SETTING THE SCENE

A new-look Stanford will tip off in 2024-25 under the leadership of Kyle Smith, who joined the Cardinal after five successful seasons at Washington State. The campaign will mark the program's first in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

TL; DR

- Stanford's roster holds an exciting mix of returning players, transfers and freshmen, led by All-Pac-12 standout, and one of the top centers in the country, Maxime Raynaud.
- The Pac-12 Most Improved Player last season, Raynaud led the Cardinal with averages of 15.5 points and 9.6 rebounds, to go with 2.0 assists per game. He is one of two power conference returners to match those averages, along with Kansas' All-American center Hunter Dickinson.
- The season marks the third in a row with a transfer for Stanford, as five experienced players joined the Cardinal: Derin Saran (UC Irvine), Oziyah Sellers (USC), Cole Kastner (Virginia), Chisom Okpara (Harvard) and Jaylen Blakes (Duke).
- Kyle Smith joins the Cardinal from Washington State as the reigning Pac-12 Coach of the Year, where he led the Cougars to 25 wins and the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2023-24. Smith brought his entire staff from Washington State to the Farm along with program icon Eric Reveno, who was at Oregon State from 2022-24 and was previously on the Cardinal bench from 1997-2006.
- Two alumni represented the Cardinal at the 2024 Olympics in Paris: Dwight Powell (Canada) and Oscar da Silva (Germany), while the program had four alumni on NBA rosters last season.

THE (BAY)CC

Stanford was announced on Sept. 1, 2023 as a new member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, along with rival Cal and SMU. This move provided the opportunity for Stanford student-athletes to continue pursuing excellence at the national level, both in the classroom and on the court, which was a core priority for the university throughout the realignment process. Stanford is positioned with universities aligned in vision for the scholar-athlete model and broad-based excellence.

MEET KYLE SMITH

Smith heads to The Farm following a successful five-year stint at Washington State, where he went 94-71 overall, including a 25-10 mark and second-place finish in the Pac-12 in 2023-24. Smith holds a 258-193 career record across 14 seasons as a head coach, including six seasons at Columbia and three at San Francisco. Additionally, he spent 18 years as an assistant coach with stretches at Saint Mary's (2001-10), Air Force (2000-01) and San Diego (1992-2000).

The 2024 John R. Wooden Pac-12 Coach of the Year, Smith led the Cougars to a No. 7 seed in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the round of 32 with a victory over Drake in the opening round. The postseason event was the seventh for Smith as a head coach and third with Washington State. They also reached the NIT semifinals in 2022 and earned a bid for a second consecutive season in 2023. Smith was the first coach in Washington State history to post a .500 or better record in each of his first four seasons, doing so after taking over a program that was under .500 in each of the previous seven campaigns.

Prior to Smith's tenure at Washington State, he led San Francisco to a 63-40 record, including 20 wins or more in each season and two postseason appearances. His three straight 20-win seasons marked just the fourth time in school history that a USF coach accomplished the feat and the first time in nearly 40 years. Preceding his time in the Bay Area, he served as the head coach at Columbia, where he put together a 101-82 overall mark, including a CIT Championship in his final season.

RAYNAUD DOUBT ABOUT IT

One of the top centers in all of college basketball made the decision to return to The Farm for his senior season despite the change in coaching. Raynaud paced the Cardinal with 15.5 points and 9.6 rebounds per game, ranking 11th in the conference in scoring, third in rebounding and sixth in field goal percentage (56.7%). An All-Pac-12 second team honoree and the conference's Most Improved Player, Raynaud's 306 rebounds were the seventh-most in a single season in program history.

The 7-footer from Paris posted 12 double-doubles on the season, the most for a Stanford player since Reid Travis had 16 in 2016-17, and he had 11 games of 20 or more points, including a career-high 29 twice. Raynaud has also been a mainstay in France's national team system, leading Les Bleus to a gold medal at the 2023 FIBA U-20 European Championship in Greece and a silver medal at the 2019 FIBA U-16 European Championship in Italy.

NEW FACES AT STANFORD

Stanford returns just 26.5 percent of its scoring from a season ago and only six of the Cardinal's 15 players were on the 2023-24 roster. The Cardinal added a pair of high major transfers in Jaylen Blakes (Duke) and Oziyah Sellers (USC) and a tandem of highly productive mid-major transfers in Derin Saran (UC Irvine) and Chisom Okpara (Harvard). Sellers, Saran and Okpara are Stanford's first undergraduate transfers since 2009 (Andrew Zimmerman). Saran and Okpara were double-digit scorers at UC Irvine and Harvard, respectively, with Okpara posting 16.5 points per night and ranking second in the Ivy League in made free throws and Saran finishing the year at 10.1 per game while helping the Anteaters to the NIT. Sellers was a 42.9 percent shooter from beyond the arc for the Trojans, while Blakes adds leadership and defense in the backcourt from Duke, where he helped the program to a Final Four appearance in 2021 and an Elite Eight in 2024.

Additionally, Stanford welcomes Cole Kastner as a transfer from Virginia, who was a three-time All-American with the Cavaliers' lacrosse program and is returning the hardwood where he was a standout at nearby Menlo School. The Cardinal added four freshmen in Anthony Batson Jr. (Scottsdale, Ariz.), Evan Stinson (Cheney, Wash.), Tallis Toure (Roseville, Calif.) and Donavin Young (Pasco, Wash.).

FARM SYSTEM

Stanford brings back six players from the 2023-24 squad, led by Raynaud, but also including Benny Gealer, Ryan Agarwal, Jaylen Thompson, Aidan Cammann and Cameron Grant. Gealer was the Cardinal's backup point guard, averaging 4.2 points and 2.3 assists per game last season while tallying a 2.7-to-1 assist to turnover ratio. Agarwal, Cammann and Grant redshirted the last campaign, but Agarwal averaged 3.5 points while shooting 45.7 percent from 3-point range as a freshman. Agarwal and Thompson were four-star recruits out of high school, with Thompson rated as high as No. 67 (247 Sports).

PARIS 2024

Dwight Powell (Canada) and Oscar da Silva (Germany) became the Cardinal's sixth and seventh Olympians in program history in Paris. The duo joined Ron Tomsic (USA, 1956), Jim Walsh (USA, 1956), Andrew Vlahov (Australia, 1988, 1992, 1996, 2000), Johnny Rogers (Spain, 2000) and KZ Okpala (Nigeria, 2020) as Stanford men's basketball Olympians. Tomsic and Walsh are the only medalists, having captured gold in Melbourne with the United States in 1956, while da Silva's fourth-place result with Germany tied the program's best for an alumni over the past 36 years with Vlahov, who took fourth with Australia three times.

Stanford student-athletes combined to win 39 medals in Paris, setting a new record for any collegiate department at any Olympic games and nearly twice as many medals as the second-best school (Cal, 20). If Stanford was its own country, it would have finished 11th in the medal count, tied with Canada, and the Cardinal steered the ACC in pacing all conferences with 102 total medals.

MATCH MY NUMBERS

- Maxime Raynaud is one of two power conference returners to meet his averages of at least 15.5 points, 9.6 rebounds and 2.0 assists per game last season, along with Kansas All-American Hunter Dickinson.
- Benny Gealer is one of two returning players in the ACC to average multiple assists per game in 2023-24 with a 2.7 assist-to-turnover ratio or better, along with Duke's Tyrese Proctor.
- Derin Saran was one of three true freshmen in the country last season to average at least 10.1 points, 3.4 rebounds and 1.6 assists while shooting better than 50 percent from the floor and 34.9 percent from beyond the arc. Reed Sheppard (Kentucky, drafted by Houston Rockets) and De'Shayne Montgomery (Mount St. Mary's, transfer to Georgia) were the other two.
- Chisom Okpara excelled in getting to the charity stripe at Harvard. Only eight players nationally met his averages for points (16.5), rebounds (5.0) and assists (2.0) while getting to the line six or more times a game.
- Oziyah Sellers was one of the Pac-12's top sharpshooters in 2023-24. Only two players shot at least 42.9 percent from 3-point range and 82.6 percent from the line: Sellers and KJ Simpson (Colorado, drafted by Charlotte Hornets).

PRO CARD

The Cardinal had four players on NBA rosters last season in Brook & Robin Lopez (Milwaukee Bucks), Dwight Powell (Dallas Mavericks) and Ziaire Williams (Memphis Grizzlies), in addition to a plethora of successful players in leagues around the world. A year removed from leading the Association in blocks, Brook Lopez ranked third in the category in 2023-24 (189, 2.4/game) to go along with averages of 12.5 points and 5.2 rebounds per game. Powell helped lead the Mavericks to the NBA Finals - the first Cardinal player since Lopez in 2021 - and averaged 3.3 points and 3.4 rebounds on 67.9 percent shooting on the season.

In his third NBA campaign, Williams averaged 8.2 points, 3.5 rebounds and 1.5 assists per game over 51 appearances for the Grizzlies, including 15 starts, and was traded during the offseason to the Brooklyn Nets. Robin Lopez appeared in 16 games last year for the Bucks before being waived at the trade deadline.

After a standout Stanford career, where he finished as the program's all-time leading 3-point shooter and ended eighth in scoring, Spencer Jones inked a two-way contract with the Denver Nuggets on July 30.

BEST OF BOTH WORLDS

The program's success once again extended beyond the court and into the classroom, where the Cardinal captured a series of major academic awards a year ago. 2024 graduates Brandon Angel and Michael Jones were Academic All-Americans for the second year in a row, which made the Cardinal the first program nationally to have multiple Academic All-Americans in back-to-back seasons since Kansas accomplished the feat in 1996 and 1997. Angel was the third player in program history to be a first team honoree, along with Mark Madsen and Chasson Randle, and was named the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, giving the program a league-record of four straight recipients.

Stanford's five Academic All-America selections since 2021 leads the country, and the Cardinal's 19 total selections in program history are tied for fifth in Division I, along with Belmont, trailing the 20 held by Duke, Kansas, Indiana, and UCLA.



KYLE SMITH

ANNE AND TONY JOSEPH DIRECTOR OF MEN'S BASKETBALL
FIRST SEASON AT STANFORD

Kyle Smith was announced as the Anne and Tony Joseph Director of Men's Basketball on March 25, 2024, and begins his first season at Stanford in 2024-25.

Smith heads to The Farm following a successful five-year stint at Washington State, where he went 94-71 overall, including a 25-10 mark and second-place finish in the Pac-12 in 2023-24. Smith holds a 258-193 career record across 14 seasons as a head coach, including six seasons at Columbia and three at San Francisco. Additionally, he spent 18 years as an assistant coach with stretches at Saint Mary's (2001-10), Air Force (2000-01) and San Diego (1992-2000).

A talented coach known for expertise in analytics and player development, Smith's tutelage has included three NBA Draft selections in CJ Elleby (2020), Mouhamed Gueye (2023) and Jaylen Wells (2024), as well as Pac-12 Freshman of the Year Myles Rice (2024), while three Cougars earned All-Pac-12 recognition in 2024. Smith also coached San Francisco's Jamaree Bouyea, who made his NBA debut in 2023, and mentored a series of professional athletes as an assistant coach, including NBA players Matthew Dellavedova and Patty Mills at Saint Mary's.

Smith has also seen success on the recruiting trail, landing two top-60 classes, the highest for Washington State in over a decade. He signed a top-100 prospect to Pullman in the class of 2022, the first for the program since Klay Thompson in 2008.

Prior to Smith's tenure at Washington State, he led San Francisco to a 63-40 record, including 20 wins or more in each season and two postseason appearances. His three straight 20-win seasons marked just the fourth time in school history that a USF coach accomplished the feat and the first time in nearly 40 years. Smith produced seven All-WCC picks, paced by two-time All-WCC first team selection Frankie Ferrari.

Preceding his time in the Bay Area, he served as the head coach at Columbia where he put together a 101-82 overall mark, including a CIT Championship in his final season. Smith mentored 10 All-Ivy League selections over his six seasons at Columbia, led by Maodo Lo, a two-time first team honoree and the second-leading scorer in school history.

Smith played an integral role in building the Gaels' program into a perennial championship contender in the West Coast Conference under head coach Randy Bennett. In his nine seasons in Moraga, the Gaels made three NCAA Tournament (2005, '08, '10) appearances and earned one NIT bid (2009). Saint Mary's averaged 23 wins over Smith's last six seasons on the staff, including an 81-20 record over his final three seasons. The 2009-10 team finished with a 28-6 record, advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Championship and was ranked 19th nationally in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll.

During his one season at Air Force, Smith served as the Falcons' offensive and recruiting coordinator and took a lead role with player development and scouting. He was instrumental in the recruitment of 2003-04 Mountain West Conference Player of the Year Nick Welch along with all-conference players Antoine Hood and A.J. Kuhle.

Before joining the Falcons, Smith served eight seasons as an assistant coach at San Diego from 1992-2000 under Hank Egan and Brad Holland. During his time at San Diego, Smith helped lead the Toreros to their second-highest win total in school history (20 in 1999-2000) and as associate head coach, orchestrated a defense that allowed the lowest opponent scoring average (62.6) in the West Coast Conference (62.6 in 1999-2000).

Born in El Paso, Texas, Smith graduated in 1992 from Hamilton College with a degree in English literature. He also played basketball and helped lead the Continentals to a 26-1 record and the No. 1 ranking in the nation for NCAA Division III as a junior. He shot a school-record 51.3 percent from three-point range and helped Hamilton to an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) championship.

Smith earned a master's degree in educational leadership from the University of San Diego, where he began his coaching career.

Kyle and his wife, Katie, have three sons, Rocco, Bo, and Luke.
