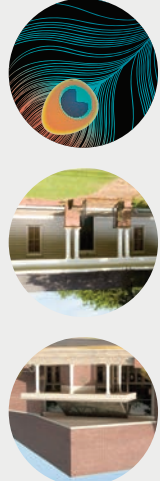


Centennial Center (10)
Home to the Georgia College Bobcats, the Centennial Center provides 4,071 seats and can accommodate another 800 floor chairs. It can be used for large events, such as concerts, conference general sessions or exhibits. 478-445-6742

Sallie Ellis Davis House (47)
In 2008, Georgia College joined the Sallie Ellis Davis Foundation in a partnership to renovate this historic house and open it as a cultural center. Recognized by the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation, the house was home to Sallie Ellis Davis, a local educator who touched the lives of hundreds of African-American children, many of whom, as adults, formed the Sallie Davis Foundation. 478-445-5400

Andalusia
Once home to famed American author and alumna Flannery O'Connor, Andalusia spans more than 500 acres and includes the historic plantation house where the author lived and wrote some of her most acclaimed fiction. O'Connor returned to the estate in 1951 and it was her final home upon her death in 1964. Today, Andalusia serves as a museum with the mission to care for, collect, interpret and exhibit items that illustrate the history of the site during the time O'Connor lived on the property. Andalusia is open for public tours and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980. 478-445-8722



Georgia College has an array of distinctive resources on campus that provide outstanding educational and cultural opportunities for the community as well as our students.

The Flannery O'Connor Collection (46)
The Ina Dillard Russell Library established the Flannery O'Connor Collection in 1947 when the author's first story was published. Additional manuscripts were given to the library by Regina Cline O'Connor in 1970. The collection has grown and is available for scholarly research. 478-445-0988

The Paul D. Coverdell Papers (45)
In 1996, former U.S. Senator Paul Coverdell donated his Peace Corps papers to the Ina Dillard Russell Library. In 1999, impressed with the Georgia College mission, he donated his U.S. Senate papers. 478-445-0988

The Old Governor's Mansion (38)
The mansion served as the home of Georgia's governors until 1868 and now is open for tours. Considered one of the finest examples of High Greek Revival architecture in the nation, it was designated a National Historic landmark in 1973. 478-445-4545

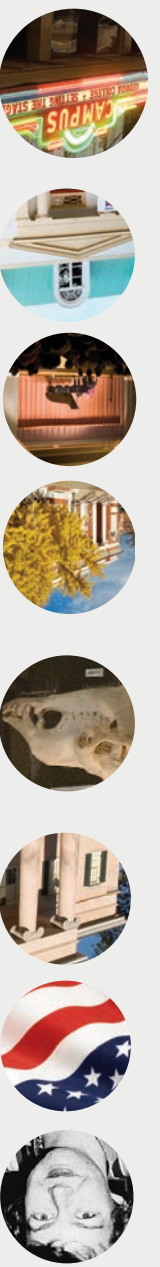
Natural History Museum and Planetarium (22)
Georgia College opened the Natural History Museum in Herby Hall in 2004, boasting one of the largest fossil vertebrate collections in the Southeast. The adjacent planetarium enables Georgia College students to make real astronomical observations on a simulated but realistic sky. The Planetarium highlights space telescope observations and is available as a field trip experience for local school children. 478-445-0809

Russell Auditorium (45)
A campus landmark, the auditorium features Greek Revival architecture and an elegant décor. Seating up to 982, including a balcony, centered on a 1,000-square-foot stage and orchestra pit, Russell is the main performance space for Georgia College music, theatre and dance productions. 478-445-6542

Max Noah Recital Hall (27)
Located on the third floor of Porter Hall with seating for 150, Max Noah Recital Hall provides an intimate performance space for chamber music concerts and small theatre productions. 478-445-6572

Museum of Fine Arts (53)
The Georgia College Foundation purchased the Lucy Underwood House, designed by prominent Atlanta architect Philip Schutze, and converted it into art gallery space. It houses the university's permanent collection. 478-445-4572

Campus Theatre (8)
Georgia College restored the art deco exterior of the 1935 Campus Theatre building and remodeled the interior for the GC Bookstore, to serve both the college and the community, a "black box" performance theatre and offices for the Department of Theatre. Included is theatre space may be rented for special functions. 478-445-2749

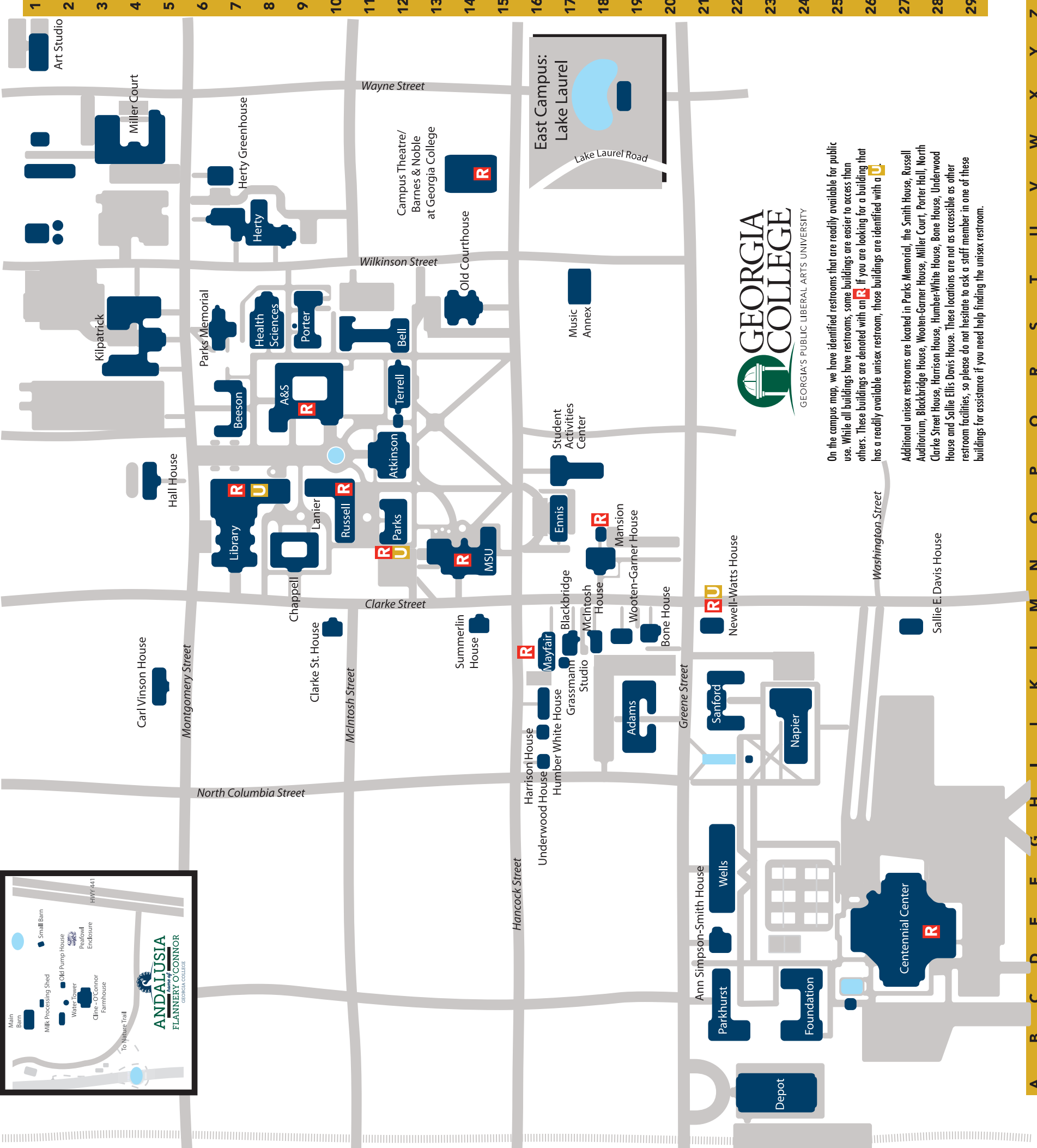
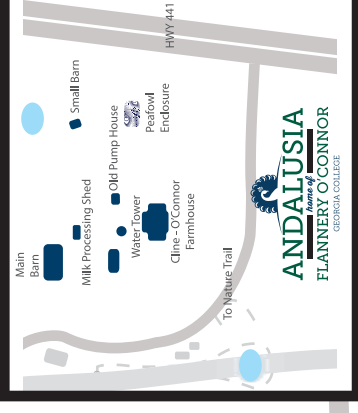

To West Campus
 From the main campus, follow West Hancock Street to the U.S. 441 Bypass. Turn right on the bypass. Take the first left turn onto West Campus Drive. West Campus will be on your right.

To East Campus
 From the main campus, follow East Hancock Street across the Oconee River. Take the second left after the river onto Lake Laurel Road. The East Campus complex is two miles ahead on the right.



On the campus map, we have identified restrooms that are readily available for public use. While all buildings have restrooms, some buildings are easier to access than others. These buildings are denoted with an **R**. If you are looking for a building that has a readily available unisex restroom, those buildings are identified with a **U**.

Additional unisex restrooms are located in Parks Memorial, the Smith House, Russell Auditorium, Blackbridge House, Wooten-Garner House, Miller Court, Porter Hall, North Clarke Street House, Harrison House, Humber-White House, Bone House, Underwood House and Sallie Ellis Davis House. These locations are not as accessible as other restroom facilities, so please do not hesitate to ask a staff member in one of these buildings for assistance if you need help finding the unisex restroom.
