

KIRKINRIOLA PRIMARY SCHOOL

Kirkinriola Primary School has a rich historical heritage and is committed to upholding its fine educational traditions. Many of our past pupils still attend our annual events and talk fondly about their early days as pupils of this family-orientated school.

Kirkinriola Primary School was opened in October 1929 and continues 89 years later as the vibrant heart in this community.

Our rural location, just off the Cushendall Road, Ballymena, offers our children an idyllic setting for learning and enables us to access outdoor education with ease.

The school is well equipped with resources to support our inspiring curriculum, including the most up to date technologies like iPads. We are also fortunate to be equipped with a full compliment of laptops that our P1-7 children have access to at all times to support their learning.

It has always been important at Kirkinriola Primary School to work closely with our parents, creating a happy and caring environment that encourages every child to develop their full potential.

In keeping with our Christian ethos, the pupils are expected to act responsibly and in a caring manner from an early age - looking after themselves, others and their environment. Older children are encouraged to set an example for the younger ones and develop independence in preparation for the next steps of their educational journey.

ASSESSMENT & REPORTING

Assessment involves the continuous monitoring of the individual child's progress combined with more formal tests or examinations. A formal progress report or pupil profile is issued at the end of each school year.

Parents may make an appointment at any time to discuss their child's progress and are invited to attend parent teacher consultations.

HOMEWORK

Homework provides pupils with the opportunity to revise work done in school and practise good, individual work habits.

Our School Policy requires homework be undertaken each night. The support of you as parents in your child's studies is strongly encouraged.

Generally Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1 pupils should take about twenty to thirty minutes, while Key Stage 2 pupils will sometimes require up to an hour to complete





THE NORTHEN IRELAND CURRICULUM

It is our policy that the pupils of Kirkinriola Primary School shall receive their full entitlement under the Northern Ireland Curriculum and we are committed to maintaining a broad, well balanced, and relevant Programme of learning which gives each child access to the acquisition and development of skills, knowledge, values and attitudes, appropriate to his/her needs.

Information Communications Technology (ICT)

As a school we attach importance to the use of digital technologies. During their time at Kirkinriola your child will have opportunity to E xplore and express their understanding using a range of ICT equipment, including digital cameras, programmable toys, robots, drones and handheld tablet devices. They will also use the internet to support their learning activity.

Language and Literacy

Literacy is central to primary education. It is our policy in Language and Literacy to lead children, through a progressive and balanced curriculum which provides opportunities to engage in talking and listening activities and reading and writing, to a level of competence which will equip them to meet the needs of secondary level education with confidence. Ultimately, having mastered the mechanics of reading, the goal for our pupils is to read competently both for pleasure and information.

Mathematics & Numeracy

The school's Mathematics and Numeracy Policy and schemes of work have been prepared in accordance with the N.I. Curriculum Numeracy Strategy. Children study number, processes in mathematics, shape and space, measures, and data handling. Emphasis is given to quick mental recall of the basic number facts and the development of the ability to tackle problems in a practical and systematic way.



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EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We encourage Primary 4, 5, 6 & 7 children to participate in extra curricular activities. Where it is practical we also try to offer occasional after school activities for pupils in P1-P3.

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding (PDMU)

The provision of a supportive and safe environment for learning, in which pupils have lots of opportunities to mature to their full potential socially and emotionally is a prime characteristic of our school ethos in addition to the curricular PDMU programme. The school has extended children's opportunities to talk about their thoughts or feelings and share any concerns, for example, through use of 'feelings' charts and the strategy of 'circle time'.

The World Around Us

The World Around Us includes interrelated aspects of Science & Technology, History and Geography, with an emphasis on development of relevant skills. Children learn about themselves, the variety and diversity of plant and animal life, materials and physical processes. Opportunities are also provided to encourage pupils to develop a positive attitude towards having a healthy lifestyle. History is seen as the interaction, in the past, between people, places and events. Through a study of history strands children should come to understand, to some extent, how events have affected the present. Geography in the first instance, gives our children the opportunity to study their own environment and culture. Secondly, it assists in the development, knowledge and understanding of people in different places and of different cultures. Educational visits to sites of historical and geographical interest are undertaken.

Religious Education (RE)

The school follows the core syllabus for RE in the Northern Ireland Curriculum. Parents may remove their children from Religious Education and/or Assembly on the grounds of conscience. In such cases the school will try to make alternative arrangements for the periods concerned.

Play Based Learning

The school is committed to play based and activity based learning as a means of delivering the N.I. Curriculum. At each level planned opportunities for learning through play will be offered for the promotion of every child's emotional, social, physical and intellectual development.

The Arts



Physical Education & Sport

The Board of Governors and the Principal have set the Admissions Criteria and have the final decision. The enrolment number and admission number for Kirkinriola Primary School are:-

Enrolment Number 95 (under review)

Admission Number 14 (under review)

Admissions criteria to be used in the event of the school being over subscribed. The criteria are listed in order of priority:-

Children who reach the age of 4 on or before the 1 July may be enrolled on 1 September of that year.

Brothers and sisters of pupils already in the school.

Children whose home address is the shortest distance away from the school as measured by public road.

Children who attend Kirkinriola Early Years (KEY).

Criteria for admission of pupils from Primary 2 to Primary 7; the school will admit any pupil provided all the following criteria are fulfilled:-

The schools enrolment number will not be exceeded.

The school will, in the professional judgment of the Principal, be able to meet the educational needs of the pupil.
