take it one game at a time. It's good to dream bigger, but we want to be ranked top 10 in March going into the NCAA Tournament."

Enjoying his fourth year of playing eligibility and his fifth year at Florida State, Ojo continues to maintain his balance between his schoolwork and basketball. Recording career-best numbers in all columns of the stat sheet, the center currently averages 5.2 points per game, 3.9 rebounds per game and has also registered his first collegiate double-double this season. Having already secured a Bachelor's in International Affairs, and working towards his Master's Degree in International Affairs, he's appreciated the opportunity to attend Florida State University.

"There have been ups and downs, here and there, and the most challenging thing is trying to be the best student athlete that you can be, trying to manage school with basketball, trying to not procrastinate too much and getting things done on time," he said. "This is school so you have to pass your classes before you play basketball, so you can't give up one for one."

With his focus on this season and getting all the success possible out of it, he also is ready for the future, hopeful for a basketball related-one but comfortable knowing that his education will help take him closer to whatever he wants to work towards.

"Hopefully we can see how far we could take this thing [this season] Hopefully take it to April and play in the Final Four this year," Ojo said.

"After that, I'll see what I have, and all that basketball can offer as a professional. Maybe get a job or something [working with] the team. With that and my Master's Degree, I hope to have a job somewhere someday, settle down and just be a good citizen."

Xavier Rathan-Mayes 'Stirs The Drink' For Florida State Hoops

Instead of inquiring the minds of his trusted assistants, Leonard Hamilton turned to his dependable point guard to direct Florida State's offense after a time out.

Maybe Hamilton was relying on his most experienced player. Maybe he was simply riding the hot hand.

As Xavier Rathan-Mayes became the fourth player in school history to record 10 assists with zero turnovers in the Seminoles' latest victory, it was not his offensive savvy that earned the most praise. It was his pride in the grueling task of defending opposing point guards the length of the court that garnered the most attention.

"It takes an exceptional type of mental toughness that it takes to be able to do that," Hamilton said of Rathan-Mayes, a player he believes is deserving of All-ACC recognition this season.

No. 19 Florida State (22-6, 10-5 ACC) hopes Rathan-Mayes can be the catalyst to a much-needed road win at Clemson (14-13, 4-11) on Saturday at noon.

"It just shows the maturity and the journey that we've had together to know that I'm his guy," Rathan-Mayes said of his coach. "He looks to me and he counts on me in all situations."

FSU is in a four-way tie for second place at 10-5 in the ACC standings with Louisville, Duke and Notre Dame. The top 4 teams in the standings will qualify for a double-bye straight to the quarterfinals of the conference tournament in two weeks.

If the Seminoles are able to score a road victory at Clemson, they'll hope to sustain the success three days later at Duke on Tuesday night. The final game of the regular season is against Miami on March 4 before the ACC tournament.

"There's no question we want the double bye," Hamilton said. "The only way to get it is not wish for it. Go and take it."

Winning on the road has been easier said than done for the Seminoles.

FSU owns one of the best home records in the country at 17-0, and is one of three teams (No. 2 [Villanova](#) and No. 22 Butler) to have six wins over top 25 opponents -- with five coming at home.

But the Seminoles have lost five games to unranked teams away from the Donald L. Tucker Center. The most startling trend is FSU's knack for trailing by at least 15 points in the second half of each defeat.

"It's going to test where we are mentally, physically, and I think it's really going to help us," Rathan-Mayes said. "I think we're in a really good place. I think we're really meshing as a team at the right time in the season."

Despite the road woes, Rathan-Mayes has played his best basketball of the season during conference play.

No player has a better assist to turnover ratio than Rathan-Mayes' 3.6 to 1 clip. He has had zero or one turnover in 9 of 15 conference games, and has notched 32 assists with only five turnovers in his last five outings.

Boston College coach Jim Christian, after a 32-point loss to FSU on Monday, said Rathan-Mayes is "the straw that stirs the drink" for the Seminoles.

But again, Hamilton lobbied for Rathan-Mayes to earn All-ACC defensive team honors like former guards Toney Douglas and Michael Snaer did during their FSU careers.

“He has to be the best pressure defensive guard (in the ACC),” Hamilton said.

As FSU’s regular season winds to an end, the Seminoles have deeper aspirations they hope to achieve in their first NCAA tournament berth since winning the conference in 2012.

Rathan-Mayes hopes this run will be the lasting mark with the Seminoles.

“We’ve come a long way,” Rathan-Mayes said. “I’m just happy to be in the position that I am in now, be able to have the team that I have, and to be able to have successful like we are.”

Rathan-Mayes Maturing At Point Guard For Florida State

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Xavier Rathan-Mayes' maturation as a point guard has been one of the overlooked aspects to Florida State's success so far this season.

The 6-foot-4 junior is third on the 17th-ranked Seminoles in scoring, averaging 10.3 points per game, but he is fourth in the conference in assist-turnover ratio (2.6-to-1) and fifth in assists (4.7 per game).

Rathan-Mayes said he has been pleased about the progress this season, but acknowledges there is still more that has to be made.

"There's always room for growth," he said. "My teammates have put me in a good position to lead. We just have to keep everyone healthy and keep doing what we need to do to get a high seed for the conference tournament and make the NCAA Tournament."

Rathan-Mayes is also quick to say this is the most fun he has had at Florida State, which is quite a change from a year ago. He struggled during the second half of the season and often it appeared as if he was at odds with coach Leonard Hamilton.

At the end of last season Rathan-Mayes briefly entered the NBA draft but decided to return to school after a conversation with Hamilton. Rathan-Mayes credited those talks with serving as a foundation to his improvement this season.

"From that point I knew what was wanted and expected," Rathan-Mayes said. "We had some good conversations. I ran with it from there and he has helped me along the way."

Rathan-Mayes originally came to Florida State as a shooting guard. In 2014-15, he led the Seminoles in scoring (14.9 points per game) along with being the first freshman in ACC history to score 30 points or more in three games. But with the recruitment of Dwayne Bacon, Malik Beasley (who left for the NBA after one season) and Jonathan Isaac the past two seasons, Hamilton moved Rathan-Mayes to the point and thought he would excel there.

There were times last season when Rathan-Mayes looked like he was reverting back to the tendencies of a shooting guard, but that hasn't happened as much this season.

"The biggest thing was learning how to manage the game and everyone else around you. Being a shooting guard you don't have anything to worry about other than shooting," he said. "It took a lot of time to grasp and understand what it takes to be a good point guard. I needed to know what the coaches wanted to run and the philosophies."

Hamilton said what has pleased him the most this season is that Rathan-Mayes has allowed himself to be coached.

"He has been a sponge and sought out advice from coaches. He has been eager to learn what he needs to do to make things better," Hamilton said.

Where Rathan-Mayes has excelled the most is in conference play. He leads the ACC with a 3.1-to-1 assist-turnover ratio in 14 conference games and has committed three or more turnovers just once.

After winning six of their first seven in conference play, Florida State has gone 3-4 since then heading into Monday's game against Boston College.

Despite a two-game losing streak, Rathan-Mayes thinks the Seminoles can still do well down the stretch and possibly secure a double-bye for the conference tournament. After Monday's game, the Seminoles close the regular season against Clemson (Feb. 25), No. 12 Duke (Feb. 28) and Miami (March 4).

"I've got to help our guys understand better what we need to do. I feel like these are games we can win," he said.

Transition Paying Off For Florida State's Rathan-Mayes

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State is in the midst of one of the best seasons in the history of the program, but it wouldn't be possible without the evolution of point guard Xavier Rathan-Mayes.

He came to FSU as a shooting guard, and after sitting out a year due to an eligibility issue, he led the Seminoles with 14.8 points per game during the 2014-2015 season.

Then everything changed.

FSU brought in two of the top guards in the country in Malik Beasley and Dwayne Bacon and Rathan-Mayes was moved into the point guard role.

He struggled with the role during the 2015-2016 season. He averaged 11.8 points and 4.4 assists per game, but also averaged 2.5 turnovers per game that year.

"I think any time your ambition is to become a complete player when you have been accustomed to playing a certain style all your life is an adjustment," FSU coach Leonard Hamilton said.

"I don't think it's as much mental as it is physical. He has the physical tools. He's made the adjustment of understanding the importance of being a guy who has the ability to make his teammates better and make the game easier for them.

"That's a learned process as much as any part of the game."

The Seminoles failed to reach the NCAA Tournament for the fourth straight year, and Rathan-Mayes considered leaving the program. He declared for the NBA Draft in April 2016, but decided to come back in May.

"When I came to Florida State I wanted to do something special," Rathan-Mayes told the *Tallahassee Democrat*. "I wanted to bring this program to back to the top of the mountain. I want to hopefully win a National Championship here and do something special. That's what I want to do, and that's what Dwayne Bacon wanted to do as well. We both decided to come back for that."

To do that, he had to fully embrace the transition from a primary scorer to a facilitator.

"It was a transition," Rathan-Mayes said.

"It was a growth period that I had to go through. There was a maturity aspect that I had to deal with. I think I've done a really good job.

"My coaches and my teammates depend on me and give me the confidence to do what I do every single night. I had to go through a little period where it was rough, but it has worked out the best for me, for my teammates, and for our team. We're having an amazing season because of it."

Rathan-Mayes has had to work on that part of his game every day, but his teammates and coaches have seen him put in the time and effort. They've also seen the progress that he's made on both ends of the court.

"I think that's a part of his game that he's continually concentrating on," Hamilton said.

"I think he's evolving with a better understanding of how to run a team. How to make your teammates better. To be a facilitator. A guy who reads the situation and gives the team what they need during certain periods of the game.

"I don't think that he has given up his ability to score. There have been times where he has given us a real punch from an offensive standpoint. I think he's gotten extremely good at defending without fouling.

"He's become one of the premier defenders in the ACC, which no one ever seems to mention. His defense has been just short of being unbelievable. His ability to pick up the ball and be consistent in his effort. He doesn't seem to tire. He's always energized.

"Offensively he seems to be getting a better feel for his teammates. Finding ways to make the game easier for them."

He is the third leading scorer on FSU's team this season with 10.3 points per game, but leads the team in assists per game with 4.8. He's cut down on his turnovers as well with 1.9 per game this season.

He has gotten better as the season has gone on, and really turned the corner heading into ACC play.

In conference games this season, Rathan-Mayes leads the ACC in assist-to-turnover ratio at 3.1-1. He has 52 assists to just 17 turnovers in the last 11 games.

He's been able to do that by earning the trust of coach Hamilton and the trust of his teammates.

"Just making sure that I not only know my spot, but I know everyone else's spot around me," Rathan-Mayes said.

"I had to become a true extension of coach Hamilton. Where I didn't have to look over at the bench every single time down. Where I could have him trust me enough to where I could call plays by myself without hearing from him.

"We've gotten to the point now where if he calls a play and I see something different, I'll tell him. He trusts me to be able to run that.

"It was just a maturity process that I've had to go through, and it's working out for the best now."

He knows that he has come a long way from the player that he was at the start of the 2014 season until now, and it's something that he prides himself on.

"I'm proud of myself to see how far I've come, but I'm not satisfied," Rathan-Mayes said.

"I've got a lot of work to do to continue to lead this team to hopefully an ACC Championship and to a National Championship. When I'm able to do that then I can look back and reminisce on what I've gone through to get to that point."

Mann Comes Up Big In Win Over Louisville

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (Seminoles.com) – Terance Mann isn't one to get caught up in his offensive production.

However, after a scoreless evening against No. 15 Notre Dame earlier in the week, the sophomore rebounded with a strong effort to help lead No. 10 Florida State to a 73-68 win over No. 12 Louisville.

Mann finished the contest against the Cardinals with 15 points on 6 of 10 shooting, adding three rebounds and a pair of blocks in 29 minutes of action.

“Terance responded very well tonight,” FSU coach Leonard Hamilton said after the game. “We thought he had some opportunities to drive and he was aggressive. He gave us a big lift both offensively and defensively.”

Against the Irish, Mann only attempted two shots and came away feeling he could have done more to help his team in the 83-80 FSU triumph on Wednesday night.

“I didn't have a good game last time and I just thought I needed to bring a lot of energy and help my team today,” Mann said on his outing against Louisville. “I just tried and let the game come to me, I tried not to force anything.”

Scoring 9 of his 15 points in the first half, Mann was instrumental in helping Florida State to a 41-35 advantage heading into the break. His layup with 17:22 left in the half capped a 14-0 run by the Seminoles to start the game, a lead they would never relinquish.

In the second half, Mann's defensive energy led to a few key blocks, including one that prevented the Cardinals from cutting the lead to four with 5:29 left in the game as they trailed the Seminoles 66-60.

“That's how I've played my whole life,” Mann said. “I don't mind doing the little stuff that goes unnoticed, but if we win then it'll become noticed.”

Mann is averaging 9.3 points per game through the first 20 games of the 2016-17 season, up from 5.3 points per game a season ago. The maturation process for the 6-6 guard out of Lowell, Mass., is blossoming in front of his teammates' eyes.

“That guy has been working so hard,” shooting guard Dwayne Bacon said. “Teams are going to leave him open because they think he can't do certain things, but he can. When it's like that though, he's a guy that steps up and he did that tonight.”

“Everyone can see from last year to this year, Terance has improved a lot in many areas,” center Michael Ojo added. “He's always the ‘glue guy’ for us, and it's been so exciting to see how he's been able to help this team.”

While the Seminoles opened many eyes around the country by going 5-1 in a span of six straight games against top-25 teams, a new challenge awaits. FSU must travel for three straight away games, a stretch of contests that will test the team's consistency in a brutal Atlantic Coast Conference.

Mann's unselfish spirit and willingness to contribute in any way possible will be key if the Seminoles are to keep themselves atop the ACC standings.

“We learned we're a good team during this tough stretch. Our team is together and wants to play for each other,” Mann said.

“We think we're the best team in the country.”

Terance Mann – The Glue Guy

Some Players might bristle at the description. Like it was almost an insult to their talent level and ability.

But when Terance Mann hears the term “glue guy” he beams with pride. Because that’s precisely what he was raised to be.

The Florida State sophomore grew up watching his mom coach the game – Daynia La-Force is currently the head women’s coach at Rhode Island – so he knows better than most how important those players are that can do everything to help win.

They don’t care about leading the team in points or rebound. They just care about helping lead their team to a victory.

Any way Possible.

“Exactly,” Mann said. “I’ve seen my mom have up and down seasons. And when they’re winning I’ve never seen her talking about who scored the most points. She talked about how the team played. She was happy if they were engaged and playing together. And if they played well on defense.”

So that’s what Mann Tries to do. He tries to be a good teammate. Tries to play well on defense. Tries to do his part on both ends of the floor. And in the locker room.

It’s why Florida State head coach Leonard Hamilton said Mann was becoming the leader of the team after his 16-point, 10-rebound performance on Sunday in the win over Florida.

Keep in mind: Mann is just 11 games into his sophomore season. That’s pretty early on to be considered a leader.

“My strength is probably keeping all my teammates happy on the court,” Mann said. “I try to do the little things. I just try to do what my team needs to win.”

Last year he didn’t get a chance to do that a whole lot. As the least-heralded member of an FSU freshman class that featured Dwayne Bacon and Malik Beasley, the 6-foot-6 Mann averaged 17 minutes per game for the Seminoles.

While his fellow freshmen classmates led the team in scoring.

“They’re like my best friends,” said Mann, who averaged 23.1 points per game as a senior at Tilton School in New Hampshire. “I loved seeing them get all that attention and how well they did, especially with Malik going all the way and getting drafted. ... It was amazing to see those dudes do what they did.”

But it wasn’t always easy. It never is for a freshman who is on the bench more than he’s on the court.

“I had my times when I would get into myself and be itching to get out there,” Mann said. “But I talked to my mom a lot and she helped me through it. She didn’t let me get selfish or anything.

“She helped me through it all. She’s Been through it the last 22 years. She’s seen players go through it all the time, so she didn’t let me get selfish or be a cancer to my team.”

He's been anything but this season for the 10-1 Seminoles. He's been the glue.

Mann is second on the team to Bacon in minutes played (25.5) and is currently averaging 7.9 points, 4.8 rebounds and 2 assists per game. He knows he still has a lot of work on, but he truly believes his team has a chance to be special.

And that's what he cares about the most.

"Everyone's happy," Mann said. "Everyone's happy seeing each other do well. Everyone's happy with what we can do. ... I feel like this team can be as good as we want to be. If we choose to lock in and pay attention to detail, we could find ourselves in the Final Four.

"That's really what we believe."

Smith Has A Senior Day To Remember

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Jarquez Smith's day started and ended with a standing ovation.

As No. 15 Florida State put the final touches on a 66-57, Senior Day win over No. 25 Miami, senior Smith took a moment to let it sink in.

An unblemished 18-0 record at the Donald L. Tucker Center this season, a No. 2 seed in the ACC Tournament, and an already locked-in high seed for the NCAA Tournament in a few weeks.

"It was like the perfect ending, this whole year being undefeated at home," Smith said. "Coach (Leonard Hamilton) made it everyone's priority to send me and (fellow senior, Michael) Ojo off like legends on our last home game."

When the final buzzer sounded Smith and Ojo led the team in a victory lap around "The Tuck" celebrating with the band, students, and fans that remained in their seats to enjoy the moment. It was as if the Seminole faithful and players knew they'd witnessed one of the best regular seasons in program history and weren't going to let the moment leave them.

"It gives me chills, it was an overwhelming feeling," Smith said. "Knowing my family was in the stands for my last game too, it just made me happy."

Smith, finished with 11 points and five rebounds to help the Noles knock off the Hurricanes for the second time this season. As FSU held on to a tight 42-39 margin with 13:32 left in the game, Smith provided one of the best plays of the year for the Seminoles, one that is surely to be replayed on highlight shows around the country this week.

After Xavier Rathan-Mayes missed a three-point shot, Smith skied and threw down a rim-rattling, one-hand putback dunk, igniting the arena and his teammates.

"He was way above me," sophomore Dwayne Bacon said. "I was about to go try and put it back (first), but he got up there. It was crazy."

Added Smith, "I played a lot more aggressively knowing this would be my last time playing in the Tucker Center. That was a big motivation (factor) for me."

The slam helped spark a 7-1 FSU run, pushing the lead to a comfortable margin the Seminoles would never relinquish.

"It did a lot for us in that moment," Rathan-Mayes added. "'Quez' did a good job of sparking our offense, he was aggressive and we need him to do that every single night. If he does that, our team is better."

Smith's transition to the center position has helped solidify the paint for FSU this season. It's a transition Smith said needed some time getting adjusted to, but one that was necessary for his team to be successful in this campaign.

"He's matured a lot and his game has taken a new step playing the 'five,'" Rathan-Mayes said. "His IQ is really high and he's able to teach others. We lean on him to be a cornerstone for program and lead the guys around us."

"We needed the type of strides he made," Bacon said. "He put in the work in the off-season, took his role the right way and its part of the reason we're going to the tournament this year."

If the Seminoles are going to make a deep run in the ACC and, subsequently, the NCAA Tournament, Smith's energy and activity in the paint will be a key for FSU's success. However, Smith knows the Noles can achieve milestones this program has seldom seen in its existence.

FSU's No. 2 seed in the ACC Tournament offers an opportunity for the school to make a serious run at its second ACC Tournament title and its first since 2012.

"Being a number-two seed, we want to go there and defend what we earned," Smith said. "I even think we're a Final Four team if we can play our best from here on out."

Sheridan College Helps Savoy Achieve Division I Dream

SHERIDAN, WY. — “Once it left my hand, I knew it was good.”

PJ Savoy doesn’t lack in confidence, and that trait definitely helped the former Sheridan College General splash back-to-back game-winning 3-pointers — and 83 others — throughout his freshman season at the Bruce Hoffman Golden Dome.

That same confidence brought Savoy, a Las Vegas native, to Sheridan as a freshman, and it caught the eye of big time NCAA Division I scouts over the summer.

A year after his late-game heroics at the Golden Dome, the 6-foot-4 sharpshooter is squeezing his way into the lineup for the Florida State Seminoles, the 12th-ranked team in the country.

Savoy followed an odd path — a junior college kid leaving after one year for a high-major DI program. It was always the plan for Savoy, whose father was a standout at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas in the early ‘90s, to play at the highest collegiate level. That’s what brought him to a community college in Sheridan.

Sifting through Sheridan College men’s basketball rosters from years past, one wouldn’t have to look far to discover Division I-caliber talent. Oftentimes, top-level players are forced to go the junior college route because they don’t meet the academic standards of four-year universities. They utilize two years of eligibility at the junior college level and hopefully improve in the classroom while impressing NCAA coaches on the hardwood.

But it probably isn’t fair to lump all JUCO players into that category, especially Savoy.

A qualifier out of high school, his grades and SAT and ACT scores were strong enough for a dorm room at a four-year university.

But a dorm room wasn’t enough.

Savoy was a baller. It was in his genes, and it’s what he loved. The Sheridan College coaching staff — head coach Matt Hammer and assistant Tom Parks — sold Savoy on playing for the Generals, gaining some valuable experience against college-level competition and improving his game before ultimately playing at the level he had long envisioned for himself.

“A lot of the cases that we have, qualifiers are guys that just aren’t recruited by the schools that they’re interested in going to,” Hammer said. “So going a year of junior college basketball, four-year schools, they really watch qualifiers to see how they perform that first year against higher level competition.

“PJ came in as a freshman and obviously had a great year.”

Savoy made a name for himself at Sheridan College and across Region IX. He was SC’s second leading scorer at 16.8 points per game. He shot 46 percent from the field, 43 percent from behind the arc and 86 percent from the free-throw line.

His 199 attempted 3-pointers ranked 41st in the country, and his percentage was the 85th best.

He made plenty of teams pay with his long ball, including the highlight 3s that drowned Casper College and Northwest College at the buzzer.

Still, at the end of the year, Hammer was expecting his star player back for a sophomore season, another year to hone skills other than his shooting.

Savoy had other plans.

The sniper spent the spring at the Golden Dome, going through drills, getting up shots and bulking up in the weight room. But once he hit the hardwood at a couple of JUCO showcases in the summer, his bags back in Sheridan essentially packed themselves.

The postgame handshakes mounted. Coaches wanted to meet the young shooter. His phone rang with calls from New Orleans, Southern Miss and East Tennessee State. Then, more from the big dogs: Utah, Texas Tech, UNLV and Florida State.

On Aug. 9, 2016, Savoy announced via his Twitter page that he was heading to Tallahassee to play for the Seminoles.

“Big shout out to my Sheridan family for being understanding in my choice. With that being said, I would like to say I will continue my education and better my skills in Garnet and Gold at the Florida State University. Go Noles.”

“It was obvious to me that we were a good match for each other,” Florida State head coach Leonard Hamilton said.

“He needed to go somewhere with someone who needed what he does best and vice versa.

“He is the perfect match for what we need, and I think he’s only going to get better.”

Even as Hammer prepped for Savoy to don a Generals jersey as a sophomore, the sudden flooding of Division I offers wasn’t necessarily surprising.

“He was never rattled out on the floor; he never looked like he was out of place,” Hammer said of Savoy’s time at SC. “He always had something about him. As a coach, you liked having the guy out on the floor because you knew at some point he was going to make some sort of play.”

Savoy’s year at Sheridan College — those plays and that confidence his former coach spoke of — put him ahead of the curve when he arrived in Tallahassee. After sitting out the first six games of the season with a toe injury, Savoy’s knack for scoring translated quickly from small Wyoming gyms to the 12,000-seat Donald L. Tucker Civic Center.

And that first game with a new team just does something to him. Savoy’s career high at Sheridan College was 28 in his first game as a college basketball player.

And his first game as a Seminole? He dropped 27 points on 8 of 11 shooting (7 of 10 3PT) — in 14 minutes. Game two, he added 18 points in 23 minutes. The Florida State athletics department called it one of the most productive beginnings to a Seminoles career ever.

“With PJ, he’s coming in, and it looked like he’s been playing in college, to be honest,” Florida State junior forward Phil Cofer said, noting the differences between coming straight out of high school like he did. Cofer is also Savoy’s roommate at FSU. “He’s coming to practice, working hard and shooting crazy.

“Just having him on our team is great for us.”

Savoy wasn’t able to speak to The Press due to Florida State policy for underclassmen, but Hammer stays in touch with his former player and echoed Hamilton’s sentiment about FSU being the perfect fit.

“Watching that Florida State team, they’re so deep,” Hammer said. “But they’re all bought in to what the team is trying to do.”

With 13 players averaging at least 9 minutes per game for the Seminoles, Savoy's nestled himself nicely into a team that's sitting on an impressive 14-1 record.

"His personality," Cofer said of Savoy's ability to fit right in with the squad. "He was a little quiet at first, but just having the type of dudes on our team, he was just willing to bring that brother mentality in."

Hamilton threw some credit to the SC staff for doing exactly what they told Savoy they'd do when he committed to the Generals.

"They were helpful in the process as well as any situation I've ever seen," he said. "Those guys are professionals, and they just do a great job."

Hammer and the Generals have adjusted to life without Savoy. They're 14-2 and jumping into the conference season. But Hammer still finds time to flip on ESPN to watch his former player drain shots in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"It's awesome," the SC coach said. "When I see the guys on TV, I don't think of them playing games here; I think of all the times in practice, chewing a guy out for not running the floor hard or being in a stance, and then seeing them on TV doing those things that you were asking them to do."

"It's a great thing for Sheridan College, and it's a great thing for PJ," he added, before repeating himself. "It's awesome."

Savoy is averaging 7.5 points in 9.8 minutes per game. He's third on the team in made 3-pointers and second in 3-point percentage.

The Hair Up There: FSU's Isaac, Mann And Smith Are A Cut Above

Admit it. Like so many, you've admired from afar -- even if it has created confusion at times.

It's hair. Not just any hair. It's the hair belonging to Florida State men's basketball players Jonathan Isaac, Terance Mann and Jarquez Smith.

All three players rock what is known as the "frohawk." It's a contemporary look which has exploded in popularity over the last two years. The sides fade and are gradually blended upward. From there, the length can range from being short like Smith's to a wilder look like Isaac's.

Mann, who is 6-foot-6, said he's had a similar experience with people confusing him for Isaac, who is 6-10.

"Especially on TV," Mann said. "My family members will say, 'I can't tell if that's you, No. 23 or No. 1 sometimes. I'm like, 'Yeah, it's hard sometimes.'"

Mann, a sophomore, has had a frohawk going back to last year. Smith, a senior, said he changed his hairstyle in the summer after his dad suggested he grow it out.

As for Isaac -- whose hair might add nearly a foot to his already lengthy frame -- he started growing it out in high school. He used to wear a "caesar," which is a cleaner look with trimmed edges.

Isaac, who was a rising star on the AAU circuit and a five-star prospect as a senior in high school, left his home in Naples and would play his final year at IMG Academy in Bradenton. Going to IMG did more than help Isaac become a better basketball player.

"Once I got out of the house and she couldn't really control my hair anymore," Isaac said of his mother, "I just went with it."

Despite a record start to this season, the Seminoles have managed to keep a straightforward approach for the most part. They've made a point to discuss the importance of unity while quickly eliminating any talk of individuality before it begins.

That all stops when you ask who has the best hair on the team.

Isaac is convinced it's him, while Mann also voted for himself.

So what does Smith think?

"I would say myself, but I'm not that type of person," Smith said with a giant grin. "But I do think Jon has the best. Jon's hair is always curly."

What does Seminoles coach Leonard Hamilton think about his players' lengthy locks?

Isaac, Mann and Smith say the clean-shaven Hamilton will share his thoughts from time to time. His lone request is all three keep their hair looking presentable.

"He talks about it a lot," Isaac said. "He told us one day that, 'It's all going to be gone,' so cherish it."

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TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Brandon Allen’s minutes tend to be few – if any – late in games and in mop-up situations. Allen is a junior walk-on, a former minor-league pitcher who enrolled at Florida State in 2013. He is one of the last guys off the bench. Except for a night like Tuesday.

Allen was quickly a big part of the first half game plan for FSU, which was without star freshman Jonathan Isaac and junior Phil Cofer. That meant Jarquez Smith would start and the 6-foot-6 Allen would step in as the backup power forward.

“I had a feeling even at the start of the game,” Allen said. “With Isaac and Cofer being out, I had a feeling I would get a chance to play.”

Allen knocked down a runner in the lane and settled in. He added a pair of 3-pointers as part of a career-high 10 points in FSU’s 98-49 win over Southern Miss. For most guys, 10 points is a decent game. For Allen, 10 is a huge night considering he had made just eight baskets in two college seasons.

After missing all of 2015-16 due to a foot injury, Allen worked hard over the summer to prepare for his return to the court. Often, that return meant helping his teammates in practices as they prepare for game days.

Allen is also busy with a heavy workload as he pursues an engineering degree.

“Sometimes he misses meetings because he has some really difficult academic requirements that he has to fulfill,” FSU coach Leonard Hamilton said. “Glad to see him come out there and show if we need him he’s going to be ready. Tonight he had a chance to show you how hard he’s worked all summer to be a guy who can contribute.”

Allen could get an early call again Thursday night as FSU hosts Nicholls State (9 p.m. on ESPNU). If Isaac and Cofer aren’t able to play, the Seminoles will be in a similar situation. And with the team in the middle of four games in eight days, Hamilton is also looking to limit the minutes of his star players.

So it only makes sense that Hamilton will look down the bench and utilize the Seminoles’ depth. And Allen could see himself once more playing meaningful minutes early in the game.

“Keep your head up, keep working hard and you’ll get your chance,” Allen recalled coaches telling him. “(Tuesday) was just a lot of fun honestly.”
