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► **REFLECTING ON 2022-23**

As we reflect on the 2022-23 fiscal year (Sept. 1 – Aug. 31), we are fortunate to have experienced another exciting and successful year here on The Farm. The winds of change continue to blow throughout collegiate athletics, but as we experience more and more evolution within the national landscape, our department's leaders continue to ground ourselves on the guiding principles of providing Stanford student-athletes the ability to pursue their fullest academic and athletic potential and to compete at the highest levels.

► **FOOTBALL LEADERSHIP TRANSITION**

On Nov. 27, 2022, David Shaw announced his resignation from Stanford's Bradford M. Freeman Head Football Coaching position after more than a decade of remarkable success. It would be hard to think of a figure who has been more instrumental to Stanford's excellence on the gridiron than Coach Shaw, who played football for the Cardinal from 1991 to 94 and later returned to coach for four years as an assistant and 12 years as a head coach. Coach Shaw cared deeply about the holistic development of his players, and he experienced great achievement in every facet of his program. Stanford Football's graduation rates were among the nation's highest during his tenure, and he led the team to four New Year's Six bowl game appearances, including two Rose Bowl victories. I, personally, will miss working with David, and I know I am joined by a great many Cardinal fans

and alumni who are forever grateful for his contributions to Stanford.

Following Coach Shaw's announcement, we were fortunate to pass the baton to Troy Taylor, another talented head football coach whose coaching values are aligned with Stanford's vision for athletics. Coach Taylor has led the programs under his charge to great success at every level of football, and brings a compelling plan for greatness to The Farm.

► **RECLAIMING THE DIRECTORS' CUP**

The 2022-23 academic year also saw the return of a cherished icon of athletic excellence: the Learfield Directors' Cup. The Directors' Cup is awarded annually to the nation's most successful athletics department, and Stanford has now claimed the cup in 26 of the 29 years it has been awarded. Success in the Directors' Cup is an indicator of Stanford's commitment to broad-based excellence, and reclaiming the trophy has been a point of pride for our department this year.

► **CONFERENCE REALIGNMENT**

The summer of 2023 was unusually eventful, with a new round of conference realignment prompted by Colorado's July 28 announced departure from the Pac-12, and Washington, Oregon, Utah, Arizona, and Arizona State's subsequent departure plan announcements on Friday, August 4. Our campus and athletic leadership were aligned in the belief that preserving the Pac-12 was the best outcome for Stanford; however,

once it became clear that was not a viable path we analyzed our options and ultimately announced that we would accept an invitation - alongside the University of California, Berkeley, and Southern Methodist University - to join the Atlantic Coast Conference in the summer of 2024. Following the departure of eight Pac-12 peer schools, our student-athlete leadership expressed a clear desire for us to find a home that preserved their ability to compete at the highest level. We were also fortunate to have found a conference that aligns us with many exceptional peer institutions who share a similar approach to athletics. There is much preparation to be done as we face scheduling, travel, and other logistical challenges associated with the change, but we are committed to finding the best way for Cardinal student-athletes to compete nationally while keeping their well-being and academic focus top of mind.

► **MOMENTUM FOR A NEW CHAPTER**

The 2022-23 athletic year saw a great deal of success on the conference and national level for Stanford student-athletes and teams. Team NCAA championships captured by men's gymnastics, women's water polo, and women's rowing highlighted the year and preserved our streak of winning at least one NCAA team championship for each of the past 47 years, dating back to the 1976-77 campaign. Stanford also brought home two national titles in sailing, padding its overall team national championship total to five.

In addition to Cardinal programs who won it all, we also had several programs achieve great progress on the national level, highlighted by our

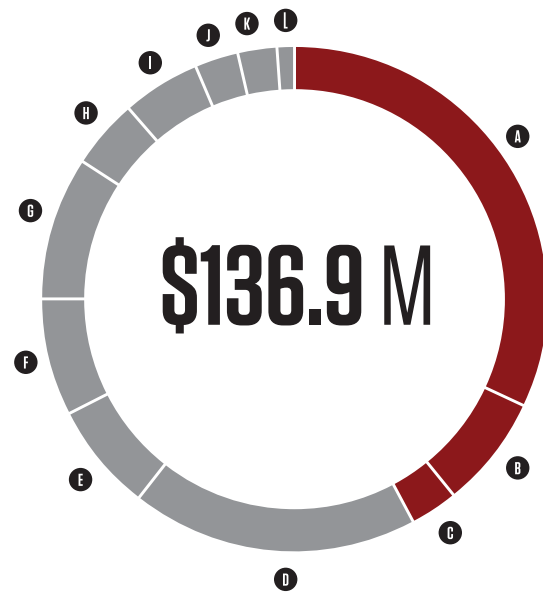
baseball and softball teams' appearances in their respective NCAA College World Series events.

Underlying the competitive success was a record year in fundraising. More than 6,000 families supported Stanford student-athletes, helping to make fiscal year 2023 the most successful fundraising year in the history of Stanford Athletics. Your investment in our people, programs, and facilities helps ensure The Farm remains the Home of Champions now and for generations to come.

As we embark on a new chapter in the ACC, I am extremely grateful for the steadfast support of so many throughout the Cardinal Athletics community. There is a great deal of progress to be made, but I am incredibly optimistic, with strong reason to believe that our department will continue to deliver upon the promise that has drawn elite student-athletes to The Farm for decades: Stanford is uniquely positioned to provide student-athletes with the best chance to discover their fullest academic and athletic potential.

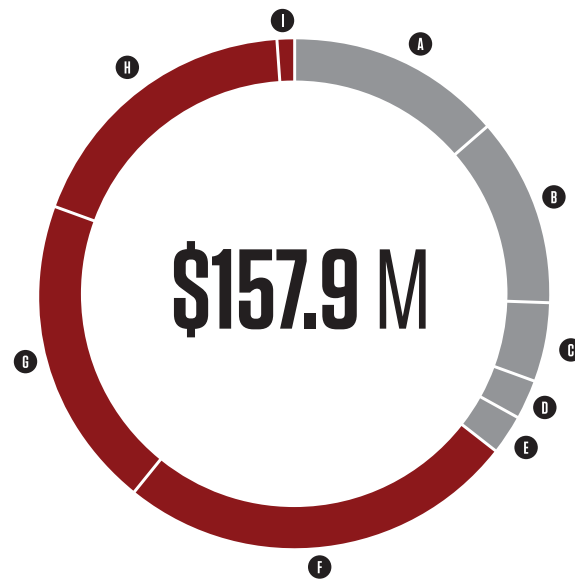

FY23 FINANCES

The Department of Athletics, Physical Education, and Recreation (DAPER) earned \$136.9M in revenues throughout FY23, while incurring \$157.9M in expenses related to varsity sports. DAPER was able to bridge the deficit through funding from the university and a withdrawal from the DAPER Investment Fund. As displayed in the exhibit above, 42-percent of departmental revenues in FY23 came from philanthropic gifts. Consistent support from annual donors remains critical for our long-term success and growth, particularly as the costs our programs face to compete nationally at the highest level continue to rise.

ANNUAL GIVING

Thank you to the 4,355 families who made a gift to the Buck/Cardinal Club or their favorite sport, which accounted for \$9.8M. These expendable dollars are essential in providing the immediate resources our student-athletes need to achieve success in the classroom and in competition. On April 6, 2023, Stanford Athletics celebrated National Student-Athlete Day by implementing our inaugural Athletics Giving Day. In just 24 hours, the Stanford Athletics community came together and raised \$391,739 from 758 families, including 505 who are former student-athletes. It was truly remarkable to see this level of support and excitement from the community on this day. ATHLETICS DIRECTOR'S CIRCLE

New this year, the Athletics Director's Circle was created as a philanthropic annual giving society for leadership level support of Cardinal student-athletes. ▶ RECLAIMING *the* CUP

Stanford, which produced runner-up finishes to Texas in each of the last two seasons, reclaimed its familiar position as the most successful intercollegiate athletic department in the nation. The Cardinal had captured the Directors' Cup for 25 consecutive seasons from 1995 to 2019, after finishing second in 1994 to North Carolina in the award's inaugural season.

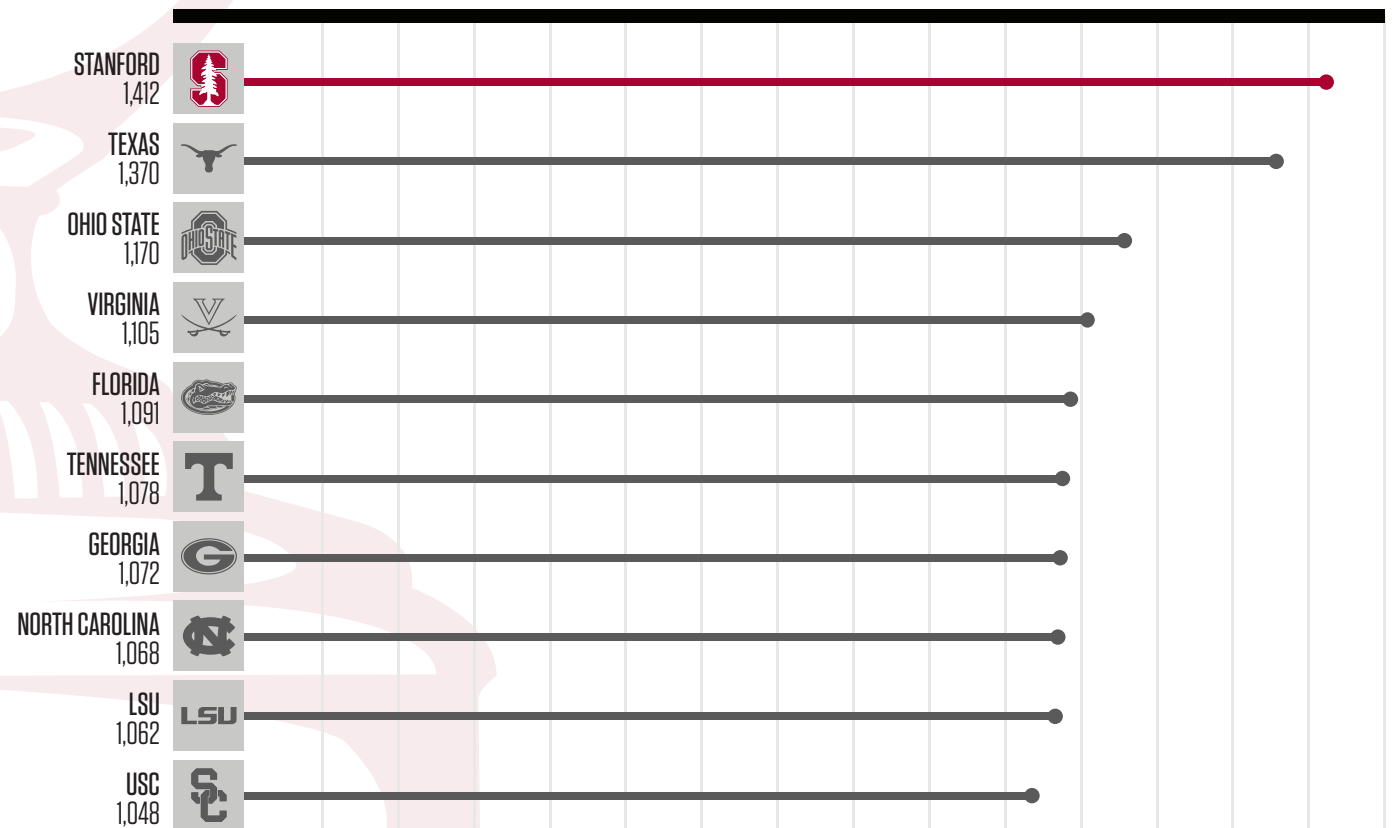
Texas was the runner-up with 1,370.50 points, followed by Ohio State in third with 1,170.75, Virginia in fourth with 1,105.50 and Florida taking fifth with 1,091.50.

The Cardinal won three NCAA titles in 2022–23, as men's gymnastics maintained its dominance with a fourth straight victory, women's water polo repeated for the first time since 2014–15, and women's rowing secured its second program crown and first in 14 years. Extending one of the most recognizable streaks in college athletics, the Cardinal has won at least one NCAA team championship in each of the last 47 seasons, dating back to the 1976–77 campaign. Stanford also secured two national titles in sailing, bringing its overall team championship total to five.

In addition to its three NCAA championships, Stanford also delivered five top-3 finishes from women's swimming and diving, women's golf, softball, women's tennis, and men's outdoor track and field. The Cardinal scored in three of four countable sports, along with 15 additional total sports.

Overall, 19 sports are counted in the final DI standings, four of which must be women's volleyball, women's basketball, men's basketball, and baseball. The next highest (15 maximum) sports scored for each institution, regardless of gender, are used in the standings.

Program and individual student-athlete success across the board highlighted an impressive 2023 season for the Cardinal, culminating with two event wins at the U.S. Collegiate Nationals and a second-straight MPSF title.

The Cardinal began the 2023 season with a young squad, featuring six freshmen on its 14-member team. The new student-athletes didn't skip a beat getting settled among their teammates and helped guide the Cardinal to regular season success, including a 96-88 dual meet victory over 2022 national champion Ohio State.

After taking first at the Western Regionals, the Cardinal headed to Denton, Texas, to face off in the MPSF Championships. Stanford's power was on full display, sweeping all five events to claim the 2023 conference title.

Lindi Schroeder was dominant, taking first place in the solo for the second year in a row while also earning gold in the duet competition, alongside freshman Yara Elian. In the trio, it was three freshmen earning the crown, with Elian, Miko Begossi, and Ivy Davis combining for the win.

Nicole Goot was the champion in the technical competition and the team competition went to the Cardinal as well, solidifying the victory. Stanford swept the awards as well, with Schroeder named the MPSF Swimmer of the Year, Elian the Freshman of the Year, and head coach Megan Abarca the Coach of the Year.

In the U.S. Collegiate Nationals, Stanford faced its toughest competition of the year again in Ohio State. In a close battle for the national title, the Cardinal came up just short, securing two of the five national event championships and taking second to the Buckeyes, 95 to 92.

The Cardinal squad of Lindi Schroeder, Hailee Heinrich, and Yara Elian finished first overall in the trio competition, marking Schroeder and Elian's first national title and Heinrich's second.

Stanford closed out the meet in style, topping the Buckeyes in the team competition and securing its second event win of the meet. Begossi, Ivy, Elian, Goot, Heinrich, Ava Jih-Schiff, Audrey Nguyen, and Emmanuella Tchakmakjian finished at the top of the podium, giving the Cardinal its first team title since 2021.

Seven student-athletes were honored after the U.S. Collegiate Nationals with All-America awards. Elian, Goot, Schroeder, Davis, Begossi, Heinrich, and Tchakmakjian each brought home the award.

The team was also dominant in the classroom this season, averaging a 3.93 GPA, the best among all Stanford teams. Eight swimmers were also named MPSF All-Academic selections, with each eligible swimmer receiving the award.

In a season marked by resilience and determination, the Stanford baseball team showcased a combination of youth and experience on the diamond, culminating in a remarkable return to the College World Series. With an overall record of 44-20 and an impressive 23-7 mark in the Pac-12, the Cardinal clinched back-to-back conference regular season titles and punched their third consecutive ticket to the College World Series.

The Cardinal finished the regular season with great momentum, winning five of the last eight games and 22 of 32 overall. This momentum was reflected in their national ranking, finishing the season at an impressive No. 4 according to D1Baseball.

Making their 19th appearance in the College World Series, the Cardinal solidified their position as a baseball powerhouse. This marked their 38th postseason appearance overall, with their 19 appearances ranking seventh most in the nation. Notably, Stanford hosted a regional for the 21st time in program history, overcoming formidable opponents such as No. 25 Texas A&M, Cal State Fullerton, and San Jose State to advance to the super regionals.

In a testament to their resilience, Stanford won three straight elimination games in the regional, including two victories over #25 Texas A&M. The momentum carried into the super regionals, where they triumphed over Texas in three games, securing their ticket to Omaha for the third consecutive season.

Throughout the season, Stanford's offensive prowess was evident, boasting a team batting average of .316 (first in Pac-12, 10th nationally) and averaging

8.36 runs per game (second in Pac-12, 17th nationally). They led the conference and ranked 10th nationally in home runs (117) while holding the second position (10th nationally) in slugging percentage (.539). In addition, they led the Pac-12 in hits (745) and on-base percentage (.403), showcasing their all-around offensive excellence.

The super regional against Texas provided a thrilling climax to their journey. Despite a setback in the first game, the Cardinal bounced back with determination. Senior Quinn Mathews delivered a stellar performance in his final career home appearance, striking out 16 Texas hitters in a complete game effort, guiding Stanford to an 8-3 victory in a must-win game.

In a dramatic winner-take-all super regional game, with the score knotted at 6-6 in the bottom of the ninth, junior Drew Bowser emerged as the hero. His walk-off RBI single, a fly ball lost in the lights, secured a 7-6 victory over Texas, punching Stanford's third consecutive ticket to the College World Series. Bowser's outstanding performance, including homering in all three games against Texas, showcased the team's depth.

Freshman catcher Malcolm Moore also made significant contributions, hitting .500 with four runs scored, two doubles, a homer, and five RBIs. Other offensive standouts included Braden Montgomery, Eddie Park, and Temo Becerra, each delivering crucial hits in the series.

In Omaha, the Cardinal dropped a 3-2 thriller to No. 1 seed Wake Forest before seeing their comeback efforts come up short in a 6-4 loss to Tennessee in their final game.

Wrapping up the seventh season under head coach Jerod Haase, the Cardinal won 14 games in 2022–23 and closed the season as one of the top offensive programs in the country. Spencer Jones was an All-Pac-12 forward for the second season in a row. James Keefe was Stanford's third straight Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, while Brandon Angel and Michael Jones were named Academic All-Americans.

The streak of elite recruiting continued for Haase and his program, with Stanford signing Andrej Stojakovic, the team's third McDonald's All-American in four years, and Kanaan Carlyle, a top-40 signee. The top-tier class is Stanford's first with two top-40 recruits since 2006 (Brook and Robin Lopez).

Stanford paced the Pac-12 in 3-point shooting in conference play at 37.9 percent, while the team is a combined 42.0 percent in conference games since the opening league win over Oregon State on Jan. 19. Eight qualified players league-wide sported a 3-point percentage north of 40 percent in conference play, three of which are Stanford Cardinal. Max Murrell led the Pac-12 at 42.9 percent, while Michael Jones was fourth at 41.9 percent and Spencer Jones sixth at 41.2 percent from deep. In addition, Brandon Angel shot 44.2 percent in Pac-12 play, ending one make shy of qualifying to lead the league, while Ryan Agarwal was at 43.5 percent on a smaller number of attempts.

Stanford ranked second with 8.6 threes per game against Pac-12 foes, while holding the nation's best percentage (42.6%) from Jan. 20 through the end of the season.

Spencer Jones crossed the 1,000-point threshold during conference play, becoming the program's 50th member of the 1,000-point club. He has moved into 24th on the program's all-time scoring list with 1,318 points.

Establishing himself as one of the best 3-point shooters in program history, the sniper has 261 career threes, which ranks second all-time in program history. He is 43 away from matching Chasson Randle '15 for the top spot and 84 away from tying former Oregon guard Tajuan Porter for the all-time Pac-12 record. Jones averaged 14.1 points and 4.7 rebounds per game, and was named to the All-Pac-12 second team.

Jones announced in April that he would return to Stanford for his additional year of eligibility.

The Cardinal raced to an 88-79 win over No. 4 Arizona on Feb. 11. Michael O'Connell scored a team-high and career-high 22 points, helping the Cardinal outshoot the Wildcats 61-percent to 46-percent from the field. Spencer Jones scored all 18 of his points in the second half, while Harrison Ingram added 12 points, 9 rebounds, and 7 assists. Five Stanford players ended in double figures, with Brandon Angel (14) and Maxime Raynaud (13) joining the fun.

The win was Stanford's third over Arizona in the last six meetings, and was Stanford's second year in a row with a top-five win (No. 5 USC in 2022).

In its penultimate Pac-12 campaign, Stanford was again the class of the conference, winning a share of its record 26th regular season title as part of its 22nd consecutive 20-win season.

The Cardinal went 29-6 overall, 15-3 in league games, had more AP Top 25 wins than any other team in the country (10), and made its 35th straight NCAA Tournament appearance in 2022–23.

Stanford was led by WBCA Defensive Player of the Year and consensus All-American Cameron Brink. Brink became the Cardinal's first back-to-back WBCA All-American since Chiney Ogumike (2012–14) following a season in which she was one of two players nationally to average 15 points, 9 rebounds and 3 blocks per game. The two-time reigning Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year finished second nationally with a school-record 118 blocks and was third in the country in blocks per game (3.47). She recorded the program's first triple-double with blocks when she had 16 points, 11 rebounds, and 10 rejections in a win over Oregon on Jan. 29.

The 2022–23 season also marked the end of the celebrated career of Haley Jones, who became the 29th Stanford player selected in the WNBA draft when she was taken with the sixth pick in the first round by the Atlanta Dream. Jones was one of the most versatile players in Cardinal history and finished her four years on The Farm with 1,535 points, 889 rebounds, 396 assists, 107 blocks, and 90 steals, the only player in program history to hit each of those marks. She averaged 13.5 points, 9 rebounds and 4 assists as a senior and was the only player in the country with those numbers.

All-Pac-12 performers, Brink and Jones were joined among the conference's 16-player postseason awardees by Hannah Jump. The Stanford senior was one of only two players to average better than 44-percent from deep while making at least 100 3-pointers, and just the ninth major conference player to do that since 1999–2000. Jump broke Stanford's single-season record for 3-point makes (100), and ranked ninth nationally in 3-point field goals and eighth in percentage (44.1).

A psychology major with a 3.75 GPA, Jump was also chosen as the Pac-12's Scholar-Athlete of the Year, becoming the seventh from Stanford to win the award in women's basketball, joining Jayne Appel (2010), Kayla Pedersen (2011), Chiney Ogumike (2014), Brittany McPhee (2018), Alanna Smith (2019), and Lexie Hull (2022). She was also one of five on the Pac-12 Winter Academic Honor Roll along with Elena Bosgana, Agnes Emma-Nnoppu, Kiki Iriafen, and Ashten Prechtel.

Prechtel was also taken in the WNBA Draft along with Haley Jones, going to the Connecticut Sun with the 10th pick in the third round and 34th overall. It was the first time the Cardinal had two picks in the same draft since 2014 (Chiney Ogumike/Mikaela Ruef).

Setsuko Ishiyama Director of Women's Basketball Tara VanDerveer finished the year with 1,186 career victories in 44 seasons as a collegiate head coach, including 1,034 over 37 seasons at Stanford, and in 2023–24 will break Mike Krzyzewski's record (1,202 wins) to become the winningest coach in college basketball history (men's or women's).

Stanford's 2022 men's cross country season will always be notable for the first time a Cardinal runner captured an NCAA cross country individual title. Charles Hicks outkicked Northern Arizona's Nico Young down the stretch on a crisp, cool sunny morning at Oklahoma State's Greiner Family Cross Country Course. Hicks set a course record while leading the Cardinal to fourth place as a team.

It was the pinnacle of the season for a Stanford men's team that had much success, winning the Pac-12 and West Region championships, as well as the Nuttycombe Wisconsin Invitational. Hicks repeated as conference champion and Ky Robinson won the Nuttycombe race and placed 10th at NCAA's. Men's coach Ricardo Santos earned West Region Coach of the Year honors. Because of the difficulty of the Oklahoma State course, Hicks had a feeling it would create an honest pace, meaning this wasn't the kind of course that would lead to a lot of sitting back and waiting. And that was how he liked it. Hicks wanted to push from the outset and two Northern Arizona runners – Young and Drew Bosley – obliged. The field broke apart quickly: for a while Robinson remained in the front pack, but eventually, it splintered to three – Hicks, Young, and Bosley. Robinson backed off and led the chase pack.

Hicks tucked behind the two NAU runners and the order remained that way for most of the race. Hicks noticed that on the uphills over multi-loop course, he gained ground without trying to. Each time the NAU runners dropped back slightly and Hicks drew closer. Hicks kept that in his mind until a series of hills on the final lap.

As Hicks converged on the NAU pair on another uphill, he decided to continue the momentum past them. There was about 1.3 kilometers to go when Hicks

took the lead. He didn't make a huge move – he knew Young would catch him anyway and therefore wanted to preserve something for late in the race – but he did commit himself.

Sure enough, Young made a big push as they rounded a corner onto a downhill to the finish with 200 meters to go. But Hicks responded and pulled away over the final meters.

The West Region title was Stanford's second consecutive and 17th overall. It enabled the Cardinal men to advance to the NCAA Championships as a team for the 29th consecutive season, where Stanford earned its ninth consecutive top-six team finish.

The conference title was Stanford's 16th. Behind Hicks was Cole Sprout in third, Meika Beaudoin-Rousseau in fifth, Ky Robinson in sixth, and Thomas Boyden in seventh. Stanford placed five in the top seven and six among the top 10.

Robert DiDonato was the top-placing freshman at the Pac-12 Championships and earned conference's Freshman of the Year honors.

After the collegiate season, Hicks went on to win the European under-23 cross country championship while representing Great Britain, and Robinson raced for Australia at the World Cross Country Championships and placed 23rd. Robinson was named first-team Academic All-American for cross country/track and field.

The Stanford women's cross country team earned its third consecutive NCAA West Region title and placed 13th at nationals, with Zofia Dudek emerging to win All-America honors.

Women's coach J.J. Clark, Stanford's Franklin P. Johnson Director of Track and Field and Cross Country, earned West Region Coach of the Year honors. Dudek, a junior, led the Cardinal in every meet she competed in. She was 20th at the NCAA Championships, third at the NCAA West Regionals, sixth at the Pac-12 Championships, and 16th at the Wisconsin Nuttycombe Invitational. The All-America honor was the first for Dudek, the Foot Locker national cross country champion in high school and the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year during the 2020–21 cross-country season. She closed out the 2022–23 academic year by being named first-team Academic All-American for cross country/track and field.

The West Region title was the third in a row for Stanford. The title advanced the Stanford women to an ongoing record of its 30th consecutive NCAA Championships berth as a team.

The Cardinal women placed fourth at the Pac-12 Championships, though only third-place Oregon was a regional foe among those top four teams. At regionals, Stanford easily beat the Ducks, 96-76, as each earned the NCAA automatic spots. The Card's five scorers all placed ahead of Oregon's third runner, and six Cardinal finished in the top 25.

Earning All-Region honors, with their regional finishing places, were Dudek (third place), Lucy Jenks (15th), Audrey DaDamio (18th), Audrey Suarez (19th), Riley Stewart (21st), and Abi Archer (25th).

Dudek earned her highest race finish since winning the Sacramento State Invitational on Oct. 1, 2021. She led a group of Cardinal in the front pack for

much of the race and finished in 19:25.1 over 6 kilometers (3.73 miles). Among Stanford's team accomplishments was a 12th consecutive season with an All-American.

Overall, Stanford reached the NCAA Championships as a team for the 35th season, including 30th in a row – the longest streak in the country. Stanford also earned its 30th consecutive NCAA top-16 team finish. The regional title was the Stanford women's 18th.

In comparing Stanford to its rival, the Cardinal extended its winning streak against Cal to 59 in championship meets (conference, regional, NCAA) when both have full teams. In conference championship meets, Stanford has beaten the Bears 32 consecutive times.

Dudek was named to the All-Pac-12 first team and Riley Stewart earned Pac-12 Freshman of the Year honors by finishing as the top freshman at the conference championships, placing 24th.

Stewart, out of Englewood, Colorado, won the season-opening USF Invitational at Golden Gate Park in her collegiate debut and was Stanford's No. 1 runner at the Cowboy Jamboree on the NCAA championship course in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Stewart was Stanford's record ninth Pac-12 Cross Country Women's Freshman of the Year, joining Dudek (2019), Olympian Elise Cranny (2014), Cayla Hatten (2012), Teresa McWalters (2004), Arianna Lambie (2003), Sara Bei (2001), Victoria Chang (2000) and Erin Sullivan (1999).

Jenks, a junior, established herself as the team's No. 2 runner, holding that position at the NCAA Championships and NCAA West Regionals.




M FENCING

In the two biggest team competitions of the fencing season – the NCAA and Mountain Pacific Sports Federation championships – Stanford competes as a combined men’s and women’s program.

The Cardinal placed 13th as a combined team at the NCAA Championships and won the MPSF crown through something called a team relay – a format used for the second year. The crucial points came from freshman Sanjay Kasi, in unlikely circumstances.

Though he struggled the day before in the NCAA West Regionals, Kasi was placed in the final spot in the lineup for the MPSF team relay final against Air Force.

Stanford was leading 25-15 when Kasi took to the strip to face MPSF foil champ Jack Griffith in the first-to-30 contest for the conference title. Kasi didn’t back down. Though Griffith outscored him 9-5, Kasi never allowed his opponent momentum and got the touches he needed to ignite a Cardinal celebration.

“To defend our title with a freshman finishing our competition means great things for the future,” Stanford co-head coach Lisa Posthumus said. Stanford built a lead largely through the saber mastery of individual MPSF champion Donghwan Park. That was no surprise. Park, an All-American as a freshman and sophomore, won the NCAA West Region title with an 11-2 record and was given the top seed in the four-fencer MPSF individual tournament. Park cruised through his two bouts, beating UC San Diego’s Jerry Pan in the final, 15-11.

Park, a junior, not only won his first regional and conference titles, but he was named MPSF Men’s Fencer of the Year. Park went on to finish 17th at the NCAA Championships in his third appearance at nationals in three tries. Overall, Park finished 59-26 (.694) – a 24-victory improvement over his sophomore year. His Stanford career record stands at 115-69 (.625).

Stanford junior Kai Rayle advanced to the MPSF men’s epee final before falling to UCSD’s Vedran Markota, 15-11. Rayle was named to the MPSF first team and, with his third-place at the NCAA West Regionals, was named to the All-West Region second team. His season record was 39-28 (.582).

Stanford’s men and women historically have competed for conference team championships separately. When the MPSF began to sponsor fencing in 2022, it created a combined title. Though records are incomplete, Stanford’s men won at least seven titles since first joining a conference in 1965, and the women won one, with a combined title in 1980. Therefore, Stanford fencing now has at least 11 conference team championships.

Park became the 34th different Stanford male to win a regional championship while winning the 48th title overall – all since 1985. Also, Park became Stanford’s first conference saber champion since Howard Cash won the NorCal Conference title in 1982, though that fact is a little deceiving because individual titles weren’t always contested in conference competition.

As for the specific weapons, Stanford’s saber group, led by Park, went 113-96 (.541). The foil team, led by Kasi at 34-25 (.576), went 77-66 (.538). And the epee team, led by Rayle, went 98-93 (.513).




W FENCING

The Stanford women’s fencing team swept the three Mountain Pacific Sports Federation individual titles and earned two NCAA West Regional titles in 2023. At the NCAA Fencing Championships, Stanford placed 13th as a combined men’s and women’s team, with Irene Yeu, Crystal Qian, and Joy Yun representing the Cardinal women in Durham, North Carolina.

Yeu placed 11th at epee, going 6-1 on the final day of pool competition to secure her second All-America honor. Among her 12 victories in the NCAA Tournament, three were over top-six placers. Among those she beat were defending champion Kaylin Sin Yan Hsieh and Eszter Muhari, ranked No. 17 in the world at the time, both of Notre Dame.

Yeu’s success marked the 41st time a Stanford woman has placed in the top 12 in any weapon at nationals and the 16th time in epee. Yeu, who was fifth at the NCAA Championships in 2021, is among eight different Cardinal women to place among the top-12 in epee all-time.

Freshman Crystal Qian finished just two spots out of All-America recognition, in 14th, going 12-11 in foil to finish the season with a 49-22 record (.690).

Qian, the MPSF Newcomer of the Year, doubled as the MPSF and NCAA West Region foil champ. She went 8-2 at the West Regionals, 16-6 at the Western Invitational, and 11-3 at the Northwestern Duals. In the MPSF team relay that decided the conference team title, Qian closed out the 30-18 semifinal victory over Incarnate Word and out-touched her Air Force opponent 5-2 in the final.

Yun was the MPSF’s Women’s Fencer of the Year after winning the MPSF and NCAA West Region titles in saber. She advanced to the national championships for the second time, placing 22nd while closing with a flourish.

After going 0-4 in the fourth round, Yun went 3-1 in Round Five. Included among those victories was a 5-4 stunner over Maggie Shealy of Brandeis, who went 19-4 to place first in the overall pool and earn the No. 1 seed for the semifinals. Yun finished the season with a 41-22 (.651) record, including a 9-2 record at the NCAA West Regionals and 18-3 mark at the Western Invitational. In the MPSF team relay, she out-touched her Incarnate Word opponent 5-1 in the semifinals and her Air Force opponent 7-2 in the final that resulted in the team title.

The Cardinal women’s epee squad of Yeu, Hanna Lee, and freshmen Aditri Patel and Meghana Paturu went a combined 149-86 for a team-high weapons winning percentage of .634. All four had winning overall records, led by Yeu’s 56-28 (.667) mark and Paturu at 28-14 (.667). Yeu won the MPSF title and was a second-team All-American.

The saber team, led by Yun, went 133-98 (.576) and the foil team, led by Qian, went 121-92 (.568).

Men’s and women’s co-head coach Lisa Posthumus was named MPSF Coach of the Year. After 24 seasons, she remains Stanford’s third-longest tenured head coach, behind only women’s basketball’s Tara VanDerveer (36 seasons) and women’s water polo’s John Tanner (25).



FIELD HOCKEY

The second year of the Roz Ellis era at Stanford saw one of the most improved teams in the country, with the Cardinal winning 10 games and reaching the championship game of the America East Tournament. Despite a smaller roster, Stanford tallied three wins over ranked opponents and led the America East in goals-against average.

Haley Mossmer paced the team with 11 goals and 23 points while Fenella Scutt had a team-leading six assists. Lynn Vanderstichele (14) and Rose Winter (10) contributed double-digit points, while Daisy Ford (41 saves) and Kendall Dowd (38 saves) split the time between the posts.

The Stanford season started on a high note with an overtime win over Holy Cross – the extra time foreshadowing a trend of additional periods throughout the season. Lynn Vanderstichele netted the game-winner in overtime, a feat she would replicate nearly two months later in overtime over then-No. 20 James Madison.

Daisy Ford made 11 saves in a clash at No. 4 Maryland, and Stanford added a shootout victory over Michigan State on Sept. 4 with the first of six shutouts on the season.

The Cardinal battled to advance to its eighth-straight America East Tournament (out of eight), winning bouts against UC Davis (5-0), then-No. 21 UAlbany (1-0), and Bryant (3-0) before officially punching its ticket to the conference championship at New Hampshire with a 3-0 triumph.

Traveling to Orono, Maine, for the America East Tournament, Mossmer started a torrid stretch of play. First, she scored the game-winner in a 2-1 victory over

Vermont, and followed with a hat trick in a 3-1 win over No. 23 Maine to lead the Cardinal to the title bout. Mossmer's hat trick was the first for a Cardinal player since 2021 (Corinne Zanolli at Miami), and the first for a Cardinal player in the America East Tournament.

Caroline Guden scored first in the championship game against No. 17 UAlbany, but the Great Danes advanced to the NCAA Tournament in a stroke off.

Four players earned All-America East honors, including a first team nod for Megan Frost and a second team selection for Cara Sambeth. Anna Ghuliani was named to the All-Rookie team, while Isabelle Pilson joined Frost on the All-Academic team.

The all-conference honor was the third consecutive for Frost, and her first to the first team, while Sambeth earned second team standing for the second season in a row. Molly Redgrove, meanwhile, was selected to the NFHCA All-West Region second team.

Stanford also had the second highest team GPA in the country, and every eligible player was selected to the NFHCA National Academic squad.

The 2022 season will ultimately be remembered as the final year of David Shaw's successful and memorable tenure as Stanford football head coach. Shaw announced his resignation in the early morning on Nov. 27 following the season finale vs. BYU at Stanford Stadium.

The winningest coach in program history, Shaw finished his 12 seasons with a 96-54 record. Shaw was honored with the 2017 Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Award and led Stanford to three Pac-12 titles and two Rose Bowl victories during his tenure.

In addition to guiding Stanford to three Rose Bowl Game appearances, Shaw is the only four-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year, having led the Cardinal to three conference titles. Shaw's 96 overall wins rank ninth in Pac-12 history while his 65 conference victories rank fifth. Stanford achieved 29 wins against top-25 opponents (ranking eighth nationally since 2011), 11 against top-10 programs, and five against top-5 foes. In addition, the Cardinal had 43 players drafted, a total ranking tied for 13th nationally and tied for the most in the Pac-12.

The Cardinal was equally accomplished in the classroom during Shaw's tenure, boasting a nation-leading 15 Academic All-Americans since 2010, five more than any other program and 10 more than any Pac-12 school in that span, including Andrew Luck (2011) and Christian McCaffrey (2015) as Academic All-Americans of the Year.

Stanford finished the 2022 season 3-9 overall and 1-8 in the Pac-12. It marked the second straight season the Cardinal has finished 3-9 overall, and since 2019, Stanford is just 14-28.

After Shaw's resignation, Jaquish G. Kenninger Director of Athletics Bernard Muir turned to Troy Taylor to become the new Bradford M. Freeman Director

of Football. Taylor guided Sacramento State to a 30-8 mark in four years and a berth in the FCS quarterfinals for the first time in school history. Prior to the 2022 season, Sacramento State had never won an FCS Playoff game in its program history.

The Cardinal began the season with a 41-10 win over Colgate at Stanford Stadium, but lost its next four, all to teams that finished the season ranked in the AP Top 25 (No. 12 USC, at No. 8 Washington, at No. 15 Oregon, and No. 17 Oregon State).

However, in a high moment of the season, Stanford went on the road to South Bend and claimed back the Legends Trophy with a thrilling victory at Notre Dame Stadium. The Fighting Irish finished the season 9-4 and ranked No. 18 in the AP's final ranking.

The Cardinal won its second straight the following week, 15-14 over Arizona State, on the leg of five Joshua Karty field goals. At the time, Stanford was 3-4, but lost its final five to end the season. Over the last three full seasons, the Cardinal is 0-12 in the month of November.

Speaking of Joshua Karty, what a season for the junior placekicker from Burlington, North Carolina. He was named First Team All-America by the Associated Press, Second Team All-America by *The Sporting News* and Third Team All-America by the Football Writers Association of America.

Karty is just the second placekicker in school history to earn First Team All-America honors (Rod Garcia, 1973). He is the first Cardinal since 2018 to earn All-American honors (Paulson Adebo, FWAA Second Team) and the first Stanford football player to earn First Team All-America honors since 2017 (Bryce Love, Associated Press).



M GOLF

Stanford men's golf returned to the top of the Pac-12 in 2023, winning its 12th conference championship and its first since 2019. The Cardinal was ranked in the top-10 for the entirety of the campaign and finished tied for eighth at the NCAA Championships.

Stanford emerged from its fall season as one of the top programs in the country, scoring victories at the Fighting Illini Invitational (Sept. 16–18) and the Golf Club of Georgia Collegiate (Oct. 21–23), in addition to posting match play victories over Cal and Texas. Michael Thorbjornsen led the Cardinal in Illinois with a seven-under par score to win the tournament, and he finished third in Georgia at 11-under to guide Stanford to its second team title of the fall.

The calendar turned to 2023, and Stanford carried its momentum into a third-place result at the Prestige at PGA West, an eighth-place finish at the Cabo Collegiate, a third-place finish at the Goodwin, hosted by Stanford at TPC Harding, and a fourth-place mark at the Western Intercollegiate.

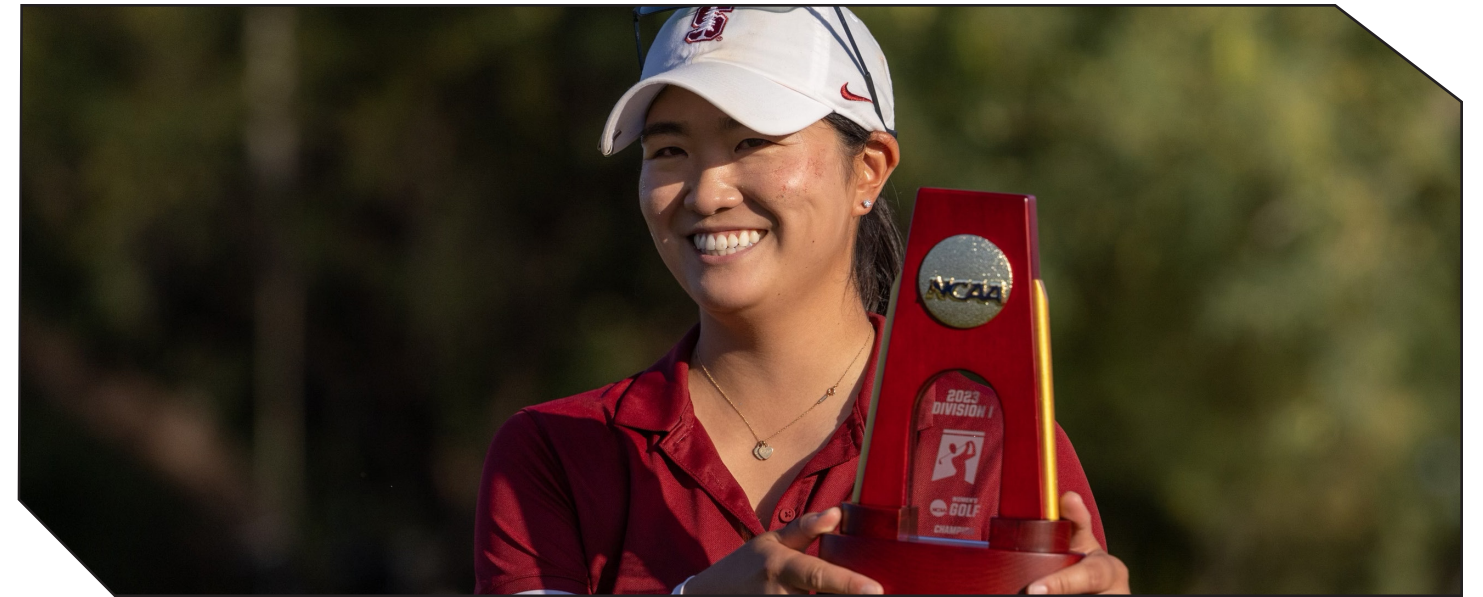
The Cardinal hosted the Pac-12 Championships April 28–30 at the Stanford Golf Course, winning its first championship since 2019. The 13-stroke victory (19-under 1,381) was the first double-digit margin of victory for a team at Pac-12 Championships since 2016, when the Cardinal bested Cal by 29 shots. More impressively, Stanford sat in sixth place and trailed Arizona State by 19 shots following 18 holes on Friday, meaning the Cardinal bested the Sun Devils by 32 strokes over the final 54 holes. On the individual side, Thorbjornsen was Stanford's first Pac-12 champion since Maverick McNealy in 2015.

Stanford continued its stretch of impeccable play at the NCAA Las Vegas Regional, held at Bear's Best Las Vegas, combining to shoot a staggering 57 strokes under par. Ethan Ng led the way for Stanford with a career-best fourth-place finish, ending the 54-hole event with an 18-under 198, the best NCAA Regional performance ever by a Cardinal. Thorbjornsen was close behind in fifth, while Barclay Brown, Nate Menon, and Karl Vilips all ended at least seven under par and in the top-30 overall.

The NCAA Championships were held in Scottsdale, Arizona, at Grayhawk Golf Club, with Stanford finishing tied for eighth overall. The Cardinal fought back from 17th place through 18 holes, climbing to sixth through 54 holes, but missed out on match play after dropping a 10-hole tiebreaker to Arizona State, with both teams finishing 12-over par. Brown was in contention for the individual championship throughout the duration of the event, taking fourth overall.

For the second consecutive season Michael Thorbjornsen was honored as an All-American, while Barclay Brown and Karl Vilips earned their first selections.

Thorbjornsen was the Pac-12 Golfer of the Year, leading the program to the conference championship for the first time since 2019. He was a first team All-Pac-12 honoree for the second straight year, and he was a finalist for the Ben Hogan Award. Thorbjornsen led the Pac-12 with a 69.26 scoring average, which ranked sixth nationally. That scoring average is the second-best in program history and it ranks as the eighth-best mark in Pac-12 history.

Stanford closed out another dominant season in 2022–23, maintaining the nation's No. 1 ranking throughout the season and producing an NCAA semifinal finish. Despite falling short in its bid to repeat as NCAA champions, the Cardinal racked up seven event wins, including team titles at the NCAA Pullman Regional and NCAA Championship. Stanford, which made its 31st overall NCAA appearance in 2023 and 13th in a row for the second-longest active streak in the country, is also the only program to reach the NCAA match play quarterfinal stage in all eight seasons of the current format.

In addition to Stanford's team success, Rose Zhang put the finishing touches on arguably the most decorated amateur career in the history of collegiate golf during two dynamic seasons (2022–23) on The Farm.

Named the Honda Cup sport award winner for golf for the second straight season and a top three finalist for the Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year, Zhang finished her career as a two-time NCAA individual champion. The first female to accomplish that feat, Zhang twice set the NCAA single-season scoring average record, with a 68.80 sophomore-season scoring average besting a 69.68 freshman average.

In addition to finishing her career as a two-time ANNIIKA Award recipient, Zhang was also a two-time WGCA Golfer of the Year, becoming the first repeat honoree since Duke's Amanda Blumenherst in 2008. A two-time First Team WGCA All-American, Zhang also established the NCAA career scoring average record with a 69.24 average in 62 career rounds. Zhang was also a two-time Golfweek Player of the Year recipient.

Stanford was well represented among the Pac-12's annual year-end conference awards, with Rose Zhang repeating as Golfer of the Year and Megha Ganne honored as Freshman of the Year.

Stanford has delivered four straight Pac-12 Golfer of the Year recipients, with Zhang winning in back-to-back seasons and following Rachel Heck (2021) and Albane Valenzuela (2019).

Ganne became the fourth Freshman of the Year honoree, joining Zhang (2022), Heck (2021), and Andrea Lee (2017).

Anne Walker, who was named the Margot and Mitch Milias Director of Women's Golf in 2012, has established herself as one of the premier college coaches in the country. In addition to leading the Cardinal to its first two NCAA titles in school history (2015, 2022), Walker has mentored some of the most recognizable names in the sport.

Stanford has enjoyed unprecedented team and individual success under Walker. The Cardinal has qualified for NCAA Championships in all 10 possible seasons during Walker's tenure, including six appearances in the national semifinals, while earning the distinction of being the only program in the country to reach the NCAA match play quarterfinal stage in all eight seasons of the current format.

A two-time WGCA National Coach of the Year (2015, 2022) and three-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year (2015, 2021–22), Walker has mentored the likes of Rachel Heck, Andrea Lee, Mariah Stackhouse, Albane Valenzuela, and Rose Zhang, a heralded group that has combined to win three NCAA individual titles, three ANNIIKA Award honors, three WGCA Golfer of the Year Award nods, and four Pac-12 Golfer of the Year Award accolades.

Stanford led from start to finish on the way to winning its fourth consecutive NCAA men's gymnastics championship on April 15 at Penn State's Rec Hall. Stanford, the nation's top-ranked team, scored 422.458 points to beat runner-up Michigan with 419.889, giving the Cardinal its ninth championship. Thom Glielmi has led the Cardinal to six NCAA titles, which ranks third overall among active Stanford head coaches and trails only Lele Forood of women's tennis (10) and John Tanner of women's water polo (9). The nine national titles ties Stanford for fourth among men's gymnastics programs (Penn State 12, Oklahoma 12, Illinois 10). Gymnastics is just the second Cardinal men's sport to win four consecutive NCAA titles, and the first since men's tennis from 1995-98.

From the first gymnast – Taylor Burkhart on vault – to the last, Stanford never trailed. Burkhart opened the first rotation with a career-best 15.000 and Stanford immediately added to that advantage with Khoi Young scoring 14.800 at No. 2 in the lineup. Freshman Asher Hong followed by scoring a meet-best and career-high 15.333 at No. 3 to win the individual national title. Stanford already had a 73.999-70.665 lead over second-ranked Oklahoma, which opened on floor, after one rotation.

Stanford extended the lead in the second rotation on parallel bars, getting a career-high 14.566 from Brandon Nguyen to lead the way. Oklahoma, Stanford's main rival over the Cardinal's recent run of success, dropped to third on the rotation and never recovered, finishing fourth.

After Stanford put up a 67.999 on horizontal bar, led by Burkhart (14.000) and J.R. Chou (13.900), Nicolas Kuebler kept the momentum going in the fourth rotation, guiding Stanford to a season-best 70.965 on floor exercise. Kuebler nailed down a career-high 14.800 to win the floor national title - taking the crown over Michigan's Fred Richard based on execution score.

With Kuebler's win, Stanford has now won the floor title in back-to-back seasons after Bryan Perla was crowned in 2022. With Brody Malone winning in 2019, Stanford has now won the floor title in three of the last four championship meets.

Though the Cardinal maintained a healthy lead, Michigan made a late run, moving up from fifth after two rotations to second after four. After five rotations, Stanford's lead was cut to only 2.337 points, with the Cardinal heading to rings and Michigan to floor in the final rotation.

Fortunately, Stanford had Kuebler to keep the momentum with the Cardinal. And he did. Kuebler enjoyed a near-flawless routine, sticking the dismount perfectly to score a career-best 14.556 for the second consecutive meet. With Michigan's leadoff scoring 13.100, Stanford's lead ballooned to 3.803 points.

The dagger came from Brandon Briones at the No. 4 spot. Briones nailed his routine to the tune of 14.733, offsetting a strong performance from his Michigan counterpart, Landen Blixt, who scored 14.600 on the floor.

With all-around champion Richard scoring a 14.800 to close out floor for Michigan, Mark Berlaga gave Stanford enough with a 13.566, and the Cardinal were victorious once again.

Led by the goal to "Up the Ante," the 2023 season was one to remember for the Cardinal women's gymnastics team. Continuing the unprecedented excellence of Rodgers Family Director of Gymnastics Tabitha Yim's tenure, the 2023 campaign was highlighted by three home victories and the program's best score in Maples Pavilion since at least 1999 alongside key road wins at No. 20 Arizona State and No. 25 Washington.

The Cardinal returns all but five routines from its 2022 lineups and will be aided in the addition of four talented newcomers in its quest to continue upping the ante for the 2024 season.

Stanford kicked off its 2023 competition schedule with the inaugural Super 16 Presented by Ozone in Las Vegas. Led by a career-best scoring all-around title from senior Chloe Widner, the Cardinal topped No. 20 Georgia, No. 14 Oregon State, and Rutgers at the Orleans Arena.

The Cardinal had a lot to prove with its new lineup in its season opener, replacing 11 routines lost by graduation or retirement. The nation's No. 1 recruiting class stepped up in Vegas, taking over 10 of those routines. Seven of the 10 routines performed by the newcomers scored 9.775 or better.

In just its third meet of the season and entering Tempe with an unblemished record, the Cardinal earned its first win over No. 19 Arizona State since 2017 to move to 5-0 through three meets.

The historic win over the Sun Devils came in come-from-behind fashion, led by Stanford's then-best season beam score and an anchor hit from Chloe Widner of 9.900.

In a night celebrating the careers of Isabela Onyshko, Jade Chrobok, Chloe

Widner, and Addie Stonecipher, the No. 24 Cardinal earned its season-best score of 197.575 in a battle with No. 11 Oregon State. Stanford's team score against the Beavers marked the program's best score in Maples Pavilion dating back to at least 1999.

Stanford's efforts against the Beavers recorded the program's fifth-best regular season score in school history and its top home score since 2004, when the Cardinal topped California 198.875-195.750 and set a new NCAA team score record. The Cardinal's score of 198.875 from 19 years ago still stands as the NCAA's best-ever team total.

The Cardinal's 2023 campaign included scores of 196.000 or better in every regular season meet.

No. 20 Stanford fought until the very end but earned a third-place finish at the NCAA Regionals Second Round, ending its 2023 season at Pauley Pavilion.

The NCAA Regionals Second Round meet was neck-and-neck through three rotations, with the Cardinal down .100 heading into the final rotation. Stanford's gymnasts stepped up to finish the meet, recording the program's top vault team score in 11 seasons (2012 season, 49.550 at NCAA Super Six).

Senior Chloe Widner finished her senior season Thursday morning competing in the all-around competition at the NCAA Championships Semifinals Session I. The Frisco, Texas, native shined on beam, earning a 9.9500 and placing tied for fourth to notch the best individual beam score in program history in its current format at an NCAA Championships event.

A strong 2023 campaign for the Cardinal came to a close in May, highlighted by numerous accolades for the team and student-athletes along the way. Two players garnered *USA Lacrosse Magazine* All-American selections, along with two conference players of the year and academic recognition for the entire team.

Stanford began the season with recognition in both of the major polls, sitting 14th in the ILWomen/IWLCA Rankings and No. 9 on the *USA Lacrosse Magazine* list. With a challenging 17-game regular season schedule featuring seven ranked opponents, the Cardinal kicked off the season with an exciting match-up against No. 13 Virginia at Cagan Stadium. Among Stanford's big games this season was one against Pac-12 rival No. 19 USC. In a heated matchup, the Cardinal took down the Women of Troy 15-12 on The Farm.

The regular season was full of impressive performances across the board for Stanford, including seven weekly Pac-12 awards and a national offensive player of the week award for Annabel Frist. Kara Rahaim collected two Pac-12 defensive player of the week honors while Ashley Humphrey and Frist each added two offensive honors, and Sarah Jaques collected an offensive award as well.

The Cardinal's season came to a close in the Pac-12 Tournament against Colorado in the second round. Stanford's campaign concluded with a 10-8 record.

Multiple players made strides in the record books during the season. Kara Rahaim moved into third in the Pac-12 record book for career saves with 413 and fourth in career ground balls with 114. Ashley Humphrey became Stanford's all-time leader in assists in just her second year of action. She led

the conference in assists for the second-straight season with 42, moving her career total to 130, the second-most in Pac-12 history. Her 199 points are also the fourth-most career points in both the history of the Pac-12 and Stanford. Annabel Frist took over draw control duties and led the conference with 138 draw controls, the second-most ever in a single season in the Pac-12 and the ninth-most draw controls per game in the NCAA with 7.67. Her 192 career draw controls are already the third most in Stanford history after just two seasons of play.

Stanford racked up awards in the postseason, beginning with a flurry of conference accolades. Rahaim was named Co-Goalkeeper of the Year, the second straight yearly award for the star stopper. She also brought home the Pac-12 Lacrosse Scholar-Athlete of the Year award, the first Stanford lacrosse athlete to earn the honor. Frist was named the inaugural Pac-12 Draw Specialist of the Year as well. The pair were also named All-Pac-12 First Team selections, along with Ailish Kelly, Ashley Humphrey, and Caroline Mondiello. Sarah Jaques and Jay Browne rounded out the conference awards with All-Pac-12 Second Team honors. Ashley Humphrey and Frist both were named *USA Lacrosse Magazine* All-Americans while the former was also named to the Tewaaraton Award Watch List.

In the classroom, 15 players were named to the IWLCA Academic Honor Roll, the most of any team in the Pac-12. Stanford was also named an IWLCA Academic Honor Squad, awarded to teams that have a team GPA of 3.2 or higher. 24 athletes were also named to the Pac-12 Academic Honor Roll, again leading the conference's lacrosse teams.

A national runner-up finish in the varsity eight race provided the 2022-23 season highlight for the Stanford women's lightweight rowing program.

The team of coxswain Lydia Garnett, freshman Juliette Lermusiaux at stroke, Hannah Justicz, Emily Molins, Brooke Ruskiewicz, Ella Moore, Lauren Howe, Mikayla Chen, and bow seat Sophie Molins placed second to Princeton by six seconds to secure second at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association Championships in West Windsor, New Jersey.

The Cardinal finished sixth in the overall standings and also got a boost from a seventh-place finish from the varsity four team of coxswain Valerie Gonzalez, Charlotte Burnham, Annie Cloud, Dhamanpreet Kaur, and Jordan Stock.

Justicz and Lermusiaux were named Pocock Racing Shells All-Americans and, in addition to their IRA success, were part of the varsity eight boat that captured the Western Intercollegiate Rowing Association title. In addition to the eight, the Cardinal four boat won a WIRA crown at Lake Natoma in Folsom.

Stanford earned a 13th-place finish at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) regatta and came home with some hardware to punctuate its performance, highlighting the team's 2022–23 season.

The Cardinal won the second varsity eight at Mercer, New Jersey, winning by 1.5 seconds over runner-up Navy.

An encouraging aspect was the team's performance throughout their dual regattas. In the first six duals of the season, Stanford had great success. At the Stanford Invitational, the two Card eights combined to win five of six races against Boston College, Wisconsin, and Northeastern.

As for individual accomplishments, freshman Caspar Griffin was named Pac-12 Co-Newcomer of the Year. Also, graduate student Peter Chatain and junior Travis Senf earned Pac-12 all-conference honors.

The Stanford men's rowing program turned 119 years old on April 30, the anniversary of its first race, a 1904 dual against Cal in the Oakland Estuary, on four-oared barges with coxswains. A year later, Stanford was second in the IRA Grand Final.

The Cardinal finished with a 6-1 dual record and a fourth-place Pac-12 finish. The season ended not only with the success of the No. 2 eight, but with a runner-up finish in the No. 1 eight petite final.

The IRA second varsity eight champion was composed of Scott Buzard, Jack Clark, Ben Felter, James Fetter, Sebastian Marsoner, James Pullinger, Noah Tan, Tibor Thompson, and Nick Woehrl.

Meanwhile, Stanford excelled academically at the conference level and among its national peers.

Nineteen student-athletes were named to the Pac-12 Spring Academic Honor Roll, which honors any student-athlete with a cumulative grade point average of 3.3 or above and at least one year in residence at the institution. Among those honored: Kyle Bergstedt, Buzard, Chatain, Clark, Felter, Fetter, Valeria Gonzalez, Joseph Guman, Jacopo Mascitelli, Logan Morley, Joey O'Brien, Senf, Elysia Smyers, Henry Stewart, Tan, Thompson, Flynn Traeger, Porter Weisberg, and Woehrl.

Eighteen student-athletes were named to the IRA All-Academic squad, which recognizes institutional letterwinners maintaining a 3.35 GPA or higher and having competed at the IRA Championships. Among those honored: Bergstedt, Buzard, Chatain, Clark, Felter, Fetter, Guman, Mascitelli, Morley, O'Brien, Senf, Smyers, Stewart, Tan, Thompson, Traeger, Weisberg, and Woehrl.

Later in the summer, Chatain earned his first call-up to the U.S. senior men's rowing team. Chatain, a veteran of the U.S. under-19 and U23 teams, was named to the U.S. roster for the World Rowing Championships in Belgrade, Serbia, earlier this fall and named to the Men's eight team. The assignment gave Chatain an opportunity to bid for a spot on the U.S. team for the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris. Chatain is a Stanford graduate student in computer science with an emphasis on artificial intelligence and earned his undergraduate degree in mathematics with minors in computer science and physics. He won silver with the U.S. team at the U23 World Championships in Prague in 2021. The Cardinal has a strong history with the senior national team, most recently with Austin Hack competing on the U.S. eight boat at the 2014 and 2015 World Championships.

The Cardinal made its mark on rowing's biggest stage during the 2023 season, earning its first team national championship since 2009 to cement its status as the top women's rowing program in the country.

Highlighted by victories from its varsity eight and second varsity eight crews, Stanford captured its second NCAA championship in school history and first since 2009 with a dominant performance on May 28.

The Cardinal, which had produced back-to-back runner-up finishes to Texas over the last two seasons, totaled 129 points and finally broke through to claim the hardware at Cooper River Park, which was also the site of Stanford's first NCAA crown 14 years ago.

The victories in the varsity eight and second varsity eight increase Stanford's all-time program total to four individual national champions. The Cardinal's previous titles came from the varsity eight in 2009 and second varsity eight in 2011.

One of 13 active Stanford head coaches with at least one national title, head coach Derek Byrnes has guided the Cardinal to three national championships. His two previous crowns came at the helm of the lightweight rowing program in 2015–16.

No. 4 Stanford captured its second consecutive conference title on May 14, winning the 2023 Pac-12 Women's Rowing Championships held on Dexter Lake.

Stanford won the title by 3.5 points, a point greater than its 2.5 point victory over Washington in 2022. Washington finished in second place, while California earned a bronze medal finish. Stanford stormed the race course and made its presence known early in the regatta. The Cardinal's novice eight made a

move late in the race to overtake Washington and California's boats, earning the program's first win of the day. The third varsity eight continued with a decisive victory over California, earning the team's first 3.5 points of the day and a conference title. The Cardinal's varsity four took an insurmountable lead from the start of the race and did not relent to take the title in open water over the Huskies and Golden Bears. With the win, Stanford took a two-point lead in the team standings. Stanford's second varsity eight earned its fourth consecutive runner-up finish, falling just short of topping Washington. Heading into the final race, the Cardinal were tied with the Huskies in the points race.

After leading the Cardinal to its first team national championship since 2009, Stanford women's rowing head coach Derek Byrnes was named the Division I National Coach of the Year, announced by the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA) on June 15. In addition, Byrnes' coaching staff of Alben Family Associate Head Women's Rowing Coach Molly Hamrick and assistant coaches Sarah Dougherty and Megan Biging were collectively named the CRCA's Division I Staff of the Year.

The 2023 season was Byrnes' best since coming to The Farm, leading the Cardinal to a national title while also earning the program's second consecutive Pac-12 Championship and his second consecutive Pac-12 Coach of the Year honor.

For the second year in a row, Stanford women's rowing swept the end-of-year awards from the Pac-12. Azja Czajkowski earned her second consecutive Pac-12 Athlete of the Year honor, Célia Dupré was named the Pac-12 Women's Rowing Newcomer of the Year, and head coach Derek Byrnes was selected as the Pac-12's Coach of the Year. Annabelle Bachmann, Lettie Cabot, Katelin Gildersleeve, and Rachel Miller earned All-Pac-12 accolades for their strong performances this season.

Simply put, 2022–23 was the most successful year in Stanford sailing history. From individual, team, and university accomplishments, the Cardinal set new high marks in every category.

Beginning in the fall, freshman Chapman Petersen decisively sailed to a PCCSC title in the men's singlehanded conference championship. He advanced to the ICSA event and captured the first men's singlehanded national championship since Emery Wagner in 2006.

The Cardinal continued its success into the spring season, completing a clean sweep of the PCCSC titles. Both fleet and team conference championships returned to The Farm, guaranteeing Stanford's participation in the national championship events as well.

The conference championships marked Stanford's 13th straight fleet title and 16th straight team title.

On the national stage, Stanford proved to be one of the best in the country. In the first national championship opportunity of the season, the Cardinal finished as runner-up in the Open Team Race Championship. It was the program's second-best finish at the event, trailing only the 1996–97 team that won the race, Stanford's only national championship prior to the 2022–23 season.

The Cardinal brought its momentum into the Open Fleet Race Championship, sailing to victory in the regatta just days after the team race event. It was the first title in the event in program history and the first time Stanford topped the podium on multiple occasions in the same season after the women's team earned the fleet race title as well.

Michelle Lahrkamp and Ellie Harned were the leaders for Stanford in the A division, finishing with a division-best mark of 37 points, 12 less than Harvard's 49 in second place. In the B division, Vanessa Lahrkamp and Abigail Tindall led the way, guiding Stanford to the third-best total. The Cardinal's 56 points trailed only Yale and Brown in the division.

Grace Austin, Jack Baldwin, Gwendolyn Donahue, Sophie Fisher, Hannah Freeman, Patricia Gerli, and Justin Lim all competed for the Cardinal in Kings Point, New York, as well, leading the team to the top spot on the podium.

Following the historic run of championship events, the Cardinal was named the recipient of the Leonard M. Fowle Trophy, given to the team that accrues the most championship points across the fall and spring seasons and is noted as the most successful collegiate sailing program in the country.

Six sailors were named ICSA All-Americans, led by Michelle and Vanessa Lahrkamp who earned the honor of All-American Skipper in both the women's and open divisions. Patricia Gerli, Ellie Harned, and Abigail Tindall were named ICSA All-American Crew and Grace Austin was the seventh All-American honoree, earning Honorable Mention Crew honors.

Stanford brought home plenty of accolades in conference honors as well. Vanessa Lahrkamp was named Open Skipper of the Year. Chapman Petersen and Justin Lim each earned All-PCCSC Open Skipper honors, and Abigail Tindall earned All-PCCSC Crew honors.

With a young team and a habit of setting records, the Cardinal is primed for more success in 2023–24.

Simply put, 2022–23 was the most successful year in Stanford women's sailing history. The team topped records in the fall and spring seasons, culminating in the first national championship in program history.

Early on in the fall season, Hallie Schiffman set the tone for the season, claiming the PCCSC women's singlehanded championship in dominant fashion. She advanced to the national competition where she earned second overall, Stanford's best finish since 2018.

The Cardinal continued its success into the spring season, completing a clean sweep of the PCCSC titles. Both conference championships returned to The Farm, guaranteeing Stanford's participation in the national championship events as well.

The conference women's fleet title marked Stanford's 18th conference crown in the event. In the women's team, it was Stanford's second consecutive PCCSC title since the event's inception in the spring of 2022.

The championship season began with the Cardinal hosting for the first time at home in Redwood City. The ICSA Women's Team Race was a thrilling contest between Stanford and Yale, ultimately resulting in a victory for the Bulldogs and a second-place finish for the Cardinal.

In the very next championship opportunity, however, and the first of three straight in King's Point, New York, Stanford claimed first place in the Women's Fleet Race Championship, the first women's sailing title in program history.

Michelle Lahrkamp guided the team in the A division, working with Sophie

Fisher, Patricia Gerli, and Ellie Harned as the crews throughout the event. In the B division, Michelle's sister Vanessa Lahrkamp led the team to the best score of the division, working with Grace Austin and Abigail Tindall as crews.

Following the historic run of championship events, the Cardinal was named the recipient of the Leonard M. Fowle Trophy, given to the team that accrues the most championship points across the fall and spring seasons and is noted as the most successful collegiate sailing program in the country.

In a season full of firsts, Michelle Lahrkamp added another after being given the James Rousmaniere Award for Student Leadership, the first time a Stanford sailor has received the honor.

Seven sailors were named ICSA All-Americans, led by Michelle and Vanessa Lahrkamp who earned the honor of All-American Skipper in both the women's and open divisions. Hannah Freeman was also named a women's All-American Skipper, while Patricia Gerli, Ellie Harned, and Abigail Tindall were named ICSA All-American Crew. Grace Austin was the seventh All-American honoree, earning Honorable Mention Crew honors.

Stanford brought home plenty of accolades in conference honors as well. Sophie Fisher was named the Women's Skipper and joined Michelle Lahrkamp as All-PCCSC Women's Skipper, and Abigail Tindall earned All-PCCSC Crew honors.

With a young team and a habit of setting records, the Cardinal is primed for more success in 2023–24.

After 10 years with Jeremy Gunn serving as the Knowles Family Director of Men's Soccer at Stanford, the Cardinal secured its 20th NCAA Tournament appearance and maintained a top-10 ranking for 12 straight weeks, ending the season at No. 7.

Several young players became integral pieces for Stanford in 2022, setting the program up for more sustained success and growth in 2023 and beyond.

After narrowly missing out on the postseason a year ago, Stanford began the preseason of 2022 as an unranked squad. The first weekend of play quickly showed fans and the country what Stanford was capable of. A pair of wins against Villanova and SMU launched the Cardinal into the national conversation, with the team going from unranked to No. 3 in the country. The Cardinal would go on to win six out of its first nine games, tying the other three for the longest unbeaten streak to start a season since 2001. In the regular season home finale, Stanford fired in seven goals against Pacific, the largest Cardinal men's soccer victory since 1989.

Stanford closed out the regular season at 11-2-5, securing a first round bye in the NCAA Tournament and the No. 5 overall seed. Stanford hosted High Point University in the second round of the tournament and showcased its power, taking down the visitors 6-2. The Cardinal's six goals tied the record for the most ever in an NCAA Tournament game, matching the goal tally of the 2000 NCAA Second Round win over UIC, 6-0.

Stanford hosted No. 12 UNCG in the third round, which proved to be a more challenging contest. The Spartans and the Cardinal each netted one goal during regular time, and after a winner couldn't separate the two in OT, the match entered penalty kicks and was recorded as a draw. UNCG advanced in the penalty shootout by a score of 3-1, ending the Cardinal's season in the third round.

Stanford had plenty of players who were key in the team's success throughout the season, but none more than senior captain Keegan Hughes. Hughes was named the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year for his efforts, while also earning First Team All-Conference honors. Fellow captain Cam Cilley was also named First Team All-Pac-12 after scoring five goals and tallying five assists. Keegan Tingey and Shane de Flores were named Second Team All-Pac-12 and All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention, respectively.

Keegan Hughes' dominant season saw him gain recognition from across the country. The senior defender was named a MAC Hermann Trophy semifinalist, the most prestigious individual honor in all of college soccer. He was also named a First Team All-American by United Soccer Coaches after he and Cam Cilley each earned All-Far West Region First Team honors.

Carlo Agostinelli and Keegan Tingey each earned a spot on the CSC Academic All-America Team for their success in the classroom. Meanwhile, 15 members of the team earned Pac-12 Academic Honor Roll selections. Hughes' success on the field was matched in the classroom as he was named the United Soccer Coaches Scholar Player of the Year, the first Cardinal player to ever receive the honor. Hughes and Cilley were each named First Team Scholar All-Americans as well.

Three of Stanford's seniors are continuing their playing careers after signing homegrown contracts. Hughes signed with the Columbus Crew and has since made his professional debut for the first team on March 25 after subbing on against Atlanta United. Tingey and Cilley each signed homegrown contracts as well and now suit up for the San Jose Earthquakes. With the pair joining the ranks in San Jose, Stanford now has five alumni playing for the local MLS team with Tanner Beason, Ousseni Bouda, and Will Richmond all currently on the team as well.

The 2022 season for the Stanford women's soccer team unfolded as a testament to skill, resilience, and a series of remarkable achievements. The Cardinal finished with an outstanding overall record of 17-2-3 and a stellar 9-1-1 performance in the Pac-12, earning them the conference title.

Entering the NCAA Tournament as the No. 3 seed, Stanford carried a No. 7 ranking in the United Soccer Coaches poll. The Cardinal's unbeaten streak of 12 matches (10-0-2), coupled with six shutouts in their last eight contests, underlined their defensive strength and determination.

Stanford marked its 31st appearance in the NCAA Tournament, a testament to the program's enduring excellence. Notably, the team hosted a first round NCAA Tournament match for the 21st time in program history, maintaining a tradition of excellence that had seen them host the first round in 13 straight seasons from 2007-19.

Cagan Stadium stood as a fortress for Stanford, with an impressive record of 100-5-8 since the start of the 2014 season. The team showcased its offensive firepower, scoring three-plus goals in nine of 22 matches, with a highlight of six goals against San Jose State on Nov. 11.

The Cardinal's offensive statistics were nothing short of remarkable, boasting the eighth-best scoring offense in the nation at 2.64 goals per match. They led the nation in shots on goal per game (11.05) and ranked second in shots per game (23.55), only trailing BYU. The team's 58 total goals ranked sixth nationally and second in the Pac-12.

Defensively, Stanford showcased its strength by allowing just 12 goals through 22 matches (0.54), leading the Pac-12 and ranking sixth nationally.

Goalkeeper Ryan Campbell played a pivotal role, ranking first in the Pac-12 in goals against average (0.549) and securing eight shutouts, which ranked second in the Pac-12 and 41st nationally.

Key contributors to Stanford's success included Lumi Kostmayer and Jasmine Aikey, both freshmen making a significant impact. Kostmayer ranked eighth in the Pac-12 and 50th nationally in total goals (10), while Aikey matched her with 10 goals, managing a hat trick and a record-breaking four-goal performance against San Jose State on Nov. 11.

Stanford's season was marked by historic moments, including Kostmayer's hat trick against San Diego, the first for the Cardinal since 2021. Aikey added her own hat trick at Oregon State before her four-goal spectacle against San Jose State.

The Cardinal's opening match against Sac State resulted in a 5-0 victory, extending their unbeaten streak in season openers to an impressive 16 matches (15-0-1). However, they faced a setback in their Pac-12 opener, marking only the second loss in the last three years.

The season also saw several newcomers making their mark, with freshmen Jasmine Aikey, Elise Evans, and Allie Montoya starting in the season opener. In total, six Cardinal players made their Stanford debuts, showcasing the depth and talent of the team.

Notably, three Pac-12 head coaches, Marguerite Aozasa (UCLA), Hideki Nakada (Utah), and Nicole Van Dyke (Washington), once served as assistants to Stanford Head Coach Paul Ratcliffe, highlighting the coaching legacy at the heart of Stanford's success.

Stanford (47-15, 14-10 Pac-12) produced one of its best seasons in school history in 2023, finishing two wins shy of a spot in the national championship series. The Cardinal made its third NCAA Women's College World Series appearance overall and first since 2004. Achieving its fifth-best win total in school history and best finish since a 48-11 campaign in 2009, the Cardinal remained a top-10 fixture all season and was ranked as high as No. 3 in several final polls. Stanford compiled a 21-game winning streak from Feb. 12 to March 17, second only to winning 28 in a row from Feb. 7 to March 23 in 2009.

Stanford finished 2-2 at the NCAA Women's College World Series in its third appearance in school history (2001, 2004, 2023).

After falling 2-0 to No. 1 Oklahoma in its opener, the Cardinal rebounded with shutout wins over No. 12 Alabama (2-0) and No. 7 Washington (1-0).

In the national semifinals against No. 1 Oklahoma, Stanford was unable to hold an early 2-0 lead and was defeated 4-2 in nine innings despite pushing the defending NCAA champion Sooners to the brink.

Taylor Gindlesperger (.538 BA, 7 H, 8 TB) and Nijaree Canady (18.2 IP, 9 H, 3 ER, 2 BB, 25 K) were named to the All-Tournament Team. Stanford is now 6-6 all-time at the Women's College World Series.

In addition to reaching the Women's College World Series, Stanford finished 7-2 overall in NCAA Tournament competition in 2023. The Cardinal swept through NCAA Regionals in its first hosting opportunity in 12 years before defeating Duke on the road in consecutive games during the NCAA Super Regional round.

Stanford owns a 54-45 record overall in NCAA competition and made its 20th

appearance in program history. The Cardinal is 44-27 in NCAA Regionals, 4-12 in NCAA Super Regionals and 6-6 at the NCAA Women's College World Series.

The Cardinal advanced to NCAA Super Regionals for the seventh time overall and in back-to-back seasons for the third time in school history (2005-06, 2008-09, 2022-23). Stanford has qualified for the NCAA Tournament in four straight seasons, including a memorable 2022 campaign in which Stanford won the Tuscaloosa Regional and reached its first Super Regional since 2011.

The Cardinal has served as an NCAA Regional host on seven occasions (2001, 2004, 2007, 2009, 2010, 2011, and 2023).

Stanford has displayed considerable progress each year under Head Coach Jessica Allister, who owns a 196-112 overall record in six seasons on The Farm.

Allister's career coaching record is 486-219 and includes a 290-107 mark during a seven-year tenure at Minnesota.

Allister has directed the Cardinal to four NCAA appearances, chalking up a 11-7 record with back-to-back NCAA Super Regional showings. Allister has guided the Cardinal to 11 NCAA appearances as a player (2001-04), assistant (2007-09), and head coach (2019, 2021-23).

Allister's staff includes Jessica Merchant, Stanford's Jessica Mendoza Associate Head Softball Coach, and Tori Nyberg, an assistant coach who works with the pitching staff.

In its first season with a conference affiliation, the Stanford women's squash team placed third in the Mid-Atlantic Squash Conference and completed the season with a No. 11 ranking.

The Cardinal was represented in the Collegiate Squash Association National Individual Championships by sophomore Si Yi Ma, who reached the main draw of the top-level Ramsay Cup, Lucia Bicknell, who won the consolation title of the Holleran Cup West Division tournament, and Khushi Kukadia, a semifinalist in the main draw of the Holleran Cup East.

Stanford earned a winning record in dual competition, going 7-6 overall with a 59-58 record in individual matches.

In MASC action, Stanford placed third in the six-team conference tournament that also includes Dickinson, Drexel, Franklin & Marshall, Georgetown, and Virginia.

Stanford concluded its season with a 6-3 victory over Tufts in the third-place match of the Kurtz Cup, the B Division championship tournament at University of Pennsylvania's Specter Center.

Among individual honors, Yi Ma was named second-team All-American. Bicknell was designated as a Scholar-Athlete by the CSA, and Miriam Cheng was named Co-Freshman of the Year by the MASC.

Stanford finished the 2022–23 season strong, closing out a championship season with a top-eight finish at the NCAA meet. Eleven swimmers and divers combined to collect 28 All-American honors while also having the best GPA among all division I teams.

Stanford kicked off the campaign in the fall of 2022 with a dual meet victory, taking down conference foe Utah at the Avery Aquatic Center 199-97. Following the Triple Distance Meet against California, the Cardinal headed to North Carolina for the midseason NC State/GAC Invite. Against strong competition, Stanford finished on the podium in third place, and with its eyes on the remainder of the dual meet season. The Cardinal faced off against four ranked opponents in dual meets, three of whom are also Pac-12 rivals. Stanford closed out the regular season with a 4-2 record, highlighted by a senior day victory over No. 20 USC.

Rafael Gu also was named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Week during the regular season while Jack Ryan claimed four of the nine possible Pac-12 Diver of the Week awards.

The Cardinal began the postseason at the King County Aquatic Center in Federal Way, Washington. During the diving portion of the championships, Jack Ryan earned a silver medal in the 1-meter while Peyton Donald added a fourth-place finish. Andrei Minakov claimed his second-straight Pac-12 title in the 100 fly, while also leading Stanford to a clean sweep of the podium. Aaron Sequeira finished in second place in the event while Rafael Gu claimed third. Minakov added a third-place finish in the 50 free while Ron Polonsky took third in the 200 IM. Polonsky also claimed sixth in the 400 IM. Zhier Fan took

fifth place overall in the 100 breast while swimming the fourth-fastest time in program history. Fan is just the fourth Stanford swimmer to break 52 seconds in the event. Gabe Machado took fourth in the 1,650 free, swimming his way into the record books with the 15th-fastest time in program history. Minakov closed out a strong conference championships with a sixth-place finish in the 100 free. Stanford wrapped up the championships in third place, trailing California and champions Arizona State.

The NCAA Championships saw the Cardinal finish in the top-10 for the second straight year, taking eighth place overall. Jack Ryan and Ethan Foster led the way in the diving pool, earning All-American honors in the 1-meter and platform, respectively. Along with five relay teams that each earned All-America recognition, four swimmers claimed individual honors, led by Ron Polonsky and Aaron Sequeira who each had two. Polonsky's time in the 100 breast at the NCAA Championships set the new Stanford record in the event at 51.14.

Stanford was just as successful in the classroom during the 2022–23 season. The Cardinal claimed the top GPA among all division I programs in the NCAA, while 24 athletes were named CSCAA Scholar All-Americans. Nineteen student-athletes were also named to the Pac-12 Academic Honor Roll.

Leon MacAlister was named the Pac-12 Men's Swimming and Diving Scholar Athlete of the Year and also earned his second consecutive CSC Academic All-American honor. Luke Maurer, Preston Forst, and Ron Polonsky joined MacAlister among the CSC Academic All-American selections.

Stanford produced a third-place NCAA finish in 2023 for the second straight season, representing its 10th top-three finish at the NCAA Championships since 2008, a stretch that includes three consecutive national championships from 2017–19. The Cardinal totaled 333 overall points at NCAA Championships, with individual national champions Claire Curzan (200 backstroke) and Taylor Ruck (200 freestyle) among 14 All-Americans. Stanford also repeated as Pac-12 champions, claiming the hardware for the sixth time in seven seasons.

Stanford extended its streak as the only program in the nation to have finished in the top-10 at NCAA Championships every season. The Cardinal has won 11 NCAA titles and 12 national championships overall.

Claire Curzan won the 200-yard backstroke, setting a pool record with a time of 1:47.64. Taylor Ruck claimed the 200-yard freestyle, clocking in at 1:42.36. Curzan was a seven-time All-American in her debut season while Ruck finished as a five-time All-American, bringing her career total to 19 All-America honors.

The Cardinal boasted 14 All-American swimmers in 2023, an increase from 12 in 2022. Torri Huske matched Curzan as a seven-time All-American.

Putting the finishing touches on a dominant conference meet, Stanford repeated as Pac-12 champions in 2023 and claimed the hardware for the sixth time in seven seasons.

The Cardinal totaled 1,725.5 points, its most since scoring 1,775 in 2019 while producing the second-largest margin of victory at the conference championships in the last 27 years. Stanford, which captured its 25th conference title in program history, handily distanced itself from runner-up USC (1,267.5) and third-place California (1,260.5).

Named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Meet for the second consecutive season, Torri Huske came away with seven individual titles, winning the 50-yard freestyle, 100-yard freestyle and 100-yard butterfly in addition to participating on four winning relay teams.

Claire Curzan closed out an impressive week in her conference meet debut, producing a meet record of 1:47.43 in the 200-yard backstroke on the way to winning five titles overall.

Aurora Roghair captured her first career Pac-12 title with a 16:02.28 in the 1,650-yard freestyle.

One month later, Stanford also swept the conference awards, with Huske as Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year, Curzan as Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, and Paul A. Violich Director of Women's Swimming Greg Meehan as the Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

Stanford men's tennis wrapped up another strong season under head coach Paul Goldstein, winning 16 dual matches and advancing to the NCAA Super Regionals for the third year in a row. Arthur Fery and Nishesh Basavareddy gave the Cardinal multiple All-Americans for the first time since 2015.

Despite an injury-plagued dual slate Stanford worked its way to 16 dual wins, including eight over ranked opponents and four over top-15 foes. Stanford collected two early wins for ITA Kickoff Weekend over Georgia Tech and Texas A&M to punch its ticket to ITA Indoors, where it added a 4-0 sweep of Wake Forest. The Cardinal also picked up a strong nonconference win 4-1 in Orlando over Florida.

Stanford kicked off Pac-12 play on a strong note with home wins over Arizona and Arizona State, and later added wins at Taube over UCLA and California. The Cardinal went 10-1 at home on the season, and is 34-3 at Taube over the last four seasons.

The Cardinal was sent to an Ivy League program for the second straight NCAA Tournament regional, and won the regional on the road for the second consecutive season. After downing Mississippi State and Harvard in Cambridge a year ago, Stanford defeated St. John's and host Columbia in New York City in May.

Traveling to No. 4 Kentucky for the NCAA Super Regionals, Stanford won the doubles point and added wins in singles from Arthur Fery and Filip Kolasinski, but fell 4-3 on the road in Lexington.

One of the top players in the country, Fery ended the season ranked No. 3 nationally in singles and No. 22 in doubles and was an ITA All-American in

back-to-back seasons. He was named the Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year, the 20th overall in program history, and earned his second straight first team selection and third All-Pac-12 selection overall after a second team nod in 2021. The junior went 21-5 on the season, including an 18-4 mark at No. 1 singles in dual play, earning the No. 3 national seed in the NCAA singles bracket.

Fery ended his season with 14 ranked wins this season, including three over top-eight national seeds at the NCAA Tournament. 30 of Fery's 56 career singles wins have come over ranked foes. Fery was also honored as an Academic All-American on May 31.

The fall slate of ITA Tournaments provided the perfect introduction for Nishesh Basavareddy, who went 17-1 before his first dual match with three wins. First, Basavareddy won the consolation bracket at the ITA All-American Championships with a 7-1 record in the event with three wins over top-15 opponents. He followed it up two weeks later with a perfect 5-0 sweep at the ITA Super Regionals to qualify for the ITA National Fall Championships.

The middle of Stanford's lineup was a gauntlet to face, led by Basavareddy, fellow freshman Samir Banerjee, and sophomore Max Basing.

Basavareddy ended his freshman campaign with a 25-9 record, earning ITA All-America honors in addition to being the ITA Northwest Rookie of the Year and an All-Pac-12 second team selection. He ended the campaign ranked No. 16 in singles and No. 22 in doubles, while soaring as high as No. 2 in singles in February, and reached the round of 16 in both the NCAA singles and doubles tournaments. He ended his first year on the Farm with 13 wins over ranked foes.

Yet another memorable campaign for Stanford women's tennis, the program reached the NCAA semifinals and won its 29th conference championship in 2023. Two players were named All-Americans while a host of other Cardinal student-athletes earned conference and regional honors.

Stanford put together a 25-3 overall campaign, including a perfect 10-0 mark in Pac-12 competition and a 14-0 mark at Taube Family Tennis Center.

Following a fall slate that included a semifinal appearance at the ITA Fall National Championships from Connie Ma, Stanford breezed past its first four opponents, including a pair of 4-0 sweeps at ITA Kickoff Weekend. Stanford won one of three contests at the ITA Indoor National Championships, with the win over Vanderbilt starting a 22-match unbeaten streak that spanned four months.

The Cardinal rolled through the Pac-12 before going an unblemished 3-0 at the Pac-12 Championships to earn both the regular season and tournament titles. In Ojai, Stanford blanked Washington and USC in the semifinals and finals, respectively, by 4-0 margins, and earned the right to host the first and second rounds, and eventually a Super Regional, of the NCAA Tournament. Alexandra Yepifanova was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year while Lele Forood was honored as the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the seventh time.

Stanford downed Weber State (4-0) and Oklahoma State (4-1) to reach the Sweet 16, and picked off top-10 ranked Ohio State in the Super Regional (4-1) to advance to Orlando. The seventh-seeded Cardinal faced No. 2 Texas A&M in

the quarterfinals, and earned the victory in shutout fashion, 4-0. The run for a 22nd national championship ended in the Final Four, with NC State outlasting the Cardinal at the USTA National Campus.

Stanford featured a pair of ITA All-Americans in singles, as senior Angelica Blake and sophomore Alexandra Yepifanova both earned national honors for the first time in their careers. In addition, Valencia Xu was named a second team College Sports Communicators Academic All-American.

Blake constructed her strongest season yet, finishing the year 36-7 overall, including 20-2 in dual matches, with a 16-0 mark on court three. Her only dual match losses this spring were on court one, a pair of three-set defeats in Los Angeles. She featured a 15-match win streak from late March until her loss in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Singles Championship.

Yepifanova, the Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year, finished with a 36-8 record overall in singles play, going 21-3 in dual matches, primarily on court one. Until her loss to UCLA's Fangran Tian in the NCAA Singles Round of 16, Yepifanova had gone undefeated against Pac-12 opponents the entire season, and totaled a team-high 14 victories over ranked opponents.

Xu played the majority of the season on court five in singles, going 13-6, along with a 3-0 record on court four. Overall in singles play, Xu boasted a 26-8 record. In doubles, Xu partnered primarily with Connie Ma and saw immense success on court three, as the duo went 17-3 this spring. Xu ended her season winning six singles matches in a row and was 3-0 in the NCAA Tournament.

The Stanford men were third at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, winning three individual titles at Mike A. Myers Stadium in Austin, Texas.

Ky Robinson swept the 5,000 and 10,000 meters and Udodi Onwuzurike gave Stanford its first NCAA title in the 200 (or equivalent distance of 220 yards) since 1939.

Stanford's third place, under fourth-year Franklin P. Johnson Director of Track and Field/Cross Country J.J. Clark, was the men's team's highest finish since 2000. It was accomplished with only five athletes. And all the scoring was done by three of them – Robinson, Onwuzurike, and distance runner Charles Hicks. The last time any men's team finished on the NCAA outdoor podium with three or fewer scorers was 1997 by UCLA.

Robinson, a junior, was named among 10 semifinalists for the Bowerman, collegiate track and field's highest individual award. The Australian was the first to win both the 5,000 and 10,000 at NCAA's outdoors since Edward "King Ches" Cheserek of Oregon in 2016 and the first from Stanford to do so since Brad Hauser in 2000.

Stanford men broke or tied school records 18 times over the indoor and outdoor seasons. The indoor season featured 14 such performances and the outdoors four. Among them were some of the finest marks in collegiate history.

Onwuzurike's 19.76 on June 7 in the NCAA semifinals was the third-fastest 200 in collegiate history, a Pac-12 record, and the second-fastest in the world this year. His 9.92 in the Pac-12 Championships semifinals placed him No.

9 on the all-time collegiate performers' list in the 100. And his 20.17 at the NCAA indoor semifinals was the seventh-fastest in collegiate history. Only a sophomore, Onwuzurike broke or tied Stanford school records 18 times. He holds school records in the indoor 60 and 200, and the outdoor 100, 200, and 4x100 relay.

The fall of the 4x100 relay record marked the end of Stanford's oldest school record. In 1965, the team of Eric Frische, Dale Rubin, Bob McIntyre, and Larry Questad set the world record for the 440-yard relay of 39.7. That time, converted to an auto time equivalent of 39.61 for 400 meters, was broken after 58 years by John Kroeger, Olufemi Cole, Gabriel Navarro, and Onwuzurike, who ran 39.56 at the NCAA West Prelims.

Stanford's first track and field meet of the 2022–23 academic year came on Dec. 3, 2022, at the indoor Colyear-Danville Season Opener in Boston when Robinson won the 5,000 in 13:11.53 – the third-fastest indoor time in collegiate history. It also broke the Stanford absolute (indoors and outdoors) record and provided a glimpse of what Robinson would accomplish in 2023. The indoor season also featured Robinson leading four Cardinal to sub-4-minute miles at the UW Indoor Preview. Cole Sprout, Thomas Boyden, and John Lester followed suit.

At the Pac-12 Championships, the Cardinal men were third for its best finish in five years. Onwuzurike won the 200 and Kevin Yang the triple jump. Onwuzurike, Robinson, Yang, and Max McKhann, an indoor All-American in the weight throw, were named Academic All-Americans.

The Stanford women were fourth at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships and 20th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, and won two NCAA individual titles indoors.

Stanford's NCAA indoor championships came from the distance medley relay and by freshman Roisin Willis in the 800 meters. The DMR team of Melissa Tanaka, Maya Valmon, Roisin Willis, and Juliette Whittaker earned Stanford's first title in that event in 23 years. A day later, Willis and Whittaker finished 1-2 in the 800 to help Stanford to fourth place, its best place since 2006. Willis won in 1:59.93 and Whittaker second in 2:00.05. Those were the second- and fourth-fastest fastest times in collegiate indoor history. Both were part of a spectacular freshmen class that also included Alyssa Jones, who broke the American under-20 record in the long jump and the Pac-12 record while placing second at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Jones also placed fourth at the NCAA Indoor Championships while breaking the U.S. U20 indoor record.

Willis was named the West Region Women's Indoor Track Athlete of the Year and Whittaker was named Pac-12 Women's Freshman of the Year after winning the Pac-12 800 title. They combined with Tanaka and Valmon to win the Penn Relays DMR, earning Stanford's first victory at the meet since 2015. Stanford athletes broke or tied school records 14 times. The indoor season featured eight such performances and the outdoors six. Valmon twice broke the outdoor record in the 400.

The 4x100 relay team of Cydney Wright, Jones, Valmon, and Alexa Rossum entered the NCAA West Prelims as the No. 16 seed, but by running 43.69,

they placed third to advance to the NCAA Championships and broke a school record. It marked the first time that the women's 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams advanced to the NCAA Championships in the same year since 2004. Zofia Dudek broke the Polish indoor 5,000 record and then the Polish under-23 outdoor record for the same distance.

Stanford was fourth at the Pac-12 Championships for its best conference finish in four years. The Cardinal won two individual titles – Whittaker in the 800 and Jones in the long jump.

Stanford's combined NCAA team places in cross country, indoor track, and outdoor track put the Cardinal at No. 4 in the women's Program of the Year standings by the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association. Stanford had an individual conference outdoor champion for the 26th consecutive season, the longest active streak in the Pac-12, and had an NCAA outdoor 5,000 finalist for the 21st time in 22 seasons, including 13 consecutive.

The Cardinal established school records in eight different events (four indoor, four outdoor). There were 20 additions or improvements to the outdoor top-10 list and 23 to the indoor top-10 list.

Also of note were performances by Cardinal alumnae: Valarie Allman won silver in the discus and Mackenzie Little won bronze in the javelin at the World Championships, and Elise Cranny won the 5,000 and 10,000 at the U.S. Championships.

2023 was the year the Cardinal beach volleyball team continued to rewrite its history books.

With the program's first-ever win over UCLA and its first win at the NCAA Championships, Stanford carried on its longtime legacy of excellence in the 2023 season. The Cardinal ended its 2023 campaign with a 29-13 record, smashing its previous record of 24 wins (in a single season). 2023 is a year that the Cardinal continued its reign as one of the nation's top programs, shattering its previous records along the way.

The Cardinal handed two top-five programs losses late in the 2023 season, topping No. 5 LSU on its home courts and besting No. 1 UCLA at home during the 2023 Pac-12 Championship.

No. 10 Stanford had a spectacular first day of play at the Battle on the Bayou, upsetting No. 5 LSU 3-2 and topping North Florida 4-1 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Stanford's win over LSU is the program's first victory over a top-five ranked opponent this season and the Cardinal's first-ever win over the Tigers. Stanford's meeting with the Tigers was fierce from the start, with four of the five courts (and first two courts played) pushed to three sets to secure dual match points. Ashley Vincent and Kelly Belardi once again led the way with a three-set win on court four, but LSU quickly took a 2-1 lead with wins on courts five and three. Fifth-year Charlie Ekstrom and Maya Harvey tied the match back up at 2 with a gritty win on court two. Junior Xolani Hodel and senior Maddi Kriz clinched the dual victory, coming back from a first-set defeat to top the Tigers 18-21, 21-18, 15-11 on court one.

No. 8 Stanford earned its first-ever program dual-match win against No. 1 UCLA, upsetting the Bruins to move onto the winners bracket semifinals of the 2023 Pac-12 Championship. In the programs' fourth meeting of the season, the Cardinal edged out the Bruins with wins on courts one, three, and four. Freshman duo Kelly Belardi and Ashley Vincent topped the previously

undefeated (as a pair) fours pair of the Bruins in Stanford's lone straight-set victory of the day, topping UCLA's Jessie Smith and Marlie Monserez 21-19, 21-18.

The Cardinal's third consecutive trip to the NCAA Championships in Gulf Shores, Alabama, led the program to new heights, earning the team's first ever victory on the white sand beaches of the national championship tournament.

With the match on the line, Belardi and Vincent pulled off a come-from-behind three-set victory on court four to help No. 9 Stanford upset No. 6 GCU 3-2. The Cardinal topped No. 6 GCU for the second time in the 2023 campaign and ended the Lopes' season in the first round of the national championship tournament. Stanford's first match point came on court three, as AVCA Top Flight duo of juniors Emmy Sharp and Kate Reilly swept GCU's pair of Anaya Evans and Cami Sanchez 21-17, 21-17. After the Lopes quickly took a 2-1 dual match lead with wins on courts one and two, the newly minted pair of sophomore Taylor Wilson and freshman Daria Gusarova came back from a first-set defeat to tie the dual match up at 2-2 with a three-set victory over GCU's Dana Roskic and Jessica Drake. Belardi and Vincent clinched the win with their 28th win as a pair, bettering their own school record for wins in a single season as a duo. The pair handled immense pressure with the team's season on the line and held off a Lopes' duo who battled back multiple times in the third set, including tying the match up at 13-13.

The Cardinal finished its historic season the next day, falling 3-0 to No. 2 Texas Christian.

Head Coach Andrew Fuller also solidified his mark at the helm of the Cardinal during the 2023 season, earning his 100th win as the program's head coach on March 1, 2023.

In his 17th season at the helm of the program, the Birkhofer Family Head Men's Volleyball Coach John Kosty guided the Cardinal to a 15-13 overall record and a 6-6 mark in the MPSF (t-3rd).

For the first time in program history, Stanford advanced to the final of the MPSF Tournament in consecutive seasons, falling to eventual national champion UCLA at Maples Pavilion. Outside hitter Will Rottman and libero Justin Lui were named to the MPSF All-Tournament Team for a second straight year.

Rottman (second team) and Lui (honorable mention) were named AVCA All-Americans, while opposite Theo Snoey earned Freshman All-America recognition by Off the Block. The Cardinal finished the season ranked No. 9 in the AVCA poll.

Rottman was named an AVCA Second Team All-American in 2023, and is now the 21st multiple-time All-American in program history. He led the team in kills (323), aces (32), and points (374.5). Lui landed on the honorable mention list for a second straight year, pacing the MPSF with 2.10 digs per set - 12th nationally. The Cardinal now has 76 All-America awards all-time.

Outside hitter Kevin Lamp and Lui were selected to the All-MPSF second team, while middle blocker Nathaniel Gates and Rottman landed on the honorable mention list. Snoey was named to the MPSF All-Freshman Team. Stanford now has 113 all-conference selections all-time.

Rottman averaged 4.33 kills, 1.58 digs, 0.67 aces, and 5.29 points per set, scoring 32 percent of the team's points. Lui collected 1.67 digs and 0.75 assists per set.

Stanford, which earned one first-place vote, was picked to finish third in the MPSF by the league's coaches. UCLA, which received five first-place votes, was selected to win the MPSF, while Pepperdine collected the final first-place vote and was second.

Gates earned his second straight MPSF Defensive Player of the Week honor on April 10. Redshirt senior Justin Lui won three straight MPSF Defensive Player of the Week honors to start the season (Jan. 9, Jan. 16, and Jan. 23).

As a team, Stanford was third in the MPSF in digs per set (8.30), and fourth in hitting percentage (.298), kills per set (12.13), assists per set (11.47) and aces per set (1.24). The Cardinal was fifth as a team in blocks per set (1.93).

Head Coach John Kosty completed his 17th season at the helm of the Cardinal program and his 33rd overall on staff in 2023. He is now 246-211 in his career. He guided Stanford to the 2010 NCAA national championship and the 2014 NCAA finals. The Cardinal has produced a first team AVCA All-America selection in nine of the 17 seasons under Kosty. Stanford has appeared in the MPSF Tournament in 14 of Kosty's 17 seasons (missing out in 2007 and 2015. The tournament was canceled in 2020).

Stanford closed out the 2022 season with a 27-5 overall record and a 23rd conference championship with a 19-1 mark in the Pac-12. The Cardinal made its 41st NCAA postseason appearance in 42 seasons, advancing to its 16th regional final since the tournament expanded to 64 teams in 1998.

Stanford produced three AVCA All-Americans as opposite Kendall Kipp and setter Kami Miner earned first-team recognition, while libero Elena Oglivie landed on the honorable mention list. The Pac-12 Player of the Year and AVCA Pacific North Region Player of the Year, Kipp led the team with 4.51 kills on .319 hitting. Miner was tabbed the Pac-12 Setter of the Year, while Oglivie earned Pac-12 Libero of the Year honors.

Head Coach Kevin Hambly is now 142-33 (.811) in six seasons on The Farm, mentoring 12 AVCA All-Americans to 21 awards and five CSC Academic All-Americans. Hambly was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second time in 2022.

In four tournament matches in 2022, Stanford outthit its opponents .336 to .228. Opposite Kendall Kipp paced the team with 5.87 kills on .432 hitting, 1.07 blocks per set, and 6.47 points per set. Outside hitter Caitie Baird added 3.20 kills, 1.80 digs, and 0.33 aces per set. Miner dished out 12.53 assists per set, while Oglivie anchored the defense with 4.87 digs per set.

The Cardinal played 21 matches against the 2022 NCAA field, posting a 15-6 record. Stanford was 8-1 against Pac-12 teams in the tournament, and picked up nonconference wins over No. 2 seeds Minnesota and Nebraska, No. 3 seed Florida, No. 5 seed Houston, LSU, Pepperdine, and Tennessee State.

Stanford has won more NCAA titles (9), more NCAA Tournament matches (135), made more Final Four appearances (23), and been in the national

championship match (17) more times than any other program in the nation.

Stanford clinched its 20th Pac-12 title, and its 23rd conference championship overall in 2022. Stanford has won 11 of the last 17 Pac-12 championships. The Cardinal has finished in the top four in the Pac-12 in 36 of 37 seasons.

Selections of Kipp, Miner, and Oglivie bring Stanford's total AVCA All-America award count to 110 honors spread over 46 players. It is the second career recognition for Kipp, who earned a second-team nod in 2021. The Cardinal has produced multiple All-Americans in the same season in 17 of the past 18 seasons.

Led by Pacific North Region Player of the Year Kipp, five Cardinal were recognized by the AVCA with all-region honors. Joining Kipp on the all-region team were Baird, Miner, and Oglivie, while freshman Elia Rubin landed on the honorable mention list. Kevin Hambly was tabbed Pacific North Region Coach of the Year. Stanford now boasts 120 all-region selections all-time (including honorable mention).

Opposite Kendall Kipp was tabbed the 2022 Pac-12 Player of the Year. She is the 13th Cardinal player to earn the conference's highest honor, capturing Stanford's 17th Player of the Year award and first since Kathryn Plummer won back-to-back in 2017 and 2018.

Sophomore Kami Miner is the third Stanford player to be named Pac-12 Setter of the Year, collecting the seventh award overall as Madi Bugg won it from 2013-15 and Jenna Gray from 2017-19.

Opening his tenure as the Dunlevie Family Director of Men's Water Polo in 2022, Brian Flacks guided Stanford to a 17-0 start – the best for a first-year head coach in program history and the best for the Cardinal since the 2001 squad also went 17-0.

The 17-0 record to open the season surpassed Dante Dettamanti's 10-0 start in his first season at the helm of the program in 1977.

Stanford, which reached No. 1 in the national rankings, finished the season 22-5 overall to post the program's most wins since 2015, but ultimately missed the national tournament and its bid for a 12th national title.

In addition to the impressive start to the season, the Cardinal also won the MPSF Invite at home, including a victory over UCLA and the first of two against eventual national champion California, and advanced to the MPSF Championship game in postseason play.

Individually, Stanford featured a pair of All-Americans as Quinn Woodhead and Jackson Painter were both honored by the Association of Collegiate Water Polo Coaches (ACWPC). Woodhead was picked for the first team, while Painter earned a second-team nod, extending Stanford's ledger of multiple All-Americans to every season since 1975.

Finishing his career as a four-time All-American, Woodhead earned first-team honors for the first time, leading the Cardinal both in and out of the pool all fall. He ranked second on the team with 45 goals, playing all 27 games. His 15 multi-goal performances also ranked second on the squad. A force on both ends of the pool, his 15 field blocks were the most in the MPSF.

Painter's All-America honor was the first of his career after a dominating junior season. He led the entire MPSF with 67 goals, including 18 multi-goal

performances. His 99 points were the best in the league as he also added 32 recorded assists. His season-high of five goals came four different times, while he scored in 25 of Stanford's 27 contests.

Woodhead and Painter also headlined a group of five Stanford standouts on the All-MPSF team. Woodhead, selected for the fourth time in his career, landed on the first team, while Painter, Nolan Krutonog, and Larsen Weigle earned spots the second team. Rounding out the selections, Riley Pittman was listed as an honorable mention selection. With the five, Stanford has now placed at least four on the All-MPSF teams for seven years in a row.

Playing every second in goal for the Cardinal, Krutonog compiled an MPSF-best 240 saves while averaging 8.89 saves per game over his 27 contests to rank second in the conference. He also finished eighth in the MPSF in recorded steals with 25. Krutonog featured 13 double-digit save performances, including a season-best 15 stops on two occasions.

Pittman checked in with 33 goals for the Cardinal to rank sixth, featuring eight multi-goal performances. He had a season-high of three goals in five different games.

Weigle ranked eighth on the team with 27 goals this fall, playing in all 27 contests. The native of Atherton, California, featured six multi-goal performances, notching a hat trick in three different games.

Following the conclusion of his playing career on The Farm, Weigle was awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship for his academic and athletic achievements. NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners receive a one-time grant of \$10,000. In addition to maintaining at least a 3.2 grade point average, they must perform with distinction in their sport and be nominated by their institution's faculty athletics representative.

No. 1 Stanford (24-1, 5-1 MPSF) defeated USC 11-9 to secure its ninth NCAA title in school history and repeat for the first time since 2014-15. Appearing in its 12th NCAA final in 13 seasons, Stanford avenged its only loss and closed out another stellar campaign which included a second straight MPSF crown and its best start to a season (16-0) since 2011. The nation's only program to have participated at every NCAA Championship since the event's inception in 2001, Stanford's 16-game winning streak to open the season was its longest overall since 2014.

Stanford received multi-goal performances from four players and made several defensive stops down the stretch in the NCAA final.

Ryann Neushul and Jewel Roemer both contributed two goals and two assists, pacing a balanced offensive attack featuring seven different goal scorers. Maya Avital was sensational in goal, denying a penalty shot and making 11 saves, representing the seventh time this season she finished with at least 10 saves.

The Cardinal raced out to a 4-1 lead, highlighted by a pair of goals from Celeste Wijnbelt, who entered the game having scored eight all season. USC responded with three unanswered goals in the second quarter, holding Stanford scoreless to force a 4-4 tie at halftime.

Leading 6-5 with 3:24 remaining in the third period, Stanford received goals from Sophie Wallace and Neushul to move ahead 8-5 with eight minutes left. Wallace's second goal put Stanford into double digits but USC scored three times in a three-minute span, cutting the deficit to 10-9.

Ella Woodhead gave the Cardinal some breathing room with 50 seconds

remaining, finding the cage for her 10th goal of the season.

Stanford and USC have combined to win the last 13 NCAA titles, fueling a rivalry that dominates the sport.

However, the Cardinal has won six of the last eight meetings overall, with all of those victories clinching a tournament title (NCAA -2, MPSF - 2, Barbara Kalbus Invitational - 2). The Trojans have won the last four MPSF regular season tilts.

The Cardinal repeated as MPSF champions for the second time in school history (2000-01) and captured its seventh conference title overall, having also won the crown in 2003, 2006, and 2014.

Through 26 seasons, head coach John Tanner has compiled a 622-89 (.874) overall record while directing the Cardinal to 22 all-time NCAA appearances, nine NCAA titles (2002, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2017, 2019, 2022, 2023) and nine national runner-ups.

Named ACWPC Coach of the Year for the eighth time, Tanner picked up his 600th career victory in Stanford's 25-8 win over Fresno State on Jan. 28.

In its second season under the Matt Gentry Head Wrestling Coach Rob Koll, Stanford produced another All-American, the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year, and a conference champion.

Stanford was 6-7 overall and 2-3 in Pac-12 duals. The Cardinal was the runner-up at the Pac-12 Championships, held at Maples Pavilion. Freshman Daniel Cardenas (157) became the ninth Stanford rookie to win a conference title, bringing Stanford's total count to 38.

The Cardinal qualified six wrestlers to the NCAA Championships in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Joining Cardenas as automatic qualifiers were Jaden Abas (149), Shane Griffith (165), and Nick Stemmet (197), while Nico Provo (125) and Tyler Eischens (174) received at-large berths.

Griffith, a 2021 NCAA champion and two-time NCAA finalist, became just the third three-time NCAA All-American in program history. The Westwood, New Jersey, native placed fifth at 165 pounds and is now 14-3 in his career at the national tournament. He completed his time with the Cardinal with an 87-11 overall record.

Cardenas reached the Round of 12 in Tulsa and finished his freshman season 24-3 overall and 5-0 in duals. The Cardinal registered 18.0 team points, good for 26th overall at the NCAA Championships.

Team awards were unveiled at the Cardinal's annual banquet in April, and it was no surprise that Griffith took home the Vern Jones Most Outstanding Wrestler award for a fourth straight season. Cardenas secured the Newcomer Award.

The Most Improved Award went to Stemmet, who qualified for his second

NCAA Championships after a runner-up finish at the Pac-12 Championships. The junior was 21-11 overall and tallied four wins over ranked opponents.

Eischens was presented with the BAGUBA Award, given to the individual who best exemplifies what the coaches look for in a Stanford wrestler and how he represents the program. With a 22-10 record, Eischens made his third career appearance at the NCAA Championships coming off a second-place finish at the conference tournament. His career record stands at 69-34.

The Chris Horpel Coaches Award, given to the individual that made significant contributions to the well-being of the team in terms of attitude, improvement, or special leadership, was presented to Charlie Darracott. The junior was in and out of the starting lineup all season, finishing as the runner-up at the Menlo Open, Mountaineer Invitational, and Reno Tournament of Champions, and third at the Southern Scuffle.

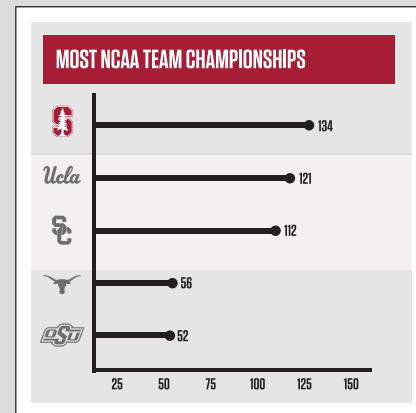
Junior Suhas Chundi took home Outstanding Scholar-Athlete honors for a second consecutive season, carrying a 3.90 cumulative GPA in computer science. Senior Luciano Arroyo was presented with the Ironman Award, exemplifying someone who comes into the training room every day with a great attitude and outlook on the process.

Thirteen wrestlers were recognized with the Tod Surmon Award for their outstanding performance in a dual. The winners were as follows: Abas (Cal Poly), Brook Byers (Arizona State), Cardenas (Oregon State), Darracott (California Baptist), Jackson DiSario (CSU Bakersfield), Eischens (Rutgers), Hunter Garvin (Penn), Griffith (Lindenwood), Peter Ming (Little Rock), Jason Miranda (North Dakota State), Provo (Oklahoma State), Stemmet (Virginia Tech), and Tony Williams (Menlo).

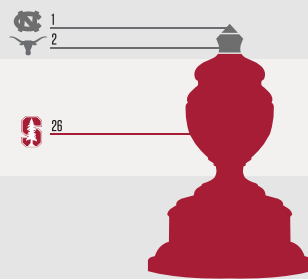

DIRECTORS' CUP AWARDS

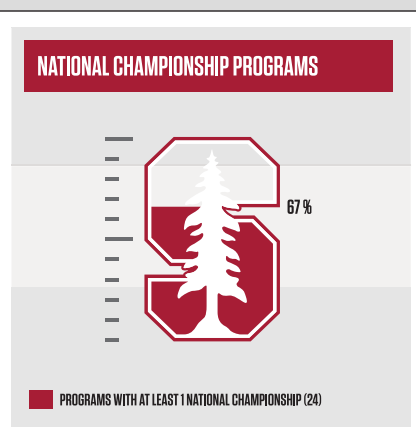


▶ DECADES OF DOMINANCE

The Learfield Directors' Cup is awarded to the nation's top overall athletics department, with points awarded based on each institution's finish in NCAA Championships. Stanford has won 26 Directors' Cup awards, with the next-highest institution earning two. In addition, Stanford has captured 10 Capital One Cup trophies, which recognizes one men's and one women's winner annually, and is calculated by formula placing greater emphasis on higher profile sports.

▶ BROAD-BASED NATIONAL EXCELLENCE

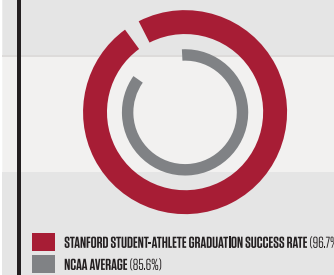

GRAD. SUCCESS RATES (AVG. LAST 10 YEARS)



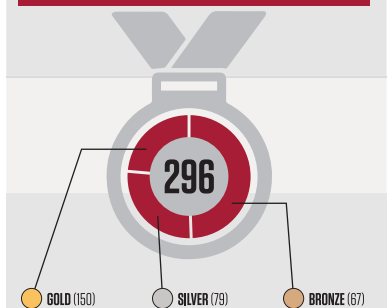
▶ CARDINAL IN THE CLASSROOM

Stanford boasts an average Graduation Success Rate (GSR) among Cardinal student-athletes of 96. The Cardinal's GSR has never fallen below 93, and Stanford has led the Pac-12 in overall GSR for each of the 17 years that the statistic has been calculated. Stanford leads the nation in NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships (189), which are awarded to students who demonstrate performance in athletics, academics, and community service, and 13 Cardinal student-athletes have been awarded Rhodes Scholarships.

▶ FROM THE FARM TO THE OLYMPICS

Stanford sent more Team USA Olympians to the Tokyo 2020 Olympics than any other institution. Since 1912, Stanford has had an affiliate who has medaled in each summer Olympics that Team USA has competed in. The record for most medals won in a single Olympics by a Stanford affiliate is five by swimmer Katie Ledecky (2016), who also captured four in 2020. Swimmer Jenny Thompson leads the way among Cardinal medalists with 12 total medals earned.

▶ INDIVIDUAL ACCOLADES
