Three To Watch In 2009...

Senior Defender Nora Soza

The anchor of Stanford's backline and one of the conference's stingiest defenders, Nora Soza's career stat line doesn't exactly reflect offensive prowess. Soza has started 38 of the 46 contests she has appeared in through her first three seasons, attempting only one shot during that stretch. And it was a big one. Soza's first career shot led to her first career goal, an improbable game-winner against California last year on Senior Day that resulted in a rain-drenched dogpile and No. 2 seed for Stanford in the NorPac Tournament. Just how important is Soza to the Cardinal? The 5-3 defender was named the 2008 NorPac Tournament MVP despite not attempting a single shot over three games.

Senior Forward Midori Uehara

Camille Gandhi and Xanthe Travlos have quickly established themselves as household names in two seasons. Stephanie Byrne burst onto the scene as a capable rookie scorer last year. And even though Midori Uehara enjoyed a breakthrough 2008 campaign with team-high marks in goals (11), points (22) and shots (26), it could be argued that she was still overlooked at times. Despite her success, Uehara was the only team scoring leader selected to the conference's Second Team. Simply put: Uehara is a dangerous scoring threat capable of taking over a game at a moment's notice. Her "yes-that-really-did-happen" four-goal explosion against Pacific last year serves as evidence.

Sophomore Goalkeeper Alessandra Moss

Flashy and slick in the cage, you can also throw in the adjective "clutch" when describing Alessandra Moss. In her first full season last year, Moss was named a Second Team All-NorPac honoree, tabbed a NorPac All-Tournament team selection and awarded three different conference Player of the Week honors. Moss totaled 111 saves and recorded a career-high 13 stops on two different occasions. Perhaps most importantly, Moss showed an ability to elevate her game when it counted. Moss established a reputation as one of the nation's top penalty stroke stoppers, allowing opponents to convert just one of four opportunities. She helped guide Stanford to its first penalty-stroke victory since 2005 when she turned away Pacific on Oct. 26 for a 2-1 win.

Keep These In Mind...

Stanford Well-Represented Internationally

While Stanford is beginning to emerge as a national contender, the Cardinal has been no stranger on the international stage. Earlier this summer, junior Camille Gandhi was named to the USA Field Hockey Women's Developmental Team and the USA Women's Junior World Cup Team. Gandhi is Stanford's most acclaimed international product, leading the USA U-21 National Team to a gold medal at the 2008 Junior Pan American Games with a game-winning overtime goal. Fellow junior and England product Xanthe Travlos represented her home country as a member of the U21 team at the 2008 EuroHockey Junior Nations Championships. Meanwhile, incoming freshman Emily Henriksson earned a spot in the USA Junior National Camp for the second straight year.

Who's Next In Line For The Rookies?

Stephanie Byrne was named the 2008 NorPac Rookie of the Year, extending Stanford's stranglehold on the conference Rookie of the Year award to six seasons and counting. This time around, Byrne was the recipient thanks to a stellar season that saw her rank second on the team with six goals and 12 points while checking in third with 24 shots. Byrne continued the list of Stanford players earning the top rookie honor, following up past winners Camille Gandhi (2007), Nora Soza (2006), Caroline Hussey (2005), Jess Zutz (2004) and Cara-Lynn Lopresti (2003).

There's Some Serious Talent Here

Five different players claimed a total of seven NorPac Player of the Week honors last year, an incredible achievement considering Stanford's record failed to reach the .500 mark. That's a testament to Stanford's overall talent, which collectively ranks among the best in the conference. And while conference Player of the Week awards might not translate into championships, Stanford produced some of the league's most memorable moments in 2008: Midori Uehara scoring four goals in a 7-0 rout of Pacific (Sept. 30 - Offensive Player of the Week), Alessandra Moss turning away penalty strokes in a 2-1 win over Pacific (Oct. 26 - Defensive Player of the Week) and Nora Soza tapping home an overtime game-winner against California (Nov. 4 - Offensive Player of the Week).

Times They Are A-Changin'

Stanford and California have always represented the upper tier of the NorPac conference. Prior to Stanford's benchmark 3-1 victory over California in the 2007 NorPac Tournament final, the Cardinal had dropped 18 straight in the series to the Golden Bears- a stretch that dated back to a 1-0 Stanford shutout on Oct. 6, 2001. Stanford had come close to snapping the streak on several occasions, as 12 of those 18 losses were decided by one goal and five occurred in overtime. But that trend is quickly getting reversed. Stanford has won three of the last four meetings against California, including two consecutive wins in the NorPac Tournament championship game.

Bring On The Challenge

Once again, head coach Lesley Irvine has chosen to challenge the Cardinal with a rigorous schedule aimed at preparing her squad for the postseason. Stanford's 2009 slate features five contests against NCAA Tournament squads from a year ago, including a road tilt against defending national champion Maryland (Oct. 30). Stanford hosts Kent State, last year's MAC Tournament champion and an NCAA play-in round participant, on Sept. 6. One week later, the Cardinal plays at Iowa, which reached last year's NCAA Tournament semifinals and won the Big Ten Tournament for a third straight season. Other matches against NCAA Tournament squads from a year ago include a visit to Penn State (Oct. 5) and a neutral site contest against Louisville (Nov. 1).

The Stanford field hockey program continues to reach new levels of success while further establishing its reputation as one of the fast-rising programs in the West under the direction of Lesley Irvine.

Now in her seventh season at the helm, Irvine has guided Stanford to back-to-back NorPac Tournament championships while her recent efforts on the recruiting trail have paid dividends in the form of All-America-caliber talent.

Building off momentum fueled from a breakthrough 2007 campaign, Stanford's 2008 season included its second straight appearance in an NCAA play-in game to follow up another NorPac Tournament title. Irvine's squad won seven of its last nine games and was crowned NorPac Tournament champions with a 2-1 victory over California.

Irvine led Stanford to one of its best seasons in school history in 2007, as the Cardinal finished 13-8 for the second-best win total in program history. Stanford recorded its first winning season since an 11-8 mark in 2001 and qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2000. Stanford also asserted itself as the premier team in the NorPac conference, capturing its first tournament championship since 2000 with a 3-1 win over California. Meanwhile, Irvine was honored as the NorPac Coach of the Year after guiding Stanford to its best start (6-0) since 1979 and a share of the regular-season conference title. Under her direction, Stanford also cracked the national rankings for the first time since 2001.

Stanford's success over the last two seasons can be traced back to an influx of talented, young players, notably England imports Xanthe Travlos and Camille Gandhi. Tabbed an NFHCA All-West Region squad selection for the second straight year, Travlos also earned All-NorPac First Team honors for the second consecutive season. Gandhi, the 2008 NorPac Player of the Year and 2007 NorPac Rookie of the Year, was tabbed a NFHCA All-West Region First Team selection in addition to earning Third Team All-America honors by WomensFieldHockey.com.

Both Gandhi and Travlos have also been active in representing their countries in international competition. A dual national citizen, Gandhi was selected to the U.S. Under-21 National Team and also led the U.S. past Chile with the game-winning overtime goal at the 2008 Junior Pan American Games. Travlos represented England's Under-21 team at the 2008 EuroHockey Junior Nations Championships.

Further evidence of Irvine's recruiting success is Stanford's stranglehold on the NorPac Rookie of the Year award. Rookie Stephanie Byrne captured the honor in 2008, becoming the sixth consecutive Cardinal player to win the award.

Irvine, 52-68 in six seasons on The Farm, officially took over the reins of the Cardinal in December 2002 after serving the previous two seasons as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for the team.

No stranger to league success, Irvine led the Cardinal to third-place finishes at the NorPac Championship in each of her first three campaigns. Stanford averaged seven wins per season during Irvine's first three years at the helm and reached the nine-win mark in 2006.

Irvine was honored following the 2004 season when she was selected to serve as the head coach for the South in the National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division I North/South Senior All-Star Game, guiding her squad to a 2-1 victory with Cardinal senior Eleanor Morgan scoring the game-winning goal.

During her head coaching tenure at Stanford, Irvine has mentored three Under-21 National Team participants, five Regional All-Americans,

six NorPac Rookie of the Year honorees, 28 all-conference team choices, 19 all-conference tournament selections and 68 NFHCA Academic All-Americans.

Stanford teams have excelled in the classroom under Irvine's leadership, winning the 2003 NFHCA Division I National Academic Team Award, placing second in 2004 and taking fifth in 2005. The national academic accolades have become a yearly tradition, with at least 10 players being honored by the NFHCA for seven consecutive seasons.

Irvine has also become active in the collegiate field hockey community outside the coaching arena. Earlier this summer, she was named a member of the NCAA West Region All-America committee. From 2004-08, she served a four-year term on the NCAA Division I National Field Hockey Committee and took over as the NCAA West Regional Committee Chair. She also served as the NorPac's NFHCA representative in 2006 and was a member of the NFHCA North/South All-Star Game Selection Committee for the West Region in 2001 and 2002.

In addition, Irvine was the USA Field Hockey Futures program Regional Coaching Director from 2003-06. This role made her responsible for the implementation of the national program curriculum within the West Region, as well as coach education and evaluation. Irvine served as a head coach in the program from 2001-03 before being promoted to her current position. She has also spearheaded the Stanford Field Hockey Camps since 2002.

Irvine came to Stanford from Iowa, where she spent the 2000 season as a volunteer assistant coach.

Irvine's first collegiate coaching job at Iowa followed one season as a player for the Hawkeyes in her first year as a graduate student during the fall of 1999. In her only season of collegiate field hockey, Irvine led Iowa to a Final Four appearance and Big Ten championship by pacing the team with 47 points (17 goals, 13 assists). She was named to the Final Four and Big Ten All-Tournament squads, while also earning Second Team Regional All-American and regular season All-Big Ten honors.

A 1999 Academic All-American, Irvine received her master's degree in health, leisure and sports studies from Iowa in 2001.

The England native played three years of field hockey for Loughborough University in her home country, graduating from the school in 1998 with a degree in physical education, sports science and recreational management. While at Loughborough, Irvine won a total of five national field hockey championships (three outdoor, two indoor) and was named to the British Universities All-Star squad. She was also selected to England Under-18 and Under-21 National Teams during her playing career overseas.

Jordan Marotta begins her sixth season as an assistant coach with the Cardinal. In addition to guiding Stanford to back-to-back NorPac Tournament championships, she is responsible for extensive work with the team's offensive skills and strategy while also playing a large role in the recruiting process.

Marotta joined the Stanford coaching staff in 2004 after playing four seasons of collegiate field hockey at William and Mary, where she received a bachelor's degree in government in December of 2003.

In addition to her work at Stanford, Marotta has been a certified National Futures coach since March of 2004, coaching U-16 and U-19 teams for the Regional Futures Tournament, as well as the California representative teams at the National Futures Championship held in Virginia Beach for the last six years. Last summer, Marotta coached the California U-19 squad to a fourth place finish in the tournament.

Marotta capped a four-year collegiate playing career (2000-03) at William and Mary with a decorated senior season, earning a spot on the 2003 NFHCA Division I North/South Senior All-Star Team, as well as earning All-State, First Team All-Colonial Athletic Association, Second Team All-South Region and CAA All-Tournament honors. Marotta was a three-time CAA Player of the Week recipient that season while also finishing as the leading points scorer in the conference.

During her career at William and Mary, Marotta led the Tribe in scoring with 31 points on 13 goals and five assists in her senior campaign and finished her career with 56 points on 20 goals and 16 assists. The Tribe also reached the NCAA Tournament twice during her career. These accomplishments, in addition to her contributions to the team and the college community off the turf, resulted in her being awarded the prestigious President's Award recognizing leadership, sportsmanship, and citizenship among all athletes at William and Mary.

Marotta and her husband, Peter, have a son, Cooper, who was born this past July. The family enjoys being a part of the Stanford community.

Mandy Hart

Mandy Hart enters her fourth year as an assistant coach with the field hockey program.

Hart enjoyed a successful playing career at Penn State from 1996-2000. During her senior season in 2000, Hart was named a third team All-American, second team All-Big Ten selection and South Jersey Collegiate Defensive Player of the Year. A center back for the Nittany Lions, she also served as the team captain in 1999 and 2000.

In 1998, Hart started all 23 games for a Penn State defense that helped goalkeeper Jamie Smith post seven shutouts. The Nittany Lions blanked three nationally-ranked opponents, including Massachusetts in the NCAA first round. Hart was named to the Big Ten All-Academic Team.

While at Penn State, Hart was a member of three Big Ten championship squads (1996-98) and four NCAA Tournament teams.

Hart graduated with a bachelor of science degree in kinesiology in 2001. She has also worked in pharmaceutical sales.

During her senior season at Haddonfield Memorial High School in New Jersey, Hart scored seven goals while anchoring a defense that recorded 13 shutouts. Hart gained numerous honors including first team all-conference, first team All-Group Two, first team All-South Jersey, and first team All-State. She also played in the Garden States Games and the 1995 and 1996 National Futures Tournaments.

Varsity Field Hockey Turf

The Stanford field hockey program begins its 12th season on the Varsity Field Hockey Turf in 2009. The state-of-the-art facility was made possible by numerous donations, including generous contributions by the Levinson Family.

With a seating capacity of 500 and measuring over 111,000 square feet, the artificial turf surface is considered one of the top playing fields in the country and the premier surface in the NorPac Conference.

The 2009 campaign will feature the addition of lights to the facility, with night games on the ledger for the first time in school history. Four towers (90-foot poles) containing 30 1500-watt metal Halide Fixtures light the playing field. The poles feature the Total Light Control (TLC) visors, which efficiently direct light onto the playing surface while reducing the off-site glare to surrounding areas.

The Varsity Field Hockey Turf has served as the host site for the NorPac Conference Championship on three different occasions (1999, 2002 and 2007). Two years ago, Stanford captured the conference tournament crown with a 3-1 victory over California. Three days later, the Cardinal hosted an NCAA Tournament contest for the first time in school history, blanking Lock Haven 1-0 in a play-in game. Stanford will once again serve as the host site for the conference tournament in 2009.

In January of 2004, the facility hosted a pair of international field hockey series featuring the U.S. National Team in its preparation for 2004 Olympic qualifying matches. The Varsity Field Hockey Turf has also hosted the Sony Field Hockey Challenge, a two-day tournament bringing together a blend of collegiate and international competition, for three straight seasons.

NorPac History

Formed in 1982, the NorPac Conference has evolved over the past 27 years from an initial California membership to the current east and west blend. Three of the original teams include Pacific, Stanford and California. Both Appalachian State and Davidson accepted invitations to join in 2000, followed by Radford in 2001. Longwood was added to the conference in 2005 as a provisional member while reclassifying to a Division I membership. After fulfilling NCAA reclassification requirements, Longwood became eligible for its first conference tournament in 2007 and was the host for the 2008 championship.

UC Davis joins the NorPac conference for the 2009 season. After the Aggies' program was elevated from club to intercollegiate status, the NorPac Conference announced the addition of UC Davis as its newest member in July 2008.

The Aggies are eligible to complete in a full 2009 conference schedule, including the NorPac tournament held at Stanford on Nov. 5-7.

With the addition of UC Davis as the eighth member, the conference will re-establish Eastern and Western divisional play in 2009. The Aggies join California, Pacific and Stanford to make up the West Division. Appalachian State, Davidson, Longwood and Radford will form the East Division. The round-robin divisional play will culminate with the conference championship tournament for all eight members.

Stanford will be hosting its fourth NorPac Championship in 2009, having previously served as the host site in 1999, 2002 and 2007. The championship has been hosted three times by Saint Louis (1998, 2000, 2003). Davidson has hosted twice (2004, 2006) with Appalachian State (2001), California (2005) and Longwood (2008) serving as the host institution once.

In 1998, the growth and development of the NorPac as an NCAA single-sport conference was assisted by a three-year grant from the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) and the NCAA, as well as by a partnership with and support from the United States Field Hockey Association (USFHA). Through the grant opportunity, the restructuring of the conference included members California, Davis and Elkins College, Missouri State, Pacific, Saint Louis and Stanford.

Since 1999, the NorPac Field Hockey Conference has received an NCAA play-in opportunity or a conference automatic qualification (2005). Over the past decade NorPac representatives are 7-2 in NCAA play-in games.

Stanford University at a Glance

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew students from all over the country; many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months – housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East – the first year foretold of greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."

▼ Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

Nearly 116 years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanford's generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

▼ Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is less than hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few minutes north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, tremendous sports and recreation facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The university is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories – including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth – where faculty from a wide range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Australia, Beijing, Berlin, Cape Town, Florence, Kyoto, Madrid, Moscow, Oxford, Paris, and Santiago.

▼ Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty – which numbers just over 1,800 – is one of the most distinguished in the nation. As of the June of 2007, the faculty included 18 Nobel Laureates, four Pulitzer Prize winners, 24 MacArthur Fellows, 21 recipients of the National Medal of Science, three National Medley of Technology recipients, 228 members of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, 135 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 83 National Academy of Engineering members, 29 members of the National Academy of Education, seven Wolf Foundation Prize winners, seven winners of the Koret Foundation Prize and three Presidential Medal of Freedom winners. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.

Currently 14881 students, of which 6689 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. A little more than 40 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 68 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, approximately 55 percent are African American, Asian American, International, Mexican American, Native American, Native Hawaiian or Other Hispanic in ethnicity. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished. Approximately 10 students apply to Stanford for every place in the freshman class with 89% of those



admitted finishing in the top 10% of their high school class. Ninety-four Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars, 74 have been selected Marshall Award winners, and 49 have been chosen Truman Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of graduating seniors plan to attend graduate or professional schools. Stanford students also shine in a tremendous array of activities outside the classroom – from student government to music, theater, and journalism. Through the Haas Center for Public Service, students participate in many community service activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 36 Division I varsity sports (15 men, 20 women, 1 co-ed). Of Stanford's 95 NCAA titles (107 national), 55 have been captured since 1990, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's athletes and coaches participated win the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, 49 competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Games, 34 represented Stanford at the 2000

Games in Sydney, and 43 Stanford associates competed at the 2004 Games in Athens. Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 9,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

▼ Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, “. . . Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care.”

Her thoughts echo in the words of former Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, “The true university must reinvent itself every day . . . At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks – teaching, learning, and research.”

Bob Bowsby

The Jaquish & Kenninger
Director of Athletics

One of the most respected athletic administrators in the nation, Bob Bowsby enters his fourth full year as the Jaquish & Kenninger Director of Athletics at Stanford University, a position he was appointed to on April 25, 2006 after spending 15 years at the helm of the University of Iowa's athletic program. In his initial three years in the position, Stanford has continued its well-earned reputation of fielding the most successful and wide-ranging Division I-A athletic programs in the nation.

As Stanford's sixth athletic director, Bowsby succeeds Ted Leland (1991-2005), Andy Geiger (1979-90), Joe Ruetz (1972-78), Chuck Taylor (1963-71) and Al Masters (1925-63). He directs a department that includes 35 intercollegiate varsity teams – 15 men's, 19 women's and one coed – plus the physical education department, intramurals, club sports, open recreation and the Stanford Golf Course.

Under his administrative guidance, Stanford claimed its unprecedented 15th straight Learfield Sports Director's Cup last spring, emblematic of the top overall program in the country. Ten Stanford teams boasted Top 10 finishes, winning national championships in men's gymnastics and women's rowing.

Stanford's student-athletes were also highly-decorated last year. Foluke Akinradewo (women's volleyball) earned her second straight national player of the year honor while eight student-athletes earned conference player of the year marks. In addition, Erik Shoji (men's volleyball) earned national freshmen of the year accolades.

Two Stanford coaches--Thom Glielmi (men's gymnastics) and Yaz Farooq (women's rowing) earned national coach of the year marks.

Throughout his career, Bowsby has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate and amateur athletics. He was named in February, 2007, to the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors.

He has previously served as President of the NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association (2002-03), Chair of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee for two years (2003-05) and a committee member for five years, Chair of the Big Ten Administrator's Council (2002-04) and Chair of the NCAA Management Council.

Bowsby was appointed by President George Bush as a member of the Commission on Opportunities in Athletics in 2002-03. The committee was led by U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige.

Bowsby was elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors. He served as a member of the NCAA/U.S. Olympic Committee Task Force chaired by Cedric Dempsey and George Steinbrenner.

In addition, Bowsby served as chair of the NCAA Wrestling Committee and has served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics.

Bowsby has also served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and served as President of the I-A organization for two years.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named

Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal

selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department from 1991-2006, Bowsby earned a reputation as one of the most admired, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. Bowsby guided and supervised the merger of the Hawkeye's women's and men's athletics departments while enabling Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible and successful Division I athletic programs.

Under his leadership, Iowa enjoyed unprecedented success and growth in the area of fund raising and facilities. Bowsby and the UI Development staff put in place \$25 million in endowments to help support Hawkeye student-athlete scholarship aid. In addition, he managed the planning and construction of \$120 million in facility projects on campus, including an \$87 million renovation to Kinnick Stadium.

A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Bowsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991, after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. Bowsby earned his bachelors degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978.

Bob and his wife, Candice, have four children: Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle.

Stanford's National Titles

NCAA championships are commonplace at Stanford University, as Cardinal teams have won national titles at an unprecedented rate, including a national-best 80 since 1980 and 57 since 1990. Stanford has won at least one NCAA championship for 33 consecutive years and has won four national titles in a single season nine times.

Nine different Stanford teams have won at least five national titles, including men's tennis (18), women's tennis (16), men's water polo (11), women's swimming and diving (9), men's swimming and diving (8), men's golf (8), women's volleyball (6), synchronized swimming (6) and women's cross country (5). A total of 19 Stanford teams have won at least one national championship.

Stanford teams have won a total of 110 national championships. In NCAA competition, Cardinal teams have won 97 team titles, including 59 men's championships and an NCAA-best 38 women's titles.
