“We need to leave space in your tummy for the ice-cream at the beach,” Mom says.

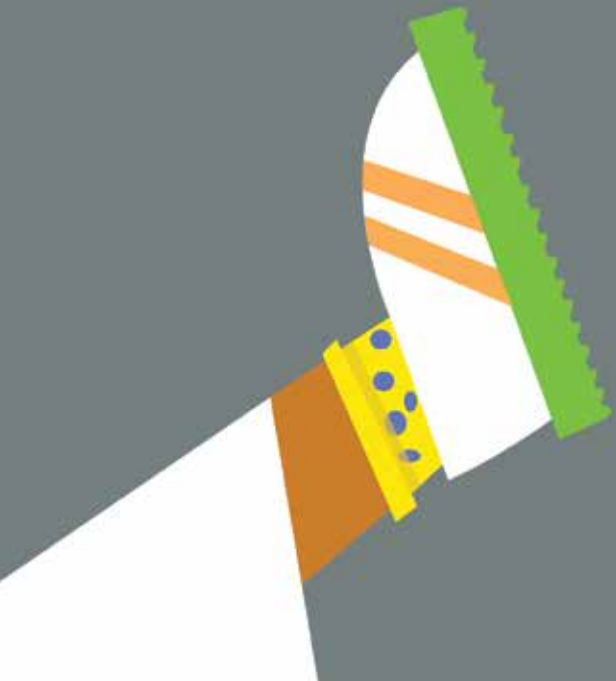
“Why are you wearing pyjamas?”
