TIP-OFF TUESDAY

In the earliest start to a season in the 104-year history of the men's basketball program, Stanford will open the 2018-19 campaign on Tuesday (Nov. 6) against Seattle at 7 p.m. at Maples Pavilion.

HOW TO FOLLOW

Tuesday's game will be televised on Pac-12 Bay Area (not the Pac-12 Networks national channel), as Guy Haberman and Ben Braun have the call. The Stanford Cardinal Sports Network will provide a live audio broadcast on GoStanford.com and the TuneIn app, with Stanford alums John Platz and Scott Reiss on the call.

EARLIEST START IN PROGRAM HISTORY

The Nov. 6 season opener marks the earliest start to a season in the program's 104-year history. The earliest date on the calendar the Cardinal had previously opened a season was Nov. 8, 2013, a 72-68 victory over Bucknell.

CARDINAL IN SEASON OPENERS

Stanford owns an 85-18 all-time record in season openers. The Cardinal has won its last eight and 28 of its last 30 openers, with the only exceptions coming in 2009 at San Diego and in 2005 against UC Irvine.

CARDINAL SNAPSHOT

Stanford returns two starters (Daejon Davis and KZ Okpala) and nine letterwinners from last season's squad that won 19 games and reached the postseason for the first time in three years.

Davis, who started all 33 games he played in, was named to the five-member All-Pac-12 Freshman Team last season after averaging 10.7 points and 4.8 assists. He broke Brevin Knight's freshman assist record with 160 last season.

Okpala, who started 21 of the 23 games he played in, averaged 10.0 ppg last year. The forward poured in a career-best 23 points against UCLA in the Pac-12 Tournament.

YOUNG SQUAD

Among the 15 players on the 2018-19 Stanford roster, 11 are in either their first or second year playing. Only senior Josh Sharma and juniors Marcus Sheffield, Trevor Stanback and Rodney Herenton enter 2018-19 with at least two seasons of playing under their belt. In last week's exhibition contest against Sonoma State, first- and second-year players accounted for 78.7 percent of the scoring (59 out of 75 points).

BACK-TO-BACK TOP-20 RECRUITING CLASSES

Stanford's heralded freshman class will make its debut on Tuesday. The Cardinal's class of new-comers is ranked as high as No. 20 nationally, giving the program back-to-back top-20 recruiting classes. Stanford's 2017 recruiting class of Daejon Davis, KZ Okpala, Oscar da Silva and Isaac White was ranked as high as No. 8 nationally.

HAASE INCREASES TEAM WIN TOTALS EACH SEASON

Jerod Haase has led his teams to increased win totals in each of his first six seasons as a head coach. In his first season as a head coach in 2012-13, Haase guided UAB to 16 wins, eventually posting 26 wins and a second consecutive postseason berth in his final year with the Blazers in 2015-16. After Stanford earned 14 wins in his first season on The Farm in 2016-17, he led the Cardinal to 19 wins and an NIT berth last season.

AGAINST SEATTLE

Stanford is 5-0 all-time against Seattle. The teams last met on the hardwood on Nov. 28, 2012 at Maples Pavilion, a 68-57 victory for the Cardinal behind a career-high 17 points from Andy Brown. Four of the five previous meetings in the all-time series have been played at home.

SCOUTING THE REDHAWKS

Seattle, out of the Western Athletic Conference, finished 20-14 overall last season. The Redhawks reached the semifinals of the WAC Tournament and played in the 2018 College Basketball Invitational. Junior guard Matej Kavas was Seattle's leading scorer last season, averaging 15.2 points. He also averaged 5.1 rebounds per contest. The Redhawks are coached by Jim Hayford, in his second season as the head coach of the program. Seattle was picked to finish third by the coaches and fourth by the media in the respective WAC preseason polls.

SOPHOMORE IMPACT

One of the top recruiting classes in school history played a big role in its first season on The Farm last year. Each member of the sophomore class started at least one game last season, and Daejon Davis, Oscar da Silva and Isaac White started together in six contests. Davis started all 33 games he played in, Okpala started 21 of the 23 contests he appeared in, da Silva started 11 games and White started nine contests. Davis (10.7 ppg) and Okpala (10.0 ppg) averaged double digits, while Davis led the Cardinal in assists (4.8 apg), White was second in three pointers (38) and da Silva was second in blocks (30).

MIRACLE AT MAPLES

Tuesday's contest features the return of the author of the "Miracle at Maples" in Seattle assistant coach Nick Robinson. On Feb. 7, 2004, Robinson hit a 35-foot running shot at the buzzer to cap a six-point comeback in the final 25 seconds and give No. 2 Stanford an 80-77 win over No. 12 Arizona at Maples Pavilion. A double Stanford graduate with a bachelor's degree in political science and a master's degree in sociology, Robinson was not only a standout player but returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach during the 2006-07 and 2007-08 seasons.

A LOOK BACK AT 2017-18

Stanford completed the 2017-18 season 19-16 overall and 11-7 in the Pac-12. The Cardinal tied for third in the conference standings, earning its highest conference finish and most conference wins since the 2007-08 season. For the first time in three years, Stanford earned a postseason berth. The Cardinal was a No. 3 seed in the postseason National Invitation Tournament, defeated BYU, 86-83, in the first round before falling to Oklahoma State, 71-65, in Stillwater, Oklahoma, in the second round.

MOST CONFERENCE WINS, HIGHEST FINISH IN 10 SEASONS

Stanford finished with 11 conference wins, its most in 10 seasons (13-5 in 2008) and five more than its 2016-17 league win total. The Cardinal tied for third in the conference, its highest finish in the standings since a second-place finish in 2008. Stanford posted at least 10 conference wins for just the third time in the last 10 seasons. In January, Stanford won five consecutive conference games for the first time in 10 seasons and posted its first conference road sweep (Washington/Washington State) in eight seasons.

2017-18 BY THE NUMBERS

Stanford's 2017-18 squad posted its highest scoring average (75.9 ppg) in 16 years, best field goal percentage (.461) in 14 years and collected the fourthmost rebounds (1,368) in a season in school history. The Cardinal led the Pac-12 in rebounding (39.1 rpg) last season.

HOME SWEET HOME

Stanford completed the 2017-18 season 14-4 at Maples Pavilion. The 14 wins were the most home victories in the past six years. The 2011-12 team won 17 home games during the regular season and 20 overall with three NIT victories at Maples Pavilion.

EXHIBITION WIN OVER SONOMA STATE

Sophomores Daejon Davis and KZ Okpala led Stanford to a 75-59 exhibition victory over Sonoma State on Oct. 30 at Maples Pavilion. Okpala led all players with 20 points, while Davis added 16 points on 6-for-10 shooting. Sophomore Oscar da Silva finished one rebound shy of a double-double with 14 points and nine boards. Freshman Cormac Ryan started the game and dished out a team-high four assists to go with nine points and six rebounds.

In just his first two seasons as Stanford's Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball, Jerod

Haase has already left a strong imprint on the program. Under his leadership, the Cardinal has instilled an invested, tough and selfless attitude that has elevated Stanford to success it hasn't enjoyed in a decade.

In his second season on The Farm, Haase guided the Cardinal to a third-place finish in the Pac-12 with 11 conference wins, the program's highest finish and most league victories in 10 seasons. Competing without two starters for half the season, Stanford won 19 games overall and earned a postseason berth for the first time in three years with a second-round appearance in the National Invitation Tournament.

In two seasons with Haase and his staff, several members of the Cardinal have earned individual accolades. Forward Reid Travis has been voted a First Team All-Pac-12 selection by the league's coaches and garnered NABC All-District laurels each of the last two seasons. Forward Dorian Pickens was named an all-conference player for his performance on the court and the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for his efforts in the classroom this past season. Point guard Daejon Davis was named to the five-member Pac-12 All-Freshman Team in 2017-18.

In two full recruiting cycles, Haase and his staff have landed top-tier classes. Stanford's 2017 recruiting class was regarded as one of the best in school history. The four-member group was rated a top-10 class nationally by many, ranked as high as eighth by Rivals. The Cardinal's 2018 class is again regarded among the best in the nation. In his first year with the Cardinal in 2016-17, Stanford posted 14 wins against one of the toughest schedules. Stanford finished in the top-10 percent among men's basketball programs in the classroom as well.

Haase was appointed Stanford's 18th men's basketball coach on March 25, 2016. At UAB, Haase led the Blazers to a regular-season Conference USA championship in 2016 and the program's 15th all-time NCAA Tournament appearance in 2015. Haase compiled an 80-53 overall record while improving the Blazers' win total every year.

Tabbed the 2016 Gene Bartow Conference USA Coach of the Year, Haase led the Blazers to a 26-5 overall record and a 16-2 conference mark while capturing their first regular-season title since 2011. Along the way, UAB

established school records for overall victories (26), conference wins (16), road wins (10) and consecutive victories (14). Also named the 2016 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) All-District Coach, Haase directed the Blazers to an NIT berth for the 12th time in school history. UAB also finished 16-0 at home in his final season at the helm of the Blazers, extending the nation's fifth-longest home winning streak to 25, while ranking among the nation's best in field goal percentage (.478 – 24th), assists per game (18.4 – 4th) and blocks per game (4th – 6.1).

Under Haase's guidance, UAB returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2015, shocking No. 3 seed lowa State, 60-59, in the second round for the Blazers' first NCAA victory since 2005. UAB reached the Big Dance after claiming the program's first Conference USA Tournament title despite being seeded No. 4. The triumph marked UAB's first league tournament title since 1987, when the Blazers won the Sun Belt Conference Tournament. More impressively, Haase successfully developed a roster comprised of 10 underclassmen – all players recruited by Haase and his staff – and finished 20-16 overall while guiding the third-youngest team in NCAA Division I.

The Blazers made impressive strides under Haase's leadership during the 2013-14 campaign, finishing 18-13 overall while notching three victories against teams that qualified for the NCAA Tournament. Of UAB's 18 victories, perhaps none were more impressive than the Blazers' 63-59 home win against No. 16 North Carolina. UAB was ranked in the top five nationally in rebounding throughout the season and finished the year ranked second in the country at 44.5 boards per game. During Haase's first year with the Blazers in 2012-13, UAB won six of its final nine regular-season Conference USA games and collected a victory in the conference tournament.

Prior to arriving at UAB, Haase played for Roy Williams at Kansas and spent 13 years on Williams' staff with the Jayhawks and Tar Heels. A 1997 graduate of Kansas with a degree in business administration, Haase got his start as Kansas' Director of Operations from 1999-2003. During that time, the Jayhawks reached the 2002 Final Four and the national championship game in 2003. When Williams was named head coach at North Carolina prior to the 2003-04 season, he brought Haase with him as an assistant coach and director of operations, a title Haase held from 2003-09. Haase then served exclusively as an assistant coach during his final three seasons with the Tar Heels.

A native of South Lake Tahoe, Calif., Haase attended California in 1992-93 before transferring to Kansas. He helped lead the Jayhawks to three consecutive conference titles and finished his career ranked in the school's top 10 in assists, three-point field goals and steals. Haase started 99 of 101 games at Kansas and scored 1,264 points, averaging 12.5 per game and reaching double figures 74 times. While at Kansas, Haase was a candidate for the Naismith and Wooden Awards.

As a senior in 1996-97, Haase started alongside Jacque Vaughn, Scot Pollard, Paul Pierce and Raef LaFrentz as Kansas finished with a 34-2 record while averaging 12.0 points per game despite playing with a broken wrist. As a sophomore in 1994-95, Haase averaged 15.0 points and was named the Big Eight Conference Newcomer of the Year and also tabbed a second-team all-conference selection. Haase was a first-team GTE Academic All-American as a senior, a second-team Academic All-American as a junior and a three-time academic all-conference pick. The Jayhawks' 1997 Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year, Haase earned a master's degree in business at Kansas in 2000. Haase started 23 games in 1992-93 as a freshman at California, teaming with Jason Kidd in the backcourt.

In 2017, Haase joined the National Advisory Board of the Positive Coaching Alliance, the organization that uses the power of positive reinforcement to pursue winning and the more important goal of teaching life lessons through sports.
