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Huntington withdraws from Radford City Council election

RADFORD - Radford Vice-Mayor Naomi Huntington has announced she is withdrawing from the election for the Radford City Council.

Huntington cited increased family obligations as a reason to not seek re-election. Her name will still be on the November ballot. All four seats on the Radford City Council, as well as the mayor's seat, are up for re-election in Nov. Mayor David Horton is running unopposed. Council member Jessie Foster is the only

incumbent candidate on the ballot. The remaining candidates are Kellie Banks Artrip, Bobby L. Davis Jr., Seth J. Gillespie, Janiele V. Hamden and Chad L. McClanahan.

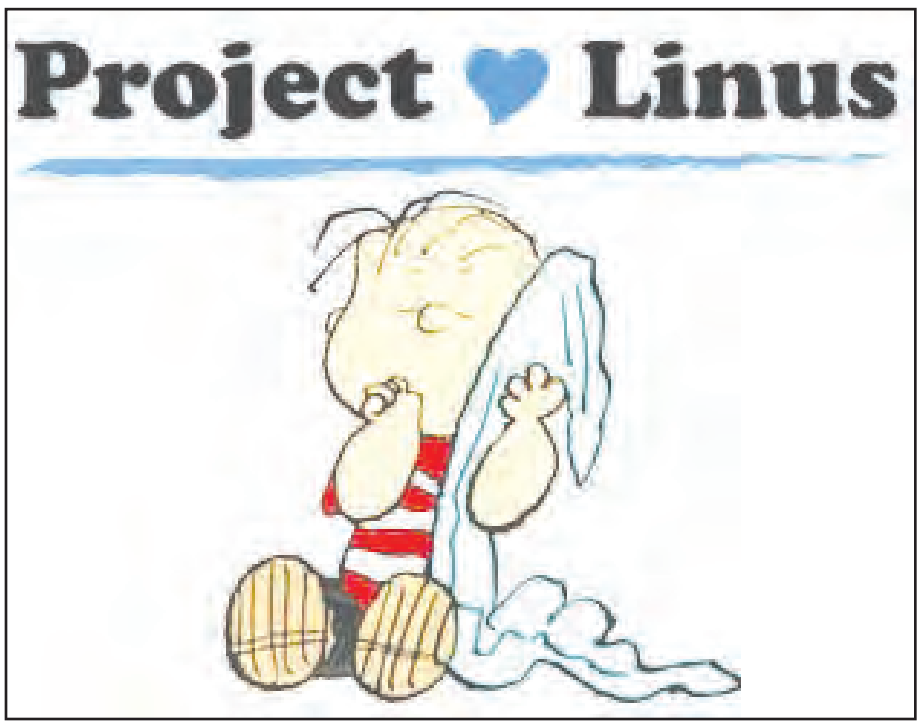
In the upcoming election, "the two highest vote getters will get the full four-year terms, then next highest will fill one unexpired term and so on, until all seats are filled," said Radford Voter Registrar Tracy Howard.

In addition to the city council election, Radford voters will be choosing three new members of the five-member Radford City School Board. The

three incumbents - Liz Altieri, Lynn Burris, and Lee Slusher - are not running for re-election. The candidates are Gloria W. Boyd, Chris B. Calfee, Ed J. Dickenson and R. Jane Swing.

Also, Radford voters will be voting on the U.S. House of Representatives Ninth District seat. Republican incumbent H. Morgan Griffith will be facing Democrat challenger Taysha Lee DeVaughan.

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 8, 2022. Early voting begins Sept. 16. Voter registration ends Oct. 17.

Riverfront property, once subject of zoning request, up for sale

RADFORD - A 36-acre property in Radford is on the market after once being the subject of a special use permit allowing an RV campground to locate there.

The riverfront property was approved for use as an RV park in 2019 by the Radford City Council but was subsequently put up for sale and

remains vacant. The property, located at 3080 Little River Dam Rd. in Radford, is valued at \$875,000 and is billed as an "RV park development opportunity," by the sellers.

"The 36+ acre property features thousands of feet of shoreline along the New River located at Exit 105 on Interstate 81," the listing reads. "The property has been approved for use as an RV park. Public utilities are available along West Main Street."

Y-Toss turns 100 tons of trash into treasure

Since its inception in 2015, the Y-Toss program has diverted more than 100 tons of items from Virginia Tech's waste system, according to Emily Vollmer, sustainability coordinator with Virginia Tech's Office of Sustainability.

Y-Toss, coordinated by the YMCA at Virginia Tech, is one of the largest sustainability initiatives on the Blacksburg campus. Each spring, the program collects gently used items — everything from refrigerators to rugs — from residence halls across campus during student move-out days.

Eight collection points are set up across the residential side of campus, with students, community members, and other volunteers aiding in collecting donated goods. Then, the YMCA team inspects everything collected, recycling broken or defective items while also cleaning and pricing usable items. Once fall move-in arrives, these items are made available at a reduced price to incoming students.

"Sustainability is a major point of emphasis in all YMCAs," said Ron Ovelgoenner, director of thrift shop operations for YMCA at Virginia Tech.

Y-Toss, specifically, centers around the focus of waste reduction. Most items used in residence halls are still useable or recyclable after the school year ends. While trash bins are an easy way to clear out unwanted goods, Y-Toss encourages students to reuse or repurpose

items instead of sending them to the landfill.

This process also allows incoming students the opportunity to furnish their rooms at a reduced cost — meaning they can save money while also helping to save the planet.

By helping keep unnecessary waste out of landfills, Y-Toss is helping push Virginia Tech toward the zero-waste campus by 2030 goal of the 2020 Climate Action Commitment. But Y-Toss's overall impact isn't exclusive to sustainability efforts.

The funds received from Y-Toss sales each year help support YMCA student programs. These include the after-school programs at Blacksburg Middle School, Prices Fork Elementary School, and Margaret Beeks Elementary School.

According to Vollmer, this year's Y-Toss collection, held May 6-11, was the strongest on record with 10.8 tons of materials donated and all eight collection bins filled up.

Since 2015, the program has engaged over 13,000 community volunteers and generated \$60,000 to support numerous YMCA programs, she said.

Y-Toss also contributed to Virginia Tech's receiving the highest rating out of all Virginia and ACC schools from the Sustainability Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System, an international rating system that looks at a university's sustainability efforts across academics, engagement, operations, and planning and administration.

"Any number of items kept out of the waste stream is a good thing," said Ovelgoenner. "And eliminating 100 tons is a significant amount of aid to the planet."

YMCA at Virginia Tech to hold Welcoming Festival celebration Sunday

"At the YMCA at Virginia Tech, we believe the New River Valley is stronger when everyone in the community feels welcome and we can all work together for the common good," said Ryan Martin, Executive Director of the YMCA at VT. The festival will celebrate community and will feature entertainment, international food, vendors and family fun with performances including a Chinese Kungfu show, traditional song and dance from China, Tibet, Turkey, India, and Latin America, Dream Dance Studio, the PanJammers, Community Poem, and a community art project.

The exhibit explores the historical and continuous journey toward the ideals of America. It includes a series of edited interviews conducted with first-generation immigrants and refugees who arrived in Virginia after 1976.

The New Virginians project is a collaboration between the Library of Virginia and Virginia Humanities with support from 2019 Commemoration and American Evolution, which names New Virginians a Legacy Project.

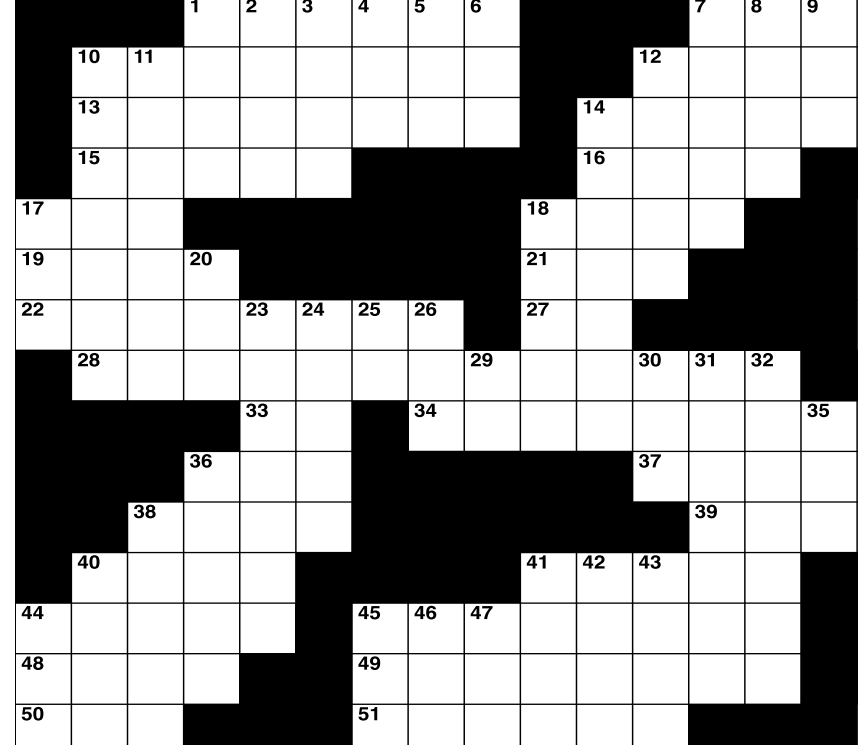
and work on their blankets at the event. Donations are always accepted.

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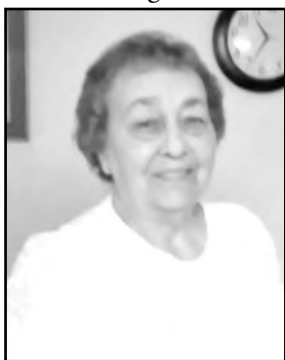

Tech lab provides ratings for whitewater helmets

Outdoor enthusiasts turning to whitewater rafting to escape the dog days of summer can chase the rapids more safely thanks to the newest ratings from the Virginia Tech Helmet Lab.

Every year, tens of millions of Americans participate in paddle sports, a category that encompasses kayaking, canoeing, and rafting.

But like any sport,

paddling can be dangerous, particularly the more aggressive whitewater variations that send paddlers through rocky rapids and swift currents.

"Millions of people enjoy whitewater sports, but they're also some of the highest-risk sports," said Stefan Duma, the Harry Wyatt Professor of Engineering and the Helmet Lab's founder.

"There are almost 50 whitewater fatalities in America every year, putting the fatality rate ahead of almost any other sport." Head injuries are a big part of the reason. If paddlers capsize — either accidentally or as part of intentional maneuvers — and then hit their heads, the results can be deadly.

"If you look at those fatalities, almost all of them are head impacts,

followed by drowning," said Duma, who is also the director of the university's Institute for Critical Technology and Applied Science and a professor in the Department of Biomedical Engineering and Mechanics.

A helmet that cushions those blows enough to keep a paddler from becoming disoriented or losing consciousness could make the difference

between life and death.

Robin Pope chairs the board of directors for the American Canoe Association, a national nonprofit that provides education and other resources for paddlers and is the governing body for the U.S. Olympic paddle sports teams. He's also an avid whitewater paddle, and said those athletes understand that helmets are nonnegotiable.

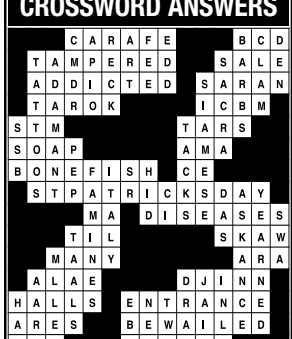
"Most of us have lots of scrapes on our helmets because our helmets have protected us from head injuries," he said. "I would not paddle on whitewater with someone who's not wearing a helmet. Most people who know what they're doing see it as too great a risk for the individual and for the rest of the group because you know there's a good chance you may have to

deal with a rescue or a serious injury."

But when it comes to choosing a helmet, Pope, who's also a physician assistant with years of experience in sports medicine, said paddlers haven't had much scientific guidance to rely on.

"It's been a matter of group opinion and personal experience and

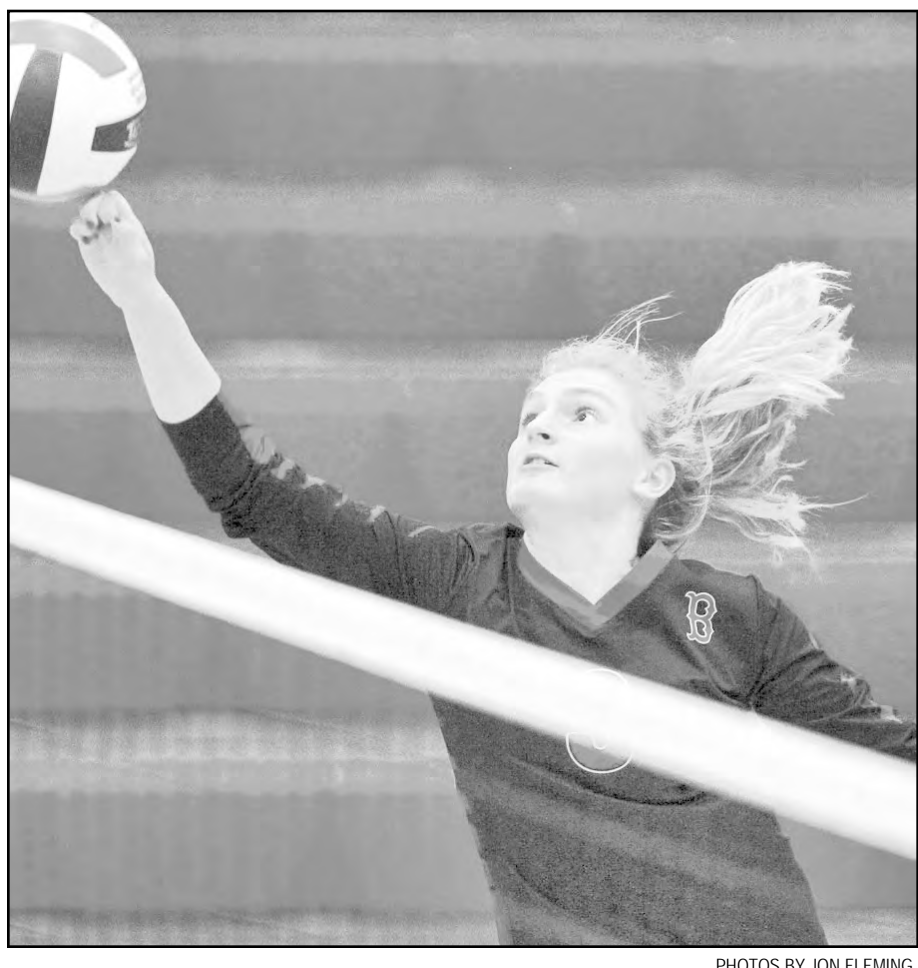

ACC men's basketball schedule

The Atlantic Coast Conference revealed the 2022-23 men's basketball schedule Tuesday afternoon with Virginia Tech opening its league slate at Cassell Coliseum on Sunday, Dec. 4, vs. North Carolina.

In all, the Hokies host six ACC weekend games to go along with a Big Monday showdown vs. Duke on Jan. 23 in a rematch of last season's ACC title game. Commonwealth Clash rival Virginia will also visit Cassell on Saturday, Feb. 4.

Season tickets are available for Tech's upcoming 2022-23 campaign in both full and conference-only packages. Those wanting to attend only the Hokies' 10 ACC home games can lock in season tickets for a reduced price of just \$22 per game and enjoy all of the same benefits that come with a full season-ticket package.

Of Tech's 20 league games, the Hokies are set for home-and-home dates with Boston College, Clemson, Duke, Miami, Syracuse,

and Virginia. Additionally, VT will welcome Florida State, North Carolina, NC State, and Pitt to Blacksburg and will travel to Georgia Tech, Louisville, Notre Dame, and Wake Forest.

Tech tips off its previously announced 11-game non-conference slate on Monday, Nov. 7, vs. Delaware State.

Following its final non-conference tilt vs. Grambling State on Saturday, Dec. 17, Tech travels to Boston College (Dec. 21) and Wake Forest (Dec. 31) to close out 2022. The Hokies then open the new year with back-to-back home games against Clemson (Jan. 4) and NC State (Jan. 7).

The Commonwealth Clash, presented by Smithfield, features the Hokies and the Cavaliers squaring off on Wednesday, Jan. 18, in Charlottesville, followed by the return trip to Blacksburg on Saturday, Feb. 4. Tech and UVA split the season series last year with each side winning at home.

Tech's conference opener vs. North Carolina marks the third straight season it will open ACC play at home, and the first time opening against UNC since the 2009-10 season (That game was in Chapel Hill.) The last time VT and UNC squared off in a conference opener in Blacksburg was Tech's inaugural ACC game on Dec. 19, 2004.

The Hokies will look to defend their ACC title in Greensboro, N.C., March 7-11, at the Greensboro Coliseum.

Mike Young enters his fourth season at the helm of the Hokies and welcomes back six returners from last season including two starters in ACC Tournament MVP Hunter Cartoer and Justyn Mutts. Tech's depth is bolstered by a highly-regarded freshman class and a trio of transfers: Grant Basile, John Camden, and Mylyjael Poteat.

personal fit," he said.

That's where the Helmet Lab comes in.

When Virginia Tech's injury biomechanics experts released the first independent safety ratings for varsity football helmets in 2011, they introduced a new model for protecting athletes by evaluating the equipment designed to keep them safe.

In the decade since, the lab's ratings have armed

athletes, parents, and coaches with the knowledge to choose the safest equipment and handed helmet manufacturers tools to optimize design.

The whitewater helmet ratings are the lab's eighth major release. Of the 21 whitewater helmet models the researchers tested, four earned five stars, the lab's top score, and two helmets earned four. Duma and his team recommend choosing a four- or five-star helmet.

The ratings, Pope said, will be a valuable resource for paddlers.

The researchers develop those ratings by using data from real-world head impacts to design test methods that assess helmet performance under realistic conditions.

"One of the things that's unique about our system is we characterize each sport," Duma said. "The way that head impacts tend to occur varies from sport to sport, and understanding those interactions is the first step to figuring out how to protect players."

For whitewater, that meant analyzing stream flows to determine how fast the current might sweep a paddler's head into a rock in different scenarios, kayaking versus whitewater rafting, for example.

Using that data, they designed lab tests that recreate those conditions. During the tests, a pendulum impactor strikes a headform protected by one of the helmets. Inside the headform, accelerometers allow the researchers to measure the force of the blow.

Each helmet model was tested at three impact locations and two impact speeds: 3.1 and 4.9 m/s.

The ratings for whitewater helmets — along with varsity, youth, and flag football as well as soccer, cycling, hockey, and snow sports — are all available on a website that has racked up more than a million visitors.

The lab's test methods are publicly available, too. That allows companies to use the protocols to evaluate designs and prototypes, optimizing a new helmet's safety profile before it ever hits the market.

"We want to help companies improve their products because that's another avenue to reducing injuries," Duma said.

Companies have responded. Helmet performance has improved in the years since the lab's first ratings, and major manufacturers use the lab's logo as a point of pride for their flagship products.

No sport is concussion-proof, but effective helmets can dramatically reduce the risk. The lab's work, which has been covered in the New York Times, the Washington Post, Sports Illustrated, WIRED, and ESPN, has enabled companies to make better products and empowered consumers to choose the best ones available.

Now those benefits extend to whitewater rafters and kayakers, too.

"We want to make sure that if you do have a head impact, it's cushioned as much as possible," Duma said, "so you can survive that event."

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
