## Make Vowels Fun by Having Children Work as a Team

A quick and easy five-minute game, this is perfect for teaching the medial sound in words. Put a Post-it on your back, which has a vowel sound written on it. Then the other player has to give words that have the medial sound in it. E.g. you have short a sound on your back so, the other player will say words with the short a sound (cat man tap)

The student with the Post-it on their back has to guess the vowel that they have.

They can do long or short vowel versions.

## The Phonic Cup Game

This vowel sound game involves play with learning. Student one hides the marble under one of the cups. Student two must guess which cup it is under after hearing student one's clues about which cup it is hidden under. E.g. Student one hides marble under e cup, then they could give the sound it makes OR words that have the medial e sound (pen bed hen)
This would also be fun way to differentiate between short and long vowels, such as having a short "A" cup and a long "A" cup.
The short a being the sound we associate with the sound a for apple
a for ant and the sound in the middle of the word mat
The long $a$ is the sound of the letter name a for acorn and a for ape or as the vowel sound in the word baby.
