RU coach pleads guilty to DUI charge

RADFORD - Radford University basketball coach and Radford native Darris Nichols pleaded guilty on Thursday to driving under the influence following his arrest on Feb. 19.

Nichols was charged with DUI and was arrested Sunday night. The second-year coach refused a field sobriety test, and a later blood alcohol level was reported at point-.25.

Details about the arrest have not been released.

Radford University was quick to put out a statement that said Darris' brother, Shane, will serve as the acting coach until the matter is examined further.

"This is a personnel matter, and we have no further comment at this time," the Radford University statement reads.

Darris was released early Monday on an unsecured \$3,500 bond. He was in court Thursday and, in accordance with his guilty plea, will have his driver's license suspended for 12 months, will pay a \$2,500 fine and will be required to have an ignition interlock system put on his vehicle. Nichols also received a 180-day jail sentence, with all but two days suspended.

The Radford native was hired two years ago after serving as an assistant at the University of Florida. During a press conference at his hiring, RU Athletic Director Robert Lineburg praised him for coming back home. Lineburg is also a Radford High School graduate.

Nichols played basketball at West Virginia University and climbed the ranks as an assistant coach all the way to the University of Florida in the SEC.

Nichols helped lead Radford High School to four appearances in the state Group A playoffs, averaging double-figures every season. He coached seven seasons at Florida, helping lead the Gators to a 108-65 record, including four straight 20-win seasons and three consecutive NCAA Tournament bids.

Nichols garnered a spot in ESPN.com's 40 Under 40 in the summer

of 2020, rated #17 on the national list that included both head coaches and assistant coaches. He was also rated the #2 assistant coach in the SEC in a poll of league coaches.

A four-year letter winner at West Virginia under Bob Huggins and John Beilein, Nichols helped the Mountaineers to a 26-11 record and a trip to the 2008 NCAA Sweet 16 his senior season.

At WVU, Nichols shined as a player in the Big East. He scored 993 career points and handed out 399 assists while shooting at a .375 clip from 3-point range. He averaged 10.7 points per game and 3.2 assists per game as a senior during WVU's Sweet 16 run. He was also a member of the 2007 NIT championship team, the 2006 Sweet 16 team, and the 2005 Elite Eight team. He finished his collegiate career in the top five of West Virginia players with the most wins. After graduation, he played professionally overseas in the Hungarian League.

His assistant coaching stops have included Louisiana Tech, Northern Kentucky and Wofford, where he coached for now-Virginia Tech head coach Mike Young.

His brother, Shane, joined him in Radford as an assistant.

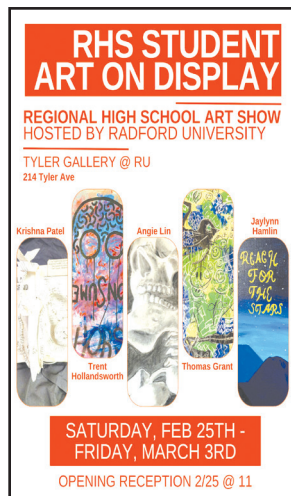

Davis College's accreditation renewal marks 30-year milestone

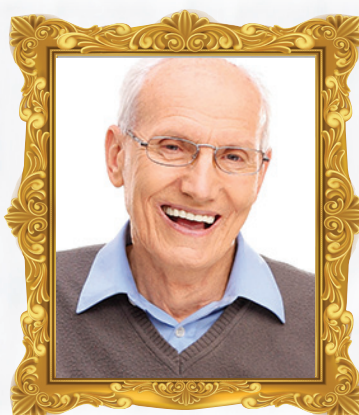
Radford University's Davis College of Business and Economics has had its accreditation extended by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) once again. The school, first accredited by AACSB in 1992, has now been certified by the organization for more than 30 years.

Davis College was one of 45 business schools to receive a five-year extension last month. Overall, approximately 965 institutions across 60 countries and territories - or just under 6% of the world's schools that offer business degree programs - can claim AACSB

business accreditation. Every school “has demonstrated a focus on excellence

in all areas, including teaching, research, curricula development, and student learning,” said Stephanie Bryant, executive vice president of the AACSB and its chief accreditation officer. “The intense peer-review process exemplifies their commitment to quality business education.”

Associate Dean Angela Stanton, Ph.D., said that consistently maintaining accreditation every five years “is truly a team effort,” led by Dean Joy Bhadury, Ph.D., with support from the Davis College leadership team and the collective efforts of the school’s entire faculty and staff.

“All of us in the Davis College are very proud of our AACSB accreditation,” Stanton said. “It is an external stamp of approval

that demonstrates we offer a high-quality business education that provides our students with the necessary foundation for success for their future careers.

“Our AACSB accreditation also lets the world know that our faculty maintain their professional and academic credentials through scholarly activity and engagement with business and industry.”

Colton Morris, a senior finance and accounting major from Buckingham, Va., and president of the school’s student-managed Investment Portfolio Organization, was one of several student leaders who met with the visiting AACSB team during its evaluations in October.

“We walked them through the classes we

were taking, the materials, and how prepared we feel for post-graduation,” Morris explained.

“AACSB-accredited schools are kind of the gold standard for business schools,” he added. “We’re competing against schools that have 30,000, 40,000 students, and we have under 10,000. That’s a big deal for me. We can compete against some of the bigger universities.”

“Our professors at Radford really helped us get an in-depth understanding of the material. After attending my internship and getting a job offer, I’m really grateful. Their approach helped prepare me more

than I think other colleges would have,” Morris said.

“This recognition by the premier accreditation agency for business programs is evidence, loud and clear, of the high quality of education provided by the Davis College,” Bhadury said.

“We would not be here today had it not been for the hard work and dedication of all Davis College faculty and staff. Equally important has been the support from our alumni, especially the Davis College Advisory Board,” Bhadury said. “For that, I feel generally honored and privileged to have had this opportunity to serve them as their dean, and I express my sincere gratitude to them.”

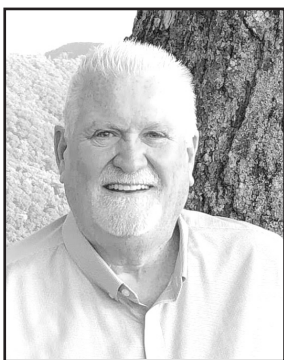

Jon Darrell Link, 52, of Christiansburg, passed away after numerous health issues on Jan. 16, 2023.

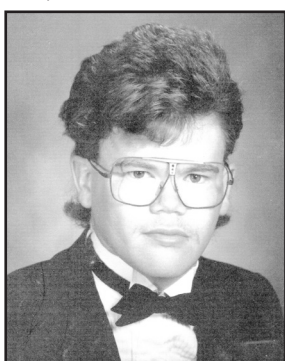
He was born on Nov. 24, 1970, to his father, Paul Steven Link, and his late mother, Karen Renee Sheppard Crawford.

Virginia legislature approves new Blue Ridge Parkway license plate

On Friday, Feb. 17, the Virginia General Assembly approved the Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation's specialty license plate.

Proceeds from sales will support enhancements and programs along the country's most visited national park.

Thanks to Parkway supporters, the Foundation exceeded the 450 pre-orders required to secure approval for the license plate. This will be the only specialty plate in the commonwealth solely dedicated to funding projects and programs along the Parkway.

"We are so grateful to all the Virginians who placed a pre-order for the plate and helped us create a new source of support for the national park in their backyard," said Carolyn Ward, CEO of the Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation.

In 2022, the park welcomed more than 15.7 million visitors. Unlike many large national parks, the parkway does not charge an admission fee, making the scenic route more vulnerable to shortfalls in government funding, maintenance backlogs, and building closures.

The plate legislation garnered widespread support, ranging from Augusta County to the Roanoke Regional Chamber to Patrick County.

In a letter of support, Kimberly Davis, executive director of the Friends of Southwest Virginia, wrote: "The Parkway is a significant economic driver for Southwest Virginia. Additionally, the work of the Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation has had a tremendous impact in both Virginia and North Carolina,

and this license plate project will help the foundation support projects and programs on the parkway for years to come."

The specialty plate fee is \$25, of which \$15 will go toward key improvements along the parkway, including repairs at trails, campgrounds, and picnic areas. Funding will also support projects such as wildlife studies, historic preservation, and educational programs. A personalized plate is available for \$35. The specialty plate is available for vehicles and motorcycles.

The DMV will soon begin the steps to get plates into production. The foundation will continue to accept pre-orders for the plate at GetThePlate.org until Friday, March 31. Those who have pre-ordered by that date will be the first group to receive the plate in the mail. Others will have to wait until the plate is listed on the DMV's website this summer. Production of the plate is estimated to take a few months, so plates will likely begin to arrive in July or August.

Since 1997, the Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation has provided more than \$20 million in support for the parkway, including historical and cultural preservation, environmental protection, visitor amenities, and education and outreach. To improve the health of children and help them connect to the outdoors, the foundation started the Kids in Parks program, which features five TRACK Trails on the parkway in Virginia. The foundation funds music programming at the Blue Ridge Music Center in Galax, which celebrates the musical traditions of the region with bluegrass, old-time, Americana, and country blues performances.

LewisGale Hospital Montgomery opens new surgery facility

LewisGale Hospital Montgomery officially opened a new \$15.9 million surgery department Monday, Feb. 20, during a ribbon cutting at the facility.

The upgrade added 7,500 square feet of new space next to the existing surgery department. The new area is home to two new, state-of-the-art operating rooms, a 15-bed Post-Anesthesia Care Unit, a sterile storage room, and support space. Renovations will also take place in 4,800 square-feet of the existing surgery department.

Alan Fabian, LewisGale's chief executive officer, said the upgrades and expansion of surgical services total nearly \$35 million in capital improvements since 2019, including a planned cardiac cath lab, advanced medical equipment, and new patient safety and quality efforts.

"For nearly 50 years, LewisGale Hospital Montgomery has offered the most technologically advanced quality care in the region," said

Fabian. "This expansion is critical in helping us to continue delivering on our commitment as the premier surgical specialty hospital, as well as being recognized as the healthcare provider and the employer of choice in the New River Valley."

LewisGale's Chief of Surgery, Jason Fowlkes, told onlookers that the project has been a long time coming.

"Adding this extra space is going to help us be more of a premiere destination," Fowlkes said. He added that new robotic surgical equipment will allow for more advanced surgical skills and care.

"I do robotics here, and we've had a little bit of a struggle around access to the system, so adding a second robot really helps other surgeons and I get access to the equipment," Fowlkes said.

Nursing student fulfills dream of following dad into the Navy

As a child, Drake Davis modeled himself on his father, a Navy nurse.

"I would pretend to mow the lawn, shave, and bandage up my older brother," Davis recalls. "Whatever he did, I was there being his little shadow until one day, when he had to leave for a while."

Davis's father told him the Navy was sending him overseas so he could help the good guys. He proudly imagined his dad as a hero, saving lives on the front lines. It was at that point Davis says he decided to be a Navy nurse, just like his father.

Throughout his youth, Davis impatiently planned out his future. He knew what he wanted to do, but he also knew he had to take it one step at a time. In high school, Davis joined the junior ROTC, where he learned basic military life skills, including uniform inspections and falling into formation. He did so well in junior ROTC that he ended up being named platoon leader. Davis also joined a practical nursing program offered by Fairfax County Schools, where he thrived, eventually becoming a certified nursing assistant.

His next step would be one of the biggest yet: finding just the right nursing school that would allow him to develop his skills and interests even further toward his goal.

"I researched universities with the top nursing programs in my home state of Virginia and New Hampshire, where my dad lived," the Yorktown native says. "When I visited Radford's beautiful campus, I knew I would be happy here. It wasn't too big and wasn't too small — it was perfect."

Davis says that Radford was already his top school when he was accepted and offered the Highlander Distinction Scholarship. He says that investment showed that Radford truly believed in him, and it solidified his decision to become a Highlander.

Now a junior at Radford, Davis says his time in the nursing program has been exceptional and helped

him grow academically and professionally — especially in the clinical skills and sim labs. He says those complex, hands-on experiences are where students "truly learn how to be a nurse."

"Before I came here, I didn't have a lot of confidence in myself as a student," Davis says, "I needed a place to help me become the best I can be, and choosing Radford to help develop that confidence is one of the best decisions I ever made."

Davis's dream of being a Navy nurse hasn't dimmed in the intervening years since he first decided on that path as a young boy. Recently, he applied for and was accepted into the Navy's nurse candidate program. Nationally, only 69 people were accepted into the program, and Davis was ranked No. 2 in the U.S. and No. 1 in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

"It is an honor to be accepted into this prestigious program," Davis says. "It truly means the world to me, and I wish I could put into words the joy and happiness I felt when I learned I was accepted. It has been a lifelong dream of mine to become a Navy nurse, and it is surreal how close I am to making it a reality."

To be accepted into the program, Davis had to submit a degree completion plan consisting of all his prior Radford University classes and all future Radford nursing classes he would take. He was also interviewed by two current Navy nurses and scored 10 out of 10 in both sessions.

Once he was accepted into the program, Davis enlisted in the Navy, but he won't be leaving the New River Valley any time soon. The Navy wants him to concentrate on school while finishing his nursing degree at Radford, and he won't be deployed during

that time.

After graduation, Davis will be commissioned as a Navy nurse officer, take the NCLEX exam, then go to officer development school (ODS) at Naval Station Newport in Rhode Island for a five-week training program. Only then can Davis finally start his career as a Navy nurse.

"I am currently a Navy nurse candidate student," Davis says. "Once I graduate from Radford, I will be commissioned as an ensign. In my current contract, I signed up for eight years, with four of them on active duty and the other four in the ready reserves."

At his enlistment ceremony, Davis was able to have another experience he had always dreamed of — his father, now a retired Navy nurse, swore him in while in uniform.

"It was a special moment for me and for him," Davis says. "Still, to this day, I want to be like my dad, and now that he's home, it's my turn to go overseas because I still believe the good guys need my help."

For the next year or so, though, Davis will be concentrating on finishing his nursing degree at Radford. He says that his education has been instrumental in everything he has accomplished so far and will be an important stepping stone in reaching the next plateau of his development.

"Nursing school at Radford showed me that I need to trust my abilities and be the first one in line for every challenge that is presented to me," Davis reflects. "I have grown confident in my academic abilities and wish I could tell my younger self, 'you can do it.' I want to thank Radford because without it, I wouldn't be who I am today."

Hokie coach leaves, others receive raises

Virginia Tech is losing its quarterbacks coach as Brad Glenn has been named the offensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati. He will rejoin Cincinnati coach Scott Satterfield, with whom he was on the staff at Appalachian State from 2005-2008.

Glenn served as Virginia Tech's quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator in 2022 and has held offensive coordinator roles at both Western Carolina and Georgia State. He replaces Tom Manning, who recently left Cincinnati to join the Indianapolis Colts in the NFL.

Coach Brent Pry said he wanted to congratulate Glenn on his new opportunity at Cincinnati as offensive coordinator. "I realize the longstanding relationship Brad has with Coach Satterfield from his time at Appalachian State," Pry said. "We are thankful for Brad and support him in this career opportunity. We are appreciative of his family's time as Hokies. I wish them all the best."

On Tuesday, Virginia Tech announced contract extensions for four current coaches: Chugger Adair (women's soccer), Mike Brizendine (men's soccer), Sergio Lopez Miro (swimming and diving) and Tony Robie (wrestling). They have all agreed to terms that will

keep them in Blacksburg through 2028.

Athletic Director Whit Babcock said he firmly believes the best days in Blacksburg are ahead, and in a statement said these head coaches are a part of the university's optimism. "Each of them has built successful programs, while being committed to providing a first-class experience for our student-athletes," Babcock said. "We're proud to call them Hokies and look forward to the continued success of their programs under their respective leadership."

Adair was named Virginia Tech's fourth-ever head coach for women's soccer in 2010, and with an overall record of 148-75-24, he already sits atop the Hokies' all-time wins list in program history. Of the 12 years leading Tech women's soccer, Adair has made the NCAA Tournament nine times.

Headlining that stretch was the Hokies' first-ever College Cup appearance in 2013. Tech has achieved an overall NCAA Tournament record of 11-9-1 with Adair at the helm, having made Sweet 16 appearances in 2011, 2013, 2014, and 2018. In 2021, Emily Gray became the highest all-time National Women's Soccer League draft pick from Tech when she was chosen third overall by the

North Carolina Courage.

Gray joined former Tech legends Jazmine Reeves (2014) and Mandy McGlynn (2020) as the only three NWSL draft selections in program history (all developed by Adair). Tech's only three All-Americans have also been under Adair's tutelage: Reeves (First Team, 2013), Murielle Tiernan (Third Team, 2015) and McGlynn (Second Team, 2019). Three of the program's four Academic All-Americans: Katie Yensen (Third Team, 2014), McGlynn (First Team, 2019) and Gray (Third Team, 2021) have also occurred while Adair was the head coach. In 2019, Adair became only the 10th women's soccer head coach in the ACC to reach 100 wins..

Brizendine has arguably led the most promising era of Virginia Tech men's soccer as head coach since 2009.

From 2016-2021, Brizendine set program records in NCAA Tournament appearances (six) and wins (nine), all while progressing past at least the first round each year - a feat accomplished by only two other teams (Indiana and Wake Forest) in that span. In 2016, the Hokies marched to the 'Elite Eight' in a run that included wins over No. 10 Charlotte and No. 7 Indiana.

Avery Zuckerwar was this past season's Class 1 volleyball Player of the Year, helping lead Auburn High School to another state title. Monday, she announced plans to continue her playing career at Emory & Henry College.

"I committed to Emory & Henry because of the close-knit feel of the campus community," she said. "I'm really looking forward to working with Coach Newberry and the rest of the team. I'm so excited to be able to continue to play the game I love."

Earlier this year, Zuckerwar was named the Mt. Empire District, Region C, and State Class 1 Player of the Year.

As a senior, Zuckerwar had 362 kills, 62 aces, and 340 digs.

Emory & Henry College is a private liberal arts college in Emory, Va. The campus covers 335 acres of Washington County, which is part of the Appalachian highlands of Southwest Virginia. The college was founded in 1836.

The latest enrollment numbers show 943 students on campus.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) announced on July 9, 2021, that Emory & Henry College has officially been accepted as a provisional member of Division II, capping a 48-year run as a charter member of Division III.

Emory & Henry will join the South Atlantic Conference (SAC) for the 2022-23 academic year after accepting an

invitation to join the league.

In January, Emory & Henry announced the hiring of Pam Newberry as the college's next head volleyball coach. Newberry joins the Emory & Henry staff after an extremely successful six-year run at nearby Patrick Henry High School.

In her six years leading the Rebels (2017-22), Newberry amassed a 131-31 record, winning the 2018 VHSL Class A State Championship. Her program also made five state appearances. Patrick Henry made the state semifinals in 2019 and in the spring 2021 season. Her 2019 squad won 31 matches.

At Emory & Henry, Zuckerwar plans to major in biology and wants to explore more around the topic of genetics.

Hokies release spring football roster

Virginia Tech has announced its football roster going into the spring, and it includes several early enrollees and transfers.

Eight quarterbacks dot the roster with Grant Wells, being the only upperclassman. Recent transfer Kyron Drones is listed as a Redshirt-sophomore, while sophomore Tahj Bullock remains in a very crowded quarterback room. Others that will be toting the clipboard at some time this coming season include Devin Farrell, Ben Locklear, and true freshmen Sylan Wittke and William "Pop" Watson III.

The team has added seven transfers: long snapper Griffin Armstrong, defensive back Derrick Canteen, quarterback Kyron Drones, wide receivers Da'Quan Felton, Ali Jennings and Jaylin Lane and running back Bhayshul Tuten.

Drones arrives in Blacksburg following two seasons at Baylor. As a redshirt freshman in 2022, he played in the five games off the bench as a reserve quarterback. He was 14-of-23 for a touchdown and 219 yards with one interception. He also rushed eight

times for 49 yards and two touchdowns. He rushed for a nine-yard touchdown and was 5-of-7 passing for 100 yards in his collegiate debut in the season opener vs. the University of Albany.

Drones was pressed into service early in the third quarter at West Virginia after an injury to quarterback Blake Shapen, going 7 of 14 for 95 yards and a score and rushing twice for 24 yards, including a career-long of 17 yards. He appeared in two games as a freshman in 2021 before being redshirted. Drones was a member of the 2022 Second-Team Academic All-Big 12 team and was named to the Big 12 Commissioner's honor roll.

The Pearland, Texas native appeared at Shadow Creek High School where he passed for 1,239 yards and 16 touchdowns as a senior in six games while rushing for 228 yards and two scores, helping his team to the 2019 state championship and a 16-0 record.

He earned Offensive MVP honors in the championship game and was named as the 10-5A Overall MVP as well as a Third-Team All-State selection. Drones was rated four stars by 247

Sports, the No. 7 dual-threat quarterback, the No. 20 player in Texas and No. 125 nationally. He was the No. 10 dual-threat quarterback earning a four-star rating from ESPN and ranked No. 60 overall in Texas. He had a three-star rating by Rivals, the No. 45 player in Texas and the No. 15 dual-threat quarterback. Drones also played basketball.

Felton (WR, 6-5, 210) comes to Tech from Norfolk State. He appeared in all 11 games and started six times as a redshirt freshman in 2022. Felton ranked second on the team with 28 catches for 492 yards with two touchdowns. He ranked seventh in the MEAC in receiving yards per game and 10th in total receptions.

His best outing with the Spartans came at South Carolina State where he

racked up nine catches for 163 yards and three touchdowns, all career highs.

The Portsmouth, Va., product played at Churchland High School,

garnering first-team All-Region 4A honors as a senior. Hecaught 43 passes for 741 yards and 10 touchdowns while helping the Truckers advance to the regional playoffs.

Jennings (WR, 6-2, 195) comes to the Hokies from Old Dominion where he made the All-Sun Belt first team and earned Phil Steele All-American honors in 2022.

He led the team with 54 receptions for 959 yards and nine touchdowns and ranked third in the country, tops in the Sun Belt with 106.6 yards per game. His nine TDs led the conference. Jennings tallied five 100-yard receiving games and had a stretch of seven straight games with a touchdown.

In 2021, Jennings earned Conference USA Honorable Mention accolades after starting all 13 games at wide receiver. He finished second on the team with 62 receptions and led the squad with 1,066 receiving yards.

The Richmond product spent two seasons at West Virginia following a standout career at Highland Springs High School where he earned VHSL All-State First Team honors, All-Richmond Metro Area First Team honors, and All-Class 5A (Region B) First Team Offense honors as a senior.

Jennings helped lead Highland Springs to a perfect 15-0 record and the 2018 VHSL Group 5A State Championship. He was selected to the North roster of the

2018 Virginia Big River Rivalry All-Star Game and was rated as a three-star prospect by ESPN, Rivals, and 247Sports.

Rivals ranked Jennings the No. 19 player in the state of Virginia and the nation's No. 78 receiver. ESPN ranked him No. 28 and 247 in the country.

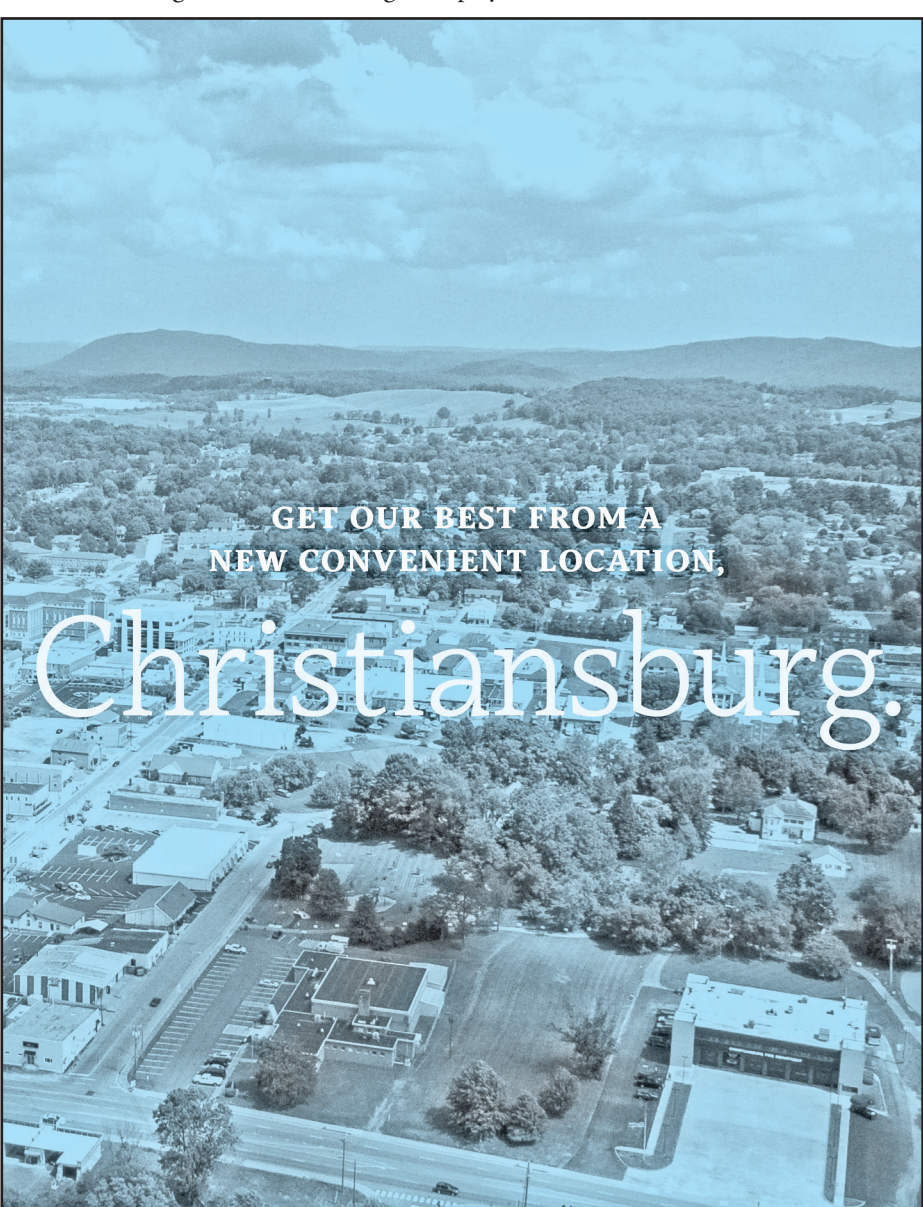
Armstrong (LS, 5-10, 220) spent two seasons at Louisiana Tech, redshirting in 2021, before playing in all 12 games in 2022. He was named to the Conference USA Commissioner's Honor Roll in 2022. He was born in Fairbanks, Alaska as a member of a military family, before living in Valencia, Spain and eventually South Korea where he graduated from Osan American High School. He played rugby throughout middle school and high school.

Canteen (DB, 5-11, 190) joins the Tech program from Georgia Southern where he played in 30 career games, making 25 starts. Over the course of the past three seasons, Canteen recorded 117 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, one sack, seven interceptions, 22 passes defended, one fumble recovery, and one

touchdown.

In 2020, Canteen started all 13 games, recording 48 tackles and tying the FBS lead with six interceptions. He was named a Freshman All-American by the Football Writers Association of America and The Athletic. He was also a first-team All-Sun Belt Conference selection. After playing in just two games the previous season because of an injury, Canteen returned in 2022, making 64 tackles and finishing with 12 passes defended and one interception.

He played at Evans High School in Evans, Georgia, and was ranked as the No. 268 cornerback in the country and the No. 207 player in Georgia by 247Sports. A first-team all-region selection and the Athlete of the Year for the 3-A region, Canteen was named the county's defensive player of the year after recording 61 tackles, two interceptions, and eight pass breakups as a senior on defense to go along with 14 catches for 473 yards and four touchdowns, averaging 43 yards per catch on offense. He was selected for the Sixth Annual Border Bowl.

Lopez Miro was named head coach of Virginia Tech's men's and women's swimming and diving program in May of 2018, and he has since helped re-establish the Hokies as a force in the pool.

In 2021, the former Olympic bronze medalist led Tech to a breakout season with the men's squad finishing a program-best 11th at the NCAA championships.

The women's team enjoyed its second-best all-time placement, finishing 21st overall. After a 2022 season that saw five swimmers earn All-American honors between both squads, Lopez Miro's athletes have set 43 school records with 359 top-10 program performances.

The Tech men are coming off a runner-up showing at the 2023 ACC championships, their highest finish since 2014, headlined by Youssef Ramadan's winning the league's most valuable swimmer for the second year in a row.

Robie came to Blacksburg in 2006 and has been an integral part in establishing

Virginia Tech as a powerhouse wrestling program, taking over as head coach in 2017.

Upon his head coaching debut, he became the first coach in ACC history to start his career with two consecutive regular-season titles. Robie has led the program to new heights in his six-year career at Tech, capturing five ACC titles (three dual meet and two tournament), and the program's first undefeated season in 2020-21 since 1956-57, finishing at 9-0.

A three-time ACC Coach of the Year recipient, he has cultivated individual accolades on the national landscape as well, developing Mekhi Lewis (165 pounds) into the Hokies' first-ever individual wrestling national champion in 2019.

In 2020-21, the program rose up the ranks to the No. 3 spot in the National Wrestling Coaches of America Coaches Poll, the highest rank under Robie and tied for the highest in program history.
