Nursery November Overview

This month we are learning about healthy eating in relation to fruit & vegetables. We will be looking at a variety of fruit and vegetables. P1 News

During numeracy activities we have been learning about capacity. We had fun at the water tray using the language: full, half full and empty.

We all have been for our Autumn walk in Forthill and have noticed all the changes that Autumn brings. We have been learning Autumn songs and rhymes.

We have made triangles on the carpet and have learnt that a triangle has 3 sides.

During Irish Maths week we completed patterns, have learnt number rhymes and completed mental Maths activities using number fans and the counting stick.

All children have now been 'Child of the Day' and we have enjoyed reading all their lovely compliments.











Topic: Goldilocks and the 3 Bears

Number: 3. Writing number 3, making a pattern of 3, making a set of 3. E.g. 3 blue, 3 red 3 green beads on a string. **Sorting:** Sorting objects for size "Big" "Middle" "Small". Eg. Big spoon goes with the big bowl for daddy bear.

Shape: Recognising a square. Know that a square has 4 sides and 4 corners and all sides are the same length. Look for squares in their environment.

Jolly Phonics: Your child has been taught the sounds s, a, t, p i, n. This month they will learn the sounds c, k, e, h, r, m, d. You can access Jolly Phonics online at <u>www.youtube.com</u>. This way you will be able to best support the songs and actions which are being taught in school through the Seesaw App.

<u>Keywords</u>: In school we have been learning to recognise and read some keywords and character names. Using the sounds <u>s</u>, <u>a</u>, <u>t</u> <u>and i</u> the children have been introduced to the keywords <u>at</u>, <u>a</u>, <u>as</u>, <u>l</u>, <u>it</u>, <u>is</u>. More information will be sent out to you this week on the Jolly Phonics programme and learning keywords.

Your child can now begin to put sounds together to read words. e.g. s-a-t sat.

Shared Reading: The children have read books from our school reading scheme, Oxford Reading Tree, in school with the teacher during shared reading lessons. Although these books have no words the children are asked questions in relation to the story and talk about the pictures and characters.

In school we have been learning to recognise and read some keywords and character names.

Musical Pathways: Musical Pathways is taking place on Monday mornings with Mrs Kirke. The children are enjoying positive singing and musical experiences. Ask them to tell you about their music lessons and if they can sing some of the action songs and rhymes for you.

P2 take part in Ditch the Dark

Our P2 children all made a wonderful effort for our recent 'Ditch the Dark' day. The children became fashion designers for the day and designed brightly coloured clothes, suitable for wearing on the darker evenings.

P2 learn about the homes people live in

The children have really been enjoying our new topic of 'Houses and Homes'. There is some great designing and construction play happening along the P2 corridor.



P2 November Overview

Learning Through Play/Topic work Primary 2 have started our new topic of Houses and Homes. We will be finding out about houses and homes in our local area and how they are similar/different to houses and homes around the world. We will learn how houses are built and what materials are used. Please talk to your child about this. We look forward to hearing what the children find out.

Literacy We have worked through the sounds **s**, **a**, **t**, **i**, **p**, **n**, **c**, **k**, **e**, **h**, **r**, **m** and **d** (including their capitals forms) to date. It is vital that your child is able to **correctly** form, recognise and sound these out (including their capital form). Please revise these daily with your child, referring to the '*Language of Writing*' on SeeSaw. Over the next month we will be forming, recognising and sounding out **g G**, **o O**, **u U**, **I L**, **f F**, **b B** and the digraph **ai**.

Numeracy – Topics: Number/Shape

- Count forwards in 1s to 60 and backwards from 20 0.
- Order numbers to 14. Ask questions like "What comes after 10?"
- We have been using number lines to practise numbers **before**, **after** and **in between** within 20 e.g. What number comes **after** 11? What number comes **before** 8? What number is **in between** 13 and 15?
- Practise adding 1 to a given number within 10 mentally e.g **7** + **1** = use counters to support thinking if needed.
- Practise recognition of the digits 0-20.
- Practise writing the numbers 0-20 correctly in order.
- We are learning about 2D shapes. Look for shapes when out and about e.g windows, roads signs, paving stones etc.

As the weather is getting colder we ask that all children bring a <u>warm coat</u> to school each day. It is important that your child is able to put on their own coat. <u>Please encourage your child to practise this at home.</u>

Note: Please remember to label your child's coat clearly.

Roots of Empathy programme in P3. 'Roots of Empathy' aims to help children care, share and include others. It gives children the opportunity to develop empathy for a younger child. Mrs Gormley's class met Baby Bobby and his mother Courtney recently. They get to watch him grow and develop over a period of time. The children ask Courtney some key questions about how he feels, what he likes to eat, what his favourite toy is. The children look forward to seeing Bobby and hearing about how he is changing and developing. Every session they sing a song or say a nursery rhyme to Bobby.



Mrs Somerville's Primary 3 class took part in a Loving Maths Story activity to celebrate Irish Maths Week. Along with children all over Ireland, they enjoyed listening to a story while exploring problem solving questions within the context of the story. Throughout Irish Maths Week, Primary 3 engaged in practical maths activities such as board games to reinforce their learning.



P3 November Overview

Literacy

<u>Grammar</u>: Children will reinforce their learning on adjectives (describing words). Children will know when to use question marks.

<u>Writing - Explanation/Information</u>: Using the book 'Tree Full of wonder' by Anna Smithers, explain why trees are so important for our environment and look for signs of Autumn throughout the book and in our environment. Writing information on how we can help protect trees and love trees that are around us. Explain the term 'wonder' and what it could mean as we go through the book – link to grammar using question marks and questions.

Anti-bullying discussions and related activities.

Spelling: Children will complete spellings each night (Mon – Wed). Use the look, say, cover, write, check method.

Numeracy

Mental Maths: Counting to 100/50 in 1s, 2s, 5s, 10s, 20s. Doubles/near and doubles to 20.

<u>Number</u>: Place value of number to 99; Adding any digit to 10; addition and subtraction of numbers to 20, finding the difference between numbers, odd and even numbers, more than, less than and equals signs.

<u>Topic Maths - Measures and Money</u>: Complete work on measures (centimetres and metres). Language of money and recognition of coins and notes. Shopping activities using money and coins to buy items and get change.

World Around Us

<u>Autumn and Trees:</u> Autumn art faces and hair portraits, autumn colours using animal frames. The importance of trees in our environment. Different types of trees, parts of trees, change of trees during each season. How to look after trees and protect them

Homework

- Literacy/Numeracy: Given on a Monday and handed up on a Thursday.
- Religion 'Grow in Love' program: Given on a Wednesday and handed up on a Friday.
- Spelling/tables: revision completed every night.
- Mathletics tasks: set on a Monday and completed for Thursday linked to number and topic work.

Other

- Please send a coat with your child every day to school as we walk in Forthill and are out at break and dinner time. Remember to label all jumpers/cardigans/coats etc. clearly.
- Healthy snacks to be eaten at break time only and treats to a minimum at dinner time.

P4 Classes Visit Enniskillen Museum

P4 classes enjoyed a visit to Enniskillen Castle in connection with their World War 2 topic. Julian showed us an Anderson Shelter and chatted to us about life in Fermanagh during WW2. He showed us some gas masks, an Air Raid Warden helmet and equipment. The children also had the opportunity to try on soldiers' uniforms. We are grateful to Julian and all the staff at Enniskillen Castle Museum for supporting us in enhancing the children's knowledge and understanding of World War 2.



P4 Classes Visit Enniskillen Library

Primary 4 classes enjoyed the opportunity to visit Enniskillen town library. The children learnt how to search for books on the shelves and where to look for books within different topics. They enjoyed reading some of the books and were delighted to have a lovely story time, listening to a story about a baby elephant in Belfast Zoo during World War 2. The children were also given the opportunity to apply for a library card and were shown how to use the borrow and return machines.



P4 November Overview

Literacy: Pupils will know that verbs are doing or action words and that adverbs describe verbs. They will identify and use these in their written work. Continue to complete the LCSWC method for spellings. Pupils will be reading their shared text *Hurricane*, and picture book *Flood*, and will be carrying out activities based on these. In writing pupils will be learning about adventure stories and will be focusing on settings and characters. P4 classes visited Enniskillen library recently and had the opportunity to apply for a library card. We would encourage families to ensure the children have the opportunity to visit the library regularly.

Numeracy: Pupils will practise recalling the 2, 10 & 5 times tables. (See page 6 of the Homework Diary). They will be continuing to practise addition of numbers bridging the 10 e.g. 45 + 56. They will be looking at written and mental methods for solving addition sums. Pupils will also be solving word problems. Our topic work this month will cover time. Classes will be revising the times of o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to, days of the week and months of the year. We will be solving word problems related to time. Pupils will be reading clock times at five minute intervals (5 past, 10 past etc) and using both analogue and digital time. Pupils continue to have personalised activities set on Mathletics each week which is part of their homework and should be completed at home.

<u>World Around Us</u>: Pupils will begin a new topic of Extreme Earth. They will look at the layers that make up the earth. Pupils will know how volcanoes are formed, how they affect people's lives and the terms extinct, dormant and active. We will look at the history of Pompeii. Pupils will know what causes earthquakes and how they are measured. Pupils will construct "earthquake resistant" buildings to withstand their own simulated earthquake.

<u>First Holy Communion</u>: All P4 classes will have the opportunity to receive their First Holy Communion, if their family wishes for them to do so, on **Saturday 10th May 2025 at 12pm in St Michael's Church**. An Enrolment Mass for all those preparing for First Communion and their families will take place on **Sunday 24th November at 10:30am in St Michael's Church**.



P5 November Overview

Numeracy

- Number: Addition and subtraction of Thousands, Hundreds, Tens and Units, problem solving activities
- **Topic:** Continue work on 2D shape e.g. regular and irregular shapes, types of triangles. Properties of 3D shape (cube, cuboid, cylinder, sphere, cone), symmetry (mirror images), lines (horizontal, vertical, diagonal and parallel)
- Mental Maths Multiplication tables (x9,x10,x11 and x12). Language of multiplication and division
- Weekly tables test.

Literacy:

- Novel: Charlotte's Web and related activities.
- Grammar work Adjectives, capital Letters and punctuation (full stops, question marks and commas).
- Writing Newspaper reports, how to be a reporter and write their own article.
- We will complete Schofield & Sims Spelling Programme Unit 8 11 (irregular past tense, s and es, c and k, x and ex, or sound, ur sound, oo and yoo sounds)

World Around Us:

- Topic work Finish minibeast topic and begin topic of Enniskillen (History of Enniskillen, local landmarks, changes in Enniskillen, poets and artists).
- Learning about history of St. Michael's Church and the Convent of Mercy, look at all the bridges in Enniskillen. STEM activities (building bridges)
- We hope to have an Enniskillen walking tour in December.

Other Information

- 10 minutes Accelerated Reading every night. Children can go to the library/computer suite each morning from 8.30 am 8.55 am to borrow/change books and complete quizzes.
- P5 library times are Monday and Thursday morning 8.30 8.55.
- 10 mins of Mathletics to be completed as part of homework every night. Children should be getting 1000 points per week. The work will be based on what the children learn in class.
- Complete spelling revision every night. Spelling and tables test on Friday morning in school.
- Irish lesson every Tuesday.
- Gaelic Football Wednesday.

P6 November/December Overview

PDMU

- Pupils will be able to recognise various feelings, reactions, points of view of self and others.
- Know what the acronym PANTS means and be aware of how to 'keep your privates private'

Maths Number Pupils will be able to:

- Add and subtract using a variety of mental strategies and standard written methods.
- Solve problems involving addition and subtraction.
- Understand and underline the key words when solving problems using addition and subtraction. (esp. in Mental arithmetic books)

Maths Topic

- Pupils will be able to identify 2D shapes and know their properties.
- Pupils will know language associated with measuring a circle (diameter, circumference and radius).
- Pupils will know the 8 points of a compass and follow instructions involving these points.

<u>English</u>

- Pupils will understand verbs and adjective and will be able to recognise and use them in differentiated activities.
- Pupils will understand adjective comparisons (big, bigger, biggest).
- Pupils will know the key elements of recount poems and look at various authorial techniques.

Topic/World Around Us Pupil will:

- Know the earth travels around the sun and it takes a year to orbit the sun (COT, M&E)
- Know that sun is our source of energy and other facts about our 'star.'
- Know that the moon is a natural satellite, the phases of the moon and about the first moon landing. **Homework:**
- <u>SPELLINGS</u> daily at home. Learn and complete columns on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in spelling booklet. Complete sentences or meanings on Monday night. Revise all tables on Thursday for Friday's test.
- MENTAL ARITHMETIC Monday Part A, Tuesday B, Wednesday part C. Highlight key parts.
- Learn TABLES daily at home. (Use Topmarks 'Hit the Button').
- Other short homework activities will be set occasionally.
- <u>READING:</u> Pupils are encouraged to read lots at home. Quizzes can be completed in school. Pupils are asked to complete one quiz per week. Please check what reading your child has to do every night alongside their AR Reading.



Numeracy

P7 November Overview

• In Number we will be working on fractions, decimals, and percentages.

• In Maths Topic we will work on data handling, 3D shapes and co-ordinates.

Literacy

- Pupils will continue to read the novel 'Twist of Gold' by Michael Morpurgo and will complete associated activities from their novel booklet.
- Grammar work: We will focus on adverbs, adjectives, direct and indirect speech.
- In writing: pupils will create reports and scripts on life in the Workhouse.
- Accelerated reading will take place in class. Children can also complete reading at home and do a quiz in school on their level.



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My Child's First Device

5 Steps to Make Phones, Tablets, and Laptops Safer

You might be deciding to give your child their first phone, tablet, or laptop (or third, fourth, fifth – even a new update). This is a big decision! The responsibility and freedom that comes with owning a device is a big step for children - and you! It might even be their first "grown up" responsibility.

As a parent or carer, it's important to remember that even if a child is tech-savvy, they need to be taught how to be tech-safe. We know this can be daunting with various device brands, apps, and settings to choose from. Our online safety experts have created 5 steps to help you make that first device (or brand-new model!) safer for the child or young person in your care.

Set up the device with your child

Taking the time to sit down with your child and

set up the device together will help you both

get to know how the device works, allow you

engines, and set up in-app purchase restrictions. You can use the device settings to set up agreed

upon restrictions, like Screen Time and App Limits.

Explain why these settings are important to protect children and young people from online risks and that these restrictions will be lifted when they are old

Check-in with your child about their device use. It

doesn't have to be a big sit-down conversation!

Informal chats over the dinner table, in the car or while watching television as a family can have the biggest impact. Ask questions like, "Tell me about

your favourite app! Why do you like to use it?" or, "How has your device helped you today?".

Online safety is never a one-off conversation – it's a continuing dialogue. Show your child that you're

This is an exciting time in your child's life! You want to be a part of that in a positive way that encourages them to share with you and trust you. If you take the time to teach them, they will be empowered in their online actions and behaviours for the better.

Do your homework

Make sure your home environment is secure and ready for your child to be online. Many major broadband providers offer age restriction settings so check with your provider to ensure these restrictions are put in place.

Many retailers offer free Parental Controls to their customers. You can find Parental Control walkthroughs on most popular provider websites.

Check the device's brand website for simple walkthroughs of where to find privacy settings on your child's specific device.



Discuss and agree on healthy phone and device habits

Once the device has been set up, take the time to agree on some healthy rules and boundaries for how they will use the device. This can include rules like when and where they can use their decide, screen time allowance and which apps are allowed to be used.

Be realistic on what will work in your household. If your child has friends with different rules, remind them that what works for one family might not work for another! As the parent or carer, you are responsible for the way your child uses their device and they will need guidance, especially if this is your child's first independent responsibility.

5 Keep Yourself Informed

We live in a digital world that changes daily. The most responsible thing you can do in keeping your child's device safe is to keep yourself informed.

Stay alert to trends and threats that they may be exposed to. With many companies beginning to offer "kid" versions of their platforms, knowing what is safe and what is suspect will help you make the best decision for your child.
