This finding isn't surprising if you consider that crosswalks are where vehicles, pedestrians and bicyclists literally "cross paths" the most. Part of the collision reduction strategies for Safe Streets Boulder, Heads Up is a collaborative campaign funded by the City of Boulder and a Safe Routes to School grant and administered by the Boulder Valley School District (BVSD). Boulder Police, University of Colorado officials, local businesses and nonprofits also helped to develop the campaign.
