Opening Draw

- Stanford (14-4, 7-2 ACC) enters Friday's contest after a statement 15-10 win over the No. 6-seeded Syracuse Orange on Wednesday night. Stanford, which jumped out to an early 4-1 lead, fell into a deficit leading into the half as the No. 17 Orange rattled off seven-straight goals en route to an 8-5 lead through 30 minutes. However, the Cardinal stormed back to life in the second half, ending the game on a 10-2 run with both Rylee Bouvier and Aliya Polisky ending the game with four goals apiece. Defensively, Stanford earned 16 caused turnovers during the evening while Lucy Pearson and Ella Morton combined for nine saves in cage as the Cardinal earned its 12th game of holding the opposition to 10 goals or less.
- No. 13/12 Stanford has been ranked in both the IWLCA and ILWomen.com Poll every week this season and ranked inside the top 10 in all three polls seven times this season. Stanford earned a program high in the IWLCA Poll on March 24 having been slotted in at No. 4. Prior to this season, Stanford's highest ranking came in the 2012 preseason poll where the Cardinal was ranked sixth while Stanford's No. 4 ranking is the highest ranking of any West Coast program since 2017 (No. 3 USC, IWLCA Week One Poll, Feb. 20, 2017).
- Stanford enters Friday's contest in the ACC Women's Lacrosse Championship Semifinals having faced two of the three teams remaining in the bracket. The Cardinal holds a 1-1 record against those teams. Stanford took a home win over Clemson (14-8) while in the bottom half of the bracket, Stanford has the opportunity to play spoiler and earn a season split against Boston College after falling to the Eagles 17-9 in the regular season in California.
- Aliya Polisky continues to hold the team lead in goals, tying her single-season high with her 53rd of the year against Cal before earning a four-goal outing against the Orange. Polisky, who has a career-high 15 hat tricks this season - started the campaign with six-consecutive hat tricks and has recorded a hat trick in six of the last 7 games for the Cardinal including a five-goal outing against No. 4 Yale in what was the second highest win in program history for Stanford. Polisky's 72 points also leads the Cardinal in that regard as the sophomore currently ranks fourth in the conference in goals and sixth in points. Ava Arceri sits second in goals with 48 on the year and has scored in every game this season for the Cardinal while Rylee Bouvier has earned 14 points in the last two games after joining the 20-goal club in the win over Cal.
- Elsewhere offensively, Martha Oakey leads the Cardinal in assists after grabbing three of her 27 assists in the win over the Irish before nabbing one against Syracuse. Her 27 assists ranks 11th all-time in program history, surpassing Ali Baiocco's 24 assists in the 2021 campaign while setting a new high for single-season assists by a true freshman. Sophomore Elise Murphy sits behind Oakey with 26 assists and has earned

Coaching Staff

Danielle Spencer – Paul A. Violich Women's Lacrosse Head Coach



- Danielle Spencer enters her sixth season as Stanford's Paul A. Violich Women's Lacrosse Head Coach in 2025. Spencer was appointed the seventh head coach in program history on June 12, 2019.
- Under Spencer's guidance, Stanford swept the Pac-12 regular-season and tournament titles in three of the last four seasons (2021-22, 2024) while making three NCAA Tournament appearances. In six seasons on The Farm, Spencer has compiled a 63-29 overall record.
- Spencer has produced six All-Americans during her tenure on The Farm: Ali Baiocco (2021 IWLCA Second Team), Ashley Humphrey (2022 IWLCA Third Team), Annabel Frist (2024 USA Lacrosse Third Team), Aliya Polisky (2024 USA Lacrosse Honorable Mention), Madison McPherson (2024 ILWomen Honorable Mention) and Lucy Pearson (2024 ILWomen Honorable Mention).
- Since Spencer's arrival, multiple players have earned the following major conference awards: Pac-12 Attacker of the Year (2), Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year (1), Pac-12 Draw Specialist of the Year (2), Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Year (3) and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year (2).
- A three-time conference coach of the year recipient, Spencer owns a 78-44 career overall record in eight seasons as a head coach, which includes a three-year stint at Dartmouth (29-19 overall).
- After the 2020 campaign was shortened due to the COVID-19 global pandemic, Spencer completed her first full season on The Farm in 2021. Spencer guided Stanford to its best win percentage in school history (.916) and the Cardinal won the Pac-12 regular season and tournament titles in the same year for the first time in program history. Stanford, which enjoyed the best start to a season (11-0) in program history, won its first Pac-12 regular season title since the league's inception in 2018 and finished the year ranked No. 16 in the IWLCA Coaches Poll. Senior Ali Baiocco was named to the IWLCA All-America second team – the first Cardinal All-American since 2018 and 11th in program history.
- In 2022, Stanford (12-7, 8-2 Pac-12) swept the conference championships, winning both the Pac-12 regular season and Pac-12 Tournament titles. Ashley Humphrey burst onto the scene as a redshirt freshman, setting program, conference and NCAA records for assists in a season with 88. She was named an IWLCA All-American and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year while Baiocco repeated as Pac-12 Attacker of the Year and Kara Rahaim claimed the Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Year award. The Cardinal finished the season ranked No. 19 in the IWLCA Coaches Poll.
- Spencer, who served as an assistant at Stanford in 2012, returned to The Farm after she turned around the Dartmouth program in just three years and earned Ivy League Coach of the Year honors in each of her final two seasons (2018-19). Spencer inherited a program coming off three consecutive losing campaigns, but the Big Green won 11 games in her second year and captured an Ivy League regular season title in her third season.
- In 2019, Spencer guided Dartmouth to its first Ivy title since 2011, tying Princeton for the top spot in the conference standings. The Big Green earned an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament, a first for the program since 2013.
- The Brighton, New York, native was named a member of the US Lacrosse Greater Rochester Hall of Fame Induction Class of 2018. Spencer graduated from Northwestern in 2010 with a degree in social policy.

Grace Gavin Kennedy – Werdegard Family Assistant Women's Lacrosse Coach



- Grace Kennedy was promoted to Assistant Coach of Stanford Lacrosse in July, 2023 after serving as Volunteer Assistant Coach during the 2022-23 season. A 2011 graduate of Loyola University of Maryland, Kennedy helped lead the Greyhounds to a 17-3 overall record, a Big East Conference Championship, an NCAA Tournament appearance, and a no. 5 national ranking by her graduation in 2011.
- Kennedy played a pivotal role in the progress of Loyola University of Maryland's lacrosse program, helping the team improve dramatically from a 2-14 record in 2006 to a top-five nationally ranked squad by her senior year.
- Kennedy earned significant individual accolades during her playing career as well. She was named a Tewaaraton finalist, a Honda Sports Award finalist, and a two-time IWLCA All-American during her four years as a Greyhound. Kennedy consistently earned recognition at the regional and conference level as well, being named a four-time Regional IWLCA All-American, a two-time Big East Attacker of the Year, a four-time All-Big East selection, and a two-time Big East All-Tournament selection.
- Kennedy holds Loyola's career record for goals (229), season records in points (98) and goals (71), and scored at least one point in 70 of her 71 career games, including a goal in 68 career contests. During her career with the Greyhounds, Kennedy led the team in goals and points in each of her four years.

Kelsey Howard – Assistant Coach



- Kelsey Howard enters her second season on The Farm in 2024-25.
- Most recently, Howard has worked with Colby College Women's Lacrosse, serving as Assistant Head Coach since 2021 and previously as an assistant coach since 2018. While at Colby, Howard has led the offensive unit, taking control of play calling duties and developing scouting reports while also assisting in recruiting.
- Howard also spent time at Bentley University as a Volunteer Assistant Coach and with MaineIax Lacrosse Club where she led 20 players to collegiate rosters. Howard has worked closely with the IWLCA, serving as the organization's treasurer and Division III Coaches Poll Master.
- Howard is a two-time graduate of Bentley University, where she earned her Master's Degree in 2017 and her Bachelor's Degree in 2015. Howard played lacrosse and field hockey at Bentley, an NCAA Division II athletics program.
- Howard earned Intercollegiate Lacrosse Coaches Association All-Region honors, was a Northeast-10 Conference all-league selection, and earned conference all-academic honors during her time at Bentley. She was Bentley's NCAA Woman of the Year nominee and a captain for both teams.

Nicole Beardsley – Assistant Coach



- Nicole Beardsley enters her first season on The Farm in 2024-25, having been hired in July 2024.
- Beardsley, who most recently served as Assistant Coach at Colorado, helped lead the Buffs to the Pac-12 Tournament Championship game in 2023 and 2024. Also the director of recruiting, draw controls, and offensive coordinator in Colorado, Beardsley helped generate the second-best scoring offense in the Pac-12 over the last two seasons and coached three USA Lacrosse Magazine All-Americans.
- Prior to her time in Boulder, Beardsley was an assistant coach, working with offense and goalkeepers at the University of Massachusetts. She has also spent time as the director of operations with Northwestern University Women's Lacrosse.
- A starting attack player in her collegiate career at Northwestern, Beardsley led the Wildcats to two NCAA final four appearances and was named a Big Ten All-Tournament Team selection in 2017.
- Beardsley graduated from Northwestern with her bachelor of science in Education and Social Policy with a focus on Human Development and Psychological Services and a Minor in Psychology in 2018. She also earned her master of science in Sport and Performance Psychology from the University of Western States in 2021.

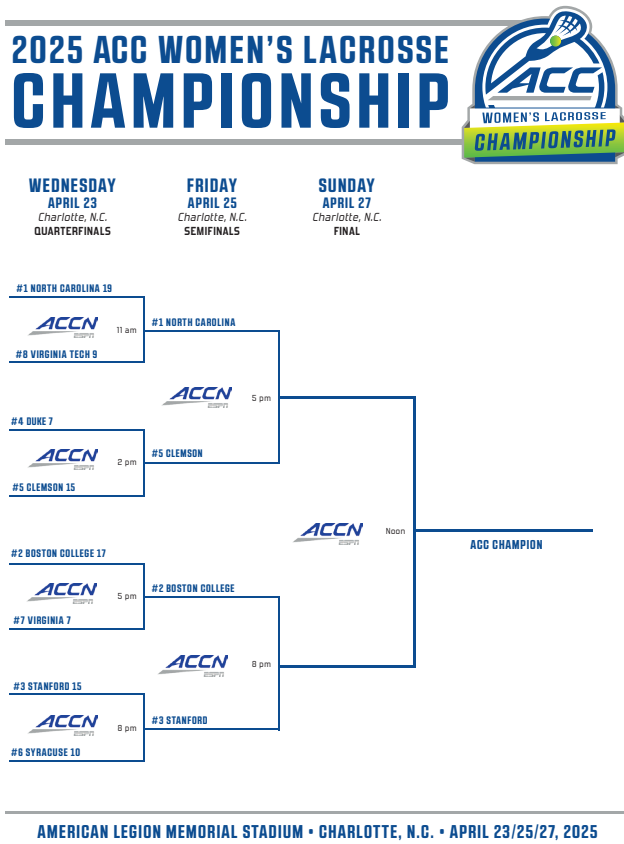

On No. 2 Boston College

- No. 2 Boston College (16-1, 8-1 ACC) enters Friday's contest having earned the No. 2 seed in this season's ACC Women's Lacrosse Championships with the second best record in the conference, earning a date with No. 7 seed Virginia in Wednesday's quarterfinals. The Eagles, who were deadlocked with UVA heading into the second quarter, utilized an eight-goal blitz to end the half with a 10-4 lead that they eventually saw out to a 17-7 victory to earn a spot in the ACC Semifinals. Following the 2-2 tie through the first quarter, BC held UVA to five goals including a scoreless third quarter to grab the win.
- The Eagles are led by Rachel Clark and Emma LoPinto with both players amassing over 90 points this season. Clark holds the team lead in goals with 85 on the season heading into Friday's contest while LoPinto is second having grabbed 61 this season. McKenna Davis is BC's main distributor, earning 63 helpers this season en route to 83 points. Molly Driscoll and Mia Mascone have also earned good stat lines this season, earning 46 points apiece through 17 games this season.
- Defensively, Shea Dolce has seen all 17 starts in cage in 2025, earning a 16-1 record. She currently owns a 7.00 goals-against average and a .565 save percentage as one of the nation's top goalkeepers this season. Elsewhere on the defensive restrainer, Shea Baker leads the Eagles with 32 caused turnovers this season while also accounting for 26 ground balls. Boston College ranks second in the nation in scoring defense, holding opponents to 6.88 goals per game while ranking first in save percentage. On the draw, BC ranks 8th in the nation at 60.6 percent with Abbey Herod leading the way with 91 draw controls this season.
- Acacia Walker leads the Eagles in her 13th season with the team, amassing a 209-56 record. Walker has earned 18 or more wins in four-consecutive seasons entering 2025 and is looking to make it five-straight this season with the Eagles currently sitting at 16-1. She has appeared in 20 of the last 21 NCAA Tournaments as either a player or a coach and was also an assistant coach with Stanford's Danielle Spencer back at Northwestern.
- The all-time series between the two teams is tied 2-2 after the Eagles won the regular season meeting between the programs, 17-9, in California in what was the highest-ever ranked matchup for Stanford in program history with then No. 5 Stanford taking on the top-ranked Eagles. Stanford's last win over the Eagles came back in the 2008 season when No. 20 Stanford def. BC, 14-10, at Cagan Stadium.

points in four-consecutive games after starting the season on a nine-game point streak.

- Stanford contains one of the strongest defensive corps in the country placing 7th in the nation in scoring defense, holding opposing teams to 8.82 goals per game. Leading the charge is junior goalkeeper Lucy Pearson who boasts a 9.07 goals-against average and .469 save percentage, both of which rank inside the top five in the conference. Pearson's goals-against average sits at 12th best in the nation.
- Elsewhere defensively, Stanford sits third in the conference in ground balls per game (18.59) and fourth in the ACC in caused turnovers per game (10.06) with Olivia Rose and Rylee Bouvier earning 28 and 26 caused turnovers, respectively. Olivia Rose's 46 ground balls lead the way for Stanford in that regard as she currently slots first in the conference in ground balls per game (2.72) while Bouvier's 1.39 caused turnovers per game is good for 10th in the ACC. On the draw, Stanford is led by Dakota Uy, Amanda Lawson and Arceri who have all accumulated 45 or more draw controls this season.

- Aliya Polisky enters Friday's contest at 130 shots attempted, which sets a new single-season record for the Cardinal with Polisky surpassing the record of 120 shots that she set in her first season on The Farm. She also enters Friday tied for second all-time in single-season goals (57) following a four-goal

record for sixth all-time with 28 assists which was most recently achieved by Ali Baiocco in 2019.

CARD AT CAGAN

- Following the 17-9 loss to No. 1 Boston College, Stanford's nearly three-season long win streak was capped at 20 games (which was the longest in DI at the time). With a win against Pitt on February 27, Stanford broke its home win-streak record at Cagan Stadium set from the 2010-11 seasons which was originally 16-consecutive wins.
- Until the loss to Boston College, Stanford had not lost at Cagan since the 2023 season-opener against Virginia (11-14) with the Cardinal grabbing 20-straight wins across the three-season stretch. During that span, Stanford had outscored its opponents 336-185 (+151).

STINGY STANFORD

- Stanford currently holds a +27 scoring differential in the fourth quarter and +53 differential in the second half after 18 games this season.
- Against Syracuse in the ACC Quarterfinal, Stanford went on a 10-2 run to close out the game including a four-goal run in 5:34 to begin the third quarter to retake the lead that it never surrendered en route to a 15-10 win.
- Having given up the first goal against Louisville, Stanford went on a 14-0 run across four quarters while holding the Cardinals without a goal for 48:08 of game action. Stanford eventually ended the game on a 15-1 run following the game-opening goal while limiting Louisville to two goals which was the lowest goals allowed by Stanford this season.
- Versus Virginia Tech, the Cardinal allowed one goal in the final 51:58 of game action and held the Hokies scoreless for 46:36 of game action between the first and fourth quarters.
- Against Cornell, Stanford allowed just one goal in the second half, holding the Big Red to its only goal of the half with 37 seconds left in regulation. It was the second time this season that the Cardinal have limited the opposition to one goal in a single half.
- Stanford's 7-1 route in the third quarter against Pitt helped the Cardinal to its second ACC win on the season and first-ever at home. However, Pitt became the first team to outscore the Cardinal in the fourth-quarter this season, outscoring Stanford 6-3 in the frame.
- Having allowed the opening goal of the second half against UVA, Stanford held strong, allowing one goal in the final 28:14 of game action, outscoring the Cavaliers 7-2 during the second half.
- Against the Aggies, Stanford held UC Davis without a goal in two quarters and did not allow a goal in the final 24:50 of game action.
- The Cardinal, which limited Colorado to just one goal in the final frame, clamped down defensively against the Buffs in the second half, eventually outscoring CU 10-2 to earn the comeback win.
- Against USC, the Cardinal held The Trojans without a goal in the final 19:59 of game action en route to a 9-2 run in the second half.

TENNESSEE DON'T MIND

- For her efforts against USC, Tennessee native Aliya Polisky was named the USA Lacrosse Magazine DI Women's Player of the Week on Feb. 11 after her eight-point appearance. Polisky's five-goal first quarter is the most she has scored in a single quarter in her career.

AN IRON CURTAIN

- Having accumulated 17 saves across the weekend of 3/10, including a career-high 15 in the win over the No. 4 Bulldogs, Lucy Pearson earned Stanford's first weekly defensive honor, claiming both the IWLCA National- and ACC Defensive Player of the Week nods.
- Pearson grabbed her 15 saves on 34 shots faced in the affair against Yale while also spearheading a defense that held Virginia Tech to one goal in the final 53:42 of game action, including a shutout run of 46:36 between the first and fourth quarter.

OKAY OAKLEY

- Freshman - and Charlottesville, Va., native - Martha Oakey enters Saturday after a stellar outing in the season-opening win over USC with a goal and four assists in her first collegiate game. Oakey assisted on Polisky's season-opening mark before accumulating her first collegiate goal in the third quarter as part of a string of three-unanswered Cardinal tallies in the frame.
- Oakey leads the team in assists heading into the weekend, having grabbed three of her 27 assists this season in the win over Notre Dame. Oakey has amassed 45 points so far this season and leads the team in freshman scoring after the three-point outing against Syracuse in the ACC Quarterfinal.

SOARIN' WITH ARCERI

- Ava Arceri had her breakout game in the 20-3 win over UC Davis as the sophomore grabbed a career-high five goals in the win. Having only scored four goals in 14 appearances last season, Arceri has scored in each of Stanford's 16 games this season and has already surpassed her single-season goal scoring mark from 2024 with 48 on the campaign.
- Arceri also sits second on the team in draw controls (47) and earned a single-game high in draw controls in the win over UC Davis, tallying six on her tab.

NOTES ON THE FARM

- Stanford finished the 2024 campaign near the top in the nation in multiple defensive categories including scoring defense (11th, 9.00), caused turnovers per game (8th, 10.56), save percentage (12, 47.4%) and ground balls per game (5th, 21.00).
- The Cardinal, which has swept the Pac-12 regular-season and tournament titles in three of the last four seasons (2021-22, 24), transitions to the ACC in 2025, a storied lacrosse league that boasts eight NCAA championships among its current membership and 19 overall.
- Stanford was picked fifth in the 2025 ACC Women's Lacrosse Preseason Coaches' Poll, as announced by the conference on Tuesday. The Cardinal boasts two players on the conference's All-ACC Team with Annabel Frist being named as the conference's draw control specialist while Aliya Polisky earned an At-Large bid.
- Three Cardinal were tabbed to Preseason All-America lists including senior midfielder Annabel Frist, junior goalkeeper Lucy Pearson and sophomore attacker Aliya Polisky. Pearson was named a USA Lacrosse All-America Honorable Mention, while Frist and Polisky earned Second Team and Third Team honors, respectively. Polisky and Frist were also named to InsideLacrosse.com's Nike Lacrosse Women's DI Media All-American list with Polisky garnering Second Team honors and Frisk earning Third Team recognition.
- The Cardinal's five losses in the 2024 campaign was the lowest total since the one-loss campaign in 2021 in which the Cardinal took home the Pac-12 regular season and postseason championships in the same season for the first time in program history. In the five losses, all but one were decided by one goal or less, including three to ranked opponents (2/11 at #16 Virginia, 4/25 at #13 Stony Brook and 5/10 vs. #12 Denver).
- Stanford is well positioned to produce a strong ACC debut, returning its top two offensive threats in Aliya Polisky (53 goals, 18 assists, 120 shots) and Jordyn Case (48 goals, 14 assists, 114 shots). Rylee Bouvier (20 goals, 9 assists) and Annabel Frist (19 goals, 19 draw controls) were also among the Cardinal's top seven goal scorers overall while goalkeeper

Lucy Pearson (132 saves) anchors the defense.

- Senior Annabel Frist, junior Lucy Pearson and sophomore Aliya Polisky continue to rake in the preseason praise having been named to the 2025 Tewaaraton Award Watch List which was announced by the Tewaaraton Foundation. The trio is part of a list of 50 players for the award that recognizes the sport's top player.
- The Cardinal landed three players among the InsideLacrosse.com Top 50 Players For 2025 list, with Aliya Polisky (19), Annabel Frist (46) and Lucy Pearson (50) earning preseason recognition. Stanford's total of three top-50 selections ranks tied for fourth in the country, behind only defending NCAA champion Boston College (6), Northwestern (5) and Michigan (5). North Carolina also was recognized with three picks.
