A place where rabbits are kept or raised.







How are they similar and different?





The gestation period for rabbits and hares is about a month.

Each litter has three to eight babies.





Baby rabbits are called kittens or bunnies. Baby hares are called leverets.





A baby rabbit is born hairless and completely blind. A baby hare has fur and sight and can move on their own an hour after being born.





Hares are larger than rabbits and have longer hind legs.





Both rabbits and hares have short tails.





A rabbit's fur stays the same color all year, while a hare's fur changes from brown or gray in the summer to white in the winter.





Both rabbits and hares are herbivores. Rabbits tend to eat softer grasses and vegetables, while hares like to eat harder bark and twigs.





Rabbits live in burrows underground and hares make nests above ground.





Rabbits can be domesticated and kept as pets, while hares remain wild.



Rabbits are social animals that live in groups called colonies. Hares spend the majority of their time alone.





Rabbits escape danger by going underground. Hares escape danger by running fast.









More than half of the world's population of rabbits live in North America.



Rabbits live in meadows, woods, forests, grasslands, deserts, and wetlands.



Parts of a Rabbit



A female rabbit is called a doe and a male rabbit is called a buck. A baby rabbit is called a kit.



All rabbits except for cottontail rabbits live in underground burrows.



Rabbits live in groups called colonies.



Rabbits can weigh anywhere from 2-24 pounds.



Rabbits have long ears that are about 4 inches long.



Rabbits have short tails.



Rabbits are herbivores. They eat grass, clovers, wild flowers, and farm crops.



Rabbits only sweat on the pads of their feet.




Rabbits are most active at dawn and dusk. They eat around dusk.




Rabbits have a lifespan of around 10 years.

Many people have rabbits for pets.




