Candidate forums, meet and greet coming up in Radford

RADFORD - Radford voters will have a chance to get to know the candidates for Radford City Council and the Radford City School Board at two upcoming candidate forums.

Co-sponsored by the Radford Chamber of Commerce, the Montgomery County-Radford City-Floyd County Branch NAACP, and the League of Women Voters of Montgomery County, the candidate forums will be held in person at the Radford High School auditorium and also will be broadcast live on Facebook.com/radfordchamberofcommerce, Facebook.com/mrfnaacp.org, and Facebook. comLWVofMCVA. The forums will also be posted the next day on www.radfordchamber.org, www. lwvmcva.org, and www.mrfnaacp.org.

The first of the two forums will feature the candidates for the Radford City Council (council members and the mayoral candidate). It will be held Wednesday, Oct. 12, at 7 p.m. at the Radford High School Auditorium. Invited candidates are: R. David Horton (mayor), and council member candidates Kellie Banks Artrip, Bobby L. Davis, Jessie C. Foster, Seth J. Gillespie, Janiele V. Hamden, and Chad L. McClanahan.

The second forum will feature candidates for the Radford City School Board and will be held Monday, Oct. 17, at 7 p.m. in the Radford High School Auditorium. Invited candidates are Gloria W. Boyd, Chris B. Calfee, Ed J. Dickenson, and R. Jane Swing.

The moderator for both forums is Karen E.

Jones. The candidates will have two minutes to introduce themselves and tell why they are running for office. Questions for the forum will come from the audience, which will be asked to submit questions during registration and will be able to submit questions during the forum using a Q and A box. Audience questions will be screened for duplication and variety. The public can also submit questions ahead of time at https://mrfnaacp.com/ RadfordCityCandidateQuestions.

The moderator will address those questions to all the candidates, and she will rotate the order in which questions are asked among the candidates. Each candidate will have up to two minutes to answer each question. A rebuttal will be allowed for up to one minute per question. Candidates will be able to offer only one rebuttal per question. Each candidate will have two minutes to make a closing statement. During the closing statement, candidates may address any of the questions previously asked.

The Radford Heritage Foundation will host a Meet and Greet with the Radford mayoral and city council candidates on Tuesday, Oct. 18, from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Glencoe Mansion, Museum and Gallery.

"Join us for this unique opportunity to meet with all the candidates in one place," said Radford Heritage Foundation Director Scott Gardner. "Spend time with them in a casual atmosphere to learn more about them and their visions for Radford's future."

Tracy Howard, the general registrar and director of elections will be at the event with voter registration



and absentee ballot applications and sample ballots. He will also answer questions about voting, the election, and the ballots.

The event is open to the public.

Radford man waits 45 years for karate black belt

RADFORD - The Radford Karate Club was started by instructor Jerry Beasley in 1973 when Radford University was known as Radford College.

Four years later, several members of the club were eligible to take their black belt exam. Due to an injury, Freddie Harris, one of the club members, was

unable to continue. After more than 40 years of not seeing each other, some of the original members of the club who passed the exam and were awarded their black belts - including Gary Harmon and Jerry King - met recently for a club reunion and agreed that Harris, their friend and karate colleague, should receive his diploma for 1st dan Black

They brought their request to Jerry Beasley, their former instructor, and Harris was awarded his diploma at their reunion. The diploma was dated March 1, 1977. The rank of black belt is a symbol of the highest level of achievement

All the original members of the club attending the reunion agreed that earning their black belt helped them identify their path of success in life. All the men retired from meaningful careers:

Harris from the printing department at Radford University, Jerry Beasley as a professor at Radford University, Gary Harmon as the Radford City Chief of Police, and Jerry King as a Radford City Schools administrator (currently the pastor at Snowville Christian Church).

World class piano trio comes to Radford University

RADFORD -Tuesday, Oct. 11, Radford University's College of Visual and Performing Arts will host a free concert by Trio Con Brio Copenhagen, a widely acclaimed group known for its passionate and powerful interpretation of classical music.

The concert is the first of three events in the University Performance Series for the 2022-23 academic year.

Brio Trio con Copenhagen is a fusion of two overlapping "musical pairs." Two sisters, violinist Soo-Jin Hong and cellist SooKyung Hong, are from South Korea. Pianist Jens Elvekjaer, Soo-Kyung's husband, is from Denmark, where the group is based.

Founded at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna in 1999, the trio is recognized for its exceptional musicianship, fresh approach, adventurous programming.


Trio Con Copenhagen has won international several competitions since their formation and has released award-winning albums including "Shostakovich

Arenksy," winner of the German Record Critics' Award in February 2022.

Shostakovich's "Piano Trio No. 2 in E minor, Op. 67" will feature in the Oct. 11 performance as well as works by Beethoven and Prokofiev.

program she developed within the Art Department at Appalachian State University.

Marshall says her new job is all about collaboration and she's spending time and energy looking for grants and opportunities to connect the Floyd Center for the Arts to the community.

"I am daydreaming every day about what to bring to the center,' For example, she would like to

create a "Fab Lab" like the ones she had in Texas and North Carolina. These "makerspaces" employ a wide variety of design and digital fabrication tools like laser cutters, vinyl cutters, CNC routers, and 3D

"It is my goal to introduce the excitement of digital fabrication in the arts to the public; currently makerspaces are somewhat limited to academia," she said. She also wants to create a strong


bond with Radford University and its art students. Marshall would like to see student interns and art exhibits in the future. "I would like for the Floyd

Center for the Arts to be an option for students to exhibit their artwork because I know from firsthand experience the struggle of searching for a gallery space and/or teaching opportunities," she said. Her first major exhibition as

Executive Director is called "Mithila Medley: Contemporary Arts from an Ancient Culture in North India." It draws in part from Radford University's permanent collection and is part of a four-museum exhibition this fall of Indian art.

NRCC to host ACCE bass fishing tournament fundraiser

New River Community College Educational Foundation is hosting the 2022 Big ACCE Bass Tournament on Saturday, Oct. 15 to support Access to Community College Education (ACCE) at NRCC for Pulaski County students.

Craig Drennen's 'First Acts, Scene 2,' was inspired by Shakespeare's 'Timon of

Moss Arts Center exhibitions to feature works from artists Craig Drennen and Steve Locke

Works from two prominent artists are on display in Virginia for the very first time. The Moss Arts Center's fall exhibitions will feature two solo shows: Craig Drennen's "First Acts, Scene 2," a collection of paintings, mixed-media installation, and video inspired by an obscure Shakespeare work, and Steve Locke's "the daily practice of painting, consisting of 114 portraits Locke painted over the course of a year.

The exhibitions will open with a reception on Thursday, Oct. 13, from 5 to 7 p.m. in the Moss Arts Center's Grand Lobby, located at 190 Alumni Mall in Blacksburg.

Drennen will give an artist talk on Friday, Oct. 14, at 2 p.m. in the Cube. The talk also will be available via livestream on the Moss Arts Center website. The galleries and all related events are free and are open to the public.

Drennen's "First Acts, Scene 2" is a selection of work from the artist's ongoing series based on William Shakespeare's "Timon of Athens." Unproduced in Shakespeare's lifetime and regarded by many as his weakest play, "Timon of Athens" has been inspiring Drennen's slow walk to self-portraiture since 2008.

Largely unknown,
"Timon of Athens"
invited Drennen to make
work "in a desolate place,"
which he compared
to "the Appalachia of
my childhood." From
the minor to major
characters, each serves
as an opportunity for

both satire of his artist's personae and a survey of the history of painting.

"The daily practice of painting" is part of Locke's exploration of relationships among men and their gaze. Painted mostly in gouache on 6by 6-inch claybord, each square panel features a centered solitary head seen from the shoulders up. Bright hues prevail in these intimate scaled portraits, which contain a multitude of male expressions. Sometimes with eyes closed and tongues out, Locke's men go against the idealized portraiture. Presented horizontally in a single line below eye level, the viewer looks down to return their gaze, compounding their vulnerability.

VT entomologist says stink bugs make like humans in the winter by heading indoors and riding out the colder months

Kevin Rice, director of the Smith Agricultural and Research Center, says brown marmorated stink bugs make like humans in the winter by sheltering indoors and riding out the colder months. In the process, of course, they also make themselves

Rice says adult stink

bugs tend to aggregate into groups when arriving at overwinter sites, creating nuisance problems for homeowners. Rice is the director of the Alson H. Smith Jr. Agricultural Research and Extension Center. In the spring and summer, these insects feed on a wide variety of fruit and vegetable crops.

"I have focused on novel trap design for monitoring brown

marmorated stink bugs and quantifying their movement among landscapes,' Rice said. "I'm currently collaborating with a team of engineers and entomologists to use UV lasers and UAV to track brown marmorated stink bug movement among

different landscapes." Rice said there is also hope that biological

A moment of brutality against an enslaved woman in "The Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass" led Virginia Tech undergraduate Safyque xRichardson to explore ideas of Blackness, suffering, and identity in an essay that won first place in the 2022 John D. Wilson Phi Beta Kappa Essay Contest, sponsored by the Mu of Virginia chapter of Phi Beta Kappa to recognize excellence in undergraduate writing. In its award statement, the 2022

John D. Wilson Prize Selection Committee wrote, "Through her

analysis of Frederick Douglass's autobiography, xRichardson addresses questions that are just as pressing today as they were in 1848: What are the consequences of objectifying one's suffering body — of showing the literal scars — when trying to get others to care for one's suffering? What becomes of oppressed people's voices — of their ideas and their demands — when our focus remains on their bodies?

The committee selected xRichardson's "Reduction to the Black Body: Brutality in The Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass" for the urgency of the essay's argument, the clarity of its voice, and, notably, the innovation of its form. "The writing pushes against the strictures of conventional essayistic structure in a manner that allows xRichardson's voice to be truly heard," said Evan Lavender-Smith, an assistant professor of creative writing in the Department of English and president of the Mu of Virginia chapter.

really good," said Dye, who passed away in early 2020 at the age of 94. "Here you've got the sound of the river up and down the whole golf course the entire time. The river and scenery are unbelievable."

Dye was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2008. Among the hundreds of highly regarded Dye-designed golf courses around the world are The Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, Fla., The Ocean Course on Kiawah Island, S.C., Harbour Town Golf Links on Hilton Head Island, S.C., and the Straits Course at Whistling Straits in Sheboygan, Wisc.

McConnell Golf is no stranger to Pete Dye courses, having had the master himself renovate his original design of The Cardinal in Greensboro, N.C., in 2006.

Founded in 2003, McConnell Golf is the largest owner of private clubs in the Southeast. ACC baseball tourney to return to home of Durham Bulls

The Atlantic Coast Conference and Durham Bulls have announced that the ACC Baseball Championship will return to Durham Bulls Athletic Park in 2023. The 12-team tournament will be held next May 23-28.

The city of Durham has hosted the

ACC Baseball Championship 12 times previously, including seven of the past 13 tournaments. The tournament singlegame attendance record of 11,329 was set in 2013 at Durham Bulls Athletic Park (North Carolina versus NC State) and still stands as the largest crowd ever to view a college baseball game in the state of North Carolina.

The Bull Circulum played best to the

The Bull City also played host to the second-largest crowd ever to watch a tournament championship game (9,759 for Florida State versus NC State in 2015)

"There's terrific excitement surrounding our return to Durham for the 2023 ACC Baseball Championship," said ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips. "Our teams and fans always appreciate the first-class experience at the Durham Bulls Athletic Park, and we've not only set attendance records, but have enjoyed some of the most exciting games in the history of the ACC baseball championship. The Durham Bulls are amazing partners, and we are looking forward to another outstanding event."

"We are proud to once again partner with the ACC to bring its baseball championship to Durham Bulls Athletic Park and the Triangle to showcase the best college baseball in the country," said Durham Bulls Vice President Mike Birling. "The DBAP has hosted many memorable moments in ACC Championship history, and we look forward to continuing that in 2023."

"Each championship event is a unique opportunity to showcase Durham as a championship hub, particularly when such a premier event returns for a remarkable 13th time," said Marcus Manning, executive director of the Durham Sports Commission. "It's also a demonstration of the Durham Bulls' leadership and continued commitment to hosting events that have a wideranging impact on Durham and the Triangle area. The Durham Sports Committee is very excited to have this event back in Durham."

For the first time in tournament

history, ACC Network will carry all games played Tuesday, May 23 through Saturday, May 27. ESPN or ESPN2 will continue to carry the Sunday Championship Game. Durham Bulls Athletic Park has played

host to the ACC Baseball Championship 10 times previously, most recently in 2019. The total attendance of 64,140 for the 2015 Championship was the third largest in tournament history. Durham Athletic Park, the Bulls'

Durham Athletic Park, the Bulls' previous home venue, welcomed the ACC Championship in 1984 and 1986. The 2023 tournament will be the ACC's 49th Baseball Championship and the 25th played in the state of North Carolina.

The 10,000-seat Durham Bulls Athletic Park, located in downtown Durham, can be accessed from the Durham Freeway. The ballpark reflects many characteristics of old-time parks and the historic downtown Durham architecture. A 32-foot-high wall stands in left field 305 feet from home plate, resembling Fenway Park's Green Monster. The Blue Monster, as it's called in Durham, contains a similar old-style manual scoreboard.

A roof covers approximately 2,500 seats behind home plate and down both the first- and third-base lines to the end of each dugout. All seats at the DBAP are extra wide with seat backs and extra leg room. More than 95 percent of the seats have cup holders. The stadium was designed and built so that every seat gives fans a great view of the field with an intimate ballpark feel.

The ballpark's most distinctive feature is the Snorting Bull which stands tall above the Blue Monster. This bull was modeled after the bull used in the 1988

film, Bull Durham.

Next spring's ACC Baseball Championship will again showcase some of the top talent in all of Division I. Nine ACC teams earned spots in the 2022 NCAA Championship field, one shy of the league record and tying for the most of any conference last season. The ACC has placed at least six teams in the NCAA tournament for 18 straight

WILDLIFE REPORT

Mange confirmed in Virginia Bears

Since 2014, DWR has been monitoring sarcoptic reports of mange in Virginia's black bears. Mange is a highly contagious skin disease caused by a mite that affects many wild and domestic animals. From 2014 to 2017 reports were sporadic and primarily focused in the northwestern mountain counties of Frederick and Shenandoah.

Shenandoah.
Since 2018 reports have increased in frequency and geographic spread, and mange has been confirmed in 18 counties. The public can play a key role in

helping DWR understand

and manage this disease,

not only by being on the lookout for bears infested with mites, but also by reporting them.

Currently, there are many unknowns related to the occurrence and spread of mange in bears. Research efforts are underway to understand these processes. Mites can transfer to a new host when an unaffected animal comes into direct physical contact with an infested host. In addition, mites that fall off an infested host can persist in the environment and may infect a new animal that enters a site contaminated

with mange mites.



piles, bird feeders and other food resources).

Virginia's first mange-affected bear was diagnosed in a bear from Rockingham County in 1994. From 2014 to 2017 reports were sporadic and primarily focused in the northwestern mountain counties of Frederick and Shenandoah. Since 2018, reports have increased in frequency and geographic spread, and mange has been confirmed in 14 counties. DWR asks anyone who sees a bear showing signs of mange as described below to take photos, note your exact location (take GPS coordinates, if possible), and submit this information to the VA Wildlife Conflict Helpline at vawildlifeconflict@usda.gov or (1-855-571-9003).
