### **School Aims**



#### At Holy Child Primary School we aim to:

- Create a happy and supportive community that promotes a child's attainment and progress.
- Value each individual child, member of staff, governor and parent.
- Give a high priority to creating a close and supportive liaison between home, school and the wider community.
- Ensure that children are enabled to work to the best of their ability and to grow in knowledge and understanding in all areas of the curriculum.
- Ensure that learning is a rewarding and

- enjoyable experience for everyone. Provide a relevant, broad and balanced curriculum which enables each child to achieve to their full potential, not only academically, but artistically, emotionally and socially.
- Use a wide range of teaching strategies to cater for different learning styles.
- Promote the principles of fairness and justice for all through the education that we provide.
- Ensure that all children have equal access to the full range of educational opportunities.

### The Curriculum

#### The primary phase comprises:

Years 1 and 2 Years 3 and 4. Years 5, 6 and 7. In Holy Child PS, teachers integrate learning across the six areas to make relevant connections for children. These subject areas cover the range of knowledge, skills and understanding commonly accepted as necessary for a broad and balanced curriculum. Active learning is an integral part of our approach, particularly through play in the early years.

#### In addition to Religious Education, the curriculum is set out in six areas of learning comprising:

Language and Literacy - including talking and listening, reading and writing and opportunities to incorporate drama

**Mathematics and Numeracy** focusing on the development of mathematical concepts and numeracy across the curriculum

Physical Education - focusing on the development of knowledge, skills and understanding in a range of physical activities.

- focusing on the development of emotions, health, relationships and sexuality education, understanding of the local and global community

The World Around Us - focusing on the development of skills and knowledge in geography, history, science and technology

The Arts - including art and design, music and opportunities to incorporate drama





### **Embracing Change**

The pace of change in the world today is unprecedented and driven by daily advances in technology. Technology is a great motivator with the potential to enhance learning if used in positive ways.

For this reason, here in Holy Child we have invested heavily in this area with the creation of two ICT Suites (PC Suite and Apple Mac Suite), the acquisition of Ipads at a ratio of 1:2 pupils and the employment of ICT staff.

Even our youngest pupils arrive in school with a passion for technology and a range of ICT skills. Whilst we aim to develop these skills to



extend learning across the entire curriculum, we also teach our children about the dangers of technology and how to protect themselves online.

## Beyond the Classroom



At Holy Child, we recognise that high quality learning takes place when children are motivated and engaged and in order to achieve this, we believe it is essential to provide opportunities to learn in the world outside the classroom.

Therefore we ensure that children engage in learning in the playground, the school garden, the local community including Creggan Library as well as in venues throughout Derry and Northern Ireland. Our P7 children avail of a residential trip every year



## Extended Schools & Extra Curricular Provision





In Holy Child there are a wide range of activities that take place between 8 and 9am each morning and after 3pm.

This extra -curricular programme is made possible in two ways: the goodwill of teaching staff that use their own talents and After School Clubs interests to offer additional opportunities to The programme includes activities such the children and extended schools funding as: Football, Netball, Swimming, Athletics, provided by DENI.

Holy Child opened the doors of its Kids Club in September 2012. It operates Monday to Friday each week from 3-5pm. Two members of staff run this club: Caroline Mc Laughlin (coordinator) and Deirdre Doyle (assistant).


The club costs £3 per day and this is reduced to £2 should there be more than one child from a family.

Each day the children engage in a wide range of activities: playing board games, using construction toys, cooking, art and craft and ICT. They have their own room but also visit other areas of the school such as the ICT suite and obstacle course.

This club is a firm favourite of both our parents and pupils. It was introduced to offer additional support to our families particularly those who work and need help with childcare arrangements.



### Music



September 2014 saw our music provision extend even further when the tin whistle was introduced for all our P4 children.

Holy Child also has a very active school choir who sing at a variety of functions throughout the year.



## Accommodation



Holy Child has nine classrooms within the main building and several others available in mobile units. There is also an assembly hall, canteen, learning support classroom, music room and excellently resourced school library.

In addition to this, there are two computer suites, one with PCs and the other with Apple Mac Computers.

We have a mobile which is used for Kids Club (see page 10) each day and also by our school counsellor when working with children and their parents.




