


Registering and Using Oxford Owl for Guided Reading


Oxford Owl are providing free access to levelled reading books for guided reading (the books children would normally read in their reading groups). These usually correspond to the colour of words your children know/are learning. For example, if your child is learning pink words, they could begin to read the Level 1+ Pink colour band books. Below is a step-by-step guide to access the free books.




Step 1: go to www.oxfordowl.co.uk and click to enter 'Oxford Owl for Home'



Step 2: Click 'Browse eBooks'



Step 3: At the right side of the screen is an option to browse according to the Oxford Level. These should correspond with the coloured word lists your children have been learning, however, within levels there can be differences in levels of difficulty.



Step 4: When you select your colour band/level you will be taken to the corresponding free eBook library. You can register for an account by clicking 'register'.



Step 5: follow instructions on screen to register your account. You will receive an email to verify your account. Once you have followed the link in the email you are ready to go!



Step 6: You can browse books by Level or 'Book Band' (colour). Selecting a slightly younger or older age will provide access to different levels/colour bands. (This can also be used for older children). The level 1 (lilac) books are prereaders so do not have words, rather they are to provide the opportunity to develop language and comprehension by discussing what is happening in each picture. In school we use a range of different reading schemes to tailor reading to suit your child. You may, therefore, find some differences between the high frequency words on your lists, and the high frequency words in some of these books.
