Then the junior faculty were mentored in developing their own program. Follow-up was provided on campus with the faculty coordinator for outdoor and environmental education.

Issues of poverty, food insecurity, and city infrastructure issues were a focus.

Deliberative Dialogue session on "Preparing for Climate-Enhanced Extreme Weather Events in Cortland County	1	11, 13	This workshop was open to students, faculty, staff and community members. Students organized the workshop consulting with faculty and staff. This workshop was designed to identify actions for addressing climate change enhanced extreme weather events in our area.
Climate Change- Enhanced Extreme Weather Event Simulation	1	11, 13	This event provided simulation of a community dealing with climate-change enhanced extreme weather events using the National Academy of Sciences' LabX disaster activity. Participants worked through scenarios that most likely are to happen in our area as climate change impacts enhance. Follow-up discussion looked at action items the college and community need to take to be more resilient.
Outdoor Pursuits Workshops - Leave No Trace Certification Course	1	15	This course, offered through Outdoor Pursuits, allowed students and staff to gain certification in leave no trace camping. Course content includes social and environmental sustainability aspects.
Facilities Operations and Services Training – Building Automation System Training – Introductory Course for new HVAC technicians	1	8,9,13	Three day training conducted in 2016 covered one of the building automation systems which is utilized in multiple buildings on campus. By providing training to newer HVAC staff this will establish a baseline of knowledge to better understand the growing complexity of building automation systems. Topic areas covered included: basic equipment sequence of operation, control logic, alarms, faults, trends, and schedules. By focusing on schedules this helps to address ad-hoc events that come up from time to time without the need for overriding normal building schedules. By maintaining accurate schedules we lower our use of natural resources and can lower overall energy demand.
Forever Wild Summer Teacher Institute	2	4, 15	This teacher institute focused on exploring the history of inequity during the Gilded Age, views of wilderness and protection of natural resources. Forever Wild explored the meaning of "wilderness" by anchoring the Adirondacks into is historical context to reveal the political, economic, social, and cultural history of this real and imagined landscape.
Common Ground Summer Institute	2	4, 11, 15	Common Ground was a two-week NEH Summer Institute for twenty-five K- 12 teachers that offered a comparative residential experience where participants pursued parallel thematic tracks in New York City and the Adirondacks. By spending a week in each landscape, studying its history, geography, and resources, summer scholars are prepared to consider the

			vital linkages connecting these regions. Framed by a sustained discussion of land's centrality to American identity, inequity, and protection of natural resources.
