Jamaica in 1805.






Mary's mother was Jamaican. Her father was a Scottish soldier. Her mum was a nurse and Mary enjoyed playing nurses with her dolls.






At the age of 12 she helped her mother look after sick people.




When growing up, Mary enjoyed watching the ships at sea and wanted to travel.



Mary opened a hotel in Jamaica and cared for ill soldiers and their families.




She travelled around the world a lot when she was a young woman.

Mary wanted to help so much that she paid to get to Crimea herself.




She visited Florence Nightingale's hospital.

Mary opened the 'British Hotel' near the front lines in Balaclava.




She sold supplies to the soldiers and cooked food for them.






She also ran a clinic to care for ill soldiers.




Mary even helped on the battlefield in the middle of the fighting!
