Radford Memorial Day ceremonies set for Monday

Radford's annual ceremony will be held in Bisset Park, followed by Radford Noon Rotary to dedicate Field of Honor at Glencoe

RADFORD - A ceremony to honor American military service members killed in war will be held on Memorial Day, Monday, May 29, at 11 a.m. in Radford's Bisset Park.

The ceremony includes a speech by the Radford Army Ammunition Plant Commander, a 21-gun salute, and music and is held annually in the park's gazebo.

The ceremony has been held for the past 23 years and is presented by Radford VFW Post 776, American Legion Post 30, the NRV Marine Corps League, the Dublin-Radford Ruritan Club, the Radford News Journal, WRAD AM1460, and WPSK 107.1.

At 2 p.m., the Radford Noon Rotary will host a dedication of the "Field of Honor" on the grounds of Glencoe Mansion. The event will be the official start of the Field of Honor display of American flags sponsored to honor heroes of all types from service members to individuals who have made an impact on someone's

The ceremony will include remarks from multiple members of the community. Master of Ceremonies Dr. Richard Harshberger will lead the program, which

The Radford Noon Rotary is a volunteer organization dedicated to advancing Radford through good deeds. Tax prep assistance program, sees expansive growth in its second year

RADFORD - After a highly successful first year, an initiative sponsored in part by the Davis College of Business and Economics saw extensive growth in its second, a rise its director says represents a financial benefit to the public of just over a quarter of a million dollars.

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, a collaboration between Davis College and New River Community Action (NRCA), provides free tax preparation and consultation to local residents making less than \$56,000 a year. VITA is run by a single paid position, director Lacey Desper, and was staffed this year with seven volunteers.

According to its most recent report, VITA processed and filed returns for some 777 individuals this year, a 94% increase over the 400 that were handled in 2022.

Between those clients - who saved an average of \$250 in tax preparation costs - and additional services the program offers, Desper estimates it saved the public approximately \$266,000.

Of the returns filed, 137 clients were eligible for earned income tax credit (EITC); 54 earned child tax credit; 48 got advanced or additional child tax credit; and 38 received education credits.

The Department of Accounting, Finance and Business Law and its chair, Douglas Brinckman, Ph.D., along with the dean's office, provide VITA with support and office space. Two Radford University student volunteers also participated, completing 347 returns and donating approximately 220 hours of

About 100 university students and staffers filed

their returns through the program this year. "You can see the community impact of this program, which is intended to assist the economically underserved populations with their tax returns," Dean

'This is truly an impactful partnership with a local nonprofit that benefits the local community," he added.





DWR announces National Safe Boating Week in May

RICHMOND, VA — National Safe Boating Week is May 20-26 and the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) is reminding all boaters to stay safe this summer and always wear a life jacket while on the water.

A good day on the water can turn tragic in seconds. No matter where you boat-from large lakes and rivers to small farm ponds wearing a life jacket is essential for safety!

While getting ready for the boating season, boaters should make sure they have U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets in good condition that fit every occupant of the boat, including children. Safe boating week is a great time to inspect your gear, including your inflatable life jacket. Inflatable life jackets make it easy for adults to "Wear It" while enjoying their time on the water and being a good role model for young people on their

"As the law enforcement division of the primary boating agency of the Commonwealth, strive to promote a safe environment for everyone that enjoys recreating on the water. To be as effective as possible, we need your help. Please check your safety equipment at the dock, tell someone when to expect you back, make sure your vessel is seaworthy, and always designate an operator if there is alcohol aboard, says DWR Major Ryan Shuler." "We want everyone to have fun and

be safe!" No matter what time of year you go boating, always let someone know where you are going

and when you expect to return. Also, have a plan to re-board your boat in case the unexpected happens and you end up in the water.

Weather conditions and a marine forecast can be found on the National Weather Service website. The United States Geological Survey has water temperatures for some inland lakes and

Financial Focus: Can you benefit from a 529 plan?

Another school year is coming to a close. And if you have young children, they're now a year closer to heading off to college or some other type of post-secondary education or training. So, if you haven't already done so, you may want to start preparing for these costs.

And they can be considerable. During the 2022-

23 school year, the average estimated annual cost (tuition, fees, room and board, books, supplies, transportation and other personal expenses) was nearly \$28,000 for public four-year in-state schools and more than \$57,000 for private nonprofit four-year schools, according to the College Board.

Of course, some students don't pay the full bill for

college. Any grants and scholarships they receive can bring down the "sticker price." Still, there's often a sizable amount that students and their families must come up with. To help fill this gap, you may want to explore various strategies, one of which is a 529 education savings plan.

A 529 plan offers several key benefits. First of all, your earnings can grow tax deferred and your withdrawals are federally tax free when used for qualified education expenses, such as tuition, fees, books and so on. You may be eligible to invest in a

529 plan in most states, but depending on where you live, you may be able to deduct your contributions from your state income tax or possibly receive a state tax credit for investing in your home state's 529 plan. Tax issues for 529 plans can be complex. Please consult your tax advisory about your situation.

And 529 plans aren't just for college. You may be able to use one to pay K-12 expenses, up to \$10,000 per student per year. (However, not all states comply with this 529 expansion for K-12, so you might not be able to claim deductions and your withdrawals could be subject to state tax penalties.)

A 529 plan can also be used to pay for most

expenses connected to apprenticeship programs registered with the U.S. Department of Labor. These programs are often available at community colleges and combine classroom education with on-the-job training.

Furthermore, you can now withdraw funds from

a 529 plan to repay qualified federal private and student loans, up to \$10,000 for each 529 plan beneficiary and another \$10,000 for each of the beneficiary's siblings.

But what if you've named a child as a 529 plan beneficiary and that child doesn't want to pursue any

type of advanced education? If this happens, you, as the account owner, are free to name another family member as beneficiary.

And beginning in 2024, you may have even more flexibility if a child foregoes college or other post-secondary education. Due to the passing of the Secure Act 2.0 in December 2022, unused 529 plan funds of up to \$35,000 may be eligible to roll over to a Roth IRA of the designated beneficiary.

One of the qualifications for this rollover is to have had your 529 plan for at least 15 years. To determine if you qualify for this rollover, you will want to consult your tax advisor.

A 529 plan has a lot to offer — and it might be something to consider for your family's future.

Withdrawals used for expenses other than qualified education expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes, plus a 10% penalty. Make sure to discuss the potential financial aid impacts with a financial aid professional.

Virginia gas prices dip slightly from past week

Average gasoline prices in Virginia have fallen 1.6 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.29/g today, according to GasBuddy's survey of 4,081 stations in Virginia. Prices in Virginia are 18.8 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 117.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 3.2 cents in the last week and stands at \$3.94 per gallon.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest

station in Virginia was priced at \$2.75/g yesterday

while the most expensive was \$3.99/g, a difference of \$1.24/g.

The national average price of gasoline is unchanged

in the last week, averaging \$3.51/g today. The national average is down 14.7 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 106.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

"In the run up to Memorial Day, the national average price of gas has seen little overall movement over the last week. We've seen more states see prices climb than fall, which has been driven by oil's volatility as debt ceiling discussions are ongoing. I think we'll see prices rise slightly as we get closer to Memorial Day, especially if there are positive developments in the debt ceiling discussions in D.C., while pessimism could drive prices slightly lower," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "I continue to be optimistic that the national average will remain under \$4 per gallon for most of, if not the entire summer, with Americans spending a combined \$1.6 billion less on gasoline over Memorial Day weekend this year compared to last."





Mountain Valley Pipeline project record of decision signed

USDA Forest Service issued a Record Decision signed Ьy USDA Undersecretary Wilkes to allow for the Mountain Valley Pipeline project across a proposed 3.5-mile corridor of the Jefferson National Forest.

The Mountain Valley pipeline is a project of Mountain Valley, LLC, to construct and operate a buried 42-inch interstate natural gas pipeline. The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission remains the lead agency responsible for the authorization of the 303.5-mile interstate transmission project.

The Forest Service's decision includes a projectspecific amendment to the Jefferson National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan (Forest Plan) to accommodate the pipeline construction, which requires measures to minimize environmental impacts. The Forest Service

will provide a letter of concurrence for the Mountain Valley Pipeline Project to the Bureau of Land Management. The letter of concurrence will provide the Bureau of Land Management with the terms and conditions, which Mountain Valley, LLC must adhere to.

Bureau Land Management is responsible for approving pipelines that cross federal lands under the jurisdiction of two or more federal agencies and will decide whether to issue or deny the right-of-

permit. If the Bureau of Land Management right-ofway grant and temporaryuse permit is approved, a notice to proceed with construction would be

Neuroscientist explains the science of the 'brain freeze'

"'Brain freeze' or 'ice cream headache' is the occasional intense pain you feel in your head when drinking or sure that certain areas within a few seconds to of your body remain in specific temperature ranges. Your head is particularly important, so the normal response to a cold stimulus inside the head is to try to warm that area back up. It does this by rapidly increasing the flow of warm blood through the blood vessels in the roof of your mouth. This sudden expansion of

Most of the regular headaches that we get are also caused by changes in the size of our blood vessels that are similarly detected by nerve endings, these are more gradual changes."

Q: How harmful is a 'brain freeze"?

"Although pain is highly unpleasant, it is your brain's natural

way of making sure that we protect our body, even though in this case a temporary cold stimulus is not going eating something that to cause any actual is very cold. One damage. A 'brain important function of freeze' is not harmful your brain is to make and should go away

> a minute or so.' Q: What can you do to counter a "brain

freeze"?

"Everyone susceptible to getting a 'brain freeze'. If you do get a 'brain freeze', you can either drink something that is room temperature, or you can push your tongue against the roof of your mouth to quickly warm the area back up. You can also decrease the chance of getting a 'brain freeze' by eating or drinking cold items more slowly, so that your body has

time to adjust." Q: How can you

avoid one altogether? "The only way to completely prevent having one altogether is to avoid consuming anything that is cold. Summer without ice cream and popsicles seems quite sad though, so it is probably worth the risk of the occasional 'brain freeze'.

An assistant professor with the Virginia Tech School of Carilion Medicine's Department Science BasicEducation, Kristofer Rau is a neuroscientist with expertise biology, molecular electrophysiology, and behavior assessments. He has a strong interest in science outreach and advocacy.

Virginia Tech neuroscientist offers insight into how loneliness can affect health

Efforts are underway to address the "epidemic of loneliness and isolation" affecting the country, as recently addressed by the U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy who is laying out a "National Strategy to Advance Social Connection'

Virginia Tech neuroscientist Georgia Hodes says that reports of depression and anxiety are up at least 3-fold since the start of the COVID epidemic. "While loneliness and isolation are likely contributors, the COVID infection itself triggers a depressive episode in approximately 20 percent of people. Understanding how infection impacts mood may help us find new ways to treat individuals that do not fully respond to current antidepressants."

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, social isolation and loneliness have been linked to increased risk for heart disease and stroke, type 2 diabetes,

depression and anxiety, suicidality and self-harm, dementia, and earlier death.


Hodes' research explores biomarkers and treatments for depression that target the body's immune response system. For studies linking loneliness and isolation to effects on the brain, she points to one study that showed "people who reported they were lonely but were otherwise healthy adults had greater pro-inflammatory immune responses to acute stress and immune activation. The data suggests that loneliness is priming the immune system to react more strongly to stress.

Hodes says that most studies on loneliness in humans have been done in older adults. She points to a recent study by Isabelle F. van der Velpen et al, that used MRI images from the Rotterdam study to examine the relationship between loneliness and brain matter volume. "At baseline

higher loneliness scores were associated with decreased white matter volume. Perceived social support correlated positively with total brain and grey matter volume. In general, though there is little on perceived loneliness and specific changes in brain structures in humans.

"One of the most replicated findings is perceived loneliness in humans is related to higher levels of the cytokine IL-6 in the periphery. Previously, in mice we reported that altering IL-6 produced in the periphery by the white blood cells could induce or block the effects of stress on social behavior," says Hodes. "This is a protein that has increased levels when someone is sick. The human data suggest that loneliness is putting people into a constant state of low-grade inflammation which may then promote social withdrawal, depression and/or anxiety."



Hokies get ready for ACC baseball tournament Coming off Saturday's noteworthy win against the

nation's No. 1 side, the Virginia Tech baseball team has learned its postseason course this week at the 2023 ACC Baseball Championship – set to take place at Durham Bulls Athletic Park in Durham, North Carolina – as the conference revealed the official tournament schedule on Sunday morning. As the event's No. 10 seed, Virginia Tech (30-21,

12-17 ACC) will play in the opening game of both


Pool C and the tournament on Tuesday, May 23, when the Hokies battle sixth-seeded [No. 22] Boston College (34-17, 16-14 ACC) at 11 a.m. Per the tournament format, Tech will bat as the away team during its game against the Eagles. Following Tuesday's tournament opener, Virginia Tech will return to the conference championship site

on Wednesday, May 24, to oppose third-seeded [No. 7] Clemson (39-17, 20-10 ACC) at 7 p.m. Per the tournament format, Tech will bat as the home team during its game against the Tigers. Virginia Tech faced both Boston College and

Clemson during the 2023 regular season. The Hokies' lone head-to-head victory against their pool foes took place on March 10 when Tech hammered five home runs against BC at English Field, snapping the Eagles' 10-game winning streak at the time.

To champion Pool C – one of four pools feeding into Saturday's semifinal round – Tech will need to sweep its two pool games against Boston College and Clemson. Should the Hokies advance to Saturday's semifinals, they would oppose the winner of Pool B, featuring second-seeded Virginia, seventh-seeded North Carolina and 11th-seeded Georgia Tech.

As a program, Virginia Tech is making its third

consecutive ACC Baseball Championship appearance and its seventh such appearance all-time. Last season, the Hokies proudly earned the tournament's top seed courtesy of their ACC Coastal Division championship and league best, 19-9 record.

Virginia Tech last qualified out of pool play during the 2013 tournament when the Hokies reached the conference championship game, finishing runner-up to North Carolina.

All pool play games at the 2023 ACC Baseball Championship, taking place between Tuesday, May 23, and Friday, May 27, will air live on ACC Network. Should Tech qualify for the semifinals on Saturday, May 28, the Hokies would compete at 5 p.m. on ACC

The Sunday, May 29, championship game will air live on ESPN2, beginning at 12 p.m.
