



My School Day

Our school gates open for entry at **8.30 am**. We ask parents to continue to use the one way system in the mornings (driving round the back of the chapel and out the middle gates).

Parents are asked to park safely and then walk their children to the main school gate where a member of staff will be waiting to help and escort any young child/children who may need support to their classroom.

Please do not let children run through the car park as other vehicles will be entering and exiting. Pupils will go directly to their own classrooms.

This allows greater numbers to access the car park without a long queue. Parents will have a 20 minute window to drop children off at school.

We would expect pupils from classes to walk independently to their entry points and parents should remain outside the main gates to reduce footfall within the school grounds.

We would ask that you do not send your children to school before 8.30 am as the gate will not be open.

Our Ethos

Before School

By the time they come to school children know how to walk, talk, are developing their own personality and can cope with many other things. The child is most influenced by you the parent. The local environment also has it's part to play, but it is vital when he /she comes to school that you continue to support your child just as you have done in the first few years of life.

<u>Partnership</u>


The school can only do so much. With the school and home, working together, we can better help your child to learn the things he/she needs to be successful and achieve their full potential.



Life Skills

- Do not discuss school incidents, other pupils or staff in front of your child. This can be very damaging.
- Remember the story your child tells you is only half a story. The other child/children involved have their story and very often the truth is somewhere in between.

REMEMBER: School is a preparation for life. In the real world we are not happy all of the time, or get everything we want when we want it. In work there are often many differences, difficult days, jobs to be completed on time and rules to follow. In school the children will face different challenges and disappointments and however difficult it may be to resisting the urge you can't fight all your child's battles for them. It is difficult but they will get over minor disappointments and learn from the difficulties. Through facing these challenges they will learn valuable lessons, grow in independence, learn how to communicate more effectively with others and resolve conflicts.



Life Skills

Children learn important life skills from their families. These basic skills are seen as very important and should be encouraged and practised until they become automatic.

- Saying please and thank you
- Set clear boundaries for your child
- When you say "No" you mean it
- Be consistent do not give into tantrums
- Ensure your child tidies toys away when they have finished playing.
- Encourage your child to develop their concentration by persevering at an activity until they have finished it
- Play games with your child that will help them accept that they will not always win snakes and ladders, matching games, etc.
- Encourage your child to wait their turn and share with others
- Our child does as you have asked.

Medication

It is our policy in St Patrick's that Staff <u>do not</u> administer any non prescribed medicines such as Paracetamol, Calpol, Nurofen etc.



Other prescribed medicines can only be administered after a 'Request for School to Administer Medication' Form has been Completed and returned.

Transport

The Education Authority Transport Department decides who is eligible to travel on a bus, NOT the School.

An online application for transport <u>must</u> be made for any child wishing to be considered for a place on a bus. There is only one Yellow Bus to take children to and from school (Afternoon 2.45 p.m. only) Only those children who are <u>granted a bus place by the Education Authority</u> will be able travel by bus. Girls' Uniform

Navy skirt/pinafore or navy joggers, Navy sweatshirt with school crest or cardigan, Pale blue polo shirt with school crest, Optional navy fleece, summer dress.

Boys' Uniform

Homework

We see a real value in children engaging in homework. It gives them an opportunity to consolidate the work done in class, and to prepare for work to come. It involves parents helping with their children's work and encourages good working habits. However, it must be stressed that it should

However, it must be stressed that it should never be a source of anxiety or worry.

The time allocation is very general but it should not exceed:

15-25 minutes at Foundation Stage

15-30 minutes Key Stage 1

30-50 minutes at Key Stage 2

Homework will be set each night, though this may be relaxed on special occasions.

A folder will be sent home on a Monday night and should be returned on a Friday

morning. P1 will normally not begin any real homework until later in the first term

Positive Behaviour


In St. Patrick's Primary School we seek to create a climate in the school that will:


- Promote learning for all pupils

- Develop greater independence by accepting the need for self-discipline, self-control and take responsibility for our own behaviour
- Develop the pupil's interpersonal skills and their ability to work co-operatively with others to resolve problems and potential or actual conflict
- Have the endorsement and active support of the parents.


In cases where a child has misbehaved there are sanctions as outlined in the School Positive Behaviour Policy. Where there is a serious breach, parents will be notified or invited to the school to discuss the matter.

Preparing Your Child
