Our University's mission statement captures our faculty, staff and students' commitment to building a sustainable future for all. It states, "The University of Wisconsin-Green Bay provides an interdisciplinary, problem-focused educational experience that prepares students to think critically and address complex issues in a multicultural and evolving world. The University enriches the quality of life for students and the community by embracing the educational value of diversity, promoting environmental sustainability, encouraging engaged citizenship, and serving as an intellectual, cultural and economic resource."

The University was dubbed Eco UTM by Harper's Magazine, Newsweek and other national and regional media in the early 1970s shortly after its founding. The nickname came about in large part because of the University's multidisciplinary approach to solving environmental problems. That commitment continues in many ways including UW – Green Bay's 2007 signing of the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment and the campus community's support of on-campus sustainability efforts.
