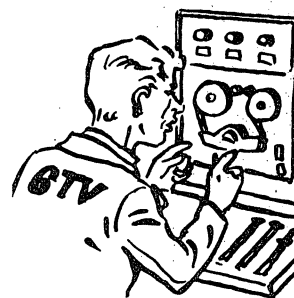

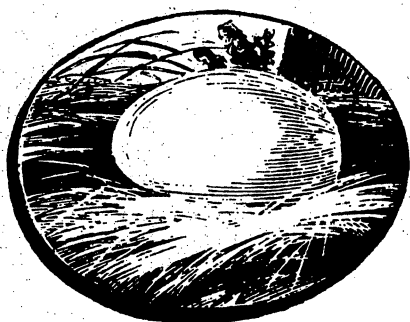
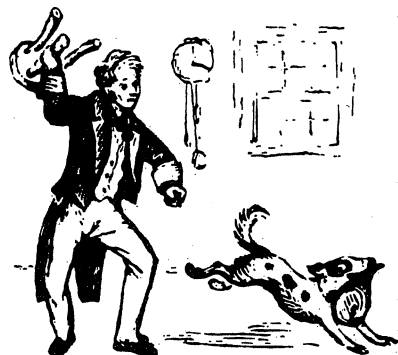

What am I?

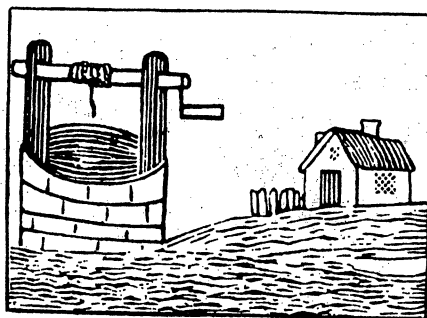
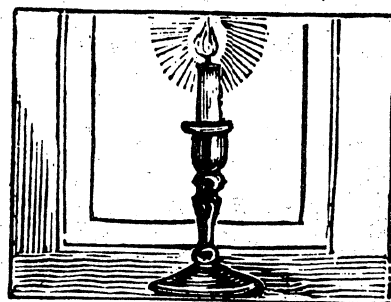
These little puzzles are called riddles, and come from an old book of nursery rhymes. The pictures next to the riddles give clues to the answers.

Cannot pull it up.

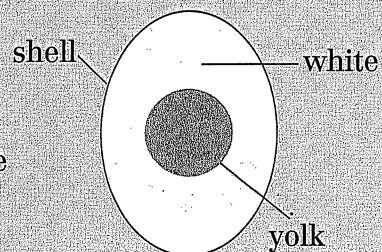
