2nd most returning scoring in the Pac-12

SETTING THE SCENE

Stanford will tip off in 2023-24 with one of the strongest returning cores in the Pac-12 and an exciting group of newcomers. Jerod Haase begins his eighth season at the helm of the program, which looks to rise to the top of the conference and reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2014.

THE OPENING TIP

- Stanford brings back an experienced core from one of the nation's top offensive teams, led by returning starters Spencer Jones, Brandon Angel and Maxime Raynaud.
- The Cardinal welcomes a graduate transfer for the second year in a row, with former Providence starting point guard Jared Bynum joining the program for his additional season.
- Stanford once again welcomes a top-20 recruiting class, led by five-star signee and McDonald's All-American Andrej Stojakovic and top-50 rated Kanaan Carlyle.
- The 2022-23 Cardinal excelled on the court and in the classroom, with Angel joining Michael Jones as CSC Academic All-Americans while James Keefe, who returns for a fifth season, was the 2023 Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for men's basketball.

3-POINT SHOOTING

Stanford returns one of the leading 3-point shooting teams in the country, with seven players entering the campaign with at least one season of 39 percent or better shooting from beyond the arc. The Cardinal paced the Pac-12 in 3-point proclivity in conference play at 37.9 percent, while the team led the country after Jan. 19 last season with a 42.6 percent clip from deep.

Max Murrell led the Pac-12 in conference play last season at 42.9 percent, while Michael Jones was fourth at 41.9 percent and Spencer Jones sixth at 41.2 percent from deep. Additionally, Brandon Angel shot 44.2 percent in Pac-12 play, ending one make shy of qualifying to lead the league, while Ryan Agarwal was at 43.5 percent on a smaller number of attempts. The Cardinal returners combined to shoot 38.2 percent from 3-point range a year ago - a mark that would have ranked in the top-10 in the country last year.

RETURNING PRODUCTION

The Cardinal brings back 72.1 percent of its scoring from a year ago, which is the second highest rate in the Pac-12. Additionally, Stanford brings back 72.9 percent of its rebounds, 77.9 percent of made threes, 45.9 percent of assists, 66 percent of steals and 84 percent of blocks.

Three starters return in forwards Spencer Jones and Brandon Angel and center Maxime Raynaud as well as six total players who saw at least 14 minutes per game. Jones led the team with 14.1 points per game and was an All-Pac-12 second team honoree.

BEST OF BOTH WORLDS

Stanford's success extends beyond the court and into the classroom, where the Cardinal captured a series of major academic awards a year ago. Brandon Angel and Michael Jones joined a select group of men's basketball alumni before them with selections to the College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-America third team. It was the first year in program history with multiple selections, with Angel and Jones becoming the 13th and 14th Stanford players to be awarded the accolade.

James Keefe was Stanford's third straight Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, making the Cardinal the first basketball program in conference history – men or women – to earn the award in three consecutive seasons. There have been 12 teams of any sport to win three straight times, with eight of those being Stanford programs.

POTENTIAL HISTORY FOR SPENCER JONES

Spencer Jones crossed the 1,000-point threshold during conference play, becoming the program's 50th member of the 1,000-point club. He has moved into 24th on the program's all-time scoring list with 1,318 points. An identical season in 2023-24 would see Jones move into fourth all-time.

Establishing himself as one of the best 3-point shooters in program history, the sniper has 261 career threes, which ranks second all-time in program history. He is 44 away from passing Chasson Randle '15 for the top spot and 85 away from beating former Oregon guard Tajuan Porter for the all-time Pac-12 record.

Jones also ranks 12th all-time at Stanford in blocks and 14th in steals. He will likely be the first player in program history to make the top-10 on both lists.

FRESHMAN CLASS

Stanford continued its run of elite recruiting under head coach Jerod Haase, bringing in five-star, consensus-top-25 recruit Andrej Stojakovic (Carmichael, Calif.) and top-50 signee Kanaan Carlyle (Atlanta, Ga.). Stanford's last classes with multiple top-50 signings were in 2017, when the Cardinal inked KZ Okpala, Oscar da Silva and Daejon Davis, and in 2006, when Brook and Robin Lopez ventured to The Farm.

A high school All-American from multiple outlets, Stojakovic was the third Stanford player in four years to participate in the McDonald's All-American game. Carlyle was part of the gold medal-winning United States team at the 2022 FIBA U18 Americas Championship. They are joined in the class by three-star center Aidan Cammann (Andover, Mass.).

A SECOND GRAD TRANSFER

Joining the Stanford program following a successful career at Providence, Jared Bynum has signed with the Cardinal as a graduate transfer. He is the second graduate transfer in program history, along with new teammate Michael Jones (Davidson) from 2022.

Bynum was a decorated point guard at Providence, where he was an All-Big East second team honoree in 2022, as well as the Big East Sixth Man of the Year and a USBWA All-District selection. Bynum was a preseason choice to the All-Big East first team last season, and he joins the Cardinal with career averages of 10.3 points, 2.9 rebounds, 4.2 assists and 1.1 steals per game. He helped lead Providence to two NCAA Tournaments.

TOUCHED BY AN ANGEL

Brandon Angel was one of the most versatile players in the country in February and March a year ago, posting 14.1 points, 5.3 rebounds and 2.4 assists per game while shooting 64.5 percent from the field and 69.0 percent from 3-point range – making him the only player nationally to hit those

benchmarks. An Academic All-American with a 4.0 GPA, Angel posted 9.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game on the season and ranked eighth in the Pac-12 in field goal percentage (51.6%).

ALLEZ LES BLUES

Maxime Raynaud returned to campus this summer with a gold medal around his neck, earning top honors with France at the FIBA U20 European Championship. Raynaud led France in scoring (14.0) and rebounding (5.0) while shooting 66.7 percent from the field and 87.5 percent (7-for-8) from 3-point range. The Paris native capped the event with a 26-point showing in the championship game against Israel.

Raynaud was one of the most improved players in the Pac-12 in 2022-23, ending the season with averages of 8.8 points and a team-leading 6.1 rebounds per game. He ranked seventh in the Pac-12 in field goal percentage and excelled after entering the starting lineup, as the seven-footer scored 11.0 points with 7.2 rebounds per night over the season's final 17 games.

GOING GLOBAL

Stanford embarked on a foreign tour from August 20-30 in France and Greece. The trip was the second for the Cardinal under head coach Jerod Haase, with the program previously visiting Italy and Germany in 2019. The Cardinal spent five days in Paris, including contests with Nanterre 92 and Tremblay, and four days in Athens, with a game against Lavrio. Stanford also visited Normandy's historic World War II beaches and famous historical sites in Paris, such as the Eiffel Tower and Sacre Couer, among others, and in Athens, including the Acropolis.

Over the three-game trip, Spencer Jones led the offense at 14.7 points per game, while Raynaud added 13.3 points and 9.3 rebounds. Stojakovic's first games in a Cardinal uniform contributed 12.7 points per outing, while Michael Jones finished the trip at 11.3 per game. Brandon Angel posted 9.3 points and 5.7 rebounds per night, while Jared Bynum was at 8.7 points and 6.3 assists.

SEASON REWIND

Wrapping up the seventh season under head coach Jerod Haase, the Cardinal won 14 games in 2022-23 and closed the season as one of the top offensive programs in the country. The Cardinal led the nation in 3-point percentage after Jan. 19 (42.6%) and topped a 25-year program record for made threes with 267. Stanford finished the season 26th nationally in offensive efficiency, per BartTorvik, with the seventh-best mark in games after Jan. 14.

A major highlight from the 2022-23 campaign was the 88-79 win over No. 4 Arizona at Maples on Feb. 11. The win was Stanford's third over Arizona in the last six meetings, and it was Stanford's second year in a row with a top-five win (No. 5 USC in 2022).

PRO CARD

The 2022-23 campaign was another successful year for Cardinal alumni in the NBA. Brook Lopez led the Milwaukee Bucks to the Association's best record, posting averages of 15.9 points, 6.7 rebounds and 2.5 blocks per game, with a league-leading 193 total blocks. Lopez was a finalist for the NBA Defensive Player of the Year award and was an All-Defense first team selection.

Robin Lopez played 37 games for the Cleveland Cavaliers, which earned the Eastern Conference's No. 4 seed, scoring 3.0 points per game on 64 percent shooting. Dwight Powell appeared in 76 games for the Dallas Mavericks, starting 64, posting 6.7 points and 4.1 rebounds per night on a career-best 73.2 percent shooting. A top-10 pick in the 2021 NBA Draft, Ziaire Williams dealt with injuries during his second NBA season. The swingman played in 37 games and score 5.7 points per game. KZ Okpala, selected in the 2019 draft, appeared in 35 games for the Sacramento Kings. The Lopez brothers will team up in Milwaukee for the 2023-24 campaign.

A-C-CARDINAL

Stanford was announced on Sept. 1 as a new member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, along with rival Cal and SMU. This provides the opportunity for Stanford student-athletes to continue pursuing excellence at the national level, both in the classroom and on the court, which has been a core priority for the university throughout the realignment process. In addition to providing a competitive infrastructure, the move positions Stanford with universities aligned in vision for the scholar-athlete model and broad-based excellence.



JEROD HAASE

Anne and Tony Director of Men's Basketball Eighth Season at Stanford

In his first seven seasons as Stanford's Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball, Jerod Haase has instilled an invested, tough and selfless attitude into the program.

Since arriving on The Farm, the Cardinal has won 112 games, recorded its best conference finish and most league wins in a decade and earned a postseason berth for the first time since 2015. The 2020 team was set to be postseason bound before the cancellation of the NCAA Tournament.

The Cardinal won 14 games in 2022-23 and closed the season as one of the top offensive programs in the country. Stanford downed a top-five opponent for the second consecutive year and ended the season with a top-25 offense nationally. James Keefe was Stanford's third straight Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, while Brandon Angel and Michael Jones were named Academic All-Americans. Spencer Jones was an All-Pac-12 forward for the second season in a row.

The streak of elite recruiting continued for Haase and his program, with Stanford signing Andrej Stojakovic, the team's third McDonald's All-American in four years, and Kanaan Carlyle, a top-40 signee. The top-tier class is Stanford's first with two top-40 recruits since 2006 (Brook & Robin Lopez).

Stanford added 16 wins in 2021-22, including the program's first win over an AP top-five opponent since 2007 and its first over a top-25 team on the road since 2014. Harrison Ingram was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year – Stanford's first since 2000 – while Spencer Jones blossomed into an All-Pac-12 conference forward. Sam Beskind was named Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, becoming the program's third honoree in the last five seasons.

The 2020-21 campaign was turned upside down by the COVID-19 global outbreak and subsequent restrictions in Santa Clara County, and Stanford showed its resilience and tenacity with a 14-13 overall record and 10 Pac-12 wins. The season included three wins over eventual Sweet 16 teams, two over Elite Eight programs, and a sweep of Arizona for the first time since 2008. Oscar da Silva established himself as one of the top forwards in the country as one of two players to average 18 points, six rebounds and two assists per game while shooting over 55 percent from the floor. He was also named the Pac-12 Scholar Athlete of the Year. The Cardinal signed its third top-20 recruiting class in four seasons, led by five-star forward Harrison Ingram. Ingram gives the program a McDonald's All-American for the second-straight year, the first time in Stanford history the feat has been accomplished.

Stanford finished 20-12 overall in 2019-20 and remained solidly in contention for an NCAA Tournament berth throughout a season shortened by the COVID-19 global pandemic. Boasting the nation's No. 16-ranked scoring defense (KenPom No. 7), the Cardinal also shot its highest field goal percentage (.469) since 2003-04 and was led by junior Oscar da Silva (15.7 ppg, 6.4 rpg) and Tyrell Terry (14.6 ppg, 4.5 rpg, 3.2 apg), who emerged as one of the nation's top freshmen. The 20 wins marked Stanford's first such finish in the Pac-12 with 11 conference wins, the program's highest finish and most league victories in 10 seasons. Competing without two starters for half the season, Stanford won 19 games overall and earned a postseason berth for the first time in three years with a second-round appearance in the NIT.

Fueled by back-to-back top-25 recruiting classes, Haase's 2018-19 squad featured freshmen and sophomores accounting for 80 percent of the scoring and rebounding. With one of the youngest rosters in the nation, Stanford won 15 games facing one of the toughest road schedules in Division I. In 2017-18, Haase guided Stanford to a third-place finish in the Pac-12 with 11 conference wins, the program's highest finish and most league victories in 10 seasons. Competing without two starters for half the season, Stanford won 19 games overall and earned a postseason berth for the first time in three years with a second-round appearance in the NIT.

Several players have flourished under Haase's tutelage. KZ Okpala became Stanford's latest NBA Draft pick in 2019. Along with Okpala's first team all-conference selection and Josh Sharma's All-Pac-12 nod, Reid Travis was a two-time First Team All-Pac-12 selection in 2018 and a two-time NABC All-District pick. Dorian Pickens was named an all-conference player for his performance on the court and the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for his efforts in the classroom in 2018. Daejon Davis was named to the five-member Pac-12 All-Freshman Team in 2018.

During Haase's first season in 2016-17, Stanford posted 14 wins against a challenging schedule and finished among the nation's top-10 percent in the classroom. Haase was appointed Stanford's 18th head coach in school history on March 25, 2016.

At UAB, Haase led the Blazers to a regular-season Conference USA championship in 2016 and the program's 15th all-time NCAA Tournament berth in 2015. Haase compiled an 80-53 overall record in four seasons while improving the Blazers' win total every year.

Tabbed the 2016 Gene Bartow Conference USA Coach of the Year, Haase led the Blazers to a 26-5 overall record and a 16-2 conference mark while capturing their first regular-season title since 2011. Along the way, UAB established school records for overall victories (26), conference wins (16), road wins (10) and consecutive victories (14). Also named the 2016 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) All-District Coach, Haase directed the Blazers to an NIT berth for the 12th time in school history. UAB also finished 16-0 at home in Haase's final season, extending the nation's fifth-longest home winning streak to 25, while ranking among the nation's best in field goal percentage (.478 – 24th), assists per game (18.4 – 4th) and blocks per game (4th – 6.1).

Under Haase's guidance, UAB returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2015, shocking No. 3 seed Iowa State 60-59 in the second round for the Blazers' first NCAA victory since 2005. UAB reached the Big Dance after claiming the program's first Conference USA Tournament title despite being seeded No. 4. The triumph marked UAB's first league tournament title since 1987, when the Blazers won the Sun Belt Conference Tournament. More impressively, Haase successfully developed a roster comprised of 10 underclassmen – all players recruited by Haase and his staff – and finished 20-16 overall while guiding the third-youngest team in NCAA Division I.

The Blazers made impressive strides under Haase's leadership during the 2013-14 campaign, finishing 18-13 overall while notching three victories against teams that qualified for the NCAA Tournament. Of UAB's 18 victories, perhaps none were more impressive than the Blazers' 63-59 home win against No. 16 North Carolina. UAB was ranked in the top five nationally in rebounding throughout the season and finished the year ranked second in the country at 44.5 boards per game. During Haase's first year with the Blazers in 2012-13, UAB won six of its final nine regular-season Conference USA games and collected a victory in the conference tournament.

Prior to UAB, Haase played for Roy Williams at Kansas and spent 13 years on Williams' staff with the Jayhawks and Tar Heels. A 1997 graduate of Kansas with a degree in business administration, Haase got his start as Kansas' Director of Operations from 1999-2003. During that time, the Jayhawks reached the 2002 Final Four and the national championship game in 2003. When Williams was named head coach at North Carolina prior to the 2003-04 season, he brought Haase with him as an assistant coach and director of operations, a title Haase held from 2003-09. Haase then served exclusively as an assistant coach during his final three seasons with the Tar Heels.

A native of South Lake Tahoe, Calif., Haase attended California in 1992-93, starting 23 games as a freshman and playing alongside Jason Kidd in the backcourt. Haase then transferred to Kansas, where he helped lead the Jayhawks to three consecutive conference titles and finished his career ranked in the school's top 10 in assists, three-point field goals and steals. Haase started 99 of 101 games at Kansas and scored 1,264 points, averaging 12.5 per game and reaching double figures 74 times. While at Kansas, Haase was a candidate for the Naismith and Wooden Awards.

As a senior in 1996-97, Haase started alongside Jacque Vaughn, Scot Pollard, Paul Pierce and Raef LaFrentz as Kansas finished with a 34-2 record while averaging 12.0 points per game despite playing with a broken wrist. As a sophomore in 1994-95, Haase averaged 15.0 points and was named the Big Eight Conference Newcomer of the Year and also tabbed a second-team all-conference selection. Haase was a first-team GTE Academic All-American as a senior, a second-team Academic All-American as a junior and a three-time academic all-conference pick. The Jayhawks' Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 1997, Haase later earned a master's degree in business at Kansas in 2000.

Haase and his wife, the former Mindy Meidinger, have three children: Gavin (16), Garrett (13) and Gabrielle (10).

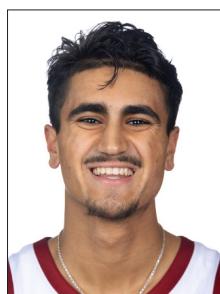
