UMASS MEETS STANFORD IN NIT SEMIFINAL TUESDAY

- UMass is making its 19th postseason appearance and its 11th in the Postseason NIT. The Minutemen were slotted as a No. 5 seed in their bracket, marking the third postseason appearance in the last six seasons and the first in four vears under head coach Derek Kellogg.
- UMass returns to the NIT Final Four for the first time since 2008 as the Minutemen face Stanford on Tuesday at 7 p.m at Madison Square Garden. The game will be broadcast nationally on ESPN2 with Mike Patrick, Fran Fraschilla and Bill Raftery calling the action. It will be carried nationally by Westwood One Radio with Bob Papa and former UMass head coach Steve Lappas on the call. The game will also be available on all four stations of the UMass Radio Network with Josh Maurer and Tim Kenney. The UMass-Stanford winner will advance to the championship and face the Washington-Minnesota winner on Thursday, March 29.

2011-12 UMASS SEASON CAPSULE

- The 2011-12 season marks the fourth for head coach Derek Kellogg ... Kellogg starred as a point guard for the Minutemen from 1992-95, playing for coach John Calipari ... Kellogg spent a year as a graduate assistant with Bruiser Flint at UMass, two years at George Mason with Jim Larranaga and eight at Memphis with Calipari, culminating with the 2008 NCAA Runner-up season ... UMass' win totals under Kellogg have grown from 12, 12, 15 and 25.
- With its 20th win of the season in the regular-season finale against Rhode Island, it marked the 15th 20-win season in school history and the first in Kellogg's four years. The 25 total victories are currently tied for the fifth highest total in UMass annals.

Top Tidbits

- Sophomore PG Chaz Williams is a Brooklyn native who attended Bishop Moore HS and transferred to UMass following his freshman season at Hofstra.
- UMass is 13-12 all-time in the National Invitation Tournament, make ing Final Four appearances in 1991 2008 and 2012. The Minutemen are a combined 24-20 in the NIT and NCAA Tournaments.
- · The Minutemen collected six reg ular-season wins against teams that qualified for the NCAA & NIT Tourneys. · UMass is seeking its 26th win of the season, which would be the fifthhighest total in school history.
- · UMass is 9-13 all-time at Madison Square Garden, last playing in the 2008 NIT Championship game where it lost to Ohio State.
- UMass and Stanford are meeting for the fifth time, having split the previous four meetings, including in the 1991 NIT semifinals where the Cardinal claimed a 73-71 win.
- · UMass is 10-10 away from home this season and has won three-consecutive road games for the first time since the 2008 season.
- UMass has scored more than 40 points in a half 32 times this season, with a high of 51 against Duquesne (3/6) in the A-10 Tourney First Round.

This Date In UMass History

March 25-April 3

3/25/2005: Travis Ford is hired and produces a 62-35 record in three seasons, including a share of the 2007 Atlantic 10 regular season crown and two NIT appearances. 3/25/2008: Minutemen come back from 22-point deficit with 14:34 remaining in the second half to defeat Syracuse 81-77 and advance to the NIT Semifinals for the first time since 1991. They also became the first team to ever <u>beat the Orange at the Carrier Dome twice in one season.</u> 3/26/1992: UMass' 87-77 loss to Kentucky in an NCAA Sweet 16 game marks the end of all-time leading scorer Jim McCoy's career. He finished his stellar four-year stint with 2,374 points.

3/26/2001: Steve Lappas is hired following nine seasons at Villanova. He would go 50-65 in four years.

3/26/2007: Stephane Lasme is named AP Honorable Mention All-American, marking the first Minutemen to earn AP honors since Marcus Camby was named to the first team in 1995-96.

3/27/1991: UMass falls to Colorado, 98-91, in the NIT Third Place Game held in Madison Square Garden.

3/29: UMass has never played a game on this day. 3/30/1996: UMass plays in its only Final Four in school history, a 81-74 loss to Kentucky in East Rutherford, N.J. It also marked the final game of All-American and future NBA star Marcus Camby's career.

4/1/2008: UMass defeats two-time defending NCAA Champion Florida, 78-66, in the NIT Semifinals.

4/3/2008: UMass hangs tough in the NIT Championship game, but losses to Ohio State, 92-85.

- UMass started the year 11-3, suffering losses to No. 22 Florida State & College of Charleston in the Bahamas and at Miami. A 7-3 start in league play had the Minutemen among the league leaders, but losses in four of five games hurt UMass down the stretch of the A-10 season. The fifth loss in that stretch was a 90-88 overtime loss at Temple after a 33-point setback at Dayton. Despite the loss, that performance sparked the Minutemen in the win over Rhode Island to close the regular-season and a pair of wins in the A-10 Tournament, including an upset of top-seeded and 21st-ranked Temple in the quarterfinals.
- In the regular-season slate, UMass went 5-3 against teams that qualified for the NCAA Tournament and 1-5 against NIT entrants.
- The Minutemen are shooting 44.3 pct. (196-of-397) from the field over the past six games and averaging 86.0 points per game.
- UMass averages 8.0 3-pointers per game this season and has made at least 10 in nine games. The Minutemen have made 65 triples in the last seven games and are connecting on 42.6 pct. during that stretch.
- UMass has collected 310 steals this season and is just one shy of tying the school record set during the Final Four season of 1995-96. The squad is averaging 8.9 thefts per game, which ranks eighth in the country and is on the heels of the 9.0 spg school mark of the 1999-2000 campaign.
- · UMass won its first 14 home games before improving to 15-1 with its Atlantic 10 Championship First Round win.
- UMass averaged 4,359 fans in 15 dates at the Mullins Center this season. Those numbers got increasingly higher as the season evolved to 5,411 for eight A-10 home games and 6,614 for the last five regularseason home dates. The Minutemen saw four crowds of more than 6,200 in the final six games, with a season-high 8,399 in the victory over Saint Louis.

NEW YORKERS RETURN HOME

• The game at Madison Square Garden is a triumphant homecoming for sophomore point guard Chaz Williams, who grew up in Brooklyn and attended Bishop Moore HS and nearby Hofstra University as a freshman in 2009-10 before transferring to UMass. Assistant coach Adam Ginsburg is a native of Baldwin on Long Island.

UMASS FANS PLANNING A RETURN TO THE GARDEN

- When UMass reached the 2008 NIT championship game, the university ferried 14 busloads of students and fans to the finals and sold out its allotment quickly. With a more than 700 on the buses and thousands more wearing UMass maroon in attendance, the Minuteman nation accounted for the majority of the 8,407 in attendance.
- This year's squad has generated even more excitement in the region and officials are expecting an even larger contingent of UMass fans at The Garden. As of Friday afternoon, UMass had already sold more than 1,000 tickets to season-ticket holders, donors and UMass Alumni Association Legacy members. Additionally, student tickets will be available for pickup on Monday when classes resume from Spring Break. Ten buses have been reserved for Tuesday with more on standby if needed. A UMass pregame reception will take place at Stout NYC, located a block from MSG at 133 West 33rd Street.
- Former UMass football standout Victor Cruz of the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants has indicated on his Twitter account that he might be in attandance. He made an appearance at the UMass-Xavier contest this season and visited with the team in the locker room following the game. Drexel head coach Bruiser Flint, who spent 12 seasons as an assistant and head coach at UMass, mentioned in his postgame press conference following the loss to the Minutemen that he was planning on supporting coach Kellogg - his former point guard - by being in the crowd.

UMASS' POSTSEASON TOURNAMENT HISTORY

- UMass has an all-time postseason record of 24-20 in 18 combined appearances in both the NCAA and NIT tournaments. The Minutemen are making their 11th NIT appearance this season and have run their record to 13-12 which includes Final Fours in 1991 (fourth), 2008 (runner-up) and 2012.
- UMass is now 6-6 in NIT First Round games and 6-3 in true NIT road games. The Minutemen have played 15 of their 24 games in New York state, going 5-10 in those contests and 2-9 at Madison Square Garden.
- With Tuesday's 101-96 2ot win over Mississippi State, UMass has now faced an SEC school in each of its last three NIT appearances. The Minutemen defeated Alabama, 89-87 in overtime, in Amherst six years to the day from the MSU game. A year later in 2008, UMass outlasted defending NCAA Champion Florida, 78-66, in the semifinals at Madison Square Garden.


UMASS' 'ROAD' TO THE NIT FINAL FOUR

- Slotted as a No. 5 seed in its bracket, UMass has advanced to the NIT Final Four for the third time in school history (1991, 2008, 2012) by virtue of road victories over No. 4 seed Mississippi State (101-96 2ot), No. 1 Seton Hall (77-67) and No. 3 Drexel (72-70).
- By virtue of their three road wins to reach New York City, UMass and Minnesota have added their names to a very select group of NIT teams. The duo are just the fourth and fifth teams to win three road games en route to reaching the NIT semifinals. Since the tourney began using home sites in 1977, only Fresno State in 1998, Detroit in 2001 and Georgetown in 2003 reached Madison Square Garden via three road victories.
- FIRST ROUND 101-96 2ot at Mississippi State: UMass scored the first eight points and led 55-41 with 15:08 to play. MSU fought back to go ahead 66-65 with 5:00 left. Chaz Williams missed potential game-

winning baskets on contested jumpers in the closing seconds of both regulation and the first overtime. Williams led five Minutemen in double figures with 28 points, while Sean Carter (20p/12r) and Raphiael Putney (10p/16r) each posted double-doubles. Both teams shot 43 pct but UMass dominated the bigger Bulldogs on the glass with a 56-41 margin and 21 offensive boards that were converted into a 24-7 edge in second-chance points. The Minutemen set school NIT records for points scored (101), individual points (28 by Williams) and individual rebounds (16 by Putney).

- SECOND ROUND 77-67 at Seton Hall: Chaz Williams (20 pts) led four players in double figures and Terrell Vinson came up huge down the stretch as UMass snapped a two-game losing streak to SHU in a sold-out Walsh Gymnasium. With the Minutemen clinging to a 65-64 lead, Wiliams and Vinson connected on back-to-back 3-pointers which pushed the margin to 71-64 with 1:30 left. Vinson finished with 10 points and seven rebounds with all eight of his second-half scoring coming in the final 6:22. Raphiael Putney had 15 points and Sean Carter posted his second-consecutive double-double with 11 and 11.
- QUARTERFINAL 72-70 at Drexel: UMass rallied from a 17-point deficit with 16:26 to play and wore down Drexel with a 26-7 run and a very effective press in the 80-degree Daskalakis Athletic Center. The Minutemen shot a season-high 59 pct. for the game and a blistering 71 pct. (17-of-24) in the second half. Chaz Williams had a game-high 20 points with four rebounds, four assists and two steals. Terrell Vinson added 14 of his 18 points in the second half with a team-high five rebounds to go along with two assists, two blocks and two steals. Philadelphia native Jesse Morgan finished with 13 points and four steals, while matching Williams with two 3-pointers for all four of UMass' outside shots.

UMASS TURNING INTO NIT ROAD WARRIORS

- This year's UMass team had tasted some success on the road but had struggled to sustain the wins and string together any type of win streaks away from home. But that all changed with the NIT schedule dealt the Minutemen in the first three rounds. UMass won at Mississippi State of the SEC and at Seton Hall of the Big East in the first two rounds of the postseason event, marking the first time it had won consecutive road games since January of 2010. Then, last Tuesday, the Minutemen erased a 17-point second-half deficit at Drexel and snap the Dragons 18-game home-court winning streak. The last time a UMass team won three-straight road games came during the 2008 NIT Final Four run when that group won four-straight away from Amherst, culminating with the epic come-from-behind win at Syracuse in the quarterfinals.
- UMass made some serious NIT history on Tuesday by becoming just the fourth team to win three road
 games en route to reaching the NIT semifinals. Since the tourney began using home sites in 1977, only
 Fresno State in 1998, Detroit in 2001 and Georgetown in 2003 reached Madison Square Garden via three
 road victories. Minnesota duplicated the feat with wins at La Salle, Miami (Fla.) and Middle Tennessee.

NIT QUARTERFINAL MAGIC LIVES ON

- UMass improved to 3-2 in NIT quarterfinal games with its improbable 72-70 come-from-behind win at Drexel on Tuesday. All three wins have come in dramatic fashion and hold a special spot in school history.
- The 82-80 overtime win at Siena in 1991 saw UMass erase a 10-point second-half deficit and Tony Barbee make a buzzer-beating 3-pointer to force the extra session moment's after the Knickerbocker Arena announcer invited fans to sign up for a bus trip to the NIT semifinals at Madison Square Garden in New York.
- Four years ago at Syracuse, the Minutemen again faced an uphill battle, trailing by 22 points with 14:30 left before they started raining threes all over the Carrier Dome. UMass made 9-of-13 from outside over the final 14 minutes to win 81-77 and become the first team to ever beat Syracuse at home twice in the same season.

UMASS' 20-WIN SEASON & MARCH SUCCESS

- The Minutemen picked up their 20th win of the season on March 3 with the 89-83 win over Rhode Island in the regular-season finale. It marked the 15th time in history that UMass reached the mark and the first in head coach Derek Kellogg's four seasons.

- With 25 wins this season, UMass has tied for the fifth-most wins in school history with the 2007-08 NIT runner-up squad (25-11).
- The 10-win improvement from last season's 15 wins is tied for the secondhighest jump in school history, matching the increase from 20 wins in 1990-91 to 30 in 1991-92 in John Calipari's third to fourth years at UMass. The school record of 11 win jump is held by Travis Ford's 2006-07 squad - his second in Amherst - which won 24 games en route to the NIT Second Round following a 13-win campaign in 2005-06.

UMass men's basketball head coach Derek Kellogg, on the eve of the Minutemen's season opener, announced the signing of 6-9 center Tyler Bergantino of Springhill, Fla. to a National Letter of Intent. The talented big man, now a senior at Nature Coast Technical High School in Brooksville, Fla., will join the program for the 2012-13 season.

"Tyler exemplifies exactly the type of person and player we want at UMass," Kellogg said. "He is an extremely high-character young man and plays the game at a high level at both ends of the floor. My staff, the team, the UMass community and I are all very excited to have Tyler joining the UMass basketball family."

At 6-9, 240 lbs., Bergantino is a physical force inside and possesses rapidly improving skill and touch around the basket. He enters his senior year at Nature Coast the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,150 career points. Bergantino is coming off a junior campaign in which he led all of Hernando County with averages of 17.9 points, 12.5 rebounds and 4.8 blocked shots. That followed up a sophomore season in 2009-10 in which he posted averages of 14.5 points, 10.9 rebounds and 5.2 blocks.

UMASS AT THE "WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS ARENA"

- All-time at Madison Square Garden, UMass has an 9-13 overall record entering the 2012 NIT Semifinals. UMass last played at the Garden in the 2008 NIT Final Four, defeating Florida (78-66) before falling to Ohio State (92-85) in the championship game. Prior to that, UMass split a pair of games at the 2005 Panasonic Holiday Festival, beating St. Peter's (66-49) and losing to St. John's (51-49) in the final.
- UMass has had two of the biggest wins in school history at the Garden, beating a ranked team for the first time ever and beating a No. 1 team for the first time ever.
- The Minutemen are 6-3 in regular-season games at the "Mecca of Basketball" including a 1-1 mark in the 1993 Preseason NIT and 5-2 in other regular-season games, mostly against metro New York area teams. The Minutemen are 2-9 in the postseason NIT, collecting victories

in 1973, over Missouri (78-71) -- the first win over a ranked team in school history and four years ago over Florida (78-66) in the semifinals.

- The most memorable game for UMass at the Garden came in the 1994 Preseason NIT. then-No. 18 UMass beat No. 1 North Carolina, 91-86 in overtime on Nov. 24, for the Minutemen's first win over a No. 1 ranked team in school history. Lou Roe led UMass with 28 points. With the big win and nation taking notice, the Minutemen played No. 6 Kansas tough two nights later but lost to the Jayhawks, 86-75 as Roe had a team-high 25 points.
- UMass played its first-ever game at MSG against St. Peter's. The then-Redmen beat St. Peter's 94-75 on Feb. 1, 1962. UMass played Iona in each of the next two seasons at the Garden, losing both times.
- UMass made its postseason NIT debut at the Garden in 1970, falling to Marquette, 62-55 on Mar. 14. Hall of Famer Julius Erving was held to just 18 points in the game -- only the second time that season he failed to score 20 in a game -- as he averaged 25.7 that season.
- In UMass' first postseason NIT win, coming at MSG, UMass defeated No. 15 Missouri, 78-71 on Mar. 17, 1972 for its first-ever win over a ranked team in school history after being 0-10 against Top 10 teams. Coached by UMass Hall of Famer Jack Leaman, former Boston College coach Al Skinner had 14 points and six rebounds in the win. UMass lost to No. 11 North Carolina in the second round, 73-63 on Mar. 20 as current Louisville coach Rick Pitino scored eight points.
- UMass advanced to the NIT Final Four for the first time in school history in 1991, playing at the Garden, but lost in the semifinals, 73-71 to Stanford on March 25, 1991. In the third place game, Colorado beat UMass, 98-91 on March 27.
- The Minutemen rode the momentum of the epic 22-point second-half comeback in the quarterfinals at Syracuse into the 2008 NIT Final Four, where they knocked off the two-time defending NCAA Champion Florida, 78-66, on April 1 before a 92-85 setback to Ohio State in the championship game on April 3..

HEAD COACH DEREK KELLOGG AT THE GARDEN

• Tuesday's game at the Garden will mark the first time Derek Kellogg has been to MSG as the head coach at UMass, but not his first overall as he played a pair of games during his junior season when the Minutemen participated in the 1993 Preseason NIT. As the starting point guard playing for then-head coach John Calipari, Kellogg was the primary ball-handler and play-maker as No. 18 UMass upset No. 1 North Carolina 91-86 in overtime on Nov. 24, 1993 in the semifinals before falling to No. 6 Kansas 86-75 two days later.

SERIES HISTORY WITH STANFORD & THE PACIFIC 12 CONFERENCE

- UMass and Stanford have met four LIMass vs. the Pac 12 previous times with each school claiming a pair of victories. Three of the games have occurred in postseason play, including the 1991 NIT Semifinal match-up when the Cardinal won 73-71 en route to the title.
- · Stanford won the first two meetings, 86-81, at the Hurricane Classic in West Palm Beach, Fla. on Dec. 29. 1986, and the aforementioned NIT

- Semifinal contest on Mar. 25, 1991. UMass has been victorious in the last two match-ups, both of which came in the second round of the NCAA Tournament - 75-53 as Nos. 2/10 seeds in Albany, N.Y. on March 19, 1995 and 79-74 as Nos. 1/9 seeds in Providence, R.I. on March 16, 1996.
- UMass has compiled a 7-6 record against teams currently in the Pacific 12 Conference. The Minutemen's last four games against Pac-12 schools have been with Utah twice and Oregon twice. UMass defeated the Utes 90-75 earlier this season in the Battle 4 Atlantis in Paradise Island, Bahamas on Nov. 25, 2011 and 69-53 in the 2002 Maui Invitational before splitting a neutral-site 'home-and-home' with the Ducks in 2000 & 2001. UMass outlasted UO, 62-58, in Springfield, Mass. on Nov. 27, 2001, but fell 91-76, in Portland, Ore. a season earlier on Dec. 2, 2000.

OFFENSE GETTING CLOSER TO GOING 'FULL UMASS', CLICKING ON ALL CYLINDERS IN THE POSTSEASON

- With head coach Derek Kellogg's transition to an up-tempo offense and fullcourt, trapping defense this season, there have been periods of play where the team has gone 'Full UMass' as he refers to it, but not too many where the style has been sustained for more than a game or two at a time. But that appears to be changing in recent weeks where the Minutemen have put together some very complete efforts.
- Over the last seven contests, UMass has averaged 86.3 points, while shooting .444 from the floor and .426 from outside. Even the free throw shooting is up from the season mark of .675 to .713. Six players in the eight-man rotation - and all five starters - are scoring at least 9.3 ppg, with First Team All-Conference PG Chaz Williams leading the team in scoring (20.9), assists (7.3) and steals (2.9).
- Expanding the microscope to the last nine games shows that the Minutemen have reached the 80-point plateau six times for the first time this season and averaged 8.8 made 3-pointers per game.
- On the defensive side of the ball, the UMass pressure defense has totaled 83 steals in the last 10 games for a 8.3 spg avg and outscored the opposition 18.9-14.5 in points off turnovers.

ROLE PLAYERS' IMPORTANCE OF LATE

- · With most opposing scouting reports keying on UMass' top scorers Chaz Williams, Raphiael Putney, Jesse Morgan and Terrell Vinson, the emerging role and importance of the next four scorers in the Minutemen rotation can't be understated.
- The guartet of Sean Carter, Freddie Riley, Javorn Farrell and Maxie Esho has each provided an above average game at some point in the past nine games - most recently Farrell who went for 16 points with seven in ovetime of the 101-96 win at Mississippi State in the NIT First Round. A week earlier he collected 20 points, seven rebounds and career highs in assists (9) and 3-pointers (3) in the A-10 Tourney win over Duguesne.
- Carter outplayed Mississippi State's Renardo Sidney with 20 points and 12 rebounds in a career-high 48 minutes in the NIT First Round. He also keyed the win over Rhode Island in the regular-season finale with his third career double-double and his first 20-plus point performance, finishing with 22 points, 10 boards (7 offensive) and three blocks. Riley had 12 points in 22 minutes off the bench in the win over Xavier (2/21). Despite falling to La Salle (2/18) by a point. Esho took over at times in the second half before posting a career- and game-high 18 points, along with six rebounds and

three steals. Esho also kept UMass within striking distance in last Saturday's A-10 Semifinal loss to SBU, as he registered 14 points and seven boards in 15 first-half minutes.

WE'RE PLAYIN' CHAZ-KETBALL

- With apologies to Lil' Bow Wow and his hit single "Basketball," UMass has been playing Chaz-ketball all season long with the immediate impact and transformation Chaz Williams has had on the program. While his exploits throughout the season have been well documented, the sophomore from Brooklyn has taken his game to another level during the postseason.
- In three NIT victories he has averaged 22.7 points, 6.3 rebounds, 5.3 assists and 1.7 steals, while shooting 56 pct. (23-for-41) from the floor and 53 pct. (8-for-15) from outside.
- In six postseason games this year (5-1 record) he has averaged 20.2 points, 5.8 rebounds, 5.8 assists and 2.2 steals, while shooting 49 pct. (35-for-72) from the floor, 55 pct. (12-for-22) from outside and 81 pct. (39-for-48) at the free throw line.
- His 608 total points this season are the 11th-highest single-season total in UMass history. He is the eighth player to reach the 600-point plateau and the fourth to do it in their sophomore season.

CHAZ WILLIAMS NAMED FIRST TEAM ALL-ATLANTIC 10: ADDS FIRST TEAM **NABC ALL-DISTRICT 4 HONORS**

- Redshirt sophomore PG Chaz Williams was named to the First Team All-Atlantic 10 squad as voted on by the 14 head coaches and added NABC All-District 4 First Team accolades a week later, becoming the first NABC honoree at UMass since Gary Forbes in 2007-08. Williams leads UMass in scoring (16.9 ppg), assists (6.3 apg), steals (2.3), 3-point FG pct (.425), FT pct. (.787) and minutes (34.9 mpg). He also ranks among the A-10 leaders in scoring (7th), assists (1st), steals (3rd), 3-point FG pct (5th) and assist-to-turnover ratio (t-4th, 1.9).
- In 16 A-10 games, the Brooklyn, N.Y. native posted the following stats: 15 double-figure scoring games ... 5 games with at least 20 points ... 3 doublefigure assist games ... 7 games with at least 9 assists ... 3 doubles-doubles with all coming in the last six games.
- The transfer from Hofstra is the 54th first team all-conference selection in school history and the first since 2007-08 when Gary Forbes was named the A-10 Player of the Year. UMass now has 20 first team honorees since the league's inception prior to the 1976-77 season.
- For Williams, it marks the second career postseason league honor following his selection to the Colonial Athletic Association All-Rookie Team when he played for current Fordham coach Tom Pecora at Hofstra during the 2009-10 campaign. He averaged 9.8 points and 4.2 assists while starting 20 games.
- St. Bonaventure senior forward Andrew Nicholson was named the Player of the Year and Temple's Fran Dunphy was named the Coach of the Year. Saint Joseph's sophomore forward C.J. Aiken was named the Defensive Player of the Year while Richmond Freshman Kendall Anthony was selected as the Rookie of the Year. Sophomore forward Ronald Roberts of Saint Joseph's was voted the Sixth Man of the Year and La Salle senior guard Earl Pettis earned the Chris Daniels Most Improved Player Award.

WILLIAMS NAMED TO ATLANTIC 10 ALL-CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM

- Despite not being able to lead the Minutemen into the title game of the Atlantic 10 Championship, Chaz Williams was named to the 5-member All-Championship team after averaging 16 points, 7.5 assists, 4.0 rebounds, a 3-to-1 assist-to-turnover ratio, 3.5 steals and 12-of-14 from the FT line in the team's two games in Atlantic City. Factoring in UMass' first round win over Duquesne at home and the Brooklyn native posted 17.7 points, 6.3 assists and 5.3 boards while making 4-of-7 from outside and 23-of-28 from the charity stripe in three tourney games.
- The remaining members of the All-Championship squad included Andrew Nicholson (MOP) and Demitrius Conger of tourney champ St. Bonaventure, and Tu Holloway and Mark Lyons of runner-up Xavier.

WILLIAMS IS GOOD AS ADVERTISED

- Redshirt sophomore point guard Chaz Williams has been given the responsibility of quarterbacking the Minutemen's new up-tempo offense and the transfer from Hofstra lived up to the billing, averaging 16.9 points and a league-leading 6.3 assists this season (13th in NCAA). He is shooting 43 percent from 3-point range and has an assist-turnover ratio of nearly 2-1. Defensively, he ranks 18th nationally in steals with 2.3 per game.
- In league play, he posted averages of 17.4 points (4th in A-10), 6.9 assists (1st) and 83.3 FT Pct (8th).
- Prior to a first-half miss against Saint Louis (1/28), Williams hit 33 consecutive free throws over a sixgame stretch which broke Donta Bright's (1996) single-season record for consecutive free throws made against conference opponents. The school record for the most consecutive made free throws is 40 which was also set by Bright in 1996.

- Williams has recorded 13 20-point games this season, with career-highs of 29 on 6-of-8 from outside against Xavier (2/21). He also has eight games with at least nine assists, including six of the last 12.
- Williams has posted five double-doubles this season with his last coming in the A-10 Quarterfinal win over No. 21 Temple. Williams, Kevin Dillard (Dayton) and Tu Holloway (Xavier) are the only players in the A-10 to post multiple double-figure assist games this season.

WILLIAMS ONE OF THE MOST COMPLETE POINT GUARDS IN THE NATION

You don't have to tell the followers of this year's Massachusetts team how special Chaz Williams is to the success of the squad. But to put things into perspective, consider that he is one of

just three players in Division I this year to average at least 16.0 points, 6.0 assists and 4.0 rebounds per game. The others are Tim Frazier of Penn State and Nate Wolters of South Dakota State.

WILLIAMS ON PACE TO BE FIRST TRUE POINT GUARD TO LEAD UMASS IN SCORING SINCE 1985

- A check of the UMass record book shows that Chaz Williams is on the verge
 of doing something that hasn't been done in nearly 30 years. As the team's
 leading scorer throughout the season, Williams looks to be the first true point
 guard to lead the Minutemen in scoring since 1984-85 when Donald Russell
 averaged 15.2 ppg. When adding Williams' team-leading categories of assists,
 steals and minutes into the fold, the timetable extends three more years to
 1981-82 when Russell lead UM with 16.4 ppg, 2.5 apg, 1.4 spg and 36.7 mpg.
- Some may recall that recent scoring leaders Ricky Harris (2009-10) and Shannon Crooks (2001-02) played the point, however historians will point out that they were shooting guards who happened to play the point guard position out of necessity in those seasons.

KEEP YOUR 'TV' TURNED ON AFTER HALFTIME

 Junior forward Terrell Vinson has turned in a pair of crucial second-half performances in the last two NIT games. Against Seton Hall in the second round, 'TV' finished with 10 points and seven rebounds, but all eight of his

- second-half scoring came in the final 6:22 which included the follow of a Chaz Williams 3-pointer with one of his own that pushed the margin to 71-64 with 1:30 left. Three days later in the quarterfinals at Drexel, the Baltimore, Md., native scored 14 of his 18 points after the intermission.
- In the 2nd half of the last two games he is averaging 11.0 points on 9-of-16 (.563) shooting and a team-high 4.0 rebounds.

MORGAN SHOWS THE BROTHERLY LOVE

UMass fans are hoping guard Jesse Morgan can replicate his strong play
ifrom four games in his hometown of Philadelphia into more above average
performances in New York City this week. In four contests at La Salle, Saint
Joseph's, Temple and Drexel, he averaged 17.0 points and 3.3 rebounds while
shooting 44.4 pct. from the floor and 45 pct. from outside. Those numbers
are all well ahead of his season averages of 10.1 ppg, 2.9 rpg with shooting
percentages of 40.1 and 36.8, respectively.

MORGAN'S PERFECT RHODE ISLAND GAME

 Jesse Morgan was 9-for-9 from the field, including 6-for-6 from 3-point range for 25 points in the win over Rhode Island (3/3). ESPN Stats & Info provided the following nugget: He's the first player to take at least nine field goals and six 3s without missing since Oregon's Brice Taylor was 11-for-11 from the field and 7-for-7 from 3-point range in the 2007 Pac-10 Tournament championship game.

CARTER DEMANDING RESPECT INSIDE

- While he may not be the stat sheet stuffer that some of his teammates have become, senior Sean Carter's play has remained strong throughout the season and been near dominant at times in the postseason. He ranks fifth in the Atlantic 10 in field goal pct. (.567) and 11th in rebounding (6.5), while leading the team in board work 14 times. His numbers in league play are even more impressive, where he finished the season 2nd in FG pct. (.653) and 16th in rebounds (6.5).
- The Fayetteville, N.C. native has posted 11 double-figure scoring games this season, including a pair of 20-plus point performances. Four of his five career double-doubles have come this season with top performances on in the first two rounds of the NIT at Mississippi State (20p/12r) and at Seton Hall (11p/11r). He also was solid in the regular-season finale against Rhode Island (22p/10r) on Senior Day.

DUNK YOU VERY MUCH

- Its no secret that dunks can play a big role in exciting the crowd and shifting
 a game's momentum, and UMass has a pair of players who can bring the
 house down on any given night. Senior Sean Carter and sophomore Raphiael
 Putney have combined for 81 of the team's 126 slams this season.
- Carter leads the team with 52 thus far, including a season-best five at Rhode Island (2/1/12). In fact, of his 115 made buckets this season, 47 pct. have come from above the rim. In his three seasons since transferring from Oregon State he has led UMass in dunks each year and produced 102 (27, 23 & 52) rim rockers out of 238 field goals good for 43 pct.
- Conversely, Putney uses his long, athletic frame to find ways to reach the basket that most players can't manage. He has 27 dunks, with a good number of those on alley-oops and fast breaks. His soaring throwdown in transition against Saint Joseph's was named ESPN's No. 8 Play of the Day (Jan. 14, 2012), the No. 4 Play of the Week (Jan. 16, 2012) and is also a nominee for the GEICO Play of the Year.

PUTNEY NOMINATED FOR DUNK OF THE YEAR

- Raphiael Putney's alley-oop dunk from half court against St. Bonaventure (2/8/12) has been nominated for Dunk of the Year! The Dunk of the Year competition is part of the Dunks of the Year special which airs on ESPN2 March 26.
- Each week for four weeks, six rim-rattling dunks will be nominated for Dunk of the Year. Two winners from each week will be determined by fan voting through the official Facebook page (facebook.com/DunksOfTheYear). The eight finalists will compete in a two-week voting competition to determine the Dunk of the Year. The winner will be announced during the Dunks of the Year special which airs Monday, March 26 on ESPN2.

UMASS ONE OF A-10'S TOP SCORING TEAMS

- At an average clip of 77.3 points per game, UMass is the top-ranked scoring team in the Atlantic 10 and 15th nationally. The Minutemen are one of eight teams in the league to average over 70 points per game.
- UMass is also the fifth-ranked team in the league in terms of scoring margin at plus-4.9 over opponents. Saint Louis (+11.7), La Salle (+6.7), Temple (+6.1) and St. Bonaventure (+5.7) are the only A-10 teams to have margins higher than the Minutemen.

UMASS POSSESSING AT A HIGH RATE

Logic says that the more you have the ball the more opportunities you have
to score, and that's exactly what head coach Derek Kellogg has accomplished
this season with the conversion from the dribble-drive motion offense to the
up-tempo, full-court press gameplan. UMass leads the nation in total possessions (2,691), ranks second in field goal attempts (2,273) and is seventh
in possessions per game (74.8).

MINUTEMEN SOLID WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF

- UMass is 18-1 (loss came in OT at Temple on 2/29) this season when leading
 at halftime and 7-9 when trailing at the break. In the seven wins when they
 have been behind, the largest deficit overcome to win was on Tuesday at
 Drexel, when the Minutemen were down 10 at the break. Drexel eventually
 led by 17 in the 2nd half before UMass mounted a comeback.
- The Minutemen's largest lead at the half was 19 on two occassions at East Carolina (12/6/11) and against Saint Louis (2/2/12).
- In the last three seasons, UMass is 38-6 (.863) overall and 23-2 (.917) at the Mullins Center when leading at the half.

SHARP SHOOTING

- UMass has shot .437 from the floor this season after posting a .401 shooting
 percentage a season ago. Much of the improvement can be attributed to the
 new up-tempo, fastbreaking offense that Derek Kellogg has implemented this
 season. Taking advantage of the long, athletic players on his roster, Kellogg's
 offense has resulted in higher percentage shots in transition.
- The 2,273 field goal attempts thus far are the second-highest single-season total in school history and the most since the 2006-07 squad took a record 2,281 shots.
- Along those same lines the 3-point line to be exact this season's bunch ranks in the top-3 at UMass in 3-pointers made (2nd, 283) and attempted (2nd, 803).

MINUTEMEN WITH SHARPSHOOTERS UP AND DOWN THE ROSTER

- UMass averages 7.9 3-point field goals per game, which ranks first in the Atlantic 10 and 37th nationally. The Minutemen have made 283 triples this season to rank second all-time in school history.
- UMass is one of just four schools in Division I with four players who have made at least 50 treys. The others are Florida, Iowa State and Youngstown State. All told, six of the players among the eight-man rotation are legitimate outside threats.

BALANCED SCORING AMONG ROTATION

- With UMass utilizing a shorter bench that has employed eight players due to injuries, one would think that the same two or three guys would dominate the box score on a regular basis, but that's been the case with this team. Since the start of A-10 play on Jan. 5, five different players have led the team in scoring, five in rebounding, three in assists, six in steals and six in blocks.
- In 16 games this season, UMass has had four or more players reach doublefigure point totals, translating into an 13-3 record. Against Utah, Davidson, Central Connecticut, and Fordham, five Minutemen reached double-figures in the scoring column.

OUTSIDE SHOOTING+PROTECT THE BALL=WIN

- It's a simple formula, but when UMass is able to shoot the ball from outside and keep turnovers to a minimum, chances are the Minutemen win. In 25 games won this year, UMass is 218-of-563 from three-point land and average 13.8 turnovers per game. In 11 games lost, UMass is just 65-of-240 from deep and average 17.0 turnovers.
- Sharing the ball is also a key. The Minutemen average 16.8 assists in wins this year, while that number drops to 12.3 in losses.

CLEARING THE BOARDS

 UMass has been solid on the boards this season averaging 39.3 rebounds per game - that places the Minutemen first in the Atlantic 10 and 13th nationally.
 The Minutemen have outrebounded their opponents 18 times this season and are 13-5 in those contests.

BRINGING THE DEFENSIVE PRESSURE

- To go with the new up-tempo offense, Derek Kellogg has the Minutemen pressing and trapping more on defense in 2011-12. The new attacking defensive style has worked extremely well thus far as the Minutemen have forced an average of 16.6 turnovers per game and scored 21.1 points per game off those takeaways.
- UMass has collected a school record 321 steals on the year, translating to 8.9 steals per game. The Minutemen have recorded double-digit steals in 14 games, including three of their last five and two of their three NIT contests. Also, the 8.9 spg avg is second only to the 9.0 avg set in 1999-2000.
- In the A-10 Quarterfinal win over #21/24
 Temple, the Owls committed a seasonhigh-tying 22 turnovers, marking the
 ninth time an opponent has had at least
 20 miscues in a game. UMass has scored at
 least 20 points off its opponents 15 times
 this season, topping 30 points four times.
- In its 36-point win at Boston College on Nov. 21, UMass turned 23 Eagles turnovers into 28 points and outscored them 28-6 over the final 10:30 of the game.

- In the win vs. Northeastern (11/14), UMass forced 21 turnovers and scored 26 points off turnovers. Sampson Carter led the defense with three steals.
- The Minutemen held the Huskies to just 38 percent shooting in the game, including a 9.1 percent mark from behind the arc.
- In the opener vs. Elon, UMass forced 25 Phoenix turnovers and scored 34 points
 off those turnovers, including 12 fast-break points. Jesse Morgan led the
 defensive charge with a career-high five steals in 17 minutes. UMass finished
 with 14 steals total.

KEY IMPROVEMENTS OVER LAST SEASON

- Throughout the season, a trio of players have made significant strides over their 2010-11 averages.
- Jesse Morgan played in just 12 games last season averaging 4.4 points in almost 11 minutes per game. This year, the combo point guard/two guard is averaging 10.1 points in 26.9 minutes.
- Raphiael Putney has increased his scoring from 4.4 points to 10.2 points and is averaging over two more rebounds per game (3.0-to-5.9).
- After having a strong freshman campaign in 2009-10, Terrell Vinson saw his scoring dip from 9.6 points per game to 6.5 last season. This year he is back to form averaging 10.0 points in 26.0 minutes per game.

HOME SWEET HOME AT MULLINS

- UMass completed its home schedule with a 15-1 record this season. The 12 consecutive home wins to start the season (11-0 at Mullins, 1-0 at The Cage) was the best since 1993-94 when the squad was a perfect 14-0 at home.

Mullins Center

- The 11-consecutive wins at the Mullins Center are the third-longest skein since the facility opened 19 years ago. UMass won its first 27 games in the building.
- UMass completed its 19th season of play at the William D. Mullins Memorial Center and has posted an all-time record of 192-75 (.719). The Minutemen also own a 103-49 (.676) all-time record in regular season Atlantic 10 Conference games at the Mullins Center, and a 4-2 mark in Atlantic 10 Tournament contests.
- Including this season's record, UMass has gone 29 consecutive seasons without having a losing record on its home court.

UMASS AGAINST RANKED FOES

- As a result of the 77-71 win over #21 Temple in the A-10 Quarterfinals, UMass is 31-74 vs. AP Top-25 teams all-time with four wins since 2004. The Minutemen have played three games against a ranked foe this season against #22 Florida State at the Battle 4 Atlantis on Nov. 24, at #23 Temple in Philadelphia on Feb. 29 and against #21 Temple on Friday in Atlantic City, N.J.
- UMass had lost its last seven against ranked schools dating back to a 61-60 win over #25 Kansas at the Sprint Center in Kansas City on Dec. 13, 2009. Derek Kellogg is now 2-8 against Top-25 teams.

ESHO NAMED ATLANTIC 10 ROOKIE OF THE WEEK (2/20)

- Redshirt freshman Maxie Esho was named the Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week following his performance against La Salle (2/18) two weeks ago. Esho poured in a career-high 18 points on 7-of-9 shooting to lead all scorers. He also added six rebounds and three steals in a career-high-tying 22 minutes.
- This markes Esho's first weekly award and the second for UMass this season.
 Raphiael Putney was named the Co-Player of the Week on Jan. 30. The last time a UMass player earned Rookie of the Week honors was two years ago when Terrell Vinson garnered the award on Dec. 20, 2009.

LALANNE TAKES PRESEASON A-10 HONOR

- The Atlantic 10 Conference announced its preseason awards at its annual men's basketball media day in Brooklyn on Oct. 13 with UMass freshman Cady Lalanne being named to the All-Rookie Team. The forward from Orlando, Fla. is the first Minuteman named All-Rookie since Freddie Riley and Terrell Vinson in 2009.
- Joining Lalanne on the All-Rookie Team are Dezmine Wells (Xavier), Jerrell Wright (La Salle), Justin Martin (Xavier), Alonzo Nelson-Odada (Richmond) and Anthony Lee (Temple).
- Lalanne joins the Minutemen following becoming eligible per NCAA rules after attending UMass as a student in 2010-11. The 6-8 big man played at Oak Ridge HS in Orlando, Fla. and his AAU ball with the Florida Rams.

UMASS LED BY ONE OF ITS OWN

- Derek Kellogg, in his fourth season, is the first UMass alum to serve as the head coach of his alma mater since Tom McLaughlin, who coached the Minutemen from 1981-83. Kellogg graduated from UMass in 1995 where he was an All-Atlantic 10 selection in 1995. McLaughlin graduated from UMass in 1973 where he was one of three future head coaches on the team. He was joined by former Boston College head coach Al Skinner and current Louisville coach Rick Pitino.
- Kellogg is not the only current head coach from the UMass rosters in the mid-90s as Tony Barbee is in his second year as the head coach at Auburn. In his first season with the Tigers, Barbee's squad went 11-20 overall and 4-12 in the SEC after taking UTEP to the NCAA Tournament the previous season. Alum Harper Williams was named to Barbee's staff this summer. The pair were at UMass' Nov. 17 win against NJIT in Amherst.
- Prior to McLaughlin, the last UMass alum to lead his alma mater was Lorin Ball (Class of 1921), who coached the team from 1945-52.

GAME 1 - Season Opener At The Cage UMASS 85, ELON 67

Nov. 11, 2011 • Curry Hicks Cage

AMHERST, Mass. - Playing just its second game in 18 years at the historic Curry Hicks Cage, UMass men's basketball (1-0) used a 21-4 run early in the second half to erase a four-point halftime deficit and cruise to a 85-67 victory over Elon (0-1) on Friday night. Sophomore transfer Chaz Williams led the way with 18 points and eight assists. Juniors Sampson Carter (17), Terrell Vinson (17) and Javorn Farrell (13) rounded out UMass' four double-digit scorers.

The Minutemen used a new running and pressing style and a raucous Cage crowd to force 25 Elon turnovers, scoring 32 points off those turnovers. Jesse Morgan led the charge on defense with a career-high five steals.

In his first game in a UMass uniform, Williams, a transfer from Hofstra, was the catalyst all night for the Minutemen, grabbing six rebounds and coming up with 3 steals to go with his 18 points and eight assists.

Vinson recorded the fourth double-double of his career, leading all players with 11 rebounds. After Elon took a four-point lead into the half, and a quick jumper to start the second half gave Elon its largest lead of the game, 45-39 with 19:46 remaining, the Minutemen went on a charge, outscoring the Phoenix 21-4 over the next 5:09 to take an 11-point lead, 60-49 with 14:37 left. Sampson Carter scored eight points in the run that included 11 UMass points off turnovers.

Javorn Farrell hit a 3-pointer with 6:06 left in the second half that put UMass' lead over 20 points for the first time, 77-55.

For the game, UMass shot 44.3 percent from the field, while Elon shot 34.4 percent. The Minutemen finished 25-of-36 from the free throw line, and scored 12 fast-break points to Elon's two.

The Minutemen jumped out to an early 8-2 lead, forcing four Elon turnovers in the first four minutes. UMass reached its largest lead of the opening half , 21-13, on a Sean Carter dunk off a Chaz Williams assist with 11:53 remaining, but the Phoenix would battle back, using 14-of-17 free throw shooting, to take a four-point lead, 43-39 into halftime.

UMass forced 13 Elon turnovers in the half, scoring 13 points off those turnovers.

Lucas Troutman led all scorers in the first half with 11 points, while Williams paced the Minutemen with 10 points and four assists.

The Huskies chipped away, drawing within nine points with 3:05 left in the half, but UMass used three steals, two by Sampson Carter, to score seven transition points in the final two minutes and take a 40-28 lead into halftime.

Vinson led the way in the first half with 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting while Williams racked seven assists.

AMHERST, Mass. - Four double-figure scoring efforts, including a double-double from Terrell Vinson, led UMass men's basketball to a 79-58 victory over NJIT (1-2) at the Mullins Center on Thursday night and closed out the Minutemen's season-opening homestand at 3-0. Vinson scored 13 points and grabbed 11 rebounds, while Javorn Farrell (17), Chaz Williams (15) and Raphiael Putney (12) all reached double digits in points.

Freshman center Cady Lalanne grabbed a career-high 14 rebounds to go with six points in 15 minutes, while Williams dished out a game-high nine assists.

After a Chris Flores basket cut the UMass lead to 11 with 9:05 left, the Minutemen ran off 11-straight points, finished off with a Freddie Riley jumper that gave UMass a 21-point lead, 63-41 with 6:53 left in the game and allowed the home team to cruise to victory.

GAME 4 - Commonwealth Classic UMASS 82, BOSTON COLLEGE 46 Nov. 21, 2011 • Conte Forum

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. - Led by a stifling defense that forced 23 turnovers that led to 28 points, UMass beat Boston College, 82-46 in the Commonwealth Classic on Monday night at Conte Forum. The Minutemen (4-0) outscored the Eagles (1-2), 28-6 over the final 10 and a half minutes to turn an 11-point halftime lead into a 36-point win, the largest margin of victory in the 45 games between the in-state rivals.

Chaz Williams scored a game-high 16 points, dished out five assists, and had three steals. Freddie Riley (14), Cady Lalanne (11), and Jesse Morgan (11) completed the Minutemen's quartet of double figure scorers.

Besides forcing 23 turnovers while allowing just 11, the Minutemen also dominated the glass, winning the rebounding battle 46-31. The UMass bench outscored BC's 35-8.

The Eagles cut their deficit from 19 down to 14, 54-40 with 10:36 to go, 3-pointers by Jesse Morgan and five-straight points from Freddie Riley began the Minutemen run where they outscored the Eagles 28-6 the rest of the way to cruise to victory.

The 36-point win beats the previous biggest margin of victory in the UMass-BC series, a 30-point Minutemen victory on Dec. 12, 1998 in Worcester. It is UMass' biggest victory over any opponent since beating La Salle by 37, 100-63 on March 5, 2008.

After leading by 11 at the half, 37-26, the Minutemen built their lead to 19, 54-35 on Sampson Carter bucket with 13:15 left in the game, and after BC knocked its deficit back to 14 momentarily, gave the Minutemen a 8-2 spurt that pushed the lead to 20, 62-42 with 7:54 to go.

The Eagles took their biggest lead in the first half, 16-8 with 14:34 left, but the Minutemen cranked up the defensive pressure, holding BC scoreless for nearly five minutes and to just 10 points the rest of the half. Williams gave UMass its first lead since 2-0 when he made a steal and floater in the lane making it 21-20 and forcing a BC timeout with 8:33 left in the first half.

It would turn into a 29-10 run to end the first half to give UMass a 37-26 lead at halftime. It was a balanced attack for the Minutemen as nine players scored in the opening 20 minutes and none with more than six (Williams).

The victory was UMass' first over BC since 2007 and first over a BCS conference school since Dec. 13, 2008 (Kansas).

GAME 5 - Battle 4 Atlantis Round 1 #22 FLORIDA STATE 73, UMASS 53 Nov. 26, 2011 • Imperial Arena

PARADISE ISLAND, Bahamas - A 16-4 run to end the first half erased a one-point UMass lead and led No. 22/20 Florida State (5-0) to a 73-53 victory over the Minutemen (4-1) in a physical first round game that featured 52 total fouls and 50 free throws on Thanksgiving afternoon at the Battle 4 Atlantis in the Bahamas.

It was a physical contest throughout as UMass was whistled for 30 fouls and Florida State was called for 22. Four technical fouls were called in the game, two against each team. The Seminoles went 30-for-39 at the line, while the Minutemen were 13-for-21.

Raphiael Putney led the Minutemen with 11 points, Maxie Esho netted 10 and Javorn Farrell added nine. Chaz Williams dished out a game-high six assists to go with eight points.

FSU's Michael Snaer led all scorers with 18 points and grabbed 10 rebounds. Okaro White also had a double-double with 11 points and 11 boards.

Both sides struggled to shoot at Imperial Arena. The Minutemen shot 28 percent for the game including 2-of-23 from 3-point range. The Seminoles shot 35 percent and were 3-of-12 from behind the arc.

After the Seminoles jumped out to a 15-6 lead with 11:44 left in the first half, the Minutemen responded with a 14-4 run fueled by pressure defense. Two free throws by Raphiael Putney finished off the run and gave UMass its first lead of the game, 21-20 with 5:09 left in the half.

The Seminoles responded with 16-4 run to close out the half and take an 11-point lead, 36-25, into the half.

The FSU lead reached as much 17 points, 45-28 with just under 15 minutes to go, but the Minutemen were able to run off seven straight points to cut it back to an 11 point game, 45-35, with 12:53 to go, thanks to a Putney 3-pointer and free throws from Sampson Carter and Maxie Esho after the defense came up with two steals in a row.

Fouls and FSU free throws took their toll down the stretch however, as Farrell and Putney both foulded out.

GAME 6 - Battle 4 Atlantis Round 2 UMASS 89, UTAH 75

Nov. 27, 2011 • Imperial Arena

PARADISE ISLAND, Bahamas - The combination 15-of-30 3-point shooting and a defense that scored 31 points off 19 turnovers, UMass (5-1) cruised to an 89-75 victory over Utah (1-4) in the second round of the Battle 4 Atlantis in the Bahamas on Friday night. Jesse Morgan scored 15 points, all in the first half on 5-of-5 3-point shooting, as the Minutemen put five players in double figures for the first in two years.

Chaz Williams scored 14 points, dished out seven assists and had five steals. He and Morgan were joined in double figures by Javorn Farrell (13), Freddie Riley (13), and Raphiael Putney (12).

By forcing 19 turnovers with its fullcourt press, combined with 12 offensive rebounds, UMass took 22 more shots in the game than the Utes, who shot 60 percent from the floor. The Minutemen shot 50.7 percent for the game.

The last time UMass had five players in double figures scoring was two years and one day ago, on Nov. 24, 2009 against St. Francis (NY). The team's 15 3-pointers were one shy of the school record, set Feb. 25, 2009 against Duquesne.

Utah was led by Josh Watkins with 16 points and seven assists.

They Minutemen built on nine-point halftime lead with good shooting that carried over into the second half. Putney scored seven of eight UMass points on four successive possessions to extend UMass' lead to 19, 73-54 with 9:44 left, and a Farrell lay-up with 7:14 left pushed the lead to 20, 77-57.

UMass took a 44-35 lead into halftime, led by 15 points from Morgan on 5-of-5 3-point shooting and 11 points from Farrell. The Minutemen scored 15 points off 12 first-half Utah turnovers, most caused by the UMass press. to make up for the Utes shooting 68 percent.

Trailing by five, 24-19, UMass went on a 16-4 run that included four 3-pointer, two by Morgan and one each from Putney and Farrell to take a 35-28 lead with 5:49 left in the first half.

Morgan's hot hand would continue down the stretch of the first half with his fifth three in five attempts giving the Minutemen a 41-33 lead with 3:36 left.

After the Utes jumped out to an early 8-3 lead, the UMass fullcourt press began to force turnovers and easy baskets. Sean Carter recorded three dunks in transition and Terrell Vinson added another, but Utah made nine of its first 11 shots to give it a 19-16 lead just under seven minutes into the game.

PARADISE ISLAND, Bahamas - A day after putting on a red-hot 3-point shooting performance of its own, UMass (5-2) fell victim to stellar outside shooting in Saturday's finale of the Battle 4 Atlantis, falling to the College of Charleston, 85-61, as the Cougars (5-1) shot 12-of-23 from behind the arc. Cady Lalanne led the Minutemen with 12 points on 5-of-6 shooting.

The Cougars used a 20-4 run between the 12:38 and 6:50 marks of the second half to turn a five-point lead into a 68-47 advantage.

The Minutemen shot 34.7 percent overall and were 4-of-28 from 3-point range. The Cougars shot 50.9 percent from the field and were even better from 3-point range at 52.2 percent.

Charleston's Anthony Stitt and Antwaine Wiggins each scored 23 points and were 5-of-8 and 3-of-5, respectively, behind the arc.

A day after coming within one of the school record for made 3-pointers with 15, the Minutemen missed their first eight shots from behind the arc against the Cougars, falling behind by as much as seven on two occasions in the first half, but went four for its next eight from long range, including two from Morgan, to go into halftime down by four, 38-34.

Morgan led UMass with eight points in the first half, while Stitt led all scorers with 13. The Cougars were 5-of-10 from behind the arc in the half, but a 22-16 rebounding edge, nine of which came at the offensive end, kept the Minutemen within four.

The Minutemen never let their deficit reach more than seven until three free throws by Sundberg after he was fouled by Putney on a 3-point attempt gave the Cougars an eight-point lead, 51-43, and Stitt followed with a 3-pointer to make it an 11-point game, 54-43 and force a UMass timeout with 11:01 remaining.

Sean Carter had a near-double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, and Jesse Morgan added 10 points as well.

The Minutemen pulled down 24 offensive boards in the game, converting them into 18 second chance points.

AMHERST, Mass. - The UMass men's basketball team was able to improve to 10-3, Thursday night, as the Minutemen defeated Davidson, 73-65. UMass remains undefeated in the friendly confines of the Multins Center now at a record of 5-0; 6-0 overall in home games including the season-opener at the Cage. The Minutemen are riding a four-game win streak going into next Friday's match-up against Central Connecticut. Jesse Morgan led the Minutemen with 14 points, while Maxie Esho had a career-high 12 points.

All told, five players reached double-figures in the scoring column for UMass, while Sean Carter hauled in a season-high 10 rebounds. Along with Esho and Morgan, Raphiael Putney, Chaz Williams, and Javorn Farrell each scored 10 points.

Davidson (7-4) was led by De'Mon Brooks who scored a game-high 22 points and added eight rebounds. Tyler Kalinoski added 12 points off the bench for the Wildcats.

A Putney three-pointer with 15:45 left in the first half gave UMass an 11-9 lead early, but Davidson responded with a 12-2 run to take a 21-13 lead over the next four minutes. A lay-up by Putney for his 10th point of the game stemmed the run.

With Davidson up 26-17, the Minutemen responded with an 9-0 run of their own. A pair of Maxie Esho free throws tied the game at 26-26 with 4:37 left before halftime.

Momentum once again shifted the way of the Wildcats to close out the half as Davidson used a 9-3 run to go into the break up 35-29.

The game of runs continued in the first six minutes of the second half with UMass putting together a 17-4 run sparked by five points from Morgan and a four-point play from Maxie Esho. Esho added a put-back with 12:53 left giving UMass a seven-point lead 46-39 - its largest of the game.

Tom Droney hit a three from the left wing with 12:24 to go to pull Davidson back within four and sparking an 8-0 run which gave the Wildcats a 47-46 lead.

Back-to-back three-pointers by Freddie Riley put UMass back up 52-47 with 9:17 left in the second half.

The teams traded baskets for nearly the next six minutes until a pair of free throws by Davidson's Jake Cohen cut UMass' lead to one, 58-57, with 3:30 left to go.

Four points from Javorn Farrell, a three-pointer from Terrell Vinson and a pair of key rebounds by Sean Carter extended UMass' lead to 10, 69-59, with a minute to go.

Davidson hit a pair of three pointers in the final 43 seconds, but UMass countered with 4-of-6 free throws to preserve the lead and the win.

AMHERST, Mass. - Using a 32-point scoring edge, the second-largest winning margin of the year, the UMass men's basketball team defeated Central Connecticut State on Friday evening, 97-65, improving to 7-0 at home this season. Five different Minutemen reached double-digit scoring, as Raphiael Putney and Chaz Williams paced UMass with 18 each.

The Minutemen have now won five straight contests, finishing the non-conference portion of their schedule with an 11-3 record. Freddie Riley (14 points), Cady Lalanne (12 points), and Terrell Vinson (10 points) combined for 36 of UMass' 97 point effort. The Minutemen's bench continued to dominate its opponent, scoring 37 points among the non-starters compared to CCSU's 16.

On the boards, UMass controlled the Blue Devils, 48-25. Cady Lalanne and Putney eached raked in eight rebounds for the Minutemen, while Sean Carter grabbed seven. Lalanne tied his career-high scoring with 12 points, last accomplished against the College of Charleston on Nov. 26.

The Minutemen got off to a quick 18-6 lead 6:07 into the first half. Williams propelled the 47 point first half effort by tallying 12 points, en route to his seventh straight game in double-figure scoring. The redshirt sophomore also dished out four assists.

Following a 12-3 run beginning at 17:15 in the second frame, the Minutemen never looked back. Putney highlighted the latter 20 minutes with 13 points and four rebounds, ending the game with a career-high 18 points. UMass ended the stanza on a 20-3 run commencing with 10:20 remaining in regulation.

Leading the way for CCSU was Robby Ptacek with 21 points. UMass was able to hold the nation's third best scorer, Ken Horton, to just 16 points on 5-of-11 shooting. Horton came into the game averaging 22.5 points per game.

The Minutemen outshot CCSU .543 (38-70) to .349 (22-63) from the field. Andrew Mc-Carthy added a career high six points for the Minutemen in as many minutes on the court.

AMHERST, Mass. - The UMass men's basketball team pulled out a hard-fought 80-76 win over Fordham extending its win streak to six straight games and starting the Atlantic 10 season with a win at the Mullins Center on Thursday night. The Minutemen had a balanced scoring offense with five players in double figures with Chaz Williams leading the team with 20 points. The win improves UMass to 12-3 overall and 1-0 in the A-10, while Fordham falls to 7-7 overall, 0-1 in the league.

Raphiael Putney recorded his first career double-double, ending the game with 10 points and 10 rebounds, while Terrell Vinson also recorded a double-double, his third of the season and sixth of his career, scoring 14 points and grabbing a career high 14 rebounds.

Freddie Riley tallied 13 points in just 18 minutes of play off the bench. Jesse Morgan was also a key contributor with 12 points and two steals.

Fordham's Chris Gaston and Kervin Bristol each had double-doubles to lead the Rams. Gaston had 16 points and 18 rebounds, while Bristol posted 11 points and 12 rebounds. Branden Frazier led Fordham with 19 points, while Bryan Smith rounded out the top scorers with 14.

The Minutemen went five of eight from beyond the arc in the first seven minutes of the second half, starting with two from Williams and ending with two from Vinson. UMass went on a 14-0 run in the middle of the half, but Fordham battled back to within four on a 14-6 run. The rest of the half stayed close, with Fordham taking the Minuteman lead down to one with 17 seconds left in the game. Free throw shooting decided the game, with Williams hitting three, and Lamount Samuell of Fordham missing his two attempts.

The Minutemen struggled to put together an offense in the first half, but managed to end it with the lead (33-32) off of a 7-1 run in the last three minutes, punctuated by a Putney alley-oop dunk with 14 seconds left. Riley led the team in points in the half with eight, hitting two of six from beyond the arc. Putney was key on defense, grabbing six defensive boards.

Fordham's shooting percentages were better in all categories, with the biggest differential coming at the line where the Rams shot 70 percent and UMass shot 59.5 percent. The Minutemen ended the night shooting 37.3 percent from the field.

PHILADELPHIA - Chaz Williams scored a career-high 24 points and Jesse Morgan added a career-high 20 points, but it was not enough as the UMass men's basketball team mounted a second-half rally that fell just short with the Minutemen falling 82-75 at La Salle on Sunday afternoon. After trailing by 26 points at halftime, UMass went on a 21-6 run to start the second half sparked by eight points from Morgan.

With the loss, UMass falls to 12-4 overall and 1-1 in the Atlantic 10, while La Salle improves to 12-4 and 2-0 in the league.

Morgan, a native of Philadelphia, led the Minutemen in the first half with 11 points, but the Explorers were hot from beyond the arc hitting 10-of-16 three-pointers.

Along with his 22 points, Morgan finished the game with four steals, three rebounds and a blocked shot. Williams added five assists to his 24 point effort. Sean Carter rounded out UMass' top scorers with a career-high 18 points along with six rebounds.

The Explorers opened the game with an 11-2 lead after UMass went 1-for-7 from the floor in the game's first six minutes of play. La Salle converted 16 UMass turnovers into 20 points which alongside the hot shooting from outside gave the Explorers a 51-25 lead at halftime.

Thanks to UMass' 21-6 run to start the second half, the Minutemen were able to cut the lead down to 57-46 with 10:44 left.

Both teams traded baskets until a dunk by Carter followed by a traditional three-point play from Williams cut the lead to seven, 67-60, with 2:31 remaining in the game.

La Salle hit 11-of-13 free throws down the stretch as UMass extended the game with fouls and timeouts. The Minutemen were able to pull within five points twice in the final 32 seconds, but a dunk by Devon White sealed the win for the Explorers with 15 seconds left on the clock.

UMass finished the game shooting 41.9 percent (26-of-62) thanks in part to a strong shooting second half. La Salle finished the game hitting 47.3 percent of its shots (26-of-55) after hitting a blistering 57 percent in the first half.

AMHERST, Mass. - Using a late second half run the UMass men's basketball team was able to hold on and defeat Charlotte, 85-75, Wednesday night at the Mullins Center. The Minutemen converted on 13-of-14 free throw shots in a 17-6 run over the last four minutes of the game to seal the win. They remain undefeated at home posting a record of 9-0.

UMass (13-4, 2-1 A-10) was led by Raphiael Putney who tallied a career high 19 points and pulled down 10 rebounds. Chaz Williams also finished with 19 points and picked up six assists and five rebounds. Terrell Vinson finished with 18 points and seven boards. Sean Carter was a perfect 6-for-6 from the floor and finished with 15 points and eight rebounds.

Charlotte (9-6, 2-1 A-10) was led by junior center Chris Braswell who tallied a career high 31 points and went 10-for-11 from the charity stride.

The 49ers took their first lead and only lead of the game with 4:47 left in the second half. They used a 12-0 run that lasted two minutes giving them a 69-68 advantage. Over that stretch Charlotte was 6-for-6 from the floor forcing three UMass turnovers.

The Minutemen opened the game on a 21-6 scoring run that lasted over the first six and a half minutes. Carter and Vinson scored a combine 14 points over that stretch going 6-for-6 from the floor and 2-for-2 from beyond the arc. The Minutemen were able to score 10 points off five Charlotte turnovers in that time.

Charlotte was able to cut the Minutemen lead to six using a 18-8 run over six minutes of play and 13 first half points from Chris Braswell.

UMass extended its lead back to eleven going into halftime on five unanswered points from Putney. He finished the half with 12 points, five rebounds and three assists.

The Minutemen shot 55 percent (26-for-47) from the floor and 37 percent (7-for-19) from three point territory and 84 percent (26-31) from the free throw line for the game.

GAME 18 UMASS 71, SAINT JOSEPH'S 62 Jan. 14, 2012 • Mullins Center

AMHERST, Mass. - The UMass basketball team rallied from an early 17-point deficit to improve to 10-0 at home this season with a 71-62 victory over Saint Joseph's at the Mullins Center on Saturday. The win gives the Minutemen their best home start since 1992-93 and improves the squad to 14-4 on the year and 3-1 in A-10 play. The Hawks fall to 12-6 overall and 2-2 in the conference following the loss.

Sophomore Chaz Williams led the way for UMass with 22 points, aided by a 10-for-10 performance at the free throw line, while also handing out seven assists. Classmate Raphiael Putney had another standout game, scoring 17 and shooting 6-for-9, including 4-for-6 from deep, on the way to his second straight game in double figures. He also stole the ball a career high three times and totaled seven rebounds. Junior Terrell Vinson added 11 points and six boards and redshirt-senior Sean Carter was just shy of a double-double with eight points and a team-leading 10 rebounds.

Saint Joseph's started the first half on a 20-3 run, shooting 8-of-16 from the field, in the first seven minutes of the contest. The Minutemen struggled to start the game, going 1-for-11, but were able to battle back scoring 13 unanswered points in a three minute stretch. The run was sparked by a Putney dunk, who accounted for eight points, and a Riley three-pointer. UMass took their first lead of the game at 1:43 and ended the half leading 33-32.

Daryus Quarles hit the first shot of the second half, a three at 17:43 that put the Hawks on top 35-33, but Vinson hit an answering trey at the other end of the floor. C.J. Aiken's dunk moments later gave Saint Joseph's the lead for the final time before Williams' jumper at the 16:18 mark put the Minutemen in front for good. The margin did not expand beyond 10 as Saint Joseph's managed to pull within two several times, including with 2:27 to play, but UMass connected on 8-of-8 free throw attempts in the final 59 seconds to seal the victory.

The Minutemen shot 23-for-61 (37.7%) overall, compared to the Hawks' 25-for-59 (42.4%), but made up the difference from beyond the arc where UMass made 11-of-27 (40.7%), while limited Saint Joseph's to just 6-for-23 (26.1%) from long range.

Ronald Roberts led the Hawks with 16 points off the bench, while Aiken added a double-double on 10 points and 10 rebounds. Halil Kanacevic contributed 11 points, six rebounds, four assists and two blocks.

RICHMOND, Va. - A late 16-6 run in the second half propelled the UMass men's basketball team to a 79-68 win at Richmond on Saturday afternoon at the Robins Center. Jesse Morgan led the way with 20 points including a key three-pointer to spark the run after the Spiders had pulled within four points with 6:53 left in the game. The Minutemen (15-5, 4-2 A-10) will return home next Saturday to host Saint Louis in the Mullins Center at 2 PM.

Along with Morgan's 20 points, Chaz Williams netted 17 points and was just shy of a tripledouble with nine rebounds and seven assists. Sean Carter scored 15 points going 7-of-9 from the floor, while Maxie Esho scored 12 points in 20 minutes.

UMass extended that lead to seven points before Martel hit a three-pointer to keep the Spiders within three. Morgan answered with his three-pointer from the corner with 6:53 to spark the Minutemen's run closing out the game.

Both teams traded baskets early in the first half with UMass able to build a pair of sevenpoint leads midway through including a 19-12 advantage with 9:57 to go on a Morgan jumper.

The Spiders tied the game 23-23 on a Garrett dunk, but he was called for a technical foul after hanging on the rim. Williams converted a pair of free throws and then hit back-to-back field goals as UMass stretched its lead back to six, 29-23, with five minutes left in the half.

With 54 seconds left in the half, a pair of Kendall Anthony free throws cut the lead back to one, 32-31, but a Jayorn Farrell three pointer pushed the Minutemen back on top by four at the intermission.

The Minutemen finished the game shooting 28-of-58 (48.3%) and hit 19-of-22 free throws. Included in the impressive shooting from the charity stripe was a 10-for-10 effort from Williams. He has now hit 32 consecutive which ties the UMass record for consecutive free throws in a season against conference opponents (Donta Bright, 1996).

Richmond shot just 32.3% (20-of-62) for the game, but hit 24-of-32 free throws. UMass held the Spiders to just 4-of-24 shooting from behind the arc and out-rebounded Richmond 43-to-33 for the game.

The Minutemen will have the week off before facing La Salle next Saturday evening at the Mullins Center. The 6 PM tip-off will be televised live on the CBS Sports Network.

Freddie Riley and Morgan each hit a pair of three-pointers as UMass tried to stretch the final three minutes of the game, but Saint Joseph's converted 13-of-14 free throws to maintain the double-digit win.

AMHERST, Mass. - Terrell Vinson's fadeaway jumper as time expired was reviewed and ruled a two-point basket leaving UMass on the short end of a 72-71 Atlantic 10 game at the Mullins Center Saturday night.

The basket almost capped a comeback that saw the Minutemen trail by four with 21.2 seconds left. Maxie Esho grabbed an offensive rebound and converted a three-point play to cut the deficit to 70-69 with 13.1 remaining.

Tyreek Duren made two free throws for the Explorers to set up the final scenario. Chaz Williams missed the initial three try before grabbing the board and feeding Vinson whose foot was proved to be on the line in the replay.

UMass (18-8, 7-5 A-10) shot 45 percent for the game but was just 9-of-18 from the free throw line. Esho finished with a career-high 18 points on 7-of-9 shooting, while Williams recorded his second-consecutive double-double with 11 points and 10 assists.

AMHERST, Mass. - Chaz Williams scored a career-high 29 points and dished out nine assists to lead Massachusetts past Xavier, 80-73, at the Mullins Center Tuesday night.

Williams had a career night from outside, making 6-of-8 to help UMass (19-8, 8-5 Atlantic 10) snap a two-game losing skid overall and a six-game streak to Xavier. The sophomore standout narrowly missed his third-consecutive 10-assist game.

UMass shot 44 percent and was 16-of-18 from the free throw line, making its final 13 in the contest. The Minutemen also made 10 3-pointers, the seventh time this season they have reached double figures.

Xavier (17-10, 8-5) was led by Dezmine Wells' 19 points and three steals. Mark Lyons had 15 while Kenny Frease added 12 off the bench. The Musketeers committed 20 turnovers, which the Minutemen converted into 19 points.

With Xavier holding a 21-16 lead midway through the first half, UMass got hot from outside, making four 3-pointers in a three-minute stretch as the Minutemen outscored Xavier 14-2 and stake a 30-23 lead.

UMass closed the half with a Raphiael Putney dunk and a trey by Williams to head into the break ahead 41-29.

The Minutemen had opened the game shooting just 7-of-24 before closing the frame 9-of-11, including 4-of-5 from outside.

The second half saw UMass extend its lead to 20 points eight minutes in as a Freddie Riley layup capped a 12-5 run. He finished with 12 points.

But Xavier fought back, trimming the margin to eight on two occasions, the last being a Lyons triple with 4:19 to play.

The Minutemen extended their lead to double-digits with a 9-4 run. Xavier made a couple of threes late to get within five before Williams made three of his seven free throws to account for the final margin.

Putney finished with 13 points, six rebounds and tied his career high with four blocks.

The crowd of 6,632 fed off the energy of the game but also got energized with the appearance of former UMass football standout Victor Cruz. The New York Giants wideout returned to campus for the first time since helping the Giants win Super Bowl XLVI.

PHILADELPHIA - The Massachusetts men's basketball team erased a 10-point deficit with iust over two minutes left in regulation to force overtime before eventually falling to No. 23/25 Temple 90-88 in a game reminiscent of some of the classic UMass-Temple battles of the past.

Chaz Williams turned in a brilliant performance for UMass (19-10, 8-7 Atlantic 10) as he finished with 26 points, 11 assists, eight rebounds and four steals. Raphiael Putney and Terrell Vinson both had 16 before fouling out of the contest.

With one game remaining, $U\bar{\text{Mass}}$ is tied for sixth with La Salle and Dayton - both of whom have the head-to-head tiebreaker over the Minutemen.

Temple (23-6, 12-3) clinched a tie for the league's regular-season title and was led by Khalif Wyatt who scored 26 points, including the winning layup in the final seconds of overtime.

The Owls made a living at the free throw line, making 30-of-40 compared to 6-of-10 for the Minutemen. UMass shot 45 percent and used a 12-of-24 effort from outside to keep the pressure on all game.

But the long-range jumpers were never more important then the final minutes of regulation when UMass trailed 77-67 with 2:01 to play. That's when Williams made a trey from the top of the key, stole an inbounds pass for a layup and Freddie Riley drained a fadeaway in the corner to cut the margin to 77-75 in the span of 50 seconds.

Following a pair of Temple free throws, Riley made another three in the opposite corner to make it a one-point game with 50.4 left. The Owls split a pir of free throw before Putney made a putback with 26 tics left that ties the game at 80 and force the extra session.

The Minutemen scored the first six points of overtime for their largest lead of the night but couldn't hold it as the Owls made five freebies and tied it at 88 with a 3-point play by Wyatt. After a pair of missed bucket from Williams and Maxie Esho, Wyatt scored the game winner with 16.1 on the clock.

Jesse Morgan was off on a baseline runner and Esho couldn't connect on the tip before the Owls grabbed the rebound to end the contest.

The game was tied eight times and had 11 lead changes. UMass held a slim 44-38 edge in the paint while Temple finished with a 48-45 lead on the boards.

The game featured six ties and 10 lead changes but none over the final 6:30. With URI having taken a 72-71 lead on a pair of Outerbridge free throws, UMass went on a 14-0 run that ended with seven second-chance points.

Despite being outrebounded in the contest 47-37. UMass dominated the glass during the final six minutes to the tune of a 14-5 margin.

AMHERST, Mass. - Chaz Williams, Javorn Farrell and Raphiael Putney combined for 61 points in leading No. 8 seed Massachusetts past No. 9 seed Duquesne 92-83 in the First Round of the 2012 Atlantic 10 Conference Championship at the Mullins Center Tuesday night.

With the win, UMass advances to Friday's quarterfinals where it will face No. 1 seed Temple. Tip-off at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City is set for Noon Eastern time.

Williams finished with 21 points, eight rebounds and four assists, while Farrell had his most complete game in three seasons at UMass with 20 points on 7-of-14 shooting, nine assists and seven rebounds. Putney matched Farrell's three 3-pointers en route to 20 points and six boards.

UMass (21-10) improved to 31-30 all time in A-10 Tourney play and advanced to the quarterfinals for the second time in the last three seasons and 26th time overall.

The Minutemen shot 51 percent from the floor, 47 pct. from outside and made 24-of-31 free throws. UMass also held a 40-34 edge on the glass.

Duquesne (16-15) had five players in double figures, led by Eric Evans and Jerry Jones, who finished with 16 apiece. Jones was 4-of-6 from behind the arc. The Dukes shot 44 pct.

The game had 14 lead changes and eight ties.

UMass pulled away from Duquesne early in the first half when a 14-3 Minuteman run extended their lead to 23-15 with 11:35 to play. Consecutive triples from Javorn Farrell and Raphiael Putney gave UMass its largest lead of the half. 29-18 with 10:22 on the clock.

Just over five minutes later, the Dukes tied it at 35. UMass broke a deadlock at 42 when it closed the half on a 9-6 run.

Both teams shot over 50 percent in the first period and combined for 13 3-pointers.

Duquesne led 78-73 with just over six minutes to play when UMass rattled off nine-consecutive points to stake a 82-78 lead. The Dukes answered the run with a three from Sean Johnson. That would be the final field goal for the Dukes over the final 6:02.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. - A pair of command performances from Chaz Williams and Jesse Morgan led the UMass men's basketball team to a 77-71 upset of top-seeded No. 21 Temple on Tuesday afternoon in the opening game of the Atlantic 10 Quarterfinals at Boardwalk Hall. The win advances UMass (22-10) to the A-10 Semifinals against the winner of Saint Joseph's and St. Bonaventure. It also marks the Minutemen's first win in the A-10 Quarterfinals since defeating St. Bonaventure in 2001.

Williams scored 20 points in the game, while Morgan led all players with 21 points - 16 of which came in the second half. Just over 30 minutes from his hometown of Philadelphia, Morgan was 8-for-13 and hit three three-pointers as his play sparked much of UMass' offense in the second half.

Temple (24-7) had four players in double-figures with Khalif Wyatt scoring a team-high 15 points. Ramone Moore added 14 points.

After trailing by five at halftime, UMass jumped out of the gates to start the second half with a 15-0 run to take a 46-36 lead on a Sean Carter dunk just over four minutes into the period. Seven of Morgan's points came in the run as UMass hit four of its first five shots and forced three Temple turnovers in the stretch.

Just as quickly as UMass jumped out to the 10-point lead, Temple responded with the long ball. Moore hit back-to-back treys followed by a three pointer from Juan Fernandez as the Owls cut the lead to five, 55-50, with 12:12 to go.

An 11-2 run from that point for Temple gave the Owls a 61-57 lead thanks to another Fernandez three-pointer.

A driving lay-up and a three-pointer for Williams gave the Minutemen the lead again 62-61 with just under six minutes remaining. The Owls responded again to regain the lead on a traditional three-point play for Wyatt.

Morgan hit his third three-pointer of the day with 4:50 to go giving UMass a 65-64 lead. Terrell Vinson forced a turnover on the ensuing Temple possession. Javorn Farrell hit another three pointer to extend the Minutemen's lead to 68-64 just 18 seconds later and UMass never looked back.

The Minutemen hit 7-of-9 free throws in the final two minutes and the Owls went just 2-for-7 from the field. A Fernandez three-pointer with two seconds missed as Morgan pulled down the rebound to seal the win.

Temple took a 36-31 lead into halftime as the Minutemen struggled at points shooting from the field. UMass missed six straight field goals in a three-minute stretch midway through the stanza as Temple built an early 22-13 lead.

An Esho jumper with 8:11 to go snapped the cold shooting and the Minutemen fought their way back into the game. A Farrell lay-up with 2:22 left in the first half cut the lead to four, 32-28, but Temple kept the Minutemen from getting any closer.

pointer from Theodore with 17:29 to go. UMass pushed the lead back to back to four, but a pair of free throws by Herb Pope tied the game at 42-42 at the 14:15 mark.

A lay-up by Farrell followed by a put-back from Sean Carter and a three-pointer from Williams quickly pushed UMass back ahead by four, 51-47.

Brandon Mobley's three-pointer from the right wing gave the Pirates a 52-51 lead with 9:51 to go marking the first time Seton Hall had led since the 13:04 mark of the first half.

After a Carter lay-up gave the Minutemen back the lead, Fuquan Edwin hit a pair of free throws to extend the Pirates to a three-point lead, 56-53, with 8:49 to go.

The Pirates went up by four for their largest lead of the second half, but a Vinson drive and free-throw after Pope's fourth foul of the game cut it back to one, 60-59, with 6:27 left in the

game. The Minutemen retook the lead, 61-60, on a Carter lay-up 30 seconds later.

Vinson hit another put-back lay-up and Williams hit a three-pointer with 2:24 left in the game giving UMass a 68-64 lead forcing Seton Hall to call timeout.

Vinson continued his hot shooting late in the second half when his three-pointer with 1:31

extended UMass' lead to 71-64 and forcing another timeout from Seton Hall. After scoring just two in the first half, Vinson was key down the stretch with eight points. UMass closed the game on a 13-5 run to seal the 77-67 win.

Mar. 20, 2012 • Daskalakis Athletic Ctr. PHILADELPHIA - Terrell Vinson scored 14 of his 18 points in the second half as Massachusetts

erased a 17-point deficit to defeat Drexel, 72-70, and advance to the semifinals of the National Invitation Tournament. The comeback marked the second time this season the Minutemen have been able to overcome a 17-point margin for a win (vs. Saint Joseph's on Jan. 14). UMass will next play in the NIT Semifinals held next Tuesday at Madison Square Garden in New York City.

Trailing 53-36 with 16:26 to play, UMass outscored Drexel 26-7 over the next nine minutes while making 10 of 14 shot and forcing eight Dragon turnovers. Drexel tied it at 62 before consecutive jumpers from Vinson pushed the margin to 68-62 with 4:13 left.

The Dragons cut the margin to 70-68 on a Frantz Massenat layup. Sean Carter responded with

a pick-and-roll bucket that extended the lead back to two possessions with 1:33 remaining. Following two Massenat free throws, the Dragons had one more possession with under 16 seconds on the clock after UMass was unable to score on two possessions. Massenat's jumper was short and the Minutemen swatted the ball down the court to secure their second appearance in the NIT semifinals in the last five years.

UMass (25-11) shot 59 percent for the game, including a blistering 71 pct. in the second half. Chaz Williams had a game-high 20 points with four rebounds, four assists and two steals. Vinson added a team-high five rebounds to go along with two assists, two blocks and two steals. Philadelphia native Jesse Morgan finished with 13 points and four steals, while matching Williams with two 3-pointers for all four of UMass' outside shots.

UMass' path to the semifinals included three road wins, making it just the fourth school to accomplish that feat since the tournament began using home sites in 1977 - Fresno State in 1998, Detroit in 2001 and Georgetown in 2003.

Tuesday's win might have been the most dramatic for the squad this season as the Minutemen 17-point deficit matched the highest overcome in a victory, matching the 17-point deficit in UMass' 71-62 home win over Saint Joseph's.

Drexel (29-7) was led by Dartaye Ruffin's 17 points on 8-of-10 shooting. Ruffin dominated the paint in the first half, scoring all of his points during the opening period while leading the Dragons to a 41-31 lead at the break.

ŬMass will now face the winner of the Nevada-Stanford game on Tuesday, March 27 at Madison Square Garden. This marks the third semifinal appearance for UMass, following 1991 and 2008 showings.

Fourth Year as UMass Head Coach • UMass '95

UMass brought one of its own home to run the men's basketball program in 2008-09, the 100th season of UMass Basketball.

Former Minuteman point guard and Springfield native Derek Kellogg was named the 21st head coach in University of Massachusetts men's basketball history, on April 23, 2008. The 1995 UMass graduate returned to his alma mater for his first head coaching job after serving as an assistant coach for 12 years, the last eight at the University of Memphis under former UMass head coach John Calipari. The energetic and hard-working Kellogg is largely credited for recruiting many of the Tigers which helped Memphis reach the NCAA Championship game in 2008 and eight consecutive 20-win seasons and eight consecutive postseason berths.

In 2010-11, Kellogg led UMass to its best start since the 1995-96 Final Four season as the Minutemen opened the year with a 7-0 mark. UMass also posted its first seven-game win streak since 1998. UMass finished 15-15 in 2010-11.

Kellogg finished his second season at his alma mater with a 12-20 record. But that including the Minutemen's first Atlantic 10 Tournament victory in eight years as UMass knocked off No. 6 seed Charlotte, 59-56. The Minutemen had lost its first tourney game in each season dating to 2002.

In his first season as the head coach at UMass, Kellogg led the Minutemen to a 12-18 record including an epic win over defending NCAA Champion Kansas in Kansas City before a nationally-televised audience on ESPN. UMass senior Tony Gaffney was honored as the Atlantic 10's Defensive Player of the Year in 2009 as well as being named to the A-10 Second Team. Gaffney led the A-10 in rebounding and averaged a double-double with 11.5 points and 10.2 rebounds per game. Gaffney was UMass' first player to average a double-double in 30 years.

Ricky Harris was named to the Atlantic 10 Third Team after be averaged 18.2 points per game, the highest scoring average for any returning player in 2009-10.

Kellogg has led UMass to one of the nation's top recruiting classes in the nation and the consensus best class in the Atlantic 10 according to publications. The group of Sampson Carter, Javorn Farrell, Raphiael Putney, Freddie Riley and Terrell Vinson make up the highly-talented class.

As a four-year letterwinner at Massachusetts from 1992-95, Kellogg played on four Atlantic 10 Conference regular season and tournament championship teams. The Minutemen were just the second team in NCAA history to win four-straight outright season and tournament championships. During his four-year career at UMass under Calipari, the Minutemen were 111-24, including 51-11 in the Atlantic 10, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament each year, including the Elite Eight in 1995. Kellogg was named the team's captain as both a junior and senior. He was named a 1995 Atlantic 10 All-Conference selection and was a three-time All-Atlantic 10 Academic honoree. On UMass' career lists, he is fifth in assists (453), seventh in all-time three-pointers (138), as well as seventh in three-point percentage (38.1). Kellogg played his high school basketball at Springfield Cathedral where he was a two-time Massachusetts All-State player and McDonald's honorable mention All-American.

Kellogg spent eight years on the Memphis staff under Calipari where he brought his "coach on the floor" mentality at UMass to the sidelines, and it has paid huge dividends for the Tiger program. In Kellogg's eight seasons in Memphis, he has helped lead the Tigers to eight-straight 20-win seasons and eight-consecutive postseason berths (2003, 2004, 2006, 2007, 2008 NCAA; 2001, 2002, 2005 NIT). Prior to this recent run, the last time Memphis had eight-straight 20-win seasons was from 1982-89. This current stretch of eight-consecutive postseasons is a first for the Tiger basketball program, breaking the previous mark of six-straight postseason tournaments from 1988-93.

In 2007-08, Kellogg was an integral part of another magical Tiger campaign, which continued through the 2008 NCAA Tournament championship game. The NCAA Final Four appearance was the Tigers' first since 1985, and the NCAA title contest was the program's first since 1973. Memphis set an NCAA single-season record for victories with 38 wins (38-2 mark) and held down the No. 1 spot in both national polls for five-straight weeks during the season. The Tigers finished 2007-08 ranked No. 2 in both national polls, the highest final ranking in school history. Memphis also won a school-record 26-straight games, and swept the Conference USA regular season and tournament titles for a third-consecutive season.

The Tigers won 30 games for a third-straight year in 2007-08, becoming the second school in NCAA Division I history to accomplish the feat. Kentucky was the first to do so from 1947-49 and 1996-98. UCLA joined the elite group later in 2007-08. From 2005-06 to 2007-08, Memphis won 104 games (104-10 record) and tied the 1996-98 Kentucky squads for the most victories in a three-year period in NCAA Division I history.

In 2006-07, Kellogg helped lead Memphis to another record-setting campaign. The Tigers won 33 games for a second-straight season (33-4 record) and captured their second-consecutive Conference USA regular season and tournament titles. The back-to-back outright regular season

history.

crowns were a first for the Memphis program, and the consecutive tournament championships were the Tigers first since they won two-straight Metro Conference Tournaments in 1984 and 1985. Memphis advanced to the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight for a second-straight year (2006, 2007), marking the first time in school history that happened.

The 2006-07 Tigers also pulled a first in Conference USA history. Memphis posted a perfect 16-0 regular season mark and captured the league's postseason tournament. The Tigers were the second squad in C-USA history to go

16-0 in the regular season as Cincinnati did so in 1999-2000.

That Bearcat team, though, did not win the Conference USA

Tournament title. The Tigers received a No. 2 seed in the

NCAA Tournament and finished in the top 10 in both

national polls (No. 5/AP; No. 7/ESPN-USA Today).

Kellogg also played an integral role in the Tigers' 2005-06 remarkable season. Memphis posted a 33-4 record and won the Conference USA regular season and tournament titles. The conference regular season crown was the Tigers' second in three years. The 2005-06 Memphis squad earned the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament No. 1 seed and advanced to the Elite Eight for the first time since 1992. The Tigers finished the season ranked in the top 10 of both national polls (No. 4/AP; No. 6/ESPN-USA Today). Those final rankings were the highest in Memphis basketball

From when Kellogg joined the Memphis staff in 2000-01, the Tigers won the 2002 National Invitation Tournament championship, claimed a share of the 2004 Conference USA regular season crown and took home the 2002 and 2003 C-USA National Division titles. The Tigers have posted 219 overall victories (27.3 wins per year) and 101 conference wins (12.6 league victories per year) in his eight seasons. The eight years prior to that span, the Tigers had 140 total wins and 66 conference victories.

In addition to the 2006, 2007 and 2008 final national rankings, the Tigers also finished the 2003 (No. 19) and 2004 (No. 24) seasons ranked in the final Associated Press poll. Prior to the 2002-03 and 2003-04 seasons, the last time Memphis was ranked in the final polls in consecutive years was the 1984-85 and 1985-86 campaigns.

Kellogg was an off-campus recruiter for the Tigers, and also assisted in scouting opponents. His hard work — especially on the recruiting trail — gained him national recognition. In the summer of 2007, Rivals.com listed Kellogg (No. 7 spot) as one of the nation's 10 assistants "ready to move up." A year earlier in 2006, the same web site named Kellogg as one of the nation's top 25 recruiters, and HoopScoop magazine tabbed him as one of the nation's top assistant coaches.

Prior to joining Calipari's staff, Kellogg spent one season at Youngstown State. In his lone year at Youngstown State, Kellogg was a member of a coaching staff led by former UMass assistant John Robic that re-energized a community about Penguin basketball. Youngstown State finished fourth in the Mid-Continent Conference regular season standings, but were in first place in the league before losing their top scorer, Elmer Brown, with seven games left in the regular season. Youngstown State signed a freshman class which included three top-100 recruits during Kellogg's tenure.

Kellogg joined the Youngstown State staff after two seasons at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va., where he worked for Jim Larranaga. The Patriots posted a 19-11 record during the 1998-99 season, captured both the Colonial Athletic Association regular-season and tournament championships and earned an automatic bid to the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

Kellogg began his coaching career at his alma mater. He was a graduate assistant and part-time radio broadcaster at UMass for the 1996-97 season. Kellogg also played a season with the Connecticut Skyhawks in the United States Basketball League in 1995.

Kellogg, 37 (born June 20, 1973), is a 1995 graduate of Massachusetts with a degree in Real Estate/Finance. In May of 2005, he married Nicole Flory, who graduated from UMass in 1997. The couple welcomed their first child Maximus Antonio Kellogg on April 28, 2008 (five days after he was hired at UMass. Kellogg's parents George and Ruth Kellogg currently reside in Belchertown, Mass.





All that Chaz: UMass basketball guard Williams has been better than advertised

AMHERST - Three days before playing in what is billed as the world's most famous arena, and an hour before the **University of Massachusetts** men's basketball practice was to start, Chaz Williams was shooting jumpers in a near-empty Mullins Center on Saturday.

He was not hoisting up half-court 3's, a common mood-lightening lark for workouts before a big game.

The UMass guard was working on mid-range wing shots as if they would actually count against Stanford, the opponent in Tuesday's NIT semifinal at New York's Madison Square Garden.

What drives Chaz Williams, who in one year has arguably become the most popular player among UMass fans since the John Calipari teams, and one of its most electrifying?

Hard work is a good place to start.

"I struggled horribly with my shooting in high school. I was OK as a junior, but not really very good until my senior year," Williams said.

In what could be a transformational year for UMass basketball, its sophomore point guard has been the biggest difference of all.

He's been more, too - a leader, a dynamic force of nature, and a mindset with a quick, agile body attached.

"We heard he might transfer from Hofstra (after a coaching change in 2010)," UMass coach Derek Kellogg said.

"We knew a lot of coaches in his league (Colonial Athletic Association), and they all seemed - well, I don't want to say they happy to see him leave, but they all thought Chaz would do well here.

"From word of mouth, we heard he was looking to transfer and was a good kid. We knew he could play the tempo we wanted.

"I didn't know he'd be such a great leader. We got more than we expected, an unbelievable fit."

Williams is listed as 5-foot-9. It is widely assumed that if he's 5-9, Doug Flutie is 6-3.

Whatever his physical size, Williams' value has gone beyond his team leadership in 3-point shooting percentage (42.5) and free-throw shooting (78.7) as well as in points, assists, steals and minutes per game (16.9, 6.3, 2.2 and 34.9).

He is usually the first player on the practice floor.

"I try to be. That's who I am," Williams said.

"There are no limits to how much you can work."

Williams credits his coaches, his teammates and Dr. Joe Carr, a sports psychologist who worked with the team's atttidue.

"Dr. Carr was great, taking us apart and putting us together. It helped us understand who we are," Williams said.

Williams sat out last season due to NCAA transfer rules. Unlike many of his teammates, he has already played at Madison Square Garden, three times in all.

That could be useful for a player who has already shown a knack for rising to the occasion and making the biggest moments his best.

"He not only makes shots, he seems to make them when we need them most," Kellogg said.

Kellogg had to decide whether Williams' high-octane style came with too much risk of reckless abandon. The concern would prove ill-founded, but that was not obvious in October.

"The debate was about whether to pull him back or let him go. I think we've done a good job, letting him go but showing him the moves," Kellogg said.

Williams says it helps that another point guard is his coach. Knowing his own game was based on patience and wisdom in the half-court game, Kellogg smiles at the comparison.

"Chaz and I are opposite ends of the point-guard universe, but I always appreciated quick guards who could get by people. They can change a game," Kellogg said.

Picked for 12th place in its own, 14-team league, UMass is 25-11. The Minutemen are the last Atlantic 10 team still playing basketball.

To the guard who drives this team, there is always a higher bar to aspire.

"Actually, I'm a little disappointed. I thought we could have done better and gone further," Williams said.

"We'll make up for it in the future by improving and correcting our mistakes. That's all part of growing."

UMass rallying cry wilts Drexel

PHILADELPHIA — Drexel, the consensus best team to be denied entry into the NCAA tournament, is now the third consecutive home victim of a UMass team just two victories away from claiming consolation bragging rights itself.

Shooting 70.8 percent in the second half, the Minutemen dragged the Dragons across the court of Daskalakis Athletic Center, rallying from a 17-point deficit to a thrilling 72-70 win and a berth in the NIT semifinals Tuesday night at Madison Square Garden against tonight's Stanford-Nevada winner.

"We have just started at this level of basketball over the last month, three weeks, because guys have finally matured," said Minutemen coach Derek Kellogg, whose players nevertheless celebrated like children when the rebound of Frantz Massenat's 10-footer that could have forced overtime was batted into the backcourt as time expired.

Kellogg himself turned to the cadre of UMass fans and more than once waved them up out of their seats while Terrell Vinson scored 10 of his team's 12 points during one stretch that took UMass from 53-37 down to 64-62 up in just 10 minutes.

The lead was six after a Chaz Williams 3-pointer with 3:37 to go, but with a Drexel front line that dominated 17-7 in second-chance points in the first half worn down, Massenat was all the scoring the Dragons had left down the stretch in the steamy, 2,200-seat gym.

"It was hot," said Drexel coach Bruiser Flint, Kellogg's good friend and once mentor at UMass. "And they wore us down."

Indeed, Drexel got awfully tired taking the ball out of the basket, and had nine turnovers in the second half, enough to render worthless a whopping 43-21 rebound advantage.

"(Drexel) must have run the same play 25 times in the first half and scored on 18 of them," said Kellogg, so he put Vinson on the Dragons' dominating front-line player Samme Givens, while Dartaye Ruffin, a five-point average scorer who had gone off for 17 in the first half, disappeared.

"We're a much better defensive team when we score," Kellogg said.

Consecutive dunks by reserve Maxie Esho got the Minutemen's hearts started, and a layup and a 3-pointer by Williams quickly had the lead down to eight points with 13 minutes to play.

"We did a good job of persevering with a lineup that was really non-starters," Kellogg said.

Williams never really got into the paint consistently despite his game-high 20 points, but the Minutemen (25-11) scored in transition and in the waves they ride into New York.

"Winning on the road against an SEC team (Mississippi State), a Big East team (Seton Hall) and what I thought was one of the best teams in the country in Drexel, all three games on (ESPN), has helped the UMass name," Kellogg said.

That's plenty of reason to keep playing, even down 17 points with 16:23 to go.

Terrell Vinson delivers for UMass men's basketball when game is on the line

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. - Terrell Vinson's highlights aren't likely to end up on SportsCenter's top 10.

The University of Massachusetts men's basketball team has its share of breathtaking dunks and enough alley-oops to potentially be called Lob U. Chaz Williams has gotten well-deserved attention for his game-changing speed and program-changing leadership and Raphiael Putney's improved game and freakish athleticism have made him a fan favorite and a media star.

But with the game on the line, or in Saturday's case the season on the line, the Minutemen have looked to Vinson and more often than not, the junior has delivered.

In the second half against Seton Hall, UMass looked like it had started to falter. The Minutemen's first-half lead and its accompanying momentum were a distant memory.

The Pirates were bearing down and UMass was just trying to hang on, trailing by four points.

So with 6 minutes, 27 seconds left, Williams did what he often does. He fed the guy who had a huge tip-in to put the Minutemen ahead by five in double overtime against Mississippi State, the same guy whose 17 second-half points nearly carried UMass to a comeback against St. Bonaventure.

"Yes, I do look for TV in clutch moments," Williams said. "I actually call him Terrell Durant as a little joke, but you know."

Vinson both liked and bristled at the comparison. He's a proud Baltimore native and Kevin Durant is from Beltway rival Washington D.C.

"I wish it was a little more Terrell Melo, though," Vinson said smiling.

Both Durant and Baltimore native Carmelo Anthony will likely play against Herb Pope next year as the Seton Hall power forward is considered a likely NBA draft pick. The last two seasons the 6-foot-8 power forward had dominated the Minutemen in the Pirates' two blowout wins. On Saturday, Pope was defending when Williams got the ball to Vinson on the block.

Vinson spun past Pope and laid it in, as the Big East's all-conference big man fouled him. That brought UMass back within one point. Vinson added a put-back of his own miss and a game clinching 3-pointer to lead the surge that sewed up the win.

"I can recall many games when the game's in the balance and the guys on the team are looking to run some things to him, really looking for him in different spots on the floor," said Minuteman coach Derek Kellogg. "We run a couple particular plays, mainly in the last four or five minutes of the game.

"He's come through quite frequently," Kellogg added. "It's nice when a junior, a guy who's put in the work, actually starts to reap some of the rewards of years of hard work."

Vinson's play has been an important part of the turnaround by UMass this season. The 6-foot-7 Vinson's willingness to do the dirty work inside has allowed the 6-foot-9 Putney to make more plays on the perimeter. And Vinson's ability to deliver in the clutch has allowed the Minutemen to win more games.

"It's a good role. People remember the final moments of the game," Vinson said. "So I guess I'll always be remembered."

UMass men's basketball wins at Seton Hall in NIT, advances to play Drexel

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. - Add struggles against Seton Hall to the list of demons the University of Massachusetts men's basketball team has exorcised this season. The Pirates crushed the Minutemen in 2009 and 2010 regular-season games and dominated them in a closed scrimmage this season.

But in the second round of the National Invitation Tournament on Saturday, UMass controlled the game early and answered a Seton Hall surge late and held on for a 77-67 win in Walsh Gymnasium to earn a spot in the quarterfinals.

The Minutemen (24-11) will play Drexel (29-6) Tuesday at 7 p.m. in Philadelphia. Drexel beat Northern Iowa 65-63 Sunday in the second round.

UMass junior Terrell Vinson, who had been on the losing end of all three of those whippings by the Pirates, said he found satisfaction in ending that streak Saturday.

"That was more of a personal game," said Vinson, who had eight of his 10 points in the second half. "We scrimmaged them earlier this season and they handed it to us at the end for the third straight time. We just didn't want to have it for the fourth straight time."

The Minutemen, who led by as many as 12 in the first half, knew Seton Hall (21-13) eventually would make a run. The Pirates cut their deficit to 36-30 at halftime and carried momentum through intermission. UMass held its lead for most of the half, but Seton Hall eventually scored seven straight point to pull ahead 60-56 with 6 minutes, 40 seconds left.

The Minutemen ended that run when sophomore point guard Chaz Williams looked for Vinson, who has scored big baskets for UMass in big spots all season. Vinson took the pass, spun on the block and laid the ball in as Herb Pope fouled him. Vinson hit the free throw to bring the Minutemen within 60-59.

Brandon Mobley missed a 3-pointer at the other end and a Raphiael Putney rebound spurred a UMass fast break. Williams drove into the lane and dropped the ball off for Sean Carter, who laid

it in to put the Minuteman ahead 61-60 with 5:51 left.

After the teams traded two free throws apiece, Vinson missed a jumper, but grabbed his own rebound and laid it in to increase the lead to 65-62 with 3:47 left.

Pope made two free throws and then blocked Carter's shot to give the Pirates a chance to take the lead with just under three minutes left. But Fuquan Edwin, who led Seton Hall with 21 points and seven rebounds, traveled to give the ball back to UMass with 2:53 left.

Williams then attacked from the left of the top of the key by faking the defender who stepped back. That gave Williams just enough space to knock down a 3-pointer that put the Minutemen ahead 68-64 with 2:35 left and sparked an ovation from the previously nervous pocket of UMass fans behind the bench.

With their momentum gone, the Pirates seemed to tire as Edwin missed a jumper and Pope threw away the offensive rebound. Seton Hall lost Vinson for a second on defense and Williams got him the ball. The junior buried an open 3-pointer from almost the same place Williams had just hit his with 1:30 left to put UMass up 71-64.

That essentially clinched the win as the Minutemen made enough free throws to hold on.

"Coaches always preach to us, every team is going to have their run," said Williams, who had 20 points, seven rebounds and six assists, with just three turnovers. "It's just how respond to it once a team knocks you down. I think we responded pretty well. It's just the will to win, once again."

Putney added 15 points and eight rebounds, and Carter had a double-double with 11 points and 11 rebounds.

As the players walked off the court, the "Let's go UMass" chants reverberated through Walsh Gym.

"I thought we gave everything we had," said Minuteman coach Derek Kellogg. "I was proud of our team, that we didn't really fold to their pressure in the second half, when they made a run and had some good things going.

"Testament to the guys on my team," he added. "I think that they're playing some of the best basketball that we've played all year. And they want to play 'til July. I keep saying it. They'd want to play all the way to July, if we could. Maybe even August, if the weather's nice."

STARKVILLE, Miss. – The University of
Massachusetts Minutemen gave head coach Derek
Kellogg all they had Tuesday night in the opening
round of the NIT Tournament on the road against
Mississippi State. It took two overtimes and 101
points, but the first postseason game of the
Kellogg era will have a second round as UMass
defeated the Bulldogs, 101-96.

"I thought it was an unbelievable basketball game," Kellogg said. "Every time we threw a jab, Mississippi State came back with one of their own. It was like a heavyweight fight between two teams with nothing to lose."

UMass used a smothering full-court defense to wear down the larger Bulldogs, while sophomore Chaz Williams put on an offensive show. The 5-foot 9-inch guard racked up 28 points, playing over 47 minutes ,remarkable in that Williams suffered a freak knee injury with 9 minutes remaining in regulation. The tough sophomore said he did not even think of coming out of the game.

"I'm going to play until the buzzer sounds or coach takes me out," he said. "I was fortunate for it not to be a serious injury. I thank God for allowing me to finish the game for my teammates."

"Chaz means so much to the team," Kellogg said. "He's a good, tough player, but the biggest thing is he has the will

to win. He has that New York City toughness that we talk about. Unless you're around it, you don't know what it means. He brings that to his team."

Fifth-year senior center Sean Carter logged even more time, with all but two minutes on the unfamiliar court, where UMass has never played.

"That's how tournaments are," Carter said. "You don't know anything about the other team. They tell you who you're playing, and you just go. You don't have time to prepare. You can't learn the plays. The team that has the will to play, the team who is going to leave it on the floor the most, is who is going to come out on top."

Although UMass jumped out to a fast start and led by as many as 13 points in the first half, Mississippi State found their will in the second and made the Minutemen work for the victory. The Bulldogs came from behind twice to force double overtime.

Carter was cool down the stretch, scoring 9 points, mostly on the free throw line, and putting the game out of reach.

"These guys have trained really hard in the off-season, and really worked their tails off for these moments," Kellogg said. "I felt comfortable with the guys on the floor, especially Sean with the free throws."

For the Bulldogs, only NBA prospect Arnette Moultrie could break through, scoring 34 points. Sean Carter added 20 points for the Minutemen, and Javorn Farrell notched 16.

Controversy at the end of regulation had Williams trying to break a 72-72 tie with a layup at the last possible second that missed and was tipped, but officials waved it off, calling a shot clock violation. The officials gathered at the table to check the replay, but confirmed the ruling.

Mississippi State got the last chance at a shot with 6.1 seconds remaining, but failed to break the tie as the teams headed to the first overtime.

The Bulldogs built a small lead in overtime, but a three-pointer by guard Jessie Morgan erased the lead and Terrell Vinson put UMass back on top moments later with a basket and free throw.

A three-pointer by Bulldogs guard Jalen Steele sent the game to a second overtime, but Carter made sure it was the last.

The Minutemen will next travel to Seton Hall to face the Pirates, who survived a scare earlier in the evening against Stony Brook, 63-61. The date of the game had not been determined Tuesday night.

A glance at almost any box score from this season will tell you the type of player **Chaz Williams** is. But that doesn't tell you the impact the sophomore guard has made for UMass this season.

That impact was on full display Tuesday night --on national television, nonetheless --- as Williams,
the diminutive point guard, powered the
Minutemen to a thrilling, **101-96**, **double- overtime win over Mississippi State** in the first
round of the NIT.

As the ESPN2 audience saw, Williams is a gamechanger. A playmaker. A player who makes his team better in so many ways.

Williams scored a team-high 28 points, and had eight rebounds, six assists, and three steals in a team-high 48 minutes. He was 4-of-7 from beyond the 3-point line, including a dagger late in the second overtime that put the Minutemen up five points with 2:00 to play.

For the season, Williams leads the team in scoring (16.7 points per game), steals (79), assists (218) and is third in rebounding despite being a generous 5-foot-9.

He has played his best in the biggest of games. In the A-10 Conference Tournament **quarterfinal win over top-seeded Temple**, he had 20 points,

10 assists and four steals. In the **opening-round winggage Quantes** ne, he went for 21 points, four assists and eight rebounds.

Against Temple at the end the regular season, Williams scored a game-high 26 points with 11

assists and eight rebounds. In a late-February win over perennial conference power Xavier, Williams had a careerhigh 29 points, nine assists and five rebounds.

There were a number of other terrific efforts from the redshirt sophomore transfer throughout the season, but perhaps his greatest contribution to the turnaround season for the Minutemen --- along with his impact over the next two highly-anticipated years --- is in the way he makes his teammates better.

The assists, of course, are one thing, and they shouldn't be discounted. But his overall ability to spread the floor, impact the game in so many ways and bring life to UMass basketball is the full story on Chaz Williams.

Comparing the production and impact of players like Raphiael Putney, Sean Carter, Javorn Farrell, Jesse Morgan and Terrell Vinson this season to the production they provided in previous years, it's clear they have all found their full potential this year. Williams is undoubtedly to thank for that.

Williams and the Minutemen move on in the NIT and will face top-seeded Seton Hall, which nearly got into the NCAA Tournament before being one of the last bubble teams left out.

It's not a Dr. Seuss book, but rather a look at related accomplishments of the last two coaches to lead the **University of Massachusetts** men's basketball team to the National Invitational Tournament.

A run to the 2008 final was ultimately the last of a successful, three-year coaching stint by Travis Ford.

Four years later, his replacement Derek Kellogg is hopeful that a return trip to the NIT is just a building block to a bigger and better thing – the NCAA Tournament.

The Minutemen (22-11) will **play at Mississippi State** (21-11) Tuesday night at 7 p.m., in an opening round game.

Kellogg has helped turn around a program that lost 20 games during his second season, by leading the team to its first postseason appearance since it lost to Ohio State in the NIT final.

Dante Milligan said after the 2008 final, "I definitely believe we're leaving the basketball program in better shape than when we came."

Milligan and fellow seniors Etienne Brower and current NBA player Gary Forbes uid leave, but not before Ford left a month later to coach at Oklahoma State.

The four-game run to the '08 final included a semifinal round win over two-time defending champion Florida.

And just to get to Madison Square Garden, UMass had to rally from a 22-point deficit to beat Syracuse.

Chaz Williams better than advertised

The guy sitting out is always an all-star.

Every player sitting as a transfer or academic nonqualifier always develops a legend during his year off for their showing in pickup games and practices. There were stories about the prowess of Tyrone Weeks, Lari Ketner, Monty Mack, Tiki Mayben and even Tyrell Lynch before they ever got eligible. Some panned out. Some washed out.

Chaz Williams, who sat out last year after transferring from Hofstra, was no different. With the University of Massachusetts struggling though the point guard struggles with Gary Correia, and for a while Daryl Traynham, the promise of Williams was hard to wait for.

The stories undersold Williams' potential. He's been better than advertised.

On the most basic level, Williams has allowed Derek Kellogg to install a run-and-press transition style the team has thrived in this year. UMass' athletic roster is perfectly designed to play that way, but without a point guard that can make good decisions at high speed, that athleticism would be wasted.

But it's more than that with Williams.

Despite being a newcomer and only a sophomore, Williams has been a leader from day one. In any huddle, he's talking, instructing and encouraging. He and coach Derek Kellogg have been in sync from the beginning. The team has taken on his personality. There's an optimism and positivity that stemmed from Williams' attitude and blossomed as the team has been successful.

"He's brought great poise to our team. He's a young guy, came in early in the season and he brought it. He had a couple of games (with) a few mistakes, but he learns quick. He's a smart player," senior Sean Carter said. "He's mature on the court for his age. He drives us with his passion."

Williams has backed up his attitude with his play. Williams is indisputably the best player on the roster and none of the returning players have resented that. His 16.5 points per game have almost single-handedly made up for the 18.7 ppg that graduated with Anthony Gurley and his 6.5 assists per game have made his teammates better.

In UMass' first meeting with Temple, Williams nearly had a triple-double with 26 points. 11 assists and eight rebounds. If he doesn't have the game he had, not only do the Minutemen not go to overtime, but they probably lose by at least 15 points. But after the game Williams pointed to a couple of late turnovers and said it was his fault the team lost. That approach not only helped motivate himself, but sent a message to his teammates: If the guy who nearly had a triple-double can get better, anyone one can.

In the rematch, Williams had just one turnover.

"I am impressed with him. He plays hard. Ten assists with one turnover is pretty impressive for all that time with the basketball," Temple coach Fran Dunphy said. "Obviously he's talented, fast, and hard to guard but a competitive instinct is what separates him. We are not the only team that has had difficulty guarding him, and we won't be the last."

This season's success feels like the start of something larger and Williams is a cornerstone of that future's foundation. The Minutemen bring back everyone but Carter and will get Sampson Carter back from injury, while adding three freshmen. But more than that, Williams will get better. He could go into next year as the favorite to be Atlantic 10 Player of the Year with a team that can realistically set its sights on the NCAA tournament. But Williams wasn't looking that far ahead.

"We have another task at hand tomorrow," Williams said. "We said. 'Don't get too big after this win. Let this carry us over."

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. – UMass coach Derek Kellogg wasn't sure if it was his biggest win ever, but he will find out soon enough.

Jesse Morgan scored 21 points, Chaz Williams added 20 and each made crucial free throws in the final 27 seconds as the **Minutemen defeated top seed Temple 77-71** Friday in the quarterfinals of the Atlantic 10 tournament. Eighth-seeded UMass advances to play No. 4 Saint Bonaventure, a 71-68 winner over fifth-seeded Saint Joseph's, in the semifinals Saturday at 1 p.m.

"I'm not sure if this is my biggest win, but if we win tomorrow, it will be," said Kellogg, whose team improved to 22-10. "This builds confidence that we can compete against the top teams in our league. That's one more step in the right direction. Tomorrow will be another big-time challenge for us."

Trailing 36-31 at halftime, the Minutemen scored 15 unanswered points to start the second, including seven by Morgan, to take a 46-36 lead. The run was capped by an emphatic dunk by Sean Carter off an alley-oop pass from Williams with 15:54 to play.

The lead was 48-38 before Temple's Ramone Moore drained three 3-pointers, sparking a 20-6 Owls run. Temple moved ahead 61-57 with 8:03 left.

"We responded well," Kellogg said. "With four minutes and change, with no timeouts left, I said, 'It's up to you now."

The teams battled closely down the stretch. A runner by Khalif Wyatt brought Temple within 73-71 with 28 seconds left, but Williams and Morgan each converted twice from the stripe to clinch the

Morgan, who picked up two early fouls and sat for much of the first half, said his teammates told him to stay focused.

"They told me to keep my head, just keep playing, and it worked out," Morgan said. "The last game was a

confidence-builder for us. We knew we could play with them."

Temple defeated the Minutemen 90-88 in overtime Feb. 29 in Philadelphia. Williams agreed that game helped his team.

"Once we found out Temple was our matchup, we locked in, settled down and learned from our mistakes," said Williams, who had 10 assists and just one turnover Friday. "Watching the last game, I could have gotten to some 50/50 balls. I take responsibility for our last game."

Wyatt, Temple's second-leading scorer and third in the conference, was late for the game and did not start. He entered with 10:24 left in the first half and sparked the Owls to a 24-15 advantage at the 7:37 mark. UMass rallied within 32-28 on a layup by Javorn Farrell, but trailed 36-31 at the break.

The Minutemen connected on only 12 of 32 shots in the half (37.5 percent) while the Owls were 13 for 28 (46.4 percent) and held a 21-15 rebounding edge.

"We got ourselves back to up four – two times we were up four (in the second half) – and we had poor decisions with the ball and it led to baskets down the other end. We can't do that," Temple coach Fran Dunphy said. "We got out of character again and that's what happens .x.x. we're going to pay the price and we did today."

Wyatt scored 15 points and Moore 14 for Temple, which tied a season-high with 22 turnovers.

It was the 64th meeting between the schools, with Temple now holding a 43-21 advantage.

UMass basketball team's increased unity didn't happen by accident



ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — A lack of talent wasn't the biggest issue with the UMass basketball program in the previous three seasons. Sure, it took Derek Kellogg some time to restock the barren cupboards Travis Ford left behind after he bolted for Oklahoma State four years ago, but the Minutemen featured some capable individual players in the last few seasons emphasis on individual.

From the outside, UMass seemed to be lacking the chemistry that would enable the team to get over the hump. For example, the Minutemen began last season 7-0, hit a rough patch and never recovered, stumbling to a disappointing 15-15finish.

As it turns out, it wasn't just outsiders that recognized the lack of intangibles. Kellogg and his players made a concerted effort to become more a team this season, instead of a collection of individual talent.

The result has been a 21-10 season, which continues today at noon against Temple in the quarterfinals of the Atlantic 10 tournament in Atlantic City. UMass isn't all the way back, but this season has been a step in the right direction.

Fans returned to the Mullins Center, thanks in part to the team finally living up to the exciting style of play Kellogg has promised since he took over at his alma mater. With a solid cast of juniors and three sophomores leading the team in scoring, the future looks bright.

But none of the positive vibes would be possible if the players didn't dedicate themselves to becoming a true team, a process that began long before practices kicked off last fall.

"I think the guys put in the work as a group from May until the start of the year where it was them," Kellogg said. "They were working with our new strength coach Rich Hogans. They were kind of on their own because we're not allowed to do anything with them over the summer and I thought that was a huge turning point that they really all bought in and worked their tails off in the offseason. Now when the game is on the line or you realize you're giving up a little bit of yourself, you all put that work in together and it's a little tougher to let it go."

Kellogg recognized the change in culture immediately, as he noted in an interview before the season began.

"The biggest difference I'm seeing is we have a team," Kellogg said in November. "We have guys that look at each other as family members, players that are playing for each other and are willing sacrifice finally for the betterment of the team and the program. In college, sometimes that's as important as having the best player on the floor. It's who has the best group of guys and the best team, not who has the best collection of individuals."

As you read in today's Herald, junior Javorn Farrell is a shining example of the team's new attitude. Farrell has put the team first and accepted a reduced role, something that probably wouldn't have happened in the past.

"We were young. Some of the people that were here weren't recruited by coach Kellogg. We also had some players that were recruited pretty high and we all had our own agendas," Farrell said. "Now we all see that it's going to take a team to win. We had some great players – leading scorers or whatever – but we saw that someone scoring 20 isn't what helps us win. It's going to be everybody putting a little bit aside and everybody playing together that's going to help us win."

That's not to say it's been all roses for the Minutemen this season. They've faced their share of adversity. Injuries to a pair of forwards — **Sampson Carter** and **Cady Lalanne** — have left the team with just eight scholarship players and they lost three games by three points or less down the stretch.

In the past, either would have been enough to derail the season. But this year, the Minutemen have weathered the storm. Players have stepped up to fill the voids left by Carter and Lalanne and the team responded to the tough late-season losses with a pair of wins, including a 92-83 victory over Duquesne in the first round of the A-10 tourney on Tuesday.

Kellogg credits the work of renowned sports psychologist Dr. Joe Carr with instilling better camaraderie among the players.

"We've done some exercises and brought in Dr. Joe Carr, who helped do some things with the team early on in September," Kellogg said. "It was something that I thought was big for us to form that brotherhood that these guys talk about quite frequently."

Carr has worked with numerous college and professional teams. His work with the Minutemen didn't end with a preseason session, as he's remained a resource throughout the season.

"It's had a huge effect. I'm able to converse with Dr. Carr once or twice a week for the season to bounce things off him," Kellogg said. "He'll watch our team and get a feel for where our energy level is. He's made a stop throughout the season to come in and re-energize our team and just to reevaluate some of the exercises and things that we put in place when he initially came. That's been a big boost for myself and the kids on the team to have a resource like Dr. Carr, who has been working for a lot of teams, but spending enough time with UMass to say we're one of his programs."

Kellogg looking to stoke a fire

ATLANTIC CITY - The two teams once were fierce Atlantic 10 opponents who went at it with such fervor that one of the indelible images of the rivalry was Temple coach John Chaney trying to attack University of Massachusetts coach John Calipari at a postgame press conference.

Then UMass's basketball fortunes faded and Temple's evolved from Chaney to the current success of coach Fran Dunphy.

Enter coach Derek Kellogg and a rejuvenated UMass squad. The Heimlich maneuver, please.

Friday at Boardwalk Hall, Kellogg will try to turn up the heat in the rivalry once again when his eighth-seeded Minutemen take on the top-seeded Owls in the conference tournament.

"I talk to the team all the time about the history of the rivalry, having played in so many of those games," said Kellogg. "Kids get lost in the shuffle when you haven't seen it in a while.

"But I think the game we played against them 10 days ago brought back the memories. It was a great game in a big—time environment, with players fighting for every inch of the floor.

"That awakened the echoes of Temple-UMass for my kids. That's what you expect a Temple-UMass game to be."

UMass lost that game, 90-88, in overtime at Temple.

"We were up 6 with two minutes left [in overtime] but didn't close it out," Kellogg said.

UMass point guard Chaz Williams said the team has not forgotten that game.

"We've been watching the film and replaying the game in our heads," said Williams, who with a 16.2-point average could become the first point guard in 30 years to lead UMass in scoring. "We made some mental errors, and we know we can play with this team and win."

Williams turned philosophical when asked what has set this UMass team, which is 21-10 overall, apart from the failures of its predecessors.

"We're playing as a team and a unit and as a brotherhood, and we want to be successful in life, and it's carrying over to the floor," he said. "Last year, if somebody took a bad shot on the floor, we would just stagnate. That's not the case this season. We have a different mind-set."

Beating Temple will take all of that mind-set, plus some physical skill. The Owls are 24-6, including a victory over Duke, and are considered a lock for the NCAA Tournament no matter what happens this weekend.

Guards Khalif Wyatt, Ramone Moore, and Juan Fernandez have a combined average of close to 45 points.

"They are, as good as any three guards in the country," said Kellogg.

The keys to beating Temple?

"Like Cal used to say, it's a 12 noon game, so the team that shows up ready to play will win," said Kellogg. "We have to slow down the three guards. We want to get the pace moving and free up our shooters. They probably want to play rough and tough. But Temple's record speaks for itself at Boardwalk Hall."

Temple is 10-2 at the venue and has won three of the last five A-10 tourneys played in Atlantic City.

UMass, on the other hand, is 0-6 in its last six outings in Atlantic City. The last time UMass won here was in 1995 when it beat La Salle, 87-64, with Lou Roe making an Atlantic City homecoming.

"This should be a spectacular quarterfinal game," said Dunphy. "It will be great for the fans."

Javorn Farrell, UMass get it together at right time

Before the season, Javorn Farrell described a more unselfish culture with the UMass men's basketball team.

"It just feels like everyone is on the same page and no one has personal agendas that they're trying to achieve over the team's goals," Farrell said in November.

While genuine, the comments were easy to make before a game had been played and anyone was forced to accept a reduced role.

But Farrell has proven to be a man of his word. The junior was squeezed out of the rotation and didn't play in a 90-88 overtime loss to No. 21 Temple on Feb. 29.

Rather than sulk over the benching, Farrell responded when given another chance. He provided a spark in an 89-83 win over Rhode Island in the regular season finale before exploding for 20 points, nine assists and seven rebounds in UMass' 92-83 win over Duquesne in the first round of the Atlantic 10 tournament on Tuesday.

"It's a special situation to have him respond and come back and play the way he did in such a big game," UMass coach Derek Kellogg said. "It's always been in Javorn. He has it in him to step up in big situations."

Farrell hadn't played up to the promise he showed as a sophomore, when the scrappy 6-foot-5 swingman averaged 8.5 points and 4.1 rebounds. His minutes and shots have declined this season, consequently reducing his production (6.1 points, 2.8 rebounds).

But there has been another difference this season: The Minutemen (21-10) are enjoying their most success in Kellogg's four years. With three sophomores stepping into bigger roles, established veterans like Farrell had to make personal concessions.

"It's not been easy on some of the older guys as there's been some shifts in the lineup," Kellogg said. "Sometimes you go from a starter to a guy coming off the bench because that's what the team needs you to do. That's not easy for players that have been in the program for 2-3 years to now say, 'I'm going to reinvent myself and do whatever I need to do for the basketball team.' When guys are able to do that — like Javorn taking on that role — I think that's when you become a better basketball

In a way, things come full circle for Farrell today when UMass faces top-seeded Temple at noon in an A-10 quarterfinal in Atlantic City, N.J. Farrell will have a chance to make an impact this time and, more importantly, the sacrifices made by him and others have the team in better position to win.

"We're in the frame of mind that you want to be in. That doesn't guarantee success, but I think it gives you a chance to have success," Kellogg said. "The game at Temple at least lets us know that even though they're the No. 1 team in our conference and they're in the Top 25, there were instances in that game that we were the better team. We just have to have more of those instances to have some success."

AMHERST - Javorn Farrell had a career game and the University of Massachusetts put to rest the ghosts of Atlantic-10 tournament first-round losses past with a **92-83 win over Duquesne** Tuesday before 4,061 at the Mullins Center.

The victory sends eighth-seeded UMass (21-10) to the second round of the A-10 tournament where it will meet top-seeded Temple on Friday at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City, N.J. UMass suffered a 90-88 overtime loss to the Owls just last week in Philadelphia.

"That team played well, I thought Duquesne came at us with everything they had, took a lead late in the second half and I thought the guys on the team made a concerted effort to try and win the basketball game," UMass coach Derek Kellogg said. "To have the crowd into it the way it was, that was a big-time ending and I thought it was a big-time college atmosphere."

Farrell scored a season-high 20 points with a career-high nine assists, as well as seven rebounds. Chaz Williams scored 21 with eight boards and Raphiael Putney dropped in 20 points.

And the Minutemen needed all that and more in a game in which the lead changed 14 times and the

game was tied on another eight occasions.

"Actually I thought they were going to escape from us a little bit," UMass forward Terrell Vinson said. "I hit the big three and that was good, we got stops and rebounds and we scored. We turned it up in the last minutes."

The back-and-forth game had the Dukes (16-15) ahead by five with six minutes to play when Vinson buried the 3-pointer from in front of his bench. Farrell then scored in the lane thanks to a penetrating drive and pass by Williams to tie the game.

Williams then sank four straight foul shots to give UMass an 82-78 lead.

Sean Johnson (12 points) hit a 3-pointer to bring

Duquesne back to within one but Williams scored on a layup, then hit a foul shot after Duquesne's B.J. Monteiro picked up his fifth foul.

Frustration got the better of Monteiro and he was given a technical foul, but that was equalized when plastic soda bottle was thrown at the Duquesne players from the stands, the home team getting a technical for the stupidity of the fans.

Farrell hit two two free throws and T.J. McConnell two for Duquesne, making to 87-83. But Duquesne was unable to score again as the UMass defense arrived in the nick of time.

The win erased the memory of last year's sorry performance in the first round, a 78-50 loss to Dayton at the Mullins Center.

"That's all I could think about the last 365 days and last season and how we went out," Vinson said.

A wild first half had an even wilder finish as the Minutemen went to the locker room with a 51-48 lead.

A track meet broke out on the basketball court, the team's combining for 13 3-pointers and 99 points. UMass made 57 percent of its shots while the Dukes were good on 53 percent of their shots from the floor.

The lead changed six times and was tied on four more occasions. UMass had a four point lead with the ball and 26.7 seconds left when Kellogg called a timeout to draw up the final play of the half.

During the timeout, Duquesne coach Ron Everhart asked the officials to check the TV monitor, claiming Putney

elbowed Johnson just before the timeout. The refs checked the monitor and agreed with the Dukes coach, issuing a


flagrant-1 foul to Putney.

Johnson made the two free throws and Duquesne was awarded the ball which could have led to the Dukes tying the game or taking the lead into halftime.

But Jesse Morgan stripped McConnell of the ball at midcourt and scored at the rim and was fouled by McConnell, hitting the free throw for a 51-46 lead with 10 seconds left.

McConnell answered with a short jumper at the buzzer to allow Duquesne to settle for a 3-point deficit at the break.

Williams' up-tempo style points Minutemen to A-10 tournament

UMass plays its biggest game of the season tonight when it hosts Duquesne in the first round of the Atlantic 10 tournament. Those stakes mean the Minutemen likely can count on a big performance from point guard Chaz Williams, who has shown a propensity for rising to the occasion.

The generously listed 5-foot-9 point guard has a sizable chip on his shoulder that was forged on the unforgiving Brooklyn playgrounds.

"It comes from my stomping grounds, being from Brooklyn," Williams said. "I've always been doubted. I've always been told I was never going to be anything. Growing up I kind of listened to it, but also used it as motivation. That's what drives me today."


There is little Williams can hear on the court that is more harsh than his early days.

"I get driven over people talking trash to me because I feel like they're still doubting me once again," Williams said. "That's what brings my game to the highest peak."

Named to the All-Atlantic 10 first team yesterday, Williams has scored in double figures in 11 straight games and turned in a pair of monster performances in two marquee late-season matchups.

In an 80-73 win against Xavier on Feb. 21, Williams had 29 points, nine assists and five rebounds. A week later, he had 26 points, 11 assists and eight rebounds in a heartbreaking, 90-88 overtime loss at No. 21 Temple.

Williams is eager to play under the brighter lights of the conference tournament.



The game plan this season has been for Williams, who sat out the 2010-11 campaign after transferring from Hofstra, to quarterback a new up-tempo style implemented by fourth-year coach Derek Kellogg. With athletic scorers Raphiael Putney (10.1 points per game) and Jesse Morgan on the wing (9.8) and solid veterans Terrell Vinson (9.3) and Sean Carter (7.9) inside, things have come together with Williams running the show.

"They just know I'm a pass-first point guard," Williams said. "I like to get them shots. They know if they run the floor and they're open, I'm going to get them the ball no matter what. I just wanted to come in and bring my spirit and my heart and my toughness to the team just to help us out."

Including the Temple loss, UMass (20-10) dropped three of its final nine games by three points or less, with two going to overtime. Those narrow defeats likely will be the difference between an NCAA and an NIT resume, but the Minutemen aren't wasting time lamenting missed opportunities.

"It's a new season now," Williams said. "The schedule and record is 0-0. We're just looking to come out and just fill up on wins and not worry about the losses."



Youth, verve putting UMass back on the map

AMHERST - You might not have motored out on the Mass. Pike this season to see a game, or even watched any of the occasional regional telecasts on cable. But if you're a "SportsCenter" regular, you've caught a few glimpses of University of Massachusetts basketball.

Twice within the last couple months, the show's "Top 10" segment has featured highlight-reel plays by UMass sophomore Raphiael Putney. You might recall them. They were dunks. True, practically every "Top 10" hoops play is a dunk. But these were memorable.

That's especially so for the clip that was ranked No. 3 Feb. 8, which came midway through the first half of a game at the Mullins Center against St. Bonaventure. The Minutemen were on a fast break when point guard Chaz Williams, despite having not reached midcourt, launched the ball toward the basket. Putney, running the court with a gazelle's urgent gait, took off in midstride, caught the ball next to the rim, and slammed it. The crowd exploded.

"I loved it," said coach Derek Kellogg, who in his fourth year has his first 20-win season - and counting, as the Minutemen (20-10, 9-7 Atlantic 10) prepare to host Duquesne (16-14, 7-9) tonight in the first round of the conference tournament. "Those are the type of plays that excite the fans, and they're also game-changing plays. I think that was even more the case with the dunk against Saint Joe's, when we were down 12 and needed something to wake us up."

The coach was referring to the No. 8 play in the "Top 10" on the Jan. 14 "SportsCenter." UMass had fallen behind Saint Joseph's, 20-3, and was just beginning to show some life by scoring 5 straight points. Then Putney struck on the fast break, as Williams found him with a sweet between-the-legs bounce pass and the 6-foot-9-inch highlight reel soared over a defender and slammed the ball home to make it a 10-point game. The Minutemen would have the lead by halftime, and they won, 71-62.

"That was one of the top plays a UMass player has made, not just this year but ever," Kellogg said. Because it lit a spark and his team won? That's part of it, the coach acknowledged, but he's thinking more of the big picture.

"I haven't seen those kinds of dunks around here in a long, long time," said Kellogg, who was a Minuteman point guard during four A-10 championship seasons from 1992-95. "Plays like that dunk can be program changers. My vision for this team is to be running and throwing alley-oop passes and making incredibly athletic dunks. We're starting to be that team. We're making plays the student section goes crazy over. And we're starting to get some national attention."

A large part of the UMass program's attention-grabbing enhancement can be attributed to Putney and fellow sophomore starters Williams and Jesse Morgan. The latter has elevated his game at shooting guard, most recently in Saturday's regular-season finale, when he put up a career-high 25 points against Rhode Island on 9-of-9 shooting, including 6 of 6 from the 3-point arc.

"When he's knocking down his 3-pointers and getting into the lane and making plays, we're a dangerous team," said Kellogg. "And Jesse's also become a very good defender. We put him on the other team's best player on occasion, and he's locked those guys down."

As for Williams, the 5-9 transfer from Hofstra is the engine that makes the Minutemen go. The team's leading scorer (16.2 points per game) and the A-10's leading assist man (6.4), he was named first-team all-conference Monday, the first UMass player so honored since Gary Forbes (now with the Toronto Raptors) was the A-10 player of the year in 2007-08.

"The thing about this kid is, he just loves to play basketball," said Kellogg. "He's always in the gym working on making himself better and making his teammates better, too. Chaz has put the team on his back at times with his scoring, and other times he's done little things to get his teammates recognized. He's a competitor with that New York City toughness. And he gets how I want the team to play."

That brings the story full circle back to Putney, whom Kellogg recognized as the prototype athlete for his preferred uptempo style the first time the coach spotted the then-high school player four years ago at the Reebok All-American basketball camp in Philadelphia. "His dexterity and the way he moved, for a player of his length, it really intrigued me with how I wanted to play as a coach," said Kellogg. "He looked like a guy who was just scratching the surface of what he could be."

After a redshirt year, Putney's role increased gradually as his freshman season wore on. "Last year was kind of rough, because I didn't know college basketball," said Putney, who averaged 4.4 points and 3.0 rebounds. "But this year I've taken on a bigger role, and I like being a guy the team goes to when we need a bucket. I've gotten better over time. I've gotten comfortable."

And made defenses uncomfortable.

Putney, a 21-year-old out of Woodbridge, Va., is the only Minuteman other than Williams with a scoring average in double figures (10.2), getting his points everywhere from exhilarating dunks to teardrop 3-pointers. He's too long for most perimeter defenders to bother, too quick for most bigs to stay with.

"When he's in the right frame of mind to take over games and play the way we need him to, he's a really tough cover," said Kellogg.

But the coach sees Putney's value extending well beyond the offensive end of the court. After all, if Williams is the engine that drives this team, what fuels that fast-break engine are the plays that put the ball in the point guard's hands. And Putney leads the Minutemen in both blocked shots (44) and defensive rebounds (137).

"When he does what I call the grunt-man stuff - the defensive rebounds, the shot blocks, the dives for loose balls - we're a much more polished team," said Kellogg. "Raphiael does the little things, things that a lot of kids don't understand are the important things. He's a complete player - but one who still has a big upside."

As such, Putney is a microcosm of this UMass team of three sophomore starters and a couple of freshmen (Cady Lalanne and Maxie Esho) who've shown flashes of what Putney sporadically put on display last year. "We have a program now," said Kellogg. "The kids are in the gym working, they have a brotherhood, a bond, and now there are older guys who've been here with this coaching staff and can show the younger ones how we play basketball at UMass. You want to get to the point where when a senior leaves, the next kid just comes in and takes his spot."

"It's a transition. We've had some rough times since I've been here," said Kellogg, who won 12, 12, and 15 games in his first three seasons. "Everything hasn't gone the way I planned or how I would have liked. But now this is fun. We have 20 wins, we have a chance in the conference tournament, and hopefully some postseason play. We've done it with an exciting style, with a little bit of flair. And that's why the crowds have come back the way they have."

AMHERST - **University of Massachusetts** senior center Sean Carter says he has thought about scoring 20 points in a college basketball game

It took him 121 games, but he made it on Senior Night in a game that showcased what Carter has meant to this program.

"In my dream, it's actually about 40. When I was inching up to 16 or 18 this year, I thought I'd make it," Carter said after scoring a career high 22 points in an 89-83 win over Rhode Island before 7,501 at the Mullins Center.

Jesse Morgan scored a career high 25 on 9-for-9 shooting with six 3-pointers for UMass (20-10, 9-7 Atlantic 10).

The Minutemen wound up with the No. 8 seed in the Atlantic 10 tournament. They will play their first-round A-10 game Tuesday night at home against Duquesne (16-14, 7-9), the No. 9 seed.

UMass wound up in four-way tie for fifth place with Saint Joseph's, Dayton and La Salle, but lost the head-to-head tiebreakers and got the eighth seed.

Carter is the only UMass senior to play regularly. His focus on defense and rebounding has made it easy to overlook him or take him for granted, but coach Derek Kellogg has not.

"Sean is a genuinely good person, the type I want in this program. He's on the Student Advisory Council, he spends time with people, and he's also improved his game every year."

"In this game, he was unreal. It was the best game he's played since he's been here."

Carter spent a year at Oregon State, then transferred to UMass as one of Kellogg's first additions.

A 4.0 student as a sociology major, he not only reached 20 points for the first time but had 10 rebounds - seven off the offensive glass.

Once a liability at the time, Carter hit 8 of 11 free throws.

The win gave Kellogg, a fourth-year coach, his first 20-win season - and only the third for UMass since 1998.

"A lot of teams get to 20 after a few postseason games. To get it in the regular season is a milestone for the program," he said.

Rhode Island had beaten UMass in Kingston, R.I., last month. The Rams finished 7-24 overall and 4-12 in the A-10, leaving longtime coach Jim Baron's future in question.

Forward Orion Outerbridge scored 24 points Saturday and 53 in two games against UMass. He had 18 before Javorn Farrell began defending him and slowed him down.

"I was happy Javorn played so many minutes (26) and played so well," said Kellogg, who never called for Farrell off the bench in Wednesday's overtime loss at Temple.

"We need him. We need everybody if we're going to make a run in the A-10 tournament."

UMass led 44-43 at halftime. Rhode Island overcame a 66-55 deficit to lead briefly, but a 14-0 UMass run made it 85-72.

Morgan could not recall making nine straight shots.

"Not in a game, anyway. Maybe in practice, but it's definitely a good feeling that gives me confidence," the sophomore guard said.

"He's one of the best scorers in the league. I just wanted to get the ball to him," said point guard Chaz Williams, who scored 19 points with nine assists, six rebounds and five steals.

Williams had been hounded by defenders in recent games. He looked to Carter for help.

"They were cracking down on me, so I told Sean to find some gaps. The plays we ran for him were terrific, too," Williams said.

In a typical epic, UMass loses an OT heartbreaker at Temple

PHILADELPHIA - If this was in fact the last Atlantic 10 Conference men's basketball game between the **University of Massachusetts** and Temple, the Minutemen very nearly gave their archrivals something to remember them by.

They gave their own program one of the most inspired performances in the 63 games these teams have staged.

It was not enough. UMass shook off the fierce hostility of the Liacouras Center, only to lose a 90-88 overtime heartbreaker Wednesday night.

"It was a great college basketball game. I was very proud of our guys," UMass coach Derek Kellogg said.

"Hopefully, they can take a learning lesson from this on how to close out a win. But when they were trailing, they came back to the huddle, believing they could win.

"When that's the case, anything can happen."

Khalif Wyatt scored 26 points for Temple. The junior guard's breakaway layup with 16.4 seconds left was the winning basket.

The win clinched the top seed in the A-10 tournament for No. 23-ranked Temple (23-6, 12-

3), which was playing on Senior Night and may be Big East bound as early as next season.

Wednesday night.

UMass is 19-10 overall and 8-7 in the Atlantic 10. The Minutemen are all but certain to finish out of the league's top four, which carries with it a first-round bye in next week's A-10 tournament.

That means they will play a first-round game Tuesday night. It will probably be at home, though if they lose to Rhode Island Saturday, they could fall as low as ninth and get a first-round road game.

They are now in a three-way tie for sixth.

"We didn't do everything we could have done. There were a lot of mental mistakes on our part that changed the game," center Sean Carter said.

"It was possible to take this game. We just have to stay positive and focussed," said point guard Chaz Williams, who scored 26 points with 11 assists, eight rebounds and four steals.

Trailing 75-66 with 2:40 left in regulation, UMass forced an 80-80 tie and then took an 86-80 lead in overtime.

Temple responded with an 8-2 run. With 58 seconds left, Wyatt's old-fashioned 3-point shot tied it at 88.

Williams' contested layup didn't fall, Maxie Esho's tip was blocked and Wyatt scored on a breakaway with 16.4 seconds left.

UMass came down for a last try. Jesse Morgan's twisting jumper from the right side missed, another tip didn't fall, and the upset bid was done.

Heartbreaking.

Two big 3-pointers by Freddie Riley helped wipe out the late deficit in regulation. It was a different UMass team than the outfit that, by its own admission, mailed in the final minutes of Saturday's 33-point loss at Dayton.

"This isn't the best UMass basketball left, but that's around the corner. This is a precursor," Kellogg said.

"This reminded me of those UMass-Temple games of the 1990s - both teams throwing haymakers and shots, nobody giving up."

True to their game plan, the Minutemen kept the tempo as rapid as possible, giving the more methodical Owls some trouble.

UMass played one of its best halves of the season and led 37-32 at the midpoint. Temple opened the second half on an 18-7 run.

But there was no quit in the Minutemen, who briefly regained the lead. Temple's answer came from back-to-back 3-pointers by Ramone Moore and Juan Fernandez that gave the Owls a 61-58 lead with 8:20 left.

When Temple regained possession, Kellogg was hit with a technical foul. Wyatt swished both free throws, and the Owls had a five-point lead.

Trailing 69-60 with four minutes to go, UMass breathed new life when Williams hit back-to-back 3-pointers. Moore's basket stalled the comeback, but UMass still forced overtime.

Baskets by Carter and Raphiael Putney opened the session, and Williams was open for a 3 that would have made it a seven-point lead.

"That might have sealed it, but it hit the back rim. It's a shot I would tell him to take every time, the way he was playing," Kellogg said.

"At times in the games, he dominated for us, which is what we need against such good teams."

Wyatt, Michael Eric (19 points) and Fernandez (18) led Temple. Wyatt had six assists for the Owls, who took 40 free throws to the Minutemen's 10.

UMass guard and Philadelphia native Morgan, who played extremely well with 15 points, was hit with a technical soon after. Temple inflated its lead to nine.

Playing on a tender ankle, Terrell Vinson scored most of his 16 in the first 10 minutes.

Putney was insignificant for a half. After that, he was great and finished with 16 points.

Temple is looking at a move to the Big East, possibly for as early as next season. The future of the most storied rivalry in the Atlantic 10, one that put the league on the national map, hangs in the balance.

A scheduled meeting of the trustees athletics committee Wednesday was cancelled, delaying a decision some media sources are calling inevitable.

UMass has more immediate concerns. A 1-4 slide has pushed UMass into the middle of the jumbled A-10 standings. The Minutemen will rely on their own Senior Night to regain momentum for next week's conference tournament.

UMass got an early boost from Vinson, who scored 12 of his team's first 16 points. The junior forward had 14 by halftime.

He got help from Williams, who scored 10 with six assists before halftime. The point guard rose to the occasion under pressure, as he had with a career high 29 points in last week's win over Xavier.



UMass' pint-sized point guard brings relevance

We'll have a column today on Xavier, but UMass certainly worthy of praise as the Minutemen stand one victory shy of a 20-win campaign:

AMHERST, Mass. - Derek Kellogg had never laid eyes on Chaz Williams before. The UMass head coach and his staff did their due diligence, talked to plenty of CAA coaches who spoke glowingly of the Hofstra transfer and his toughness and ability to play far larger than his diminutive stature.

Then the UMass coach and former point guard got his first look at Williams when he came to Amherst on a visit.

Uh-oh.

"I thought his height was questionable," Kellogg said.

"But he walked with a swagger," Kellogg added. "And I just figured this kid has to be able to play."

Williams is listed at 5-foot-9, but Kellogg was already forewarned that his newest recruiting target wasn't a legit 5-9. Then he walked in the door.

"I think he's probably 5-foot-5," Kellogg said of the Brooklyn native

"He's killing me," Williams said of Kellogg claiming he's 5-foot-5.

All joking aside on Williams' stature, this kid can play. He's exactly what Kellogg has needed since he replaced Travis Ford at UMass: a legitimate floor leader.

Admittedly, I saw Williams on his most impressive 40 minutes (he actually logged 38) as a Minuteman point guard. He was clearly the best guard on a court that also featured fellow New Yorkers Tu Holloway and Mark Lyons, going for 29 points and dishing out nine assists.

"He did everything for us tonight," Kellogg said. "He made shots, made free throws and defended," Kellogg said.

That hasn't always been the case, but when Williams plays this way he changes this UMass team and makes them a viable contender for a Top four spot in the A-10. The Minutemen won their 19th game last night against Xavier and improved to 8-5 in league play, which puts them in a three-way tie with the Musketeers and Saint Joseph's for third place.

"This was as big as any win we've gotten since I've been back," Kellogg admitted after the 80-73 win. "Xavier has been the benchmark of the league -- and for us to do it with what was on the line."

Kellogg hasn't gotten UMass basketball back to what it was in the days when John Calipari was running things, but the fan support has grown as the wins have piled up and as Kellogg has altered his style of play, opting to press and run with added frequency.

Xavier came into last night's game having won the past six in the series, but Williams and his teammates snapped that streak and while the program's point guard hasn't had to endure what most of his teammates have over the past few years, he was primed on the importance of this victory.

"They gave me an understanding of everything," Williams said. "Guys told me how Xavier has left a bad taste in their mouth over the last few years, but this year we're turning things around and making people realize that UMass basketball is back."

Back by Calipari standards? No, but that'll never happen again. That's just plain unrealistic.

However, UMass has become relevant in the A-10 again.

Senior Sean Carter a leader on the court and in the classroom at UMass

AMHERST - Sean Carter's on-court senior leadership for the University of Massachusetts has been on full display all season.

The Minuteman center is in the midst of the best year of his career, but he's been setting an example off the court as well. As his scoring average has gone up, so has his grade point average.

Carter was one of 29 UMass athletes, and the only one from the men's basketball team, to earn a 4.0 grade point average in either the fall or spring semester in 2011.

Carter, a sociology major who earned his perfect score in the fall, was proud of the first-time accomplishment.

"All A's? Can't beat that," said Carter, who'll likely be a strong candidate for Atlantic 10 All-Academic honors. "I knew I had pretty good chance of getting good grades this semester and I took advantage of the opportunities I had."

Carter liked the idea that his success might help disprove some people's assumption that athletes don't prioritize their academics.

"I wanted to show people that we take school seriously. It's good for the community to see that we take school seriously, that we're serious about academics and sports," Carter said. "We're all trying to get better in the classroom. Everybody is. I'm trying to show the younger guys what type of grades we should be getting. We're all capable of it."

UMass coach Derek Kellogg, a three-time Academic All-Conference team member from 1993-95 when he was a Minuteman, was impressed.

"He has set an example in a lot of different ways around here," Kellogg said. "For any player to do that and still be playing is a great accomplishment and one I'm very, very proud of."

Carter, who transferred to UMass from Oregon State, said he's enjoyed being a student more as his college career has progressed.

"Over the years I've grown to love it more as I've been taking classes I'm more interested in. I've found some things are really interesting," he said. "I got interested in a lot of social movement stuff in my classes. I wrote a lot of papers and stuff with that."

He hoped to someday work with children after his basketball career was over.

"I want to do something with kids, underprivileged kids. The sociology has really helped me understand a lot about the welfare system and how that works, and the rules and regulations," he said. "Some kids need some guidance to help themselves and their families. I want to be the type of person who can help them with after-school programs and stuff like that."

Carter planned on saving the proof of his 4.0.

"You get a certificate. I'm definitely going to keep that," Carter said. "One day when I have my own kids I can show them."

Putney staying out of foul trouble; leads team in def. rebounds, blocks

With almost half of the Atlantic 10 season in the books for the Massachusetts men's basketball team, one thing has become evident; it's a different team with Raphiael Putney on the court. Last Saturday, the 6-foot-9 forward managed to stay out of foul trouble and played a season-high 36 minutes in the Minutemen's 72-59 win over the Billikens. He also recorded his third double-double in seven games, with 22 points and 10 rebounds.

His performance earned him Co-A-10 men's basketball Player of the Week honors on Monday.

Putney was brilliant on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court versus SLU. He abstained from attempting miraculous blocks and rarely drove in too deep to the paint, instead selecting to shoot mid-range shots or floaters.

However, this smart play offensively and defensively has been absent for parts of the season. As good as he can be, he's been prone to mental mistakes.

Putney often gets posted up by stronger players and has the propensity to commit soft fouls, something UMass coach Derek Kellogg doesn't want to see.

"Instead of taking those weak ticky-tacky fouls, he's got to make sure it's a tough hard nose play," said Kellogg.

Considering his recent breakout and his offensive efficiency (49.4 percent shooting), Putney averages just 22.6 minutes per game, the least among starters, despite being the second leading scorer on the team.

One can easily chalk his lack of minutes up to his constant foul trouble.

Putney has committed the third most fouls on the team, despite not playing huge minutes, and has fouled out three times this year, tied with freshman Maxie Esho for the most on the squad.

It's not only Putney who has struggled with his foul trouble. The Minutemen also have struggled with fouls whenever Putney resorts to the role of spectator after his foul issues.

"I think there's a correlation between us struggling sometimes against teams in our conference and him not being on the floor," said Kellogg.

In four of its five defeats, Putney struggled to stay on the floor because of foul trouble, accumulating at least four fouls in each of those losses.

He's also had to sit out large chunks of the first half on multiple occasions after picking up two fouls early in contests.

Lately, Putney's experienced a handful of highs and lows in conference play. He played wonderfully in back-to-back wins versus Charlotte and Saint Joseph's. The sophomore had just two fouls between the games, while averaging 18 points, 8.5 rebounds and 34.5 minutes per game over the two-game stretch.

However, he followed with disappointing showings against Richmond and Duquesne during UMass' next two games. Putney fouled out against the Spiders and committed four fouls versus the Dukes and averaged just 4.5 points and 19 minutes per game against the two A-10 foes.

While Kellogg agreed that foul trouble factors into Putney's lack of minutes, he also attributes that to his conditioning, which he hopes improves next season.

"Right now I think he can play as good as he's capable of for 18-20 minutes a game, and then the other minutes he's just kind of out there," said Kellogg.

Kellogg noted the significant progress Putney has made from last season to this year in terms of his strength. He hopes that the progression will carry into next season.

It seems it's easy for viewers to try to critique a player like Putney because his potential is so evident. He's shown some flashes of brilliance on offense, including arguably the Minutemen's top play of the season when he threw down a thunderous dunk at the Mullins Center over winter break that cracked SportsCenter's Top 10.

When Putney is not fouling on the defensive end, he's usually making a spectacular block, picking an opponent's pocket or pulling down a rebound with his unbelievably long arms.

"His defensive rebounding, his steals and blocked shots are really what I think makes us a better team," said Kellogg.

He leads the team on the season with 26 blocks and 92 defensive rebounds.

"I think he's just scratching the surface," said Kellogg. "Some of it's going to come with maturity, some of it's going to come with added weight and like a lot of college kids, just figuring out the game."

For now, people may over-analyze his flaws and point out what he should be doing better. But the fact of the matter is if Putney puts everything together soon, then his critics will have nothing to complain about.

Resiliency has helped UMass basketball stay the course

AMHERST - The **University of Massachusetts** men's basketball team prides itself on its collective short memory.

"We just try to think about the next game. It's better to look forward and get prepared," said sophomore guard Chaz Williams, whose team plays Saint Louis at home on Saturday.

"It takes some growing up to move past a tough game. I had some of that growth in high school."

UMass is 15-5 this season, and 4-2 in the Atlantic 10. The Minutemen have not lost consecutive games this season.

They will try to build on last week's 79-68 at Richmond, which came after an 80-69 loss at Duquesne.

Jesse Morgan and Williams combined for 15 turnovers at Duquesne. They showed no ill after-effects at Richmond, where they combined for 37 points, 11 rebounds, 10 assists and only four turnovers.

Williams had 17 points, nine rebounds and seven assists. He reaffirmed his place as one of the better point guards in the Atlantic 10.

He is averaging 15.9 points and 5.9 assists per game. He has made his last 32 free throws and is closing in on Donta Bright's school record of 40 straight.

Morgan's 20-point night at Richmond strengthened the sophomore's case as one of the league's emerging star guards.

He is averaging 9.0 points, third on the team, and 2.4 assists.

Shaking off defeat has helped UMass go 9-2 since Dec. 4.

"It's something I learned, just by maturing and staying positive," Morgan said.

"There is not much time to dwell on a loss. Nobody likes to lose, but the game won't change," center Sean Carter said.

Resiliency was not a UMass strong suit last year, when Williams was sitting out as a transfer and Morgan was a bit player.

The Minutemen had three separate four-game losing streaks. They finished 15-15.

One of the worst defeats came after a five-point loss to Boston College had ended the team's promising 7-0 start.

The Minutemen came home and lost 68-56 to Maine. Later that seaon, they lost at Saint Louis and were then upset at Saint Joseph's, which took an 0-8 A-10 record into the game.

Winning at Richmond allowed UMass to avoid its first two-game losing streak.

"That was a good game to win, at a place where we have struggled. It was good to see the guys fight and scrap for a win that gave us good, positive reinforcement," UMass coach Derek Kellogg said.

The Minutemen have had a week to prepare for Saint Louis, which took a 15-4 record into Wednesday night's game against Xavier.

"It's a great time too get rested, re-energized and more familiar with what we're doing," Kellogg said.

"Those things are as important as anything at this time of season. We've been hitting the weight room, too."

The schedule break came after UMass had spent nearly a full week in travel.

After losing at Duquesne, the team returned to Amherst for one day, then flew out again to Richmond.

"This is a good time to get some practice and get prepared for a good team like Saint Louis," Carter said.

Kellogg said the Minutemen's 5-0 record after losses is the result of hard work.

"If you have players who put in the time and work on the practice floor, they probably won't have two bad games in a row," he said.

Putney making big strides

He may just be the most complete player on the Massachusetts men's basketball team. And his name isn't Chaz Williams.

It's the man who's spent most of the first 19 games soaring above the rim with his thunderous slams and knocking down 3-point baskets in transition: sophomore Raphiael Putney.

But you can call him 'Skinny.' That's the name he's carried with him ever since his Amateur Athletic Union days as a sophomore in high school playing for DC Triple Threat.

The 6-foot-9, 185-pound power forward has leaped onto the stage this season for the Minutemen and has solidified himself as one of the premier players on the squad.

Putney does it all for UMass. The Woodbridge, Va., native is second on the team in scoring with 10.2 points per contest, grabs 5.1 boards a night and leads the Minutemen with his 24 blocked shots on the defensive end.

UMass coach Derek Kellogg, who swayed Putney to Amherst as the final piece to his first official recruiting class with the Minutemen, said he feels the forward's versatility and undeniable athleticism separates him from others at his position.

"I think the biggest thing is that he's a kid that defensively can cover a guard ... but also go in there and rebound with the big guys and give some help inside because of his length and his size and I think that's huge," said Kellogg. "And then to have his athleticism to where he can get out in transition and shoot the 3 at 6-foot-9 gives us a weapon that I don't think a lot of teams have."

Putney's basketball days started in the sixth grade, when he played for his town's middle school squad. But it wasn't until his junior year of high school that he realized he was a special talent.

He shot up three inches to 6-foot-7 over the summer bridging his sophomore and junior year of high school, at which point his AAU coaches told him he had the potential to play Division I basketball.

Kellogg first spotted Putney in 2008 at the Reebok All-American camp in Philadelphia, where 'Skinny' was selected to play in the camp's All-Star Game.

"I saw this really kind of thin, athletic kid that seemed like he enjoyed to play the game and I was immediately drawn to his potential where I was watching him and felt down that the line, given some time and some of his nurturing, he could become a really good player," said Kellogg.

Putney liked the prospect of playing for UMass because of Kellogg, turning down other offers from George Mason, Virginia Tech and St. Joseph's among others, he said.

"I knew that he played here so I liked coach [Kellogg] and he's got some history out here and I thought it'd be a good chance for me to come here and learn from his experience that he played at UMass and then just try to get an Atlantic 10 championship there," said Putney.

And so it was finalized in November 2008; Putney was officially a Minuteman.

He was redshirted for the 2009 season, but Kellogg said it was the right decision for the big man and feels it aided his development and transition to the college game.

"I think that was ... huge for him to get him matured both on and off the court, getting acclimated to UMass and the academics, but also how physical and tough the college game can be at this level and I thought that first year gave him a good test of [not] just being able to practice, but go against guys that were college players," said Kellogg. "From that point on, I think he really decided that he was going to put in an effort to become a good college player."

As a redshirt freshman in 2010, Putney appeared in 29 of the team's 30 games, averaging 4.4 points per contest while seeing an average of 12.7 minutes on the court.

In the offseason, Putney went to work.

After shooting just 22 percent from 3-point range the year before, 'Skinny' knew he had the potential to better that part of his game.

"I've been at the gym working over the summer trying to get my 3-point shot better because last year I didn't have as good of range as I wanted to but ... coming into the new season, I think I worked hard for it and now its showing on the court," he said.

A year later, Putney is connecting from downtown at 38 percent, as the 3-point shot has quickly become a key element to his game that makes him a mismatch nightmare for opponents.

His shooting stroke wasn't the only thing he did to better his game, however.

When Kellogg recruited him, he knew he wasn't a "finished product," and felt that he needed to spend valuable time in the weight room to reach his potential.

And that's exactly what he did in the offseason, putting in the necessary time and hard work with strength and conditioning coach Richard Hogans to build up his strength.

"He's been a good help to me," said Putney. "He's been pushing me in the weight room and I've been getting a lot stronger with him and working with him on my diet and it's been good so far. I'm hoping to keep it up."

According to Putney, the muscle and weight he gained over the summer has paid dividends not only in extending his range behind the arc but in his rebounding as well, as he improved upon his mark of just three rebounds a game in 2010.

The factor that has arguably been the biggest influence on his transformation to stardom this year has been the installation of the uptempo, full-court press style of play that Kellogg introduced for the 2011-2012 campaign.

Putney's ability to run up and down the floor and make impact plays on both ends of the court makes the new offense "a perfect fit for me." He's consistently on the receiving end of alley-oop lobs from Williams (one of which ended up on a recent edition of Sportscenter), connecting on 3-point baskets in transition and rejecting lay-ups on the break.

"[His teammates] are realizing that he's becoming a focal point of our offense and our defense and they're starting to respect the fact that he can knock down 3s and make plays for his teammates," said Kellogg.

As Putney knows all too well, in order to get better you have to put in the right amount of work to do so.

"I got a lot of potential, my coaches keep telling me every day, but you ... got to put in hard work and that's it," he said.

As for this year's team, Putney explained that the Minutemen have the ability to contend with the top teams in the A-10, and possibly the country, on any given night.

"I think, right now, we can be one of the top teams in the Atlantic 10 [conference] this year and win our league, actually," said Putney. "I think every team that we step up to we are capable of beating if we just focus in and just do everything we can to get to our conference championship and hopefully go to the NCAA tournament this year."

If 'Skinny' keeps playing this way, he just might be right.

Raphiael Putney realizing substantial potential for UMass men's basketball

AMHERST - The potential has always been obvious with Raphiael Putney. The University of Massachusetts sophomore forward's combination of athleticism, shooting ability and length has made his future tantalizing to anyone who watched him.

But for much of last season, that potential only showed up in spurts. Plays that would put every eye in the building on him, an alley-oop or a blocked shot, would too often be followed by long stretches where he wouldn't be noticed at all.

But it's becoming harder and harder not to watch the Minuteman sophomore forward as the distance between the present and that immense potential is shrinking rapidly. The combination of a new offensive system, added maturity and strength, and a point guard who is looking to get him the ball in transition have led to a breakout year from the native of Woodbridge, Va.

"I feel like I'm comfortable at this level now," Putney said. "My confidence is where it needs to be and I'm playing real good right now. I'm just trying to keep it up."

Heights and weights on most college football and basketball rosters are more fiction than fact and UMass isn't any more accurate than most. Putney's listed weight last year was 180 pounds, about 15 more than his actual weight.

This year he's at about 178 (inching closer to his listed 185), according to new strength coach Rich Hogans, who has helped Putney add and keep on the extra pounds. But while Putney still looks thin, his time in the weight room has helped add muscle to his skinny frame.

"Underneath those clothes, he's getting ripped under there," Hogans said.

"Rich has helped me a lot. With my body type I can't really get big, but I'm getting stronger," Putney said. "On the court you can tell I'm getting a lot stronger with the things that I do."

The added strength has helped him withstand the physical play as well as maintain enough stamina to stay on the floor longer. His numbers are all climbing.

Last year he scored in double figures just three times. This season he's had at least 10 points in seven of his last eight games and 11 overall. His scoring average has more than doubled, going

from 4.4 points per game to 10.2. Putney is averaging 5.1 rebounds and has blocked a teamhigh 24 shots.

His highlight film moments are increasing too. His first-half dunk during the Minutemen's comeback win over Saint Joseph's on Saturday earned him SportsCenter's No. 8 spot on its daily top plays, and a still photo taken of his dunk in mid-flight has been all over Facebook.

"I've been around some guys that were really great athletes, but seeing that dunk as a still photo... Wow," UMass coach Kellogg said. "I was impressed. But I want to make sure he realizes that was one play and stays grounded."

That's figuratively of course because Putney isn't likely to stay grounded on the floor. He's got a taste for the big dunk adulation.

"I like that picture a lot," said Putney who was captured rising toward the basket with his right arm fully extended palming the ball above his head as the crowd and every player on the court looked on.

He had a similar dunk against Fordham and several alley-oop slams throughout the season.

"This year I've had more amazing dunks than I've ever had in my basketball career," he said. "It's getting exciting. I hope to keep it up."

Putney said he feeds off the thunderous applause that has followed.

"It gets me motivated and helps me play harder throughout the game. Plays like that helps bring more energy," he said. "I'm an energy-type guy. If I bring energy other guys are going to follow."

Putney promised that there's more to come in his game. He said he's working to be more effective inside.

"I think I should be in the post a lot more," he said. "I have undersized guards who guard me. Even though I'm a perimeter player I think I can help my team going to the post more like Sean Carter or Maxie Esho.

"I think I can get a lot better," he added. "I still have two more years to go."

Kellogg agreed.

"I'd love to put him in the post now. A lot of times he's matched up against a guy who is 6-foot-2 or 6-foot-3," Kellogg said. "As he gets stronger, you could just throw the ball up to him in the post and its hard to stop a guy with his wingspan...

"For a kid his size and length to have his athleticism is not something very common," Kellogg added. "He's matured mentally as much as physically. He's much more persistent in the gym before and after practice. He's doing the little things that lead to the big things."

ATLANTIC 10 FLYING HIGH - As of Monday morning, the Atlantic 10 had 10 of its 14 members ranked in the top 100 of the RPI, more than any other conference in the country. The 11th team, Duquesne is ranked 101. Of those 10, six are in the top 68.

Temple is No. 24, followed by Dayton (27), Xavier (43), Saint Joseph's (53), Saint Louis (59),

UMass (61), La Salle (78), St. Bonaventure (89) and Charlotte (91).

TRAVIS FORD ON THE HOT SEAT? - Former Minuteman coach Travis Ford's name is starting to show up on the "coaches on the hot seat" lists that are popular among national media at this time of year.

After two trips to the NCAA Tournament and one to the NIT, Oklahoma State is 9-8 (2-2 Big 12) which is below expectations. His miscalculations in recruiting both at UMass and OK State have been well-documented, but is all that really enough to contemplate firing him?

According to the Tulsa World, Ford's contract, which runs through 2019, is for \$3.725 million per year plus incentives, bonuses and other extras. With oilman T. Boone Pickens donating huge amounts of money to the athletic department, Oklahoma State has more financial flexibility than most, but can anyone pay that buyout?

UMass men's basketball coach Derek Kellogg advises hard work and enthusiasm in building successful career

SPRINGFIELD – The key to success is a strong work ethic and being upbeat, **Derek Kellogg**, head coach of the University of Massachusetts men's basketball team, told a gathering Tuesday of 400 high achieving city high school students at Western New England University.

The students were taking part in the 10th annual MassMutual Academic Achiever Conference sponsored by MassMutual and Western New England University.

Kellogg, who grew up in Springfield and played basketball at UMass under famed coach **John Calipari**, outlined his odyssey from growing up in the Hungry Hill neighborhood to becoming head basketball coach at his alma mater.

He described his first college basketball coaching stint at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va. It only paid \$9,500 a year, but Kellogg said he worked 14 hours a day.

"It is not about the money. It is about the ability to do what you want to do," Kellogg said.

"You be the champions. You be the leaders. You push for it," the coach urged the students, telling them to disregard statistics and material on the Internet that discourages them from thinking they can be successful.

Kellogg also exhorted the students to be energetic.

"Are you an energy giver or an energy taker?" he asked. "I don't want to be around an energy taker. Be an energy giver. ... Be passionate about what you do."

Kellogg made his remarks as keynote speaker for the event, which was for Springfield high school students who had maintained a B average or better for four consecutive marking periods during grades 10 through 12.

The program included a variety of hands-on activities in various fields, including financial services, business, information technology, broadcast communications, criminal justice, medicine and the sciences.

Workshops also focused on the college admissions process, paying for college, making a good first impression and financial skills.

Uttam Adhikari, a 17-year-old junior at High School of Science and Technology who wants to become a cardiologist, was heartened by learning that there is financial aid available for college and how to apply for it.

"There are many opportunities," Adhikari, a native of Nepal, said of his potential college career.

Fourteen-year-old Katelyn M. Ekmalian, a freshman at Springfield Renaissance School, was equally upbeat about the program.

"It is amazing," Ekmalian said.

The workshops she took part in emphasized that to be successful in a career you have to communicate love and enthusiasm.

"You have to enjoy what you are doing," Ekmalian said.

Ekmalian, who wants to be a television broadcaster, got a chance to give a weather report in the university's studio.

"I love being in front of the camera and I love talking," she said.

Second-half surges have UMass basketball on a roll

AMHERST - The Gipper does not visit the **University of Massachusetts** men's basketball locker room, even in spirit.

The Minutemen are still getting the message from within those walls, and raising their play when they leave them.

"It's kind of the same routine at halftime, whether we're up or down," point guard Chaz Williams said of UMass (10-3), which takes a four-game winning streak into Friday night's home game against Central Connecticut (5-6).


"We go over the things we should be doing. I might say something about what we need to do, or what I'm not doing," Williams said.

There isn't much that Williams has not been doing. He is averaging 14.5 points, 6 assists and 2.7 steals per game.

He has often sparked second-half runs, the likes of which have become his team's trademark.

In their last three games, the Minutemen have trailed at halftime. Against Siena, a 16-3 secondhalf surge erased an 11-point deficit.

UMass had a 21-1 run against Quinnipiac, and a 17-4 burst against Davidson. Both spurts came just after halftime.

The Minutemen won those three games by a total of 17 points, an average of 5.7 per game.

"When we get down, we don't panic," center Sean Carter said.

"I think it's better conditioning. Our preseason work has paid off," said forward Raphiael Putney, who is second on the team with 8.8 points per game. "We regroup at halftime, and think about what we're doing wrong. I think our confidence level is where it needs to be."

"I think the players are more mature this year," coach Derek Kellogg said.

"They believe in our style, and the offseason time they put into conditioning is paying off. We also have more speed than in the past.

"If we play at the pace we want in the first 20 minutes, and into the second half, it can take a toll on the other team."

UMass has outscored its opponents by 38 points in the first half, but by 67 after the break.

Were it not for its minus-20 second half-showing in a 24-point loss to College of Charleston, the second-half "plus" differential would be even greater.

Some second-half surges have been followed by an opponent's comeback, only to have UMass prevail at the end.

Williams said the halftime break is more about adjusting than speech-making.

"It could be anybody who says something, if we need to be energized," he said.

"Most of the time, it's just about us coming back out and wanting to win more."

UMass is getting noticed. On Monday, ESPN.com writer Andy Katz ranked UMass third on his list of "10 teams that impressed this (past) week."

The Minutemen were actually fourth, since top pick Kansas State was treated as its own entity.

Of the rest, only North Carolina and Providence got higher grades than UMass, which earned notice by beating Davidsoon.

That victory had meaning after Davidson had upset Kansas.

"I don't pay much attention to that stuff, but it's still nice to hear," Kellogg said of the ESPN recognition.

Central Connecticut has lost four straight. In one of the low points of the 2010-11 season, the Blue Devils routed UMass 92-63 at New Britain, Conn.

Kellogg hopes the memory helps motivate his team.

"We have a few guys back from that. I think they might remember how they took it to us," he said.

AMHERST - With the University of Massachusetts men's basketball team trailing by four at halftime Saturday night, Minuteman sophomore point guard Chaz Williams pulled Terrell Vinson aside and challenged the junior forward to make an impact in the second half.

Vinson delivered. He scored five of his 13 points and three rebounds in the 18-0 run by UMass to start the second half en route to a 72-67 win over Quinnipiac.

"I told him at halftime he's got to step it up," Williams said. "Being the player that he is, he responded perfectly well, That was a different side of 'TV' tonight. He gave us a spark and the rest of the troops just followed."

Minuteman Coach Derek Kellogg agreed.

"It was exactly what we were looking for," Kellogg said. "He made a couple nice defensive plays and his presence really made a difference, That was one of the better games or at least halves that he's played in a long, long time."

Vinson, who scored in double figures in the first three games of the season had not reached 10 points again until Saturday.

"I was in a little bit of a funk. That definitely felt like the best game I played in a while," Vinson said.

BAY STATE SUCCESS - UMass is now 7-0 this season in games played in Massachusetts with those wins coming in four different buildings. In addition to being 4-0 at the Mullins Center, the Minutemen are 1-0 in the Curry Hicks Cage, Conte Forum and MassMutual Center.

NEXT UP - UMass (9-3) is off until it hosts Davidson (6-3) at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Mullins Center. The Wildcats play Kansas at 9 p.m. Monday in Kansas City.

Davidson is 1-1 against Atlantic 10 teams, having defeated Richmond and lost to Charlotte.

MISCELLANEOUS - Freddie Riley's three free throws made and five attempted for the Minutemen were both career highs.

UMass senior Matt Hill did not suit up for the game with a knee injury which is not considered serious. Hill has appeared in just two games this season.

Former Minuteman Chris Kirkland (1997-2000) was among the 2,890 in attendance.

Kellogg features depth during UMass win

The Massachusetts men's basketball team stepped onto the court Wednesday night in an unfamiliar fashion.

For the first time this season, their floor general, Chaz Williams, and greatest 3-point threat, Freddie Riley, found a seat on the bench to begin the game. The duo had started all seven games prior to this point but were benched for reasons unrelated to discipline, according to UMass head coach Derek Kellogg.

"I wanted to let them know that really there is no set lineup and that the way things went in the Bahamas I wasn't happy with and I thought that maybe shaking it up a little bit would get their attention," said Kellogg.

Riley and Williams both struggled in the Bahamas in certain situations. In two of the three games in the Bahamas, Riley shot a combined 1-for-12 on 3-pointers, while Williams, the team's leader in assists, failed to register a single dime in the team's final game of the tournament.

The unexpected move was not just about getting through to Riley and Williams, Kellogg saw this as an opportunity to get backup point guard Jesse Morgan and wingman Raphiael Putney much deserved minutes.

"It helped get Jesse some minutes at the point, and it was [going] to help Putney get some more playing time," said Kellogg.

Putney responded well, going 4-for-4 in the first half and tallying all 10 of his points in the first 20 minutes of the game.

Kellogg was particularly pleased with Morgan's effort as he who tossed in eight points and added a season-high nine assists.

"I thought he did a great job," said Kellogg. "For us to be better he's got to get better and he showed great signs in the Bahamas and I thought he showed some great signs tonight."

Despite their absences from the starting lineup, both Riley and Williams made significant contributions.

Riley led the Minutemen with 15 points, highlighted by a pair of dunks and three 3-pointers. Williams finished just behind Riley in scoring with 12 points, and continued his dazzling play at the point guard position, dishing out eight assists.

Kellogg was pleased that coming off the bench had little effect on two of his most important players.

"Really it's just all how they are attitude-wise," said Kellogg. "If they come in and they're excited and ready to play I don't think that affects them too much."

Ultimately, the benching meant little in terms of minutes played for Riley and Williams.

Riley played 16 minutes, a number that surely would have been higher if the score hadn't gotten so out of hand. Morgan and Cady Lalanne led the Minutemen in minutes played with 28, but despite the benching, Williams finished right behind them playing 25 minutes, another number that likely took a hit given the score in the second half.

In the end, Riley and Williams proved there's truly no difference between starting a game and coming in off of the bench, a point Kellogg has attempted to stress to his players ad nauseam this season.

"I've really tried to sell [to] these guys [there are] 10-11 starters," he said. "I don't know how much kids these days buy that but that's what I'm going with."

Judging by Riley's reaction to the benching after the game, Kellogg's philosophy has rubbed off on him.

"I'm comfortable with whatever role coach wants me to play in," said Riley.

UMass now heads out to Miami to face another ACC opponent. Kellogg isn't entirely sure how the starting five will look for that game.

"I'm not sure about that, I think we'll reevaluate game-by-game and play-to-play of who's starting," said Kellogg.

Derek Kellogg, UMass back on point?

It was twenty years ago today, Sergeant Pepper taught the band to play

Late on Friday night, Curry Hicks Cage was three-quarters filled with lonely hearts. The fans who came out to watch the opening game of the University of Massachusetts' season hadn't seen consistently good basketball in a long, long time.

The first player introduced in the starting lineup -- little more than a headband and a roaring motor -- was Chaz Williams, the new point guard, the guy UMass coach Derek Kellogg is counting on to be the team's Sergeant Pepper. Preposterously listed at 5-foot-9, Williams stood as one of only two players on the roster with his hand over his heart on this Veterans Day, swaying back and forth during the national anthem.

Over by the bench, his brown hair slicked back as always, his eyes already burning with intensity, Kellogg had the exact same posture: hand over heart, swaying. He, too, was eager to get it going.

It was 20 years ago this month, on Nov. 22, 1991, when UMass last opened its season in the Cage. This had been UMass' colorful home for hoops since 1931, where for years the court had been laid out over a dirt floor, sometimes prompting squirrels to scurry into the lane. This was where fans used to sleep out overnight to get seats to watch Julius Erving play for the then-Redmen in the early 1970s. And this was the place where, one day in practice, a sophomore point guard named Rick Pitino picked a fight with the incumbent senior point guard, Mike Pagliaria, breaking his thumb.

Legendary coach Jack Leaman kicked Pitino off the team for the year, telling the student newspaper, "He thought too much about himself, and not about the 11 other guys on the team."

For many years, the Cage has been a classroom for point guards. Leaman, still UMass' all-time leader in coaching wins, had been a point guard himself at Boston University. John Calipari, who took over a woebegone UMass program in NCAA tournament, and he's trying to get back to the 1988, had been a college point guard. Both considered the

position to be the very foundation of college basketball. The good point guard, they preached, was the coach on the floor. He was the guy who made everyone around him better.

Nov. 22, 1991, was also the first taste of college basketball for a young point guard from nearby Springfield. Derek Kellogg was an unheralded recruit from the city where the game was invented. Late in a 94-59 rout of Siena before a raucous full house at the Cage, he was sent into the game by Calipari -- and got his first chance to run the show.

Thus began a season when UMass truly arrived on the national stage. The Minutemen would go on to win the Atlantic 10 regular-season and tournament titles for the first time in school history. They got into the NCAA tournament for the first time in 30 years, and advanced to the Sweet 16. (There they lost to a Kentucky team coached by Pitino, in a game made famous by a pivotal technical foul call against Calipari for stepping out of the coaching box.)

If UMass basketball had been going in and out of style, that group was guaranteed to raise a smile. The Minutemen went on a roll, dominating the A-10 for years and appearing in seven straight NCAA tournaments from 1992 to 1998. That stretch included all four years of Kellogg's career, the final three of which saw him serve as the starting point guard, and the last two as the team's captain. If not blessed with explosive athletic ability, Kellogg was clearly the consummate coach on the floor.

Every game at the Cage filled to its capacity of just over 4,000 fans, and even when the team moved to the Mullins Center in February 1993, there was never an empty seat. For years, the crowd was an automatic 9,493. The basketball was certainly a thrill, and the crowd was such a lovely audience.

But in truth, UMass basketball has been out of style for quite some time now. Since that seven-year NCAA run, the Minutemen haven't been back to the Big Dance even once. Of the 14 teams in the Atlantic 10, only three (Fordham, La Salle and Duquesne) have had longer waits.

In April 2008, the UMass athletic department hoped to chart a course back to the promised land by hiring Kellogg as coach. He had spent the previous eight years coaching with Calipari at Memphis. The press conference to introduce Kellogg was held at the Cage. "We're going to be the hardest-working, most fun, most passionate, most energetic team in the country," he said that day.

Leaving aside the rest of it, one thing has been clear to this point: The Minutemen haven't been much fun. There were all

kinds of obstacles that Kellogg faced when he took the job (not least of which was a cupboard largely left bare by previous coach Travis Ford).

Ironically, the biggest ingredient in the team's lack of success (records of 12-18, 12-20 and 15-15) has been a disastrous run of point guards. Kellogg has booted two reasonably heralded point guard signees, Doug Wiggins and Daryl Traynham, for disciplinary reasons. His first point guard in 2008-09, senior Chris Lowe, had played three years for Ford and struggled to adjust to a new system that never took hold at UMass. (The vaunted "dribble-drive-motion" that worked so well at Memphis was more of a fizzle, crash and burn at UMass. There were painfully few created baskets and lots of disjointed one-on-one play.) Kellogg also tried to convert shooting guard Ricky Harris, the school's third all-time leading scorer, to point, but that minimized his effectiveness. Also marginally effective were Gary Correia and David Gibbs.

The position that Kellogg knew to be the foundation of a college basketball team's success was, through three years, far from stellar at UMass. Some fans hung in, but the Mullins Center almost never approached even half of its capacity. Superfan "Matty G," in his maroon uniform with the No. 0, would race onto the court during timeouts and exhort fans by saying, "This side -- 'U' -- this side -- 'Mass'!" but the response was usually quite tepid.

The winter sport of choice at the university had become hockey, with raucous crowds the norm. Basketball

no longer rocked the house.

Year 4 of the Kellogg regime is a critical time, and deep down the coach knows it. This is time for some results, and it's time for some fun. Enter Chaz Williams.

A redshirt sophomore from Brooklyn, Williams transferred from Hofstra after an impressive freshman year when his coach, Tom Pecora, left for the job at Fordham. Williams arrived with plenty of pizzazz. Before he even played a game at UMass, his teammates were talking about how Williams was already a team leader. Kellogg describes him as a fearless, charismatic, pedal-to-the-metal player who has embraced the leadership role.

On his team bio on the school's website, Williams paints an interesting picture. Besides learning that Williams is lactose intolerant, fans find out that his favorite book is "His Life and Universe," a biography of Albert Einstein. The three words he uses to describe himself as a basketball player are "Nate Robinson Jr."

And the thing he would like to do before graduation?

"NCAA Tournament."

Friday night's opener was a far cry from Kellogg's playing days when UMass once upended top-ranked North Carolina at Madison Square Garden. Last night, the Minutemen took on another team from North Carolina -- Elon University.

At halftime, the Phoenix had a 43-39 lead. A few of the 3,093 fans in attendance at the 4,024-capacity Cage left to enjoy their weekend.

They missed Williams putting on a show in the second half. He was at his improvisational best -- call it the Jazz of Chaz -- during a 13-0 run that put the Minutemen ahead to stay. In a stretch of just 1:04, Williams:

- Hit a 3-pointer to knot the game at 45
- Fought hard through traffic to find Sampson Carter for a 3-pointer to put UMass in front
- Penetrated into the lane and dished to Freddie Riley for a layup
- Rifled a half-court bounce pass to Carter in stride for a layup that forced Elon to call a timeout and essentially hoist the white flag

It was a flurry of plays that UMass fans had not seen in many moons. It was more than just points on the scoreboard. It was aggressive. It was creative. It was fun.

The players were into it. The fans were, for a moment at least, electric.

"I don't really play to the crowd," Williams said after putting the finishing touches on a game-high 18 points and eight assists (to go with six rebounds and three steals) in an 85-67 win. "I play for my team, just try to win. I play for the brotherhood."

Like New Year's Eve and baseball's spring training, hope is everywhere at this point in the college basketball season. There are all kinds of good-faith pronouncements about unity and commitment. Williams says that UMass bonded in a deep way in the offseason, following last season's freefall. (A promising 7-0 start ended

with a 15-15 record after the Minutemen closed the regular season by losing at Fordham, the Rams' first A-10 win after 41 straight losses -- and then followed that up with a 28-point loss to Dayton in the first round of the A-10 tourney.)

"We had a tough offseason," said Williams, who had to sit out the season as a transfer. "We all wanted to win. We all wanted to do this together. Last year is the past. We just leave that behind, and we just worry about now."

The team, which returns most of its top players from a year ago (other than top scorer Anthony Gurley and point guard Correia), has been working for the first time with a full-time strength and conditioning coach, earmarked only for basketball. And before practices began, the team spent a weekend with sports psychologist Joe Carr. "That was the best experience for our group of guys to have," said Williams. "At first we were brothers, but now we're a brotherhood."

Big Brother Kellogg liked what he saw Friday night. He was pleased with the efforts off the bench from erstwhile starters Terrell Vinson (17 points and 11 rebounds) and Carter (17 points and seven rebounds). But most of all, he was pleased that, maybe just maybe, his long-awaited point guard has finally arrived after three years of trying to fill that void.

"To see Chaz play the way he did tonight was, I guess, 'comforting,'" said
Kellogg, finding an unusual word in his coaching lexicon. "When the ball is
in his hands, at least in my mind, something good is going to happen. He knows what he's doing."

Twenty minutes after the game, the sweat was still streaming down Kellogg's face, but it seemed -- at least for now -- that a burden had lifted. "As much as I was coaching in the game, it was enjoyable to watch him play," said Kellogg. "He made some passes that we haven't seen in a couple of years. ... That's a taste of what UMass basketball is going to be."

Time will tell if that really plays out and the Minutemen come back into style. The Sergeant Pepper of the past and the Sergeant Pepper of the present hope that fans will have their hands over their lonely hearts as they get ready to enjoy the show.

UMass men's hoop will run and press in season opener

AMHERST - The University of Massachusetts men's basketball team will unveil a new style and four new players at its old gym tonight.

The Minutemen will open their 2011-12 season at 9 p.m. when they host Elon at Curry Hicks Cage. The game is part of a doubleheader with the hockey team's 6 p.m. game against Holy Cross at the Mullins Center.

UMass coach Derek Kellogg is looking forward to getting started.

"I feel like we're in a spot where its good to play a game," he said. "I don't know how much more we can go against ourselves and how much better we can get until we play somebody else and see what works and what doesn't work.

"I don't know if any coach feels that they're totally ready because there's so much you have to get in in a certain amount of time," Kellogg added. "It's time to see what's good, what's not and what to build on and improve. There's no better time. It's time to get it rolling."

Four UMass players will be in uniform for the first time. Sophomore Chaz Williams, a transfer from Hofstra, is expected to start at point guard. Redshirt freshmen big men Cady Lalanne and Maxie Esho will both come off the bench in the frontcourt. Lalanne is expected to see considerable minutes this season. Andrew McCarthy, a walk-on 7-footer, is also a redshirt freshman. He could potentially see action as well.

Williams is expected to be a key component in the Minutemen's run-and-press system that they will be using for the first time this season.

Junior wing Javorn Farrell said even the returning players will seem different.

"I want everybody to see the work we put in the off-season and see the new style that we're playing which is more exciting," Williams said.

Kellogg said he is not sure exactly how many players he will use.

"I'm looking to go as deep as we can," he said. "If guys are playing to exhaustion and playing at

the level I want, I can see us playing 11 guys.

"If we're coasting I can see us playing 11 guys for a different reason," he added. "I want to play 10 or 11 guys because they're competing at a high level."

Kellogg confirmed that his starters will be Williams, with Freddie Riley in the backcourt. Farrell and sophomore Raphiael Putney will start at forward with Sean Carter in the middle.

Off the bench, sophomore Jesse Morgan will back up Williams, but will also see time on the wing. Terrell Vinson, Sampson Carter and Esho are expected to be in the rotation at forward because all three can play inside and outside. Lalanne will back up Sean Carter, but could play alongside him in bigger lineups, while Matt Hill is in the mix inside as well.

Elon, which was 14-17 last year (including three wins over non-Division I schools), was picked fifth out of six in the Southern Conference's North Division in that league's preseason poll. The Phoenix lost three starters from last year's team including Chris Long, who led the team in scoring (14.7 points per game) and assists (6.1 per game). Senior guard Drew Spradlin (6-foot-5) is the team's top returning scorer (13.6) and rebounder (4.1).

The game is the second of what is expected to be an annual game at the Cage, which was the home gym for the Minutemen from 1932 to 1993. Since the Mullins Center opened, UMass played its first regular-season game at the Cage last year and defeated Holy Cross 83-76.

Farrell said the players liked playing in the Cage.

"It was definitely fun. It's nice to go in there and play. It's a packed house and we don't see that often," said Farrell who turns 21 today. "A 21-point victory on my 21st birthday wouldn't be too bad."

BERGANTINO SIGNS - Tyler Bergantino has officially signed his National Letter of Intent to become a Minuteman. The 6-foot-9 big man from Spring Hill, Fla., held an event at his high school, Nature Coast Technical, for the signing and announced on his Facebook page that he'd made his verbal commitment official.

"Tyler exemplifies exactly the type of person and player we want at UMass," Kellogg said in a statement. "He is an extremely high-character young man and plays the game at a high level at both ends of the floor. My staff, the team, the UMass community and I are all very excited to have Tyler joining the UMass basketball family."

Williams handed keys to new UMass offense

A basketball team goes as far as its point guard can take it.

Massachusetts men's basketball coach Derek Kellogg should know that as well as anyone. After all, he did serve as the Minutemen's floor general in the early '90s, calling out the signals during the most glorious days of the program when the team was consistently under the national spotlight.

Now, nearly 20 years since last donning the Maroon and White for UMass, Kellogg is entering his fourth season patrolling the sidelines as the coach for the Minutemen. While the team's makeup has surely changed over the years, the need for consistent guard play hasn't. After a couple of seasons without reliable play at point guard, Kellogg finally has reason to believe that will change this season.

Standing at 5-foot-9 and 175 pounds, Chaz Williams certainly isn't the easiest to spot, especially when you factor in his lightning quick pace that can help him get by defenders in almost the blink of an eye. And with his small stature, the first-year point guard has big shoes to fill this season.

After sitting out last year due to NCAA transfer regulations following his switch from Hofstra, Williams will make his debut for the Minutemen in the season opener tomorrow night at the Cage as the starting point guard.

While this will technically be his first year on the team, Williams has had the benefit of a full year of practicing and getting acclimated with his teammates. After an impressive performance in the preseason, Kellogg has full confidence in handing him the keys to the offense.

"There are high expectations for him within our locker room and within the coaching staff," said Kellogg. "I'm not sure if he'll ever be able to reach the coaches' expectations [because they're so high] but I think he has a chance to be a very good player."

Those expectations are warranted too, partly because he has done it before. As a freshman at Hofstra two years ago, Williams averaged 9.8 points and 2.8 assists per game on his way to being named to the Colonial Athletic Association All-Freshman Team. He's also a threat to drain the 3-pointer, as he averaged 38.9 percent from beyond the arc that season.

After a year off and watching from the sidelines, Williams is eager to get back on the court and be an integral part of the Minutemen's plans for success this season.

"I expect to do some things I haven't gotten to do in the past," said Williams. "A lot of things that will make my teammates better and a lot of things that'll help us win games.

"I want to help bring some excitement back to UMass," he added.

Excitement will be a key ingredient to the UMass recipe this season, as Kellogg has designed a new offensive system that will cater to Williams' abilities.

After losing Anthony Gurley to graduation, the Minutemen will be abandoning the dribble-drive offensive style that has been its staple over recent years.

While the offense geared towards Gurley's ability to create his own shot, the scheme got stale quickly, Kellogg explained. Without any other players that could create their own shot, defenses were able to key in on Gurley and force turnovers and a difficult shot selection.

But now, as UMass moves on from the Gurley era, a new fast-paced, run-and-gun offensive style will be installed and Williams is seemingly licking his chops in anticipation of leading this new brand of Minutemen basketball.

"[The new offense] is more in the favor of the way I play," he said. "I feel like it's in the favor of the way most of the guys on this team play. It's going to benefit us a lot and help us become a much better team."

Williams' job is made a lot easier because the roster is deep with athletic wingers that can get on the break with him with ease.

Players like Freddie Riley, Javorn Farrell and even senior center Sean Carter are some of those beneficiaries that are pleasantly welcoming the game that Williams will bring to the table this season.

"His ability to push the ball up the court is definitely going to help us out," said Carter. "He just gets the ball to people in all the right places, for the shooters, the big men, everyone. He puts us in good situations to help us score."

Kellogg echoed those sentiments.

"He's a point guard that's done it before," he said. "It's not like, 'Can he do it?' or 'Will he do it?' because he was an All-Freshman player in the CAA, which is a league almost comparable to the Atlantic 10.

"When he gets comfortable and really gets acclimated to this style," continued Kellogg, "I think you'll see a team that has the chance to be pretty good."

For now, as he settles in with his team in anticipation of Friday night's opening tip, Williams is focused as much as ever on the task at hand

He says that he doesn't feel the pressure of being the starting point guard and that as a Brooklyn native, he's ready for anything.

"At the end of the day, it's just basketball," he said. "It's something that I love to do.

"Winning is also something I love to do."

Analyzing the "brotherhood"

It was sometimes dreadful watching the Massachusetts men's basketball team last season.

Aside from the fact that the Collegian press conference seat is stationed right next to the wicked loud band, I had to watch a shaky UMass side parade around the 3-point line on offense and never get anything accomplished.

Here's how most offensive drives went last season: former guard Gary Correia would bring the ball up and dish out to former guard Anthony Gurley. Gurley, following the guidelines of UMass coach Derek Kellogg's dribble-drive offense, would literally dribble the ball twice and drive into the lane. If he made it past a defender, which was often not the case, he would lay up a 50-50 ball that may or may not have sunk into the net. Otherwise, he would begin a series of passes with the rest of the team — the ball became a hot potato for the Minutemen to bounce around.

And it showed something that the team was severely missing last season – they lacked any team chemistry.

Players didn't have trust in each other to take the shot, or drive in, but rather bounced the ball around the 3-point line until Gurley hawked up a Kobe Bryant-esque fade-away jump shot that was average at best. There wasn't any trust in each other, which limited their offensive ability throughout the season.

This season, there's a new mentality for Kellogg and the Minutemen. At a recent practice last Friday, I kept hearing the term "brotherhood" tossed around by both the players and Kellogg. And that is what the team is trying to become. It'll be less of players joined together for the sake of playing, but actually a team of players brought together to have fun and win games.

And it's kind of exciting.

I would be lying if I said there wasn't a certain stigma with the team this year. Players appear more comfortable around each other and the coaches, and definitely show a lot more smiles. However, as Kellogg noted, the team has yet to play a game in it season, which means the tensions that arise from lost battles has yet to sink in with the team.

But there still remains this interesting dynamic missing from last year's side, something which might translate into wins. At the end of the 2010-2011 campaign, center Sean Carter expressed his dislike for how the locker room was acting towards the end of the year, noting that the team was a little shaky off the court. Kellogg, and returning Minuteman Andrew McCarthy, said that is not the case this year.

Which means what? Well, for starters it might not show a collapse like last year's team had. I mean, the team lost by a point to then-No. 24 Temple before dropping to Fordham – which had yet to win an Atlantic 10 game at the time – just after. That kind of collapse may not spring up if the team has this "brotherhood" mentality.

The "brotherhood" mentality isn't limited to just off the court either. For the past two seasons, Ricky Harris and Gurley were the goto men for the offense. A lot of faith was put into these guys to rack up high numbers and lead the Minutemen.

But from what Kellogg has preached in the early part of the season, there isn't a go-to guy like before. Sure he has sights on Freddie Riley to go on a scoring tear, and he sees Javorn Farrell as a strong candidate to garner some points, but there isn't one prolific, stand-out player like before. This – coupled with the elimination of the dribble-drive offense – will offer an offensive side where the players trust and rely on each other more heavily. And if there is this "brotherhood" mentality, it might just translate into enough chemistry that playing on the court will be like getting together for dinner – a simple task, if all the right pieces are laid out correctly.

After last season, which had its moments but ultimately lost its glamour when the same offensive tactics kept being employed, it's

exciting to know that there is this new mentality. If the players are in cohesion like they appear at practice, and if they truly have this "brotherhood" mentality, then it could be a fantastic season to watch. Fluid play and cohesive moments through the court would offer a hell of a season to cover.

But like any brother-relationship, there's bound to be some problems. Siblings argue all the time, don't they? There's a good chance that after a few losses set in, that the team will begin to lose some of the high-morale and trickle off just a bit. If too much faith is put into each other, what happens when things turn sour? What happens when those offensive and defensive drives collapse and the entire team has to blame the "brotherhood?" Morale is surely to decline if the entire team is put to blame, and if all players are disappointed both in themselves and others.

Regardless of what problems may arise with this new "brotherhood" mentality, it's going to be exciting to watch. It'll be exciting to watch some UMass basketball where players trust each other. If this "brotherhood" translates to the court, I'll gladly keep my ill-placed seat at the press table at the Mullins Center. I'll crane my neck if it means I can see some quality, cohesive and fluid basketball on Jack Lehman Court.

This "brotherhood" idea might not bring the team wins, but it does make the game – a game which seems all too lost in the professionals – more entertaining.

Chaz Williams big enough to handle load at UMass

Point guard feels up to the challenge

AMHERST - The business of returning University of Massachusetts basketball to its wildly successful days of a decade and a half ago is a methodical process for coach Derek Kellogg. It's an assignment that has turned into a personal crusade, because the coach was part of that renaissance in the early 1990s.

Three non-winning seasons, a 19-29 Atlantic 10 record, and a slide into regional insignificance have warmed the seat for Kellogg, who fully realizes that the fan base expects a winner, and the fact that the Minutemen have been lapped by Xavier, Temple, and Dayton has turned them impatient.

This is a critical season for Kellogg. His fingerprints are all over the program. These are his guys, and what he needs for a resurgence is a leader, a point guard who can spark his up-tempo style with the fearlessness and heart that exemplified those 1990s teams.

He may have found such a conductor in Chaz Williams, a 5-foot 9-inch sophomore transfer from Hofstra, whose Brooklyn upbringing is apparent from the moment he speaks. He brings a New York bravado to Amherst, and his leadership and passion are exactly what Kellogg believes will push the Minutemen back among the elite teams of the Atlantic 10.

After a coaching change at Hofstra, Williams decided it was time to leave New York, and UMass was far enough away to offer a new cultural experience but close enough for the occasional visit home.

"I'm from Brooklyn, N.Y., so I'm pretty much ready for anything," said Williams. "But I can't go home as much. Back at Hofstra, I used to go home a lot.

"I'm happy that I'm far away because now I don't have to go home, I can just go to the gym and work out."

"He carries himself like a New York City point guard, a guy that has a little chip on his shoulder," said Kellogg. "He talks with a swagger. And every coach in the Colonial [Athletic Association] said, 'If you had a chance to get Chaz Williams, you'd better take him.'"

Williams, whose upper torso is dominated by tattoos, walks with the confidence of

someone who has spent his life trying to prove he can play with the big boys. Nate Robinson walked into the Celtics' locker room with an identical strut, determined to prove he could play among the giants.

While Robinson's off-court antics may have led to his Boston exit, Williams has taken the positive aspects of Robinson's game and funneled them to his own. He resembles Robinson so much so that his teammates call him "Little Nate," but he fully realizes that point guard responsibilities encompass much more than canning 3-pointers and

converting fast-break dunks.

The Minutemen need a distributor and a stabilizing force.

"The biggest things have been his leadership and his energy," said Kellogg, a UMass point guard from 1991-95. "Those are some things that are hard to teach and coach somebody, but he has a natural ability to be charismatic and bring energy to practice every day.

"He has a chance to be a very good player for us if he continues those habits."

While the atmosphere was rather casual in Amherst before a recent practice, there is an undeniable reality that this is a crucial season for Kellogg and the program. While Xavier is heavily favored to win the Atlantic 10 and perhaps make a deep NCAA Tournament run, the rest of the conference is filled with improving upstarts.

UMass lost leading scorer Anthony Gurley, who essentially was a one-man team last season - the lone Minuteman to average double figures in scoring. All of the supporting cast returns, but only junior swingman Javorn Farrell averaged more than one assist, leaving a gaping hole for a point guard.

Williams was named to the CAA All-Freshman team two years ago, averaging 9.8 points and 2.8 assists. When Tom Pecora was replaced as Hofstra coach by Mo Cassara, Williams consulted with his mother, Diane, and decided to leave.

He is the youngest of three children, raised by Diane since his father died when Williams was 9. Williams bonded even more with his mother, especially on lonely game nights when he was unable to play as a transfer.

"Most of the time at nights, I used to go home and call my mom and we would just have long conversations and she'd tell me this is for the better," he said. "And this is a year that could make me or break me. It made me into a better person."

Williams is determined to make this UMass thing work, and the support of his family has prepared him for the challenge.

"Without both of my parents, it kind of hurt me, but it helped me grow into the man I am today," he said. "I had to grow up faster and I had to become a man early. That gives me the attitude I have now.

"My mom and my grandmom are the two main people in my life I really look up to. My grandmother, she doesn't know much about basketball, she just knows scoring and winning. But she always calls me with motivation."

With his close-knit unit behind him, Williams is prepared to accept the responsibility of leading the Minutemen back to prosperity. Kellogg's record is 39-53, and it includes a demoralizing loss to Fordham last March that ended the Rams' 41-game conference losing streak. UMass followed by getting pounded, 78-50, by Dayton in the first round of the Atlantic 10 tournament.

"Having played here, a lot of people continue to have a view of UMass, asking me, 'When are you going to get it back to the '90s?' "Kellogg said. "We were No. 1 in the country and we were probably the only program to have that success coming from where UMass was.

"My goal is to get us to a certain point and really build a program, and hopefully someday we'd all love to have a magical run and something special can happen."

Because the Minutemen are coming off three consecutive nonwinning seasons, expectations are tempered, but Kellogg believes Williams will thrive in such circumstances.

"He can be a kid that can feed off the noise and can be that kid that has a chance to be one of those [great] players here at UMass," Kellogg said. "I love that he's my leader.

"I wouldn't say the guy's an angel, but he's a good kid, he's charismatic. The dude likes to play the game. I like the fact that he's an extension of me right now."


