



OCT 2017

Science Gallery Detroit receives a million-dollar grant from MSU Federal Credit Union (MSUFCU), to be disbursed over the next 5 years.

NOV 2017

We launch the open call for our inaugural exhibition, HUSTLE.

NOV 2017

We kick off our lead in programming with The STEAM Engine, a science-themed poetry slam, and The Intersection, which paired artists and scientists in dialogues around topics ranging from fashion, to sound, to interdisciplinary education. The Intersection was produced in partnership with the Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit (MOCAD).

MARCH 2018

The Science of Grief provided community members with the opportunity to share stories about grief they have experienced in front of a rotating silent audience. At fourteen hours, the event set a record across the Network as the longest Science Gallery event.

APRIL 2018

In The Intersection: Behind the Scenes of Fashion, industry professionals and artists from Detroit is the New Black, Lazlo, and Detroit Fiber Works examined the behindthe-scenes process of creating sustainable fashion products that we see in our favorite stores. JUNE 2018

We launch the open call for our second exhibition, DEPTH.




EXHIBITIONS: HUSTLE

HUSTLE, an exhibition that explored what it means to work hard or get worked over, was open to the public from June 16, 2018 to August 25, 2018 at 1001 Woodward Avenue. HUSTLE is a theme that is uniquely Detroit, as the spirit of the hustle has become an unofficial rallying cry for the city. The theme paid homage to Detroit's reputation for the resilience and determination of its people by examining the many definitions of survival and success.

Our intent was to create space where people of Detroit, specifically those ages 15 to 25, could come to learn, converse, and teach us about the implications of hustle in their community as well as around the world. Our initial assessment is that we were successful in reaching a challenging demographic to address, and our overall number of 10,295 visitors exceeded the opening in London and nearly reached the total achieved in Melbourne. Audience engagement with Science Gallery Detroit's social media channels increased by an average of 60.43% throughout the run of HUSTLE. We had additional success on building relationships and creating spaces for programming and events to be designed with communities in Detroit and at MSU.





PROGRAMMING HIGHLIGHTS EVENTS SINCE LAUNCH: 36


The STEAM Engine: Hosted by Will "The Poet" Langford and Natasha T. Miller, The STEAM Engine was a unique fusion of poetry and science. From the functions of the medulla oblongata to the science of sound waves, premier spoken word artists from across the region explored a range of scientific topics as they competed for a \$1,000 grand prize. Audience members took on the role of determining the winner, and over 40% of the audience was between the ages of 15 and 25.



The Intersection: Developed in partnership with the Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit, The Intersection featured artists who are pushing the boundaries between the fields of science and art and examined how an interdisciplinary approach to thinking and problem solving can help us address some of today's most challenging social issues. Topics ranged from The final installment of the series, The Science of Food and Music, featured Ahmir "Questlove" Thompson, world-renowned musician, foodie and New York Times bestselling author ; Max Hardy, chef and owner of Detroit's River Bistro, Coop, and expert on Caribbean-fusion cuisine; and award-winning writer and filmmaker dream hampton.



Love Motel for Insects: Using UV lights to attract local arthropods and create a temporary Love Motel for Insects, artist Brandon Ballengée hosted an evening of collecting, identifying, drawing, and discussing insects.



The Biggest Gayest Show Ever: The Biggest Gayest Show Ever was a variety showcase featuring world-renowned entertainers from the Detroit LGBTQ community. This show was a collaboration with the Ruth Ellis Center and acted as a response to conversion therapy while celebrating the first international day of LGBTQ+ people in science, technology, engineering, and math.

Science of Grief: Science Gallery Detroit Community Engagement Manager Natasha T. Miller opened a space in the Detroit Institute of Arts that provided people with the opportunity to speak about some grief they have experienced. For fourteen hours, community members shared their stories on stage in front of a rotating, silent audience. Natasha has been dedicated to providing public spaces for people to speak about their grief, and this event was a continuation of that work.

Go-In Poet: After a powerful performance of the poems that won over the College Unions Poetry Slam Invitational Team (CUPSI) crowds in Philadelphia, the Michigan State University CUPSI team discussed the hustle of college life and how they hustled their way to becoming the 9th-ranked college slam team in the world.



Science Storytelling Workshop: From STEM topics to science history, literature, ethnography, and more, participants in this workshop series discovered step-by-step techniques they could use to unlock something completely different and engaging about their research. Hosted by Kyle Marian, participants learned storytelling techniques to translate their research/work life or science interests for wider audiences and discovered how to better connect with their audience, whether it was grant funders on paper, career-days with young students, or a future job-talk.

Prediction Error: Alice Liddell & Dancers: This dance performance explored the concept of effort through the lens of working hard without reaping results. Many of the systems we operate in have tangible ways to measure our success. For example, in school, our grades on exams reflect our hard work and often garner a reward, recognizable to others and ourselves. However, once we are removed from this system, we are no longer guaranteed results from our efforts, and we must reconcile with the dissolution of this familiar structure.







Detroit Hustle: Hustle is more than a word for many Detroiters; it's a way to connect to music and movement. For a week in July, famous Detroit instructor Calvin Sibert (a.k.a. "Mr. Smooth") hosted Hustle dance lessons outside of 1001 Woodward.











MEDIATORS


Mediators are a team of young adults with a passion for talking about science and the arts. The mediator program was founded upon the idea that Science Gallery is a space for conversation, for ideas to collide and opinions to be shared.

Mediators are selected for the role because they are interested in the world around them, and in particular in the arts, science, and design. They are typically very interested in what happens in a space where art and science meld in new and sometimes surprising ways, in what way the things they see/do/say/hear at Science Gallery Detroit might play out in the world, in subject areas outside of their personal interests, and in listening to and learning from others.

Using their expert knowledge and interdisciplinary backgrounds, our incredible team of 17 mediators sparked conversations around the exhibits within HUSTLE, and shared their knowledge of Science Gallery and its activities with the general public.

PLANS FOR 2019

Our second exhibition, DEPTH, will examine the power and complexities of water and open in summer of 2019. Science Gallery Detroit remains a pop-up gallery model, with hopes of securing a permanent gallery location by 2020.
