Library Book Fundraiser





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New Primary Maths Curriculum - this is what the teachers will be training in on the 9th May!

Information for parents on the new Primary Mathematics Curriculum



The Department of Education has published a new maths curriculum for children in primary and special schools. The curriculum sets out what children will learn in maths in every school.

What is different and how children will learn under the new curriculum

The aim of the new curriculum is that children see maths as important and useful to their everyday lives.

It does not change much of 'what' children learn, but it improves 'how' children learn maths. This includes more learning through play and problem solving. It also provides more opportunities for children to be creative, take risks and be challenged. It gives teachers more flexibility to teach in a way that best meets the needs of each child. The following are some examples.



 Children will have a chance learn maths through play. Teachers can use games involving counting, measuring, angles and so on.

- Children can make connections between maths and other areas of learning. Some examples are the use of maths in PE or history, or Irish.
- Children are encouraged to share, reason and argue their thinking about maths.
- Children will be given more space to work with each other and discuss their ideas.
- Children will have the chance to solve real-life problems using maths.



Supporting teachers
During this school year, teachers
and principals will get to know
the curriculum and might begin
trying parts of it in their
classrooms.



Teachers and principals will receive support in the new curriculum. The school will let parents know when this support will happen. It may mean that schools close for some or all children for a short period.



More information
The Primary School Curriculum is changing. The *Primary*Mathematics Curriculum is another step in updating the curriculum, much of which is over 20 years old.

Your school has been selected with 900 others to begin the Governments Free Hot School Meal scheme in line with the EU Child Guarantee. This scheme has many benefits, beyond basic need.

Collective hot school meals are proven to:

- boost immunity, reducing sick days and subsequent disruption to education and class flow
- keep students focused in their afternoon studies, ensuring educational time is optimised
- grant all children equal access to nutrition with an approved high quality menu. It is vital that all children take part to ensure stigma is not created for those in need
- collective eating with peers is proven to encourage "fussy" eaters to try new meals in a safe space, increasing nutrition and reducing nutrition related illness

For the good of all children, we need all parents to commit to trying the service and help us to create a culture in Ireland, in line with almost all European countries, whereby a hot school meal is a definitive part of the school day, encouraged by parents and teachers alike.

Your child will have 5 different menus in a week, so choice or boredom will not be an issue, once their **orders are changed regularly** with your assistance.

The school meal programme **shifts parental responsibility** from making lunches, to choosing lunches and adjusting snacks and evening meals accordingly.

We have invested in hiring the best in the business and developing our facilities to bring you high quality meals. We will do all we can to make this a positive experience for you and your child and ask for your full support to help us realise the incredible opportunities hot school meals will afford the children.

Subject: Irish Times Clarification

Dear Principal,

With the recent Irish Times article on school meal nutrition, we just want to take this opportunity to reassure you all of The Lunch Bag stance.

We are incredibly disappointed in the opinion piece showcased by the Irish Times with regards to a review of a small, hot drop model, school meal supplier. Based on negative findings of this one company, a sweeping generalisation was made with regards to the entire school meal scheme, with no attempt made to reach out to other suppliers.

I just want to assure you and your families that:

- All our chicken and Turkey is sourced from McCaugheys family farm in Castleblayney.
- All our pork is from Loughnane's butchers in Galway
- We work with Finnegan's farm in Navan for our veg and Mike Duggan Limerick for our fruit (which we wash and hand cut ourselves)
- Our beef is from McKeowns in Ballymena
- We are well aware of fibre deficiencies in Irish diets, therefore add lentils to our mince dishes for a fibre boost
- We work with Ballymaloe literally the best in the industry, to ensure sauces are made specifically for us to meet HI guidelines including low salt and low sugar contents, while pulsed veg dense
- All our cheeses are from Bandon Vale in Cork
- We work with Glenhaven in Co Wicklow to develop chicken goujons that are 100% chicken breast and are baked not flash fried
- We proudly display our nutritional info on our app and website
- All our meals are passed by the Dept Social Protection and Dept Health for meeting guidelines

We have also just won a Guaranteed Irish award because over 98% of our products are Irish (we can't source blueberries in Ireland..).

As a team, we are relentless in our pursuit for on-going improvements and literally work night and day to meet this enormous surge in demand that has come upon us. We have a team of vibrant, bright Dietitians and Nutritionists constantly reviewing our nutritional standards and meals.

We have just employed over 400 people across the school community to heat our meals and given opportunities for those that really struggle to find employment that meets their child care needs. Our Irish suppliers are creating jobs across the country to source and provide the highest quality products.

We have grown from a tiny team in 2019 to one of the largest food suppliers in the country. We do not take this task lightly. We are parents ourselves and passionate that what we do will make a positive impact. We vehemently stand over our product, our produce and our people and will continue to ensure that in a few short years, there will be a marked improvement in childhood outcomes and it will tie back to the moment our school meals were launched into schools nationwide.

School meals are statistically proven to increase attendance and attention, boost immunity and moods and we have had the most fantastic feedback from schools and families about the positive changes they are seeing every day.

We are so conscious that children get bored very easily and, once bored, will complain about quality and produce more waste. While we have a different menu every day to counter boredom - we need families to change their orders regularly. We are working on new menu ideas on an on-going basis and can't wait to showcase our new proposals and our promotional ideas around the same.

We will be emailing parents with the above reassurances also, but really appreciate your support at this time. We are just normal people, doing our very best to give you and your school community the best service we can.
