NMU Interim Strategic Plan

In February 2022, the NMU Board of Trustees directed that an interim strategic plan be created to help tell the story of who we are at NMU and to provide an on ramp for Northern's new president. The Institutional Effectiveness (IE) office has coordinated development of the plan. IE has conducted engagement sessions with faculty, staff and students and is coordinating steering committees that oversee the interim plan's five focus areas. Focus area steering committees have faculty and administrators leading as co-chairs and a range of faculty and staff participants.

NMU Organization

NMU is comprised of four main divisions with many offices operating within each division.

The **Academic Affairs Division** is administered by the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs. Academic Affairs has oversight of departments related to academic operations, student development, and admissions. Academic Affairs includes Global Campus, continuing education and workforce development, economic development and workforce initiatives.

Teaching at NMU

The Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) offers a wide range of teaching and learning professional development opportunities. Instructional technologists and the NMU Teaching and Learning Scholar are available in Harden Hall 106 to work with you individually to develop strategies and materials for your face-to-face or online classes.

The Teaching and Learning Advisory Council (TLAC), a standing committee of the Academic Senate, helps stimulate the creation of a campus culture that truly values, promotes, recognizes, and rewards excellence in teaching and learning. TLAC offers the opportunity to have a TLAC member visit your classroom and provide a confidential peer review of your teaching.

FAQs

Q: How do I get an EduCat site for my class?

A: NMU EduCat™ is our Moodle-based learning management system. EduCat sites are not created automatically. If you want one for your face-to-face class or your online class, you need to complete the EduCat Course Request Form (<https://tinyurl.com/educatrequest>). The Center for Teaching and Learning will create the course shell for you.

Q: What is active learning and why should I do it?

A: Think about active learning as the opposite of passive learning. There are many ways you can include active learning in your courses, but they all rely on the intentional engagement of students. Student-centered active learning techniques have resulted in improved student understanding and improved student retention in the general student population and in underrepresented minorities. The CTL can help you with the techniques that are best for your classes.

Q: How can I share material with my class and comply with copyright laws?

A: Electronic reserve material can be added through EduCat. Bring physical reserve items to the Library Public Services Desk. Reserve requests must be made each semester. Library staff manages copyright issues/fees for reserve material. For details, see <https://lib.nmu.edu/services/course-reserves>.

Q: What student information can I share?

A: The **Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)** is intended to protect the confidentiality of student records and to give students access to their records to assure the accuracy of their contents.

- *Posting grades publicly.* Student grades cannot be posted publicly either by the student's name, NMU IN, or social security number. The only way student grades can be posted publicly is if the student is given a temporary identifier which only applies to the current class they are enrolled in, is not tied in any way to their academic record, and is issued in a confidential manner.
- *Seeing graded assignments.* Students should not be able to see one another's assignments if there is any "personally identifiable" information on the assignment. For example, students going through a stack of graded assignments in search of their own is a violation of FERPA.
- *Sharing with parents.* Such things as progress in a course, deficiencies in a subject area, scores and grades on papers or exams, and missing work are all part of the student's educational record. You cannot share this information with a parent unless you have written authorization from the student to do so.

Q: Should I record class attendance?

A: The federal government requires that all Federal Pell Grant recipients must begin attendance in all of their courses to be eligible for the grant. Schools must document that the student began attendance in all classes.

Because of the Federal financial aid rules, the Registrar's Office will not allow faculty to record an F grade without the instructor noting the last date of attendance. This allows us to recalculate financial aid eligibility for those students who stop attending and earn an F grade because they did not withdraw from a course. It can also be helpful to know the attendance pattern if the student disputes a grade a semester after-the-fact.

You may use the **Educational Success Platform** to record daily attendance. You will receive a notice with instructions as to how to report prior to the 100% refund drop deadline (2nd Tuesday of the semester).

Students may also need to be officially excused from class for university-sponsored activities; refer to the policy on *Class Attendance* available through <http://www.nmu.edu/policies>.

Q: How do I submit final grades?

A: Final grades are submitted electronically using <https://mynmnmu.nmu.edu>. Dates for submitting grades are in the Academic Calendar. The Registrar's Office will provide instructions for posting grades using MyNMU.

Teaching Online

Learning management system – NMU uses EduCat, a Moodle-based system, for online courses (<https://educat.nmu.edu>). Complete the EduCat Course Request Form (<https://tinyurl.com/educatrequest>) to have a course shell created for you. In future semesters, you will need to make EduCat requests, even for courses for which you already have shells, so that student rosters are loaded.

Support for faculty teaching online is available through the Center for Teaching and Learning, Global Campus, and the Extended Learning and Community Engagement (ELCE) Scholar(s). The CTL offers workshops and individual consultations regarding online learning in addition to providing other support for teaching and learning. The ELCE Scholars disseminate information about distance teaching and learning-related resources on campus, and promote collaboration and partnerships among faculty interested in distance teaching excellence.

Student preparation – Before participating in any online course, students are required to complete a self-paced, online tutorial module. The tutorial is available through EduCat.

Quality Matters – NMU subscribes to the Quality Matters Program (www.qualitymatters.org), which provides a continuous improvement peer review model for assuring the quality of online courses. The centerpiece of the program is the Quality Matters Rubric, a set of 8 general standards and 42 specific standards used to evaluate the design of online and blended courses. The rubric standards are based on best practices established through review of relevant research literature, the expertise of experienced practitioners and existing standard sets. Many departments already have at least one faculty member who has completed QM training. For additional information, contact the Center for Teaching and Learning or the ELCE Scholar(s).

Online Showcase – NMU’s Teaching & Learning Scholar and the Extended Learning Scholar collaborated with faculty across campus to create a showcase of multiple online designs and teaching activities from several disciplines. Online Teaching Qualifications

Faculty and other instructors must be approved as “qualified” prior to teaching online. To be distance qualified, anyone teaching an online course must have completed required professional development on online teaching competencies in four general categories:

1. The NMU online teaching environment (e.g., methods for engaging students, instructor resources)
2. NMU learning management system basics
3. Managing and delivering online course content
4. Grading and evaluation

Faculty who are new to teaching online at NMU will complete a four-week online professional development course, “**Teaching Online @ NMU,**” delivered through NMU’s learning management

system. It introduces techniques and tools for leading online courses at NMU, as well as related policies, processes, and resources. This course focuses on the delivering, not designing, of online courses.

Faculty who have previously taught online at NMU will complete a self-paced tutorial, **“Teaching Online @ NMU Overview,”** delivered through NMU’s learning management system. Alternatively, faculty who have previously taught online at NMU may choose to take the course designed for new online faculty. With approval from Academic Affairs, faculty who have previously taught online elsewhere may be permitted to complete the self-paced tutorial instead of the four-week course. Alternative professional development may be approved by Academic Affairs.

Online Teaching Fellows

NMU Online Teaching Fellows is a professional development initiative sponsored by Extended Learning and Community Engagement and facilitated by the Center for Teaching and Learning. The goal of the initiative is to develop faculty expertise in the design, development, and delivery of online courses in order to build and enhance online programs. The initiative includes a series of intensive Teaching Fellows programs and has been offered in online and hybrid formats (<https://www.nmu.edu/ctl/online-teaching-fellows-initiative>).

Distance Learning Expectations for Teaching

NMU uses the Quality Matters standards (<https://www.qualitymatters.org>) and Chickering and Gamson’s (1987) “Seven Principles for Good Practice in Undergraduate Education” for a stepwise approach setting expectations for design and delivery of online classes.

The Course Review begins as early as Entry Level standards (meets contractual obligations and guarantees that the course is not a correspondence course) that scaffold to bronze, silver, gold (which meets the 23 3-point Quality Matter Specific Review Standards), and platinum (meets all of the QM Specific Review Standards). Each level adds Quality Matters standards and increases communication between the instructor and student. We are moving toward all courses meeting the gold level; ultimately at the platinum level, the course would meet all design and delivery standards.



We are in the process of moving from Phase 1, using the Entry Level Course Design Assessment Rubric, to Phase 2, Minimum Standards.

Technology on Campus

Notebook computers for students – Full-time students are issued notebook computers as part of tuition and fees; part-time students can opt into the notebook computer program.

Notebook computers for faculty – Faculty, including adjuncts teaching at least three credit hours, are issued notebook computers. Computers are distributed in Harden Hall just prior to fall semester and at Technology Support Services during all other times.

Adjunct/contingent faculty members teaching fewer than three credit hours should consult with their department head regarding access to a notebook computer.

Network – On campus, use Wi-Fi or an orange data jack to connect to the Internet and the NMU network. Off campus, you may be able to connect to the Internet and NMU's network through NMU LTE (www.nmu.edu/lte).

Software – For a list of the software available for your NMU-issued computer, see the Software Management system at <http://notebook.nmu.edu/software>. Software can be installed at the Technology Support Services. You can also request software be installed for your students during class time. If you or your students need software not on your list, contact the Dean of Library and Instructional Support.

The Center for Teaching and Learning supports incorporating technology into teaching and learning in face-to-face and online classes, in addition to providing other support for teaching and learning. The CTL assists faculty with creating audiovisual productions in NMU's Studio 102, where they can also explore emerging technologies such as Virtual Reality. Studio 102 is a space for online media production. This recording space is set up as a quiet place for faculty to record content for online courses and explore virtual reality tools. Lighting, sound, and two lightboard options have been designed for excellent recording capabilities. A lightboard is a glass board that is internally lit and recorded through so that instructors can write on it while making 'eye contact' with their audience. Studio 102 is located in 102 Harden Hall, next to the Center for Teaching and Learning.



If you are teaching an online course or want to use EduCat for your face-to-face class, you need to complete the EduCat Course Request Form (<https://tinyurl.com/educatrequest>). After they are created, you will always have access to your EduCat sites so that you can edit them at your convenience. You will need to make EduCat requests each semester that you want to use it so that student rosters are loaded.

Lydia M. Olson Library (<https://lib.nmu.edu>) provides a host of services and resources, including instruction specifically tailored for your assignments, in person or embedded in through EduCat. Olson Library can provide material beyond our own collection through Interlibrary Loan and our state-wide shared service (MeLCat).

The Commons – The Library supports The Commons, a digital repository of research and scholarly output selected and deposited by the individual university departments and centers on campus. The Commons includes NMU Master's theses (<https://commons.nmu.edu/>)

Copyright and Reserves – Library staff assists faculty in placing hard copy and electronic material on reserve, making it available to your entire class. Copyright fees and issues are managed by library staff. (<https://lib.nmu.edu/services/course-reserves>)

E-mail – NMU conducts most official business electronically so be sure to check your official e-mail account. NMU email accounts can be accessed at <http://gmail.nmu.edu>. Students are also expected to use their NMU network ID for electronic communications. You can also get e-mail lists for your students constructed from your class roster by request at <http://myweb.nmu.edu/faculty>. We discourage you from using non-NMU e-mail addresses to communicate with students.

Professional development funds are available to full-time faculty who are members of the AAUP or NMUFA bargaining units via contractual agreement. Support funds may also be provided to contingent/adjunct faculty and graduate teaching assistants. Consult your department.

External grants are encouraged and support is available to help identify and prepare grant applications. The Grants and Contracts Office coordinates this support, including funding searches, proposal development and award management. Watch for their workshop series and connect with staff for thorough support.

The Commons is NMU's institutional repository that brings together all of the university's research, with an aim to preserve and provide access to our intellectual outpouring. Advising at NMU

Guiding NMU students from the day they arrive on campus to the day they leave with their degrees is truly a team effort.

- All new full-time, first-time freshman students are advised by a professional adviser in the **Academic and Career Advisement Center (ACAC)** for their first year at NMU.

In addition to course scheduling and advising issues, ACAC advisers also work with these students in the first year to explore career and major options, assist with study skills and strategies, and provide referrals to campus resources.

Even though the ACAC advises freshmen in the first year, academic departments may make efforts to contact these students through classes in the major, direct mailings, invitations to department clubs and events, etc. The ACAC will assist by providing updated lists by major upon request.

These professional advisors are knowledgeable about General Education graduation requirements, program requirements and completion paths of their departments' majors, and various academic and nonacademic supports from which their students may benefit. They have offices located near the department(s) with which they work, facilitating easy availability for their advisees and regular collaboration with faculty in their department(s). The official transition from ACAC advising to

Embedded Success Specialist advising generally occurs at the end of the winter semester.

- Though “traditional” (some might say “bureaucratic”) advising duties like scheduling have shifted to professional advisors, **faculty** play a critical role in mentoring students outside of the classroom: helping them understand career paths in their fields, suggesting extracurricular opportunities that may enhance their learning experience, helping them network with colleagues in their disciplines, and more.

This approach to advising is still relatively new at NMU. The shift towards professional, dedicated advising began in the fall of 2015, and fall 2022 will be the first semester that all departments have an Embedded Success Specialist. So far the returns are promising, with evident increases in both retention (3rd and 5th semesters) and aggregate GPA.

Educational Innovation at NMU

SISU: The Innovation Institute is located at 111D Harden Hall.



Safety, Emergencies, and Accidents

Blue Light Emergency Phones are in parking lots and other exterior locations in tall blue columns illuminated with a blue light. They connect directly to Public Safety.

Classroom and Laboratory Safety – If a medical emergency exists, call 911. Non-emergency accidents must be reported to your department head and an accident report form should be filed.

Make sure you and your students have proper equipment appropriate for the activity. Safety training is mandatory for students taking specified laboratory classes.

Declared Emergencies – NMU has procedures to follow in the event of a declared emergency. Register your cell phone number with Public Safety to receive emergency text notices. Review the Emergency Guidelines at www.nmu.edu/publicsafety.

Fire – Dial 911 and if within a university building, pull the fire alarm. Emergency assistance will be dispatched immediately. Fire Alarm Evacuation Procedures are at www.nmu.edu/publicsafety.

Medical or Safety Emergencies – Dial 911. As with all calls to the 911 system, remain calm, provide your location and the nature of the emergency.

Policies – Several policies (<http://www.nmu.edu/policies>) offer guidance for safety and emergency situations and include:

- Chemical Hygiene Plan
- Bloodborne Pathogens Exposure and Control
- Hazardous Materials Management

Safety Training resources, including an active shooter response video, are available through the Employee Services tab on MyNMU (<https://mynmu.nmu.edu>).

Reporting an Accident – The Safety Department must be immediately notified of all personal injury accidents involving faculty, staff, students, or visitors resulting in injuries requiring treatment other than self-administered first aid. The injured individual must notify his or her supervisor, responsible faculty member, or the Safety Department. A University Incident Report must be prepared within twenty-four (24) hours of the injury. The report can be submitted online through the Employee Services tab on MyNMU (<https://mynmu.nmu.edu>). Note: A personal injury accident is an accident other than a motor vehicle accident. Motor vehicle accidents involving injuries are required by the Motor Vehicle Code to be reported; contact Public Safety.

What NOT To Answer – If anyone (parent, spouse, roommate, etc.) contacts you saying there is an emergency and requests the schedule or whereabouts of a student, do not divulge the information. Refer the caller to Public Safety.
