

Mathematics

- Count to and across 100, forwards and backwards from any number including 0
- Count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals and 1 to 20 in words
- Count in multiples of 2, 5 and 10, forwards and backwards
- Use the language of: equal to, more than, less than, most and least to describe numbers
- Recall and use addition and subtraction facts to 20
- Add and subtract one digit and two digit numbers up to 20, including zero
- Solve addition and subtraction problems, including missing number problems, using concrete objects and pictures. For example, $7 = \square - 9$
- Solve multiplication and division problems using concrete objects, pictures and arrays with support
- Recognise, find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity
- Recognise, find and name a quarter as one of four equal parts of an object, shape or quantity
- Measure and begin to record lengths and heights, mass/weight, capacity and volume, time (hours, minutes and seconds)
- Recognise and know value of coins and notes
- Sequence events in order e.g. before and after, next, first, today, tomorrow, yesterday, morning, afternoon and evening
- Know the days of the week, months of the year and year date
- Tell the time to the hour, half past the hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times
- Recognise and name common 2D and 3D shapes including rectangle, square, circle, triangle, cuboid, pyramid and sphere
- Describe position, direction and movement including whole, half, quarter and three quarter turns

Speaking and Listening

- Speak audibly and fluently with increasing command of Standard English
- Ask relevant questions to extend understanding
- Maintain attention and participate actively in conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments
- Actively participate in discussions, performances, role play, improvisations and debates

Reading

- Apply phonics knowledge to decode words, speedily link sound to grapheme to all 40+ sounds, including alternatives where applicable
- Read common exception words
- Read words with –s, -es, -ing, -ed, -er and –est endings
- Read words with contractions (I'm, I'll, we'll) and understand that apostrophe represents an omitted letter(s)
- Re read books to build fluency and confidence in word reading, including joining in predictable phrases
- Develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read and increased vocabulary by listening to, retell and discussing a wide range of poems, stories, fairy stories and traditional tales and non-fiction texts at a level beyond which they can read independently
- Link what they read and hear read to their own experiences
- Learning to appreciate rhymes and poems, reciting some by heart
- Check that text makes sense as they read and correct inaccuracies
- Answer and ask questions about the text and make predictions based on text so far



Writing

- Spell words containing each of the 40+ phonemes, common exception words and the days of the week
- Name and order letters of the alphabet
- Add –s or –es at the end of nouns to show the plural
- Use –ing, -ed, -er and –est at the end of words e.g. helping, helped, helper
- Write from memory sentences dictated by the teacher including correct spelling and punctuation
- Sit correctly and hold a pencil correctly
- Form all letters (capitals and lower case) and numerals correctly
- Leave a space between words
- Compose a sentence orally before writing it
- Sequence sentences to show development of ideas, using “and” as a connective
- Re-read and check what has been written makes sense
- Read aloud their writing clearly to an audience
- Start sentences with a capital letter and end with a full stop, question mark or exclamation mark
- Use a capital for names of people, places, days of the week and for the personal pronoun “I”
- Use and understand the grammatical terms letter, capital letter, word, singular, plural, sentence, punctuation, full stop, question mark and exclamation mark
