No. 2/2 Oregon (8-1, 5-1) 20

- With its 26-20 win over Oregon, Stanford ...
 - Improved to 8-1 overall and 6-1 in Pac-12 Conference play
 - Improved to 31-5 overall (22-3 Pac-12) under head coach David Shaw
 - Improved to 45-17 all-time when ranked in the top 10
 - Improved to 46-30-1 all-time vs. Oregon
 - Improved to 27-14-1 at home against Oregon
 - Tonight's meeting was the second ever in which both teams enter the game nationally ranked
 - Second-ever matchup between two Pac-12 teams ranked in BCS top five
 - 2007 – No. 5 Oregon vs. No. 4 Arizona State
 - The all-time series between the two programs has been decided by 150 points
 - Stanford has out-scored Oregon, 1,687-1,537
 - Defeated Oregon at Stanford Stadium for the first time since 2009
 - Handed Oregon its first loss in a season for the 10th time since 1964
 - Improved to 16-2 in its last 18 games played in November
 - Only losses came to Cal (2009) and Oregon (2011)
 - Improved to 15-42-3 all-time against top-five foes (7-5 since 2000)
 - Improved to 8-6-1 all-time in games played on Nov. 7
 - Most recent Nov. 7 outing was a 51-42 win over Oregon in 2009
 - Improved to 36-7 in Pac-12 play over the last four-plus seasons
 - Improved to 31-1 in its last 32 games played in California
 - Only loss vs. No. 6 Oregon in 2011
 - Improved to 12-1 at home against ranked opponents since 2009
 - Only loss to No. 6 Oregon in 2011
 - Improved to 45-17 all-time when ranked in the top 10
 - Improved to 35-3 at Stanford Stadium since the final home game of 2007
 - Extended its home winning streak to 14 games
 - Third-longest entering the week behind Michigan (19) and South Carolina (15)
 - Allowed fewer than 30 points for the 18th time in as many games
 - Limited Oregon to less than 35 points for the first time in its last 11 games
- Tonight's contest marked the fourth time Stanford played a regular season game on a Thursday, and just the second time at Stanford Stadium
- Second largest attendance for the new Stanford Stadium (51,545)
 - Record: 51,607 in 2010 vs. USC
 - Old Stanford Stadium record: 94,000 in 1935 vs. Cal
- Stanford held a 274-62 advantage in rushing yards, improving to 29-1 under David Shaw when outrushing its opponent
- The Cardinal dominated the game's time of possession, holding the ball for 42:34 compared to Oregon's 17:26
- Seven of the first nine Stanford offensive plays were Tyler Gaffney runs for a total of 32 yards
- The Cardinal drove 96 yards in 12 plays and took 5:59 off the clock in the first quarter for its longest scoring drive of the season. They would go on to match the drive in yardage, going 96 yards in 20 plays and taking 8:26 off the clock to end the first half
 - The first 96-yard drive was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Tyler Gaffney and included a 47-yard passing play from Kevin Hogan to Michael Rector.
 - The second 96-yard drive included three conversions on third down and one on fourth down with Hogan running for over 10 yards on two of the third down conversions.

- The drives were the longest Stanford scoring drive since Oct. 1, 2011 when the Cardinal went 99 yards against UCLA
- Stanford led 7-0 after the first quarter, marking the first time in 2013 Oregon has trailed following the first 15 minutes of a game
- This is the fifth time in 2013 Stanford has held its opponent scoreless in the first quarter
- The Cardinal has outscored its opponent 68-26 in the first period through nine games
- Oregon finished the first quarter with zero rushing yards on seven attempts
 - The Ducks averaged 6.9 yards per rush entering the game
- When Stanford took a 14-0 lead in the second quarter, it became Oregon's largest deficit of the season
- Oregon did not score a point in the first half, marking the first time since Oct. 10, 2009, that they were held scoreless in the first half as they trailed UCLA 3-0. The Ducks went on to win the game 24-10
 - Stanford has also held Arizona State and UCLA to zero first half points this season, while only giving up three points in the first half to Washington State and Oregon State
- Seven different players combined to carry the ball 32 times for 141 yards and two touchdowns in the first half to give Stanford a 20:53-9:07 lead in time of possession
- The Cardinal held a 238-137 advantage in total offensive yards in the first half, including a 141-22 advantage in rushing yards
- Stanford converted 8-of-10 third downs in the first half and did not allow a point in Oregon's two red zone trips
- The Cardinal held Oregon scoreless through three quarters and to its lowest point total since they were shutout by UCLA in 2007
- Oregon's fourth-quarter touchdown ended a streak of 12 straight possessions against Stanford without a point.
- Stanford has at least one sack in 28 of its last 29 outings (only game without a sack came in 2013 at Army, which attempted only 10 passes)
 - Stanford finished with 3.0 sacks against Oregon
 - The Cardinal entered the week leading all FBS teams with 181 sacks since 2009. Virginia Tech was second with 175
- The Cardinal has at least one tackle for loss in each of its last 44 contests
 - Stanford finished with 6.0 tackles for loss against Oregon
- Stanford entered the game ranked first nationally in tackles for loss allowed (3.0/game)
 - The Cardinal surrendered only 3.0 tackles for loss against Oregon
- Stanford has forced a turnover in each of its last 34 contests after Shayne Skov caused and recovered a fumble in the second quarter. Jarek Lancaster later recovered a fumble to give Stanford two takeaways in the game.
 - It is the nation's second-longest streak behind Missouri (39)
 - The Cardinal forced two turnovers to give them two or more takeaways in three games this year
 - Stanford had four caused fumbles, recovering two

Senior RB Tyler Gaffney

- Scored on a two-yard touchdown run in the first quarter for his 13th rushing touchdown of the season and 25th career rushing score
- Thirteen rushing touchdowns leads the Pac-12
- Ranks fourth in school history for career rushing touchdowns
- Rushed for 157 yards on 45 attempts to give him his sixth 100-yard rushing performance of the season
 - The six 100-yard games ranks tied for sixth most in a single season at Stanford.
- 45 rushing attempts set a school record

Junior QB Kevin Hogan

- First Stanford quarterback to defeat Oregon in back-to-back seasons since Chad Hutchinson (1996-97)
- With 11-yard rushing touchdown in the second quarter, moved into second on Stanford's career rushing yards by a quarterback (501), passing Don Bunce (1968-69, 71) with his 54 yards on seven carries
- The rushing touchdown for Hogan was his second of the season and fourth of his career

Junior WR Ty Montgomery

- 57-yard kickoff return to open the second half, moving into second on Stanford's single season list for kickoff return yards (740 this year in nine games)
- On the season, Montgomery is averaging 33.6 yards per kickoff return

Junior K Jordan Williamson

- Made four of five field goal attempts, converting on kicks of 19, 34, 26 and 35 yards
- Moved past Ken Naber (1977-80) on Stanford's career made field goals list into sixth with 43 made attempts
- 13-of-17 on the season, including 13-of-15 from inside 50 yards

Fifth-Year Senior OLB Trent Murphy

- Moved into a tie for fourth on Stanford's career sacks list, joining Chase Thomas (27.5)
- Entering tonight's game, ranked second nationally and first in the Pac-12 in pass sacks (1.2/game)
 - 10 sacks on the season
 - 12th time in school history a player has recorded 10 or more sacks in a season

Fifth-Year Senior ILB Shayne Skov

- Moved up one spot into ninth on the Stanford career tackles list, passing Pat Preston (1967-69) with his 10 tackles
- Second game on the season with 10 or more tackles
