Meaning "water" in Thai, "Nawa" reflects the Southeast Asian belief in ritual to pay respect to "Mae Kong Ka" (Water Goddess) and ask her forgiveness for disrespecting the river. Such rituals are performed during the annual Loy Kratong water festival with thousands of floats made from banana trunk and leaves and decorated with flowers. The effect of this practice, however, creates an enormous trash problem and massively pollutes the river. The choreographer would like to evoke a greater sense of protection for the environment and ask people to be conscious of their actions.

JESSICA ANTHONY

Jessica Anthony is a performer, choreographer, and educator who is interested in the ways dance empowers us to tell our stories, create community, and practice new ways of being in the world. From 2004 – 2010 she performed nationally and internationally with Jane Comfort and Company and dabbled in her own choreography, showing works at

The Field (2006) and Invisible Dog Arts Center (2010). She received her BA in Dance from The University of Washington in 2003 and her MFA in Dance with an emphasis in choreography from the University of Iowa in 2013. Her main area of research involves using dance as a tool for social engagement and inviting undergraduate students into the process of facilitating, creating, processing, and performing. This year, Jessica is a Visiting Assistant Professor in Dance at the University of Iowa and is thrilled to be co-directing Dancers in Company, the department's touring outreach company. She is a wife and mother to two children.



MICHAEL SAKAMOTO

Michael Sakamoto is an interdisciplinary artist and scholar active in dance, theatre, performance, media, and photography, and one of the leading butoh artists in North America. His work engages liminal, dialectic modes of being and advocates for intercultural dialogue through collaborations across disciplines, professional fields, and national

borders. Michael's performances, videos, photo essays and installations have been presented throughout Asia, Europe, and North America, including at Vancouver International Dance Festival, REDCAT, Dance Center of Columbia College-Chicago, TACTFest Osaka, Audio Art Festival-Krakow, and many others. He is the recipient of numerous grants and fellowships, including from the National Dance Project, Asian Cultural Council, Japan Foundation, Meet the Composer, and others. Michael is currently touring Flash, a dance theater duet with renowned hip-hop artist, Rennie Harris, and is developing Soil, a dance theater trio with performers from Thailand, Cambodia, and Vietnam/ USA for touring in 2016-2018. He is also writing An Empty Room: Butoh Performance and the Social Body in Crisis, the first English-language scholarly text on butoh written by a longtime practitioner, for Wesleyan University Press (under contract). FACULTY CHOREOGRAPHERS



ARMANDO DUARTE

Armando Duarte, professor, choreographer, and researcher joined the University of Iowa in 1993. He has received numerous awards throughout his career and has choreographed for companies in the US, Brazil, and other countries, with more than half of his repertory being based-on or related to his native Brazilian culture. Currently, his academic

research involves an in-depth investigation on the Brazilian popular culture of Samba and Carnival, from which he created courses that offer students theoretical and practical experiences on many aspects related to Samba and Carnival in Brazil. In addition, he has been presenting lectures on the subject to other institutions and participating in conferences throughout the US. He has been recently awarded with an Obermann Center for Advanced Studies Interdisciplinary Research Grant for Summer 2016. Armando is extremely happy and grateful to have the opportunity to contribute to the Dancers in Company 2016 repertory.



ELOY BARRAGÁN

Eloy Barragán is UI Associate Professor of Ballet, Undergraduate Program Director, American Ballet Theatre Certified Teacher, and Certified ScreenDance Film Maker from the University of Utah. Eloy received a choreographer fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Boise Arts Council, the Lifetime Career Fellowship by the Idaho Commission of the Arts, and the UI

Career Development Award. His choreographic work has been presented at the National Conservatory of Dance and Music in Paris, France, the 4th and 5th International Dance Festival, and the Latin Choreographers Festival in New York City. In 2009, he was invited as choreographer for the Bi-Centennial of the Independence and Centennial of the Mexican revolution. He has created new works for the National Ballet of Mexico, Ballet Pro/Musica in Arizona, the Beijing Dance Academy, Richmond Ballet, National Ballet de Puerto Rico, Utah Ballet, Ballet Real de Costa Rica, Dance Theater of Oregon, American Festival Ballet, Apoc – Apoc, and the National School of Classical and Modern Dance from the National Institute of Fine Arts – Mexico, City. His professional career began with Joffrey II and the Washington Ballet before he became a soloist for Compania Nacional de Danza in Mexico City. His career led him to Europe where he was a soloist for the Ballet Royal de Wallonie, and Mainz Stattheater for Ballet de Monterey. Eloy was a Principal dancer, regisseur, and Ballet Master for Eugene Ballet and Ballet Idaho.

GUEST CHOREOGRAPHERS



RENNIE HARRIS

Rennie Harris is an Artistic Director, Choreographer, and Director. "The Basquiat of the US. Contemporary dance scene," Lorenzo Rennie Harris has literally embodied the history of hip-hop dance (London Times). Rennie Harris has brought "social" dances to the "concert" stage, creating a cohesive dance style that finds a cogent voice in the

theater. At the turn of the century alongside Princess Grace Kelly and Dr. Julius Erving, Harris was voted one of the most influential people in the last one hundred years of Philadelphia history. He's been compared to twentieth-century dance legends, Alvin Ailey and Bob Fosse and has been awarded three Bessie Awards, three Alvin Ailey Black Choreographers Awards, an Ethnic Dance Award, the Herb Alpert Award in the Arts for choreography, as well as nominated for an Lawrence Olivier Award (UK). In addition, he has received the coveted "Philadelphia Rocky" award, Governors Artist of the Year award, and the USA artist award for choreography, and voted one of Philadelphia's

Creative Ambassadors in 2010. He also received an honorary doctorate in the Arts and Humanities (Bates College) and has recently received his 2nd Honorary Doctorate in the Fine Arts from Columbia College (Chicago). Touring nationally and internationally for more than 30 years, he has recently toured Egypt, Jordan, Palestine, and surrounding countries. Rennie Harris served as 1 of 4 Ambassadors for the United States as part of President Obama's cultural exchange program Dance Motion USA, which was led by former Secretary of the State Hilary Clinton. He and his company Rennie Harris Puremovement and their infectious brand of movement have pioneered a new genre referred to as "Hip-hop Dance Theater." Dr. Lorenzo "Rennie" Harris is atop the hip-hop heap - its leading ambassador.



WAEWADO SIRISOOK

Waewdao Sirisook (choreographer, performer, director,) is an Adjunct Assistant Professor in the Department of Dance at the University of Iowa. She holds an MFA in Dance from the UCLA Department of World Arts and Cultures and BFA from Chiang Mai University's Thai Arts program, and also studied Balinese dance in Bali,

Indonesia. As a professional traditional and contemporary dancer, Waewdao has participated in international cultural exchange programs with the Tourism Authority of Thailand since the age of 19, performing in dozens of cultural missions throughout Europe, North America, and Asia. Her work focuses on expressing the diversity of her native traditional Lanna arts and culture, maintaining its roots, and bringing it to diverse audiences.

Waewdao received a fellowship to participate in the Asian Pacific Performance Exchange 2006 and has received fellowship funding for study and research in the United States for three years in a row by the Asian Cultural Council. Waewdao is a teaching artist-in-residence for the Institute of Southeast Asian Affairs at Chiang Mai University (CMU) and formerly Payap University, and occasionally guest lectures in the Fine Arts Department at CMU. She also contributed choreography to the Black Eyed Peas video, Boom Boom Pow, and has collaborated with numerous international artists, including butoh dance artist Michael Sakamoto, new music composer Amy Knoles, and Hiroshi Koike, director of Pappa Tarahumara and Hiroshi Koike Bridge Project, and puppet artist Anurupa Roy.


