
Introduction



Edenderry Primary School is situated on the outskirts of Portadown serving a large area of housing bordering on to the Gilford and Killicomaine Roads. The school boasts excellent facilities with all classrooms being bright and spacious. The school grounds are well maintained throughout the year being used for a variety of sporting, academic and community activities.

The school has been furnished with an upgraded networked computer system as part of the Classroom 2000 initiative which allows pupils and staff to participate in a variety of computer based activities. Over the last number of years the Parent Teacher Association have embarked on a programme to provide each year group with an Interactive Whiteboard and Data projector for use in the classroom. The school has been equipped with a state of the art ICT Resource Area boasting PC's, Interactive Whiteboard, Video Conferencing Hardware and Digital Imaging Technology. All classrooms are equipped with Interactive whiteboard and data projectors.

Within the last four years the school buildings have been extended, upgraded and refurbished through the provision of an ICT learning resource room, a refit of Primary One and Two Classrooms, two new Learning Support Classrooms and an extension to the staffroom. In 2013/2014 during the school's 125th anniversary, the school was equipped with a new state of the art central library and the office accommodation upgraded and extended.






School Uniform:

The Edenderry Primary School uniform consists of :

Black trousers/skirt.

Black school jumper, grey shirt (boys), white shirt (girls), school tie.

Black plimsolls.

Yellow school polo shirt (P1 and P2 all year).

Yellow/white checked dress (Summer).

School coats and school bags are also available from local outfitters.

Wearing a uniform gives a child a sense of identity and pride in the school. We appreciate the support of parents in sending all children to school in uniform.

We strongly discourage the wearing of jewellery in school because of the safety risks posed to the wearer; and to those around them and to minimise the risk of loss or damage to personal property. *If it is a parent's wish that earrings are worn then a "stud" must be worn. Parents should note that if they are planning to have their child's ears pierced this will mean that the child will be unable to do P.E. until after the earrings are able to be removed.*

Attendance

Parents of prospective pupils are encouraged to make an appointment with the principal to visit school. At this meeting the principal will give the parents a tour of the school and answer any relevant questions.


Parents of pupils entering Primary One are invited to a "Starting School" meeting in May or June of the academic year prior to their son or daughter starting school.

Curriculum

Edenderry Primary School in keeping with the schools mission statement “Today’s Children are Tomorrows Adults” teaches the Northern Ireland Curriculum with the intention of providing all our pupils with the necessary skills and attitudes for success in later life. Thus all pupils will receive a curriculum that is balanced and broad and which promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, intellectual and physical development of the individual.

As a school we would expect that most children will have achieved the following objectives as independent, confident learners by the time they transfer to secondary school and should be able to:

- | read fluently and accurately, with understanding, discrimination and enjoyment
- | write accurately and confidently for a range of purposes and audiences
- | talk and listen in a range of contexts including individual and group situations, be able to take account of the points of view of others
- | have a firm grasp of number facts and operations, be able to use mathematical skills and ideas in everyday situations
- | know where to look for information and how to record findings
- | be acquainted with scientific principles including Design and Technology
- | be familiar with and confident in the use of Information Technology
- | work independently or in a team to find things out, interpret and solve problems
- | use a range of creative arts and crafts as a means of expression
- | possess skills, strength, endurance and mobility in order to take part confidently in a range of physical activities
- | have an awareness of local geographical and historical features
- | show an interest in other places and cultures






The development of I.C.T. within the school is a key feature of school planning. Over the past five years pupils and staff have been introduced to new resources such as Interactive Whiteboards, Bee Bots and Digital Blue camcorders. With the help of the Parent Teacher Association it is the school intention to add further to the school I.C.T. hardware. In September 2009 a fully fitted I.C.T. resource area was opened following an S.E.L.B. building programme. Currently the school has seventeen classrooms fitted with interactive whiteboards providing opportunities for all our pupils to access a range of ICT activities both as individuals and as a class.



The Curriculum



In March 2011 the school was inspected by the Department of Education Inspectorate in the areas of Numeracy, Pastoral Care and Leadership/Management. The quality of education provided at Edenderry Primary School was evaluated as being "very good" with the quality of teaching observed being from good to outstanding with an average of very good and the quality of planning for mathematics and teacher evaluation of pupil learning being commended.

The inspectors summarised their report with a statement that "This school is meeting very effectively the educational and pastoral needs of the learner; and has demonstrated its capacity for sustained self-improvement." D.E. Inspection 2011.

This report was then followed by letter of commendation sent by Mrs Godfrey, Director, Curriculum Qualifications and Standards, who said "I particularly note the Inspectorate's comments regarding the very good monitoring and evaluation of the provision at Foundation Stage and Key Stage One and of the provision for pastoral care and mathematics throughout the school. Your school's capacity for sustained self-improvement is a successful example of the policy vision set out in "Every School a Good School". " I wish the whole school community every success as you build on this positive result for the future."

It is the intention of governors and staff to build on the outstanding teaching practices already present in school in our core subjects of Maths, English and I.C.T. to provide all our pupils with the skills necessary for success in the 21st century.

Extra Curricular Activities



Edenderry Primary School offers a range of after school activities for those pupils who stay to 3.00pm. During the course of the school year the following are offered as after school options:

Boys and Girls Football, Rugby, Boys and Girls Hockey, Cycling Proficiency, Athletics, Netball, Scripture Union, Choir, Art Club, ICT Club.


These after school activities are taken by members of the school staff and for some sports by qualified representative sportsmen and women. For our team sports children are given the opportunity to compete in fixtures and tournaments against their peers from other schools.

Over the years the school has developed a reputation for sporting excellence and success. In addition to school teams regularly winning local competitions in the various sports undertaken, a number of our past pupils have represented their country in Ladies Hockey, Athletics, Football, Rugby and Volleyball.


In June 2013 the school team were crowned Northern Ireland 5 a Side Football Champions for the first time, whilst in April 2014 the girls hockey team were crowned Northern Ireland Champions during the school's 125th anniversary year. In 2015 the boys football team were crowned Northern Ireland Champions.

During the last school year there were residential visits to Shannaghmore Centre for P6 and Glasgow/Edinburgh, Scotland for P7.

In 2016 the Boys Hockey were runners up in the N.I. Mini Hockey Final and the Boys football team were also runners up in the Northern Ireland Cup and Northern Ireland 5-A-side Shield.



Music and Drama



The school choirs regularly participate in local community events, school productions, assemblies and local festivals. The Senior Choir in recent years have performed at the switching on of the Christmas lights in Portadown Town Centre, for senior citizens in our local community centres, The Rotary Club dinner and at the official opening of Country Comes to Town. These public performances compliment the school's regular participation in the Portadown Music Festival in which the Junior Choir has won the U.T.U. Cup 2011, for the highest marks achieved in the junior classes. The Senior Choir has won the Brian Toms Cup 2007-2009, for the highest marks achieved in senior classes and the school has been awarded the McKay Kenny Cup 2009, for the most outstanding performance in the festival. In May/June 2012 the school stage The Wizard of Oz over three days. The performances were attended by over 1000 parents, pupils and friends of the school. In June 2014 a special production, 'Music Down the Years', was staged to make the school's 125th anniversary. During 2014/15 the school staged a Christmas Play 'The Magical Christmas Jigsaw' and a P1 - P3 Christmas concert 'Sing-along Christmas'. In 2015/16 the school staged "The Sound of Music" over the course of a week with the infant nativity "Prickly Hay"

Music Tuition

Music tutors from the S.E.L.B. provide lessons for of our P4 - P7 pupils. Tuition is available in Brass and Strings.

Special Education Needs



At Edenderry Primary School we recognise that not all pupils learn the key skills of Literacy and Numeracy at the same rate. Within our primary school a programme of support has been put in place to assist pupils who are experiencing difficulties within either English or Maths. Specific learning targets are established within the context of an Individual Learning Plan (IEP) on which the support teacher works with each pupil during periods of withdrawal from class.

Children receiving additional help are carefully monitored and progress is regularly assessed. Parents are kept informed of the nature and duration of this additional support through initial and review meetings with the support teacher.

Occasionally the school cannot fully meet the needs of some children and in this instance, after discussion with the parents, a formal referral will be made to the SELB's Special Education Branch. This process could result in a formal Statement of Educational Need being issued by the Board.

During the school year 2011/12 the Junior and Senior Learning Support Classes moved into two new custom built classrooms built as part of a £350,000 Minor Works Building programme brought forward by the Board of Governors and the S.E.L.B.

Pastoral Care



In line with the policy of maximising the potential of each pupil the school recognises that it has a responsibility to do everything possible to care for each child's physical and emotional well-being. The school has a member of staff appointed to co-ordinate every aspect of the all embracing pastoral care programme.

We aim to provide a happy, secure environment in which children can realise their full potential as individuals through effective progressive teaching. Every opportunity will be given to your child to experience individual success.

Pupils at Edenderry are encouraged to communicate confidently and clearly within the happy open school environment. Within the context of primary education it is most likely that children will be best known by their class teacher. Therefore it is your child's class teacher who will first notice any changes in attitude or behaviour and will react accordingly.

School's Council



At Edenderry Primary School we have a working School's Council which comprises of representatives from Primary Four to Primary Seven classes. The elected councillors work in conjunction with the school's link teachers in discussing issues received by peers and processing the items discussed to the relevant member of the school community. It is the hope of the school that all pupils who serve as councillors, stand for election or cast a vote will have an understanding of the democratic system that serves this country.



Community Involvement




Schools are situated at the heart of communities, playing a crucial part in the lives of our children. Edenderry Primary School has developed strong meaningful links with many organisations within the local community. The school has long established links with local churches whose clergy lead weekly assemblies and are invited to our special public assemblies for friends and parents. Our pupils regularly visit local churches to perform in services including the school's Senior Carol Service. The school has developed strong links with the local business community through its work with Young Enterprise.

Guest speakers from the council, P.S.N.I., Fire Service and health promotion agencies participate in some whole school assemblies. In June 2016 the School was awarded the Eco-School's Green Flag for the second time.

Pupils and staff regularly participate in community events such as the Music and Speech Festivals, council organised sports events and curriculum based competitions organised by local community organisations.



The staff and pupils of the school regularly contribute to a range of local and national charity appeals.




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Parent Concerns
