

THE OPENING KICKOFF

KZSU RADIO

• Stanford football continues a three-game homestand on Saturday with a 4 p.m. kickoff against the Arizona Wildcats.

• The Cardinal looks for its first home win of the season after falling 30-23 in its home opener against Sacramento State. That loss by the Cardinal is its first against a non-FBS opponent since 2005 (UC Davis).

• Stanford lost its Pac-12 opener in Week 2 with a 56-10 loss at USC in what was the final matchup between the two rivals as Pac-12 conference opponents. This weekend's matchup at Stanford Stadium will be Arizona's first Pac-12 game of the season.

• The Cardinal used some trickery against the Hornets on Saturday to steal an extra possession. After a 51yard touchdown pass to Elic Ayomanor, Stanford recovered an onside kick on the ensuing kickoff. It was the first successful onside kick recovery by Stanford since Oct. 20, 2001 at No. 5 Oregon.

 Stanford's defense generated its first two turnovers of the season on Saturday night against Sacramento

State, both coming in the second half. Scotty Edwards and Collin Wright both intercepted passes from Hornets quarterback Kaiden Bennett, representing the first interceptions in their respective careers.

 Saturday's matchup against the Wildcats is the first between Stanford and Arizona since 2019, and just the second since 2016. Stanford has won six straight against Arizona, scoring at least 34 points in all six of those games.

• The rushing attack continues to be a huge strength of the Stanford offense. Through three games, the Cardinal is averaging 182.3 yards per game on the ground, a top-50 mark in the NCAA. It has also been a diverse attack, as no ball carrier has more than quarterback Justin Lamson's 25 carries.

• Get used to seeing a lot of the Cardinal at home. Stanford is in the midst of a stretch where it will play five out of six games at home, with a bye week in the middle. The only road trip through the end of October left for Stanford is a trip to Boulder, Colorado to take on Colorado.

CONTENT & WORKPLACE POLICIES

1. Video clips of in-game competition, live or otherwise, online or via social media networks are not permitted. Still photos may be shared online and across social platforms during the game.

2. Any non-editorial or commercial use of any picture, audio, film, tape, or digital image or drawing of the event is prohibited without prior, specific, written authorization from the host institution.

3. Internet usage in all media areas, including media work areas, stadium pressbox, digital work room and the field, is for work-related purposes only. Media members who do not follow the proper internet procedures may have their credentials and internet access revoked for the remainder of the event.

4. Media should respect the work environment of their colleagues by maintaining a quiet and professional atmosphere in all working media areas. The press box will close three hours after the conclusion of the game.

FIELD ACCESS & SIDELINE POLICY

Field access is limited to photographers, videographers and sideline reporters whose job function requires them to work from field level. Print media, and anyone working out of the press box, will only be permitted on the field for the final five minutes of games. No interviews should be conducted on the field. 1. Photo credentials will be issued only to accredited media outlets prior to the game and photo identification must be provided. 2. Photographers and videographers must check in at media will call located at Gate 8 of the stadium. Those photographers and

will be issued a photo vest. This photo vest must be worn at all times to gain access to the sidelines. Vests must be returned after the game at the on-field dropoff location situated next to the south endzone tunnel.

3. Only working photographers and videographers with professional-grade cameras will be allowed on the field. Those without proper equipment or not shooting the game will be escorted from the sidelines regardless of credential.

4. Working photographers and videographers are permitted to shoot in the designated area (between the two marked dotted lines outside the 20-yard lines and behind the end zone).

5. Photographers are encouraged to use the photo work areas, located on Level 3 of Stanford Stadium and the media room on Level 2 of the fieldhouse. Wireless internet is available. While security in this area is provided, Stanford University is not responsible for the loss of any items.

6. According to NCAA policies, the presence of any type of photographer and videographer in the bench area for all sports is strictly prohibited with the exception of one (1) institutional videographer in the football bench area. According to the NCAA Football Rules and Interpretations Manual (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4b): "the team area shall be limited to squad members in uniform and a maximum of 40 other individuals directly involved in the game. The 40 individuals not in uniform shall wear special identification." (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4e): "No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel, or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box, and no media personnel shall communicate in any way with persons in the team area or coaching box." Stanford Athletics prohibits photographers and videographers from stopping and shooting from behind the bench area or into the bench area.

• Stanford and Arizona meet for the 32nd time on Saturday afternoon and the first time since 2019.

• The Cardinal is riding a six-game winning streak against the Wildcats dating back to 2010.

• Stanford has scored at least 34 points in every game during its six-game winning streak versus Arizona, including a 55-point outburst in 2015.

• That 2015 win by the Cardinal is the largest in the history of this rivalry, with Stanford winning 55-17 thanks to 156 rushing yards from Christian McCaffrey and four total rushing touchdowns by Stanford backs.

THIS DATE IN STANFORD HISTORY...

...the Cardinal lit up the scoreboard early and often against UCLA, crushing the Bruins 58-34 in 2017. It was an historic day for junior running back Bryce Love, who ran for a career-best 263 yards, the thirdmost in Stanford history. K.J. Costello threw for two touchdowns and ran for another, and Cameron Scarlett added three rushing touchdowns.

The ground game paved the way for a big Stanford win, as the Cardinal piled up 405 rushing yards and five rushing touchdowns, nearing the program record for most rushing yards in a game (446). Stanford would go on to play in the Pac-12 Championship game in 2017, and reached the Valero Alamo Bowl.

HEAD COACH TROY TAYLOR

Troy Taylor enters his first season as the Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football, Andrew Luck Director of Offense and Kevin M. Hogan Quarterbacks Coach in 2023.

Taylor, the 35th head coach in program history, was hired on Dec. 10, 2022, by Jaquish & Kenninger Director of Athletics Bernard Muir. At Sacramento State, Taylor guided the Hornets to a 30-8 mark in four seasons and a berth in the FCS quarterfinals for the first time in school history. Prior to the 2022 season, Sacramento State had never won an FCS Playoff game in its program history.

Taylor led a high-powered Sacramento State team to a 12-1 record in 2022, with the Hornets ranking fourth nationally in scoring offense (42.9 ppg), fourth in total offense (499.8 ypg) and seventh in rushing offense (243.3 ypg). Sacramento State is the only FCS program that averaged at least 240 yards passing and 240 yards rushing per game, averaging 256.5 yards per game through the air and 243.3 on the ground.

Taylor took over a Stanford program that has won 108 games since the start of the 2010 season - a total that ranks among the nation's top-20 - with 31 of those wins coming against top-25 opponents, tied for the eighthbest mark in the country in that span.

Taylor was hired as head coach at Sacramento State on Dec. 17, 2018, inheriting a program that had compiled three two-win seasons in the prior four-year stretch. Taylor immediately turned the Hornets into nine-game winners in his first season, guiding the program to its

first three Big Sky championships (the program opted out of the 2021 spring season) and its first FCS Playoff appearances in school history, despite competing at the FCS level since 1994 and in the Big Sky Conference since 1996.

In 2022, Taylor's Hornets set the school record for victories in a season. Running back Cameron Skattebo was named Big Sky Offensive MVP, nickelback Marte Mapu was the Defensive MVP and Taylor was Co-Coach of the Year. Overall, 17 players were honored by the Big Sky, as Taylor was also named AFCA Regional Coach of the Year. Sacramento State's season came to a close with a 66-63 defeat in the FCS Quarterfinals.

As a player, Taylor guided Cordova High School to a 14-0 record and a section championship while being named the Northern California Player of the Year in 1985. Taylor continued his career at Cal, where he was the starting quarterback for the Golden Bears from 1986-89. Taylor led the Pac-10 in total offense as a senior and left Cal as the all-time leading passer with 8,126 yards. He was drafted by the New York Jets in the fourth round of the 1990 NFL Draft.

END OF AN ERA

David Shaw announced his resignation from the program the morning after the 2022 season finale against BYU. The winningest coach in program history, Shaw finished his 12 seasons with a 96-54 record. Shaw was honored with the 2017 Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year award and led Stanford to three Pac-12 titles and two Rose Bowl victories during his tenure.

In addition to guiding Stanford to three Rose Bowl Game appearances, Shaw is the only four-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year, having led the Cardinal to three conference titles. Shaw's 96 overall wins rank ninth in Pac-12 history while his 65 conference victories rank fifth. Stanford achieved 29 wins against top-25 opponents (ranking eighth nationally since 2011), 11 against top-10 programs and five against top-5 foes. Additionally, the Cardinal had 43 players drafted, a total ranking tied for 13th nationally and tied for the most in the Pac-12.

The Cardinal was equally accomplished in the classroom during Shaw's tenure, boasting a nation-leading 15 Academic All-Americans since 2010, five more than any other program and 10 more than any Pac-12 school in that span, including Andrew Luck (2011) and Christian McCaffrey (2015) as Academic All-Americans of the Year.

RECENT DRAFT SUCCESS

The Cardinal has had 55 draft picks since 2010, second-most in the Pac-12 behind only USC. Stanford is tied for eighth nationally with 11 consensus All-Americans since 2010, and its 19 Academic All-Americans in that span is eight more than any other school nationally.

Since 2012, the number of draft picks to come out of Stanford is tops in the Pac-12 with 48, one more than

USC (47). In the 2023 NFL Draft, the Cardinal had five players taken: Michael Wilson (3rd round, AZ), Kyu Blu Kelly (6th round, BAL), Tanner McKee (6th round, PHI), Elijah Higgins (6th round, MIA), and Kendall Williamson (7th round, CHI).

Since 2010, Stanford has appeared in nine bowl games, including three Rose Bowl Games, an Orange Bowl and a Fiesta Bowl.

BRING BACK SACKS

Stanford's defense came out of the gates hot with its pass rush, recording six sacks in the season opener at Hawai'i. That six-sack game by the Cardinal defense was its most in a single game since a Nov. 24, 2018 tilt against UCLA, when the unit also recorded six. It was the most sacks the defense has had in a non-conference road game since Sept. 16, 2017 at San Diego State, a game in which the Cardinal also piled up six sacks.

Since that game, however, the pass rush has slowed down. Stanford has not recorded a sack in its previous two games, coinciding with its first two losses of the year. The last time Stanford's defense failed to record a sack in consecutive games was a four-game stretch from Oct. 30-Nov. 20 in 2021.

THIRD DOWN TROUBLES

Offensively, Stanford has not had a lot of trouble converting on third downs. The Cardinal ranks 50th in the NCAA in third down conversion percentage at 43.8%, and that has helped its defense win the time of possession battle in two its first three games this season.

Defensively, it has been more of a struggle for the Cardinal. Sacramento State converted 11 third downs on Saturday, and their 68.8% conversion percentage was the highest against Stanford since 2020. For the season, Stanford is allowing opposing offenses to convert on 56.1% of its third downs, the highest rate in the NCAA. Arizona's offense struggles on third downs, converting at just a 35.8% clip, giving the Cardinal a great chance to get back on track.

BRING IT, BAILEY!

On the strength of his three-sack performance against Hawai'i, David Bailey was named the first Pac-12 defensive lineman of the week. It was the first time in his career that Bailey has earned a weekly award from the Pac-12.

The three-sack performance from Bailey is one of just six in the NCAA this season. Bailey was the first player in the NCAA to record a three-sack game this season.

Bailey's award from the Pac-12 is the first weekly defensive award winner for the Cardinal in nearly two years. Kyu Blu Kelly was the most recent winner, taking home Defensive Player of the Week after the second week of the 2021 season.

TIGHT END U IN FULL SWING

Stanford has long been considered "Tight End University" after producing many productive NFL tight ends over the years. Benjamin Yurosek could be next in line after a monster start to the 2023 season.

Yurosek has been more than just a security blanket for first-time starting quarterback Ashton Daniels; he has been the primary weapon. Yurosek was targeted 10 times and hauled in nine passes for a career-best 138 receiving yards and a 32-yard touchdown in the season-opening win at Hawai'i. For comparison, no other Stanford receiver had more than three catches against the Rainbow Warriors.

Through three games, Yurosek leads the Cardinal with 13 receptions and 192 receiving yards. His 192 receiving vards are the second-most in the NCAA by a tight end, trailing only Corey Dyches of Maryland and his 195 vards.

Prior to the start of the season, Yurosek was named Preseason First Team All-Pac-12 (Steele), Preseason Second Team All-Pac-12 (Media), and was named to the John Mackey Award and 2024 Senior Bowl watch lists.

EARLY SEASON RUSHING SUCCESS

Stanford has enjoyed a lot of early-season success in the ground game. When the offense is clicking, the Cardinal is keeping the clock moving and holding onto the ball with sustained drives that have been set up by the run.

Against Hawai'i, Stanford players carried the ball 34 times for 158 yards, with two rushing touchdowns to boot. No player had more than 11 carries (starting QB Ashton Daniels), and nobody had more than 67 yards (Casey Filkins). Against USC, the Card piled up 206 yards on the ground, with its lone touchdown coming from guarterback Justin Lamson. Stanford neared 200 yards again against Sacramento State, finishing with 180 on a season-high 42 attempts.

Eight different Cardinal players have at least five rushing attempts on the season, and in three games, Stanford has had three different players pace the team in carries. Justin Lamson and his 16 carries against USC are the most on the season for the Cardinal.

Stanford is averaging 4.7 yards per carry through two games, with an average of 182.3 per game, which ranks 44th in the NCAA. The Cardinal defense has also been strong against the run, highlighted by limiting Hawai'i to -5 rushing yards in the season opener. Stanford's defense ranks 50th in the country in run defense at 114.7 yards per game.

Coach Taylor has kept to his strategy of rotating backs in and out to keep them fresh for a 12-game season. Of the four running backs that Stanford has employed this season, none of them been on the field for more than 81 snaps through three games. According to PFF, both Filkins and Smith rank inside the top-15 in the Pac-12 with their season-long rushing grades.

NEW FACES

With a brand new coaching staff intact, the 2023 Stanford roster looks drastically different than it has in the past. Of the 106 players, 35 are brand new to the program this year, including 28 freshmen.

An additional 29 Cardinal are sophomores, resulting in 57 underclassmen on the 2023 roster. In comparison to last year's team, there were 27 freshmen and 25 sophomores for a total of 52 underclassmen.

Through two games, 11 Cardinal players made their collegiate debuts, and 10 made their first career starts.

KARTY PARTY

Joshua Karty earned a host of awards during the 2022 season, becoming one of the best placekickers in the NCAA. He was named First Team All-America by the Associated Press, Second Team All-America by The Sporting News and Third Team All-America by the Football Writers Association of America.

Karty is just the second placekicker in school history to earn First Team All-America honors (Rod Garcia, 1973). He is the first Cardinal since 2018 to earn All-America honors (Paulson Adebo, FWAA Second Team) and the first Stanford football player to earn First Team All-America honors since 2017 (Bryce Love, Associated Press).

Karty set a school record with a 61-yard field goal as time expired at Cal in 2022. The previous long was 59 yards (Rod Garcia at USC, 1973; Mark Harmon at Purdue (1981). The 61-yard field goal was the longest in the country by an FBS kicker (by two yards) and the second-longest in Pac-12 history (62 yards). It was tied for the sixth-longest field goal in the FBS dating back to 1996.

Thus far in 2023, Karty is 7-7 on field goals, running his consecutive field goals made streak to 25 (last miss came vs. Notre Dame on Nov. 27, 2021).

He finished last season 24-for-25 on PATs and 18-for-18 on FG attempts. For his career, he is 58-for-59 on PATs and 35-for-40 on field goals. His five misses have come from 49, 51, 54, 55 and 58 yards.

STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

Stanford faces another very tough schedule during the 2023 season, thanks in large part to the strength of the Pac-12. The Cardinal will face seven of the eight ranked teams in the Pac-12 this year, and will see eight ranked teams overall.

There is no better example of the strength of the Pac-12 than by looking at how the conference started the season. After Week 1, the Pac-12 was a combined 13-0, the best start for the conference since 1938.

Of the ranked Pac-12 teams that Stanford faces, four of those teams were inside the Preseason AP Top-25, with its toughest opponent scheduled as No. 6 USC on

September 9 in Los Angeles.

Four of the Cardinal's ranked matchups take place at home this year: Sept. 30 vs. No. 10 Oregon, Oct. 21 vs. No. 22 UCLA, Oct. 28 vs. No. 8 Washington, and Nov. 25 vs. No. 9 Notre Dame.

Many pundits believe that Stanford's schedule is one of the hardest in the country. According to 247Sports. com, Stanford has the 17th-most difficult schedule. This is based in part thanks to Stanford having the 15th-most difficult schedule based on last year's win-percentage totals.

The most difficult outlook for the Stanford strength of schedule comes from College Football News, which ranks Stanford's schedule as the fourth toughest in the NCAA, behind only Purdue, Colorado and Iowa State.

WHERE THEY'RE FROM

Stanford student-athletes on this year's roster hail from 30 states plus Canada.

There are a total of 15 student-athletes from Texas, the largest representation of student-athletes from outside of California (31) on the team. Behind Texas is Georgia (9), Florida (6), and New Jersey (5).

Three student-athletes are from Canada (Aaron Armitage, Elic Ayomanor, Brendon Barrow). 14 states are represented by one student-athlete.

NFL'S LEADING RUSHER - A CARD

In the NFL, the running back position has become devalued in recent seasons with running back by committees and injuries at the position. Christian McCaffrey is trying to change that in San Francisco. The former Stanford great is leading the NFL in rushing yards through the first two weeks of the season as he continues to shine since his trade to San Francisco.

McCaffrey was drafted in eighth overall 2017 by the Carolina Panthers and quickly became a star, recording over 1,900 yards from scrimmage in 2018 and 2019. Injuries slowed him down in 2020 and 2021, but he was traded to San Francisco midway through the 2022 campaign and took off once again. In 13 regular season games since the trade, McCaffrey has compiled 1,514 scrimmage yards with 12 total touchdowns.

HONORING ANDREW LUCK

On August 17, Stanford Athletics announced its 2023 Hall of Fame class, with 10 former student-athletes being inducted. Andrew Luck was honored as one of this year's inductees.

A native of Houston, Texas, Luck is also the 19th Cardinal player to join the College Football Hall of Fame, which happened last season. Luck guided Stanford to 23 victories over his final two seasons, including appearances in the 2011 Orange Bowl and 2012 Fiesta Bowl.

He won the 2011 Maxwell, Walter Camp and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm awards and was a two-time runnerup (2010, 2011) for the Heisman Trophy. A 2011 First Team All-American and two-time conference Offensive Player of the Year, Luck rewrote the Stanford and conference record books. Luck went 31-8 as a starter, resurrecting a Stanford program that had suffered seven straight losing seasons before he became the starter in 2009. He passed for 9,430 yards and 82 touchdowns during his Cardinal career, adding 957 yards and seven more touchdowns on the ground.

He was selected with the No. 1 overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts in the 2012 NFL Draft and played seven seasons in the NFL before retiring prior to the 2019 campaign. He set the NFL record for most passing yards by a rookie quarterback (4,374) in 2012 and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year in 2018.

REST OF THE CLASS

The other members of the Stanford Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2023 include Joe Borchard (baseball/ football), Kori Carter (women's track and field), Grace Fattal Luczak (women's rowing), Nicole Gibbs (women's tennis), Paul Goldstein (men's tennis), Lauren Lappin (softball), Arthur Lee (men's basketball), Melissa Seidemann (women's water polo) and Tom Wilkens (men's swimming and diving).

Joe Borchard stands out as one of the members of the Class of 2023 after shining as a two-sport athlete for the Cardinal. He was the No. 12 overall pick of the 2000 MLB Draft by the Chicago White Sox after helping lead Stanford to back-to-back College World Series appearances. He also was a backup quarterback for Stanford football and played in the 2000 Rose Bowl Game.

THE HOME OF CHAMPIONS

Stanford has won at least one NCAA team title in each of the past 47 academic years (dating back to the 1976-77 campaign), the longest streak in NCAA history. Stanford leads the NCAA with 134 team titles, including three national team championships during the 2022-23 campaign - men's gymnastics, women's water polo and women's rowing- increasing its overall total to 163.

Stanford is one of six programs with at least one national championship in football, baseball and men's basketball and the only school with at least one in football, baseball, men's and women's basketball.

Stanford won 25 straight (a streak which snapped in 2020-21) Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cups. The Cardinal's 26th Directors' Cup came during the 2022-23 season.

BRADFORD M. FREEMAN DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL ANDREW LUCK DIRECTOR OF OFFENSE **KEVIN M. HOGAN OUARTERBACKS COACH**

1ST SEASON AT STANFORD | 22ND SEASON OVERALL

Troy Taylor enters his first season as the Bradford M. Freeman : posted an undefeated record of 8-0 in league games and earned Director of Football, Andrew Luck Director of Offense and Kevin M. Hogan Quarterbacks Coach in 2023.

Taylor, the 35th head coach in program history, was hired on Dec. 10, 2022, by Jaquish & Kenninger Director of Athletics Bernard Muir. At Sacramento State, Taylor guided the Hornets to a 30-8 mark in four seasons and a berth in the FCS quarterfinals for the first time in school history. Prior to the 2022 season, Sacramento State had never won an FCS Playoff game in its program history.

Taylor led a high-powered Sacramento State team to a 12-1 record in 2022, with the Hornets ranking fourth nationally in scoring offense (42.9 ppg), fourth in total offense (499.8 ypg) and seventh in rushing offense (243.3 ypg). Sacramento State is the only FCS program that averaged at least 240 yards passing and 240 yards rushing per game, averaging 256.5 yards per game through the air and 243.3 on the ground.

Taylor took over a Stanford program that has won 108 games since the start of the 2010 season - a total that ranks among the nation's top-20 - with 31 of those wins coming against top-25 opponents, tied for the eighth-best mark in the country in that span.

The Cardinal is 14th nationally with 50 draft picks since 2010, second-most in the Pac-12. Stanford is tied for eighth nationally with 10 consensus All-Americans since 2010, and its 15 Academic All-Americans in that span is five more than any other school nationally.

Since 2010, Stanford has appeared in nine bowl games, including three Rose Bowl Games, an Orange Bowl and a Fiesta Bowl.

Taylor was hired as head coach at Sacramento State on Dec. 17, 2018, inheriting a program that had compiled three two-win seasons in the prior four-year stretch. Taylor immediately turned the Hornets into nine-game winners in his first season, guiding the program to its first three Big Sky championships (the program opted out of the 2021 spring season) and its first FCS Playoff appearances in school history, despite competing at the FCS level since 1994 and in the Big Sky Conference since 1996.

In 2022, Taylor's Hornets set the school record for victories in a season. Running back Cameron Skattebo was named Big Sky Offensive MVP, nickelback Marte Mapu was the Defensive MVP and Taylor was Co-Coach of the Year. Overall, 17 players were honored by the Big Sky, as Taylor was also named AFCA Regional Coach of the Year. Sacramento State's season came to a close with a 66-63 defeat in the FCS Quarterfinals.

After opting not to play in the spring of the 2020-21 season, Taylor guided the Hornets to their second Big Sky Conference title in

another trip to the FCS Playoffs. Taylor was named the Big Sky Coach of the Year and was one of 17 finalists for the Eddie Robinson Award. Sacramento State finished ninth in total offense (463.9 ypg) and 22nd in total defense (329.7), while its scoring offense was 33rd (30.3) and scoring defense 15th (19.1).

In his first season with the Hornets, Taylor guided the team to a 9-4 overall record and a 7-1 league mark, which gave Sacramento State a share of the Big Sky Conference title for the first time in school history, and its first NCAA FCS Playoff berth. For those efforts, he was named the conference Coach of the Year and was the recipient of the Eddie Robinson Award (FCS national coach of the year).

Taylor was Utah's offensive coordinator and guarterbacks coach for two seasons (2017-18), helping the Utes to their first Pac-12 South Division title in program history in 2018. Taylor's Utah offenses featured a balanced attack both seasons, with running back Zack Moss eclipsing the 1,000-yard mark on the ground in back-to-back seasons. At least 16 different players caught passes in both seasons.

Prior to joining the FBS ranks, Taylor was the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Eastern Washington in 2016. That season, he directed the top passing offense in the FCS and set numerous national and school records. The Eagles averaged an FCS-best 401.0 passing yards per game, ranked second nationally with 529.6 yards per game and were third in scoring offense (42.4 ppg). EWU posted a 12-2 overall record and advanced to the FCS semifinals.

Under Taylor, sophomore Gage Gubrud set an NCAA FCS singleseason record by passing for 5,160 yards while throwing 48 touchdown passes. Gubrud, the 2016 FCS Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, averaged 368.6 passing yards per game, which also led the nation. One of Gubrud's favorite targets was All-American Cooper Kupp, who caught 117 passes for 1,700 yards and 17 touchdowns before being selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the third round of the NFL Draft.

Taylor's success at Eastern Washington followed an illustrious run at Folsom High School, where he was co-head coach from 2012-15. The Bulldogs set numerous California state records, including the most points scored in a season. Folsom posted a 58-3 overall record, won the Sac-Joaquin Section title each season and claimed the 2014 CIF Division I championship with a 68-7 win over Oceanside. The team also set the California record for passing yards in four consecutive years.

Taylor was instrumental in the development of Jake Browning, who would become the 2016 Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year for Washington. Taylor coached Browning from fifth grade until he graduated as one of the most prolific passers in prep history. as many seasons in the fall of 2021. That year, Sacramento State : Browning set national records for touchdowns in a season (91 in

2014, tied) and career (229, in just three seasons), while establishing a number of California state high school records as well, including season (5,790) and career (16,775) passing yards.

As a player, Taylor guided Cordova High School to a 14-0 record and a section championship while being named the Northern California Player of the Year in 1985. Taylor continued his career at Cal, where he was the starting quarterback for the Golden Bears from 1986-89. Taylor led the Pac-10 in total offense as a senior and left Cal as the all-time leading passer with 8,126 yards. He was drafted by the New York Jets in the fourth round of the 1990 NFL Draft.

Taylor's first coaching job was at Casa Roble High School in Orangevale, Calif., in 1994. The following year, Taylor was a graduate assistant at Colorado, where he worked with the wide receivers. He returned to Cal in 1996 and remained at his alma mater through the 1999 season, where he had stints coaching receivers, quarterbacks and tight ends. Taylor also served as Cal's recruiting coordinator in 1999.

Taylor left Cal to become an assistant athletics director at Christian Brothers High School (2000-01) in Sacramento, where he also taught and was an assistant football coach for one season (2000). He spent 2003-04 at Folsom High School as the co-head coach. Taylor stepped away from coaching after the 2004 season but remained in football, serving as the radio analyst for Cal from 2005-11.

Taylor, 54, and his wife, Tracey, have three children: sons, Noah and Aaron, and daughter, Ella.

BOBBY APRIL

WILLIE SHAW DIRECTOR OF DEFENSE OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 19TH SEASON OVERALL

Bobby April III is in his first season as Stanford's Willie Shaw Director of Defense and outside linebackers coach. April comes to Stanford after spending the last five seasons at Wisconsin.

April joined the Wisconsin staff after six seasons in the NFL with the Philadelphia Eagles, New York Jets and Buffalo Bills.

In 2022, the Wisconsin defense ranked 13th in total defense (305.4 ypg), 12th in rushing defense (103.2 ypg), 26th in scoring defense (20.5 ppg) and 31st in passing defense (202.2 ypg). April mentored Nick Herbig, a consensus first-team All-Big Ten honoree who was also named a Walter Camp second-team All-American. Herbig finished the regular season as the Big Ten sack leader, totaling 11.0 quarterback takedowns.

In 2021, Wisconsin led the country and set a school record by allowing just 64.8 yards per game on the ground, becoming just the second FBS team since 2008 to allow fewer than 70.0 yards rushing per game over an entire season. Wisconsin allowed just 2.12 yards per carry in 2021, tops in the country and best by an FBS defense since 2016. In April's first year as defensive run game coordinator, Wisconsin led the Big Ten and ranked fifth nationally in rush defense (96.1 ypg.).

April was an integral part of a defensive staff that produced three straight top-five national finishes in total defense. In 2021, the Badgers allowed just 239.1 yards per game, the thirdbest mark in school history and the lowest total at Wisconsin since 1954. That was the fewest yards allowed by an FBS team since 2011.

In his first two seasons at Wisconsin, April mentored a pair of productive pass-rushers who went on to become NFL draft picks in Andrew Van Ginkel and Zack Baun.

Baun carried the banner for the outside linebackers — and the defense as a whole — as a senior in 2019, racking up 12.5 sacks and 19.5 tackles for loss to rank second in the Big Ten in both categories. His sack total, representing the third-highest single-season mark in UW history, propelled him to consensus first-team All-America honors and made Baun a finalist for the Butkus Award for the nation's top linebacker.

All told, April's outside linebackers contributed 17.5 of the Badgers' school-record 51 sacks, which ranked No. 2 nationally on the season.

Despite being limited by injury for a portion of the 2018 season, Van Ginkel led the team in sacks, with 5.5, and finished with 9.5 TFLs among his 60 total tackles that year. Baun finished third on the team with 63 total stops, including 7.5 TFLs and 2.5

sacks. The pair combined for 15 quarterback hurries and six passes defended, with Van Ginkel adding two forced fumbles and a blocked kick.

In his final season with the Bills, April coached a pair of All-Pro linebackers in Lorenzo Alexander and Zach Brown. Alexander earned Defensive MVP honors in the Pro Bowl.

Prior to his time in Buffalo, April served two seasons on the New York Jets' staff. He spent the 2013 season as a quality control assistant before being promoted to linebackers coach in 2014. April got his start in the NFL under head coach Andy Reid, working as a quality control assistant with the Philadelphia Eagles' secondary in 2011 and 2012.

A graduate of Louisiana-Lafayette, April's coaching career began as a student assistant at his alma mater in 2004. He spent the next two seasons as a graduate assistant at Tulane before taking a position as inside linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Portland State under head coach Jerry Glanville, a role he held from 2007-09. He then served as secondary coach and special teams coordinator at Nicholls State in 2010.

April is the son of longtime coach Bobby April Jr., a two-time NFL Special Teams Coach of the Year. He and his wife, Laura, have two daughters, Olivia and Gabby.

COUCH FAMILY SAFETIES COACH SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 37TH SEASON OVERALL

Veteran Pac-12 coordinator Bob Gregory enters his first season as Stanford's special teams coordinator and Couch Family Safeties Coach in 2023.

Gregory has coached in the Pac-12 for 22 years during his career and has also been a coordinator (defensive or special teams) for 22 seasons throughout his career.

After spending eight seasons at Washington (2014-21), Gregory spent the 2022 season as a defensive analyst at Oregon.

Gregory was Washington's defensive coordinator in 2021 before becoming the interim head coach midway through the season. For the five seasons prior, Gregory had served as UW's special teams coordinator.

During the four-game 2020 season, Gregory coached inside linebacker Edefuan Ulofoshio, a former walk-on who finished the season with 47 tackles, first in the Pac-12 and fourth in the NCAA (based on per-game average). Ulofoshio earned second team All-Pac-12 and honorable mention All-America from Pro Football Focus.

In 2019, Gregory led the Husky special teams to another highly successful season. Washington's punt team set a school record for punt average, while sophomore kicker Peyton Henry finished 19-for-21 on field goals. Washington added another punt return TD (Aaron Fuller), while their punt and kick coverage teams both achieved at the highest level. Opponents totaled just 44 yards of punt returns all season and managed just a 20.0yard average on kickoff returns.

The 2018 season was highlighted by the performance of UW middle linebacker Ben Burr-Kirven, who Gregory helped mentor to the top of the Pac-12. Burr-Kirven was named first team All-America by numerous outlets and won the Pat Tillman Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year award. Burr-Kirven, who was also the Pac-12's football Scholar-Athlete of the Year, posted a remarkable total of 176 tackles, the highest total by a Husky in 29 years and more than double any teammate in 2018. Gregory was also a key to the Huskies leading the Pac-12 in both scoring and total defense for the fourth consecutive season.

In 2017, Gregory's linebackers led the Pac-12's top defense for a thirdstraight season. Washington led the conference in total defense (eighth nationally) and scoring defense (fifth nationally). They also led the Pac-12 in rushing defense (fourth nationally). Two of his players –Burr-Kirven and Keishawn Bierria – earned second team All-Pac-12 honors. Beirria and Azeem Victor went on to hear their names called in the 2018 NFL Draft, the first pair of Husky inside linebackers to be selected in the same draft since 1993.

Gregory also mentored a special teams unit that included consensus All-American Dante Pettis, who set a NCAA record for career punt return touchdowns.

In his first year overseeing the UW's special teams, Gregory's units had a lot of success. John Ross and Pettis formed one of the most dangerous kick return/punt return duos in the country while the Huskies allowed just 18.8 yards per kick return and a total of just 116 punt return yards all year.

In 2015, Gregory oversaw a linebacker crew that, despite having lost two players to the NFL, anchored the top defense in the Pac-12 Conference. The Husky defense led the Pac-12 in scoring defense and total defense and also finished second in rushing defense. Inside linebackers Victor and Bierria were among the conference's top tacklers while outside backers Travis Feeney and Cory Littleton both finished in the top 10 in the league in sacks and went on to play in the NFL in 2016. Littleton, a star for the Los Angeles Rams, earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2018.

In his first season on Montlake in 2014, Gregory oversaw a veteran group of linebackers that included first-team All-American Shaq Thomspon, as well as top tackler John Timu. Between those two and then-junior Feeney, Husky linebackers scored a remarkable seven defensive touchdowns. Timu

lead the team in tackles (108), while Thompson won the Paul Hornung Award as the nation's most versatile player. Thompson was the first-round draft pick of the Carolina Panthers following the 2014 season while Timu earned a roster spot with the Chicago Bears as an undrafted free agent, starting several games at the end of the 2015 season.

Gregory joined Washington after spending the 2013 season in the same role at Boise State. He was also interim head coach for Boise State in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl after Chris Petersen departed for Washington.

Gregory had two stints at Boise State, the second starting in 2010 as linebackers coach. The Broncos led the Western Athletic and Mountain West Conferences in total defense and scoring defense in each of his first three seasons and were third and second, respectively, in 2013.

In Gregory's first three seasons, the Broncos were one of seven teams to rank among the nation's top 25 in total defense. They were second nationally in 2010, 16th in 2011 and 12th in 2012. In that same span, opponents averaged just 297.1 yards per game, making the Broncos one of six teams to allow less than 300 yards per game.

In four total seasons, the Broncos' defense allowed 18.0 points per game. The Broncos ranked second-nationally in scoring defense in 2010 (12.8 ppg), 12th in 2011 (18.7), eighth in 2012 (15.8) and 50th in 2013 (24.8).

Three linebackers earned all-conference accolades during Gregory's tenure as linebackers coach. J.C. Percy earned first team honors in 2012, Byron Hout (2010) was second team, while Tommy Smith (2012) and Hout (2011) earned honorable mention.

From 2002-09, Gregory served as defensive coordinator at California, a capacity he also held at Boise State in 2001. With the Golden Bears, Gregory's defenses were annually ranked among the nation's best. In eight seasons under Gregory, the Bears allowed opponents an average of 22.5 points per game.

The Bears' defense ranked among the top 10 nationally in four different categories during the 2008 season, while his 2004 team was second in the nation in rush defense (82.5) and eighth in scoring defense (16.0). Gregory was a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2004, which honors the top assistant coach in football.

Gregory and Petersen joined Dan Hawkins' Boise State staff in 2001 to become defensive and offensive coordinators after working together at Oregon. In Gregory's only season as defensive coordinator at Boise State in 2001, the Broncos were second in the WAC in scoring defense (23.3 ppg) and rushing defense (118.1 ypg).

At Oregon, Gregory served as defensive backs coach from 1998-2000. He was defensive coordinator at Willamette (Ore.) from 1992-97 and was defensive backs coach in 1991.

He spent two seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at Oregon in 1989 and 1990 after starting his coaching career at Washington University in St. Louis, Mo. He served as defensive backs coach in 1987 and defensive coordinator in 1988.

Gregory is a 1987 graduate of Washington State, where he earned a bachelor's degree in English. He played linebacker and defensive back for the Cougars. Gregory earned his master's degree in educational policy at Oregon.

He and his wife, Molly, have two sons, Jack and Joe.

RUNNING BACKS **1ST SEASON AT STANFORD** 9TH SEASON OVERALL

Malcolm Agnew enters his first season as Stanford's running backs 🗄 the fall of 2015. He also spent time with the Los Angeles Rams as a coach in 2023. He comes to The Farm after coaching Sacramento State's running backs since February 2020. In two seasons with the Hornets, he mentored record-breaking running back Cameron Skattebo, who became the Big Sky Offensive MVP and an All-American in 2022.

Agnew joined Sacramento State after spending the previous three seasons at North Dakota in the same position.

In 2022, Agnew coached All-American and Big Sky Offensive MVP Cameron Skattebo to a record-breaking year, while running back Marcus Fulcher also earned Big Sky third-team recognition. Skattebo rushed 196 times for 1,382 yards (7.0 avg) and seven touchdowns while adding 31 receptions for 371 yards and three scores. Fulcher had eight rushing touchdowns on 74 carries, amassing 464 yards on the ground. He also caught 36 passes for 252 yards and two touchdowns through the air. His running backs accounted for over 3,700 all-purpose yards during the historic campaign.

In his first year with the Hornets, Agnew coached Skattebo, a freshman, to third team all-Big Sky honors. Skattebo rushed for 523 yards and six touchdowns with all but 12 of those yards coming in the final six games of the season. Overall, the team's running backs combined for 1,258 rushing yards and nine touchdowns and also caught 68 passes for 643 yards and two scores. The unit averaged 5.80 yards per carry and was led by Skattebo who had a healthy 9.18 ypc average.

While at UND, Agnew coached John Santiago and Brady Oliveira to all-Big Sky honors in 2017. Santiago became just the fifth player in Big Sky history to secure first-team accolades at the same position as a freshman, sophomore, and junior after rushing for 717 yards and five touchdowns while leading the FCS in the regular season with 1,780 all-purpose yards. Oliveira added 637 rushing yards en route to honorable mention accolades.

The following season, UND boasted a three-headed monster at running back with Santiago, Oliveira, and James Johannesson accounting for over 2,700 yards on the ground and 20 touchdowns. With Santiago suiting up in only eight games due to injury, Oliveira shined for the Fighting Hawks with 1,044 all-purpose yards, ac-cumulating an average of 94.9 total yards per game, a team-high 940 yards, 161 carries, and eight touchdowns. He registered four 100-yard rushing games, including a pair of 150+ performances. Johannesson also boasted a trio of 100-yard contests, including a 213-yard day at Sacramento State.

In 2019, Johannesson led the team with 530 rushing yards and seven touchdowns. UND again had a balanced attack with five players rushing for over 150 yards and eight recording at least one rushing touchdown.

Agnew spent his first two seasons as a collegian playing for Mike Riley at Oregon State in 2011 and 2012. After rushing for more than 600 yards in two seasons with the Beavers, Agnew transferred to Southern Illinois where he played his final two collegiate seasons. He amassed 1,708 rushing yards for the Salukis.

Following his graduation, Agnew served as the running backs coach at his alma mater, De Smet Jesuit High School, in St. Louis, Mo., in

volunteer scouting assistant.

The following year, Agnew was reunited with Riley at Nebraska, where he served as a personnel assistant and focused on recruiting.

His father, Ray Agnew, played 11 seasons in the National Football League and won a Super Bowl with the St. Louis Rams in 1999 and currently serves as Assistant GM of the Detroit Lions. Agnew's brother, Ray III, had a brief stint in the NFL with the Cleveland Browns (2014), Dallas Cowboys (2015), and Washington Redskins (2015) and is currently a scout with the New York Jets. His younger brother, Keenan, recently finished his career at SIU as a defensive tackle.

Agnew signed an NFL free-agent contract with the Green Bay Packers in 2015 but was forced to end his playing career due to injury. He earned his bachelor's degree from SIU in radio, television, and digital media with a minor in marketing following the 2015 spring semester.

Agnew and his wife, Amanda, were married in April of 2017 and have a dog, Skye.

TIGHT ENDS 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 10TH SEASON OVERALL

Nate Byham is in his first season as Stanford's tight ends coach in 2017, Byham coached Anthony Manzo-Lewis, who was in 2023.

He comes to Stanford from the University at Albany, where he finished his ninth season on staff. After a four-year NFL career at tight end, Byham was most recently Albany's Associate Head Coach, Co-Offensive Coordinator and Offensive Line Coach.

In 2022, Byham was critical in the success of both tight end Thomas Greaney and quarterback Reese Poffenbarger. Greaney caught 50 passes for 693 yards and 11 touchdowns while being the only Great Dane on the All-CAA first team. He was also named a second team All-American. At QB, Poffenbarger was named a freshman All-American and was named Colonial Athletic Association Offensive Rookie of the Year.

Byham coached Karl Mofor, a two-time All-CAA selection who led the conference in rushing in back-to-back seasons (2019, spring 2021). In 2021, Mofor rushed for 115.0 ypg, a season after rushing for 1,290 yards with 10 touchdowns.

Additionally, Byham coached tight end LJ Wesneski, who made seven touchdown receptions to earn All-CAA third-team honors.

In 2018, Byham's run game scheme helped Elijah Ibitokun-Hanks earn third team All-CAA honors, rushing for 787 yards and four touchdowns on the season and averaging 69.7 rushing yards per game, sixth-highest in the conference. As a team, UAlbany rushed for 110.3 yards per game.

 In 2017, Byham coached Anthony Manzo-Lewis, who was named to the All-CAA second team after catching 20 passes for 188 yards. After the season, Manzo-Lewis signed a free-agent e he contract with the Los Angeles Chargers.

Before being named tight ends coach in 2015, Byham served as a volunteer assistant for Albany in 2014. He mentored senior tight end Brian Parker who earned third-team All-CAA honors, signing as an undrafted free agent with the San Diego Chargers following the season.

Byham, a sixth-round pick (182nd overall) in the 2010 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers, played in 14 games, including three starts, with the 49ers before signing with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for the 2012 and 2013 seasons.

A2010 graduate of Pittsburgh with a degree in communications, Byham saw action in 48 games with 36 starts in his career. Byham served as a team captain during his senior season, also earning All-Big East honors after starting 12 games and catching 10 passes for 108 yards. As a junior, he recorded 20 catches for 260 yards in 12 starts and was named first team All-Big East.

Byham and his wife, Erica, married in July 2012. Their son, Grayson, was born in 2016, and his daughter, Evelyn, was born in 2019.

MARK D'ONOFRIO

INSIDE LINEBACKERS 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 21ST SEASON OVERALL

Mark D'Onofrio (pronounced duh-NOFF-ree-oh) is in his first season as Stanford's inside linebackers coach in 2023. D'Onofrio comes to Stanford from Wisconsin, where he most recently coached inside linebackers. He has 12 years of defensive coordinator experience at three different schools – Temple, Miami and Houston.

In 2022, the Wisconsin defense ranked 11th in total defense (303.5 ypg), 10th in rushing defense (99.2 ypg) and fourth nationally at just 2.91 yards per rush attempt. Four different inside linebackers started at least two games for the Badgers, all four starting their first career games during the 2022 season. D'Onofrio was hired to coach Wisconsin's ILB unit following spring ball.

Junior ILB Maema Njongmeta was named third team All-Big Ten after leading the Badgers with 95 tackles. He added 11.5 TFL, 3.5 sacks, five QB hurries, one interception and one pass breakup. All that coming just one season after he totaled just four tackles on 50 defensive snaps in 2021. Fellow classmate and position mate, Jordan Turner, the Guaranteed Rate Bowl Defensive MVP, was Wisconsin's second-leading tackler with 68, a season after tallying just six tackles on 24 defensive snaps. Two other inside linebackers – Jake Chaney and Tatum Grass – totaled 58 tackles in 2022 after combining for just nine in 2021.

Prior to joining Wisconsin's staff, D'Onofrio spent 12 seasons as a defensive coordinator, spanning his time at Temple, Miami and Houston, where he helped develop 20 NFL draft picks.

In his first season at Houston, D'Onofrio's defense ranked second in the American Athletic Conference in scoring defense at 23.8 points per game, despite facing four of the nation's top-12 scoring offenses and five of the top 23. Houston also finished second in the AAC in rushing defense (147.9 yards per game), pass efficiency defense (121.5) and red zone defense (77.1 percent). Inside linebacker D'Juan Hines received first team all-conference honors as he finished third in the AAC with 110 tackles. While at Houston, D'Onofrio mentored two former quarterbacks – Hines and Austin Robinson – to first team All-AAC honors.

D'Onofrio followed head coach Al Golden from Temple to Miami, where his prized pupil was linebacker Denzel Perryman, a Dick Butkus Award semifinalist in 2013 and 2014 and the first Hurricanes player since 2007 to earn AP All-America honors. A second-round pick of the San Diego Chargers in 2015, Perryman ranked sixth in the league with 154 tackles this season and was voted to the Pro Bowl.

His 2015 defense at Miami ranked third in the ACC with 25 turnovers gained, while his 2014 defense was fourth in the ACC in total defense, holding nine opponents below 250 yards passing and five teams to less than 100 yards rushing. His 2013 defense was among the nation's best in takeaways, finishing the year with 27, while the 2011 defense finished the season ninth in the nation in red zone defense and 21st in scoring defense.

At Temple, he transformed a defense that ranked last in the NCAA upon his arrival to 17th in 2010 and helped the Owls become bowl eligible in back-to-back seasons for the first time in program history.

Among the other inside linebackers D'Onofrio has mentored during his career were Gary Brackett (Rutgers), a nine-year NFL veteran and starter on the Indianapolis Colts team that won Super Bowl XLI, Ahmad Brooks (Virginia), a first-team All-American in 2004 and two-time All-Pro during his 12-year NFL career, and Sean Spence (Miami), a first-team All-ACC choice in 2011 and six-year NFL veteran. He also helped develop NFL first round draft pick and two-time Pro Bowl tight end Heath Miller in 2004 while at Virginia.

After his final season at Houston, D'Onofrio continued to be active in football, working as a resource for a number of coaches at the high school, college and NFL levels.

D'Onofrio starred as a linebacker at Penn State from 1988-91 and was named team captain as a senior. He was selected in the second round (No. 34 overall pick) of the 1992 NFL Draft by Green Bay and earned a starting role at inside linebacker as a rookie before an injury prematurely ended his professional career.

D'Onofrio and his wife, Lucia, are the parents of sons Jack and Thomas.

Al Netter enters his first season as co-offensive line coach in From 2015-17, Netter served as the offensive graduate assistant coach at Michigan, working with the offensive line

Netter, who will serve as co-offensive line coach with Viane Talamaivao, arrives on The Farm after a five-year tenure at Yale, in which he served as the program's offensive line coach, co-offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

In addition to his Midwest ties, having played his collegiate career at Northwestern and later coaching at Michigan, Netter has a distinct familiarity with the Bay Area. A native of Rohnert Park, California, Netter attended Cardinal Newman High School and played parts of three seasons for the San Francisco 49ers.

Netter became Yale's offensive line coach in 2018, was promoted to run game coordinator in 2020 and concluded his stint in New Haven as associate head coach and cooffensive coordinator. In his first season, Netter helped mentor Dieter Eiselen and Sterling Strother, as both earned All-Ivy recognition. Eiselen also went on to earn All-America honors during Yale's 2019 Ivy League Championship season before later signing with the Chicago Bears. The Bulldogs also claimed the 2022 Ivy League title, with Nick Gargiulo and Kiran Amegadjie flourishing as All-Ivy selections under Netter's tutelage.

From 2015-17, Netter served as the offensive graduate assistant coach at Michigan, working with the offensive line during a stretch in which the Wolverines won 28 games and played in three bowl games. While in Ann Arbor, Netter was reunited with head coach Jim Harbaugh, whom he played three seasons (2012-14) for on the offensive line as a member of the San Francisco 49ers. Netter's NFL career also included a stint with the Tennessee Titans.

During his collegiate career, Netter was a four-year starter on the offensive line from 2008-11. A two-time team captain (2009-10), three-time All-Big Ten Honorable Mention selection (2009-11) and three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree (2009-11), Netter started all 52 career games for the Wildcats, where he helped block for an offense which produced 5,417 yards of total offense in 2011.

Netter, an All-North Coast Section tackle at Cardinal Newman High School in 2006, led the Cardinals to the Division 3 state title game that year, where they fell 27-20 in overtime to Oaks Christian of Westlake Village.

Netter earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Northwestern in 2011 and master's from Michigan in sports management in 2017.

Netter and his wife, Katie, have two children, Jordyn and Westley.

Viane Talamaivao begins his first season as co-offensive line coach in 2023. 38-16 overall record, 27-9 mark in the Pac-12 and appearances

Talamaivao, who will serve as co-offensive line coach with Al Netter, most recently served as the offensive line coach at Northern Arizona after completing the 2022 campaign as an offensive graduate assistant at Oregon.

Talamaivao's familiarity with the Pac-12 includes a coaching stop at his alma mater, USC. Joining the staff as a graduate assistant in 2019, Talamaivao remained in that capacity for two seasons before shifting to an offensive quality control analyst position in 2021.

During his time on the USC staff, the Trojans finished 17-14 overall and 15-8 in the Pac-12. Talamaivao played a key role in the development of All-Pac-12 First Team offensive tackles and eventual NFL first-round draft picks Austin Jackson and Alijah-Vera Tucker, who in 2020 was named the Pac-12's Offensive Morris Trophy recipient as the conference's top lineman.

A former four-star and top-100 recruit, Talamaivao was named a Pac-12 All-Honorable Mention selection and Freshman All-American, starting 37 games at guard for USC between 2014-17 before splitting time with the Seattle Seahawks and Jacksonville Jaguars during the 2018 NFL season.

During his collegiate career, Talamaivao helped lead USC to a 38-16 overall record, 27-9 mark in the Pac-12 and appearances in the Rose Bowl, Cotton Bowl and Holiday Bowl (twice). As a senior, Talamaivao was honored with the team's Trojan Commitment Award.

A native of Moreno Valley, California, Talamaivao received his bachelor's degree in business administration in 2018 and worked toward a master's degree in communication management from USC during his graduate assistantship.

DEFENSIVE LINE **1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 12TH SEASON OVERALL**

Ross Kolodziej (pronounced kah-LAH-gee) is in his first season : teams and in the 1999 and 2000 Rose Bowls. He also was as Stanford's defensive line coach in 2023. Kolodziej comes to Stanford after spending the last eight seasons at his alma mater, Wisconsin.

A seven-year NFL veteran, Kolodziej comes to Stanford from Wisconsin, where he coached the defensive line in each of the past two seasons. Following his NFL career, Kolodziej got into coaching and was Wisconsin's head strength and conditioning coach for football from 2015-20.

In 2022, the Wisconsin defense ranked 11th in total defense (303.5 ypg), 10th in rushing defense (99.2 ypg) and fourth nationally at just 2.91 yards per rush attempt. Senior nose tackle Keeanu Benton was named third team All-Big Ten after tallying 35 tackles, 10 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

In his first season coaching the defensive line in 2021, his unit was an integral part of the nation's best defense. The Badgers led the country and set a school record by allowing just 64.8 yards per game on the ground, becoming just the second FBS team since 2008 to allow fewer than 70.0 yards rushing per game over an entire season. UW allowed just 2.12 yards per carry in 2021, tops in the country and best by an FBS defense since 2016.

That stout rushing defense contributed to a unit surrendering just 239.1 yards per game, the third-best mark in school history and the lowest total at Wisconsin since 1954. That was the fewest yards allowed by an FBS team since 2011.

Kolodziej mentored a pair of All-Big Ten selections in his first season, Keeanu Benton and Matt Henningsen. Benton earned second-team honors while Henningsen was a third-team choice. Henningsen was also a finalist for the William V. Campbell trophy and was chosen in the 2022 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Kolodziej spent seven seasons as a head strength and conditioning coach under Paul Chryst, including six at Wisconsin, before transitioning to his on-field coaching role with the defensive line. He spent the 2013 season as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Pittsburgh before being promoted to head strength coach a year later. He served in the same capacity after returning to Wisconsin in 2015 through the 2020 season.

During his time leading the Badgers' weight room, Wisconsin produced 11 first-team All-Americans, including six consensus All-America selections, and sent 33 players to the NFL.

Prior to joining Chryst's staff, Kolodziej served as a graduate assistant at Wisconsin in 2012, working with the Badgers' defensive line. That followed a professional career that spanned seven seasons in the NFL and three in the United Football League from 2009-11, where the two-time team captain helped Las Vegas claim back-to-back league titles.

Kolodziej was a 45-game starter on the defensive line for the Badgers, playing on the 1998 and 1999 Big Ten championship a member of Wisconsin's indoor and outdoor Big Ten championship teams in track and field in 2000 and 2001.

Selected by the Giants in the seventh round of the 2001 NFL Draft, Kolodziej played for the Giants, Vikings, 49ers and Cardinals during his seven-year NFL career. While with the Cardinals, he started 14 games during the 2005 season as a member of a defense that ranked in the league's top 10.

A native of Stevens Point, Wisconsin, Kolodziej also spent the 2009 offseason as a strength and conditioning intern for the Badgers and finished his UW degree during that time.

Kolodziej and his wife, Miriam, have four children: Liz, Taylor, Asher and Abram.

THE KRISHNAMURTHI WIDE RECEIVERS COACH ASSISTANT QUARTERBACKS COACH 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 12TH SEASON OVERALL

Tyler Osborne is in his first season as Stanford's The Krishnamurthi Wide Receivers Coach and Assistant Quarterbacks Coach in 2023 following three seasons at Sacramento State as the wide receivers coach. Osborne was named to the AFCA 35 Under 35 Leadership Institute in December 2022. In August of 2023, Osborne was named to 247Sports 2023 30 Under 30 class, recognizing college football's best coaches and personnel under the age of 30 each year.

In 2022, Osborne coached wide receiver Pierre Williams to his third straight Big Sky Conference first team honors. Williams led all Hornet wide receivers with 47 catches for 723 yards and nine touchdowns.

Osborne was Sacramento State's wide receivers coach under Taylor from 2019-22, helping the program to a 30-8 record in three seasons, with three Big Sky championships, three Top-10 finishes and a 23-1 mark in conference action.

Osborne coached a group of receivers in 2019 that combined with Hornet quarterbacks to set the school record for passing yards in a single season (3,832). The group was led by Pierre Williams, who earned first team all-Big Sky honors as a sophomore. Williams had a team-high 931 receiving yards on 54 catches. Nine different wide receivers caught passes during the year and the group combined for 18 touchdown receptions.

Williams was again named to the all-Big Sky first team in 2021 after catching 50 passes for 764 yards and three touchdowns. The freshmen trio of Chris Miller, Jared Gipson and Devin Gandy all saw significant action in their collegiate debut season combining for 59 receptions for 1,003 yards and five TDs.

Osborne previously served as a graduate assistant coach at Washington in 2017 and 2018. In that role, he worked closely with the Husky wide receivers and was part of a staff which won 10 games both years. The 2017 team played in the Fiesta Bowl while the 2018 team won the Pac-12 title and moved on to the Rose Bowl. In his final year, Osborne helped coach a pair of receivers who had at least 55 catches and nearly 600 receiving yards during the year. He also coached Dante Pettis in 2017 before he was selected 44th overall by the San Francisco 49ers in the NFL Draft.

Osborne came to Washington after spending five years at Oregon. He was an undergraduate assistant coach for four years before serving as offensive analyst, focusing on quarterbacks, in 2016. As an undergrad, Osborne spent his first season directly under Chip Kelly and assisted him in coaching the slot receivers. The next four seasons he assisted coaching the Ducks' quarterbacks. During that time, he helped coach Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Mariota, Vernon Adams and Justin Herbert.

During his time on the Oregon staff, the Ducks went to a CFP national championship game, a Rose Bowl, a Fiesta Bowl and two Alamo Bowls.

Osborne is the son of longtime college football coach Tom Osborne, a former Washington State wide receiver who spent 36 seasons coaching at Washington State, Portland State, Boise State, Arizona State and Oregon. The elder Osborne was known mostly as the Ducks' tight ends and special teams coach for 16 seasons over two stretches.

He attended Sheldon High in Eugene, Ore., where he played football and baseball. A wide receiver, quarterback and defensive back on the football team, he helped Sheldon to the state title game in 2011.

Osborne earned a degree in finance and sports business from Oregon in 2016. He completed his master's degree in intercollegiate athletics leadership at Washington in June of 2018.

CORNERBACKS 1ST SEASON AT STANFORD 26TH SEASON OVERALL

Paul Williams is in his first season as Stanford's cornerbacks coach in 2023

Williams comes to Stanford from Wake Forest, where he has coached cornerbacks the last three seasons, helping the Demon Deacons to a 23-13 during his three seasons in Winston-Salem. He brings 23 years of experience coaching the secondary to The Farm.

In 2022, Williams guided a Wake Forest defense that forced 16 turnovers (seven interceptions, nine fumbles) as the program won eight games for just the 10th time in the 115-year history of the program. Additionally, the Demon Deacons downed Missouri in the 2022 Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl, which marked the 11th bowl victory in program history.

In 2021, Williams helped head coach Dave Clawson lead Wake Forest to a program-record tying 11-3 record, including a school-best 7-1 mark in ACC play. The defensive backs helped Wake Forest force 29 turnovers (15 interceptions, 14 fumble recoveries). That total was the most for Wake Forest since 2008 when they tallied 37 turnovers.

Additionally with good coverage on the back end of the defense, Wake Forest tallied 38 sacks in 2021 to set another Clawson-era record. That mark was second-most in Wake Forest history.

Williams tutored Ja'Sir Taylor and Caelen Carson to All-ACC Honorable Mention honors in 2021. Taylor went on to be a sixth-round pick in the 2022 NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Chargers.

During his first season at Wake Forest in 2020, his cornerbacks played an instrumental role in helping a Demon Deacon defense finish the season with a +10-turnover margin, the highest in the Clawson era. Wake Forest was one of just seven FBS schools to post a +10 or better margin in the country, tying for fourth in that category.

Taylor was a 2020 All-ACC honoree and rookie Gavin Holmes returned : his first career interception for a touchdown at Syracuse.

Williams has a long history of training NFL talent during his coaching career. Williams has 11 players on active NFL rosters and has produced 14 NFL draft picks from five different schools. In his last six stops as an on-field coach, Williams has produced at least one NFL defensive back.

During the 2018 season at Houston, Williams had three players ranked in the AAC's top 25 for passes defended and he mentored 2019 fourthround draft pick Isiah Johnson (Oakland Raiders).

Williams spent the 2016-17 seasons at Illinois, where protégé Bennett Williams earned Freshman All-America honors and was one of four

defensive backs to earn postseason honors in 2017. In his first season in Champaign, Williams coached the 16th-ranked pass defense, allowing only 185.9 yards per game through the air.

At Miami from 2011-15, Williams helped the Hurricanes reach three straight bowl games from 2013-15. During the 2014 season, Miami ranked 17th national in pass defense, allowing just 191.4 yards per game. He developed eight future NFL players during his five seasons in Coral Gables, including 2016 first-round draft pick, Artie Burns.

Williams spent five seasons (2006-10) at Temple, helping the Owls to a 17-7 record over his final two seasons in Philadelphia. Defensive back Jaiquawn Jarrett earned first team All-MAC honors before being selected in the second round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

During his lone season at Western Michigan, the Broncos went from one win in 2004 to seven wins in 2005. Williams coached Louis Delman, a second-round pick by the Detroit Lions who later spent six years in the NFL.

A 1996 graduate of Delaware, Williams spent six seasons at his alma mater (1999-04). During his time on staff, he was integral in helping build the Blue Hens to a national power, capped off by a 15-1 record and Division I-AA national championship in 2003. Delaware cornerback Sidney Haugabrook was a four-time all-conference honoree and an All-American in 2004. Not to be outdone, defensive backs Mike Adams and Ricardo Walker; placekickers Brad Shushman and Scott Collins; return specialist Brett Veach; as well as punters Ryan Bleiler and Chris Steiner were all named to all-league teams under Williams.

Williams was key in the development of Adams, a Blue Hen great who played 16 seasons in the NFL after going undrafted. He earned Pro Bowl nods in 2014 and 2015.

Williams began his coaching career at Lafayette in 1996 and then spent two seasons at Penn.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in physical education studies in 1996 from Delaware, lettering four years and playing on two Yankee Conference championship teams. During his career, he tallied 189 tackles, 27 pass breakups and 10 interceptions. He also ran track and set the school's record in the indoor 200 meters and won the 200 meters at the 1993 American East Outdoor Championships.

He and his wife, Nicole, have three children: Austin, Jaxon and Leah.
