Course Code	Course Title	Course Description
FOOD 1082	BETWEEN FARM AND TABLE: LOCAL FOOD BUSINESSES AND COOPERATIVES	This course will be an exploration of the plethora of local food businesses and infrastructure emerging across Canada. These businesses include innovative models such as co-operatives, eco-friendly distributors (ex. food-box drop offs by bicycle), non-profit partnerships, and Community Supported Agriculture. There will be a brief history of how global food system consolidation led to the drive for alternatives. And we will also look at how grocery stores, restaurants, processors, and abattoirs—more traditional parts of the food system are incorporating local food options. Throughout the course modules, you will be invited to discuss, debate and investigate regional examples, the contexts they work within, and the models and best practices that influence these local businesses. Not only that, but you will complete creative and useful assignments that allow you to understand the what's, whys and how-to's of food businesses in your region. From field to factory to storage room to fork, this course will trace what is necessary to create a strong, vibrant (and profitable, and socially just!) local food system.
FOOD 1080	FIELD TO FORK: INTRODUCTION TO LOCAL AND GLOBAL FOOD SYSTEMS	In an age of the 4000 km Caesar salad and the 100 mile diet, with 800 million hungry people on Earth and over 1 billion overweight, understanding the "food system" is a hot item on the menu. How do we, and how should we eat for the 21st Century? How do we build the sustainable local and global food systems we want? This course explores these questions by following food's circular journey - from the farm fields where heirloom and biotech seeds are sown; into chicken McNugget and artisanal cheese factories; out to A&P, farmers markets, and restaurants; onto our dinner tables, forks and taste buds; and back to the beginning via composters and landfills. It's a wild mix, including issues like biotechnology, organic farming, globalization, climate change, peak oil, water scarcity, food security, obesity, hunger, the global food price crisis. At the centre of the course, and certificate program it serves as an introduction for, are the practical opportunities and challenges of making food system changes happen on local and global political, economic and ecological levels.
FOOD 1083	FOOD SECURITY AND FOOD JUSTICE IN CANADA	Study the causes and consequences of urban and rural food insecurity across Canada. Struggle with the tensions between short-term stop gaps (foodbanks, meal programs, charitable services) and long-term food justice solutions (education, equitable incomes, affordability and accessibility of healthy food). Bring these realities to life by doing research or field work for a food security organization in your region.
FOOD 1081	FOOD SYSTEM TRENDS AND POLICY IN CANADA TODAY	The production, processing and consumption of food are at the core of many local and global issues. World hunger, malnutrition, genetically modified seeds, access to markets for new farmers and human nutrition are just a few of the issues that are prevalent in today's society. Policies have a major impact on all of the dimensions of these issues. Although policies have attempted to address various food issues, there is a broad consensus that food policy lacks effectiveness on several fronts. This course will introduce you to the various elements, concepts and key issues in the field of Food Policy. It will help you understand the complexity of formulating and implementing policies as well as gain the practical skills to critically analyze food policies and programs. This will be accomplished by examining various Canadian and international food policies and programs.
FOOD 1085	UNDERSTANDING SUSTAINABLE FARMING: PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICES	The current mainstream agricultural model is widely recognized as unsustainable, but there is a wide divergence of views on how to create a more sustainable system. This course begins with an exploration of the ecological, economic, and social justice principles of sustainable farming. Following this, different approaches that are currently being touted as forms of sustainable agriculture - including organic farming, food justice certification, and the use of genetically engineered crops - are critically examined. This course concludes with a review of tools and strategies that non-profit organizations, governments and businesses can draw on to enhance agricultural

		sustainability. This is not a training course for farmers, but a course for those who want an overview of sustainable
		agriculture and how it is practiced across the country. This course offers students many opportunities to direct the course of their own learning. Students are encouraged to choose readings and assignments to reflect their own interests and knowledge/skill areas they would like to develop.
Food 1084	URBAN AGRICULTURE, COMMUNITY GARDENS, FOOD SECURE CITIES	Study the exciting urban agriculture projects and policies that are currently transforming the landscape, building community, and creating food security in Canadian cities. From community, schoolyard and roof top gardens, to urban CSA (community supported agriculture) farms and greenhouses, consider success stories and challenges for the development of urban food production. Take a close look at the relationship between municipal law and policy and urban agriculture in cities of interest to you.
BES 7100	Energy Efficiency in Large Buildings	This subject covers energy efficiency as it relates to building management and application, heating and cooling, air handling, lighting and electrical systems, and building control systems. You will learn to analyze all aspects of large building operations and suggest changes complete with realistic capital expenditure proposals that include payback periods. These changes are designed to improve utility consumption within that building.
BES 7240	Strategic Financial Planning-Facilities	This course provides an overview of today's strategic and financial planning techniques for facility management. Budgeting, materials procurement and management, work order systems, work planning and scheduling, cost control concepts and techniques, and use of computers in facility management are some of the topics that are covered. A prime focus of this course is to raise the awareness of efficient energy and environmental management and to control such costs through effective planning and budgeting, and other financial techniques.
BES 7000	Building Systems: A Practical Overview	This subject is an introductory overview of today's complex building systems. It introduces building systems, enabling you to relate to the operation of a building in a safe, energy efficient and environmentally conscious manner. This course will also appeal to building managers who wish to gain some practical knowledge of the mechanical systems in buildings.
BES 7030	Air Handling	The Air Handling subject (incorporating waste management) is designed to prepare you to operate air handling systems in a safe, energy efficient, and environmentally conscious manner, as well as to manage waste in an efficient, cost effective and environmentally friendly manner.
BES 7020	Air Conditioning and Refrigeration	This course will help you understand the function of air conditioning and refrigeration with respect to equipment and design. Topics include reciprocating and centrifugal equipment, with an emphasis on theory, centrifugal plants, and operation and maintenance.
BES 7060	Water Treatment	This course is designed to provide an understanding of water treatment and the application of a water treatment system to industrial and commercial properties.
BES 7010	Heating	A component of the Building Environmental Systems Certificate (Class II). This course is designed to prepare you to operate heating systems in buildings in a safe, energy efficient, and environmentally conscious manner. Topics include: principles of heat transfer, building envelope, combustion and equipment, water and steam boilers, water pumps and seals, system controls and valves, heating terminals, and alternative technology.
COUN 2550	ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY	Please bring proof of prerequisite (unofficial transcript or grade report) to the first class. Instructor will be checking them and if the prerequisite is not met you will be asked to withdraw from the class. Component of the Social Services Worker Diploma. This course is designed to introduce students to the field of mental health and the study of psychopathology. The course focuses upon the description, classification, evaluation and treatment of

		mental health disorders. In addition students will study the use of the DSM classification system and evaluate the concept of "abnormality".
GNED 1181	Anthropology	This course seeks to develop an appreciation for the mystery of human development and to put this development into the perspective of the entire Earth's history. The course examines the physical, emotional and technological changes that man has experienced. When one has completed this course, one should have a good and fundamental understanding of the evolution of man and an appreciation for what humans have accomplished and will continue to accomplish. Course is an approved General Education elective.
CFC 1402	CFC/ODP Certficate	The Province of Ontario, Ministry of the Environment, regulates the training and certification of all persons who handle refrigerants. Topics of Instruction: CFC's and the Ozone Layer, Global efforts to reduce CFC/HCFC/HFC emissions, Summary of current Federal Regulations on CFC's and Halons, Provincial Regulations.
PFP8201	Criminology	Criminology seeks to understand the underpinnings of criminal and deviant behaviour. Students examine this behaviour through sociological, biological and psychological perspectives. Students apply this knowledge in critical examination of Canadian and global crimes and statistics. A contemporary look at victimology and restorative justice is also provided.
LDS1080	Communication (Leadership Development)	Communication skills are essential to all aspects of life but specifically this course will address business communications. With the various technology tools available and communication mechanisms today it is important to know what is available and what mechanism should be used to communicate which message. Managing the various communication channels today requires time management and effective informal and formal communication skills. This course will cover the communication styles, mechanisms and presentation skills facilitating meetings, social marketing and ways to improve all communications.
DECR 1351	Decorating with Light	This introductory course is designed to teach students the principles of lighting concepts along with how the appropriate lighting techniques can transform a space. Some topics include the colour and measurement of light, natural vs artificial light, layering techniques, the visual process, plotting your light, comparative bulb usage i.e. incandescent, LED's, halogen, etc and energy conservation.
STPC3580	Decontamination Principles, Procedures And Practices In Sterile Processing	Introduces students to the principles of decontamination including instrument/equipment disassembly, various methods of cleaning/disinfection, use of decontamination equipment (automated), proper workflow, standard precautions and the safe handling of sharps and medical bio-hazardous waste material.
SERV 1383	Customer Service & Ethics	You will focus on topics pertaining to the achievement of equity in various social and work settings, including, but not limited to, race, gender, ethnicity and social orientations. This course will enable you to identify possible strategies for empowerment in the workplace.

LDS1082	Employment Law For Leadership Development	Today's workplace is highly regulated from the commencement of the employment relationship through to its termination. An examination of both statutory law and common law will be undertaken in both federal and provincial jurisdictions. Students will review employment standards, health and safety, labour relations, pay equity and human rights legislation as it applies to management and unionized employees and leaders.
ENVI1580	Environment Management, An Introduction	The development of analytical and evaluation skills is required in the management of environmental issues. Students are exposed to environmental policies, legislation procedures, and become familiar with the implications and effects of environmental management strategies. The application and development of site inspections and program auditing are explored to assist in the recognition and analysis of potential environmental risks as they would apply in the development of an environmental management system.
ENVI1080	Environmental Citizenship	Based on the general principles of national citizenship, environmental citizenship goes beyond national borders toemphasize global environmental rights and responsibilities. Focus is on both conservation and planned sustainable use of our planet's resources, as well as on the recognition that environmental health is a prerequisite to human health. Being an environmentally-aware citizen involves personal commitment to learning more about the environment and to taking responsible environmental action. Students are encouraged to adopt attitudes and behaviours that foster global environmental responsibility.
ENVI 1084	Environmental Geology	You will examine the exciting and dramatic interactions between Geology and the surrounding environment. You will consider Geologic events—such as volcanoes, tsunami, earthquakes, landslides and avalanches—with a particular approach to their impact on humans and other life. In addition, you will analyze human responses to these hazards and disasters with a perspective towards the future. Furthermore, you will study the relationships between human activity and geology and the impact of one upon the other.
HLTS1083	Ergonomics	An overview of ergonomic principles highlights basic worksite investigation and familiarization with basic principles relating to anatomy, biomechanics, physiology, manual material handling, cumulative trauma disorders and office ergonomics.
CARE 1582	Ethical, Legal and Spiritual Concerns	This course will explore attitudes towards death and the death rituals and ceremonies of world religious traditions including Hinduism, Judaism, Christianity, Islam and Buddhism. Students will also explore the religious attitudes and beliefs concerning immortality and life after death.
FOOD 1080	Field to Fork: introduction to Local and Global Food Systems	In an age of the 4,000 km Caesar salad and the 100-mile diet, with over 1 billion hungry people on Earth and even more who are overweight, understanding the "food system" is a hot item on the menu. FSW 1554	Food Preparation and Production	Food Preparation and Production is designed as an education and training experience that will assist students in gaining practical skills required in their work environment. Students will identify and classify food commodities, while developing an overall understanding of product specifications including: origin, quality, grades and government guidelines. Students will examine the composition of food, the production requirements and appropriate cooking methods.
ADDC1580	Foundations In Addictions: Signs & Symptoms	Students will examine models and elements of addiction including the addiction spiral, terminology and theoretical approaches to explaining and understanding addiction. Age, gender, ethnicity, culture, and geography will be examined in relation to cycles and forms of addiction. The course will provide students with an introduction to the use of assessment tools, client communication, interviewing and treatment planning. The intent of this course is to provide students with introductory knowledge on the signs and symptoms of addiction, including the physical and psychological components as examined through the lens of various screening and assessment inventories.
GNED 1380	Global Citizenship	The world is shrinking. The ice caps are melting. A sneeze, thousands of kilometres away, starts a health pandemic, and technology enables us to intimately view not only earthquakes and tsunamis but human rights violations around the world. This reality calls for an understanding of sustainability, diversity, and social justice. A global citizen is aware of the wider world, respects diversity, is outraged by injustice, participates in community from the local to global level, and feels compelled to act to make the world a more humane and sustainable place. Global citizenship will help students gain personal understanding of themselves as citizens of the world and apply it in their own lives.
ENVI1981	Global Warming Concepts	In this course, students will research and discuss issues related to global warming, developing skills in innovative thinking, research, political awareness, ethical reasoning, debating, and communicating on-line and in writing. Students will develop an awareness of the current scientific certainties in global warming versus what is not certain, historical and current political issues at a global and national level, including topics such as the Kyoto agreement, ethical responsibilities of individuals, corporations, and governments, and the conflicts between economic development and the environment. This course provides the opportunity for students to develop greater understanding of social awareness and the relationship between science, technology and an individual's responsibility to society and the environment. This course meets the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities' General Education requirements in the area of Civic Life.
ECON1080	Globalization & Sustainability	The rapid growth of the global economy raises fundamental questions: How do trade and politics affect development and the environment? What are the effects of free trade and the rise of multi-national corporations on local cultures? What are the effects of the "clash of cultures" produced by international travel, migration, and new social, collaborative technologies that send film, books, television, music and other "proprietary" content spinning around the world instantly? Is globalization environmentally sustainable? Students examine these and

		other questions and analyze the day-to-day choices raised by globalization in an increasingly interconnected world.
GNED1484	History Of Aboriginal/Canadian Relations	This course provides an overview of the historic stages of the relationship between Indigenous peoples in Canada from contact to present day. It will explore the different world views at contact, the years of cooperation and negotiation through the fur trade and treaty making era and the impact of government colonial policy on Indigenous nations. The course will also explore the constitutional recognition of Aboriginal rights which provide an important context for understanding contemporary issues between Indigenous and Canadian societies including land claims, treaties and self-government.
CHLD4581	Human Sexuality	This course comprises an analysis of human sexuality drawing on historical, theoretical, cross cultural, and life cycle perspectives of sexual attitudes, behaviors, development, and experiences using a Canadian cultural lens. Selected topics may include, gender relations, body image, sexual diversity, arousal and response, mating, dating, and interpersonal attraction, interpersonal communication, sex education, sexual health or risk, and issues of power or intimacy.
GNED1488	Indigenous Identity And Relationship To The Land	This course will require students to experience and explore Indigenous cosmology(s), knowledge(s) and world view(s) as it relates to the land. The influence of land on Indigenous worldview(s) will provide a way of understanding contemporary perspectives of identity and self-determination. In addition, students will be encouraged to examine and locate their own identity and world view in relation to these concepts.
HR1080	Leadership In A Team Environment	Teams have the fundamental building blocks of organizational structure. The skills and abilities needed to lead a team-based organization are examined. Leading in a team environment requires competencies, tools and techniques that focus on group dynamics rather than solely on individual performance. Learn how to mobilize participation, build consensus and enable individuals to maximize their team's ability to achieve results.
LDS1086	Leading Responsibly (Leadership Development Series)	Sustainability in business is often related to profitability. Organizations now need to incorporate practices that include a more holistic approach to the responsibility corporations have to their communities and the environment. Leaders need to assess the impact of the business in an ethical and globally sustainable way using measures such as Corporate Social Responsibility and triple-bottom line accounting.
HLTS1080	Legislation For Health & Safety	Understanding the various jurisdictions is foundational to occupational health and safety. Students learn to locate specific legislation, the interface between the statutes, regulations, codes and standards. The obligations of employers and of employees is discussed, as is the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act and Regulations, filing claims, entitlement decision making, benefits, appeals and re-employment.

LDS1087	Managing Change	Today's leaders are often called upon to implement and support the change process. They need to be able to identify and respond to internal and external factors that will determine when and what type of change initiatives are required. Environmental scanning, identifying trends, implementing and measuring successful change are all essential to developing and managing change to the benefit of the organization. Organizational readiness and risk assessment will also be covered in the context of best practices.
ENVI 1083	Meteorology	This is an introductory course in Meteorology that seeks to, logically and methodically, develop the student's understanding of weather and weather-related phenomena. Students taking this course will develop a good working knowledge of all aspects of Meteorology and will be much better informed as to the nature and causes of weather-related events.
FSW1582	Nutrition In Health Care	This course focuses on the basic principles of diet therapy. Several disease conditions are discussed with emphasis on the therapeutic diets and nutrition support required for treatment.
HLTH4280 OR HLTH3280	Occupational Health & Safety	This course introduces participants to the broad and ever-changing field of occupational health and safety, an inherently technical subject area. The multiple dimensions of the various issues - technical, legislative, political, and personal - are a required part of the training for a professional in this field or a related field. Major topic areas include the Occupational Health and Safety Act, Workers' Compensation Board (WCB), Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS), transportation of dangerous goods, accident prevention and investigation, physical and biological agents, and the management of Occupational Health and Safety programs.
CARE 1580	Orientation to Palliative CareCC	This course will provide an overview of Palliative Care and coping with death, dying and grief. The focus is to provide you with a review of the concepts of Palliative Care, the multidiscipline team, hospice, current approaches to care, roles, issues and expectation. Identify what resources are available and discuss home care vs. institutional care.
CARE 1581	Palliative Care Communications	This course will focus on communication with the terminally ill patient and their families. Topics include: basic process and steps of effective communication, factors influencing personal and cultural attitudes in communication, identifying basic verbal and non-verbal communication, techniques used to establish a trusting relationship and how to identify ineffective communication.
CARE 1585	Psychological and Social Implications of Palliative Care	This course is designed to enable students to develop the basic knowledge and skills required to understand psychological and social implications in oncology and palliative care patients and their families throughout the trajectory of the cancer experience. Topics to be explored include historical views on cancer, coping, factors affecting coping and helping relationship, sexuality and oncology, crisis management, psychological issues in Cancer/Palliative care and burnout and ethical issues.

HRM2284	Recruitment & Selection	A basic study is undertaken regarding the principles, issues, trends and legislative requirements affecting recruitment and selection. Human resources (HR) professionals need an understanding of how recruitment and selection fits into the broader organizational structure, processes and goals of an organization and how this function is related to other functions of human resources management. Students will acquire the knowledge and skills needed to successfully identify human resource requirements and attract and retain an effective workforce for an organization. The changing legal environment and the impact of laws on recruitment and selection are an important component of this subject.
HRM4284	Recruitment & Selection	A basic study is undertaken regarding the principles, issues, trends and legislative requirements affecting recruitment and selection. Human resources (HR) professionals need an understanding of how recruitment and selection fits into the broader organizational structure, processes and goals of an organization and how this function is related to other functions of human resources management. Students will acquire the knowledge and skills needed to successfully identify human resource requirements and attract and retain an effective workforce for an organization. The changing legal environment and the impact of laws on recruitment and selection are an important component of this subject.
GNED 1481	Social media & society	In a few short years, social media has profoundly changed the global communication landscape. With the advent of social media tools such Facebook, YouTube, Wikipedia, and Twitter, more and more people are connecting and collaborating online, and creating and distributing content in ways we have never seen before. This course will provide a summary of the major developments in social media and will examine how social media is changing media, business, government, the economy, development, and education in fundamental ways. Students will be introduced to a variety of social media environments and will gain hands-on experience with many of the leading social media applications. This course requires active participation of students and a willingness to immerse in social media practices.
HLTH 1387	Stress, Wellness & Nutrition	Stress can play a significant role in people's professional lives. Learning how to deal with stress is vital to long term health. While stress alone does not cause disease, it triggers molecular changes throughout the body that make people more susceptible to many illnesses. In this course, students will gain an understanding of the importance of how to deal with both positive and negative stress in their lives. By using wellness perspectives, each student will gain more insight into how he or she can control both internal and external stressors.
CHLD 2280	Abuse and Family Violence	Child and youth abuse identification and intervention are viewed as the responsibility of every individual. Abuse of children often occurs within the larger system of family violence. Impact of socialization and prevention programs will be examined as pertinent social issues. Assessment, treatment and prevention techniques and programs will be examined including conflict resolution skills.

TEAC 2983	Adults with Learning Disabilities	This course will help you gain insight into the abilities, needs and issues of adults with learning disabilities in an educational or training setting, and society as a whole. You will gain general knowledge and awareness of the various exceptionalities with a primary focus on understanding adults with learning disabilities. Strategies and skills are explored so that educators/trainers can provide appropriate modifications and accommodations to course content, delivery and evaluation, to ensure that all learners have an opportunity to be successful.
ECE7080	Advocacy, Practice & Reflection Resource Consulting	This subject prepares the students to become effective advocates on behalf of children, families and the field of inclusive early childhood education. Students develop an understanding of the process of empowerment that assists families when advocating on their own behalf. Current elements of best practice and personal reflection and development are integral components of this subject.
HLT 7798	Assessment and Planning for the Aging Adult	This course will provide a focus on assessment and planning for the psychosocial and spiritual needs of the aging individual with special attention given to understanding aging in Canada; personality development; self-perception and self-concept; communication skills required for an older clientele; verbal and non- verbal communication techniques plus cultural variables.
SAPS 1280	Behaviour Management and Crisis Intervention	This course is intended to teach students how to effectively respond to clients who are exposed to stress and to uncertainty in a helping profession environment. In this interactive course, participants will practice effective strategies and techniques for the management of conflict and for communication in stressful situations. Best practices in care-giving situations will be studied along with the impact of personal values, institutional settings, and other factors on dysfunctional behaviour. Self-care and self-evaluation of the care- giver will also be emphasized.
CCSC1280	Building & Maintaining Customer Relationships	In this course, students develop an understanding of customer service and the skills associated with understanding the needs of customers, meeting those needs, and fostering an environment that encourages customers to return.
PFP 101	Canadian Criminal Justice System	In this course, students acquire foundational knowledge and skills related to the development, structure and practical operation of the Canadian criminal justice system. The course is geared towards students who will become practitioners in the criminal justice field and will require knowledge of their role in relation to the justice process as a whole. Throughout the course, students will have an opportunity to critically analyze the various components of the justice system, as well as examine the overall effectiveness and efficiency of the system.
COMM1704	Canadian Literature	This course will allow students to read selected Canadian literature, including novels and short stories, and to analyze and discuss various key points of each piece of literature. Students will identify the different types of audiences intended for each literary piece. Some suggested areas of study for each novel will include selected key literary terms as well as discussion of the relevance of setting and plot in relation to Canadian culture and

		history. This course will focus on both reading literature as well as the use of proper written English. The novels chosen will also be explored in relation to their relevance to Canadian culture. Key literary terms and events will be discussed for each novel, including questions for each literary piece.
COMM 2294	Communications for Business I	To be successful in your personal, academic, and professional life, you must apply effective communication skills. Critically and appropriately evaluating and responding to written and visual messages and effectively presenting ideas through a variety of channels will improve your opportunities for success. This course reviews and enhances students' communication skills (reading, writing, listening, speaking). Students respond to and write effective messages for different purposes and audiences. In addition, students research, evaluate, analyze, organize, and document information. Communicating effectively in diverse teams and across cultures is emphasized. Students prepare, deliver, and evaluate short oral presentations on a variety of business-related topics.
CARE 1587	CE-Palliative Care Durham College Certificate	This course is a component of the Palliative Care Certificate program. The focus will be on comfort measures for the terminally ill patient. There will be an emphasis placed on promoting a realistic independence for the client based on his/her support systems.
GER 1593	Complex Family Dynamics	The dynamics of family life is a complex subject. It draws insights from academic fields such as; gerontology, psychology, sociology, anthropology, medicine, theology - and also from personal experience. This course serves as an introduction to elements of family dynamics related to the complexities of aging. It offers students' knowledge and effective approaches to apply both professionally and personally with the elderly and their family members.
CNST1082	Construction Blueprints & Methods	This course can be taken on its own and is the first course within the Construction Estimating program. The course provides an introduction to basic blueprint reading and common methods of construction. Students will use construction drawings to discuss topics ranging from soil evacuation to roof design. We will discuss legal concepts of building/planning codes and statutes. You will gain a foundation of residential/commercial construction principles, and codes in practice today.
CRIM1080	Cults & Terrorism	This course will focus on conformity issues surrounding religious fundamentalism, sects, cults and terrorist groups. The reasons why people join and why they may have a difficult time leaving, will be examined. Society's contributions to supporting cultic groups will be explored. Strategies for protecting individuals and vulnerable populations from cultic and terrorist activity will be developed.
LAW2082	Family Law Practice & Procedure	Upon successful completion of this course the student will have developed a basic knowledge of family law practice and procedures as defined by the Rules of Civil Procedure for Ontario and the Family Law Act as required in the role of a Legal Assistant. This course will include knowledge of domestic contracts, divorce procedure, and family litigation
HLTH1589	Fire Protection	The risk of fire is a threat to health, safety and the delivery of services. Students learn specific information related to fire and life safety. Topics include the chemistry and physics of fire, building design for life safety, and other aspects of fire and life safety. Applicable legislation related to fire and life safety is also covered.

HASS 3580	Health Assessment	Health Assessment is designed to provide the student with the cognitive, affective and psychomotor skills required to conduct a complete physical examination and health assessment of the client across the life cycle. Included are health history taking, physical examination skills, health promotion techniques and clinical decision-making. The focus will be on the adult client who faces health challenges and life transitions.
GNED1486	Human Behavior In The Workplace	Understanding human relations is essential for career and personal success. This course draws on sociological, psychological, ethical, and legal perspectives to enhance understanding of effective interactions in today's workplace. The course includes an experiential component where students learn and practice effective teamwork skills.
CCA 1585	Management Leadership Skills	You will gain an understanding of management and leadership styles. As a manager or supervisor in today's changing economic and political climate, you will manage the many practical aspects of a business and provide leadership by motivating, empowering and supporting staff. Note: Course contains mandatory group work. Course is equivalent to CPA and RIBO accredited courses
HLTS1084	Management Labor Concerns In Occupational Health & Safety	Emerging trends and current management issues, concepts, and practices pertaining to the field of occupational health and safety are examined. Discussion focuses on several functional characteristics within organizations that pose unique challenges for the practitioner attempting to effectively manage resources, both material and human.
CORR1380	Safe & Secure Environments	Students develop an understanding of the legal parameters of correctional operations, the organizational framework of federal and provincial correctional services, and an overview of staffing models and responsibilities in secure environments. Designed as an introductory module, a knowledge foundation for subsequent application of static and dynamic security skills is established.
GNED1490	Same Sex Issues	This course is an introductory survey of the history, life and culture of gay and lesbian men and women in Canada, the United States and elsewhere. Students examine a number of topics such as personal and family life, same-sex relationships, health and social issues, media and the arts, to gain a better understanding of their impact on and relevance to homosexual people.
GIS 1082	DESIGNING & MANAGING A GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM	You will gain a foundation to design and maintain a geographic information system (GIS). As well, you will become familiar with databases, standards and industry best practices for data management.
GIS 1250	GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS INTRODUCTION	You will gain an overview of the fundamental concepts and terminology, as well as the role of geographic information systems in business, government, surveying and natural resources. Topics include the collection, management, analysis and presentation of spatial data; database system concepts; data modelling and digital mapping.

GIS 2250	GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS SOFTWARE- ARCVIEW	At the end of this course, the student should be able to create data in ArcView, to query and manipulate data; geocode addresses perform spatial analyses, produce map outputs and charts. Included with the book is a fully functioning 180-day trial version of ArcGIS software that can be downloaded from the internet and a CD of data for the book's exercises. Students will require a Windows OS to install the software.
GIS 1282	Global Positioning Systems	This course will start with an overview of GPS, history of GPS and GPS Applications. With an emphasis on the principles of GPS and how it works, you will learn about the GPS satellites and the information and signals they transmit, types of receivers and the fundamentals of how they work, and what GPS can be used for. Topics covered include accuracy and positioning, the types of errors associated with using GPS, absolute and differential techniques, different types of signals, considerations when collecting data using GPS, and how to undertake mission planning. An introduction to other global navigation satellite systems (GNSS) is provided. GPS modernization
GIS 2251	Remote Sensing	This course will introduce you to the principles and applications of remote sensing. As a planner, environmental scientist, real estate agent or other professional, you can use this science to examine the Earth from "above". At the end of the course, you will be able to understand the basic principles of remote sensing, and use software to manipulate image data and to give a preliminary interpretation of this data.
INTN 1881	Internet Mapping	Various types and variations of Internet Mapping will be discussed. Various ways of acquiring, analyzing and converting data for your Internet Map Project, Geographic Markup Language, Web Map Service and Web Feature Service Standards will be studied. Open-source and commercial solutions to serving geographical data and common tasks, pitfalls and issues involved in creating maps will be examined. This course uses MapServer, which is an Open Source development environment for constructing spatially enabled Internet-web applications and Google Maps.
ENTR 1281	Entrepreneurship I	This course will cover a wide variety of topics for those interested in starting, or seeking employment in, a small business. The course will capture the entrepreneurial spirit, and students will get first-hand exposure to the benefits and drawbacks of starting a new business and being your own boss. Issues pervasive in small businesses such as spotting trends or taking advantage of niche business opportunities will be discussed and factored into class exercises. Students will have the opportunity to practice start-up skills through feasibility analysis, the idea pitch, defining markets, targeting customers, operations, and deciding on which type of business to start. The ability to maintain and sustain operations of a small business will be experienced with particular attention to budgeting, forecasting, and cash management. In this course, students will have an authentic opportunity to test their entrepreneurial skills through a real business venture.
ENTR 4280	Entrepreneurship II	This course will cover the creation of a comprehensive business plan. The course will capture the entrepreneurial spirit, and students will get first-hand exposure to the benefits and drawbacks of starting a new business and being your own boss. Through the steps in creating the business plan, students will have the opportunity to practice start-up skills through defining markets, targeting customers, and addressing financial planning such as cash management, budgeting, and financing. At the conclusion of the course, students will each have the opportunity to 'pitch' their plan to a potential investor.

HUMA 1380	Humanities	This course focuses on some of the fundamental questions individuals ask of themselves as they proceed through life. Why are we the way we are? Do we have free will or are we prisoners of our past experiences or of our biology? What motivates societies to change? Why do social changes often divide people into opposing camps? Why does work merely "kill time" for so many people? What constitutes good government? Can nations deal with
		global issues? These questions and others are organized into units that begin with issues concerning the nature of the individual and then extend outward to various social, cultural, and physical contexts.
MKTG 4287	Marketing Digitally	This course introduces a variety of web-based and digital marketing approaches. Students will examine the new and fast-changing opportunities for marketers resulting from the changing use of digital media, including search engine strategies, websites, social media, and mobile communication. The course provides students with the opportunity to observe, evaluate and recommend online marketing strategies with an emphasis on measurement of online marketing activity. Equivalent: MKTG 4207
