Radford High yearbook staff wins VHSL Trophy Class award

The Radford High School Oakleaf yearbook staff won the Trophy Class award from the Virginia High School League for their 2021-2022 publication titled, "It's Up To Us."

The staff of four students, with help from student volunteers, photographed events in and out of school, designed artwork, and wrote copy for the 212-page publication. The theme for the book centered on the return from a difficult year for students and how "it's up to us" to make it a year to remember.

In the opening of the book, the staff wrote, "We can determine how this school year will be. We can be teenagers again. We can live in the moment. We will develop our future, one step at a time."

To support the idea of rebuilding and starting fresh, the staff went to drafting

teacher Cody Roberts for blueprints of different parts of the school that they scanned and used in their design. "I'm very proud of the hard work the kids put into this book and am thrilled they are receiving this well-deserved recognition," said Yearbook Advisor Savannah Leeman.

The four staff members are Editor-in-Chief Cassidy Mann, Co-Editor Audrey Bucy, Co-Editor Matthew Irvin, and Jeremy Gilmore. "Winning the Trophy Class from VHSL means a lot to the team and to me because we had worked very hard trying to communicate with each student class after being isolated the previous year," said Co-Editor Audrey Bucy. "It was difficult having only four members, but we managed to represent the student body as best as we could."

Voters choose Eastern Redbud for Radford's official tree

RADFORD – The votes are in, and the Eastern Redbud has been chosen as Radford's official city tree.

The tree must be adopted through ordinance by the Radford City Council to become official.

At the city council's meeting earlier this month, Radford Mayor David Horton made the announcement.

"The winner, by far, is the Eastern Redbud," said Horton. "The little heart-shaped leaves are just like the Heart of the New River Valley."

Radford's city slogan was, for many years, the Heart of the New River Valley.

Horton said the Radford Beautification and Municipal Forestry Commission plans to present the city council with an ordinance to officially adopt the Redbud as the city tree. He noted that the Common Paw Paw tree, which came in second in the voting, and the Carolina Silver Bell would also be recognized in the ordinance as "trees of significant culture and natural heritage" to the city.

The effort to name an official city tree for Radford was spearheaded by Jesse

Kelly, who operates a non-profit called Nursery Natives, the mission of which is "restoring native ecosystems, food sources, and community, one tree at a time."

Dr. Matt Close, co-chair of the Radford Beautification and Municipal Forestry Commission, addressed the city council in September about the importance of the city's urban forest tree inventory and said he hopes adopting an official tree is just the start of ordinances that can protect and enhance trees with regulations on how to properly remove and prune trees, replant deforested areas, and more.

Mummenschanz celebrates 50 years with Radford show Oct. 25

RADFORD - On Tuesday, October 25, Mummenschanz, one of the world's most celebrated and storied stage troupes will entertain Southwest Virginia as part of Radford University's Performance Series.

Since 1972, Mummenschanz has created an evolving repertoire of comedic and thoughtful stage acts punctuated by moments of surprise and excitement.

Fifty years later, they are reviving the most popular routines and adding new ones to the show.

The troupe began as a duo performing in Paris, often in the streets. There, Swiss artists Bernie Schürch and Andres Bossard invented the first and longest-running routine using clay masks, transforming themselves into different people, animals, and monsters for the audience.

The group expanded after a young

Wanaka and a photograph Lawson took in Copenhagen, Denmark, of replicas of thousand-year-old Viking ships. The ships themselves are inside the Roskilde Viking Ship Museum.

Lawson has lived in Christiansburg since

the 1980's. He first got interested in photography while taking pictures of his two daughters playing softball and volleyball. Once the children grew up, he transitioned to landscape photography, which has become his favorite art form.

Buying a car just got more efficient thanks to VTTI Director's cost-comparison tool

Spawned from a thought-provoking question, Virginia Tech Transportation Institute's (VTTI) Center for Sustainable Mobility Director Hesham Rakha has created an online tool that allows users to compare the cost of owning an internal combustion engine vehicle, also known as a gasoline-powered vehicle, against a battery electric vehicle that provides drivers or these vehicles insights into how they can save time and money and protect the environment.

"After finding no tool available to the public, I wanted to create a tool that anyone can use to determine

where a gasoline-powered vehicle or a battery electric vehicle is best for them financially," said Rakha, the Samuel Reynolds Pritchard Professor of Engineering.

The Cost Comparison Tool allows users to compare operational costs of owning a standard vehicle to an electric vehicle. By analyzing yearly mileage, electricity cost, the Environmental Protection Agency-rated miles per gallon, loan interest rate, loan duration, and price, the tool displays a chart of years and gas prices that shows the user the cost of operating a traditional vehicle versus an electric vehicle.

With data from AAA, Rakha alongside

his VTTI colleague Mohamed Farag first developed this tool in an Excel sheet, then open-sourced it on the internet for all to use.

Rakha plans to expand this tool to include maintenance costs associated with owning a battery electric vehicle, including cost of battery and technology replacements and variables such as different routes and energy versus fuel consumption.

For example, while traveling in a gasoline-powered vehicle on a highway saves fuel as compared to driving in an urban environment, it is the opposite for battery electric vehicles. Driving at higher speeds causes the vehicle to use

more of its battery energy.

"Low speeds of around 15 miles per hour are actually the optimal speed for electric vehicles, where it's around 55 miles an hour for a gasoline vehicle, and so it becomes conflicting," said Rakha. "If you want to try to minimize travel time, you will increase your energy consumption for electric vehicles. This is less of an issue for gasoline vehicles."

The current state of the tool and its future expansion of the tool will help to not only inform users of the costs of owning a vehicle, but also ensure they are saving money and make financially responsible decisions.

actress, Floriana Frassetto (who prefers Floriana), saw them perform in Rome. Floriana was fascinated by their comedic improvisation and joined the pair as an assistant. She quickly became integral to the performances, and the three reorganized as a creative trio.

"At that time, we performed in very small theaters, and we weren't called Mummenschanz," Floriana said. "We were called 'Before and After.'"

The new name came after they settled in Switzerland and began to refine their act, which had become increasingly non-verbal. "Mummen" means to conceal or to mask and "schanz" plays on the concept of "chance."

"In those days, we were happy to earn a little money and make people happy," Floriana said. "We didn't think we would last more than three weeks."

Floriana didn't know it, but she was at the beginning of a five-decade-long journey. What Mummenschanz did

realize, however, was that their creations left audiences delighted and entertained and their method was something altogether new and revolutionary.

At first, this made bookings complicated because people did not quite know how to categorize the trio. They were not mimes, dancers, musicians, or a traditional theater group. Instead, Floriana said, they were "visual artists" working on a shoestring, utilizing whatever they could find to create a unique stage experience.

"It was difficult because we really were doing everything with scrap materials," Floriana said. "We were recycling materials of everyday life and giving them a kind of poetic value. People did not know how to place us."

Then, in 1973, Mummenschanz began a European tour that would set their destinies in motion. They had a three-year run on Broadway starting in 1977 and made appearances on American

television ranging from Johnny Carson's Tonight Show to Sesame Street.

Over the decades, the show continued to transform, growing into a wild and expressive collection of tubes, balls, mutable shapes, and foam rubber creations seemingly with a life of their own.

Floriana says that overall only two things have changed. With the death of Bossard in 1992 and the departure of Schürch in 2012, she is the last of the original troupe in the production. And, she notes, the rhythm of the show is slightly faster, reflecting the pace of contemporary times.

But in most other respects, Mummenschanz still operates by relying on lighting, performance, and imagination rather than special effects. And it still appeals to generally universal human experiences and emotions in a way that invites interpretation.

"People enjoy that simplicity, that innocence," Floriana said. "It's something we often lack nowadays."

In the end, this is why Floriana continues to create and perform on stage despite the hardships and difficulties of life on the road.

"That moment of peace, of meditation almost, that moment of innocent joy is such a gift," Floriana said, "that it is worth the sacrifice."

The Radford Mummenschanz performance is open to all audiences and will take place at 7:30 p.m., Oct. 25, in the Bondurant Auditorium of Preston Hall on the main campus of Radford University.

Admission is \$15 for adults, \$7.50 for children and free with a Radford University ID. Tickets may be purchased at www.radfordactivities.com, at the Hurlburt Hall Information Desk or by calling 540-831-5420.

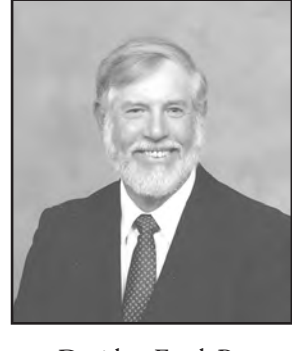

For the past two football seasons, Christiansburg's Thaxton Henley has started with a bang, only to be derailed by different knee injuries. Against Hidden Valley this past week, he rushed for 70 yards before tearing an ACL.

The multi-sport athlete now tries to recover and rehab to prepare for another sport he excels in: baseball. Tuesday, he committed to return to the baseball diamond at Alfred State College in Alfred, New York.

"I chose Alfred State for the majors they offer, and it really felt

like home when I visited. I also loved the coaching staff and how the team treated me," he said.

Henley plans to major in construction management.

Alfred State College is part of the State University of New York system. Formerly the Technical College at Alfred, the college offers a wide variety of majors in both 4-year bachelor's degrees and 2-year associate degrees.

The school has an undergraduate enrollment of 3,651 students, and its athletic program is a member of the NCAA Div. III.

"Some of my goals are to start as a freshman and earn first-team all-conference selections," he said.

This past spring, the Alfred State baseball team finished 21-22.

For now, doctors aren't certain if Henley will be able to play baseball for his senior year of high school. They do expect a full recovery by early July.

This past spring, Henley received all-River Ridge District designated hitter in a shortened season again because of other injuries. His sophomore year, he received first-team all-district middle linebacker honors, and second-team all-region linebacker honors.

At Christiansburg, he pitched and played the outfield and expects to play both in college.

Radford University basketball is stepping up its game for the fan experience this season with the addition of courtside seating.

The university announced on Friday the Courtside Lounge will offer complimentary hors d'oeuvres, soft drinks, and water with some of the best views in the arena. A cash bar will be available to purchase beer, wine, and hard seltzers.

Access to the Courtside Lounge will be available for all home regular-season men's basketball games and select women's games. The lounge will open an hour prior to tip-off, and alcohol sales will end at the 12-minute media timeout in the second half for men's basketball or at the conclusion of the third quarter for women's games.

Located in the south end zone, the Courtside Lounge will give Highlander Club members the opportunity to enjoy

premium hospitality while enjoying the entire game. Seating is limited inside the lounge, but high-top tables are available, and members will have access to leave the space to enjoy the game from their reserved seats if they choose. All alcoholic drinks will be required to stay inside the lounge.

According to a press release, membership into the Courtside Lounge is limited and in the reserved chair back sections (one through five) is limited to season-ticket holders. In addition, membership requires an annual \$500 gift per person to the Highlander Club General Fund that is designated specifically for this access.

The Highlander Club's goal is to raise financial resources for Radford University Athletics to ensure that the school's coaches and student-athletes have the necessary financial means to compete for championships and to provide RU's student-athletes the best collegiate experience on and off the playing surface.

Preseason ACC Poll: VT men picked seventh; women picked second

The Atlantic Coast Conference has released its preseason basketball poll, and the VT men were placed in the number seven spot while the Virginia Tech women were picked to finish second, the Hokies' highest preseason ranking ever. All voting was conducted by the media covering ACC Tipoff in Charlotte last week.

The conference also announced its preseason men's basketball awards live on ACC PM with Virginia Tech forward Justyn Mutts earning Preseason All-ACC honors.

Mutts was named to the second team after averaging 10.1 points and 7.3 rebounds per game in 2021-22. He enters his third season in Blacksburg with 107 games started, the third-most in the ACC.

After exploring his professional options, Mutts opted to return to Blacksburg for the 2022-23 season. The Millville, N.J., native scored in double figures 17 times last season, including a season-high 24 points vs. Notre Dame on Jan. 15, 2022. He dialed up Tech's second-ever triple-double behind 12 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists vs. Syracuse on Feb. 12, 2022.

On the women's side, Taylor Soule and Ashley Owusu were put on award watch lists and Elizabeth Kitley was picked as the preseason ACC Player of the Year.

Last season, Kitley was among the league leaders in scoring (18.1), rebounds (9.8), blocks (2.4) and field goal percentage (.551). Her 15 double-doubles led the conference as did her 13 games of 20 or more points. She scored 34 points twice and finished the year with a 42-point performance in the NCAA Tournament, the second-most ever scored in the opening round of the competition. She recorded four or more blocks in nine different contests. Her 237 made field goals set a program record for a single season. She ranks ninth all-time at VT in scoring (1,410), fifth in rebounds (800), and third in blocks (187).

Her numerous accolades from last

season include AP All-America Third Team, Kay Yow Scholar Athlete of the Year, finalist for the Lisa Leslie Award, semifinalist for the Naismith Award, Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) All-American, U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) Third Team All-American and First Team All-ACC and All-Defensive Team.

Teammates Ashley Owusu and graduate student Taylor Soule were included on the All-ACC Team. Owusu is also on the Newcomer Watch List.

Coming off a Final Four appearance, Louisville is the 2022-23 Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball preseason favorite, according to the league's Blue Ribbon Panel composed of the ACC's 15 head coaches and a select voting panel.

The Cardinals, who were slotted No. 7 nationally in Tuesday's Preseason AP Poll, received 31 of 60 first-place votes in the ACC balloting with a total of 1,069 points.

The VT women earned their predicted second-place finish by picking up 17 first-place votes and 984 points. Three-time defending ACC champion NC State closely followed at No. 3 with eight first-place votes and 963 points.

Notre Dame earned the final four first-place votes and 942 points while North Carolina rounded out the top-5 with 895 points. Miami placed sixth with 674 points, while Duke landed seventh at 627 points.

Georgia Tech (623 points) followed in eighth with Florida State (553) and Syracuse (370) rounding out the top-10, respectively. Virginia (303), Clemson (275), Boston College (271), Wake Forest (256) and Pitt (187) close out this year's predicted order of finish on the women's side.

North Carolina was voted the preseason favorite to win the 2022-23 conference Men's Basketball Championship. Also ranked No. 1 nationally in the preseason

Associated Press poll, the Tar Heels are the preseason ACC favorites for the first time since the 2015-16 season.

North Carolina received 90 of the 101 first-place votes and piled up 1,504 total points. Duke picked up two first-place votes and totaled 1,339 points to finish second in the men's poll while Virginia racked up six first-place votes and 1,310 points to take third. Miami received a pair of first-place votes and 1,138 points for fourth place while Florida State totaled 1,064 points for fifth place.

Notre Dame (971) was sixth in the men's poll while reigning ACC champion Virginia Tech (921) picked up the final first-place vote and was picked to finish seventh. Syracuse, Wake Forest, NC State, Clemson, Louisville, Boston College, Pitt, and Georgia Tech were picked to finish eighth through 15th, respectively.

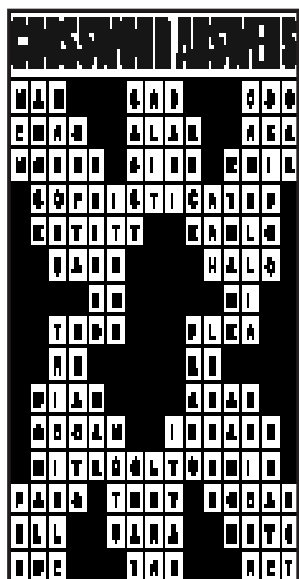

Blacksburg boys win cross-country event



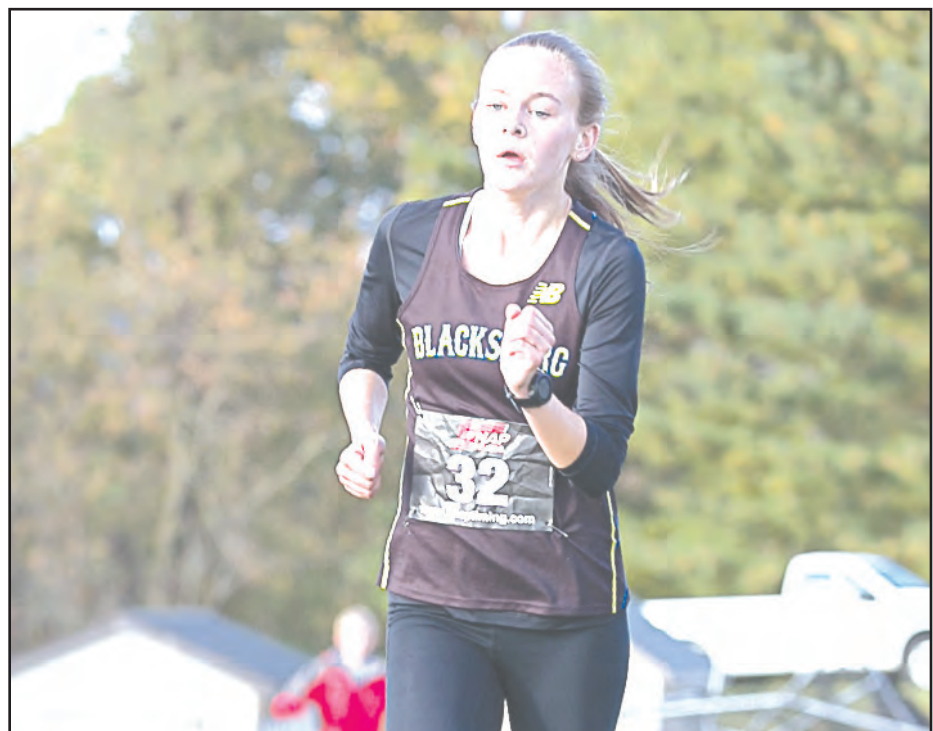
