

SPAN is Google's annual design and technology conference. Celebrating its sixth year, <u>SPAN</u> returns to New York City to explore the ways in which people use design to create systems and upend them. The conference, held at 99 Scott in the Bushwick neighborhood of Brooklyn, brings together 350 makers and technologists for a day of thought-provoking talks, hands-on workshops, and experiential sessions.
