**The Opening Tip**

Making its second appearance of the season at New York's Madison Square Garden, Stanford (24-11, 10-8 Pac-12) squares off against Massachusetts (25-11, 9-7 Atlantic 10) on Tuesday night in the semifinals of the Postseason NIT. The Cardinal is searching for its second NIT championship in school history after capturing the hardware in 1991. With four wins in its last five games, Stanford is playing some of its best basketball of the year.

In just his first three seasons as a head coach at any level, Johnny Dawkins continues to make an impact on one of college basketball's most accomplished programs.

Dawkins' contributions since arriving on The Farm have come in the form of both team and individual successes. One year after leading Stanford to a 20-win season for the 20th time in school history, Dawkins oversaw Landry Fields' progression from key reserve to all-league performer and eventual NBA Draft pick.

Dawkins has also made noticeable strides off the court, as evidenced by the addition of a top-20 recruiting class two years ago and last season's signing of Gatorade Illinois Player of the Year Chasson Randle.

The Cardinal wrapped up the 2010-11 season at 15-16. Fielding a team without a senior for the first time in school history, Dawkins put his rookies in a position to excel, with Anthony Brown and Dwight Powell earning Pac-10 All-Freshman Team honors. In fact, Stanford was represented with four all-league picks.

Stanford finished 14-18 during the 2009-10 campaign in Dawkins' second season at the helm. Working with a roster that featured only seven true scholarship players, two returning starters and six walk-ons, the Cardinal reached the Pac-10 Tournament semifinals.

Under Dawkins' guidance, Fields produced one of the most memorable seasons in school history, earning All-Pac-10 First Team honors after leading the conference in scoring, minutes played, 20-point games and double-doubles while finishing second in rebounding. He was chosen in the second round of the 2010 NBA Draft, as the 39th overall pick by the New York Knicks to become Stanford's 31st NBA/ABA Draft choice and first since Brook Lopez and Robin Lopez in 2008.

During his rookie season in 2008-09, Dawkins directed Stanford to a 20-14 record and reached the CBI semifinals, extending the program's lengthy streaks of consecutive winning seasons (16) and postseason appearances (16). In addition to surpassing Robert Burnett as the winningest first-year head coach in school history, Dawkins ranked third in victories among the 21 first-year head coaches in Division I with no prior college head coaching experience.

Dawkins, 48, became Stanford's 17th head coach on Apr. 28, 2009, after completing 11 years as a member of the Duke coaching staff. For the previous nine seasons (2000-08), Dawkins served as Duke's associate head coach and began his coaching career as an assistant in 1998-99. During Dawkins' 11 years as a coach at Duke, the Blue Devils won a national championship in 2001, six ACC regular season championships and seven ACC Tournament titles.

Dawkins finished his career in 1986 as the school's all-time leading scorer. Dawkins was a two-time first team All-ACC performer in 1985 and 1986 as well as the school's first consensus two-time, first team All-American. During his senior year, he was tabbed ACC Tournament MVP while also becoming the first Naismith Player of the Year recipient in school history.

**Stanford Against The 2012 Postseason Fields**

- Of the 32 teams selected for the NIT, Stanford faced three teams and compiled an 0-4 record (0-2 vs. Oregon, 0-1 vs. Arizona and 0-1 vs. Washington). Since the bracket was announced, the Cardinal has defeated Cleveland State, Illinois State and Nevada.
- Of the 68 teams selected for the NCAA Tournament, Stanford faced five teams and compiled a 5-3 record (2-0 vs. Colorado, 1-0 vs. NC State, 1-0 vs. Colorado State, 1-2 vs. California, 0-1 vs. Syracuse).
- Of the 16 teams selected for the CBI, Stanford faced three teams and compiled a 2-2 record (2-0 vs. Oregon State, 0-1 vs. Washington State, 0-1 vs. Butler).
- Of the 32 teams selected for the CIT, Stanford did not play any of the participating teams.

**Scouting Massachusetts**

- Massachusetts (25-11, 9-7 Atlantic 10) won all three of its Postseason NIT games on the road, joining Fresno State (1998), Detroit (2001) and Georgetown (2003) as the fourth school to accomplish the feat since host sites were introduced in 1977.
- The Minutemen erased a 17-point deficit in their most recent contest, rallying to defeat Drexel 72-70 after trailing 53-36 with 16:26 left to play.
- Massachusetts is making its 19th postseason appearance and 11th in the Postseason NIT. The Minutemen are 13-12 all-time in NIT play, reaching the semifinals in 1991 and 2008.
- Massachusetts was picked 12th in the Atlantic 10 preseason poll, finishing in a four-way tie for fifth place at 9-7.
- The Minutemen average 77.3 points and 39.3 rebounds per game while shooting 43.7 percent overall. Opponents are averaging 72.4 points and 38.8 rebounds per game.
- Be sure to watch: Chaz Williams (16.9 ppg, 4.4 rpg, 228 assists, 78.7 percent free throws), Raphael Putney (10.2 ppg, 5.9 rpg, 50 blocks), Sean Carter (8.1 ppg, 6.5 rpg, 37 blocks).

**Stanford All-Time vs. Massachusetts**

The series is tied at 2-2, with three of those four meetings taking place in the postseason. The Minutemen have won the last two matchups, eliminating Stanford in the second round of the NCAA Tournament in both 1996 (79-74) and 1995 (75-53). Stanford's most recent win in the series came back on March 25, 1991, defeating UMass 73-71 in the semifinals of the Postseason NIT at Madison Square Garden. The Cardinal also defeated the Minutemen 57-51 on Dec. 29, 1987, at the West Palm Hurricane Classic at West Palm Beach, Fla.

**Stanford-Massachusetts Common Opponents**

Stanford and Massachusetts share one common opponent (Utah). The Cardinal split its regular season series with the Utes, prevailing 68-65 at Maples Pavilion before suffering a 58-57 defeat the next month in Salt Lake City. UMass defeated Utah 89-75 in November at the Battle 4 Atlantis in Paradise Island, Bahamas, despite the Utes shooting 60.0 percent.

**MSG and NYC: Been There, Done That**

Stanford is just the fourth team to play at New York's Madison Square Garden in both the Preseason and Postseason NIT during the same season.

## Stanford All-Time In The Postseason

Stanford is now 33-20 all-time in 23 postseason appearances, including a 10-4 record in six NIT appearances. The Cardinal is also 21-15 in NCAA Tournament play (16 appearances) and 2-1 in CBI competition (1 appearance).

## 21 Years Ago: Stanford Captures 1991 NIT Championship

Stanford claimed the 1991 Postseason NIT championship thanks to an unlikely run that ended with a 78-72 victory over Oklahoma in the title game. It was the second national championship in program history, as the Cardinal also captured the 1942 NCAA crown. During its 1991 run, the Cardinal won four of its five games away from home and defeated Oklahoma for the title.

## The Cardinal All-Time At MSG

Stanford is making its eighth appearance at Madison Square Garden. This will be Stanford's second Postseason NIT appearance (1991) at the famed arena. Stanford is 9-4 all-time at MSG.

- **On Dec. 30, 1936**, at the third of four versions of The Garden, Stanford defeated Long Island 45-31 in one of the most famous games in school history. Displaying his innovative one-handed shot, Hank Luisetti poured in 15 points to help the Indians snap Long Island's 44-game winning streak and enlighten the crowd in a new brand of basketball. As reported by *The New York Daily Mirror*: "Hank Luisetti ... is perhaps the best college player ever to set foot on the Garden court. His sharpshooting on a strange floor was astounding, but it was his general floor play that electrified the crowd. The fans gave him and each of the Stanford regulars an ovation as they left the floor."
- **On March 27, 1991**, Stanford and Oklahoma faced off before nearly 9,000 fans at Madison Square Garden with the Cardinal prevailing 78-72. The Sooners led 39-35 at halftime, but the Cardinal then stormed back to take the lead with 12:38 left in the second half. Kenny Ammann knocked down five three-pointers en route to a team-high 22 points. Fellow starters Andrew Vlahov added 14, Deshon Wingate and John Patrick chipped in with 13 each and Adam Keefe contributed 12 points. Keefe was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

## Pregame Jitters? We'll Just Ask Landry...

The thought of playing in an environment like Madison Square Garden might seem intimidating to most, but former Stanford standout Landry Fields adjusted quickly last year during his rookie campaign with the New York Knicks. With Spike Lee regularly sporting his jersey from courtside, Fields started a team-best 81 games while averaging 9.7 points and 6.4 rebounds per game during the regular season. Selected as the 39th overall pick in the second round of the 2010 NBA Draft, Fields earned a spot on the NBA's All-Rookie First Team. Producing one of the most memorable seasons in school history, Fields led the Pac-10 in scoring at 22.0 points per game and finished with 704 points for the third-best single-season total during his senior year.

## Season Snapshot In 100 Words

Head coach Johnny Dawkins has led Stanford to its first 20-win season since a 20-14 finish during his rookie year in 2008-09. Stanford's 24 victories are the most since a 28-8 finish four years ago when the Cardinal reached the NCAA Sweet 16. Stanford was the only Pac-12 school with three victories against teams ranked among the RPI's top-50 (Colorado State, California and NC State). Stanford also swept the regular season series (convincingly) against Pac-12 Tournament champion Colorado, winning 84-64 at home and 74-50 in Boulder. The Cardinal placed seventh in the Pac-12 at 10-8, its first winning record in league play since 2008.

## Preseason NIT Runner-Up Finish Fuels Hot Start

Stanford fell just short of upsetting then-No. 5/5 Syracuse on Nov. 25 in the championship game of the Dick's Sporting Goods NIT Season Tip-Off in a 69-63 defeat. Leading 25-24 at halftime and 55-47 with 6:47 left in the game, Stanford was poised to take down its highest-ranked opponent since a 75-68 home win over No. 3/2 UCLA on Jan. 28, 2007. But Syracuse closed the game on a 15-3 run to escape. Stanford won its first three Preseason NIT contests by double digits, knocking down a season-high nine three-pointers in an 82-67 semifinal win over Oklahoma State following West Regional victories over Fresno State and Colorado State.

## Stanford's Path To NYC

Seeded No. 3 in its region, Stanford defeated Cleveland State 76-65 to open tournament play. After top-seeded Arizona and second-seeded Mississippi were upset in the first round, the Cardinal was assured of home-court advantage for its remaining games.

### Stanford 76, Cleveland State 65 (March 13 at Stanford, CA)

- Anthony Brown notched the second double-double of his career, tallying 15 points and a career-high 12 rebounds. Stanford is 10-1 this year when Brown scores in double figures.
- Aaron Bright scored all of his game-high 17 points in the second half, making 8-10 free throw tries.
- Stanford shot 49.0 percent overall while limiting Cleveland State to 37.3 percent shooting.
- The Cardinal made 24-39 from the charity stripe, compared a 7-13 mark for the Vikings.
- Cleveland State dominated the boards, holding a 23-8 advantage at one point and finishing with a 44-32 edge. It was the biggest rebounding margin for a non-conference opponent since Dec. 23, 2008, when Santa Clara outrebounded Stanford 43-27.

### Stanford 92, Illinois State 88 - OT (March 19 at Stanford, CA)

- Chasson Randle knocked down a three-pointer with just over a minute remaining in overtime to put Stanford in front for good in a 92-88 overtime win over Illinois State.
- Aaron Bright enjoyed his best collegiate game, pouring in a career-high 29 points on 11-13 shooting while making 6-7 from beyond the arc. He also dished out six assists in 35 minutes.
- Dwight Powell scored a season-high 18 points on 8-11 shooting to go along with nine boards.
- The victory was No. 1,400 in the 97-year history of the Stanford basketball program.
- The game featured nine ties and 17 lead changes. Illinois State led 71-60 with 9:01 remaining in regulation before Stanford answered with a 14-3 run to tie the game at 74-74 with 5:14 left to play.

### Stanford 84, Nevada 56 (March 21 at Stanford, CA)

- Stanford notched its school-record 17th home win. The previous best was a 16-1 mark in 2007-08.
- Stanford shot 53.4 percent overall, including a blistering 65.4 percent in the first half.
- Josh Huestis scored in double figures (12 points) for the first time since Jan. 14, when he poured in 13 points against Colorado. Huestis also added a team-high seven rebounds in the victory.
- Stanford owned a 33-13 edge in bench scoring and coasted to a 42-27 halftime lead.
- Stanford outrebounded its opponent for the first time in four games, overtaking Nevada 35-30.

## Randle Making An Impact In Rookie Season

Chasson Randle continues to rewrite Stanford's freshman record book. Randle is averaging a team-best 13.9 points per game while shooting 43.6 percent from the field and 43.8 percent from three-point territory. He also has been solid from the free throw line (76.4 percent). So how does Randle's debut season stack up among the best in school history? Very good...

## Owens Performing At High Level

Josh Owens is enjoying the best season of his career, ranking second on the club in scoring (11.7 ppg) and first in rebounding (5.7 rpg) while starting all 34 games. Active at both ends of the floor, Owens also leads the team in steals (41) and ranks second in blocks (24). Owens surpassed the 1,000-point mark for his career in a 92-88 overtime victory over Illinois State on March 19 and now stands at 1,021. He is the 40th player in school history to reach the prestigious scoring mark. Even more impressive, Owens is the 21st player in school history to compile at least 1,000 points and 500 rebounds in his career.

## 70 A Key Number For Stanford

Stanford improved to 18-1 when scoring at least 70 points in a game this year. The Cardinal is now 28-3 combined over the last two years when reaching the 70-point plateau.

## Lineups Based On Matchups

Head coach Johnny Dawkins employed his 15th different starting lineup on March 4 against Cal. Ten different players have received at least one starting nod this year. Meanwhile, Dawkins had used 13 different starting lineups over the previous two seasons combined.

## Winning The Rebound Battle

Stanford has owned a strong edge on the glass, averaging 36.7 rebounds per game compared to its opponents' 32.2 clip. Stanford's rebounding margin (+4.4) ranks 43rd in the country. Five different players are averaging at least 3.0 rebounds, led by Josh Owens' 5.7 clip.

## Balanced Scoring A Trademark

Jarrett Mann became the 12th player to register a double-digit scoring effort with his season-high 10-point outing against Arizona State on March 7 in the Pac-12 Tournament. That surpasses last year's total when 10 players reached double digits in scoring at least once.

## Owens, Randle, Huestis Represented Among All-Pac-12 Selections

Josh Owens was named to the All-Pac-12 Team, earning Second Team accolades to highlight Stanford's award winners. Chasson Randle was honored as one of five picks for the All-Freshmen Team, while Josh Huestis nabbed Honorable Mention status as a member of the All-Defensive Team. Owens' selection as an all-conference pick is the second of his career, as he also earned Honorable Mention status last year. Randle is the fourth player to earn All-Freshman Team status during head coach Johnny Dawkins' tenure after a six-year period in which only two Cardinal rookies were honored.

## Two Of The Pac-12's Most Improved Players

Stanford's improvement can be traced to the development of sophomores Aaron Bright and Josh Huestis. Bright's 127 assists and 3.6 assists per game lead the team. Huestis leads the team with 40 blocked shots. It's a modest total, yet still ranks as the most swats by any Cardinal player since Robin Lopez (83) and Brook Lopez (56) in 2008.

**Stanford Whips Nevada To Reach NIT Semifinals**

Thanksgiving in New York followed by spring break in the City That Never Sleeps.

That's Stanford's past and future travel itinerary after the Cardinal dusted Nevada 84-56 in a third-round NIT game Wednesday night at Maples Pavilion.

In the Preseason NIT, Stanford beat Oklahoma State 82-67 in the semifinals and lost 69-63 to Syracuse in New York in late November.

In the postseason version, the Cardinal (24-11) will face Massachusetts in one semifinal at Madison Square Garden on Tuesday. The other semi matches Washington against Minnesota.

Against the Wolf Pack (28-7), Stanford did not trail, shot 17-for-26 (65.4 percent) from the floor in the first half and led by as many as 32 in the second half.

"I think we were about as efficient as we've been all year on both ends of the floor," Stanford head coach Johnny Dawkins said. "I'm just really proud of our guys, especially our seniors."

One of those seniors, center Josh Owens, scored 15 points, tying Stanford freshman guard Chasson Randle for game-high honors. An indication of how balanced the Cardinal's offense was: Seven men scored at least eight points.

"When everybody's playing well," Owens said, "the game's always fun. It comes easy, and that's how it was today."

Said forward Josh Huestis: "We're just playing our best basketball right now."

Stanford is 5-1 in March, the lone loss a 77-71 decision to Cal in the Pac-12 tournament. The Cardinal improved to 17-3 at Maples, setting a record for home wins in a season. The 2007-08 team went 16-1.

One neat part of Wednesday's victory: It enables assistant coach Dick Davey to finish his career in New York. Davey, a longtime Santa Clara head and assistant coach, announced his retirement early this month, effective at the end of the season.

Dawkins said trying to send Davey out on a high note is "always in the back of our minds."

Said Dawkins: "As a team and a staff, we talked about making sure that we honor him, and we honor him by just winning and going out the right way. That's what we're trying to do. I think every player will acknowledge that."

Briefly: The NIT final is a week from today. ... Nevada won its other two games against Pac-12 schools this season, defeating Washington and Arizona State in early December.



**Randle Leads Stanford To Rout Of Arizona State**

Taking a page out of the Kobe playbook on Bryant's home court, Chasson Randle couldn't be guarded in the first half Wednesday night.

The freshman guard's 27-point burst - a record for a half in the Pac-12 tournament - sent seventh-seeded Stanford on its way to an 85-65 victory over 10th-seeded Arizona State in a first-round game at Staples Center.

Randle finished with 30 points, the most a Stanford player has scored since Josh Owens pinned 31 on Oregon late last season. Randle sank just a three-pointer in the second half and played only 28 minutes, but that was plenty from ASU's point of view.

ASU head coach Herb Sendek called it "a tremendous performance by a fantastic young player."

"He had one of those nights he'll remember for a long time," Stanford head coach Johnny Dawkins said.

As their reward, the Cardinal get a rubber match with Cal tonight. Stanford lost 69-59 to Cal in Berkeley in January but beat the Bears 75-70 at Maples Pavilion on Sunday.

Randle entered the evening averaging 13.1 points, but over the last four games, he has averaged 21.5 points. Against ASU (10-21), he hit 7 of 11 shots, going 6-for-8 from beyond the arc. He went 10-for-12 at the line.

He said he had no idea of how many points he had until the game was over. "I was just focusing on trying to complete plays," he said.

In the first half, he hit five three-pointers in six tries, and Aaron Bright came off the bench to sink three in five attempts. Stanford's nine threes left the Sun Devils demoralized three nights after their season peaked with an upset of Arizona.

"We didn't come out ready to play," said ASU guard Trent Lockett, who was held to six points. "They're a physical and aggressive team. They put us on our heels. We picked it up in the second half, but it was far too late."

Try as they might, the Devils couldn't handle Randle. "It was an incredible moment, his first half," Dawkins said. "I thought his teammates were terrific. They did a great job of finding him. He had it going, and they delivered the ball to him."

Randle's outburst broke the tournament-record 25-point half that Washington State's Klay Thompson, now with the Warriors, enjoyed against Washington last year.

Bright chipped in 11 points and five assists. All 15 Stanford players joined in the action.

**A Dick Davey Coaching Legacy**

Stanford associate head coach Dick Davey has built a reputation as a hard-working, effort-demanding, fundamentals-first basketball coach. For nearly four decades as a college assistant and head coach in the Bay Area, he labored to find players on the recruiting trail, challenged them to become better and remained loyal to them long after their playing days ended.

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There is, of course, the oft-told story of Steve Nash, the former Santa Clara star who parlayed his Santa Clara basketball days under Davey into a now 16-year NBA basketball career so successful that Nash has twice been named the league's most valuable player.

Davey's blue-collar coaching style made its imprint on Nash before, during and after Nash's days on the Santa Clara campus--all to Nash's ultimate and long-term benefit.

As Nash was becoming a very good--but by his own admission, not great--high school basketball player in British Columbia in the early 1990s, he was simultaneously suffering from a general recruiting prejudice that there weren't any Division I quality guards in western Canada. Nobody went to see Nash play high school ball, nor did anyone ask to see his game tapes.

Except Davey.

Then a Santa Clara assistant, Davey was not so proud or lazy as to fail to follow up on a tip about a good-student, good-skill guard prospect from a relatively remote part of Canada. Davey liked what he saw and took a chance on Steve Nash the Canadian unknown, when no one else seemed to be interested.

Davey was brutally honest with Nash at the start of Nash's Santa Clara career, telling him his defense was lousy and that his work ethic had to improve. Davey knew Nash's shooting, passing and leadership abilities had great potential, but to make Nash better Davey harped on Nash's deficient skill areas until they got better.

Nash got the tough-love message and worked hard. The rest of the Steve Nash story is, of course, the stuff of legend.

For the Santa Clara program, the payoff was two trips to the NCAA Tournament during the Nash years, including an upset of second-seeded Arizona in the 1993 NCAA Tournament. For Nash personally, the benefit was two-fold: the windfall of being a high first round selection in the 1996 NBA Draft (by Phoenix) and, within 10 years, the honor of being awarded two NBA regular season MVP trophies.

Davey's investment in and loyalty to Nash has been rewarded many times over. During Davey's 15 years as Santa Clara's head coach, Nash said yes to all manner of speaking and appearance requests by Santa Clara. Even now as a Stanford associate head coach, Davey could be seen on the Cardinal's road trips sneaking a meal with Nash whenever Nash's NBA playing schedule coincided with wherever Stanford was playing.

The Nash story is but one of dozens of examples of loyalty given and loyalty returned, in the rich history of Davey's coach-player relationships.

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With Davey, it isn't just the Steve Nash-type players that have received special coaching effort and loyalty. It also has been given to players who never came close to having a professional career. Two examples are former Santa Clara guards Brody Angley and Terry Davis.

Angley, a 5-11 point guard who entered Santa Clara as a freshman in 2004, was a better high school football player than he was a basketball player. But Davey saw something intangible in his new freshman player and immediately installed Angley as his starting point guard.

Result? In his first month of college play, Angley led Santa Clara to one of its most memorable wins ever, an upset of No. 1-ranked North Carolina at a sold-out Oracle Arena in Oakland.

Angley clearly benefitted from Davey's tough-but-compassionate coaching style. Despite his relative lack of speed and size, Angley learned to play with aggressiveness and smarts, and eventually became a highly-productive four-year starter for the Broncos. Angley was, clearly, the beneficiary of Davey's considerable coaching intuition and motivational skills.

But it was Davey's off-the-court skill and labor that benefitted Angley even more.

Angley's father, Jamie, died of cancer in 2007, and the Angley family was immediately confronted with significant financial hardship. Following Brody's graduation in May of 2008, Davey organized a charity golf tournament for the benefit of the Angley family in Redding, Calif. Dozens of Santa Clara program participants, including Davey, took a four-hour bus ride each way to participate in the June 2008 event, and thousands of dollars were raised to assist the Angley family.

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A third very public example of Davey's loyalty to his players--this one a generation earlier--is former Bronco guard Terry Davis.

Under then-assistant Davey's tutelage, Davis rose from the Bronco bench to become a part-time starter his senior year in 1984, a year in which the Broncos won 22 games and advanced to the Postseason NIT Tournament quarterfinals. Not surprisingly, Davis thanked Davey several years later for his loyalty by asking the coach to be an usher in Davis' 1990 wedding.

Problem: the Davis wedding was scheduled on the same day, and nearly at the same hour, as the start of a Santa Clara-Stanford basketball game.

Stanford fans may not remember the night of Dec. 15, 1990, when the Broncos and the Cardinal played a basketball game. Neither the Cardinal nor the Broncos provided any memorable moments that night. What was memorable was Davey's individual effort that evening, just to get to the game.

Davey was not going to say no to an invitation to serve in his former Bronco player's wedding. Yet neither was Davey going to miss coaching his current Bronco players in the Santa Clara-Stanford game.

How was Davey able to serve both his former player on his wedding day and his current players on game day? Answer: with his usual tirelessness--and with some unusual attire.

Davey prepared for the game in his usual indefatigable way, completing scouting report review, walk-through and shoot-round activities. Davey then hustled off to, and served in, Davis's wedding. And then Davey sped back to Maples Pavilion to coach the game. Without changing his clothes!

Yes, Davey coached the 1990 Santa Clara-Stanford game in tails, still decked out in his wedding-usher tuxedo!

Steve Nash, Brody Angley, Terry Davis. Just three of the countless "tales" of Dick Davey helping his student athletes both during college days and beyond.

**Senior Day Victory Spoils Cal's Chances For Title**

Given the chance to win a share of its second Pac-12 Conference title in three years, the Cal men's basketball team didn't look the part Sunday.

"We haven't acted like a team that was in first place the last two weeks," Cal coach Mike Montgomery said after rival Stanford celebrated a 75-70 victory at Maples Pavilion.

As a result, Washington retained the outright Pac-12 title, and Cal (23-8, 13-5) was relegated to a second-place tie with Oregon. Stanford (20-10, 10-8) completed its first winning conference season in four years under coach Johnny Dawkins.

The teams could meet again as soon as Thursday at the Pac-12 tournament in Los Angeles. As the No. 2 seed, the Bears get a bye into the quarterfinals. No. 7 Stanford will face No. 10 Arizona State on Wednesday, with the winner advancing to face Cal.

Stanford's Aaron Bright made three free throws -- the latter two following offensive rebounds of his misses -- in the final 42 seconds to secure the win over Cal.

Dawkins was pleased his team found a way to close the deal against a league contender. Stanford was 0-5 previously against the Pac-12's top four clubs.

"This is the first time I felt we really took a step," he said. "Now I think they realize how good we can be."

Senior Andrew Zimmerman agreed, saying, "It takes beating the better teams to believe we belong in that category. We're playing with nothing to lose."

By contrast, the Bears looked like a team playing not to lose. They were tight, out of sync on offense and unable to stop Stanford freshman guard Chasson Randle, who scored 17 points.

Senior Harper Kamp said the Bears, who have lost two games in a row for the first time all season, need to figure out what has gone wrong.

"We played really soft. Not a single one of us was ready to play," Kamp said. "I don't know why we're not ourselves right now, but we're not. So we've got to find a way."

Bigger and deeper, Stanford came out aggressively, pushing the Bears around and building a lead that reached 15 points late in the first half. Cal rallied to within two points with 1:11 left in the game but played with little poise and precision.

"We looked nervous. We played nervous," Montgomery said. "At the end of the game with three opportunities to tie, we miss (four) free throws, fumble it out of bounds, fail to block out twice.

"If we make those plays, the pressure shifts a little bit. We weren't able to make those plays."

No one is struggling more than Jorge Gutierrez. The Bears' senior guard, who could be announced Monday as the Pac-12 Player of the Year, had three fouls in the first half, the last of them on an unsportsmanlike technical foul with 5:26 left.

Scoreless a week ago Sunday in the Bears' loss at Colorado, Gutierrez finished with eight points and four turnovers. But it isn't so much the points Gutierrez provides the Bears as it is the toughness and leadership. Right now, nothing's working for him.

"He's just really fighting demons right now," Montgomery said. "He's not able to get much done. He's frustrated. We need Jorge."

Zimmerman, who scored 13 points, said the Cardinal will be loose and confident in Los Angeles.

"We know we have to win the tournament" to earn an NCAA tournament bid, he said.

Cal, which got 20 points from Allen Crabbe and 19 from Kamp, appears to be on solid ground to secure an NCAA at-large bid. But Kamp said the Bears should understand nothing is guaranteed.

"Right now, our new season is the Pac-12 tournament," he said. "That should be our focus."

**Senior Q&A With Josh Owens**

**The Bootleg:** Tell me a little bit about your prep school days. What was that decision like to move from Kennesaw to New Hampshire for your high school years?

**Josh Owens:** Really, it was a little bit of a personal decision. I was actually born in New Hampshire, and my parents always knew about Phillips-Exeter Academy, knew it was a great school. And as I got older, they told me about it and I'd always been an independent, adventurous type of guy. And I said "hey, it sounds like a great place. I'll try it out; hopefully get a whole lot of financial aid." It's the only prep school I applied to - got in, got all the financial aid, and the rest is history.

**TB:** You started out your career playing behind the Lopez twins. What were those practices like for you, and what did you learn from them?

**JO:** I would say that those practices and that whole year was a blessing. Playing behind two future NBA starters and centers was definitely a learning experience. A change of pace from playing in high school and knowing what it takes and how good people are at this level.

**TB:** Your freshman year was the last time Stanford has made the Big Dance. What was it like going through that experience as a freshman, having the dunk against Cornell in the first round, beating Marquette in dramatic fashion, and going to the Sweet 16?

**JO:** (smiling) That was an experience in itself. Like I said, the whole year was a learning experience, but when we got to the point of making it to the tournament, that's when I started to realize what it took, being a part of such a great team like that, not necessarily playing a whole bunch, you realize what it takes as a team to make it that far.

**TB:** How much were you able to appreciate it?

**JO:** (still smiling) I appreciated it a whole bunch even though I wasn't playing a whole bunch. I knew it was something special to go to the tournament. When I was younger watching the tournament, I always knew it was something special, and it was great.

**TB:** You had to sit out a year with that undisclosed medical condition. What was it like for you having to watch from the sidelines?

**JO:** That was probably the toughest year definitely basketball-wise of my life up to this point. But I definitely think it was a blessing in disguise. Sitting out gives you definitely a deeper appreciation of the game. But it gave me a chance to go out and support my teammates full-fledged as much as I could and just keeping hope and praying that I would be back on the court soon.

**TB:** Did the thought creep into your head that you may not be able to play basketball again?

**JO:** Early on when everything was up in the air and I didn't really know what was going on as much; of course, that's something that could be in the back of your head. But I treated every day as if I was going to be back on the court at some point, so I kept working out on my own, doing skill development and basketball stuff on my own, just in case I got the word that "hey, you can go back on that court" that I'd be ready.

**TB:** What was going through your head when you got the news that you could play ball again?

**JO:** (back to smiling) When I got the news, it was great after waiting so long. It was just great to hear. It was nice just to know that having faith and sticking to it paid off. And just being ready for that moment.

**TB:** On the court, you're known for your athleticism and monster dunks. For us mere mortals, what goes through your mind and what's it like to have those throw downs like you had against Arizona State and USC this year?

**JO:** It's funny because...When I was younger when I got a dunk, I'd get really hyped and I'd get really excited. Now I'll get a dunk and a lot of times I'll be like, oh, it's just two points. And whether it's during a timeout or whether it's after the game or the next day in practice, one of my teammates would say "man, that dunk was so crazy! You got all in this guy's face!" And a lot of times I'm like, "oh, I did?" (laughs) I don't really notice it when I'm up there; I just consider it another play.

**TB:** You're also one of the most effective scorers on the block in the conference. Your left shoulder has always been pretty killer, but this past year or so you've added that spin off the right shoulder. What did you do to improve your repertoire offensively?

**JO:** Just always looking for ways to get better. Working with Coach Davey for the last four years now, he's been great. He's a great teacher of the game; he has spent a lot of time teaching it - 30-plus years or so. I've always looked to him for guidance and he has always been great and telling me ways to diversify my game.

**TB:** Once your Cardinal career is finished, where are you thinking of playing professionally, or is pro hoop even on your list?

**JO:** I'd love to play pro basketball. Obviously, the NBA is a dream, playing here in the states. But if that doesn't work out, I wouldn't mind doing a bit of travelling for a few years. But after sitting out that year made me realize how much I definitely love the game. I definitely knew at that point that I wanted to play as long as I could because it could be taken away at any point.

**TB:** Once your playing career is finished, what do you see yourself doing?

**JO:** Possibly coming back here to do business school.

**TB:** The Mark Madsen path?

**JO:** Yeah, maybe the Mark Madsen path. He has been a great friend, getting to know him a little better these last couple of years. So yeah, I think that's a possibility, but who knows what will happen.



**Hard-Working Zimmermann A Hair Above The Rest**

The first thing people notice about Andrew Zimmermann, aside from his 6-foot-8, 230-pound frame, is his beard. One national media outlet voted it the best beard in Division I basketball, which is nice, but not exactly scrapbook material for the senior forward from Oostburg, Wisconsin.

"It's just something I kind of had fun with," said Zimmermann, one of four Stanford team captains who will close out his home career Sunday against Cal. "There's very few times in my life where I have had complete freedom to do what I want with my appearance."

Zimmermann, hampered by nagging injuries, has started 20 games for the Cardinal this season. Johnny Dawkins, the Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball, is hardly fond of facial hair, but when Zimmermann showed up for practice with a beard last summer and played well during an exhibition tour in Spain, he cut him slack.

"Surprised me," said associate head coach Dick Davey. "I never thought he would."

Dawkins made Zimmermann trim it earlier this year after a trip to New York, but the beard remains. "Coach said, 'I'm going to let him do it because I respect how he plays,'" Zimmermann said. "It kind of became a symbol of toughness. Giving everything you have and not caring what other people think. The team kind of fed on it."

"It's definitely made me a target," said Zimmermann. "But being a competitor, I enjoy it. Utah called me a cave man. It's fun and that's what college basketball is all about. I don't let it bother me."

While Zimmermann might not resemble a typical Stanford player, his odyssey to The Farm is even stranger. He was recruited to Santa Clara by then head coach Davey, but never played for him. Davey retired in 2007 after 30 years with the Broncos, the last 15 as head coach.

As a freshman, Zimmermann played in 19 games and averaged 2.4 points and 2.2 rebounds in about 14 minutes per contest. But he didn't like the direction the program was headed and decided to apply to Stanford to rejoin Davey. The latter made no promises, and Zimmermann wound up transferring to Foothill Junior College for a year, before gaining admittance to Stanford in 2009.

"He holds a special place for me from the standpoint of his work ethic and what he went through," Davey said. "I think the year he came in they admitted 16 transfer students. That's not athletes; that's students."

Davey is like a second father to Zimmermann. During his freshman year at Santa Clara, his girlfriend worked as a nanny for Davey's married son.

"He's a very straightforward guy," said Zimmermann. "I knew he was always there and I could go to him. At the same time, he wasn't going to go out of his way to make things easy. He wanted me to know I would have to prove myself."

Zimmermann made 17 starts as a sophomore and one as a junior, appearing in 25 games. And while his stat sheet is underwhelming--he averages 3.2 points and 2.0 rebounds a game--his biggest contribution is his hard work, leadership, passion, and knowledge of the game.

"Andrew has been terrific," Dawkins said. "I'm really proud of what he's done every year he's been here. He's been one of our hardest workers and best competitors. He's given us everything he's had. He's left a legacy of leadership, toughness, and competitiveness that I think will go a long way for our younger guys."

Zimmermann brings a lunch pail to every game. He does the dirty work, whether it's banging against bigger post players, setting screens, or diving for loose balls.

"It's hard," said Zimmermann, who averaged nearly 16 points and 10 rebounds a game his senior year in high school and was a unanimous selection to the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division 3 All-State team. "Sometimes you think you can do more, but then by doing that, you don't score or are not as efficient as you could be. Through that experience, I just decided to stick with what I do well: play solid defense, lead the team where I can, and take solid shots. I think my game has improved dramatically by just reducing what I do."

Davey, who oversees the Cardinal bigs, has never coached a harder worker, including former Santa Clara great and NBA All-Star Steve Nash.

"I've had a number of dedicated, deranged players," Davey said. "He's the hardest working kid I've ever had."

Davey said Zimmermann is almost like a player-coach.

"He has zero fear of trying to show a player how to do something or tell a player where to go," he said. "He's kind of the eyes for everybody when he's on the floor defensively. Not that he doesn't make mistakes once in a while, but he has no fear of trying to teach other guys how to do things the way he thinks they should be done, which about 95 percent of the time is the right way to do it. He really understands the game, probably as good or better than most coaches do."

**Hard-Working Zimmermann A Hair Above The Rest**

Zimmermann will graduate this spring with a degree in biology and is currently doing research for an honors thesis. He would like to attend medical school and business school.

"I want to be able to get into bio-tech or med-tech because I think the next step in medicine is really in the technology that we develop. Research has really explored a lot of the illnesses that we have today. Whether it be cancer or neurological disorders, a lot of chronic things we don't really have cures for--we just have treatments," said Zimmermann. "I think the next step will be the technologies that we develop. It think that will be a very important step and I want to be a part of that push if I get there in time."

According to Davey, medicine's gain is basketball's loss.

"He'd be a tremendous coach," Davey said. "I'd be shocked if he weren't great at it because of how hard he works."

Zimmermann's parents, Charles and Jane, will attend Senior Day on Sunday. Zimmermann has thought a lot about his last regular-season home game and figures to be emotional when he is introduced.

"That's just the kind of person I am," he said. "It's kind of freeing in that I've done everything I can do. At this point, there is nothing more I can do to prepare for the moment. I know that all I have to do is go out and play hard. If I do that, whether I score a lot or don't, everything will take care of itself. I just want to enjoy it."

As for the future, Zimmermann sees nothing but good things for the Stanford program.

"We're definitely going in the right direction," he said. "I haven't been part of a winning season and we're going to have that no matter how we finish the last couple of games. We're right on the edge of 20 wins and that hasn't happened since four years ago."

"I would say my part is trying to instill in guys that it's about your legacy, what you leave Stanford with. You see the banners. You see the pictures in the locker room or you hear people talking about Mark Madsen, Brevin Knight, Adam Keefe, the Lopez Twins, Josh Childress, and Chris Hernandez. It's got to mean something every game. I want people to remember me when I come back."

**Student-Athlete Profile: Dwight Powell**

The 2011-12 campaign hasn't exactly gone as scripted for sophomore forward Dwight Powell. An early-season ankle injury prevented Powell from comfortably settling into a rhythm. Powell's numbers dipped a bit, but Stanford continued to rack up victories thanks to one of the deepest rosters in the conference.

Fast forward to late February, and anyone who follows Stanford basketball closely can see how much Powell's play has improved over the second half of the season. Especially on the defensive end, where Powell has routinely crashed the glass (80 of his 120 rebounds have come in second half of year), altered opponents' shots (15 blocks rank third on team) and remained active on defense (third on team with 17 steals).

A matchup nightmare for opponents due to his incredible length and athleticism, Powell is averaging 5.1 points and 4.4 rebounds per game in 27 contests while making 11 starts. He's also been steady from the free throw line, making 70.9 percent and 15 of his last 17 attempts overall. A native of Toronto, Canada, Powell has scored 64.0 percent of his points in the second half of the year and continues to look more like the player who was named to last year's Pac-10 All-Freshman Team.

**THE STUDENT on...**

**As a sophomore, you haven't declared a major yet. Any specific area of study you are considering?**

"Still thinking about it. I'm exploring some options and then hoping to declare by the summer. I'm thinking about going with a Science, Technology, and Society (STS) major with possibly a focus in Management Science and Engineering (MS&E) classes, which also could lead into a MS&E major. I sort of moved away from Economics, which I wasn't as interested in as I originally thought. So I'm still feeling it out."

**You're a guy who usually takes an analytical approach to learning about new ideas, concepts, etc. Someone who can contribute a well-reasoned opinion or idea to any discussion or topic.**

"For sure. I've always been interested in breaking things down. Puzzles, riddles, games- I like to try and figure things out. That's what I like about STS; it gives you an opportunity to take some engineering courses and maybe even some computer science courses. So it's not too focused, but it also has components that are interesting to me."

**As part of a six-member class that arrived on campus last year, it must be a real benefit for you guys to share academic experiences.**

"We've all taken some classes recommended by each other. Then again, we've also stayed away from certain classes or professors. We have each others' back on and off the court. Especially when we've taken classes or had professors that someone else might be currently taking. In that case, we can let them know what is expected. So then they can manage their time accordingly and put the right emphasis or effort into the appropriate field of whatever it is they are doing."

**THE ATHLETE on...**

**It's no question that the ankle sprain from the start of the year slowed your progress. That had to be especially frustrating, considering you were coming off such a successful freshman year.**

"It was really tough. It would sprain one or two times per week for the first few weeks. I would start to feel a little bit better. Then we would tape it up real tight, but during normal movements, I would experience a tweak or sprain or it would get jammed again because the ligaments were so weak. So it was tough to battle through that. But now it's really close back to 100 percent."

**After watching the dunk you throw down in the clip below during your second game back, it appears you must be a quick healer. You've always possessed the athleticism that allows you to play above the rim and elevate over your defender. Twisting lay-ups, acrobatic finishes, effortless movement. No disrespect to LSJUMB, but scouts aren't requesting media credentials to watch our band.**

"Especially with the injury this year, that offense has sort of taken a back seat to simpler plays, two-foot plays, etc. I jump predominantly off my left foot, and that's the one that was injured, so it's made those kind of plays more difficult. Since I'm not use to making those plays due to the injury over the last few months, I've been getting caught in between some decision-making processes on the court that sometimes lead me into bad decisions. So I've been trying to stay away from those and keep it simple as I continue through the healing process. I feel like I can now contribute more and am more confident in my physical ability. Pretty much committing to our defensive plan, relaxing a little more on offense and helping us win."

**How has the transition been for you, making the jump to high-level Division I college basketball after your experience at IMG Academy?**

"College basketball is a completely different game compared to high school/AAU summer ball- the speed, the physicality, the mental aspect, the defense. Every team in college is going to have a few guys who are go-to scorers. They're going to have guys who know their role and come at you with their best. Every possession counts. Blowouts are rare. A lot of games come down to the last four minutes, and that means every possession on both ends matters. Every rebound matters, so physicality is at a higher level. Every free throw matters, so keeping yourself focused is important. In high school, you could go up 15 and you've won. In the Pac-12, you could go up 15 and then see yourself down 15."

**Stanford Routs Colorado On The Road**

Stanford hadn't played this well since the last time it faced Colorado.

The Cardinal dealt a huge blow to the Buffaloes' dreams of winning the first Pac-12 Conference title with a 74-50 thrashing Thursday night at the Coors Events Center.

Stanford beat Colorado 84-64 at Maples Pavilion on Jan. 14 to pull into a tie for first place in the conference, but had lost seven of nine games since.

The rematch figured to be tougher. But the mile-high altitude didn't bother Stanford, and neither did the Buffaloes, who suffered their worst defeat of the season.

"I don't think any of the guys noticed," sophomore Dwight Powell said of the 5,345-foot elevation. "We came here to play basketball, not climb mountains."

The Cardinal (19-9, 9-7) played near-perfect basketball for most of the first half, sculpting a 40-20 lead in a building where the Buffaloes (18-9, 10-5) had lost just once in 14 games and were unbeaten in Pac-12 games.

"Our guys were terrific, especially on the road. It was our best road win," Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said. "It was really fun to watch our guys grow in an atmosphere like this."

A near-capacity crowd of 11,036 arrived hoping the Buffs could set up a duel for first place with Cal on Sunday. Stanford, led by 20 points from freshman guard Chasson Randle, built leads of 9-1, 25-8 and 40-18.

"I don't know what to say after that one other than it was an old-fashioned butt-whippin'," said coach Tad Boyle, whose CU team fell two games behind Cal and Washington in the loss column with three games to play.

It was over early. A few first-half highlights:

\* Forward John Gage came off the bench to hit 3 of 4 shots from beyond the arc, triggering a 7-for-12 performance by the Cardinal from the 3-point arc. Randle and Aaron Bright each had two 3-pointers by halftime.

\* Stanford forged a 27-12 advantage on the boards against the Pac-12's leader in rebounding margin.

\* The Cardinal defense held CU without a 2-point field goal until Andre Roberson scored a layup with 3:33 left in the half. Clearly bothered by Stanford's size, the Buffs missed their first 15 attempts from inside the 3-point arc and finished the half 3 for 20 on 2-point tries, 6 for 29 overall.

Colorado's 20.7-percent shooting was its eighth-worst in a half since the 1954-55 season. The Buffs finished at 29.6 percent for the game, made just 4 of 19 shots from the 3-point line and were 14 for 30 on free throws.

Meanwhile, the Cardinal's perimeter shooting excellence followed a nine-game span in which Stanford converted just 31.1 percent from the 3-point line.

"We've defended pretty well all season long," Dawkins said. "We just need to complement it on the offensive end. When those two things are working for us, we can compete."

Stanford immediately stretched its lead to 47-22 with a 7-2 burst to open the second half. When Randle scored eight straight points midway through the period, the Cardinal's lead swelled to 57-28.

CU never got closer than 23 the rest of the way.

Senior Josh Owens contributed nine points and 12 rebounds as the Cardinal wound up with a 50-26 advantage on the boards.

Even with the victory, Stanford remains alone in seventh place, a half-game behind UCLA. But the Cardinal got a confidence boost just two weeks before the start of the Pac-12 tournament.

"It's good for us," Powell said, "showing ourselves how good we can play."

**Student-Athlete Profile: Josh Huestis**

Sophomore Josh Huestis immediately comes to mind when talking about which Stanford players have made the biggest leaps in their development in 2011-12. Appearing in 28 games off the bench last year as a freshman, Huestis' contributions as a sophomore make him an ideal candidate for Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year.

It's easy to see why. The native of Great Falls, Mt., made it a priority to bulk up in the offseason and expand different areas of his game. Huestis first showed that potential in September during Stanford's trip to Spain, where he posted solid numbers and wasn't afraid to hold his own against older and more experienced players in the post.

Extremely athletic and versatile, Huestis has played in every game this year while making four starts. His 5.7 points per game average ranks fifth on the club, but his 5.1 rebounds per game clip is second only to Josh Owens (5.8). Huestis leads the team with 30 blocked shots. It's a modest total, yet still ranks as the most swats by any Cardinal player since Robin Lopez (83) and Brook Lopez (56) in 2008. Huestis has also excelled at protecting the basketball, committing only 19 turnovers in 579 minutes.

#### THE STUDENT on...

**Making the adjustment from your first year in college to the second can be a challenge. How has everything worked out?**

"I have a lot better idea this year. I'm starting to understand my own preferences in terms of classes. I've also done a better job with time management, so that makes things much easier. In terms of knowing what area of study I'd like to pursue, that has helped me narrow down classes I want to take. So, this year has been far easier in terms of academics."

**You haven't declared a major yet, but is there a specific area of study out there that interests you?**

"I'm really interested in psychology, although I haven't yet decided what branch of psychology. I've taken a couple different classes. I've taken a Cultural Psychology class and right now I'm actually taking an Abnormal Psychology class. I really enjoy those. Understanding the way cultures behave the way they do is something that's really interesting to me. Also, learning about different mental disorders is also really interesting. Obviously, there is a big difference between those two, so I'm still trying to figure out which area to go with."

**Or maybe acting is in your future? That was a pretty solid impersonation of President Barack Obama in a recent Sixth Man Club student promo video with Senior Class President Jack Trotter.**

"We were going off a script, but some of it was on the fly. I guess you just sort of pick up mannerisms from watching people. I think from watching Obama's speeches, I was able to just pick up hand gestures, emphasis on certain words, those kinds of things. As far as Obama's basketball game goes, I just exercised some creative license there. It was a lot of fun. He might not celebrate after shots like that, but maybe he does? I'd like to see a game of one-on-one between him and Jack, the two presidents going at it. Jack's a serious guy so it was fun to see a lighter side while making that video."

#### THE ATHLETE on...

**Whether starting or coming off the bench, you've brought a hard-nosed, tough-minded approach every time you take the floor. When the Cardinal needs a boost in rebounding and defense, it's your number getting called.**

"It's something that you can do every game. Your shots aren't going to fall every time, but you can always rebound and play defense. What I've also started to notice about myself is by doing those things, the rest of my game starts to come along. I'll get a couple rebounds or make a good play on defense, and then I start to build confidence in my game that I can make shots. So I feel like everything really feeds off my rebounding and playing defense."

**Not to mention, you've quietly developed into one of the better shot-blockers in the league. Back in December, your last-second block of UCLA's Lazeric Jones preserved a key one-point victory.**

"It's something I feel like I've become pretty good at over the years. All my life, I've blocked a lot of shots. Just this past year, it's really started to come along though. I think it's a combination of a lot of different things. Obviously, it's a lot about timing, because guys at this level realize other players can block shots, so they're going to try and draw fouls. It's about staying down on shot fakes. Athleticism comes into play as well, being able to get up high enough to block the shot. So it's a mix of mental timing and athleticism."

**The year-to-year improvement in your game has been fun to watch. And at Stanford, there is a culture in place for players who want to enhance their game and work hard to improve. For a recent example, look no further than Landry Fields.**

"Landry is a guy I look at and just based on how hard he worked, he was able to succeed. His junior year, nobody was looking at him to be an NBA player. Even after he was drafted, nobody really considered him a starter in the NBA. But just through hard work and determination, he's made it possible. I can see a lot of similarities between our games. He's a good defender. When the Knicks played the Lakers recently, they put him on Kobe. He rebounds- as a senior, he averaged like eight rebounds per game (8.8). He's just an overall hard worker and that's someone I like to emulate."



**Chasson Randle's Path To Stanford**

When Rock Island High played in Illinois' sectional basketball finals last year, it was a heavy underdog to Peoria Central.

That's fine with Chasson Randle, who relishes a challenge. "He's not satisfied by success," said Rock Island coach Thom Sigel. "He's driven by struggles."

Randle piled up 34 points and 11 rebounds that night in a 54-52 victory, assisting on the game-winning basket with three seconds left.

Willie Randle, his father, called it "the best game of his life. He put the team on his back and willed them to win."

The man sitting next to Willie at the Peoria Civic Center was impressed too. It was Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins.

"Johnny was speechless," the senior Randle said. "He couldn't say a word."

Chasson (it sounds like "chasten") Randle someday may leave Stanford fans speechless too. For the time being, the 6-foot-1 freshman is learning the ropes of the Pac-12 and trying to polish his game.

He's certainly capable of lighting up the scoreboard, as he did Thursday night when he hit 6 of 7 three-pointers and scored 24 points in an 87-82 win over Oregon State. The Cardinal face a tougher challenge when they play Oregon 4:30 p.m. Sunday at Maples Pavilion.

Randle struggled against the Ducks in Eugene last month, making just 3 of 14 shots for seven points, his second lowest total of the season. Two days later, however, he caught fire against Oregon State.

For the first time this year he didn't start that game, for what Dawkins called matchup reasons, and scored just two points in the first half. He hit 24 after halftime, including Stanford's first seven points of the fourth overtime as the Cardinal won 103-101 in the longest game in school history.

"He really stepped up," Dawkins said. "He came off the bench and responded. He came in with an intensity, a fire and helped lead us to a victory."

Randle took over the team's scoring lead on Thursday night. He's averaging 12.7 points, inching past Josh Owens (12.3). He leads the team in steals with 29. With an average of 29.7 minutes, he is bidding to be the first freshman to lead Stanford in that department since Casey Jacobsen averaged 28.5 in 1999-2000.

Randle is sometimes compared to Brevin Knight, Stanford's all-time leader in assists (780) and steals (298), and third in scoring (1,714). Knight was a first-round draft pick of the Cleveland Cavaliers in 1997 and played for nine teams in a 12-year NBA career.

"I've seen him play in the NBA, but I didn't catch any of his games at Stanford," Randle said. "All I heard before I came here is that he was a great player, a great leader, and that he won."

The two met when Knight, now a TV analyst for the Memphis Grizzlies, visited the team just before Stanford's season started. Knight has seen him play a few times.

"He's a talent," Knight said. "The comparison comes because of his quickness, being a different player than we're accustomed to having at Stanford."

His message to Randle and his teammates was that when they step on the court, nobody cares about Stanford's rigorous academics. "It's only about basketball," he said. "We've got nice guys on our team. I told them you don't have to be nice all the time."

Knight's Stanford teams didn't win a Pac-10 title or advance beyond the second round of the NCAA Tournament. "I wish we had the kind of talent they have right now," he said.

According to Dawkins, any comparisons between Randle and Knight are unfair because Knight was a point guard and Randle is more of a point/shooting guard combination. But Randle "has amazing potential," he said. "He has a chance to be one of the best players in our conference if he continues to develop."

Dawkins zeroed in on Randle during his junior year at Rock Island, 160 miles west of Chicago. When Randle went to Hamburg, Germany, that summer with the U.S. team to play in the under-17 world championships, Dawkins was there too.

To Willie Randle, Dawkins' presence there helped solidify his recruitment of his son. The other schools he was considering, Illinois and Purdue, sent only their assistants. "Chasson felt that Johnny was true to his word that he really wanted him," Willie said.

After the United States won the gold medal and the Randles returned home, there was little opportunity for Chasson to rest on his laurels.

Said his father, "I told him the lawn needs to be mowed."

**Anthony Brown A Three-Point Threat For Stanford**

Should Stanford qualify for the NCAA Tournament by a mere game, some form of gratitude should be shifted toward sophomore swingman Anthony Brown. It was Brown who sank a 3-pointer with 15.4 seconds left in the third overtime to tie the game at Oregon State on Jan. 7. The Cardinal went on to win 103-101 in a school-record four overtime periods.

The rematch is at Maples Pavilion tonight when Stanford (17-8, 7-6 Pac-12) has Oregon State (15-10, 5-8 Pac-12) come calling at 7. Should the 6-foot-6 Brown score in double figures, the Cardinal has a good chance to win. Stanford is 7-0 when Brown has scored in double digits, 10-8 when he hasn't.

And if it's the Beavers, Brown may be one to watch. In four meetings vs. OSU, Brown is averaging 13.8 points and 6.5 rebounds per game.

Brown, who is battling Osgood Schlatters disease in a knee, has started 11 of 25 games, averaging 22.7 minutes per game. Brown is scoring at a 7.3 points per game clip, fourth on the team. He's hitting 35 percent from 3-point land, but only 37 percent from the floor. Brown had eight points and two assists without any turnovers in Stanford's important 59-47 win at USC on Sunday.

"Anthony played really well against USC," Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said. "I was excited to see that. He's someone that we count on to give us that level of play. He needs to become more consistent for us on the perimeter. He needs to continue to value the basketball and make good decisions with the ball. He'd play more if he gets his rhythm back and develops."

Brown had 11 points, two assists and three steals in that game at Corvallis. It's the shot from 20 feet out that saved the Cardinal's bacon, tying the game 95-all, that Brown still savors.

"I caught a pass in the middle and backed out because we needed a 3," Brown said. "I shot it with confidence. It was the right-side wing. I like shooting on the wings, it doesn't matter."

Brown hasn't beefed much about not being a permanent starter. Nothing wrong with being instant offense off the bench.

"Regardless if I start or don't start, I take my role to come in and score," Brown said.

As a junior at Ocean View-Huntington Beach, Brown's Seahawks lost to Sacred Heart Cathedral-San Francisco 62-55 in the state Div. III title game. Brown did his part, scoring 21 points and grabbing 11 boards. His senior year, Ocean View lost to Gardena-Serra 50-45 in the SoCal Regional Div. III semifinal.

Brown was highly recruited, rated a four-star recruit by Scout.com. He turned down offers from many Pac-10 schools, including UCLA, Arizona and Cal.

Brown was good enough last summer to make the USA 19-and-under team that played at the FIBA World Championships in Valmiera, Liepaja and Riga, Latvia. Team USA started 6-0, but finished 7-2. Brown played sparingly in five games, averaging 3.6 ppg and 1.8 rpg.

"It was a great experience to play with the age group that's the next up-and-coming," Brown said. "It made me a better player. Everyone on our team was good. We had to be cohesive and be a team. We didn't do that as well as we were capable of."

Brown has the tools to be a great player for the Cardinal. He just needs to put them all together.

"The biggest thing for me is my mind-set," Brown said. "I've got the ability, but without the mind, you can't accomplish what you need to. I'm working on my dribble-drive because they're guarding me to stop my jump shot."

The Cardinal were close to notching its biggest win of the year, leading then-No. 5 Syracuse late in the title game of the Preseason NIT in New York. The Orangemen rallied in the final minutes for a 69-63 win, an opportunity lost for Stanford.

"It was a good test for us," Brown said. "We should have won that game, but we had some crucial turnovers at the end. For the most part, that game allowed us to recognize we could play with all the teams in the country."

Stanford has five more games left in the Pac-12 season, then it's the Pac-12 Tournament March 7-10 in Los Angeles. That doesn't leave much time for the Cardinal to put some wins together to make the NCAA dance card.

"There are days when our offense is great and our defense is awful, or our defense is great or our offense is awful," Brown said. "If we can put those two together and get better shot selection, we have a good chance."

**Andy Brown Battles Injuries To Stay At Stanford**

Think you like to play basketball? Imagine you're coming down from a breakaway dunk for the top-ranked high school team in the country, and you blow out your knee.

You're done for the season. You accept a scholarship to Stanford, and after 10 months of rehabilitation, you take part in your first college practice - and blow out the knee again.

But you're a trouper and you're not going to quit. The following August, before your second year at Stanford, everything's feeling fine. In a pickup game you try to plant for a spin move - and that left knee of yours is blown out yet again. Try to imagine that.

A lot of people claim they have the basketball jones. Andy Brown is the embodiment of it. He's in his third year at Stanford, and so far all he's got to show for it is limited minutes in three games this year, four inch-long screws from his first two surgeries, three cadaver tendons from the third and a place in the sports trainers' Hall of Fame.

He probably would see more playing time this week in Los Angeles - Stanford plays UCLA on Thursday night and USC on Sunday afternoon - except that he sprained his ankle this week, so his status is doubtful. When this guy's luck turns, go in with him on a lottery ticket.

What is a wretched joint like this doing in a nice guy like him? For a reporter he went over the seven scars on his knee Tuesday like a spelunker describing a maze of tunnels.

This six-inch baby was a souvenir from his first ACL blowout at Mater Dei High in Santa Ana (Orange County), whose team he had helped guide to state titles as a sophomore and a junior. These scars were from the second surgery, to repair his ACL and meniscus. And this seven-inch beauty on the side was one of a few more from surgery No. 3 to repair his ACL, meniscus and lateral collateral ligament.

What on earth kept the 6-foot-7 forward going through three years of pain and almost daily rehab work?

"The biggest thing is my passion for the game," he said. "I started playing soccer at 2, baseball at 3, basketball at 6. I'm super-competitive. I loved basketball more than the other sports. It's made me who I am today as a person. It's not something I want to give up on after a couple of knee surgeries."

He had ample support from his family of sports nuts. His father, Steve, played football at Arizona State. His mother, Laurie, was a three-time All-American in volleyball at Cal State Fullerton. His sister, Lindsay, played volleyball at Louisiana-Lafayette.

"Whenever he comes on the court," coach Johnny Dawkins said, "he gives us a shot in the arm because everybody realizes what he's gone through and what a commitment he's showing."

Brown played nine minutes against Arizona State last week and missed a couple of shots, so he's still looking for his first college basket. When it happens, you'll be able to hear his teammates from another zip code.

**Stanford Routs Arizona State To Stop Losing Skid**

Sophomore guard Aaron Bright arrived at Maples Pavilion on Thursday night understanding exactly what was at stake to open the second half of Pacific-12 Conference play.

"We know we got to make a run at this thing starting now if we want to get into the tournament," he said after leading the Cardinal to an impressive 68-44 victory over Arizona State.

Bright made three 3-pointers in a 13-0 run to start the second half as Stanford ended a three-game losing streak in front of an announced crowd of 4,719.

After scoring two points in the first half, Bright ended with 16 and equaled Arizona State's total with four assists. Fellow guard Chasson Randle added 14 points and Anthony Brown scored all 11 of his points in the final 6 minutes, 38 seconds of the first half to ignite the Cardinal.

Stanford (16-6, 6-4 Pac-12) has a long way to go before entertaining serious thoughts of qualifying for the NCAA tournament. But it got a boost as it improved to 12-1 at Maples this season.

"We have to have a sense of urgency ... keep our emphasis on our defense," coach Johnny Dawkins said.

Dawkins worried his team had lost defensive concentration on a recent trip to Washington, but the Cardinal redoubled its effort against the Sun Devils. Arizona State (7-15, 3-7) shot 34.2 percent from the field with Cardinal defenders swarming the court.

Stanford held forward Carrick Felix (11.0 points per game) to two points. But Sun Devils' 7-2 center Jordan Bachynski led all scorers with 20 points, making 10 of 12 free throws.

Arizona State might not be the best barometer to measure Stanford's ability to rebound after falling into a third-place tie to end the first half of league. The Sun Devils' leading scorer Trent Lockett (13.9 ppg, 6.4 rebounds per game) didn't play because a sprained right ankle suffered Jan. 14.

With the 6-4 all-conference junior guard sidelined, ASU has few options. Sun Devils coach Herb Sendek kicked leading scorer Keala King off the team last month.

"Defense, turnovers, lack of any constitution to stay with our offense cost us," Sendek said.

The victory march began when Brown found his range after being replaced in the starting lineup last week. His third 3-point basket as time expired highlighted the first half.

"I told him to keep putting it up," Bright said.

Brown wasn't so much motivated by being replaced in the starting lineup. After all, Dawkins substitutes players the way a couch potato changes TV channels. He just wanted to show teammates and coaches he hadn't lost his soft touch.

"I hadn't been shooting well lately, and I just wanted to shoot well tonight," Brown said.

Another highlight Thursday came from redshirt junior Andy Brown, who played nine minutes in his second career appearance after suffering three ACL tears to his left knee in the past three seasons.

"I thought he wouldn't play this entire season," Dawkins said. "He said, 'Coach, I can go.'"

**Stefan Nastic Showing Promise**

So far, Stefan Nastic's career at Stanford hasn't exactly gone according to plan. A broken bone in his right foot ended his freshman season after five games. Though he lifted weights, he couldn't run, so his weight ballooned to 265 pounds.

He was able to write that season off as a red-shirt year, so he's a freshman again for eligibility. An illness, however, set him back going into this season. He is averaging just 3.0 points and 1.1 rebounds while playing about seven minutes a game. Eleven other Cardinal players are seeing more playing time.

Stanford (15-6, 5-4 Pac-12) is smarting from three straight losses as it prepares to host Arizona State (7-14, 3-6) tonight at 7 at Maples Pavilion. The Cardinal play Arizona (14-8, 5-4) at home Saturday at noon.

Big guys like Nastic (pronounced Nas-TICH) who take time to develop are usually called "projects." This project, though, showed some slick moves in Sunday's loss at Cal. A Toronto resident who has played for years on Serbian national teams, Nastic maneuvered quickly to block a layup by Justin Cobbs and scored 11 points. That tied his fellow Canadian, Dwight Powell, for the team high on a day when points were especially hard to come by for the Cardinal.

He also made a long-striding drive to the basket that the officials couldn't believe. They called him for traveling, and the commentators on the Fox broadcast laughingly called it a "Euro step."

The term means a drive that involves changes of direction after a player picks up his dribble, a move more commonly taught in Europe. Coach Johnny Dawkins and Nastic both said the call was incorrect.

"I know it wasn't traveling," Nastic said. "With all due respect to the referees, they definitely weren't expecting a 7-footer to do something like that, to go that far. I wasn't even expecting it myself. ... I won't stop trying it."

Still only 19, Nastic is listed at 6-foot-11 but says he's now 7 feet. He has spent summers with the Serbian teams since age 13, when he was 6-7. Like a lot of big men who have been nurtured in Europe, he has worked assiduously on his dribbling, passing and outside shooting. "I like all parts of basketball," he said.

Even in Canada, he was trained in the European approach by his club coach, Vlad Matevski, a native of Macedonia. Nastic was born in Serbia and was a toddler when his family moved to Toronto. He has both Canadian and Serbian citizenship. The Canadians have been after him for years to join their national team program, but he had already gotten settled with various Serbian age-group teams. He hopes to play for Serbia in the Olympics.

Although his Stanford teammates call him Nasty Nastic, he's anything but nasty off the court. Despite the team's recent setbacks, he said, "The mood is definitely positive. We played some very good teams."

Dawkins is definitely positive about Nastic's future. "The sky's the limit for how good he can be in the low post."



**Josh Huestis Giving Stanford A Lift**

Although it has just one area code (406), Montana is a vast mountainous state. Somehow, Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins found Josh Huestis there. In Big Sky Country, Huestis was an avid hunter and fisherman since age 12, but on the basketball court he was the pursued.

In Huestis, Dawkins found a raw but hardworking player with enormous potential.

"His motor was really high," Dawkins said. "I saw about six of his AAU games over the summer, and I don't think I saw one game where he didn't have double figures in rebounds. He has a nose for the ball."

UCLA's Lazeric Jones can attest to that. In a game at Stanford, he drove into the lane and went up for what would have been a game-winning shot with three seconds left. But Huestis the hunter went up with him and blocked the shot, preserving the Cardinal's 60-59 win.

Huestis stands 6 feet 7, not counting the springs on his feet. One of the highly regarded six-man cadre that arrived on the Farm in 2010, he has been an impressive sixth man for the Cardinal (15-4), who take a 5-3 Pac-12 record into Sunday's 5:30 p.m. game at first-place Cal (16-5, 6-2).

The rivalry with Berkeley is "intense," Huestis said. "We see every game as a big game, but this one has a little added to it."

In a rotation in which 10 players average at least 11 minutes, Huestis has to make every second count. He has yet to start a game but is averaging 6.1 points and 5.2 rebounds in 21 minutes. He leads the team with 18 blocks, including four against Colorado. He scored 13 points in that game, two days after hitting 13 with 10 rebounds against Utah.

Against Colorado, he also hit 3 of 4 three-point shots, showing a stroke that he developed over the summer. "It was nice to finally see things start to come along and give me confidence going into future games," he said.

His weakness remains foul shooting. He's just 19-for-38 from the line, a poor record even by the standards of the Cardinal, who at 66 percent are one of the worst foul-shooting teams in the Pac-12.

"It's a big mental thing with me," he said. "I shoot a lot of them in practice and outside, and I shoot well. I just have to knock them down in games."

He has had more accuracy on his annual hunting trips with his father, Gary Walsh, in the Montana outback. While still looking for his first elk or antelope, he has bagged a couple of deer and other animals. "I only walked away empty-handed one year," he said. "I like to say I have a pretty good track record."

He was born in Texas but was immediately adopted by his mother, Bonnie Huestis, then raised by her and her husband, Walsh, in Great Falls, Mont. One of his brothers is Christian Dean, a freshman defender on the Cal soccer team.

Of note: The Cardinal are trying to snap their first two-game losing streak of the year, but it won't be easy at Haas Pavilion, where the Bears are 13-0 this season and have won 16 in a row dating to last season.

**Jack Trotter Serving Double Duty At Stanford**

For a regular student at Stanford University, finding time for sleep might be considered a complex task. For Jack Trotter, forget it.

In his first three years at Stanford, the 2008 Campolindo High graduate found a way to manage his academic load with his responsibilities as a member of the men's basketball team.

"It was super tough," Trotter said. "It definitely taught me discipline because that was required to get everything done."

He put his time management skills to an even greater test early in 2011 when he ran for – and was elected – one Stanford's four senior class presidents. His father, Dave Trotter, sits on the Moraga Town Council, but a run at student government wasn't on his mind until an old friend recruited him.

"It was actually completely random. A friend of mine from sophomore year Facebooked me, asking me if I was interested in running," Trotter said. "I said, 'Yeah, that sounds awesome.'"

So like that, a campaign was born.

His slate was a diverse group that pulled from several student constituencies and unseated the incumbents by a few hundred votes.

Since being elected, Trotter has been busier than ever.

"You have to be very strict with your sleep schedule," he said. "If you have 20 minutes of free time, well, you better bring your laptop and be productive with that time. If you're flying, well, you could sleep on the plane, but realistically that's not going to be productive sleep so you might as well be working. I've kind of taken that to a new level this year with my commitments as the senior class president and academically, taking quite the course load as well."

Stanford basketball coach Johnny Dawkins said Trotter's commitment to the basketball team hasn't waived despite his added campus responsibilities. In fact, Trotter serves as one of the Cardinal's four captains.

"It's incredible," Dawkins said. "He's done a really good job of keeping a balance between what he's doing academically, what he's doing with his leadership role and what he's doing with our team. He manages his time very well. I know, for us, you can't tell he has any other responsibilities, which says a lot about him. When he's here, he's here, he's engaged."

Trotter's path to Stanford was markedly different than his ascension to senior class president.

"I recruited myself," he said. "I reached out to the coaches and said, 'Look, I'd like to walk on.' I had some pretty gaudy numbers, but not a lot of hype or buzz."

Trotter led Campo to the North Coast Section Division III championship in 2008, was the Diablo Foothill League MVP and a third-team all-state selection, but didn't receive significant recruiting interest.

After his freshman year, Trotter was given a scholarship and started all 32 games as a sophomore when he averaged 6.8 points and 4.5 rebounds per game. His role steadily declined after Stanford added more high-profile recruits to the program. Trotter was actually set to return to walk-on status this year, but Jeremy Green decided to forgo his final season of eligibility to pursue professional basketball, which freed up a scholarship for Trotter's final year.

The Cardinal will play at rival Cal on Sunday at 5:30 p.m., in what will be his final return to his East Bay roots. He's started two games this year and played in 14 of the team's 20 games for the team which sit a game out of first place in the Pac-12 standings.

## Sharp-Shooting John Gage Provides Lift Off The Bench

At Vashon Island High School in Puget Sound, Washington, John Gage regularly gunned down opponents. He wore #40, earning the nickname "40-Gage."

"If you think about it, it's the weakest shotgun in the world," said a smiling Gage, a 6-9 sophomore forward/center on the Stanford basketball team. "I don't know if the kids knew that."

Not that he cared. Gage led his school, located between Seattle and Tacoma, and accessible only by ferry, to a state championship as a junior. As a senior, he averaged nearly 19 points a game and set a school record with 89 blocked shots. Gage was selected the State 1A Player of the Year by the Washington Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association.

Gage's specialty is shooting: the longer, the better. Like most sharpshooters, he's always open and doesn't lack for confidence.

"Whenever I shoot it, I think the ball is going to go in," Gage said. "It's always been like that for me."

Johnny Dawkins, the Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball, has put no restrictions on Gage.

"John has the green light for us," he said. "We want him to be ready for a shot whenever it's available because he has one of the best strokes in our conference."

As a freshman, Gage appeared in 20 games and drew one start, averaging 3.8 points per contest. So far this season, he has played in 17 of 20 games and received two starts, averaging 5.5 points in 201 minutes of playing time.

But Gage has been efficient coming off the bench. If you prorate his totals based on a 40-minute game, he would average 18.5 points and 3.6 three-pointers per game. Gage shoots .391 percent from the field and .471 percent from 3-point range.

Dawkins admits he has rewarded Gage with more minutes because of his good play. Gage scored a career-high 13 points at Oregon earlier this month.

"Absolutely," said Dawkins. "That's what you want. I like being in the tough position of having to decide who we need to play and John did that. He put himself in that position by stepping up in some big games for us and he's earned that right."

Gage has a quick release and isn't shy about launching.

"You'd be surprised," insisted Gage. "Sometimes I just decide not to shoot. But I'm 6-9 and a lot of times I'm open. My role is to shoot the ball and I'll continue to shoot the ball."

Dawkins is hoping Gage and the 15-5 Cardinal heat up Sunday when they try and snap a two-game losing streak at Cal. It won't be easy, but Gage thinks Stanford can bounce back.

"There's no doubt we are excited about what we have going on here,"

Gage said. "It's such a special situation because we have a lot of young talent and we have amazing senior leadership. When we get it going and defend, we're pretty tough."

Gage, who until recently sported a bushy hairdo, has become a favorite of the Sixth Man Club. He's appreciative of the support but said, "When I'm on the court, it's just basketball. I don't hear anything from the crowd. I'm very focused."

As for his hair, Gage likes to wear it long, but not as shaggy as teammate Andrew Zimmermann. Gage is picky about barbers and prefers to have his hair cut at Tresidder Union on campus. Just before winter break, he went in for a trim but the shop was closed until after the holidays.

"I couldn't bring myself to get my hair cut anywhere else," he said.

"It got continually longer, so every time I took a shot it would hit me in the eye. When it (the shop) opened up, I immediately got in there and got a haircut. It was just a mess."

Gage said he was a "serious" soccer player until eighth grade. And although his dad is 5-11 and his mom is 5-10, Gage shot up quickly at age 12.

"I didn't think I was going to be very big," said Gage. "But I was 6-5 in eighth grade, so the game kind of came to me. My family and friends just kept encouraging me to play basketball. Once I got started, I just said, 'I'm going to do my best with this.'"

Gage didn't really blossom as an outside shooter until he arrived at Stanford.

"My senior year in high school I only took 11 3's on the season and made 7 of them," he said. "I was mostly a post player."

It might be surprising to learn that Gage doesn't consider himself the best shooter on the team. Although he can hold his own against almost anybody in a game of H-O-R-S-E, teammate Robbie Lemons is almost unbeatable.

"He'll beat me 80 percent of the time," Gage said.

Gage loved growing up in Vashon, which has a population of about 10,000. Few kids take ferries to every away game.

"I never knew anything different," said Gage. "It wasn't until I got here that I realized most high school rivalries are 10 minutes apart.

For me, it was an hour and a half and you just bond with your guys and have a good time."

Gage has tried to pattern his game after NBA All-Star Dirk Nowitzki of the Dallas Mavericks.

"Dirk has always been a very, very cool guy to watch," said Gage. "Just the way he shoots the ball and gets shots for himself."

For Gage to become the player he wants to be, he knows where he must improve his game.

"No doubt I need to make the biggest strides on defense and rebounding," he said. "I just need to get stronger. I need to be a problem for other teams."

Gage is an economics major and carries a team-high 3.664 GPA. He has been nominated for Academic All-America honors. Gage likes solving math problems and enjoys watching Jeopardy.

"I loved math coming in, but I realized there is math, and then there is Stanford math," said Gage. "I like finance and math, so it's a good combination for me."

**Catching Up With Chasson Randle**

Chasson Randle, the Class of 2015's lone recruit, has comfortably settled into his starting role. The 6-1 guard from Rock Island, Ill., received numerous accolades from opposing teams' coaches on the squad's summer trip to Spain, and has been an integral part of Stanford's fast start.

Statistically he has made an instant impact: he currently averages the second-most minutes on the team (30.1 per game, close behind sophomore Aaron Bright with 30.2), leads the team in steals (23), ranks second-best, again to Bright, in both assists (44) and three-pointers made (39) and has taken more shots than any of his teammates (190). In the team's Jan. 7 quadruple-overtime 103-101 win over Oregon State, Randle was unstoppable; he led all players on the floor with 24 points, including the first five points in the fourth overtime and the game-clinching points with 37 seconds remaining.

Randle, a soft-spoken leader, recently sat down with The Stanford Daily to discuss his experiences donning a Cardinal jersey thus far.

**The Stanford Daily (TSD):** What drew you to Stanford over schools closer to home?

**Chasson Randle (CR):** Really I felt that I could get the best of both worlds, both academically and on the basketball court. And I have an opportunity to do something special here as far as basketball goes.

**TSD: What do you mean by "something special"?**

**CR:** Like win championships—Pac-12 championships. And make the Tournament and go far.

**TSD: The team hasn't gone to the NCAA Tournament in four years. What would a tournament berth mean to you, as a freshman, and to the program as a whole?**

**CR:** First of all, I think it would be a great accomplishment for the program, starting up a legacy that we want to build here again. And as a freshman, it would mean a lot because hopefully I can go all four years that I'm here and do something special while I'm here.

**TSD: Before the school year had even started, you went to Spain with the team. Can you talk about the entire Spain trip experience?**

**CR:** It was a great learning experience, playing against grown men over there—they were all in their late twenties and early thirties. It's very physical over there. And also getting a chance to play with these guys, my teammates, and kind of learning how they play and learning about the coaches and how they coach, really becoming acclimated with everything as far as the basketball thing goes.

**TSD: Was it lonely being the only freshman?**

**CR:** A little bit during the summer. But my teammates all have helped me out, like Anthony [Brown] and those guys, they're like my big brothers.

**TSD: What would you say has been the biggest difference between high school basketball and Pac-12 basketball?**

**CR:** I'd say everyone is a lot quicker—from the big players, the fours and the fives, to the guards—everyone's a lot quicker. And you have to think about the game a lot more at this level.

**TSD: You're the only freshman in the rotation right now, but you are getting the second-most minutes on the team and leading the team in shot attempts. How are you balancing being a freshman with being a team leader already?**

**CR:** I feel like a leader, but really, I'm just trying to help my team out as best as I can, and grow as a player and person while I'm doing it. It's been a great experience so far, and my teammates are finding me in the right spots, and I'm able to get shots off. And then, as far as the minutes go, I'm just thankful that my coaches believe in me, and so do my players.

**TSD: What is Coach Dawkins instructing you to do when you get open looks?**

**CR:** He's not really telling me what to do—he's just telling me to stay aggressive whenever I'm out there on the floor, just look to make plays, to help either myself or my teammates on both ends of the floor.

**TSD: A couple of weeks ago, your team won a crazy four-overtime game at Oregon State, and you led everyone in scoring. What's it like to play in a game like that and to come away with the win?**

**CR:** Well, it was my first time in a four-overtime game. The atmosphere was crazy up there. It was very intense. Honestly, I felt like I could have kept playing. I wasn't really tired. You just get caught up in the moment. But it was just a great game and to come out with the win, it means a lot for our team, and it showed that we have a lot of heart and character to stick things out when things get tough—especially on the road.

**TSD: Up to this point, the team has struggled with turnovers and free throws. How do you see that turning around as the season progresses?**

**CR:** Really, we've been working on that in practice a lot, and really just trying to correct that as best as we can. I think we'll start seeing better results as we keep playing games.

**TSD: What has been the highlight of your freshman experience thus far?**

**CR:** Where should I start? It's all been a great experience so far, but I have to say the first game that I played was a big moment for me, you know, starting as a freshman. And the game we played against Oregon State, just going into four overtimes, and the way everyone played, it was great for our team, and hopefully we can just build on that and keep playing good basketball.

Brown's senior year at Mater Dei High School was cut short due to an ACL tear in January. Ten months later, Brown suffered the same injury on the first day of official practice and sat out the year as a medical redshirt. He then tore his ACL a third time last August in a preseason workout.

Finally cleared to resume basketball activities, Brown made his collegiate debut when he checked in for the final nine seconds of Stanford's 82-67 win over Oklahoma State on Nov. 23 in the Preseason NIT semifinals at Madison Square Garden. On Jan. 14 in an 84-64 rout of Colorado, Brown took the court at Maples Pavilion for the first time, grabbing one rebound and knocking down the first of two free throws for his first collegiate point in three minutes of action.

When asked in his postgame press conference about Brown, head coach Johnny Dawkins offered the following:

"I was so excited for Andy. Talk about perseverance. He's great for our guys and gives them a big lift, to see what he does in practice. Andy's spirit is in us. What he has done the last three years, the sacrifices he has made, we're just very proud of him."

#### THE STUDENT on...

**Tell us a bit about your major.**

"I'm very interested in the major itself and classes that are offered within the major, covering themes such as social media and social technology. Thinking about how we interact with each other. I have two more classes to take and will then be done with my major. After that, I plan to apply for my Masters in communication during the spring."

**Any specific classes that have really sparked your interest?**

"My favorite one so far is probably COMM 166, a class called Virtual People. I took that last year, and it was very interesting. The class was based on the development of virtual worlds that have been created by people online. Basically, virtual realities where people are able to create avatars and interact with each other. It's very interesting to see those advances in technology. Now people are actually meeting in virtual worlds online. I was also able to participate in experiments where we put on virtual reality headgear and actually succumb into another world."

**Now in your third year on campus, do you ever reflect on how your career has progressed in the classroom compared to basketball?**

"I've loved every minute of my time here at Stanford. A feeling I had not experienced in a long time; to feel like a basketball player again. Being able to play in the game against Colorado was also great. I had not played in a game since January of 2009, so to grab a rebound and actually score- that was a good feeling for me. It showed the hard work and rehab paid off, because the last three years had been a tough time for me. It was an awesome feeling to get into a game and put my name in the books."

**Fast forward to your Maples Pavilion debut against Colorado on Jan. 14. Describe your emotions at these moments...**

**- Checking in at the scorer's table:**

"Excited and relieved. I had been playing in practice for the last month or so, and to finally do it against another team was great."

**- First time you touched the ball:**

"I got trapped, so I was kind of scared. I think a Colorado player touched the ball and it went out of bounds, then Coach Dawkins called timeout and we ran a play. It's hard to put into words, because a lot of people haven't been through what I have."

**- Seconds before shooting your first free throw:**

"Extremely nervous. It was a little interesting for me to come into a game and not be warm. Once I made the first one, I was really happy. I probably didn't focus on the second one as much as I should have."

**- The ball in your hands as time expired:**

"That was great. It was cool I was able to end the game that way. It kind of gave me some hope; that I might be able to continue this and start getting into more games."

**Against Colorado, practically everyone in the building was encouraging you to put up a shot even though the game had already been decided.**

"Yeah, I don't consider myself a selfish player. In high school during my freshmen year when I would be playing at the end of games, my coaches would be yelling at me trying to get me to shoot it. I don't want to do things out of the offense. I don't really care much about trying to score. I just want to be out there helping my team build a bigger lead."

**Aaron Bright Ignites Stanford's Hot Start**

At 5-foot-11, 177 pounds--soaking wet--Aaron Bright is usually the shortest player on the court. Not that it bothers the sophomore guard from Bellevue, Wash., whose fearless style and constant smile have endeared him to Stanford basketball fans.

"I think I get it from my mom (Cindi)," said Bright. "Being smaller, you can't get away with the things taller players get away with, so you have to have that edge to you and chip on your shoulder. You have to be the aggressor."

Johnny Dawkins, the Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball, wouldn't want it any other way.

"He brings a cockiness and confidence," he said. "You can just see it when he's out there on the floor, his belief that we can be successful and his belief that we're going to win. That can be contagious. You love to have a kid out there that has that level of confidence."

Cindi, a single parent who has been divorced for 10 years, says she raised her son to be tough and strong-minded. Especially when players in Seattle's inner city called the biracial Bright names like "Red Bone" or "Half Breed."

"I'm competitive as hell," said Cindi, who works for Russell Investments. "I just taught him to be a winner. Nobody's better or badder. Everybody says you're too small to be on the floor, but you know what? You're winning."

Bright has helped the Cardinal climb to a 15-3 start heading into this weekend's road swing to Washington State and Washington. In addition to running the offense from the point guard position, he has also connected on 37-80 3-point attempts, a percentage of .463--fifth-best in the Pac-12--and has an assist to turnover ratio of 63 to 40.

"He's turned himself into one of the best shooters in the conference," said Dawkins, who would know, having departed Duke as the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,556 points. "Close to 50 percent from 3's and from the field (47.0 percent) for the season--that's phenomenal for a point guard."

"Plus, when you have the responsibilities of handling the basketball and running the team, you're kind of like a mother hen out there. The last thing you take care of is yourself."

Bright has averaged 12.3 points per game this season, but 14.2 during conference games. He has reached double figures 13 times, topped by a season-high 21 points against Fresno State.

"He's great at finding guys and he's our leader on the floor," said freshman guard Chasson Randle. "I feed off him." Bright has an infectious, mischievous grin and isn't afraid to challenge bigger bodies inside. Although he played in all 31 games last season, starting eight, he averaged only 5.1 points and two assists per game.

With urging from Dawkins and his staff, Bright worked his tail off during the offseason. Not only did he sweat in the gym, Bright watched videotape of other point guards to find ways to improve.

"I was watching the NCAA Tournament and the NBA playoffs," Bright said. "I love watching smaller guards. I watched J.J. Barea of the Dallas Mavericks a lot. I love the way he was able to get in the paint and make guys better. I watched Ty Lawson in Summer League, just because I can relate to him. I have to model my game around players my height."

Dawkins said the difference between Bright from last year to this year is night and day.

"Aaron's one of the most improved players in our conference, not just on our team," he said. "I'm really proud of what he's done, because we challenged him last spring after the season was over about getting better in different areas and the young man took it to heart."

Bright said he has raised his level of play in all facets of the game and still has plenty of room for improvement.

"I think last year I was mostly just an off-ball shooter and kind of shot my bullets when I had them," said Bright. "I thought I could do a much better job of getting into the paint, creating shots for myself above the rim, and creating shots for my teammates. I just knew I had a lot of work to do, and so far, it's paying off."

Speaking of the rim, Bright can dunk. He's never done it in a game, but has during practice.

"People don't know that about me," he said with a laugh. "When I'm in a game and have a fast break, my legs are fatigued. I don't want to go up there and have my legs go out. If I try and dunk it and miss, Coach Dawkins is going to yank me."

Bright is so right.

"I have one rule: Don't do anything in a game you haven't done in front of me in practice," Dawkins said. "He hasn't dunked during five-on-five yet."

Bright, a single child, has tattoos on both of his shoulders.

"The one on the left says, 'Love is sacrifice' and has a happy face and sad face to symbolize the ups and downs of things you love and the things that you have to sacrifice for," he said. "The one on the right says, 'Control what I can' and it has a hand to symbolize I can control my attitude, actions, and thoughts, but everything else is out of my hands." Cindi has no problem with the tattoos.

"It's who he is," she said. "He always wanted tattoos. I don't have an issue with them. I agreed to let him have one on his arm. It was in 2007. He was 15 years old and we were in Maui. We decided to get tattoos at the same time. Both of them describe our life stories."

Bright is aware tattoos on Stanford basketball players are about as common as four-point plays.

"I'm trying to get other people to do it with me as well," he said. "Gabe (Gabriel Harris) has one. I'm trying to get Anthony (Brown) to get one, but I don't know if his mom will let him. You gotta make sure the parents are okay with it."

Cindi attends about 90 percent of Aaron's games and cheers hard for her son and his teammates.

"I make it work," she said. "It's what I live for with him."

Bright said if you think she's noisy at games now, you should have heard her when he played at Bellevue High School.

"She's actually calmed down," he said. "In my early days in high school, she was crazy. I can't say anything now--she doesn't listen. She's my biggest fan."

How Bright escaped the state of Washington is surprising. An A-student at Bellevue, he was heavily recruited by the Huskies in eighth and ninth grade, then they cooled on him. Bright averaged 18 points and seven assists as a junior and 20 points and six assists as a senior.

"What happened was I got a letter for the elite camp under Trent Johnson," said Bright of the former Cardinal head coach. "And when Trent left and Coach Dawkins came, I didn't know if I was still able to come. So I called up some of the coaches and said, 'Is it okay if I still come?' They said yeah, you got the invitation. I had a pretty good camp and they started to recruit me. Once they showed interest, it was obviously my first choice."

Neither side has regretted it.

"And to be quite frank, he still has a big upside," Dawkins said. "I still think he has a lot of room for growth and that's the part that excites me as a coach and as a teacher."

Said Bright, "It's kind of funny. When I was younger, I never thought I would be at such a great institution, both academically and athletically. It was really just a blessing."

Bright, who is working on a degree in economics, played a key role in Stanford's four-overtime victory at Oregon State on Jan. 7 with 18 points and six assists in 42 minutes.

"It was huge," he said. "We approached that game like it was win or die. We try to approach every game like that, but that game was pretty big because we had just dropped one at Oregon. If we had gone 0-2 on the road, we'd probably still be at practice right now."

Instead, the Cardinal are 5-1 in conference play in what figures to be a wide open race for the regular-season title.

"It was just a great win," said Bright. "It's unbelievable how much support we had for each other. The huddles were ridiculous . . . the yelling. It was pretty intense."

Slowly but surely, Stanford is establishing an identity as a deep, tough defensive team that finds ways to win.

"I definitely think we have all the right pieces," Bright said.

**Student-Athlete Profile: Jarrett Mann**

Among the many reasons for Stanford's success this year has been increased depth, with a versatile roster featuring 10 players who average at least 10 minutes of playing time.

Perhaps one of the best examples is senior Jarrett Mann, one of four captains on this year's Cardinal squad. After starting all but two games over the last two seasons, Mann has started only seven of Stanford's 18 contests this year. Often given the assignment of locking down the opposing team's best offensive player, Mann is averaging 3.8 points and 3.2 rebounds per game while receiving 18.8 minutes of playing time.

Meanwhile, Mann's free throw rate this year is actually 10 percentage points higher than his career mark. That being said, the native of Middletown, Del., is not satisfied with the progress and wants to improve that area of his game.

Whether he is coming off the bench in a reserve role or transitioning between positions to help the team, Mann has proven to be a valuable asset to Stanford's rotation.

#### THE STUDENT on...

##### **Tell us a bit about your major.**

"American Studies is a diverse major. It's a completely open major, so you have a wide field to choose from. I've taken everything from law classes to now marketing classes. You can even take business classes. I wasn't exactly sure what field I wanted to go into, but it's kind of led me here. Just being around sports and hearing from people who have completed internships.

##### **You've thought about pursuing a career in sports marketing. Anything specific you would like to explore?**

"I'm taking a sports marketing class this quarter, and I expect that we'll cover topics like branding and elements related to apparel. It's going to be my first class. Actually, I would say J.O. (Josh Owens) and I have hour-long conversations about shoes, everything from how they feel on your feet, what they look like or how sneakers have evolved over time. Since I was in middle school, my mom would buy us as many sneakers as she could. I would collect them and try to keep them as clean as possible. Now I probably have a collection of around 60 shoes."

##### **How has your experience as a student-athlete related to your interest in athletic apparel?**

"Playing sports all your life, you experience different brands, models, etc. I have a huge shoe collection and I notice the differences in style and comfort, and how they feel. As an athlete, I feel like I would have a lot to contribute in that field and I would really like to get into it. I am looking at some internship opportunities with different shoe designers. Not only in the design, but I'm interested in how the shoes feel, the comfort level and the effects of the sneaker. Do they make you quicker or are they made more for pounding? Obviously, I've experienced some issues with my feet, so I feel like I could contribute a lot."

#### THE ATHLETE on...

##### **You're an above-average rebounding guard and arguably one of the league's top defensive players. You've compiled a career assist/turnover ratio of 1.3. And of course, you do a great job of drawing contact and slashing to the basket.**

"I'm not sure how much of it is just being a bigger guard. Really, I came in here skinny at first. I think it's just the East Coast basketball style of play, and growing up on the East Coast. A lot of it is just continuing to go to the hole. That's what I was taught to do. That's how I had always played, even at a young age. On this team, that's one thing that Coach Dawkins preaches and feels we need to do more. He wants us to attack the basket. We have a lot of great shooters, so it's great that I can come in, drive to the basket, draw fouls or dump off passes to guys. I've always been a slasher or a slithery type of guy, even as I was growing up. I like the physicality, so that's a way I can help the team. Attack the basket and draw fouls."

##### **Your free throw shooting has improved this year. In fact, there have been a few cases when your performance at the foul line has helped the team win key games (Colorado State, Oklahoma State, Oregon State).**

"I've made some mechanical changes to the shot. I think I've focused on it so much over the past three years, that this year I was of the mindset that I would just go to the line, shoot my free throws and not worry about it. Coach Dawkins tells me that when I go to the line, whether I make or miss them, I'm drawing a foul for the other team. He feels that I'm one of the better players to do that. He says 'reward yourself for it, think of it as a reward for you because you're already helping the team out.' So I've just been going up there and shooting them, just trying to get to the line as much as possible. Coach Davey actually made some mechanical changes to my shot and they've been working out some as well. So I'm just going to continue trying to improve, and not focus on it as much."

##### **It's a luxury for the coaching staff to have a veteran player who is capable of starting or providing energy off the bench. No matter what the situation, you're always ready to go.**

"When we are going up against a tough offensive player that night, Coach Dawkins will probably put me in the lineup. Even if I'm coming off the bench, he's going to rely on me heavily to guard that guy as the primary defender. In another role, he just wants me to maintain that calming effect on the offense. I think that's because I've been through it already as a leader out there. It could be on or off the ball. My role is to get the offense into a flow and keep everyone settled down."

**Cardinal Finds Groove, Routs Colorado 84-64**

Colorado head coach Tad Boyle admitted Saturday he couldn't pronounce Josh Huestis' last name.

For the record, it's HEW-stis.

Pacific-12 Conference coaches might take note after the 6-foot-7 sophomore from Great Falls, Mont., had another impressive performance to help surprising Stanford remain atop the league with an 84-64 dismantling of the Buffaloes.

Huestis matched his career high from Thursday night against Utah with 13 points in front of an announced crowd of 5,850 at Maples Pavilion. But perhaps more important were his four blocked shots, four rebounds and clampdown defense that helped the Cardinal go on a 32-5 tear over a 10-minute stretch in the second half.

By the time the carnage ended, Stanford (15-3, 5-1 Pac-12) led 74-47 against a team that opened conference play 3-0 before getting swept on its Bay Area trip.

"I know when I go in there the first thing I got to contribute is rebounding and defense," Huestis said. "Everything falls in place after that."

It all fell favorably for the Cardinal on a day it matched its victory total from last season.

After a lethargic performance Thursday over lowly Utah, Stanford came to play against the Buffaloes (11-6, 3-2), one of the league's top rebounding teams. Center Josh Owens had seven rebounds as the Cardinal out-rebounded Colorado 35-27.

"We got manhandled out there," Boyle said. "I'm telling you: To a man, those guys are strong, they are good jumpers, and they crash the boards."

A team picked to finish sixth in the league continued to prove analysts wrong in its first major test of the Pac-12. Freshman guard Chasson Randle had 18 points, and sophomore Aaron Bright added 14 as the Cardinal played patiently in the season's best performance.

Stanford looked in sync from the start after a dreadful showing two nights earlier in a 68-65 victory against Utah. Huestis said the players came away with the realization they can't let opponents run through them like the Utes did.

"We just wanted to come out as aggressive as possible at both ends of the floor and just play our hearts out," added Randle, who didn't make a turnover.

But the Cardinal needs to keep growing as it travels to Washington for two games this week. Stanford has played 10 of its 18 games at Maples, where it has lost just once.

Coach Johnny Dawkins has preached patience but also has had to show tolerance while relying on a freshman and six sophomores.

"I've got a seat belt every time I'm coaching," he said. "OK, what's he going to do? They don't always do everything right, but they play with their hearts."



**Stanford Outlasts Oregon State 103-101 In Four OTs**

Freshman Chasson Randle didn't start Saturday for the first time all season, but he was there to finish the longest game in Stanford history.

Randle scored Stanford's first seven points of the fourth overtime, and the Cardinal outlasted Oregon State 103-101 at Gill Coliseum.

"We were going to keep punching until someone was knocked out," Randle said after scoring a career-high 24 points, all but two after halftime. "I think we could have kept going. It was a lot of fun."

The Cardinal began playing basketball in 1913-14 and never had played a four-overtime game.

"We were going to wait till we won, however long it took," said Dwight Powell, who had 10 points and 11 rebounds. "Glad it's a win."

Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said he never had been involved in such a long game, not as a player or assistant coach at Duke, not during his NBA career.

"I'm very proud of our kids' effort and the way we bounced back from the other night," he said, referring to a loss Thursday at Oregon.

Dawkins said he sat Randle at the start of the game to give him a chance to watch for a few minutes after a 3-for-14 shooting performance at Oregon.

"We have confidence in Chasson," Dawkins said. "He played for us. We believe in him."

Randle made a 3-pointer and a layup in the first 70 seconds of the fourth overtime, then converted a layup in traffic with 37 seconds left to push Stanford to a 102-99 lead.

Oregon State's Roberto Nelson faked Josh Huestis into the air and drew a three-shot free-throw opportunity with 17.9 seconds left. But he made only two, and Stanford retained the lead, 102-101.

Huestis then made one of two free throws with 3.8 seconds left, and Nelson missed a potential tying shot as the buzzer sounded.

Aaron Bright scored 18 points for Stanford before fouling out in the third overtime. Josh Owens added 16 points and 11 rebounds.

Former San Leandro High star Jared Cunningham played 54 minutes for the Beavers, who also went to four overtimes for the first time. Cunningham, the Pac-12 scoring leader, finished with 19 points, six rebounds, six assists and four steals.

Stanford didn't lead until Randle hit a 3-pointer for a 61-60 advantage with 8:26 left in regulation. Neither team scored in the final 1:20 of the second half.

There was a lot of basketball left:

- Stanford was shut out over the first 4:44 of the third overtime, trailing 95-92 after three free throws by Cunningham. But Anthony Brown swished a 3-pointer from the right wing with 15.4 seconds left, and Ahmad Starks and Joe Burton missed final-seconds shots for the Beavers.
- In the second overtime, a 3-pointer by Randle and a reverse layup by Powell pushed the Cardinal to an 88-85 lead after 90 seconds. But Oregon State came back and led 91-90 after two free throws by Cunningham with 46 seconds left. Randle converted a lob inbounds pass from Powell for a layup with 19 seconds left, and Stanford led again. For eight seconds. Burton made the second of two free throws with 11 seconds left, knotting the score at 92-92 and sending the game to a third overtime.
- In the first overtime, Randle made the first of two free throws with 22.7 seconds left, tying the score at 83-83. Starks gave the Cardinal one more chance when he dribbled the ball out of bounds with 4.2 seconds left, but Brown's heave at the buzzer missed.

**Stanford Beats UCLA In Pac-12 Opener**

Stanford forward Josh Huestis finally figured out how to stop UCLA guard Lazeric Jones from scoring Thursday night - don't let the shot get to the basket.

Huestis blocked Jones' shot with three seconds remaining and the Cardinal held on for a 60-59 victory in the Pac-12 conference opener for both teams in front of 6,777 at Maples Pavilion.

Jones scored a career-high 26 points on 8-for-13 shooting, but with the game hanging in the balance, Huestis came up with the defensive play of the game.

"He had been hitting all game so I knew they wanted him to take the last shot," Huestis said. "There were a lot of possible scenarios going through my head because he had barely missed at all. I don't think he was ready to give it up. The way he was playing, I can't really blame him."

UCLA center Joshua Smith scored on a putback to begin the game, the only time the Bruins led. But after trimming an 11-point deficit to 24-23 at halftime, UCLA didn't trail by more than five points in the second half. The Bruins tied it up on five occasions and each time Stanford answered with a score on its next possession.

"It's important for our group," Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said. "We're still trying to build leadership and for those kids to be in a game like this and to learn how to close is huge for this team."

It's only one night of conference play, but a win over the team that was the preseason pick to win the Pac-12 title helped the Cardinal (11-2, 1-0) validate its impressive nonconference performance. After a sluggish start to the season, UCLA (7-6, 0-1) entered Thursday on a five-game winning streak.

"We are in conference now so we started 0-0 and have to start building again from that point," Dawkins said. "It was a big win. You want to keep on gaining momentum."

Stanford was led by guard Aaron Bright, who had 16 points but forced up a tough shot in the paint with 29 seconds left to give UCLA a final chance to win. After the Bruins' Jerime Anderson missed a three-pointer with 11 seconds left, the fight for the rebound resulted in a held-ball and the possession arrow kept the ball in the Bruins' hands.

**Note:** Reserve junior guard Gabriel Harris will miss the remainder of the season after undergoing surgery on his right knee Monday. Harris was averaging 3.6 points and 2.0 rebounds in 13.5 minutes per game off the bench.

**Owens Overcomes Adversity As Stanford's Leader**

When Josh Owens enrolled at Stanford in 2007, little did he anticipate the adversity he would face. The Portsmouth, N.H. native played on Stanford's NCAA Sweet 16 team and thought the sky was the limit for the Cardinal basketball team.

Shortly afterward, head coach Trent Johnson left for LSU and Duke assistant Johnny Dawkins was named The Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball. Owens, a 6-foot-8 power forward/center, played in all 34 games as a sophomore, then suffered a serious health challenge and redshirted in 2009-2010.

Last year, Owens rejoined the team and was an honorable mention All-Pac-10 selection, averaging 11.6 points and a team-high 6.5 rebounds. He also led Stanford with 29 blocks, ranked second with 25 steals, and posted 21 double-doubles while shooting 58 percent from the field, fourth-best in the conference.

A force in the frontcourt, Owens has helped fuel a 10-1 start. He averages 12.3 points and 5.1 rebounds per game. A Pac-10 All-Academic honoree last year, Owens has already earned an undergraduate degree and is currently working on his masters in environmental design.

"He's been through a lot," said former teammate and roommate Drew Shiller, now a color analyst on Stanford radio broadcasts. "Freshman year, he sits behind the Lopez Twins, Taj Finger, Peter Prowitt and a bunch of other guys up front; then there is a whole new coaching staff and a complete change in his role; then he has the medical setback that totally took him and everyone by surprise; last year, he had a very solid season but was a little inconsistent at times. It's great to finally see him playing better. He's the main presence inside and it's a presence Stanford needs."

"So much has happened to me since my freshman year," he said. "A lot of great players have come through and obviously you had the change in coaching staff. I loved coach Johnson and love coach Dawkins. I think coach Dawkins is great for the program and Stanford University."

The same can be said of Owens, who now resides in Kennesaw, Ga. and has three siblings. At times, he can be dominating, as evidenced by his career-high 31 points, 11 rebounds and four blocked shots at Oregon last season.

"He's so big, strong and athletic, that no one we face is really going to be able to match his athleticism," said senior guard Jarrett Mann.

"With his combination of agility, power and strength, it's hard to stop a guy like that once he gets going."

Other times, he can struggle. Against Seattle in early December, Owens went 0-7 from the field. Rather than pout and get down on himself, Owens worked even harder on the defensive end and helped Stanford secure an easy victory.

"I felt bad for him that night because he really had great looks, they just didn't go in," Dawkins said. "We've all been there as players. That's one of those nights that tests your maturity. He was great on the bench and in huddles; he was great before and after the game. That's hard for any person because you start to feel sorry for yourself. But he didn't hang his head and I was really proud of him for that."

The unselfish Owens is the ultimate team player. He could care less about his personal statistics.

"The way coach Dawkins puts it a lot of times is it's not about looking cool or egos," Owens said. "At the end of the day, winning is going to be what's cool."

Owens leads by example. He doesn't mind sacrificing his body and has the floor burns to prove it.

"He leaves it all out there on the court," said senior center Andrew Zimmermann. "He's definitely meant a lot to the guys on the team. Having gone what he went through, where he lost a whole year, was something that could have ended his career. When other guys don't take it that seriously, he can get on them and kind of push them."

Owens called his unexpected redshirt season a blessing in disguise.

"I would definitely consider that one of the hardest years of my life," he said. "But at the same time, it's one of the greatest experiences that I've grown from a lot. It's something that I wouldn't really trade anything for."

With support from his family, teammates and coaches, Owens stayed engaged with the team and became its biggest cheerleader. Although he couldn't practice, he tried to contribute every day and stayed positive.

"During games, that was tough," said Owens. "It was definitely a learning experience."

Dawkins loves his leadership and passion for the game.

"There was a time when we weren't sure if he would ever play again," Dawkins said. "From that point to now, to see him out there and cherish every moment he has on the court is something that most people and players can never identify with. You never know when something may be taken away from you, and he had that process for a season. There's no one that cherishes or values the process, the practices and the games more than Josh."

At times, Owens resembles a player-coach. The last link to Stanford's appearance in the NCAA Tournament, he wants teammates to play with a sense of urgency and realize their goals are accessible.

"It's always exciting to see his energy," said Dawkins. "I don't think Josh has ever had a bad practice or game. He may not have made shots or made mistakes, but it's never been from a lack of enthusiasm or energy from wanting to do something or participate in something he loves."

Owens knows he has the physical skills to take over a game and is working hard every day to improve them.

"I need to continue to be aggressive, both offensively and defensively," he said. "Just continue to know the value I have to the team in terms of leadership. Never forgetting that and constantly trying to push the team along."

Shiller says Owens is extremely analytical.

"He's very, very smart and thinks things through," said Shiller. "Sometimes that happens to him on the basketball court, where he's almost over-thinking instead of just letting his instincts take over and react."

Off the court, Owens loves music, everything from Jay-Z to Coldplay; architecture; and is a passionate reader. He's currently re-reading the Warren Buffett biography and does a little investing on the side.

"First and foremost, he is one of the best people you will ever come across," said Shiller, who like current teammates calls him J.O. "He loves basketball, no doubt about it. But the reason he chose Stanford is because of all the different avenues and opportunities it offers off the court. He's the epitome of a Stanford athlete."

Former Stanford basketball standout John Arrillaga, his athletic scholarship donor, feels the same way.

"Josh Owens is a tremendous basketball player and an even better person," he said. "It has been a joy to watch him grow and mature at Stanford. He has handled adversity with class and dignity and is the ultimate team player. Josh will be a success in life in anything he undertakes."

Owens and the Cardinal have their sights set on contending for a Pac-12 title and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. This is his last shot and he thinks the team is more than capable of accomplishing its goals.

"In some sense, we have a chip on our shoulder," he said. "But we also want to know that our hard work is paying off. We've been working since the spring of last year, so we're just looking forward to that payoff."

During the summer, the team played exhibition games in Spain against top-flight competition. But an even bigger bonding experience occurred in mid-November, when Stanford advanced to the semi-finals and finals of the Dick's Sporting Goods NIT Season Tip-Off at Madison Square Garden in New York. After beating Oklahoma State, the Cardinal had fifth-ranked Syracuse - now No. 1 -- on the ropes before falling, 69-63.

"I thought it was a trip we definitely needed," said Owens. "Just for the chemistry of our team since a lot of our guys haven't been in that situation. Being in that type of atmosphere with the big-stage setting was definitely something we needed to see and it was fortunate that we were able to see it early in the year."

No matter what happens this season, Dawkins said the program is better off because of Owens.

"You're not going to meet a nicer person," said Dawkins. "He's caring, he's giving. You're better for having associated with him because of what he brings out in you."

"You can be around some people and feel goodness in them. Josh is one of those guys. We've all been fortunate to have him in our lives."

**Randle Makes Instant Impact For Cardinal**

Knowing his parents wouldn't see many of his college games in person, Chasson Randle was sharp from the outset of his Stanford men's basketball career.

With Willie and Gwen Randle in the seats at Maples Pavilion, Rock Island's favorite son dropped 15 points, six rebounds and four assists in his Nov. 11 collegiate debut, a 91-52 romp over Central Arkansas.

That performance wasn't smoke and mirrors - Randle truly has been a diaper dandy for Stanford (10-1), sitting just outside the Associated Press Top 25 rankings thanks to its second-leading scorer and passer.

"I knew that I could come in and help the team. That was my goal coming in," Randle said. "It's a blessing, and hopefully I can keep improving and helping the team."

"Of course I miss my family and friends, but I talk to them a lot on the phone, so they keep me upbeat," Randle said. "And I have my teammates here to be my family. I feel like I've been adjusting well to being out here on the West Coast."

Family and friends, along with the college hoops world, had a chance to watch Randle on national television when Stanford continued the NIT tip-off tournament at Madison Square Garden Thanksgiving weekend. The Cardinal beat Oklahoma State - behind Randle's season-high 17 points - before giving currently top-ranked Syracuse a run for its money in the championship game.

Willie Randle would have been in New York City if not for his mother's 75th birthday weekend, but said it was a thrill to see his son play on basketball's biggest stage.

"He loved it. I told him stars rise when you come and play in the Garden," Willie Randle said.

"He said he would like to play at the Garden again, but he doesn't want to be in college at the time. He wants it to be after his college days, which of course would be in the NBA.

"Hopefully that will happen. Everything's looking pretty good for him right now."

Chasson Randle didn't select Stanford over Purdue and Illinois during his much-ballyhooed recruitment to be a one-and-done player, though.

Willie insisted his son is deadset on spending four years in Palo Alto, where during his official visit a conversation with former U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, a Stanford professor, swayed his decision.

"He's going to make sure he stays there for four years. He wants that degree for sure, because the only reason why he chose that school," Willie Randle said. "He loves the game of basketball, but after basketball, he's got a great paper in his hand that says 'Stanford' on it, that nobody can ever take from him."

Three months after leading the Rocks to their first Illinois Class 3A state championship in school history, and being named to countless awards, including Mr. Basketball and Gatorade Player of the Year, Randle departed for Palo Alto on June 15 to take a couple of summer courses.

Now taking 15 credit hours in his first semester, Randle's relieved he did.

"Any time you can get some credits out of the way, you should do it," said Randle, an undeclared major who wants to pursue the medical field. "I recommend that to anybody. Being able to see how everything works academically here, I think it helped a lot."

And, oh yes, Randle knows the Rocks (7-3) are enjoying a hot start to the prep season with a brand-new look.

"I definitely have been keeping up with the team, talking with coach (Thom) Sigel and a couple guys on the team," Randle said. "I know what's going on."



**Stanford Has Look Of Pac-12 Contender**

The Stanford men are 8-1, already darlings of the computer rankings and gradually injecting themselves into the discussion of who will win the Pac-12 Conference title this season.

An unlikely path for a team that was picked to finish sixth in the conference.

"I'm encouraged. I can see the potential in our group," coach Johnny Dawkins said. "Where we are today won't be good enough in January. We have to continue to get better."

Dawkins insists he is paying no attention to the rest of the Pac-12, and that's probably a good thing. Watch this conference for long, and the Cardinal could become overconfident. And this is a team that finished in a tie for seventh place last season.

The Pac-12 is 0-10 so far against Top-25 opponents, and Stanford's 69-63 loss to now top-ranked Syracuse at Madison Square Garden is perhaps as good as a result as the league can claim. On the plus side of the ledger, the Cardinal has beaten Oklahoma State and North Carolina State, contributing to its No. 17 ranking in the Sagarin computer.

The conference is more wide open than ever, partly because preseason favorite UCLA has imploded. Arizona, Washington and Cal are legitimate contenders, but imperfect. Oregon State and Oregon are hoping for something good. No one else can make a case.

Against that backdrop, Stanford appears legitimate. There is size and depth, young talent and a veteran presence. There's no better example of the team's chemistry than senior Jarrett Mann, a two-year starter at point guard now contributing off the bench while sophomore Aaron Bright emerges as the team's top scorer.

"Jarrett hasn't blinked one time. But we don't really have per se the five guys who are starting for us. Our team isn't built that way," Dawkins said. "We can start different lineups based on who we're competing against and what we want to get done out there."

A staple in the lineup is freshman guard Chasson Randle, averaging 11.2 points -- second-most of any first-year player in the Pac-12. "He has a calmness about him that's beyond his age," Dawkins said. "His teammates have helped him."

There might be more help on the way. Injuries have slowed two of the team's most talented players -- sophomores Anthony Brown (knee) and Dwight Powell (ankle/heel). Gradually, they are mending.

"I'm excited," Dawkins said. "If those kids continue to develop and emerge and play the way we think they're capable of, it means we improve as a team."

Aaron Bright wears a 24/7 megawatt smile. Always has. Even when it led misguided youth basketball coaches to tell him: You need more of a fight to you.

Even when players in Seattle's inner city taunted the biracial kid and called him "White Boy" or "Red Bone."

Even when other students at the mostly white schools he attended in the suburb of Bellevue would diss him for his hip-hop threads, for wearing his ball caps cocked over one ear, for his piercings and tattoos.

Even when he realized his dream of playing at Stanford last year, yet found himself in the middle of friction between his heralded freshman class and some upperclassmen who thought their roles were threatened.

His ready smile might be his default mode but don't be fooled. "Behind that smile is a burning fire," said Joe Harris, who played with him on Seattle's Friends of Hoop AAU team. "He's one of the most competitive people I've ever met."

Last season's Cardinal were a 15-16 team, tying for seventh in the Pac-12 with a 7-11 record. They should have been much better, Bright says. The friction "was a big part of our failure last year."

The aptly named Bright was an A-student at Bellevue High and is majoring in economics. Harvard wanted him, pitting Stanford head coach Johnny Dawkins against his former Duke backcourt mate, Crimson head coach Tommy Amaker.

#### **Center of attention**

"When Aaron's in the room, he's the center of attention; he's always lifting people's spirits," said Harris, who tried to get Bright to join him at the University of Virginia.

The two sophomore guards like to compare their numbers. Both Stanford and Virginia are 8-1. Bright leads the balanced Cardinal in scoring with a 12.2-point average; Harris is second on the Cavaliers at 12.4.

Stanford was picked in the preseason to finish sixth in the Pac-12 but has the league's best record in nonconference play. Although the preseason isn't always the best barometer, the Cardinal could be the surprise team of the conference.

#### **Making a difference**

With 2010's newcomers a year older, with Josh Owens providing muscle inside and freshman guard Chasson Randle looking mature beyond his years, Stanford is just a late-game collapse against currently top-ranked Syracuse from being undefeated. Nobody has made a bigger difference than Bright.

He's hitting 54 percent of his three-point shots. Last season, he hit 34 percent, slumping at times into the 20s. "I've never gone through slumps like that," he said.

#### **Dedicated, improved**

In the offseason, he rededicated himself, if that's the right word for someone who has been obsessed with basketball since second grade. A typical day over the summer went like this: Shoot for an hour in the morning. Spanish class for four hours. Shoot for 45 minutes to an hour. Then pickup games, followed by weightlifting. That's five or six hours of basketball-related activity a day.

"I think he's improved in all areas of his game," Dawkins said. "Last year, he wasn't ready to lead. He's really embraced that this year. He has improved his shooting and ball-handling. Last year when he was pressured, he couldn't escape guys as well as he does now. He had so much coming at him. He was spending so much time thinking about what to do. It wasn't instinctive."

Bright agrees he has improved, and he's chesty enough to think he could have had a bigger impact last season if he had gotten the chance. His minutes have jumped from 18.9 per game to 30.2, tops on a team that rotates 11 players. His confidence has grown, along with Dawkins' confidence in him. During the NBA Finals, the coach would call him to ask if he was watching the game. The answer: of course, with special attention to Mavs guard J.J. Barea, who's slightly taller than Bright.

**Sizing up things**

Bright has been 5-foot-11 since ninth grade. He thought he was on his way to 6-3. "The funny thing is, I was bigger than a lot of my friends when I was younger. I wished that I wasn't bigger than everybody. I don't think that way now."

There were times last season he wished his teammates were all on the same page. "It wasn't like the upperclassmen didn't talk to the freshmen; it wasn't like that," Bright said. But off the court, the freshmen went one way and the upperclassmen another, he said. "You can't have that." In close games, the lack of overall chemistry hurt the team, he said.

He doesn't say it, but the premature departure of junior Jeremy Green, a shooter with extraordinary range but a one-dimensional player, seems to have helped the team by causing the scoring to be distributed more evenly.

One of Bright's favorite books is "Outliers," in which author Malcolm Gladwell cites studies that show that preparation is much more important than innate talent, whatever the field. "Ten thousand hours (of practice) is the magic number of greatness," Gladwell says.

Bright is determined to get to the magic number.

**Working vacations**

When he and his mother, Cindi, went on vacations - his parents divorced 10 years ago - he would insist they find a court so he could fire 200-300 shots a day. In Maui, a door to the Lahaina Civic Center was left unlocked; he couldn't find the lights, so he propped open the door and fired off his daily quota.

In Scottsdale, Ariz., he shot in the 100-degree heat. At times, he thought he would pass out. "On the cement, it was probably 105 degrees," he said. He had to get his shots. "I feel if I'm just lying around, other people are getting better."

Each time, his mother patiently waited for him to finish shooting. "Obsessed is not even the right word to express his commitment to the game," she said.

And supportive doesn't begin to express his parents' part in his development. Cindi and her then-husband, Mark, ferried Aaron to Seattle's Rotary Boys & Girls Club since he was in the fourth grade so he could hone his game against the area's best players. They lived in Gig Harbor at the time; that meant an hour's drive each way two or three nights a week, with games all over the Seattle area on the weekends.

**Two-handed efforts**

In a recent win over North Carolina State, he scored back-to-back driving baskets off the glass, one right-handed, one left. Naturally ambidextrous, he throws and bowls left-handed, but writes, bats, golfs and shoots a basketball right-handed.

He averaged 20 points and six assists as a senior at Bellevue High, a year after leading his team to the state semifinals. "He's got an engaging personality," coach Chris O'Connor said. "I miss having him around. He's got a teachable spirit. You can get on him, and he'll come up, put his arm around you and give you a big smile."

For years, his toughness has been underestimated because of that persistent grin. "My mom always told me to smile and be friendly to everybody," he said. "When I do that, people think I'm too nice. They don't think I have a competitive swagger on the court."

Yet, opponents take note: "I'm never going to let somebody punk me on the floor," Bright said. "If it comes to that, you're going to see a different side of me."

Andrew Zimmermann wasted little time in making a memorable first impression on some folks during Stanford's November trip to New York for the Preseason NIT. ESPN analyst and former NBA head coach Jeff Van Gundy raved about his "genuine" energy, both on and off the court. Another national media member fell in love with his beard, describing it as the best in college hoops (we'll get to that later).

Meanwhile, head coach Johnny Dawkins will be equally excited if Zimmermann can maintain his current play for the entire season, which to date has been highlighted by a willingness to dive for loose balls, sacrifice his body to take charges and compete with a hard-nosed mentality.

Not content with just being labeled as a "rah rah" guy, Zimmermann has actually been a steady offensive contributor. In addition to starting eight games, the senior forward from Oostburg, Wis., is averaging 4.8 points per game while shooting 58.6 percent overall.

#### THE STUDENT on...

##### **Choosing his major of biology...**

"I've always had a love for the sciences and biology in general. A big part of it is probably my love for problem-solving. Science is really about big concepts; solving problems by learning the larger topics and then moving into something more specific. So as a freshman, it was really easy for me to pick that major. Now that I have very few classes left, I'm working in the lab. Being able to apply that broad knowledge to specific problems that can have a greater impact in the scientific or medical community in the future is really exciting for me. Hopefully I am able to turn that into a medical career, where I can have an even larger impact."

##### **Within your major, describe what you have been working on this quarter...**

"I actually work in a Regenerative Medicine lab, specifically with wound healing. So I've been able to spend a lot of time, about 30 hours a week, because I'm taking that along with one other class. It has really allowed me to actually learn what it's like to work in a lab. A lot of undergraduate students might do lab research and work just five or six hours a week. That doesn't really allow you to learn the techniques in order to be effective. So spending that time in the lab, where I can take on my own experiments instead of being under a med student who tells me what to do, has been really beneficial for actually learning the science."

##### **Majors such as economics and communication have traditionally been popular choices among the guys. Is it difficult being the only biology major on the roster?**

"Sometimes. For the most part, there are a lot of other athletes who are involved with biology or human biology. I actually see athletes from football, volleyball, and both soccer teams pretty regularly. Plus, there are definitely other non-athletes that I see in and out of class who I can bounce ideas off and talk to at any time. So it would definitely be nice if that was the case, but it's not a big deal."

#### THE ATHLETE on...

##### **Let's discuss the beard. Rob Dauster of NBCsports.com wrote in his Nov. 25 column that you possess "the best beard in college basketball."**

"I started growing the beard right before Spain. Figured I had two weeks off to see how it looked, thinking I wouldn't have it during the season. I started practicing with it, sort of waiting to see what the coaches would say. Nobody said anything. I kept it during our trip to Spain and think we grew as a team and became tougher. I see myself as a toughness player and I think that's what the coaches saw as well, and maybe liked it in the long run. That's kind of what got it started and it's still here. I've trimmed it twice, once right before we went to Spain and again when we got back from New York. Coach Dawkins said it was getting a little long. Probably the worst part is my mom and my girlfriend both don't necessarily like how long it is. My girlfriend liked it when it was shorter. My mom saw pictures of us in Spain and said she also liked it when it was shorter, but now that it's long and grizzly, she's not as big a fan."

##### **You're an example of a guy who has found his niche and really embraces the role of a high-energy player. Talking the entire game, playing with an edge, really just setting the tone.**

"I thought that was one of the things we were missing in past years. Not necessarily on an individual basis, but our team as a whole. It's something that growing up, I always found it came natural to me. Every team I've played on, talking came naturally. Defensive rotation came naturally. Hustle came naturally. So I wanted to really emphasize it and bring that intensity, and hopefully bring other guys along with it. We worked on it this spring and it's really caught on with some other guys. You can see it in the way we play defense together. I'm just happy that it's finally catching on and if that's one aspect I can bring to the team to make us better, I'm willing to do that day in and day out."

##### **Combine your reputation as a gritty, hard-nosed player with an award-winning beard, and you're likely to become a prime target for opposing teams and student sections.**

"I do like to be that guy. I like to be the guy who guards the other team's toughest player. When we watch film, Coach Dawkins will say 'this is their tough guy.' So in my head, I'm thinking, 'well, is he that tough?' So I look at it as a challenge that's been put out there. I like that. I've read that Michael Jordan would like to talk trash and be the bully, so his teammates knew they couldn't be bullied because he was the bully. Or how Larry Bird may not have talked trash but his teammates did, so he knew it was his responsibility to back them up. Having that persona on the floor is important. That way our guys know that if a screen needs to be set or there's a loose ball, it's going to happen. No other team is going to want it more than us, and that mentality is going to keep giving us confidence."

Stanford's impressive 8-1 start can be attributed to a rotation that consistently runs 10-12 players deep, allowing head coach Johnny Dawkins to employ several different combinations and matchups on any given night.

One of those early contributors has been junior guard Gabriel Harris, who has served as a key member of the Cardinal backcourt through the first nine games. A native of Birmingham, Ala., Harris has appeared in nine games off the bench and is averaging 14.4 minutes per game, which is almost double his career playing total entering this year.

Harris is averaging 3.8 points and 1.7 rebounds per game while scoring in double figures twice. Prior to this season, Harris had only reached double figures in scoring once in 43 career contests.

#### THE STUDENT on...

##### **Choosing his major of psychology?**

"Before I chose psychology, I knew my options were open and I could go in many different directions. I've always been intrigued by psychology, and how people interact with each other. I can really take it in any direction I want: business school, med school, law school. I made the decision at the beginning of last year to go into psychology."

##### **What do you enjoy most about the subject?**

"I really enjoy sports psychology and did a little more with that during my first summer. A class I really thought was interesting was the Introduction to Learning and Memory (PYSCH 45), which covered the breakdown of the decision-making part of your brain, and how your brain and body interact with each other. I'm looking at sports psychology or maybe even neuropsychology. PYSCH 1 was the introduction of psychology and that provided a good overview. Not to mention, you can definitely read the body language of your opponents a little better on the court."

##### **How do you balance school and basketball?**

"Balancing school and basketball can definitely be a challenge. For example, our first two games in the Preseason NIT were back-to-back, on Monday and Tuesday. I had a problem set due on Wednesday afternoon, so I stayed up until 2:30 the night before after our game in order to get the work done. The main thing is just trying to get as far ahead as you possibly can, and be diligent with your spare time. Managing your time, even when you're tired, is really important."

#### THE ATHLETE on...

##### **Your 70-foot buzzer-beater against Colorado State was perhaps Stanford's most memorable shot of the year so far. Walk us through it.**

"We were just trying to get the rebound first. They had a second-chance shot, and it was really fortunate that they missed the lay-up. Josh (Owens) knocked it out towards me. When I caught it, I saw the other shot clock and that I had one extra dribble. So I went around their man and I just shot it. I shot it to go in. And it went in. The main part was getting it off, but I definitely shot it to go in. I wasn't just throwing it up there."

##### **Over your first two seasons, you attempted 19 free throws combined. Through nine games this year, you're 17-23 (73.9 percent) from the charity stripe. What's been the difference?**

"Just being more physical and aggressive. The last couple years I just shied away from the physicality, but now I'm starting to embrace it. I've been talking with the coaches about where spots are that I can attack. Now that I'm getting those attempts, I feel more comfortable attacking the basket. I've even watched some tape of Jarrett (Mann) over the last two seasons and tried to see spots that worked for him as a slasher. Trying to incorporate that into my game, while keeping an attacking mentality."

##### **A knee injury back in the fall prevented you from going to Spain. What was it like to be away from your teammates during that time?**

"I was following the team every day as much as I could. Not being on the trip really hurt. I really wanted to go to Spain. My whole summer was geared to go to Spain, and be at my best while I was in Spain. So the injury at the end of the summer basically ended all my hard work and it really hurt. So I sulked for one day, powered through it and continued to rehab while you guys were gone. I had rehab for six hours a day, including weights. Even though I wanted to work hard, I wanted to work smart. I just wanted to be with my guys- that was the main thing."

**Stanford Comeback Shows It's A Contender**

Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins hasn't thought much about the Cardinal sitting atop the Pac-12 standings, but even in December, the view from above has to look awfully nice.

Preseason favorite UCLA is reeling, while conference title contenders Arizona, Cal, Oregon and Washington have all taken their lumps.

For 8-1 Stanford, things are falling into place. That much was made clear after the Cardinal erased a 12-point second-half deficit to pull off a 76-72 win against NC State at Maples Pavilion on Sunday.

One fan raised a large cutout of former football coach Jim Harbaugh's face as the Cardinal completed their comeback, and now it is Dawkins who is showing signs of turning around a program that has struggled to make an impact on the conference race since his arrival in 2008.

"Looking at long-term goals, this is one of those games that you need to punch your ticket," said Stanford forward Josh Owens, who had 19 points and 7 rebounds. "That's how Coach puts it."

Yes, Stanford is thinking about its postseason résumé. That counts as progress, as does a win in which the Cardinal defeated an ACC team when it didn't take its first lead until 3:06 remained in the game. Owens was dominant during a late 16-1 run while freshman Chasson Randle (16 points) and sophomore Aaron Bright (15 points) also came through with big moments. Other young players such as Anthony Brown (12 points) and Josh Huestis (6 points, 9 rebounds) made significant contributions off the bench.

The Cardinal beat Oklahoma State convincingly in New York, but couldn't finish off an upset bid against Syracuse in the championship game of the NIT Season Tip-Off. Beating an improved NC State team was an important result.

"It says a lot about this group," Dawkins said. "You never know how guys respond. The kids responded. It makes you feel proud.

"For us, it's a terrific win. We executed down the stretch."

But could Stanford compete for a Pac-12 title in a league that hasn't had any other teams distinguish themselves? Cal could fall out of the rankings after losing to San Diego State, leaving the Pac-12 without a Top 25 team. Before Sunday, the Cardinal had won each of its games by double-digits and had been receiving votes in the polls. Stanford could very well go into the conference season with one loss if it can beat Butler at home later this month.

Meanwhile, the Wolfpack under first-year coach Mark Gottfried was left bemoaning a second straight loss after leading late against Indiana last week as well. NC State was missing top scorer C.J. Leslie for much of the second half while he battled cramps and dehydration. Leslie had scored 14 points before halftime.

"We have to be able to play 40 minutes," said guard C.J. Williams, who scored 18 points. "Right now, we're playing 35 minutes. We're going to get that right."

Said Leslie: "We have to learn how to finish."

Stanford apparently has learned that lesson and is now showing it should be taken seriously despite being picked by the media to finish sixth.

"We don't necessarily pay attention to preseason rankings," Owens said. "We've been building since the end of the last season and the summer."

Does he consider the Cardinal a Pac-12 title contender?

"Of course. Always."



**Stanford Rallies To Defeat NC State**

Stanford's Pac-12 Conference-leading defense certainly clamped down on North Carolina State at the right time Sunday.

The Cardinal held the visiting Wolfpack to just one field goal over an eight-minute stretch late in the second half, rallying from a 12-point deficit to win 76-72 before a loud crowd of 5,871 at Maples Pavilion.

"Whenever our guys are down by that big a margin, we tell them we've still got a lot of game to play," Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said. "(We tell them) we've just got to execute better and start picking things up on defense, and in the second half we really started making plays."

Senior forward Josh Owens led Stanford (8-1) with 19 points, followed by freshman guard Chasson Randle with 16. Sophomore guards Aaron Bright and Anthony Brown added 15 and 12 points, respectively.

Stanford never led at any point until Owens made two free throws with 3:06 remaining to put the Cardinal ahead at 65-64. After that, the Cardinal never trailed, hitting 11 of 12 free throws in the final two minutes to seal the win.

"Our kids spend a lot of time practicing at the free-throw line, believe me," Dawkins said. "It was nice to see them rewarded for that, and it will continue to help our kids if we see situations like that again."

But in the end, it was the Stanford's defense -- which entered the game surrendering a Pac-12-low 54.2 points per game and holding opponents to a 38.2 percent field-goal shooting -- that ultimately hurt N.C. State (5-3).

The Cardinal, which trailed 35-31 at the half, found itself down by 12 points with 14:19 left and was down 58-49 with 8:34 to play. From that point until the game reached the final 30 seconds, a 3-pointer by Wolfpack guard C.J. Williams was the only field goal Stanford allowed.

"North Carolina State is a great offensive rebounding team," Owens said. "We weren't rebounding the way we needed to, so we started being physical and boxing out on every possession, and we just tried to limit them to one shot on every possession."

Three-pointers by Bright and Brown cut the Wolfpack's lead to six. Brown's 3-pointer sparked a 17-4 run that propelled Stanford into the lead for good and saw the Cardinal widen its lead to seven points at 71-64 with 35.4 seconds remaining.

N.C. State managed to get within three points with 7.6 seconds left, thanks in part to a three-point play by forward Richard Howell and a three-pointer by Williams, but got no closer.

The comeback was not the first time Stanford had rallied from double digits. The Cardinal was down 14-4 in the first half before fighting back to tie the game at 20 on a 3-pointer by Randle. N.C. State responded with a 9-2 run before Stanford fought back to tie the game at 31 on a three-point play by forward Josh Huestis.

"It says a lot about how our group responded, their will to win at the end of the game," Dawkins said. "You never know how your guys are going to respond until they're in that situation, but any time you can come back after being down by double digits in the second half, you can't help but feel proud of 'em."

Senior forward Andrew Zimmermann, who had started Stanford's previous eight games, did not play Sunday due to a stomach ailment.

## Stanford Shows More Strengths Than Weaknesses

The fact Stanford was the final Pac-12 team to lose this season tells you something about that league and something about the Cardinal.

Against what Johnny Dawkins said is “definitely one of the best teams in the nation,” his club played well. And dating back to Wednesday, it’s fair to say Stanford had a prideful showing in its two games at Madison Square Garden — it merely showed its inexperience and hesitancy in the big moment. It was almost as if the Cardinal was a bit surprised to be in it, amid the Orange fan-catalyzed hysteria with four minutes to go in a 60-58 game they had a lead in.

The Garden was rocking near the end; it was then that Stanford fell apart, shooting 1 for 5 with two turnovers and four fouls after the final TV timeout. Syracuse made three field goals and five free throws during the same time span.

To say Stanford lacked a go-to guy, an alpha, a floor leader in the critical stretch of the game is to be completely fair. In fact, the Cardinal’s surprise player, Aaron Bright (listed at 5-11; there’s no chance he’s within two inches of that) — who had only played in two of Stanford’s game heading into this one — was the man on the floor with the most points (13). Bright tried to make something happen, but he was overmatched, and by then the Orange knew he was coming.

“It was really tough to make plays, trying to jump down to [Josh Owens] or (Andrew) Zimmermann or whoever is down there,” Bright said. “He (Syracuse center Fab Melo) had a presence in every pass I made and every shot that I took.”

The runty ringer got rung and hung out to dry, finishing up his day with three fouls, a turnover and no made field goals in the final 6:46.

“Really, they have long arms, they’re big inside,” Stanford’s Chasson Randle said. “They really pressured us to make bad decisions sometimes. It was on us. It’s what we have to work on and improve on.”

Defensively, it got tougher and tougher as well. Maybe it was the crowd, Syracuse’s talent or just a wave of momentum that couldn’t be ultimately reversed. The Cardinal watched the Orange shot 61 percent from the field, and 44 percent from 3, in the second half.

“Before we arrived, it’s so early in the season that you don’t really know the make-up of your team, how good you can be, because it’s still early,” Dawkins. “I found out a lot about our guys during these last couple of days.”

Orange coach Jim Boeheim learned something as well: he said without the full-court press his team had, Syracuse wouldn’t have won. The team’s worked on it in practice since the start of the season, but it never had to be unleashed like it was during this game. Because of that, Dawkins realized his team’s weaknesses in the paint thereafter. The press did what it’s supposed to do in throwing the other team off its rhythm, often creating turnovers in the process.

“We didn’t get some of the things we normally get out of it,” Dawkins said. “You credit them for playing well down there in the paint. They’re physical, they’re long. And it was difficult for us to score on them down there.”

We’ve got some time to figure out how good Stanford is. It held its own against a top-five team and blew out a fringe NCAA tournament squad in Oklahoma State. That could be good enough to be top-four in the meek Pac-12.

**Syracuse Rallies To Escape Stanford, 69-63**

Kris Joseph stumbled getting up after the postgame news conference and knocked over a chair.

"Another turnover," deadpanned Syracuse coach Jim Boeheim.

It's easy to make jokes after a win, and Boeheim's latest wisecrack followed the fifth-ranked Orange's 69-63 victory over Stanford on Friday night in the championship game of the NIT Season Tip-Off at Madison Square Garden.

It didn't look like there would be much to laugh about for Syracuse as it couldn't get in front of Stanford until the Orange started to put on full-court pressure and closed the game on a 15-3 run.

"We played 40 minutes of good defense, 35 minutes of horrendous offense and 3 to 4 minutes of full-court pressure to get back in the game," Boeheim said. "They outplayed us the whole game."

Joseph had 18 points and eight rebounds and grabbed MVP honors with 38 points and 19 rebounds in the two games.

"First of all he's a senior and great leader and a terrific player," Stanford head coach Johnny Dawkins said of Joseph. "He stepped up and made big plays and he's done that before. We tried to limit his touches, but I'll tell you what, he hit some tough shots. We defended him well, but he finishes around the basket as well as any young man I've seen."

The Orange (6-0) were never able to make a run against Stanford until the game's final 4 minutes, when they made all five of their shots from the field and five of seven free throws. They forced the Cardinal (5-1) into 24 turnovers, including three in the closing stretch against the pressure.

"We just went back to what was working down the stretch," Joseph said. "We played well. We played hard and came out with the win."

Aaron Bright had 13 points for Stanford, which led 60-54 with 4:27 to go on two free throws by Chasson Randle.

Brandon Triche, who finished with 11 points, started the Orange's big run with a drive. C.J. Fair followed with a three-point play after a turnover and Joseph gave Syracuse the lead for good, 61-60, with a banked jumper with 2:54 to go.

Joseph was asked if he called "glass" before the shot.

"If your friends ask you, you say 'Definitely,' " he said sheepishly, "but I didn't call it."

He said he was chosen MVP because "my teammates were able to get me the ball. We all should have shared it. We all played outstanding, not just me."

Scoop Jardine added 14 points for the Orange, and Fair and Dion Waiters, the two reserves who led the semifinal win over Virginia Tech, both had 10 points. Syracuse shot 46.7 percent for the game from the field (28 of 60), including 17 of 28 (60.7 percent) in the second half.

"In the second half we went back with the two guards who played so well the other night," Boeheim said of Fair and Waiters, who are both sophomores.

Randle had 12 points for the Cardinal, who beat Oklahoma State in the semifinals, while John Gage added a career-high 10, six more than he scored all season.

Stanford struggled against Syracuse's 2-3 zone, but it was controlling the ball rather than making shots that did in the Cardinal. They shot 42.9 percent from the field (24 of 56), but their 24 turnovers were converted into 25 points by Syracuse. The Cardinal outrebounded the Orange 36-34 and that led to a 16-11 advantage in second-chance points.

"It's awful. It's never good when you lose, especially when you were up the whole game," Bright said. "Syracuse played great down the stretch and we weren't able to make the same plays."

The crowd of 8,477 seemed to be waiting for a Syracuse run that would keep Stanford at bay, but it didn't happen until the final minutes when the Orange's speed and size suddenly became a problem for the Cardinal.

**Zimmermann Sports Best Beard In College Hoops**

There are a lot of reasons that college is one of the greatest times of a young man's life.

You find yourself as person. You discover your calling in life. You figure out what you want to do to earn a living. And that's to say nothing of the acceptability of the rampant alcoholism and utter lack of responsibility that exists between the end of classes on Thursday and the start of class on Monday morning every week.

But the best part? Being able to avoid shaving for three months without having to worry about a condescending bosses or disapproving clients.

Enter Andrew Zimmermann, a 6-foot-8, 230-pound senior forward for the Stanford Cardinal who sports college basketball's most impressive facial follicles:

"Its just something that started before [our trip to] Spain," Zimmermann said while his team was participating in the Preseason NIT Final Four in New York City over Thanksgiving. "It makes me look tougher and they respect me because of that."

Zimmermann started growing the beard in mid-August, before Stanford went on their 11-day tour of Spain. And while he's gotten the beard trimmed once since then, he hasn't yet decided how long he's going to let the beard get; he figures that, eventually, Stanford head coach Johnny Dawkins is going to ask him to get a trim.

"I'm worried we're at the point where coach will say 'ehh, its a little too long,'" Zimmermann said.

If Dawkins is superstitious, he won't. Heading into Friday's NIT Final against Syracuse, Stanford is 5-0 on the season and playing well enough be thought of as a potential sleeper in a wide-open Pac-12. Zimmermann's had success from an individual standpoint as well, taking advantage of the minutes made available by the ankle injury suffered by Dwight Powell. Zimmermann has started all five games for the Cardinal, finishing with a season-high seven points in Wednesday's win over Oklahoma State.

"I think if we keep winning and playing well, it will have to stay," Zimmermann said, although he tried to downplay the idea that the beard is a good luck charm. "I think the way we play when we play hard, its luck in itself."

"Its a toughness look, which is something I try to play by and do on the court," Zimmermann said. He's an emotional leader and a glue guy for this Stanford team. Every defensive possession, he can easily be heard calling out screens and talking teammates through their rotations. The beard helps him embody his role.

"This is just a symbol of what we want to do," Zimmermann said. "Not caring what other people think [about how we look], just doing what we gotta do."

**Owens Leads Stanford Past Oklahoma State, 82-67**

Josh Owens got off to a great start in his first game at Madison Square Garden.

The 6-foot-8 senior forward made his first nine shots from the field and finished with 21 points to lead Stanford to an 82-67 victory over Oklahoma State on Wednesday night in the semifinals of the NIT Season Tip-Off.

"In our huddle before the game I told the team it doesn't matter if we're at the Garden, back at Stanford or in a playground, we had to come out and try to win," he said. "It was a great experience to win here."

Owens, a native of Kennesaw, Ga., then revealed he had spent time around Madison Square Garden—if not in it.

"Usually when I'm at 34th Street and Seventh Avenue I'm getting a train to New Jersey," he said.

Stanford (5-0) will play No. 5 Syracuse, which beat Virginia Tech 69-58, for the championship on Friday night.

The Cardinal had their best game from beyond the 3-point line this season.

"We think we can shoot the ball so it wasn't really an emphasis tonight," Stanford coach Johnny Dawkins said. "We spaced the floor and got good looks. We always stay in character, tell them to be ready when those shots present themselves and for the most part we took good shots."

Chasson Randle added 17 points and Aaron Bright had 15 for the Cardinal, who took control with an 18-0 run that spanned both halves.

Stanford scored the last six points of the first half to take a 46-35 lead and the Cardinal opened the second half on a 12-0 run. They hit four of their nine 3-pointers during the spurt.

Le'Bryan Nash had 16 points and Markel Brown added 11 for the Cowboys (3-1), who had their four-game winning streak at Madison Square Garden snapped.

"It's just our being a young basketball team," Cowboys coach Travis Ford said. "We're not picking up things very quickly. All these things are great experience. Sometimes you have to learn the hard way. We're learning a lesson the hard way tonight."

This was Oklahoma State's first game since women's basketball coach Kurt Budke and his assistant, Miranda Serna, were killed along with two others in a plane crash last week. The players all had the number 4 on the left shoulder of their uniforms.

"I don't want to make any excuses on that. (Stanford) deserves better than that. Our guys could just never turn it on," Ford said. "It's been a long week, but I think our guys were ready to go."

Stanford came into the game shooting 32.8 percent from 3-point range and the most 3s the Cardinal had in one game was seven against UC Davis. The Cardinal were 5 of 10 from long range in the first half, with Bright going 3 for 5. Randle matched his effort in the second half and Stanford was 9 of 19 from beyond the arc in the game.

It was another solid defensive effort by the Cardinal, who hadn't allowed an opponent to reach 60 points in their first four games.

"Especially early we did a good job defensively, getting in the passing lanes and causing turnovers," Dawkins said.

Stanford's lead reached as much as 28 points, the last time at 74-46 on a basket by Randle with 7:46 to play.

"Our focus was for a team effort and we really played well together and shared the ball, which we've been working on," Dawkins said. "There were stretches where we played really, really good defense."

Oklahoma State, which won this tournament in 1991, is 18-10 at Madison Square Garden.

### **What are the keys to success this season?**

I think one of the things that we have is depth and not much separation. The good thing about that is we have a number of guys that can contribute on any given night. The thing that we have to improve on is developing some go-to guys, guys that we feel on a nightly basis are the guys that we can play off of. Josh Owens is one of those guys. We don't have a returning player that has had to carry the load on this team. So they're all trying to find their way, trying to get a better feel for their roles and also trying to figure out how they can help this team win.

### **Early on, were there any signs of guys saying, 'If Jeremy Green was here . . . '?**

Fortunately, we had those early six games when we were on a foreign tour in Spain and he wasn't with us. I think the guys should be somewhat over that. I'm sure at times, guys have a sense that he could be here with us. But you know what, our kids haven't boarded up, and we think we have a good team in the locker room and great leadership. So we're excited about this season and we're getting better.

### **Do you adapt to the players or do they adapt to you?**

I try and make the players change and adapt to what I do. I understand the game changes and I am no longer a young man playing it, and so it's a different game than when I first used to compete. But I still think the same values, standards, and principles apply with regards to leadership in that role. Absolutely, the players are going to play the way I would like for them to play out there on the floor for them to be successful. I think it's important for the players to follow the coach's lead and what he wants. I've been fortunate looking at our guys this season--I think they understand that--the value of going in that direction.

### **Coming from a program like Duke, where winning is almost a foregone conclusion, have you had to temper your expectations at Stanford?**

I'm a competitor. I don't get much sleep. I want to win. I think it's befitting of this program and everything this institution represents. We want to do our part. I'm always preaching that to our players about our responsibility to the institution. They understand that. My expectations are always going to be high. They're as high as any top-five team in this nation and they always will be. The day that doesn't happen for me is the day I need to go do something else. I compete to win, and I want my team to reflect that. And I understand it has to be a process at times, but it doesn't mean I have to like the process. I value it. I understand it's a necessary thing. But I want my guys to think that every time we step on the floor, we have the capability of beating anyone we face. I want that mentality through all of my kids, through all of my teams.

### **You coached at Duke with Mike Krzyzewski. Has he been your biggest coaching influence?**

He's been my biggest influence. I worked with him and coached with him for over a decade. I've had an opportunity to work under a number of different coaches, but no one has influenced my coaching career or impacted my life as much as Coach K. The main thing I always want to instill in my players, and he instilled in us, is just the highest of standards whenever we step on the court, and that's with everything we do. With how you play, how you carry yourself on the court. You're a direct reflection of the university and the guys in the locker room, and so you have to go out there and understand you're always representing them. Your play says a lot about who you are and how we are as a program. That's very important for me, to make sure our kids are always representing themselves the right way.

### **How often do you talk to Coach K?**

I speak to him regularly. I'm always interested in knowing what he's doing with his family, and we talk some basketball, too. Of course we're going to get into that. He's a terrific resource and he's a great friend. I called him when he tied the coaching record and called him again when he broke it. I was really happy for him. He used to say, 'Always be careful whose bus you get on.' I will never forget that. When I left a message, I said, 'Coach, I'm happy I was on your bus. I was on the best bus ever. Thank you for all the memories.' He took me on an incredible journey. It's true. It was a wonderful experience and I loved every minute of it. It made me better.

### **Are you a basketball junkie?**

I would say I'm a basketball junkie. I watch it all the time, or am involved with our team and what we're doing pretty much all the time. I love what I do. That's why I know I'm very fortunate. I just love coaching and helping to develop young men. I had a terrific mentor who did that for me and it's kind of my way of giving back to a game that's been terrific in my life.

### **Your freshman point guard Chasson Randle has great raw talent, but he's still young. Is that part of your challenge, to teach him and help him grow as a player every day?**

Absolutely. Chasson is going through the natural maturation process like any freshman. He has talent and he's going to have some terrific moments this season, but he still has to develop. He's learning a lot. He's playing point for us and off guard. So everything he's having to learn is almost doubled up because he's learning it from both spots on the floor. On the defensive end, all the different concepts and terminology--the language that we use compared to what he did in high school are night and day. So it's a big learning curve right now, but he's going to get it. He works hard and he's conscientious. We have an amazing belief in him and he has a terrific belief in himself. It's a matter of him working through these games and learning from his mistakes.

### **Did you have an idol growing up?**

I would say my dad. He was the one guy that stands out in my life. He was a Green Beret and just taught me about work ethic, discipline, character and loyalty. It all started there for me. I was fortunate because I went and played for another guy in the military--Coach K. I've been put in a position in my life where I've had to lead a very disciplined life and approach to things and I'm very fortunate that I've had that. Those are things that have helped make me better. I'm very thankful to him for that.



**What has been your biggest adjustment coming to Stanford?**

The transition off the court has gone smoothly. Everyone here has welcomed me with open arms. They've made me feel at home here, which is terrific. My biggest adjustment has been what we're trying to do with our team and where I envision our program. As far as the culture here, coming from where I came from, there hasn't been much adjustment. Is it different? Yes. Both places have been amazing and I've loved being part of the family here.

**Name a person you would like to meet?**

A couple guys I would enjoy meeting, just because of their approach to life and what they have accomplished, would be Warren Buffett and Bill Gates. Two guys who I think have done it differently, but have been very, very successful. You learn a lot about people through their actions. Both of those guys have been amazing at what they have accomplished, but both are amazingly generous. I really admire them for that. They've been two of the biggest successes and two of the biggest givers. Their actions speak louder than words.

**How do you relax from coaching?**

The one thing I'll do to try and decompress is I'll try to go out with the family on family night. Sometimes we go to the movies. I'll go out with my wife and my kids, if they want to go. It's almost like a date night with my wife. Other than that, I'll watch the news quite a bit. I was a political science major, so I like to see what's going on. I'll watch games, especially this time of year, because there are so many on.

**How important is patience in your job? Do you have to remind yourself that you are working with teenagers?**

That's tough for me, to be quite honest. Like I always tell our guys, 'Being young is not an excuse.' And I believe that. We have got to grow and mature. Absolutely we have a lot of young guys. But you want them to know that, 'Hey, age is just a number and you can still go out there and win and be successful.' I do understand that there is a certain amount of patience you have to have with the kids and I try to find that balance with them. I want them to enjoy winning. I don't want to put them in a position where I'm on them so much that they can't even enjoy a win. But, I don't want them to enjoy it too long.

**What do you miss most about Duke?**

That was home for me for a long time. More than half my life, to be quite frank. Probably a lot of friends and family, first and foremost. A few barbecue restaurants. Bullocks Bar-B-Cue. I've been very fortunate. I think a lot of people wish they were in my shoes and had been at that institution and this institution. It doesn't get better than that.

**What do you listen to in the car?**

I listen to music sometimes, but I'm not a big radio person. There's a good chance I'm on my phone, because that's a good chance to make some recruiting calls. I'm on my phone quite a bit. I listen to some R&B and jazz. I also listen to CNN or MSNBC.

**How do you feel about recruiting? Is it a grind?**

I enjoy recruiting, because I enjoy getting to meet people and meeting their families and meeting the young men that will represent this university very well. We've been very fortunate. The kids that we've identified are kids that fit our culture and I think will be terrific student-athletes for us.

**How close is this program to being a consistent contender for the Pac-12 Championship?**

We feel we're starting to put the pieces in place. We're starting to add to our depth now, which is very important for our success. And I think the type of young men that we are recruiting can impact us in our conference. Our most talented players are freshmen and sophomores, and we have a number of them that can really contribute. And we're bringing in some young kids that we think will complement that group very well.

We just have to stay the course. We can't let up with our standards and work ethic--have to continue to push them. Pressure makes diamonds. You have to push them beyond where they think they can go. And they have to allow us to do that. That's why we have really, really high standards for what we want to do. I think our kids--especially this year--understand that more than they did last year. There was so much coming at them. They were a heralded class and everybody had high expectations, and we had expectations. They realized that there is a leap from high school to college. Not everyone just seamlessly jumps in there and plays. Matter of fact, it's probably less than one or two percent of the kids in the country that will go into a college and influence it to that level, at any institution. So I think when our kids went through that, it was tough. And then we were driving them. We wanted to get better.

I spent so much time in practice teaching. Eight of my guys, it was almost like teaching them from scratch. Josh Owens had only been with me for a year, then he was out for a year, then back. Then you had six freshmen. It was a lot of teaching and just trying to get the culture right. And then we didn't have any seniors, no one to really show these guys what we wanted. So it was difficult for them. From that experience we grew closer. When we started the spring, we were as focused as we'd ever been. That led us into a great summer. We're still in the process of developing. We have so much growing to do. We can get so much better. I see it. I kind of envision where they could be. It's just a matter of going through the process of every day coming to work, coming to get better and making no excuses about it. And it will happen. It's fun watching our young players and our leaders figure it out. We're in the stage of learning how to win. That doesn't happen overnight. You keep executing and believing.

**Randle “Definitely Excited” About MSG Trip

Basketball has taken Chasson Randle’s game to three continents and countless gyms across the globe. So when it comes time for the Stanford freshman and 2011 Rock Island graduate to pick his favorite playing venue, he needed a few seconds.

“That’s a tough one,” Randle said before a slight pause. “Probably the Orlando Magic’s arena (Amway Center).”

In a few days, that memory may change.

By winning their first two games in the Dick’s Sporting Goods NIT Preseason Tip-Off last week, the Cardinal advanced to the tournament semifinals at New York’s Madison Square Garden. That means Randle will play in the self-proclaimed “World’s Most Famous Arena” in just his fifth collegiate game.

“I’m definitely excited,” Randle said by phone on Saturday afternoon. “All the great players who played the game have been to Madison Square Garden. To say I’m going there and I will be playing there is amazing.”

MSG. The Garden. The big-time stage.

Less than a year ago, Randle spent several of his nights playing at Moline’s Wharton Field House, the Rock Island Fieldhouse or United Township’s Panther Den. Now, the 6-foot-1 guard makes his debut on a national scale as Stanford meets Oklahoma State Wednesday at 6 p.m. on ESPN2.

On their way to the semifinals, the Cardinal topped Fresno State and Colorado State on consecutive nights with Randle earning the start in both double-digit victories.

“It was exciting. Definitely exciting,” Randle said. “To have that feeling and the fact you know you’re going to be playing at a great venue, it was a great feeling. Everyone was excited. But we still have to take care of business.”

For Randle, his top priority is winning. Playing in the game’s biggest venue will not change that outlook, saying countless times during a five-minute interview that the trip to New York is all about two victories and nothing else.

Stanford enters the game with momentum, having four consecutive wins by at least 12 points. A factor in the unblemished start is Randle, the starting point guard in each game.

“It’s been good. I can’t say it’s been bad or anything,” Randle said. “I’m taking everything day by day and learning as I go. I’m still confident in my abilities and what I can do on the floor. I’m just happy winning games. That’s the most important thing.”

Along the way, Randle is adjusting to life as a college point guard and understanding his role on a veteran team. He opened the season with 15- and 10-point performances before what most Randle followers would consider sub-par nights.

Randle scored seven points -- the first time he did not reach the double-figure mark in 40 in-season games -- and committed four turnovers in the win against Colorado State last Tuesday.

Three days later, he scored a season-low three points on five shot attempts, but had four rebounds, three assists, three steals, one block and one turnover in a 70-49 win at California-Davis.

“I decided to find gaps and find other guys,” said Randle, who scored fewer than four points twice in his Rocky career. “I wanted to play the game off instincts and take it easy. I was trying to help my team win.”

Highly regarded out of Rocky for his talents, but also for a winning background, Stanford hopes its prized recruit can find that magic touch on Wednesday night and earn a fifth consecutive victory.

When the lights are brightest, Randle appears at his best. Yet, there is no need for him to flip a switch with a national audience watching.

“I shouldn’t be one of those players who turns it off and on,” Randle said. “I need to be a steady player. I’m not going to do anything I’m not capable of doing. I’m looking forward to playing Oklahoma State.”

What about Madison Square Garden?

“It’s pretty cool,” Randle said. “It’s always been in my plans. To do it early, it’s great. I’m excited for myself and my team. I’m ready to play.”

**Stanford Must Keep Maturing**

The six ducklings are a year older, but whether Stanford's greater experience translates to improvement in the Pac-12 standings will depend on how much firepower the Cardinal can muster.

Head coach Johnny Dawkins' large 2010 incoming class had talent but not a lot of bulk. When it comes to matching girth with people such as UCLA's 6-foot-10, 305-pound Joshua Smith or Oregon State's 6-7, 280-pound Joe Burton, the Cardinal looked anemic.

They have been picked to finish sixth in the expanded conference and will rely on last season's All-Freshman team picks Anthony Brown (8.7 points per game) and Dwight Powell (8.1) to increase their scoring.

"Last year, our young kids got meaningful minutes," Dawkins said. "That helped our guys grow. But I also understand that the bulk of those kids are still sophomores."

Last season, the Cardinal finished 7-11 (tied for seventh in the Pac-10) and 15-16 overall without a senior on the roster. All-Pac-10 junior guard Jeremy Green, the team's leading scorer (16.7), left school for an uncertain future in the pros.

The pressure will be on senior forward Josh Owens to provide the leadership and rebounding. The leading returning scorer at 11.6 points per game, he led the team on the boards (6.5) after missing the 2009-10 season because of an undisclosed medical condition.

Stanford ranked second in defense in the conference last season and will need to maintain that toughness as it tries to avoid its fourth straight second-division finish. Dawkins, in his fourth season, knows his team will have a hard time overcoming UCLA, Arizona, Cal and Washington, but a more balanced offense should help.

"I think we'll be a better defensive team," Dawkins said. "We have the potential to be a better offensive team, too. We won't have the same look we had last year.

"We had a focal point in Jeremy. We don't have that luxury. Because of that, we'll do it more by committee. I don't think you'll see one guy lead us in scoring 20 games out of 31" (as Green did).

The addition of freshman guard Chasson Randle, the lone recruit this year, finally gives Dawkins a player who can create off the dribble as well as hit shots from the outside. Randle probably will split time initially with sophomore Aaron Bright. Jarrett Mann, who had to play the point last season out of necessity, moves to shooting guard.

Mann is an excellent defensive player but a poor outside shooter, so the 2-guard spot might fall to Bright, junior Gabriel Harris or Brown, a swingman with a nice shooting stroke. Brown played for the United States in the Under-19 World Championships in Latvia over the summer.

Last year's freshman class also included 6-11 Stefan Nastic, who played only five games before being sidelined with a stress fracture in his foot. John Gage, a 6-9 sophomore, needs to add an inside presence to his fine outside shooting. Forward Josh Huestis is still looking for a role.

Nastic should provide board power with senior big men Jack Trotter, who was elected president of Stanford's senior class, and hustling Andrew Zimmermann.

## Can Stanford Hoops Regain Its Status?

The talk at Stanford isn't about treading water.

When Cardinal coach Johnny Dawkins had Skip Kenney, the school's Hall of Fame men's swimming coach, address his players before basketball practice on Monday afternoon, the topic was the importance of team chemistry.

Kenney's credentials? His teams have captured 30 consecutive Pac-10 championships. Given the Farm's long history of producing NCAA titles (101 in all) and top scholars, the basketball team can simply learn by osmosis that excellence at the school is an expectation.

"We always have high expectations here," said Dawkins, whose team departs for its preseason tour of Spain on Saturday. "That's the nature of this university in every facet, whether it's academically, whether it's athletically. You look at the programs here and the success they've had. That goes along with the territory.

"For me, it's more exciting. You want to have expectations. That means that you have a chance to accomplish something. For us, having those expectations going into our fourth season, we're excited about the challenge."

But can the rest of the campus say the same? While the Cardinal features plenty of young talent and is poised to improve in the first year of the Pac-12, the program is looking to rebound following a 15-16 campaign that resulted in its first back-to-back losing seasons in 25 years.

Not long ago, the bouncy floor at sold-out Maples Pavilion represented the program's pulsating vibe during a Mike Montgomery era that saw Stanford reach the NCAA tournament for 10 consecutive years.

Mark Madsen did a little shake after his game-winning dunk in a comeback win against Rhode Island that sent the Cardinal to the 1998 Final Four. First Daughter Chelsea Clinton used to cheer on her school from the student section. Tiger Woods attended games, including the one against Arizona that ended on Nick Robinson's midcourt buzzer-beater that was so memorably captured by Brent Musberger and Dick Vitale. Back when the team earned numerous No. 1 national rankings, the tree mascot simply danced with more of a spring in its step.

But since Trent Johnson left for LSU following a trip with twins Brook and Robin Lopez to the Sweet 16 in 2008, Dawkins has yet to lead Stanford to the NCAA tournament. And in a complete role reversal, the school's football program went from laughingstock to the talk of the town during Jim Harbaugh's four-year reign that yielded a pair of Heisman Trophy finalists (RB Toby Gerhart, QB Andrew Luck) and upset wins against powerhouse USC. In Harbaugh's final game, Luck and the Cardinal capped off a 12-1 season with a win in the Orange Bowl.

When the Cardinal open their season Saturday against San Jose State, they will do so as the nation's No. 7 team, their highest preseason rank since 1950.

What a difference a few years make.

"The buzz was Stanford basketball," said Cardinal radio color analyst Drew Shiller, a Burlingame, Calif. native who played for Johnson and Dawkins. "It ruled on campus. The players walked around and were recognizable. That has totally shifted to football. It's all about Andrew Luck. It's all about the Orange Bowl. Look what Harbaugh did. They deserve it. Basketball does not have the same stature.

"In the last five years, the thunder of the program has gone away. Winning -- first and foremost -- will get that back."

While the football team ranks seventh nationally, the men's basketball team hasn't finished higher than seventh in the Pac-10 since Dawkins arrived from Duke. The Cardinal has been dealt numerous setbacks. Despite Landry Fields developing into the conference's scoring and rebounding champion in 2009-10, the team was hampered by the loss of key forward Josh Owens for the entire year due to an undisclosed medical condition. Last season, Stanford played 10 freshmen and had no seniors. In the spring, leading scorer Jeremy Green was placed on academic suspension and then unexpectedly turned pro.

As an example of how the program could overcome, Dawkins has at times pointed to the success over at Stanford Stadium and noted how the football team persevered through the lean years with commitment and hard work. "They, too, had that period where they turned it around," Owens said. "They stayed the course and in three or four years they kept making progress, kept making progress, and boom. Like Coach always preaches, 'Stay the course, follow the plan and it'll work out.'"

Dawkins isn't accustomed to losing. He was the national player of the year in 1986 while leading Duke to the national championship game. He eventually coached under Mike Krzyzewski, helping Duke win it all in 2001.

What Dawkins has done well is recruit. He brought in ESPN's 18th-ranked recruiting class in 2010 and then added top-100 recruit Chasson Randle as a freshman to this year's team. Stanford gave Dawkins a two-year contract extension in July, and now the pressure is on after a couple of rebuilding seasons.

"For me, it's one of those things where I'm never satisfied with being just mediocre," Dawkins said. "It's not what I come from. It's not what I know. And so, of course, it's tough. It's tough. But you also have to realize there is a process. It just doesn't happen overnight.

"We've paid the price with some of the things we've gone through. From that, I think we're building a stronger chemistry. We're building our culture through all the things that we're facing. Because of that, things will be better when that time comes. Then we can turn the corner."

Having a team stocked with returning players that is only missing Green is reason for optimism. The 6-foot-8 Owens came back from his year away to average 11.6 points and a team-leading 6.5 rebounds, and he has senior leadership capability as the last vestige of Johnson's Sweet 16 team.

After making the Pac-10 all-freshman team, swingman Anthony Brown and forward Dwight Powell are looking to make a jump, with Brown gaining valuable experience on the USA Under-19 world championship team this summer. Point guard Aaron Bright is another player in the sophomore class that showed potential and cracked the starting lineup last season. Randle is a combo guard who is expected to receive major minutes in a backcourt that also includes senior Jarrett Mann.

Dawkins also hopes to get contributions from players coming back from season-ending injuries. Stefan Nastic, a 6-foot-11 redshirt freshman, should be able to play during the trip to Spain after being limited to five games last season by a stress fracture in his right foot. Andy Brown is expected to be available in October after the junior twice tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee, forcing him to redshirt the past two seasons.

"It's a good recipe for Stanford to really break out and finish in the upper-echelon of the Pac-12," said Shiller, who played for the Cardinal in Dawkins' first two seasons. "He's recruited well, has brought players along and developed them. Everything seems to be there, but he needs to now get the results."

Randle, a big part of Stanford's future, doesn't remember much about the Montgomery era, but he is old enough to remember watching the success of the program on television back home in Illinois.

"I always thought I would come to Stanford," said Randle, who rooted for Josh Childress and the Lopez twins. "They sent the first questionnaire I ever got. I was in the backyard shooting and counting down: '3 ... 2 ... 1 ... Stanford wins.'"

Stanford wins? After back-to-back losing seasons, that would certainly be a welcome change on The Farm.

"We've had back-to-back losing seasons," Randle said, "and everybody's mentality is, 'We got to get it done this year, make a statement, bring things back to where they were before.'"

Willing to assist the travel party in Spain with everything from rebounding during shooting drills to loading the team bus, Madsen tagged along for the cultural experience (no, he did not dance the Flamenco) and offered a few takeaways on the trip.

**www.gostanford.com: It's been a blast for the guys to have you around over the last 10 days.**

"I think getting to know the players on this team has been a huge highlight of this trip for me, personally. Whereas I basically knew all of them already, there's a stronger bond there now. We're all students. They're undergrads and I'm a graduate student, so there is a familiarity there. There is a relationship. They remind me what it's like to be an undergrad and I'm able to share my experience at the graduate level."

**www.gostanford.com: Head coach Johnny Dawkins and his staff have made a concerted effort to connect with alumni. Whether it's Adam Keefe having the team over for dinner in L.A., Brevin Knight speaking to the team or guys like Josh Childress, Landry Fields and Robin Lopez stopping by practice, alumni of the program are always welcomed back.**

"I think when Johnny arrived in 2008 that was one of his points of emphasis. I think Coach Dawkins has done a great job of keeping alumni involved and really having an open door policy, as far as that goes. When anyone comes back, they are welcome with opened arms, embraced by the staff and made to feel part of the Stanford basketball family. I think Johnny has done a great job of bridging the gap between the different eras, and that includes pre-Montgomery players. Again, it's a warm embrace, a feeling of family. It's a sense of "this is our home and we are all here together."

**www.gostanford.com: This was such a valuable trip for this team. Especially with a young squad looking to establish an identity, getting the opportunity to square off against some of the best competition in the world. What did you think?**

"I look at the fact that we just played against six professional level teams, two of which, Real Madrid and FC Barcelona Regal, have beaten NBA squads. We were leading the game against Real Madrid. Now they might not have had their full complement of players, but, hey, the bottom line is our guys competed at the pro level against some of the best athletes in the world. So from that standpoint, it was quite inspirational to see. It was an opportunity for them to use their craft and their skills against those pro players. But it also was an opportunity to learn from these pro players at the international level, because have a lot of tricks and those guys were definitely looking to beat us. For these teams, it's a must-win situation because it's the start of their preseason. These teams were looking to make a statement and hit us with their best punch. We fought them blow for blow and played them really tough."

**www.gostanford.com: How important is a trip like this in regards to developing chemistry?**

"Based on what I saw in the games, and it was only six games, this was a group that came together and really learned how to play with each other. The word chemistry is a common word in sports and we all hear it. I really think a lot of chemistry was developed on this trip, not only on the court but also off the court. Both are important. When I look back at my time with the Lakers, during some of those years when we were really winning, we would have team dinners that everyone attended. Even during the playoffs. Of course, guys were busy with outside commitments at times but still made it a point to build that bond and interact with each other. So I really think having that chemistry will be huge for us this season."

**www.gostanford.com: On a personal note, it must have been nice for you to return to Spain (Madsen spent two years in Spain on a mission after high school).**

"It's funny, because as we were in Barcelona, I started counting the number of times I had been to Spain. I've traveled internationally but not extensively. And I realized this was my fifth time coming to Spain. I came here before my mission; my parents brought the whole family out here for a vacation. Three weeks after that, I learned that I would be coming on my mission to Spain. Then I came over here with a college basketball team, a USA team, and I also visited here with some friends a few years ago. So now it's my fifth time. I just feel lucky and fortunate that Stanford decided to invite me along. That I'm part of the Stanford family and was able to return to a special country that has meaning for me personally. I was in a gift shop and I realized that in all my prior trips to Spain, I've never really bought any souvenirs. So I bought six framed replica paintings of Southern Spain where I lived. Being able to be here as a part of the Stanford program, with the players and coaches, it just made for a very memorable trip. I feel very fortunate to be part of the Stanford basketball family."



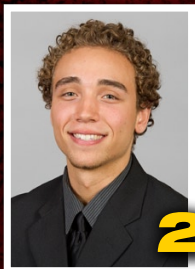
