The Story Behind Our Badge

Traditionally school crests have been inspired by geographical or architectural landmarks within their locality, significant local historical events or even by the heraldic coats of arms of distinguished local families. These badges are designed to foster pride in the students for the achievements of their school and the surrounding area so that they too wish to emulate and build upon proud traditions.

The challenge for St Colman's in the design of its new identity was the creation of a brand that not only retains the more traditional core values of Christianity and academia but also one that embraces our ethos of nurturing and supporting all our students to thrive in the modern world. Furthermore we wished for a design which also encapsulated the various pathways taken by our Sixth Year students.

During the development of the school's new crest, key terms used to describe the school's identity and ethos were explored. They fell into two categories: Industry - outwardly exploring what the school's 'business' is, and Values - inwardly considering the school's concerns for its students on a social and interpersonal level.

The final crest conveys each of the key terms through the abstraction of individual elements that act as metaphors. A modern layered approach was adopted. The combination of abstraction and contemporary layering promotes unison of these elements and their respective values. As such, the design chooses not to focus on individual elements but the crest as a whole with the abstraction allowing the viewer to select and focus on what values are important to them.

Working from the back forwards the key components are; shield/Latin scroll, Christian cross, blades of a windmill, glass leading and a flower. Each item or combination of items has been selected for a specific role.

The shield is representative of strength and unison of the school whereby the teachers and students work together to create strength in learning, whilst the Latin scroll helps to emphasise the importance of academia and history.

The cross is representative of St Colman's Christian values being at its core, and its strong links in the local community. These values assist not only helping students focus on more traditional learning but also to develop interpersonal and social skills within their community, school and later, workplace.

The windmill blades form an architectural metaphor that works with the school's very direct Latin motto of 'Facta Non Verba' (Deeds not words). One interpretation suggests 'we can all have knowledge but it's what we do with that knowledge that counts'. The windmill blades are representative of the local landmark 'The Windmill Tower of Ballynahinch'. The windmill is a strong metaphor for the school and its industrious work ethic.

Glass leading and the flower, possibly most important of all is the care for the students' well-being. Of paramount importance is St Colman's pastoral care of its students. Without the school's strong emphasis on the students' mental and physical welfare, it becomes just a business. The flower is a strong visual metaphor representing the 'crop' we yield as the students leave our doors. It signifies their: learning; industry, hard work, diligence, focus, academia and vocation. These combined with the care, empathy and community they experience in St Colman's will help them grow and blossom.

To summarise, a school is an infinitely complex thing. Not a machine, not a business, but somewhere to learn and to grow in a safe and positive environment. We are proud that these concepts are reflected in our crest.


Community

Key Stage 4

Subjects available in Years 11 and 12 are divided into a compulsory core and a range of optional subjects chosen from two groups. Under the SEP (Shared Education Programme) joint classes are undertaken in some subjects with The High School, Ballynahinch.

Currently, St Colman's offers a range of academic as well as vocational subjects, which strive to meet the future career prospects of all our students. Students taking vocational subjects can take courses such as; Hairdressing, Beauty therapy, Plumbing, Carpentry, Patisserie and Motor Vehicle Servicing.

In terms of Sixth Form College provision, St Colman's offers one of the widest ranges of subjects in the Co. Down area. St Colman's have always recognised the importance of balance between academic and vocational subjects. This balance enables us to tailor provision to every individual student. With over thirty subjects at Level 2 and 3 to choose from, our highly skilled teachers and Tutors specialise in post-16 education, delivering excellent teaching and learning.

Some subjects are offered in collaboration with The Assumption Grammar School which is an important contribution to the Ballynahinch Area Learning Community. Combined with their academic studies, students are required over the two-year course to participate in our Enrichment Programme.

Our Careers Advisor works with students to ensure successful applications are made to colleges and universities. We regularly have students accepted at Queen's, University of Ulster and other top third level establishments. Students also attend higher education fairs and open days.

Library

Reading and Education are one in the same. St Colman's School Library is a comfortable and bright learning centre where all students can access most books of their choice.


The Librarian ensures that the library remains fully stocked and accessible and helps promote an individual and reflective learning environment. The Library is open from 8.00 am until 4.30 pm each day.

Numeracy

Numeracy is very important in St Colman's as it is a vital skill which all pupils need a certain level of proficiency in to cope with the numerical demands in everyday life and throughout school subjects.

At St Colman's Years 8 and 10 students have a specific Numeracy class during which time they are given opportunities to develop their numeracy skills. This time is made flexible to address the needs and requests of the pupils.

Pupils are encouraged to become more responsible for their own learning through the provision of a Mathematics Glossary and Numeracy Mat to KS3 pupils. Year 8 and Year 10 pupils have also been given access to Mathletics, an educational and interactive iPad app. This app provides both online and offline practice and enables parents to become involved in supporting their child's Numeracy development.

School Council

The Student Voice is an essential component of St. Colman's ethos.

Pastoral Care



Form Teacher

Pastoral Care

In St Colman's there is mutually close and supportive alignment of the pastoral and academic. There is a climate of ambition and support that enables all pupils to achieve to their full potential across a broad and balanced curriculum of academic subjects, sporting endeavours and cultural enrichment. The pastoral structures in St Colman's ensure that the needs of pupils are addressed swiftly, efficiently and effectively.

Each pupil has a Form Teacher who has responsibility to know individuals in depth. Pupils meet their Form Teacher every day and receive guidance, encouragement and help as a matter of course. The Form Teacher monitors the pupil's progress and is the first contact for parents in the need to contact the school.

Year Teacher

The Year Teacher has responsibility for the pastoral care of pupils across the whole year group. There is a close working alliance between Year Heads and Form Teachers. Year Heads devise and ensure that pastoral programmes are implemented by Form Teachers.

Trained Counsellors

Whilst there are trained counsellors on the teaching staff pupils are supported by professional counsellors who can be accessed through the Head of Pastoral Care. Pupils are encouraged to seek help for issues, embrace positive self-management and develop their confidence and capabilities.

Guidance

The school has a broad range of pastoral programmes designed to develop maturity, encourage thinking skills and personal capabilities and enrich the lives and opportunities for all in St Colman's. Copies of School Policies are available on request

Special Educational Needs

The term 'special educational needs' has a legal definition, referring to children who have learning difficulties or disabilities that make it harder for them to learn than most children of the same age. Many children will have special needs of some kind at some time during their education.

St Colman's recognises that Special Educational Needs cover a wide spectrum of type, duration and severity. We aim to create and maintain a positive learning environment for every child. To ensure this each child has access to a full, broad and balanced curriculum and equal opportunities to achieve. All students with Special Educational Needs (SEN) are identified and assessed as early as possible and support provided throughout their years in school. Every child in St Colman's has the opportunity to develop an appropriate sense of self-esteem and we employ a range of appropriate strategies/resources for teaching, learning and assessment. We foster a good working relationship between parents, school and outside agencies ensuring that adequate provision is made for all children. Learning Support in St Colman's involves all staff and is led by the SENCO.

Comenius Exchange Programme



St Colman's previously participated in the Comenius Project which involved multilateral partnerships between our school and six other European Schools, namely in Belgium, Sicily, France, England and Poland. From 2012-2014 our project was named 'European Mobile School'. The aim of this project was to 'work together, play together and stay together'.

The project involves Christmas box exchanges to all our partner schools, live online chats via Skype, exchanges to Belgium, visiting the European Mobile School in Blankenberge and, our Year 14 pupils hosting their Belgian partners in September.

During hosting week, our Belgian partners visited Northern Ireland and were involved in cultural visits to the Giant's Causeway, the Mournes, Belfast City and Dublin to name a few.



The President/ Duke of Edinburgh Awards



The Duke of Edinburgh award programme has been designed to introduce our pupils to worthwhile leisure activities and voluntary service. It serves to challenge our pupils to discover the satisfaction of achievement in a non-competitive environment. Pupils will gain self-confidence, skills and aspirations by following the programme through to completion. Our Silver award programme is designed so that it is achievable by all whilst developing independence of thought and action, respect and understanding and the ability to lead and work as part of a team.

All pupils undertake four key sections namely volunteering, skills, physical and expedition, each with their own timescales and programme objectives as a licensed organisation.





St Colman's fully encourage and inspire our Year 13 pupils at every stage of their adventure, recognising and rewarding their achievement.

The BALC Learning Community

The Ballynahinch Area Learning Community is a partnership of four schools:

- Assumption Grammar School;
- The High School Ballynahinch;
- St Colmcilles High School;
- St Colman's Ballynahinch and;
- SERC.



All collaboratively work together as one in the local community to provide an extended curriculum and increased learning opportunities for students. The principle aims are to provide young people with opportunities to enrich and extend their experiences appropriate to their background and aspirations.

The school aims to build on the work already in place to extend the curriculum and provide cross community activities. By providing students with the opportunities to work together it is hoped to encourage a more cohesive local community.

Careers Education and Guidance

The ETi inspectorate highlighted the 'very good' support given to students in St Colman's with regards to Careers Education and Guidance.

All students from Year 8 – 14 have timetabled Careers classes in which emphasis is placed on the development of personal awareness skills related to occupational opportunities. Two joint heads of the Careers Department are assisted by a Career's Advisor who is separately funded by St Colman's to give expert advice and assistance. External support is also provided from the Careers Service NI. An extensive programme of careers support is integrated into the school calendar throughout the academic year including:

Facilitation of Careers Convention, UCAS and FE Applications and Open Day, Organisation of Work Experience placement at Key Stage 5, impartial careers information, advice and guidance towards employment opportunities.



Lifestyle



Healthy and enjoyable lifestyle choices are promoted in St Colman's at every opportunity. Sport either through PE or extra-curricular activities offers students the chance to participate in: Rugby, Soccer, Gaelic football, Camogie, Netball and countless other fitness-building, team playing, and individual sports.

Fitness Freddy is a regular visitor and gets everyone (even the teachers) up off their feet in a Fitness Freddy frenzy of dance and movement.

Students are invited to take part in an enrichment programme where they can choose from activities such as first aid training, Defibrillator training, Hair and Beauty, Duke of Edinburgh/ Presidents Award, Certificate in Personal effectiveness and C.o.P.E.




Creativity

iPad Technology in St Colman's



In keeping with our 'believe and achieve' ethos, we want every student at St Colman's to be fully prepared for a world where digital technology is transforming work and social life. Technology has now reached a level where it can be effectively applied in mainstream education. It has been our ambition for a considerable time to allow students to have access to top quality digital technology as and when needed for their learning. We believe that students' learning and progress can be greatly improved by increasing access to digital technology, and this can be achieved by enabling every student to have a personal device.

In September 2013 we launched the iPads for Learning Scheme. This was initially offered to Year 9 and 11 students, and today all students have access to their own iPad. The school has invested heavily in infrastructure to ensure it can support large numbers of iPads. Each student who joins St Colman's is provided with the latest iPad, protective case, a range of paid and free apps, insurance and warranty, with full backup and technical support available in school for the duration of the scheme. The iPads are available to take home at night. The iPads remain the property of the school throughout the duration of the scheme.

There are two documents that must be read and signed before an iPad will be issued to a student. An 'Acceptable Use Policy for both Pupils and Parents'. All documents, including the AUPs, can be downloaded from the School Website, or obtained from the school office.

iPads for Learning Scheme

Why choose a tablet?

We bought our first iPads two years ago, and have been testing them extensively since then. No other device offers the performance, versatility, range of educational apps and support from both the manufacturer and supplier. The iPad in our view represents the best value for one to one technology. Students (and staff) need little instruction in how to use iPads. Whether it is producing a presentation in Science, searching the internet, completing a quiz, recording a podcast, videoing a role play, analysing technique in PE or using one of the stunning educational apps. We are convinced that one to one use of iPads will greatly enhance students' enjoyment of learning and improve the attainment of your child.

What outcomes are expected?

Students have been using iPads for the past two years. We have noticed that their independence in learning, creativity and problem-solving skills have all developed. Staff have been able to give more highly personalised feedback on their work, and staff and students have been able to work closely together to develop new ways of teaching and learning. Many staff have commented on improvements in both student motivation and behaviour.

Why are parents being asked to pay?

We have invested significantly in the school's ICT infrastructure (around $\pounds 150,000$ to date) specifically in this scheme. We have installed a schoolwide wireless network, a superfast Internet connection, supplied iPads and training to staff and pupils. We receive no funding for a scheme such as this, so have to ask parents to contribute towards the costs. We are subsidising the cost by around $\pounds 25,000$ per year group, but cannot run

such an ambitious scheme without some parental financial support.

What's included?

The 'iPads for Learning' scheme offers the use of an iPad, a range of free and paid educational apps; a rugged, shockproof, dustproof case with excellent protection against accidental damage; a warranty and insurance policy with no excess. The retail value of this package is in excess of £600.


