First Push-Back

- Stanford concludes the weekend having dispatched Ball State on Friday afternoon, 6-0. The Cardinal - which bounced back from a lackluster first quarter - had four different goal scorers on the day while Daisy Ford and Kendall Dowd combined for Stanford's second-consecutive shutout.
- Following Kate Nemec's season-opening tally to kickstart the Cardinal run, Nadine Brenninkmeyer and Liv Martin both recorded consecutive braces to push the Cardinal to an insurmountable lead. Following up in the scoring department, Maroussia Walckiers nabbed her first goal of the season 30 seconds following Martin's second of the day to give Stanford the 6-0 win. The six goals were the most the Cardinal has put up since a 6-3 home win over Richmond on September 8, 2023.
- Having grabbed four-point performances, both Brenninkmeyer and Martin lead the Cardinal in scoring and points with two goals and four points each. Mia Clark, Esther Pottebaum and Ella Ganocy all recorded assists in the win over the Cardinal as they sit in a four-way tie in the helper category with Scout Butler who earned an assist on Summer Knight-Thompson's first collegiate goal in the game against Maryland. Overall, Stanford has 10 players who have recorded a point this season.
- Defensively, Daisy Ford backstops the Cardinal having amassed a 2-1 record following a 45 minute performance on Thursday, adding another save to her 16 on the year. Ford currently owns a 1.09 goals-against average and .842 save percentage to start the year. With her career-high 12 saves against the Terps, Ford became the first Stanford goalkeeper to record at least 12 saves in a game since the 2019-20 season when Kelsey Bing stopped 12 shots against Louisville on October 15, 2019. Ford currently leads the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) in saves this season heading into the weekend.
- Kendall Dowd also earned her first action of the season, and first minutes since facing Ball State last season, on Thursday recording 2 saves in the fourth quarter to preserve the shutout for Stanford. She currently holds a 1.79 goals-against average and .731 save percentage.
- Summer Knight-Thompson, who was named to the NFHCA Collegiate Watchlist, became the first freshman to score in a season-opener since Rose Winter did so in the 2019 season-opener in what was a 4-3 shootout loss to #15 Northwestern (8/30/2019).
- Stanford currently boasts a two-game shutout streak and has held its opponents scoreless for 138:12 of game action. Stanford's last goal allowed was to Maryland's Josie Hollamon, which came from a penalty stroke on

Coaching Staff

Roz Ellis – Susan Ewing York Director of Women's Field Hockey



- Roz Ellis was named head coach of the Stanford field hockey program on June 25, 2021. She enters her fifth season in 2025.
- Bringing back nearly all of its roster from the previous season, Ellis led the Cardinal to an improved season in 2024 with an 8-9 record in its inaugural season in the ACC. Stanford got out to the best start of the Ellis era with a 5-1 record to start the year and won each of its final two ACC contests to earn the program's first-ever ACC tournament berth. Cara Sambeth earned All-ACC Second Team and NFHCA Division I All-West Region Second Team honors after returning from her redshirt year, while Daisy Ford enjoyed a career year between the posts with 94 saves and a conference-leading saves per game mark (5.53).

- The 2023 season saw Stanford field a team of 16 underclassmen, finishing the year 4-11 in the Cardinal's final season in the America East conference. Gemma Townsend registered an impressive freshman season, leading the Stanford attack in both goals (5) and assists (3) on the year. The Esher, England native became the first Cardinal freshman to lead the team in all scoring categories since Corrine Zannoli in 2017. Star Horlock also tallied double-digit points on the season with 10, while Daisy Ford and Kendall Dowd shared time between the posts with 52 and 41 saves, respectively. Following the season, Horlock was named to the All-America East second team, as well as the All-America East Rookie Team alongside Townsend.
- Stanford was one of the most improved teams in the country in 2022, winning 10 games and reaching the championship game of the America East Tournament. The Cardinal tallied three wins over ranked opponents, with Haley Mossmer leading the team with 11 goals and 23 points. Four players earned All-America East honors, including a first team nod for Megan Frost and a second team selection for Cara Sambeth. Stanford led the America East in goals-against average.
- The Ellis era at Stanford began in 2021, as the Cardinal played a full season with no goalkeeper and just 13 players but still found a way to win games and find success throughout the campaign. Stanford continued its stretch of never missing an America East conference tournament, with Haley Mossmer led the offense with eight goals and 17 points, while Lynn Vanderstichele scored four times. Cara Sambeth had nine defensive saves, which ranked second in the country and led the nation on a per-game basis, and added nine more as an emergency goalkeeper late in the season. Sambeth and Megan Frost earned all-conference accolades.
- Ellis arrived on The Farm after serving as the assistant coach at Iowa from 2018-21, leading the Hawkeyes to three NCAA appearances and the program's 12th trip to the national semifinals in her final season, continuing a steady progression for one of the country's most respected programs. Ellis was also instrumental in Iowa being one of six schools in the country to produce at least three NFHCA All-Americans.
- The 2020 season came on the heels of an impressive 2019 campaign, in which Iowa captured the Big Ten regular season and tournament crowns for the first time in school history. Ellis, along with head coach Lisa Cellucci and assistant coach Michael Boal, were honored as the 2019 NFHCA West Region Coaching Staff of the Year, as the Hawkeyes finished 17-5 overall while producing two NFHCA All-Americans, five NFHCA All-West Region honorees, three All-Big Ten selections and the NFHCA West Region Player of the Year.
- Ellis helped guide the Hawkeyes to a 14-7 record and NCAA appearance in her first season in 2018 and was honored as part of the NFHCA West Region Coaching Staff of the Year.

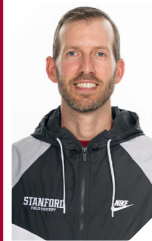
- A native of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, Ellis took the next step in her coaching career by serving as the associate coach at Temple in 2015.
- Prior to a one-year stint as an assistant coach at Louisville (2014-15), Ellis was the lead assistant coach at Massachusetts (2011-14), where she helped build a powerhouse in the Atlantic 10. Ellis guided the Minutewomen to a 34-14 record, two conference crowns and two NCAA appearances.
- Ellis' coaching career began as an assistant coach at Appalachian State in 2009, followed by a one-year stay at Wake Forest as a volunteer assistant coach from 2010-11.
- Ellis enjoyed a standout collegiate career at Iowa (2005-08), earning NFHCA Second Team All-America honors as a senior. An anchor of the Hawkeye defense, Ellis started all 83 games of her four-year career, totaling 14 goals, 11 assists and 53 shots. Ellis led Iowa to three NCAA appearances, three straight Big Ten tournament titles and the school's first NCAA semifinal showing since 1999.
- Following her collegiate career, Ellis was a member of the Women's National Championship Tournament (HPC) from 2006-11, in addition to the Old Alexandra Club in Dublin, Ireland, in 2010.

Megan Frazer – Onnie Killefer Assistant Field Hockey Coach



- Megan Frazer enters her fourth season as the Onnie Killefer Assistant Field Hockey Coach in 2025.
- Frazer was a two-time NCAA champion at Maryland, where she was a two-time captain and the winner of the prestigious Honda Award for field hockey in 2011. Following her standout career in College Park, Frazer spent three years playing professionally with Mannheimer Hockey Club in Germany, which competed in the top tier of the Bundesliga as well as in the EuroHockey Champions Cup.
- The experience for Frazer extends to the international level, as she has competed for the Ireland national team since 2007. A former captain with her country, Frazer was a World Cup silver medalist in 2018 and is the recipient of numerous FIH Player of the Tournament Awards.
- Frazer brings a wealth of coaching experience to The Farm, as she has coached at the Strathearn School in Belfast, Northern Ireland since 2019. She previously served as the Ulster University head coach from 2017-18 and was a high-performance player mentor at Ulster from 2019-20.
- Frazer graduated from Maryland in 2013 and earned her master's degree from Ulster in 2019 in biomedical engineering.

Craig Haley – Kristina M. Johnson Assistant Field Hockey Coach



- Craig Haley enters his third season as an assistant coach with the Stanford field hockey program in 2025.
- Haley was a mainstay for the South African national team from 2009-14, scoring 10 goals over 30 appearances, and with the national indoor team from 2014-17, with five goals in 12 appearances. His playing career spanned five countries with stops in Germany, Australia, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom in addition to South Africa.
- An experienced coach across multiple levels in South Africa, Haley worked with Fish Hoek Hockey Club from 2019-22, working with the men's first team and the boys under-19 team, while adding responsibilities in 2022 with the ladies' first team at Pinelands Hockey Club. He was the Director of Field Hockey at Fish Hoek, coordinating programs for 23 teams while building a hockey foundation at the primary school and high school. Haley also spent a year with the women's 50+ South African team, including a trip to the FIH Masters World Cup in Spain.
- Haley holds level II coaching qualifications from the International Hockey Federation (FIH) and the South African Hockey Association, and is a level III coaching candidate from the FIH. He holds a Master of Science degree from the University of Cape Town.

On Ball State

- Harvard (1-0, 0-0 Ivy League) heads to The Farm having started its season in The Golden State on Friday with a tightly-contested bout against Cal, edging the Golden Bears in overtime, 2-1, in Berkeley. Harvard's Kitty Chapple opened the scoring in the second quarter before Liz Klompmaker leveled the scoreline five minutes into the second half. With neither side netting the breakthrough in regulation, Harvard's Lara Beekhuis had the final chance and put it away to give the Crimson its first win of the season.
- With goals in the season opener, Harvard's Chapple and Beekhuis lead the Crimson in the goal-scoring department. Chapple, who serves as a team captain out of the midfield, netted her seventh career goal and has 26 points overall in her four years. With her ninth game-winner, Beekhuis has earned 21 goals in her collegiate career after consecutive 10-goal seasons during her freshman and sophomore seasons. Sage Piekarski also returns to the Crimson on the attacking side, having potted 17 goals and 39 points in 41 appearances.
- Harvard boasts one of the top defenses in the nation having ranked in the top-10 nationally in goals-against average (1.05), save percentage (.800) and scoring margin (1.48). The Crimson led the Ivy League in goals-against average and scoring margin in 2024. Hoping to continue the trend, first year goalkeeper Linde Burger earned her first collegiate start between the posts on Friday, nabbing the win. Tessa Shahbo also helps anchor the defensive corps for the Crimson, amassing a 26-7 record with nine shutouts entering her senior year. Shahbo currently owns a 1.13 goals-against average and .766 save percentage in 37 appearances.
- Tjerk Van Herwaarden leads the Crimson in his 12th season with the program having taken over the role in 2012. Under his leadership, Harvard has amassed 10-straight winning seasons since 2014-15 and has earned 16 or more wins in three of the past four seasons (Did not play in 2020-21 due to COVID-19 Pandemic). Van Herwaarden has led the Crimson to consecutive NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals appearances - a program first - and owns a 147-67 record in his tenure.
- The Crimson entered the season No. 6 in the NFHCA Preseason rankings and were slotted in the No. 2 slot in the Ivy League Preseason Poll, earning one less point than favorites Princeton.
- This week's matchup marks the sixth meeting all-time - and first since 2019 - between the two programs as Stanford currently holds the all-time series lead, 4-1. The Cardinal has won the previous four meetings including both matchups on The Farm. Both of the previous meetings were decided in a penalty shootout including the last matchup in California on September 12, 2019 (W, 2-1).

Team Notes

August 29. Stanford has not given up a goal from the run of play in 150:55 of game action, last surrendering a goal late in the first half against the Terps off of a continued penalty corner.

- The Cardinal has outscored its opponents 7-0 over the last two games, outshooting the opposition 51-14 during that time including 22-6 in shots on goal. Stanford has also out-earned the opposition in penalty corners during that span at a line of 17-6, including 14 in the win over James Madison.
- Stanford's 26 shot attempts on Thursday ties the most in a single game since March 29, 2021 when the Cardinal amassed 26 shot attempts in a 3-0 win on the road over UC Davis.
- In the win over Ball State, Stanford twice earned goals within 30 seconds of each other including Nadine Brenninkmeyer's second- and Liv Martin's first of the afternoon which came 17 seconds apart. Stanford had not had consecutive scores within 30 seconds of each other since November 1, 2019 when Corinne Zanolli and Emma Alderton scored 28 seconds apart in a 5-0 home win over UC Davis. 17 seconds between goals is the least time between goals since at least the 2018 season.
- The Cardinal returns 23 players for the 2025 squad - including 10 seniors - maintaining nearly 80% of its offensive production from a season ago. Cara

Sambeth returns after a six-goal campaign in 2024 while Liv Martin and Jenny O'Grady return having sat atop the team leaderboard in assists last season with both players bagging five.

- Maroussia Walckiers returns to The Farm for her fifth season after a medical redshirt in 2024 and is poised to add to the Stanford offensive regime. Walckiers had started 46 of her 50 career games and has tallied 15 goals and six assists in three competitive seasons. Meanwhile, incoming freshman Summer Knight-Thompson can bring more firepower to the Cardinal offense after a stellar career in England where she earned caps with England's U16 & U18 programs while earning a Super Six's Championship in England's premier indoor hockey league.
- On the defensive end, Preseason All-ACC honoree, Daisy Ford, returns between the posts after starting in all 17 games for the Cardinal last season. Ford led the ACC in saves per game last season (5.53) having turned in a career-high 94 saves in all competitions. Her .770 save percentage also ranked third in the conference.
- Stanford boasts one of the toughest schedules in 2025 with nine future opponents having been ranked inside the National Field Hockey Coaches Association Preseason Poll including Friday's opponent, Maryland, who is slotted at No. 4. Following the weekend, Stanford's future opposition includes six teams ranked inside the top-10 including North Carolina, Virginia, Duke, Harvard, Michigan and Boston College. Fellow ACC foes Syracuse and Wake Forest rank outside the top-10 at No. 11 and No. 20, respectively.
- The Cardinal, who finished sixth in the ACC regular season in 2024, enters the campaign having been picked to finish seventh in the 2025 Preseason ACC Field Hockey Coaches Poll. North Carolina leads the pack with 77 points including six first place votes followed by Duke, Virginia and Boston College. Syracuse and Wake Forest were slotted fifth and sixth, respectively, while the Cardinal took seventh ahead of Louisville and Cal.
