Develop these four essential elements to set the stage for your short story.

Part 1 - The Basics

1.1. CHARACTERS

Who are your main character(s)? What is their relationship? What do they want?

1.2. POINT OF VIEW

Will you write in the first, second, or third person? If you choose third person, is your narrator


omniscient or focused on one character?

1.3. CONFLICT

What is the main problem or conflict facing your character(s)?

1.4. SETTING

Where does your story take place? How does it challenge or contextualize your characters?



2.1. THE OPENING

What image, dialogue, or scene will your story open on? Make sure it hooks the reader and introduces something important about the character(s) or conflict.

2.2. THE PROBLEM

2.3. THE ESCALATION

through dialogue, obstacles, or urgency.

How will the story escalate after you've introduced the problem? Plan how you'll raise the stakes

2.4. THE CLIMAX

Describe the moment when your character(s) finally face the problem.

2.5. THE ENDING Whether you choose to resolve the problem or end on a more ambiguous note, plan an ending
