1 • Stanford is 5-0 this season when forcing at least one turnover, and 0-3 when not forcing a turnover.

3 • Stanford's three losses this season have come against the AP's No. 3, No. 10 and No. 16th-ranked teams in the nation (Notre Dame, Utah and Washington State). Those three teams have a combined record of 21-3 (.875) this season—and one of those losses was head-to-head (Washington State over Utah).

6 • One of the most disciplined teams in the nation, Stanford has the sixth-fewest penalty yards in the nation this year with just 38.13 per game—also the fewest in the Pac-12.

7 • Don't expect many points immediately after halftime. Stanford has not allowed more than seven points in any third quarter this season. The Cardinal has only allowed 20 third-quarter points in its first eight games—currently ranked 8th in the nation in 3rd quarter points allowed (Washington ranks sixth).

10 • Stanford has won 10 of the last 13 matchups against Washington.

11 • Senior wide receiver JJ Arcega-Whiteside ranks second nationally -- and first among Pac-12 players -- with 11 receiving touchdowns. That's the second-most in a season in Stanford history and the most receiving touchdowns for a Cardinal in 38 years—Ken Margerum had 11 in 1980, while James Lofton set the school record with 14 in 1978.

13 • In addition to his 48 receptions and 743 receiving yards this season, Arcega-Whiteside has drawn 13 penalties this year—11 pass interference and two holding calls for 175 penalty yards (nearly two penalties and 22 yards per game).

15 • Sophomore cornerback Paulson Adebo ranks second nationally with 15 pass breakups and third in the NCAA with 2.0 passes defended/game. He ranks atop the Pac-12 in both categories.

20 • Junior quarterback K.J. Costello ranks among the Top 20 nationally in completion percentage (19th), passing efficiency (20th), passing touchdowns (18th), passing yards (16th), passing yards per game (17th) and yards per attempt (20th). He leads the Pac-12 in efficiency (155.9) and is second in the conference in passing yards (2,165) and yards per attempt (8.52).

34 • Costello's 34 completions against Washington State were the sixth-most in a game in school history, and most since Steve Stenstrom had 37 at Notre Dame in 1994.

36 • Sure-handed senior wide receiver Trenton Irwin has at least one reception in 36 consecutive games, a streak that ranks eighth nationally.

52 • With an Oct. 18 victory at Arizona State, head coach David Shaw earned his 52nd Pac-12 win, surpassing Washington's James Phelan (1930-41) for 15th-most conference victories. Shaw needed only 65 games to achieve 50 conference wins, tied for second-fastest in Pac-12 history (USC's Pete Carroll reached the 50-win mark through 60 league games).

90 • Stanford's 90 wins this decade rank fifth nationally and the most of any private school, ahead of TCU (78), USC (77) and Notre Dame (76).

253 • Senior inside linebacker Ryan Beecher was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin lymphoma on Dec. 21, 2017. His final chemotherapy session came on June 4, 2018, and he returned to action in Stanford's season opener against San Diego State on Aug. 31, 2018, a span of 253 days after his diagnosis.

3,546 • Senior running back Bryce Love ranks fourth nationally among active players with 3,546 yards rushing. This also ranks fourth on Stanford's all-time career list.

.900 • Junior kicker Jet Toner's .900 field goal percentage (9-of-10) ranks 10th in the nation and first among Pac-12 players.

1934 • Stanford picked off a school-record seven Husky passes in a 24-0 win at Stanford Stadium. Bobby Grayson had four of the seven interceptions and returned two for touchdowns.

1958 • Rick McMillen rushed for 185 yards on 26 carries in a 22-12 victory at Stanford Stadium.

1971 • Stanford's Benny Barnes picked off three Sonny Sixkiller passes in a 17-6 win in Seattle.

1977 • Guy Benjamin completed 28 of 47 passes for 376 yards and three touchdowns but Stanford saw its 10-game winning streak against the Huskies come to an end in Seattle, 45-21.

1981 • Darrin Nelson became the first running back in school history to rush for four touchdowns in a game despite a 42-31 loss at Washington.

1982 • John Elway completed 20-of-30 passes for 265 yards and Mike Dotterer rushed for 106 yards on 20 carries as Stanford upset second-ranked Washington at Stanford Stadium. The performance landed Elway on the front cover of the following week's edition of Sports Illustrated.

1988 • Jon Volpe rushed for 220 yards on 29 carries to set a single-game rushing record that stood for over 20 years.

1994 • Backup quarterback Scott Frost, who had started five games at free safety, came on in relief after Steve Stenstrom broke his finger in the second quarter. The sophomore engineered three secondhalf scoring drives, tacking on 88 rushing yards and a 10-yard touchdown run to upset No. 12 Washington at a rain-soaked Stanford Stadium, 46-28.

2006 • T.C. Ostrander connected with Richard Sherman for a 74-yard touchdown pass and Bo McNally returned an interception 49 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter as Stanford defeated the Huskies, 20-3, snapping a 12-game losing streak to Washington. The win was Stanford's lone victory in a 1-11 campaign.

2008 • Anthony Kimble came off the bench to rush for a career-high 157 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries while quarterback Tavita Pritchard completed 16-of-24 passes for a season-high 222 yards and three touchdowns.

2009 • For the second straight week, Chris Owusu returned the opening kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown while Toby Gerhart reached the 200-yard mark in rushing for the first time in his career.

2010 • Stanford limited Washington to 107 yards of total offense and seven first downs while blanking the Huskies in Seattle, 41-0. Stanford scored touchdowns on its first four possessions and its defense shut out the Huskies at home for the first time since 1976.

2011 • Stanford took the ground route and buried the Huskies, 65-21, at Stanford Stadium. Stanford rushed for 446 yards to set a school single-game record. Stepfan Taylor rushed for 138 yards on 10 carries and Tyler Gaffney, running out of the Wildcat formation, gained 117 yards on nine attempts. It marked the first time Stanford had two 100-yard rushers since 2007.

**2012** • Washington receiver Kasen Williams took a quick screen pass 35 yards for the go-ahead score with 4:53 left as Washington rallied from a 10-point deficit to defeat Stanford at CenturyLink Field, 17-13. The Cardinal was held without an offensive touchdown for the first time since 2007, using Trent Murphy's 40-yard interception return for a score to keep the visitors alive until Williams' fourth-quarter burst.

2013 • Ty Montgomery had two big kickoff returns and a long touchdown reception, gaining 290 all-purpose yards, to put the Cardinal out in front early. But Stanford was in danger in the final minutes when the Huskies drew within three and had the ball. The Stanford defense held; however, it took a replay reversal after a Washington catch was ruled complete for a first down, to ensure the victory. On fourth-and-10, Keith Price's low sideline pass to a falling Kevin Smith at the Stanford 33-yard line with 1:16 remaining was overturned.

2014 • Kevin Hogan ran for a 5-yard touchdown with 4:29 remaining, and No. 16 Stanford used its stingy defense and a poorly-timed fake punt by Washington to post a 20-13 win. Hogan was 17-for-26 passing for 178 yards and added 53 yards rushing. Ty Montgomery had a 62-yard kickoff return to start the game and also added a 17-yard touchdown reception, busting through three Washington defenders to find paydirt.

**2015** • Christian McCaffrey caught a touchdown pass, ran for another score and gained 300 all-purpose yards in a sterling all-around performance to lead No. 10 Stanford to its sixth straight victory, 31-14, over Washington. Kevin Hogan threw for 290 yards and two scores for the Cardinal. McCaffrey had a 50-yard touchdown catch and 7-yard scoring run in the third quarter. In all, he ran 23 times for 109 yards, caught five passes for 112 yards and added 79 yards on kick returns in his third 300-yard all-purpose game of the season.

2016 • No. 10 Washington handed Stanford a 44-6 defeat in front of a packed Husky Stadium, the Cardinal's worst loss since a 41-3 setback against Arizona State in 2007. Stanford's only touchdown came late in the third quarter on a 19-yard pass from Ryan Burns to JJ Arcega-Whiteside.

2017 • Bryce Love ran for 166 yards and three touchdowns against the nation's stingiest defense, leading Stanford to a 30-22 victory over No. 9 Washington. The Huskies started fast with touchdown runs by Myles Gaskin on the first two drives, building a 14-7 lead before the Cardinal responded with 23 unanswered points. K.J. Costello contributed to a balanced attack and took advantage of opportunities downfield, completing 16 of 27 passes for 211 yards, while Jet Toner chipped in with three field goals.



## TEAM

1.94 • Stanford has 199 rushing touchdowns in David Shaw's 103 games as head coach, an average of 1.93/game.

3 • Three Cardinal -- Irwin (100), Arcega-Whiteside (103) and Kaden Smith (120) -- had 100 or more yards receiving against Utah (Oct. 6), a first for Stanford since Oct. 10, 1998 (vs. Oregon State).

5 • Stanford has started five different offensive line combinations in the first eight games this season. Four starters have missed at least one game this season, three have missed multiple games and one has missed the entire season (a combined 15 games missed).

7.15 • Senior Bryce Love currently holds the Stanford career record with 7.15 yards per carry. Christian McCaffrey is second at 6.21.

10 • Junior quarterback K.J. Costello's 10 touchdown passes were second-most by any quarterback in the Shaw era through the season's first four games (Andrew Luck had 11 in 2011, Kevin Hogan had eight in 2014).

32.4 • Stanford's 32.4 points/game in 2017 ranked eighth in program history. Stanford has averaged 30 or more points in four of head coach David Shaw's nine seasons.

32:17 - At 32:17, Stanford's average time of possession per game since 2011 ranks sixth nationally. The average millennial spends over 32 minutes a day on Instagram.

50 • Stanford has 50 rushing touchdowns in its past 26 games.

74 • Stanford has recorded at least one rushing touchdown 75 times in its past 84 games. Stanford has won 35 of its past 44 games when recording at least one rushing touchdown.

96 • Stanford's offense returned over 96 pct. of its total scoring from 2017 (435 of 453 points).

120 • Junior Kaden Smith's career-high 120 yards receiving against Utah (Oct. 6) were the most by a Stanford tight end since Zach Ertz's 134 vs. Cal in 2012.

134 • Senior Trenton Irwin ranks 17th in the Stanford record book with 134 career receptions.

156 • Stanford has scored in 156 consecutive games, dating to Nov. 11, 2006.

300 • Costello has four 300-yard passing games this season. He is just the fifth Cardinal—and first since Andrew Luck in 2011—with four such games in a season, joining Luck, Steve Stenstrom, John Elway and Stanford radio analyst Todd Husak. His four career 300-yard passing games is tied with Jim Plunkett (1968-70) for sixth all-time in school history.

405 • Stanford's 405 rushing yards against UCLA in 2017 was the fourth-highest total in program history.

2,507 · Senior Cameron Scarlett and senior Bryce Love combined for 2,507 rushing yards in 2017, as the top rushing tandem in program history returns for the 2018 campaign.

2,833 • Stanford's 2,833 rushing yards in 2017 ranked fourth in program history.

19,588 • Stanford has rushed for 19,588 yards since 2011, 20th-best nationally. That's over 13.7 trips across the Golden Gate Bridge.

#### JJ ARCEGA-WHITESIDE

2 • Arcega-Whiteside has at least two catches in 20 straight games, including at least seven in each of the last three games.

6 • Arcega-Whiteside had six touchdown receptions over a two-game stretch from the 2017 bowl game to the 2018 opener (three vs. TCU, three vs. San Diego State). That tied Ken Margerum for the most receiving touchdowns in consecutive Stanford games, set in 1980 with quarterback John Elway on the delivering end (two at Washington State, four vs. Oregon State).

7 • With seven career 100-yard receiving games (three this season), Arcega-Whiteside ranks sixth in school history.

10 • Arcega-Whiteside's is the first Cardinal with 10 catches in a game (vs. Washington State on Oct. 27) since Zach Ertz had 11 in the win at No. 1 Oregon in 2012.

11 • Arcega-Whiteside's 11 total touchdowns are eighth-most of any player in the nation this year, and second-most in the Pac-12 this season (Oregon State running back Jermar Jefferson has 12).

15 • Dating to the 2017 regular season finale against Notre Dame, Arcega-Whiteside has 15 receiving scores over the past 11 games.

25 • Arcega-Whiteside's 25 career receiving scores ranks third on the program's all-time list—one behind Troy Walters (1996-99) for second place.

44.8 • Arcega-Whiteside's ranks second in the nation among wide receivers with a 60.0 percent catch rate on deep passes (20+ yards).

226 • Arcega-Whiteside's 226 receiving yards against San Diego State were the third-most in program history. It was the fifth time a Cardinal receiver eclipsed 200 yards receiving.

2,000 • Arcega-Whiteside needs 97 yards to become the 14th Cardinal with 2,000 career receiving yards.

1 • Stanford's defense has at least one takeaway in 33 of the past 40 games (25 forced fumbles, 40 interceptions).

1 • Stanford has at least one sack in 88 of its past 96 games.

2 • Two of the top pass-breakup performances by a Cardinal defense under head coach David Shaw have been registered in the 2018 season's first three games. Stanford had 11 against USC on Sept. 8, the most by any team under Shaw, and 10 against UC Davis, tying for second under Shaw.

2 • Stanford has allowed only two kickoff returns (27 yarder vs. San Diego State, 12-yarder at Notre Dame) on the season.

3 • Stanford held USC to three points during a Sept. 8 win. The Cardinal surrendered fewer than the three points against USC only four times previously: 16-0 victory in 1905 (first meeting between the programs), 16-0 win in 1934, 3-0 triumph in 1935, and a 13-0 blanking in 1941. USC had not been held to three points or fewer since Nov. 1, 1997, when the Trojans were blanked, 27-0, at Washington.

5 • Fifth-year senior inside linebacker Bobby Okereke has five or more tackles in 19 of the past 21 games.

15 • Stanford has forced at least one turnover in 16 of the past 18 games. The Cardinal is 46-6 under head coach David Shaw when winning the turnover battle.

16 • Sophomore Paulson Adebo ranks third nationally with 16 passes defended (second nationally with 15 passes broken up). In the past 10 years, no defensive back has more passes defended in a season than Houston's William Jackson III, who had 28 in 2015.

16 · Fifth-year cornerback Alijah Holder was targeted a whopping 16 times against UC Davis (Sept. 15), yet allowed only a long reception of 14 yards.

20 • Over the past five years, Stanford and Kansas State are the only two Power 5 teams to have 20 percent of their kickoffs result in field position past their own 35-yard line.

21 • Toner's 21 field goals made in 2017 were the second-most in program history. Only three returning kickers had more field goals than Toner last season.

30 • Stanford has not surrendered a kickoff return of 30 yards or more in its past 23 games, dating to a 2016 contest at Oregon. In seven of 14 games last season, Stanford did not surrender a single kickoff return yard.

39 • Senior Cameron Scarlett returned a school-record 39 kickoffs in 2017, and ranked first nationally with 12 kickoff returns of 30 or more yards. He is seventh all-time at Stanford with 1,379 career kick return yards.

**43.7** • Senior Jake Bailey's 43.7 career punting average ranks first in program history. Bailey posted the second-best punting season in school history last year, averaging 45.4 yards/punt. He led the Pac-12 and ranked seventh nationally.

94 • Okereke's 94 tackles last season were tops among Cardinal returners, and the most by any returning player since 2008.

100 • Stanford has allowed 100 or fewer rushing yards 46 times under head coach David Shaw (40-6 in such contests).

108 • The Cardinal has at least one tackle for loss in each of its past 108 contests.

117 • Toner's 117 points in 2017 ranked fifth on Stanford's single-season scoring list.

121.0 • Stanford has allowed only 121.0 rushing yards/game since 2011, a figure that ranks fourth nationally.

167:38 • Stanford went 167:38 without allowing an offensive touchdown during the season's first three games (first quarter of the season opener against San Diego State and the final play of the season's third game against UC Davis).

200 • Stanford has allowed 200 or more rushing yards only 16 times in 103 games under head coach David Shaw.

243 • Stanford has made 248 consecutive extra-point attempts, the second-longest streak in the nation (Auburn is first with 251). The streak dates to Stanford's matchup at Oregon State on Oct. 26, 2013. During the streak: junior kicker Jet Toner – 70-70, Conrad Ukropina – 108-108, Jordan Williamson – 60-60.

308 • Stanford leads the nation with 309 sacks since 2011.

1.000 • Toner's perfect 1.000 extra-point pct. in 2017 was the 13th in program history. Toner is one of three Cardinal ever with a 1.000 career extra-point pct.

### PROGRAM

1 • Stanford has defeated at least one top-20 opponent on the road in seven of eight seasons under head coach David Shaw. Stanford had only one top-20 road win in the nine seasons prior to the start of Shaw's tenure in 2011 (at No. 2 USC on Oct. 6, 2007).

2 • Former Cardinal John Elway (Denver Broncos) and John Lynch (San Francisco 49ers) are NFL general managers. The other two schools with two NFL general managers? Connecticut and John Carroll.

5 • Five Cardinal have completed work for their undergraduate degree: fifth-year senior Alameen Murphy, fifth-year senior Bobby Okereke, fifth-year senior Alijah Holder, fifth-year senior Isaiah Brandt-Sims and fifth-year senior Brandon Fanaika.

13 • Shaw is one of 13 African-American FBS head coaches.

17 • Stanford overcame a 17-point deficit to post a 38-31 overtime win at Oregon (Sept. 22). It was the second-largest comeback win for the Cardinal since 1996 (trailed 21-0 in a 35-21 win at USC in 1999). Stanford has overcame a double-digit deficit in a winning effort 20 times since 1996, and six times under head coach David Shaw.

17 • Stanford requires students to declare a major before their junior year. Among the team's upperclassmen, 17 majors are represented. Majors are: aeronautics and astronautics, communication, computer science, economics, history, human biology, international relations, Japanese, mechanical engineering, media studies, management science and engineering, political science, product design, psychology, sociology, symbolic systems, and science, technology and society.

22 · Shaw is one of 22 head coaches currently coaching at their alma mater.

29 • Stanford's 29 fourth- and fifth-year seniors are the most of any Pac-12 program.

30 • Stanford's 2018 roster includes student-athletes from 30 different states and one foreign country.

30 • The Stanford Concussion and Brain Performance Center is at the forefront of concussion and traumatic brain injury research, and is incorporating state of the art eye-tracking tests -- EYE-SYNC -- in all of its studies. The EYE-SYNC test is administered with customized eye tracking technology, called Dynamic Visual Synchronization Goggles. The eye tracking test lasts 30 seconds, and the results show the ability to focus -- a key problem after a concussion.

#### ATHLETICS

6 • Stanford is one of six programs with at least one national championship in football, baseball and men's basketball. It is the only school with at least one national championship in football, baseball, men's basketball and women's basketball.

7 • Stanford is one of seven schools to earn Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR) Public Recognition Award each of the past four seasons.

24 • Stanford won the 2017-18 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup, extending its streak to 24 years of capturing the award presented to the most successful intercollegiate athletic department in the nation.

42 • Stanford, which sponsors 36 varsity sports, has won at least one NCAA team title in each of the past 42 academic years, representing the longest streak in NCAA history.

**117** • The Cardinal leads the NCAA with 117 team titles.

142 • Stanford claimed five national team championships during the last academic year, increasing its overall total to 142, including 117 NCAA titles.

1.1 • Stanford's inner campus includes about 1.1 million square feet of shrubs, 143,000 linear feet of groundcovers, 43,000 trees, 25 fountains and more than 800 different species of plants.

2 · Stanford's faculty includes two Presidential Medal of Freedom winners.

4 • Stanford's faculty includes four Pulitzer Prize winners.

5 • The top five undergraduate majors at Stanford include: computer science, engineering, human biology, management science and engineering, and mechanical engineering.

17 • The Stanford community includes 17 Nobel laureates.

24.8 • As of 2017, Stanford's endowment eclipsed 24.8 billion.

31 • Stanford faculty have won the Nobel Prize 31 times since the university's founding.

96 • Stanford's 8,180-acre campus is large enough to contain 96 Disneylands.

97 • About 97 percent of all eligible undergraduates live in campus housing.

150 • The 700-acre Stanford Research Park, created in 1951, is home to over 150 companies.

625 • There are more than 625 registered student organizations at Stanford.

700 • There are about 700 buildings on Stanford's campus that incorporate approximately 15.4 million square feet.

2,040 • Of the 47,450 applicants -- the largest application pool in school history -- for Stanford's class of 2022, only 2,040 were admitted. The admitted students came from all 50 states and 63 countries.

13,000 • There are an estimated 13,000 bikes at Stanford daily.
