What is it?

'Say Yes to Languages' is a language learning programme, which is fully funded by the Department of Education.

Why is it a great opportunity for your child?

- It is a great chance to have fun while exploring a new language.
- Children who learn languages are more likely to develop better literacy skills and increased creativity, as well as an appreciation of diversity and deeper empathy for others.
- Language learners tend to score higher in Maths! They develop problem-solving and critical thinking skills.
- It is a great opportunity to have a positive experience learning languages, which will help with subject choices in secondary school.
- It will help your child to develop a range of skills which they can use in the future, no matter what career path they take.

Where and when does it take place?

The classes take place in your child's school, during the normal timetable. The programme runs for a total of ten hours of classes.

‘Say Yes to Languages’ Aims:

- Generate awareness among pupils of the range of languages, including Irish Sign Language, used by their peers in their schools and communities, which may help support greater inclusion and appreciation of diversity in society.
- Encourage uptake of languages at post-primary level.
- Provide opportunities for increased levels of collaboration among the school community, with regard to the celebration of languages and cultures.
- Support the implementation of Languages Connect: Ireland’s Strategy for Foreign Languages in Education.

Did you know?

In 2022, over 750,000 people resident in Ireland spoke a language other than English or Irish at home. Over 200,000 of these were born in Ireland. (CSO)

Modern foreign languages will become part of a redeveloped Primary School Curriculum in Ireland.

In all other European countries, pupils already learn one or more foreign languages from primary school.
