Straidbilly is a controlled primary school. We have currently 88 pupils on our roll ranging from 4-11 years of age. The school is under the control of the Education Authority (NE region), Ballymena.



# About Our School



Straidbilly Primary School serves a wide area in the north of Co. Antrim, between Ballymoney, Ballycastle, and Bushmills. We enjoy warm family connections with local communities which span several generations. The aim of staff and governors is to provide the best quality education and care for all of our pupils. Mutual respect between staff and pupils is evident in the happy, welcoming atmosphere of the school.

Our highly qualified teaching staff is ably supported by experienced classroom assistants and ancillary staff who all work together for the good of the whole school. They are supported by a dedicated Board of Governors.

The school currently has five class bases, a resource area, all with Interactive White Boards, and a school garden which can double up as an outdoor classroom. Pupils' work and achievements are exhibited attractively on displays.

Former pupils have gone on to pursue a wide range of careers - in academic, professional, business, and farming spheres. The governors and staff are proud of the school's reputation in the community and work hard to uphold this.

# The Curriculum

It has always been the policy of the school to offer the widest possible range of experience to our pupils. We keep pace with educational change and constantly adjust our teaching methods to keep in line with contemporary good practice and with the demands of the Northern Ireland curriculum.

Schemes of work have been prepared for each year group, ensuring the correct balance of subjects. We use a wide range of learning and teaching strategies and resources to cater for the needs of all our pupils. Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities are infused into the teaching and delivery of the curriculum.

## THE NORTHERN IRELAND CURRICULUM AREAS OF LEARNING

### LITERACY

Talking and Listening, Reading and Writing develop the necessary communication skills for pupils to grow and contribute to their society. We use Reading Eggs, Accelerated Reader, a wide range of both fiction and non-fiction texts and a wealth of ICT resources to expose pupils to all forms of Literacy. Philosophy for Children is taught in all classes to develop self-confidence and good habits in communication.

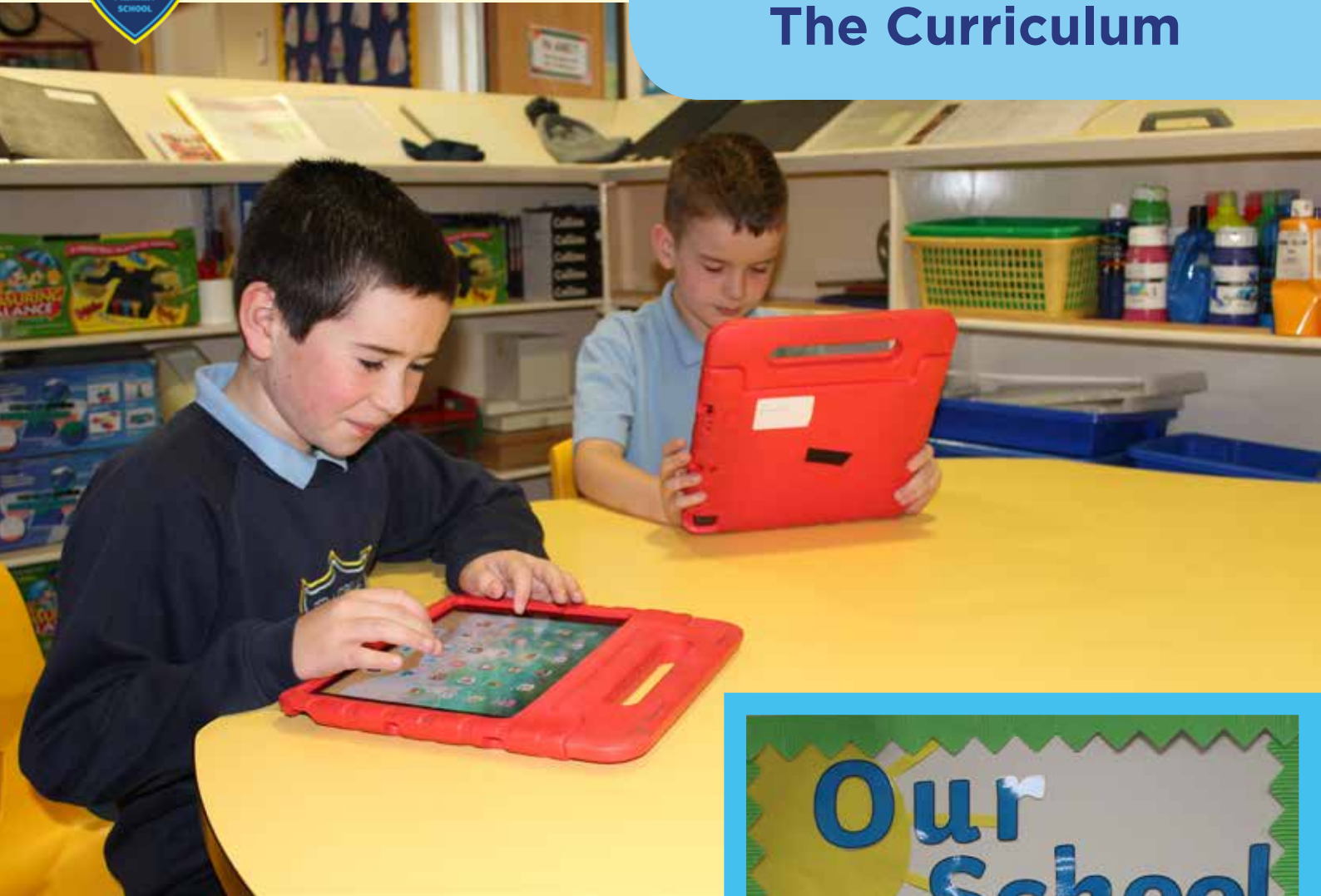


### NUMERACY

Number, Measures, Shape and Space, Measures and Processes. Pupils have access to a wide variety of practical resources and activities to enable them to develop mental agility, the understanding of mathematical concepts, and problem-solving skills.



# The Curriculum



## ICT

ICT is embedded in all areas of the curriculum. ICT skills are both taught in their own right and also as a vehicle for developing learning in other curricular areas. While the advantages of the internet are many, we are very mindful of the challenges of social media on young people today and devote much time to the teaching of online safety.

## THE WORLD AROUND US

Science and Technology, History and Geography. We have developed many Thematic units to deliver this aspect of the curriculum and to enable pupils to develop the necessary skills to explore and understand their world and the things which impact it. We have a strong focus on Outdoor Learning and use local natural resources and organisations to support our programmes.





# The Curriculum

## THE ARTS

Art, Drama and Music. Our pupils have the opportunity to develop their creativity by participating in school productions, festivals and competitions. All pupils from P4 upwards learn the recorder, and tuition in woodwind and stringed instruments with EA tutors is available.

## P.E.

From Fundamental Movement to Sports teams, pupils have access to a wide PE Curriculum including Games, Gymnastics, Dance, Athletics and Swimming. Pupils in Key Stage Two make use of the local Joey Dunlop Centre for swimming classes. Our After-school activities programme also provides many opportunities for different sports and we enter football and hockey teams in local tournaments. Sports day is a popular day for all to display their abilities!

## R.E.

We follow the EA/NEELB scheme for RE as the prescribed syllabus and encourage Christian morals and values. Our assemblies are non-denominational and we welcome many visitors to assembly including local ministers, charity representatives, storytellers and organisations such as RNLI, National Trust etc.





# The Curriculum

## PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AND MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

Through this programme, we promote the development of each child personally, socially and emotionally, encouraging them to become independent and enabling them to make responsible choices and decisions to help them to lead happy, healthy and fulfilling lives.

## HOMEWORK

In Straidbilly homework is set to support and consolidate the learning going on in class. We encourage parents to take an active interest in their child's homework and speak to their class teacher about any concerns.

## ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING

Continual assessment by teachers takes place throughout the year. All children are tested formally at the end of P4 and the end of P7 in Literacy, Numeracy and ICT. The results of these will be included in your child's report. All parents are offered two formal interviews each year and written reports are issued in June.

In February, P7 parents are invited for an interview to choose a Post-Primary school for their child. Parents are always welcome to make an appointment with their child's class teacher or the Principal to discuss any concerns they have.





# All Round Care

## SPECIAL NEEDS

This school acknowledges that those pupils who have special educational needs, either throughout or at any time during their school years, must have those needs identified and addressed. These pupils have the right to a broad and balanced curriculum which covers all aspects of the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

Once a teacher has expressed a concern over some aspects of a child's performance, the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO) becomes involved. An individual plan is written, which is discussed with parents. It may be necessary to avail of further support from Special Education services. The school also takes pride in challenging children who are above average or of exceptional ability.

## PASTORAL CARE

Teachers adopt a positive and caring attitude to children in the classroom. A Child Protection Policy is in place and can be viewed at any time. This reflects both legal and pastoral responsibilities.

The Designated Teacher for Child Protection, the Deputy Designated Teacher for Child Protection or the Chairperson for the Board of Governors may be contacted about a child protection issue. We will take all reasonable steps to ensure that the children's welfare is safeguarded and their safety preserved. The safety of children is of paramount importance and we would ask for your co-operation in the following points:

- Pupils should always use the pedestrian entrance and not the vehicle entrance.
- Pupils must have permission to leave the school grounds and teachers must be notified if pupils, for any reason, have to leave school early.
- Teachers should be notified if there is a change in the person collecting the children from school.
- Our school doors remain locked during the school day and are released by staff. All visitors will be met by a member of staff and will be asked to sign in.
- Fire drills are carried out termly.





## CLUBS

### EARLY BIRD BREAKFAST CLUB

This runs daily from 8:00am-8:40am. Children are provided with toast, pancake and fruit juice/water. Children not attending Early Bird should not arrive before 8:40am.

Our Wraparound Care provision operates Monday-Friday from 2pm-5pm. The cost is £3 per hour and this includes toast, pancake & juice. In Stay & Play (2pm-3pm) & Hangout (3pm-5pm) children can do homework, have access to computers, table top games and art materials.

## SCHOOL COUNCIL

Our school councillors, elected by the pupils, meet regularly to discuss matters which concern them, from worthwhile suggestions for improvements to our school to asking for a school pet! It is very important that our pupils have their voice in school matters heard, where possible.

## P7 BUDDY SYSTEM

Every P1 child has at least one P7 buddy who will help them settle in. Our P7's every year feel this is their favourite responsibility and it is a duty they carry out with great pride and care.



P7 pupils assist in the dining room to promote good eating habits, initiate healthy conversation and assist tidying up after the meals. In the playground, P7 pupils run a duty rota to assist Supervisors and help make playtimes happy and fun!

## SCHOOL HOUSE SYSTEM

We have three "Houses" in Straidbilly - Carnmoon, Cloonty and Loughlynch - all named after neighbouring townlands. The pupils have great pride in their house and a healthy competition exists. House points can be gained for a variety of reasons including behaviour, work, school competitions and good citizenship.

## P6 & P7 RESIDENTIAL

A residential trip is planned every year, usually in the summer term, when pupils can try out new challenges and experiences. It is our aim to try to ensure the school residential is accessible for all.

## PRIZE DAY

Prize Day takes place at the end of June where pupils' successes and achievements are formally recognised.

## THE SCHOOL AND THE COMMUNITY

The school values its links with the local community and is proud to be known as a place where everyone is welcome. The Principal and staff are always willing to assist parents and others with any advice they can offer or with practical help which they can give regarding the education of the children in their care.



## PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

The staff fully support the idea that parents should be closely involved in school and a good rapport between parents and teachers is encouraged. We would encourage parents to see their child's Teacher, Principal or Designated Teachers for Child Protection if they have a concern about their child or an aspect of the school. Two parent representatives are elected every four years to serve on the Board of Governors.

We have a very active and committed PTA who arrange events to provide opportunities for people to get together socially as well as raise funds for the benefit of the children. We would encourage all parents to support their fund raising events as they benefit all children in the school. New parents are most welcome to join the PTA, either on the committee or as a helper at events!

We enjoy a long-standing, positive working relationship with Armoy PS and St Olcan's PS.

Our three schools are currently linked through Shared Education and our pupils have opportunities to get together for programmes based around many areas of the curriculum. This programme not only enhances opportunities for school improvement, but also opportunities for greater community involvement and cohesion.
