## To Whom It May Concern:

I am pleased to submit a letter on behalf of Alta Planning + Design in support of the Initiative for Pedestrian and Bicycle Innovation at Portland State University. IBPI fills a unique niche in the pedestrian and bicycle planning, design and engineering profession, offering many innovative services:

- Cutting-edge bicycle and pedestrian research, such as Dr. Jennifer Dill's "Bike GPS study" that demonstrated
  the value of low-traffic bikeways; Dr. John Gliebe's work with Metro (the Portland region's elected regional
  government) to integrate bicycles into the regional traffic model; and evaluation efforts for the City of
  Portland's Safe Routes to School program and demonstration facilities like bike boxes, cycle tracks, and
  buffered bike lanes.
- Training for active professionals on timely bicycle and pedestrian issues, ranging from introductory week-long
  intensive basics courses to advanced special topics in planning, design, and engineering. This is particularly
  important because most urban planning programs in the nation do not include training on nonmotorized
  transportation. Courses are taught in most cases by active professionals in the field, offering participants the
  benefit of unparalleled real-life experience.
- Technical manuals aimed at professionals that advance the field, such as the Bicycle Boulevard Guidebook
  that defined essential and optional design elements for low-traffic bikeways designed to appeal to a wide
  variety of user types and offer a low-stress bicycle experience.
- IPBI is a force for cultural exchange. New for 2011, the IBPI is offering PSU students the opportunity to learn
  about the world's best bicycling infrastructure firsthand through the Netherlands study tour. IBPI also
  partners closely with First Stop Portland to arrange for site tours, lectures, and meetings between
  international delegations visiting Portland to learn about green initiatives, including bicycle and pedestrian
  innovations. IBPI has also created materials for self-guided tours of innovative bicycle and pedestrian facilities
  in Portland.
- IBPI fosters academic excellence and supports the development of promising young bicycle and pedestrian
  professionals by offering five community-sponsored scholarships for masters and Ph.D. candidates in the

Urban Studies and Urban and Regional Planning programs who intend to pursue a career in pedestrian and bicycle transportation.

In short, IBPI offers a completely unique bridge between the academic, private and public sectors, and tangibly advances the field of bicycle and pedestrian transportation through research, information sharing, professional development, supporting young and established scholars, and serving as a clearinghouse for technical and policy guidance. Portland, Oregon, and the nation are richer for IBPI's formation.
