Radford students shine at Addys

RADFORD - Three Radford University Graphic Design majors took home "Addys" at the Western Virginia Advertising Awards in Roanoke.

Seniors Valerie Ray and Emily Woods, and junior Britiany Rorrer, earned two Judges Choice Awards plus three Gold and three Silver awards between them in the student competition.

The competition is sponsored by Roanoke's chapter of the American Advertising Federation to recognize excellence and creativity in advertising across all media platforms. Winning entries are eligible to enter the District 3 awards contest which covers Virginia and the Carolinas. From there, winners can move on to the national competition.

Valerie Ray garnered both a Gold and Judges Choice award in the Sales Promotion Packaging category for a fictional brewery, Backyard Brewing, that subtly played on the university's Highlander identity.

"The idea was Kilt Guilt Scottish Ale would be their first nationally distributed beer," Ray explained, "so it needed unique packaging to be set apart from the dozens of other craft brews available."

Christiansburg woman competes on Jeopardy

Christiansburg, appeared on Jeopardy on Wednesday, March 22.

Morris, a Virginia Tech student pursuing Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and Master of Public Health degrees, came in third on the show and won \$1,000.

"With a background that includes a bachelor's degree in Spanish, time spent living in Spain, work in a financial regulatory agency across the street from the White House, singing with the Boston Symphony Orchestra and in New York's Carnegie Hall, nature studies at the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute, and now study toward dual degrees at the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine, it's little wonder how Morris is multifaceted enough in her interests and knowledge to qualify

for the popular TV quiz show that began nearly 60 years ago," according to information announced by Virginia Tech.

Tm a mixed tracker in life," said Morris, referring to a veterinary studies track that doesn't specialize on a particular animal type. "I'm a person who can't stop looking at the big picture, and at the same time, memorizing trivial facts."

Morris began the process of qualifying for the show in August 2021 by taking the "Jeopardy! Anytime Test" online.

"Everyone should do it," Morris said. "It's just an online quiz."

Her strong performance on that test led to a proctored test via Zoom and a screen test, which qualified her to be among a pool of potential candidates

Body discovered in search for missing man

A body found in West Virginia might be that of a missing Christiansburg man.

Authorities have been searching for 86-year-old Siegfried Holzer for more than three weeks. He was last seen on February 23 after a trip to a local repair

Security cameras showed Holzer at the counter dropping off a chain saw for repairs. When he didn't return home, a GPS locater showed his car in Hardy County, almost three hours away.

The Hardy County Sheriff's Office found his

vehicle around the 11000 block of State Road 55 in Baker, W.Va. and initiated a search. Three different search efforts had not found any sign of the man, but on Wednesday, a body was found just a short distance

from where his car was left sitting. The remains have been sent to a medical examiner's

office and police are awaiting positive identification. The investigation remains ongoing, and no other

details are available at this time.


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Country star Rissi Palmer brings her 'Southern soul' to the Moss

While she has made her mark as a country music artist, Rissi Palmer is equally at home performing R&B and has a gift for reaching across musical boundaries to bring the entire spectrum of popular music

Palmer will bring what she calls "Southern soul" to the Moss Arts Center for two performances on Thursday, March 30, and Friday, March 31, at 8 p.m.

Palmer will be joined by guitarist Charles Newkirk for both concerts in the center's Cube, located at 190 Alumni Mall.

In 2007 Palmer released her debut album, "Rissi Palmer," charting singles 'Country Girl," "Hold on to Me," and "No Air." Since then, she has independently released a Christmas single; her first children's album, "Best Day Ever;" and an EP titled "The Back Porch Sessions." Her most recent album, "Revival," was released in 2019 and has been critically hailed as her most personal and uplifting work to date.

Palmer is one of only five Black women to ever appear on the Billboard country music charts. In 2007, she became the first Black woman to chart a country song since Dona Mason in 1987. Dedicated to supporting artists of color who have been underrepresented in mainstream country music, her radio show, "Color Me Country with Rissi Palmer," on Apple Music Country provides in-depth and necessary conversations with both new and established artists.

Palmer will be featured in the documentary short series "American Masters: In The Making." Following Palmer as she works on music for her new album while managing family life and the busiest professional year she has had in a decade, "Rissi Palmer: Still Here" aired nationally on PBS on Friday, March 24, at 9 p.m.

to the center's lineup, creating a focus on Black Southern artists who effortlessly cross genres and revitalize time-honored music traditions. In addition to Palmer, "Up 86" features performances by Ammons and Sonny Miles.

"Rissi Palmer's career is a series of left

turns," Ammons said. "Her 2017 twangy

mid-tempo anthem, 'Country Girl,' made her the first Black woman to grace Billboard's Hot Country charts in over 30 years. She achieved this feat by wading through the prejudices of country music while brandishing the obstinance of the genre's Black forebears. Her radio program, 'Color Me Country,' reminds us that there has never been an absence of Black voices in the country category, just a bigoted radio dial. Palmer's 'Southern soul' is a resounding catchall for the impellent lyrics, fervent vibrato, and palatial strings that bind her country, gospel, rock, and blues inflexions at a common crossroad."

The public can be part of the audience when Palmer records an episode of her radio show "Color Me Country with Rissi Palmer" live in the Moss Arts Center Cube on Thursday, March 30, at 5:30 p.m. Palmer will be joined by Richmond guest artist Tony Jackson. A gifted singer often compared to country superstar Randy Travis, Jackson's strong, emotionally charged, and engaging voice and back-totradition style has captured the hearts of millions. The show is free and open to the public, but registration is required.

Palmer also will speak to Virginia Tech students about her path as a musician, foundation leader, and radio show host.

Tickets for the performance are \$15 for general admission and \$10 for students and youth 18 and under. Virginia Tech Transportation Institute sheds new light on Virginia State Police vehicles

BLACKSBURG difference between red and blue could save lives.

Ronald Gibbons and his team of researchers from the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute (VTTI) have found that motorists passing a stopped police vehicle pay more attention when the vehicle has more emergency lights and uses red lights in its light bar. Now, as the next fleet of Virginia State Police vehicles is being rolled out, the vehicles are being equipped with a new lighting pattern that includes both red and blue lights, based on testing and evaluation by Virginia State Police Driver Training Center staff, nationwide

best practices for police vehicle emergency lighting, vendor input, and recommendations from VTTI's published research.

"VTTI's lighting study findings and recommendations played a significant role in the marking and lighting configuration of our newly designed patrol SUV's," said Col. Gary T. Settle, superintendent of the Virginia State Police. "We are grateful for the significant research and collaborative efforts that VTTI extended to the Virginia State Police during the multiple phases of the study."

The Move Over Law established in 2002 requires drivers to move over if passing stopped vehicles with flashing amber, red, or blue lights. Despite the law, 40 officers were killed in 2022 across the nation in trafficrelated incidents, a 29 percent increase from 2021, according to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund.

In return, she will return to Botswana and work for the government as a veterinarian for at least two years. She hopes to work with the exotic wildlife prevalent in her

"I'm going to go back for those two years and hopefully work in the wildlife industry because Botswana has one of the biggest wildlife industries," Hughes said. "Botswana lacks vets and lacks the education system to teach people about animals and how to properly take care of animals. ... I'd like to work with exotic animals. The different animals seem way more complicated to work with and how complicated interests me the most.'

Virginia Tech is helping Botswana with its conservation and sustainability efforts. Kathleen Alexander, a professor of wildlife conservation in the College of Natural Resources and Environment, has been conducting research in Botswana for nearly 30 years. In 2001, she co-founded the Centre for African Resources, Animals, Communities, and Land Use (CARACAL), which is a nonprofit organization on the edge of Chobe National Park that promotes conservation efforts while also improving the lives of the people through outreach and educational efforts.

Alexander spoke highly of Botswana's conservation and sustainability efforts.

"Under His Excellency's leadership, Botswana is one of the fastest-growing economies in the world and undoubtedly a leader in conservation," she said. "I can truly say without any hesitation that his passion for wildlife is only surpassed by his commitment to the well-being of the citizens of Botswana. His government has prioritized infrastructure development and wealth-creation programs for communities, including the most vulnerable across the landscape. These programs are embedded and advanced and a unique embracement and culture of conservation and democracy." In 2019, Masisi and first lady Neo Masisi

visited CARACAL and met with Alexander

and her research team, and he expressed support for Alexander's efforts. Alexander approaches research through a holistic lens, one that balances positive conservation outcomes with betterment of the people within various communities.

"The government of Botswana and the people of Botswana have a keen interest in studying the epidemiology of diseases of both domestic and wild animals, which can destroy people's herds of livestock," Masisi said. "It's in our national interest to forestall the dire consequences of animal diseases on our communities' livelihoods. Thus, we

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



Inside the Bracket: Breaking down the teams in Seattle

In front of a sold-out Cassell Coliseum, the Virginia Tech women's basketball team earned a spot in the Sweet 16 for just the second time in program history, advancing to the regional semifinal round following wins over Chattanooga and South Dakota The top-seeded Hokies will make

the cross-country trek to Seattle ahead of their clash with No. 4 Tennessee on Saturday, March 25. Tipoff time is set for 6:30 p.m. ET on ESPN2. The winner of that game will play

the winner of the UConn-Ohio State contest on Monday, March 27, with a trip to the Final Four up for grabs.

Take a deeper dive below into the other three squads joining Virginia Tech in the Emerald City this weekend. NO. 4 TENNESSEE

No stranger to March Madness, the Lady Vols are making their 36th Sweet 16 appearance, the most for any women's or men's program in NCAA Tournament history. Tennessee has won eight national championships in its storied history, trailing only UConn and its 11 national titles.

Virginia Tech and Tennessee met earlier this season in Knoxville, a 59-56 win for the Hokies behind a teamhigh 18 points from Kayana Traylor. Elizabeth Kitley was held to just six points in that contest, one of only three games this year in which she failed to reach double figures.

The Lady Vols appear to be peaking at the right time, having scored 94 points and 95 points, respectively, in their first two NCAA Tournament games. They have won eight of their last 10 games, and the last time they lost to a team that was not No. 1 South Carolina was a 91-90 setback to Mississippi State back on Feb. 6.

Rickea Jackson and Jordan Horston,

both First Team All-SEC picks, pace Tennessee's offensive attack, averaging a combined 35 points per game.

The Hokies are 3-8 all-time against UT, including an 0-1 mark at neutral sites. Interestingly enough, that one neutral site game happened to be Virginia Tech's first Sweet 16 trip back in 1999, a game the Hokies lost 68-52 in Greensboro, North Carolina. Tennessee Head Coach Kellie Harper was a starting guard for the Vols in that game in 1999.

NO. 2 UCONN

A program that needs no introduction to women's basketball fans, UConn is appearing in its 30th Sweet 16. In the midst of a seven-game winning streak and having won 10 of their last 11 outings, the Huskies defeated Vermont and Baylor this past weekend to claim a spot in Seattle and extend their run to 29 consecutive Sweet 16 showings.

Forward Aaliyah Edwards joins Kitley on the Naismith Player of the Year semifinalist list and boasts averages of 17.0 points per game on 59% shooting along with 9.0 rebounds per game. Azzi Fudd, the nation's topranked recruit in the Class of 2021, recently returned from injury and put up 22 points in the Huskies' win over Baylor Monday evening.

Virginia Tech and UConn have met 11 times but have not faced one another since 2006 in an NCAA Tournament second-round game, a 79-56 victory for the Huskies in University Park,

NO. 3 OHIO STATE

The Buckeyes needed a buzzer-beater to defeat North Carolina on Monday to claim their second-straight trip to the Sweet 16. Ohio State is in the midst of its 25th NCAA Tournament appearance and is pursuing just its second Final Four in program history.

OSU's offense is one of the best in the country as the Buckeyes average 80.4 points per game on 46% shooting while dishing out 17.4 assists per game. Guard Taylor Mikesell leads the team with 17.2 points per game.

The 6-1, 220 Steiner is perhaps best known for his time in World Championship Wrestling (WCW), and has also wrestled for Jim Črockett Promotions (JCP), World Wrestling Federation/Entertainment (WWF/WWE), Total Nonstop Action Wrestling (TNA, later Impact Wrestling), and Extreme Championship Wrestling (ECW). He is a four-time world champion in wrestling, being a one-time WCW World Heavyweight Champion, a one-time WWA World Heavyweight Champion, and a one-time WWC Universal Heavyweight Champion and a one-time WWA World Heavyweight Champion (Indianapolis version). He is the eighth WCW Triple Crown Champion.

During the 1980s and 1990s, Steiner wrestled alongside his older brother Rick as The Steiner Brothers. "Watching the guys work this morning, they're really efficient and smooth in what they're doing," Pry continued. "I'm fired up we got an open practice for everybody on March 25. We did this last year and have another one this spring, which will be in Lane Stadium. I believe that's our fifth practice. It will be a chance for everybody to come out and see what we're about."

Tech added 19 newcomers for the spring semester, with 13 of the players being on offense, five on defense and one specialist. Wide receiver was the position group with the most influx (5), while offensive line was a close second (4).

Of course, two new assistants had to jump into the deep end of spring ball. Pry called it a crash course.

"There's some familiarity, right? Through the interview process you have a lot of discussions on Zoom. You can talk multiple times and talk technique and fundamentals. Where we're at. What they believe in. Philosophies. And then familiarity with the offenses they've been around. That was important in the process. It sure makes the transition better when there's a lot of familiarity," he said.

Virginia Tech recently announced the addition of Ron Crook as offensive line coach. Crook's career has spanned three decades and includes stops at Cincinnati, West Virginia, Stanford, Harvard and Illinois, while spending the previous season at South Dakota.

Maryland's Elijah Brooks was named running backs coach, following a successful run with the Terps and powerhouse DeMatha Catholic High School.

The Hokies will hold their annual Spring Game, presented by PMSI, in Lane Stadium on Saturday, April 15 at 3 p.m. More specifics about that day's events will be released when finalized.







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Track and Field/Cross Country office named in Jerry Gaines' honor

Ceremony recognized Tech's first black scholarship student-athlete

Virginia Tech director of athletics Whit Babcock announced that in recognition of Jerry Gaines, the director of track and field/cross country office is officially named in his honor.

The Dr. Jeremiah "Jerry" Gaines Jr. '71 Track and Field/Cross Country Director's Office, which is located on the third floor of Cassell Coliseum, was unveiled during a special VIP dedication ceremony Monday morning.

Gaines opened the way for black athletes to compete in track and field as the first black full scholarship athlete at Virginia Tech. His school record in the outdoor long jump (24' 10" (7.57m)) stood until 2013, and his 120-yard hurdles record still stands at 14.1. Gaines graduated from Tech with a degree in Spanish in 1971.

"Virginia Tech, as much as anything, gave me validity – undeniable proof that I could indeed compete on this huge stage as well as anyone," said Gaines. "A Virginia Tech class ring meant that I could stand alongside anyone, and never again have to endure those stares that might label me as anything less than 'legitimate.' It meant that I could not only function, but excel in any type of environment academic, athletic, social, or any other.'

Gaines continued to excel after college, first serving in the Army as a second lieutenant. He then found his way back to the classroom as a high school Spanish teacher and coach. He

was awarded coach of the year in 1987

by the Portsmouth Sports Club and

was named teacher of the year in 1990.

Gaines greatly influenced the lives of

thousands of students before retiring

in 2011.

"Great leadership is never a matter of lauding one's power over others, but to help others to greatness in whatever endeavor they might choose to pursue

in life," said Gaines. As one of only 20 black students on campus, he helped build a path for every black athlete to find greatness at Tech, standing against racism and prejudice in the classroom. With the support of family, teammates, coaches, and a special English teacher, Gaines learned the power of encouragement and the difference between success and significance.

'This is a significant honor for Jerry because it is a permanent reminder of what this amazing individual means to not just the athletics department at Virginia Tech but the entire university," said director of track and field/cross country Dave Cianelli. "Every student-athlete who attends Virginia Tech will now know how much Jerry Gaines influenced their opportunity to attend Virginia Tech and be a student-athlete."

In November of 1990, Gaines was the first black athlete inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame. Although he continues to feel humbled by the recognition, he is well deserving of the honor as a seven-time conference champion and an eighttime national championship qualifier.

"I feel honored and blessed to have been given the opportunities to serve Ut Prosim," said Gaines. "My life's riches lie in the memories stored away in this old heart – gold coins that are represented by the thousands of individuals I have been blessed to meet and get to know."
