Dear Parents,

I would like to take the opportunity to wish our entire school community a pleasant and happy Easter holidays. We look forward to a busy summer term, along with reflecting on such a successful year to date. I hope you all enjoy our school newsletter and get a feel for life in Scoil Phádraig Naofa for our young pupils.

I also wish to share with you the exciting news that our school will undergo expansion over the coming months, with the addition of two classrooms. These classrooms will enable us cater for all children with specific interests and talents across our school community. The school will be adding two special classes for autism. The staff and Board of Management are very excited with these additions, which is very much in line with our school ethos and mission statement as we endevour to "offers our pupils a rich variety of opportunities so they can grow and develop their skills and talents in a warm and nurturing atmosphere." Two classrooms in the main building will be reconfigured to accommodate 2 autism classes and 2 main stream classes will be accommodated in the modular building. Most of the construction work will take place in the summer holidays. However, we expect some initial work to take place over the months of May/June.

As you are aware out site is very tight. Should builders arrive on site during the May/June, traffic in the morning and afternoon may be affected. Any changes to our traffic management plan will be clearly communicated to all well in advance. It would be our hope that the majority of families will take the opportunity to walk to and from school over what will hopefully be summer weather conditions. In addition, we may not be able to provide parking for all our staff while the building work is in progress. We ask your understanding in this instance, in particular the understanding of the residents of Foxwood and Mount Oval. It will be short term and necessary to accommodate all our pupils.

As a school community we are proud to support the development of all our pupils recognising the talents and individual needs of each pupil.

I would also like to thank our immensely hard-working staff for all that they continue to do day in day out. The atmosphere they help create is what makes Scoil Phádraig Naofa so very special for the children here. Many thanks also to our Parents Association who have been extremely busy on our Easter Raffle, Grandparents Day, plans for upcoming Holy Communion and Graduation Ceremonies, along with a range of other items. I would also like to thank our Board of Management, whose help ensure our school continues to develop and achieve excellence in all that we do.

I hope the boys and girls take the opportunity to rest up, enjoy themselves and return to school rejuvenated and ready for our summer term. I look forward to welcoming you all back to school on Tuesday, April 29th.








Throughout the week, pupils from the Student Council shared our whole school Friendship message via the school intercom.

The children worked collaboratively to design and build the many key features of the Irish Monastery such as, the Round Tower, Church, high walls, cells etc. The children labelled the main features of the monastery to help the other children to learn about the buildings.






### **History Projects**

Fifth Class then jumped on several centuries to the Irish Famine of 1847. Here they constructed examples of the key symbols of the Irish Famine, the small home where the poor people lived, with their thatched roof and small pieces of land. This was in sharp contrast to the grand home of the wealthy landowners with their large gardens and abundance of food. Finally the children constructed a Famine Ship which carried people to various countries around the world e.g. England, America in search of a better life. Congratulations to all those in Fifth class for bringing our shared history to life.



### **Maths in Action**

At Scoil Phádraig Naofa we promote active hands on learning whenever possible so that children can learn process and channel their 'book learning' into real life experiences. With this in mind, it was great to see the pupils from Third Class activitely involved measuring the corridors using non standard measures, i.e. pencils. There was a lot of focus and concentration which was peppered by giggles and crawling, as the children brought "Maths to life and making it real".



Meanwhile the pupils in Senior Infants were busy collecting information to construct their pictogram. They focused on two different topics, 'Our Favourite Pets' and 'Our Favourite Sports'. This 'hands on' interactive activity provided much discussion, the use of mathematical language and the display and analysis of results, whilst also providing a lot of fun and laughter.

One of our students in Fifth class has provided additional information on their activities below.


### Engineering in a Box




