

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Financial Focus: Are your goals 'must have' or 'nice to have'?

Like everyone, you may have a lot of financial goals. But are they all of equal importance? Probably not. And do they share a similar timeline? Again, it's unlikely. So, your first step may be to prioritize your goals — and

This process should include the following steps:

then follow a process that can help you achieve them.

Identify your goals as "must have" or "nice to have." Making sure you can retire comfortably and won't outlive your resources is a "must have" goal. For this goal, you can't compromise — you need to be certain of achieving it, or at least as certain as possible. But if you want to someday own a vacation home by the beach, and you can't ever quite afford it, you might find an acceptable substitute, such as renting. So, it seems fair to say that achieving this goal would be "nice to

have that luxury — you'll probably need to prioritize where your investment dollars are going. For your main "must have" goal — retirement — you'll be helped by the ability to automatically invest through your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. If you're

have unlimited sums to invest — and very few of us

on track toward this goal, and you budget carefully and potentially receive salary increases over the years, you may also find space to keep contributing toward the "nice to have" goals.

Put "price tags" on your goals. You need to know what your goals will cost. Of course, you may need to estimate the costs for some goals based on different factors. For example, when you think about your goal of retiring comfortably without outliving your money, you'll need to consider some key questions, including these: When do you want to retire? What sort of retirement lifestyle do you envision? Do you see yourself downsizing your living arrangements? For other goals, though, such as purchasing a vacation home, you could get more specific on how much money you'll need. Follow an appropriate strategy. The nature of your

goals, and their estimated cost, along with your appetite for risk, should drive your investment strategy — but another key factor is time. So, for a long-term goal like retirement, you'll likely need a reasonable amount of quality growth-oriented investments in your portfolio. Philadelphia work commuters and vacationers heading to the City of Brotherly Love or the Jersey shore are nearly a week into grappling with and sitting in stand-still traffic after a tanker truck fire collapsed part of a I-95 bridge in the northern part of the city. The fire also heavily damaged the southbound lane of I-95. How all this stress and time-waste affects commuters and their workday performance and/or their behavior at home after the commute is part of larger phenomenon that psychologists call commuting spillover.

"Do the experiences that we have during our workday affect our behavior and perhaps even influence our safety when commuting home? Can a difficult commute to the office undermine our ability to have a happy, healthy, and productive day at work? Questions like this reflect a phenomenon referred to as "commuting spillover," which is when workday experiences affect experiences during the commute and vice versa," said Charles Calderwood, a Virginia Tech associate professor of psychology. "It is essential that we understand connections between our commuting and work experiences to evaluate critical inputs to our health, wellness, and productivity inside and outside of the workplace."

Calderwood added that the science of commuting spillover illustrates numerous and important findings that enhance our understanding of how our lives at work and during the commute connect. Recent research by Calderwood suggests that encountering workday demands that are challenging, interesting, or engaging may help boost your energy and attention to devote to safe driving on the way home.

"One issue that remains poorly understood is whether and how major disruptions to commutinginfluence commuting spillover. On the one hand, when the commuting conditions we face are more unpredictable, this tends to be one of the most reliable recipes for stressful commuting," Calderwood said.
"However, it is possible that some

adaptation to these commuting conditions may occur over time that allows commuters to feel more in control of their commute, such as different route choices and altering commuting times," he added. "To the extent that we feel in control of the conditions of our commute, that tends to reduce the commuting stress

Charles Calderwood is an associate professor in the Virginia Tech Department of Psychology. His research focuses on studying how employees perceive, react to, and recover from work stress both at home and during the workday, including how commuting spillover (the carryover of workday stress reactions into the commuting environment) affects drivers.



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
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

Fleet named Class 1 Player of the Year

The Virginia High School League announces its 2023 Class 1 all-state softball team. Auburn senior pitcher Kirsten Fleet is the Class 1 Player of the Year, and Auburn head coach Tim Smoot is the Class 1 Coach of the Year.

The right-handed Fleet started and completed 27 games this season with a 26-1 record pitching 175 innings, striking out 389 batters with an ERA of 0.48, allowing 17 runs (12 earned runs), 20 shoutouts, nine nohitters, and five perfect Additionally, she limited opposing batters to 51 hits and 18 walks. Offensively in 2023, she batted .388 with 26 hits in 68 atbats, five home runs, and 26 RBI. Fleet has a career pitching line of 378 innings pitched, 97 hits, 37 runs (24 earned runs), 852 strikeouts, 44 walks, 0.44 ERA and 39 shutouts. This season, the power-hitting

slugger hit for an average

of .456, with 36 hits, 29 RBI, seven doubles, one triple, and 11 home runs while walking 15 times.

Smoot, the Class 1 coach of the year, guided the Eagles to a 26-1 record and a thirdstraight state title with a 1-0 victory over Rye Cove in the state finals. Auburn reached the state finals with a 4-1 win against Eastside in the quarterfinals and a 1-0 win over the Buffalo Gap in the semifinals. Smoot has been with the Eagles program for seven seasons, the first five as an assistant coach and the last two as head coach. He has guided Auburn to back-to-back state titles.

The all-state softball team consists of three pitchers, one catcher, four infielders by position, three outfielders, one DP-flex, and two at-large players from any position Only those players selected first-team all-region are eligible for selection to

The Virginia High School League announces its 2023 Class 1 all-state girls' soccer team. Eastern Montgomery's senior midfielder Maddie Bruce is the Class 1 Player of the Year, and Eastern Montgomery's head coach Whitney Shaver is the Class 1 Coach of the Year.

Bruce, last year's Class 1 2021 girls' player of the year, totaled 52 goals and 32 assists for the Mustangs this season. Her 32 assists and 136 points this season place her in the top 10 single-season totals in VHSL girls soccer history. The Shenandoah University signee's career totals of 113 goals and 91 assists (missing the 2020 season because of COVID) place Bruce among the all-time top players in goals and assists in VHSL history.

Shaver led Eastern Montgomery (22-0) to its third-straight Class 1 state title with a 2-1 win over Auburn, with the decisive goal coming in the third overtime period. The Mustangs have now won 54 straight games. Shaver has a four-record of 68-3 since taking over the Mustangs program



Six Hokies earn preseason Al

Phil Steele's College Football Preview released its preseason All-ACC teams, and the Hokies landed six players on the preseason squads.

Wide receiver Jaylin Lane was named to the second team as a punt returner and fourth team as a wide receiver. Defensive end Antwaun Powell-Ryland was named to the third team defense while Peter Moore was named third team punter. The Hokies had three other elections to the fourth team, running back Bhayshul Tuten, linebacker Keli Lawson and punt returner Tucker Holloway.

Lane tallied 69 receptions for 940

yards and five touchdowns last season at Middle Tennessee State. He led the team with four 100-yard receiving games. In three years with the Blue Raiders, Lane registered 124 receptions for 1,528 yards. He also returned 38 career punts for 457 yards and a touchdown.

Powell-Ryland, a Portsmouth, Virginia native, appeared in 27 games at Florida, making five starts and totaling 34 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 7.5 tackles for loss, one pass breakup and three forced fumbles. He recorded 29 tackles including three sacks last season.

Moore attempted 73 punts totaling

3,042 yards (41.7-yard average). He placed 24 punts inside the 20 and delivered 17 beyond 50 yards, including his season long of 67 yards. Tuten was a third-team FCS All-American as a sophomore last year for North Carolina A&T, where he ran for 1,363 yards and 13 touchdowns and caught 31 passes for 342 yards and four more touchdowns. He topped the 100-yard rushing mark 10 times in 2022.

Lawson recorded 23 tackles (11 solo), one interception, one pass breakup and a fumble recovery last season. He returned his first career interception for a

touchdown against Georgia Tech.

Holloway played in five games as a freshman, fielding nine punts totaling 191 return yards (21.2-yard average). He set the Virginia Tech program record for single-game punt return yardage on Nov. 5, 2022, against Georgia Tech (188 yards, 7 returns), scoring his first career touchdown on a 90-yard return and earning ACC Specialist of the Week

Program for underrepresented undergraduate students in STEM receives NIH funding

Alexandra Hanlon, director of the Virginia Tech Center for Biostatistics and Health Data Science, was recently awarded a \$1.25 million grant from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) for a summer program aimed at promoting and diversifying the field of collaborative biostatistics.

The Collaborative Undergraduate Biostatistics Experience (CUBE), an eight-week summer program geared toward underrepresented undergraduate students, will receive \$250,000 per year over the next five years through the NIH Research Education Program.

This R25 award, which is funded in a joint effort from the National Institute on Drug Abuse and the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, is specifically targeted toward enhancing data science research training in addiction

CUBE, which was piloted in the summer of 2022 and highlighted in the

April 2023 edition of Amstat News, is built on four pillars: training in introductory biostatistics, training in R programming, professional development, and a collaborative research project addressing research questions in various disciplines.

"There's no program like this in the country - not even close," said Hanlon. "There are summer programs in biostatistics, but none like ours that heavily emphasize professional development, including communication and technical writing; the technical aspects of R programming delivered in tandem with the corresponding biostatistics training modules; and an interactive collaborative research project that includes the mentorship of a clinical investigator."

This year's program — which is also funded by the integrated Translational Health Research Institute of Virginia, Merck, and Virginia Tech's Fralin Life Sciences Institute and Institute for Society,

Culture, and Environment — runs from June 5-July 28.

In addition to earning a \$4,800 stipend, students enrolled in CUBE are provided with free housing. They are also afforded the opportunity to work closely with experienced collaborative biostatisticians, leading experts in the areas of addiction, and peer and graduate student mentors as they learn about the challenges of communicating and working collaboratively in a multidisciplinary team science environment.

Through CUBE, underrepresented undergraduate students receive introduction to the world of collaborative biostatistics, opening up career pathways that they never knew existed. After participating in the CUBE pilot program in 2022, Kayla Williams, a recent graduate of Ohio State University, now plans to pursue her Ph.D. in biostatistics at Drexel University this fall.

'We need diversification in collaborative

biostatistics," Hanlon said. "The number of students in STEM continues to grow, but the percentage of underrepresented students remains very low.'

While the pilot program included just four students — two housed at Virginia Tech and two at the University of Virginia — and this year's group features five students, the funding from this NIH grant will allow CUBE to expand to 10 students hosted at Virginia Tech each summer through 2027.

Still, Hanlon would like the program to grow even further to continue to raise awareness of collaborative biostatistics and diversity in the field. The ultimate goal is to expand the program nationally through multiple funding institutions across the country with centralized resources at

Virginia Tech. We want to sustain CUBE for a long,

long time," said Hanlon.

Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine to establish Department of Neurosurgery

The Virginia Tech Board of Visitors has approved the establishment of a Department of Neurosurgery at Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine, which will enhance neurosurgical education for medical students and make a lasting impact on the Roanoke and New River valleys. The new department will help advance the field of neurosurgery with cutting-edge research while addressing the growing demand for specialized care

The Department of Neurosurgery will be instituted with the approval of the State Council for Higher Education for

Virginia (SCHEV).

"The creation of a new Department of Neurosurgery will be a significant milestone in the growth of the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine. Over the past decade and within the Department of Surgery, Carilion Clinic expanded its neurosurgery program to include experts in adult, pediatric, endovascular, and complex spinal neurosurgery," said Lee Learman, dean of the medical school. "These faculty are actively engaged in the education and research missions of the medical school. They instruct Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine medical students and neurosurgery residents and collaborate with researchers at the Fralin Biomedical Research Institute at VTC and the Virginia Tech School of Neuroscience. The program has now grown to the size that it can become organized as its own academic department, as is the case in

most U.S. medical schools." When it became fully integrated as the ninth college at Virginia Tech in 2018, the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine had 11 departments nine clinical and two non-clinical —

including the Department of Surgery, which contained 11 sections, or specialty areas that required specific education and training, including neurosurgery. Leaders from the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine and Carilion Clinic, seeing the demand for the existing neurosurgery specialty and residency program, along with the needs of the region, determined a standalone department was critical.

Michael Nussbaum, chair of the Department of Surgery, expressed excitement about the potential impact of the new department on the region. "The addition of a dedicated Department of Neurosurgery will strengthen our ability to provide comprehensive care to patients in need," he said. "By integrating neurosurgery education into our medical curriculum to a greater degree, we are investing in the future of health care in this region and advancing the level of specialized care available." Neurosurgery, a branch of medicine

focused on the prevention, diagnosis, and surgical treatment of disorders affecting the nervous system, has witnessed remarkable advancements in recent years. By establishing the Department of Neurosurgery, Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine aims to equip future

physicians with the skills and knowledge necessary to address complex neurological conditions and deliver high-quality care. The new department will expand clinical rotations and elective opportunities for students at the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine. It will also enhance post-medical school residency training by potentially providing additional residency positions. The neurosurgery residency

program at Carilion Clinic - Virginia

Tech Carilion School of Medicine

currently offers one position per year for a

total of seven residents at any given time. During 2021-22, the program received 245 applications for the neurosurgery

residency position. With the establishment of the Department of Neurosurgery, the region is poised to witness a transformation in neurological care. By growing the cadre of highly skilled neurosurgeons, the region will experience an increase in specialized expertise, supporting improved patient outcomes and access to care. The presence of a dedicated department will also enhance research opportunities, attracting grants and funding to support innovative projects. This will not only contribute to the scientific community but also stimulate economic growth in the region.

Carilion Clinic's new neurosurgery chair, a renowned clinical and academic leader, will be appointed as the medical school academic chair after SCHEV

approval of the department. A nonphysician vice president of neurosurgery from Carilion and a full-time research associate will support the administrative and academic success of the department. The department would be established with nine physician neurosurgery faculty

"Demand for neurosurgical services continues to increase, and adding a new academic department will continue the great momentum happening with health sciences in our region," said Nancy Howell Agee, Carilion Clinic's chief executive officer. "Specifically, it will mean enhanced care for our patients and new opportunities for clinical trials, research, ground-breaking innovations, and academic growth, all of which contribute to our region's growing reputation as a health care hub."
